# MINUTES

# June 27th, 1961

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in Committee Room 712, The United Church House, Toronto, at 9:30 a.m., Tuesday, June 27th. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Rev. E. E. M. Joblin was appointed Minute Secretary.

A welcome was extended to Rev. R. K. Shorten, as this was his first Executive neeting since his appointment as Assistant Secretary of the Board.

Present: Revs. W. M. Mustard, M. C. Macdonald, E. E. M. Joblin, George Morrison, R. K. Shorten, Emerson G. Knowles, R. Douglas Smith, Messrs. Ralph S. Mills and E. D. Kingsbury. Mr. Hugh D. Campbell attended as a corresponding member.

Regrets were received from Rev. H. M. Denning and Messrs. Arthur Webster and J. W. Frid.

#### Communications

The Secretary presented a letter from the Synod of Bermuda thanking the Board for its generous action in assisting the work of two circuits recently re-arranged.

### Resolutions

- 1. It was requested that sympathy on behalf of the Executive be extended to the following: Mrs. Forbes, on the death of her husband, Rev. J. Arthur Forbes; the family of the late Rev. John F. G. - 2. Congratulations on their election to the presidency of their respective Conferences were extended to: Rev. D. M. Sinclair, Maritimes; Rev. John Hurst, Montreal and Ottawa; Rev. E. G. Kelloway, Bay of Quinte; Rev. Robert Oliver, Hamilton; Rev. D. G. Ray, Manitoba.

- (ii) Approval was given for the continuation of services of Miss Dorothy Naylor, following her marriage this summer, at Exmouth Street, Saint John.
- 3. The appointment of Mr. G. F. McAuslan as Lay Supply for the New Industrial Charge, Niagara Presbytery, was confirmed.
  - 4. Oriental Work: Confirmation of the following was approved:
- (i) Hamilton, Chinese: Mrs. Marian Chen—weekend basis at rate of \$23.00 per week; Board to pay travel costs from Toronto to Hamilton and return, plus cost of meals.
- (ii) Moose Jaw, Chinese: Rev. Pui Sam Mo; to be transferred from Victoria, B.C.

#### Oriental Work

Toronto Chinese: Mr. Morrison reported on meetings with the Board and Minister of the Chinese Church at which he, Dr. MacKay, Superintendent of Missions, and Mr. Davenport were present. In view of certain situations which, in the judgment of these representatives, were unsatisfactory—especially in regard to young people's work, it was decided that both Minister and Congregation be notified that the whole matter would be under review at the Annual Meeting of the Board in the spring of 1962 and any necessary action will then be taken.

# Church Extension Director, Ottawa Presbytery

- It was agreed to approve the appointment of Rev. Norman Coll, D.D., as Church Extension Director for Ottawa Presbytery, July 1st, 1961; terms of appointment to be as follows:
  - (i) Two-thirds of time to be devoted to Church Extension Work and one-third to duties as Secretary of Presbytery.
  - (ii) Salary to be at rate of \$4,000, of which the Board's share would be \$3,250.
  - (iii) Office space in St. Marc's Church, Ottawa, now used by the Superintendent of Missions, to be made available rent free until December 31st, 1963. (The \$250 per year credited by the Board on loan to St. Marc's to be regarded as rent of office as formerly).
  - (iv) Equipment of present Superintendent of Missions to remain in office.
    - (v) Appointment to be reviewed at end of two years.
- 2. It was proposed that Dr. Macdonald, Dr. Smith and Mr. Macmillan have conference with Dr. Coll and certain representatives of Ottawa Presbytery representing Church Extension interests.

# Toronto, Police Court Chaplaincy

A letter was submitted from Dr. MacKay containing the suggestion that a Hostel might be provided for the use of Police Court Chaplain, with the suggestion that Barbara House might be secured for that purpose. It was agreed that the Executive ask Toronto Home Missions Council to examine this possibility, with the understanding that it would be given sympathetic consideration by this Board.

# Hospital Chaplaincies

Saskatoon Chaplamcy: Request for adjustment in breakdown in total allowance of \$6,000 as between salary, travel allowance and housing allowance. It was agreed that we pay according to scale set by this Board, leaving Presbytery free to divide it as it wishes.

### Rural Work

Approval was given to the request for confirmation of payment of \$50 from 1961 account, this being balance of amount voted for 1960 for Lay Supply Training School, Five Oaks, Paris, Ont.

# Larger Parishes and Pilot Projects

1. Muskoka United Church: Superintendent of Missions reports request by Official Board that Presbytery be asked to set up a small independent Commission to study the situation. It was agreed to ask Presbytery to set up a Commission of five, Rev. F. L. H. Stymiest, Superintendent of Missions, and Rev. Emerson G. Knowles, being named by this Board, and the other three to be named by Presbytery.

- 2. Kamsack Larger Area Project: Recommendations of Special Committee of Presbytery:
  - (1) That for the new pastoral year the Kamsack Area Project continue under the direction of the Presbytery Committee appointed; that the identity of the present four charges be maintained and that a unified budget be approved; and that the Home Mission Board be requested to make the grants listed (see below). (It will be noted that the total of these is \$1500 less than the total of the grants at present provided by the H.M.B. and the W.M.S.). Further, that the four official Boards meet jointly as an Area Project Council as required.
  - (2) That the Kamsack Area Project include the areas of the present charges of Cote, Pelly, Togo and Kamsack, and that the presiding minister be the minister of the Kamsack charge; other workers to include: Miss Manning, resident in Kamsack; Mr. Soles, resident for at least the first year in Pelly; a worker to be resident at the Cote Mission.
  - (3) That a request be made for a worker to have special responsibility on the Cote Reservation; to live on the Reservation and to take part in the team ministry of the Kamsack Larger Area Project, and that it is preferable that he have training in Social Work.
  - (4) That all workers take preaching services over the whole area on a rotating basis and that there be opportunity for the outlying points to have a regular administration of the Sacraments by the minister.
  - (5) That Cote be represented on the Committee (Presbytery) as well as Togo, Pelly and Kamsack.
  - (6) That the major responsibility of the Kamsack minister be to the Kamsack congregation, with general supervision over the project; that the major responsibility of Miss Manning be for Christian Education Promotion; and that the major responsibility of Mr. Soles be for pastoral care.

A grant of \$8,200 is requested from July 1, to be applied as follows: Kamsack (MO) \$500 on travel; deaconess, \$200 salary plus \$1,200 travel; secretary, \$1,000; Pelly (MLS), \$1,100 travel; Cote (MLS), \$3,200 salary plus \$1,000 travel.

(Kamsack provides minister's salary \$4,000, plus \$510 travel, and H.M.B. is asked to provide \$500 travel for supervision of Larger Area Project; Deaconess' salary to be \$3,500, plus \$1,200 travel; Mr. Soles, Pelly—salary \$3,200, plus \$1,200 travel; Lay Supply, Cote—salary \$3,200, plus \$1,000 travel; Secretary—salary \$1,000.)

These were approved in principle for one year—the Secretaries to consider details (e.g. travel) and report to next Executive.

# Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

- 1. Church of All Nations, Montreal: Re shortage claimed by Rev. John Roberts over three-year period. It was agreed (a) that the Secretaries be authorized to pay the deficit for 1960, when the correct amount is ascertained; (b) that Dr. Macdonald, Dr. R. Douglas Smith and Rev. K. G. MacMillan be requested to look into the matter of deficits for previous years, with the idea that a grant might be made on compassionate grounds; and (c) that this committee consider the possibility of separating the Slavic congregation from the present institutional set-up.
- 2. Toronto, Fred Victor Mission: Agreed that the following be suggested as the Constitution of Fred Victor Mission, on the understanding that the Toronto Home Missions Council and the Board of Evangelism and Social Service be submitted drafts of the document:
- "1. In accord with the direction of The Manual, Section 304, the Board of Home Missions shall have final authority in all matters of policy and operation.
- "2. There shall be a Board of Directors of 21 members appointed by the Board of Home Missions from the following sources:
  - (a) Four nominees of the Board of Home Missions (including one Secretary).
  - (b) Four nominees of The Toronto Home Missions Council, of whom at least one shall be a member of the Executive.
  - (c) Two nominees of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service.
  - (d) The Co-Superintendent of Home Missions in charge of this phase of work.
  - (e) Eight nominees of the Toronto East Presbytery (not necessarily its members).
  - (f) The Co-Superintendents of Fred Victor Mission.
- "3. The Chairman of the Board shall be appointed by the Board of Home Missions.
- "4. The Board of Directors shall meet at least once per year.
- "5. There shall be 5 Advisory Committees related to the separate phases of the Mission work, each comprised of 5 members including the Chairman, who must be a member of the Board of Directors. These Committees are the following:—
  - (a) Family Work. This includes Chapel and other services, Sunday School, mid-week activities and welfare work related thereto.
  - (b) Transient Work.

- (c) Senior Citizens Work.
- (d) Welfare Industries.
- (e) Property and Finance. This includes all property matters and all accounting and financial matters involved in the four main areas of work.
- "6. The Advisory Committees shall meet at least five times per year on regular times in the month and shall report to the Board of Directors and be subject to that body."

# Interim Arrangements

In the transition period (i.e., for the present and unless there is revision by the Board of Homé Missions), the following interim arrangements shall obtain:

- (a) The Family Work (5 (a) above) and Transient Work (5 (b) above) shall be carried on in that part of the Building dedicated in September, 1960, under the direction of Dr. W. A. Hunnisett.
- (b) The Senior Citizens Work (5 (c) above) and Welfare Industries (5 (d) above) shall be carried on in that part of the Building completed in 1961, under the direction of Dr. J. I. MacKay.
- (c) Dr. W. A. Hunnisett and Dr. J. I. MacKay shall be designated as Co-Superintendents.
- (d) It is suggested and hoped that a majority of those at present on the Fred Victor Mission Advisory Board shall be included in the nominations of directors by the Toronto East Presbytery.
- (e) Two members of the present Fred Victor Mission Advisory Board shall be members of the Property and Finance Advisory Committee (5 (e) above).
- 3. Toronto, St. Christopher House: Agreed to the proposal to incorporate the Board of Directors of St. Christopher House, on the understanding that in no way prejudices the authority this Board has in the operation of the House, as provided by the Manual.
- 4. Toronto, Queen Street United Church: Approval was given to the request for grant towards salary of part-time German-Speaking Secretary; suggestion being that congregation pay \$75 a month and Board an equal amount.
- 5. Sault Ste. Marie, All People's Church. No action was taken on the question of recompense for loss of earnings because of attendance at meeting of representatives of congregation in Toronto, April 17th.
- 6. Winnipeg, Ukrainian Work. Mr. Morrision made a progress report with regard to the integration of the Ukrainian work with the North Winnipeg Mission.

7. St. Paul's-Avenue Road, Toronto: Request for grant of \$3,000 towards salary, plus living quarters and travel allowance, to assist with youth work. Secretaries and Superintendent have authority to give assistance if, after investigation, they feel it is justified—to report to the Sub-Executive.

# Manse Furnishings

1. Point Edward-Blackwell, Lambton Presbytery: The Point Edward congregation has undertaken to provide a new manse, towards which the Home Mission Board voted a grant of \$3,000 and the Charge was given to understand that consideration would be given to a grant for furnishings. Since then, however, salary offered by combined charge is \$3,900 plus \$800 travel.

A grant of \$650 is requested towards total cost of \$2,185, towards which the W.A. at each point has undertaken to contribute \$750. Referred to Secretaries and Superintendent.

- 2. Empress, South Alberta Presbytery: Application for grant of \$750, towards cost of furnishings for new manse in process of construction. Superintendent states furniture in old manse is very dilapidated. Approval to pay \$750 if Mr. Stade has made a commitment, but make it clear that interpretation given was correct.
- 3. Brentwood, Victoria Presbytery: Presbytery requests grant of \$750 towards furnishings costing \$900, to be purchased for rented manse, with the idea that, later, when manse is bought or built, additional furnishings costing over \$1,500 would be purchased. Approval was given to pay \$450 now and the balance at a later date, if requested.

# Language Papers

- 1. Grant for Canadian Ranok (Ukrainian) was voted by the Board to June 30th only.
- Mr. Morrison reported on current status of Ranok negotiations, Editorial cost of July-August issue is provided in grant to June 30th; printing cost of this issue to be met by grant.
- A progress report on the continuance of Ranok indicated the possibility of its publication under other auspices but with a partial grant from our Board if we were satisfied with the content. A further report is to be given at the Sub-Executive.
- 2. "Credo"—Through a misunderstanding, the grant voted by the Board of Home Missions in April was \$1,200, as it was reported that the Board of Information and Stewardship was paying \$500 and the W.M.S. \$800. Neither of these Boards has as yet voted any grant. It was agreed to authorize payment of the \$2,500 required, on the understanding that we would negotiate with the W.M.S. regarding the possibility of paying a share of this total grant.

# Fund For Retired Workers

Re Mr. Herbert Goodland: Agreed to the recommendation that allowance be continued at the rate of \$420.

# Licenses to Administer Sacraments

1. At the request of the Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee, it was agreed to recommend to the General Council or its Executive that all candidates and lay supplies appointed to regular pastoral charges for the 1961-62 Conference year be licensed to administer the Sacrament of Baptism. # Hospital Work

- 1. Bella Coola General Hospital: It was agreed to confirm the reappointment of Mr. C. Urseth and Mr. C. Allertson, and the appointment of Mr. Andy Siwallace and Mr. Andy Schooner, as members of the Hospital Board.
- 2. R. W. Large Memorial Hospital, Bella Bella: (a) Constitution: Agreed to approve certain minor changes and to forward the revised Constitution to Dr. G. E. Darby for submission to the B.C.H.I.S. in Victoria, B.C., for final approval. (b) Board: Continuation of the present Board was authorized, pending approval of the Constitution.
- 3. The Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton: Re Bank Overdraft: On motion, the following resolution was adopted:
- Be It Resolved: That the Reverend Harold W. Boyd, John E. Whiting, M.D., and James G. Evans, M.D., or any two of them, be and are hereby authorized for and in the name of The Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton, B.C., from time to time to borrow money from The Royal Bank of Canada, Hazelton, B.C., either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000).
- 4. Queen Charlotte Islands General Hospital: (a) Holiday Supply: Agreed to approve the employment of Dr. Eldon Lee as holiday supply for six weeks; remuneration to be at the rate of \$600 a month, plus housing accommodation and payment of return fare for himself and Mrs. Lee, to be paid from the Medical Services Fund.
- (b) Constitution: Agreed to approve the revised Constitution, already approved by the Sub-Executive of General Council, and that the revised copy be forwarded to the B.C.H.I.S., Victoria, B.C., for its approval. (c) Board: Agreed to approve continuance of the present Hospital Board as an Interim Board, pending final approval of the Hospital Constitution.

# **Education Grant**

In response to the enquiry as to whether Rev. D. L. Holtzman, Forest Charge, Brandon Presbytery, is eligible for an Education Grant for his son, the Executive expressed the opinion that, since this student will live at home and has only a distance of nine miles to commute to Brandon College each day, no grant could be given.

#### Indian Work

- 1. Cree Bible Dictionary: It was agreed to subsidize the purchase of Cree Bible Dictionaries up to a number of 200 at \$1.00 each, the purchaser to pay \$1.00 per copy.
- 2. Edmonton Residential School: The re-appointment of Mr. A. E. Caldwell as Acting Principal was approved for a six months' period, to December 31, 1961.
- 3. Re representation at Vacation Seminar in August, 1962, Cape Dorset, Baffin Island, N.W.T., sponsored by the Indian-Eskimo Association in co-operation with the Department of Northern Affairs: Agreed to confirm the nomination of Mrs. Ralph S. Mills and to give assistance up to \$275 towards expenses.
- 4. Morley Residential School, Alberta: Agreed to authorize a contribution of \$1,000 for the purchase of band instruments, to be paid from the Indian Work Account.

# Provision of Furnished Manses for Single Ministers

In reference to Section 104 (a) of The Manual, when single ordained ministers are settled on pastoral charges, it was agreed that the following policy be adopted for aid-receiving charges:

- (a) If there is no manse available, the Board of Home Missions will assist the pastoral charge in providing the Minister with a rental allowance up to \$75.00 per month for one year. At the end of the year, the Board will make available the normal grant and/or loan for a new Manse.
- (b) Each situation will be dealt with on its merits.
- (c) A furniture grant up to \$500.00 on a dollar for dollar basis will be provided on the settlement of a single ordained minister, with the understanding that this will be increased by \$250.00 (for Manses being furnished for the first time) when a Married Ordained Minister occupies the Manse.
- (d) It was agreed that the above policy apply in the cases before the Executive, namely: Balmoral, Saskatoon Presbytery, and Bendale, Toronto East Presbytery.
- (e) In the case of Clute-Island Falls, Cochrane Preshtyery, it was agreed to make available a grant at the rate of \$700.00 towards rental of \$900.00 for heated quarters.

# Car Subsidy

The case of Rev. Clinton N. Howard, Reston-Pipestone Charge, Brandon Presbytery, was considered and it was agreed to make available a loan of \$500.00 towards purchase of a car.

# Moving Expenses

- 1. Basis re Ordinands: Agreed to the use of the following basis for establishing the amount to be paid for travelling expenses of an Ordinand and his family when he drives his own car: That the allowance be five cents per mile for the distance travelled (most direct route), plus cost of meals at up to \$5.00 per day for each adult, and up to \$3.00 per day for each child, exclusive of infants, and cost of overnight accommodation at from \$8.00 to \$12.00 per night for family; this to be based on a per day rate of travel of 400 miles.
- 2. Agreed to vote a grant of \$250.00, on compassionate grounds, towards moving expenses from Saskatchewan to Ontario of Mr. J. E. Fellows, candidate from Toronto Centre Presbytery, who served as Lay Supply for one year at Bradwell, Sask.

#### French Work

It was agreed to vote a grant up to \$300 towards cost of bringing a French Evangelist from Europe to conduct missions in the Montreal and Ottawa Conference; it being understood that assistance would be available, also, from the Board of Evangelism and Social Service.

# Real Property

A committee consisting of Rev. G. M. Morrison, Mr. E. D. Kingsbury and Mr. H. D. Campbell was appointed (a) to bring in a definition of what constitutes Real Property of the Board; and (b) to study question of re-appraisal and depreciation for purposes of the Board's records; report to be made at the next meeting of the Executive.

# Church Extension

Policy of Assistance. The following amendments were approved:

- 1. Grant for Church or Church Hall-
  - (a) \$2,000 where cost of building is under \$50,000. \$2,500 where cost of building is from \$50,000 up but under \$75,000.
    - \$3,000 where cost of building is from \$75,000 up.
  - (b) Minimum grant of \$2,000 may be advanced when site is purchased. If building, when erected, qualifies for a larger grant application may be made for balance.

- 2. \$125,000 earmarked for 1961 to provide grants to Local Church Extension Councils or Presbytery Church Extension.
- 3. Where a Church Extension congregation is calling a minister for the first time, and where the salary is up to \$3,800, there shall be no penalty against the grant for a manse, and where the salary is from \$3,800 to \$4,100 the grant shall be reduced by the amount of salary in excess of \$3,800.
- 4. All sections of the Policy of Assistance regulations will operate currently in 1961.
- 5. If guaranteed amount of \$400,000 from Missionary & Maintenance is not fully expended on grants as set out above, loans can be made from any balance to local Church Extension Councils or to Presbytery Church Extension Committees. These loans will bear interest at 4½% and normally be of 3 years' duration.

# French Work, Ste. Anne Des Monts, Quebec

A communication was received from the Rev. J. R. McCullough of Murdochville, with regard to the situation at Ste. Anne des Monts. It was agreed that Rev. Carson Duquette be asked to investigate the situation and, if it seems justified, after meeting Mr. McCullough and subject to approval of Presbytery, the latter be asked to make further investigation.

# **Property**

# PEACE RIVER

Dawson City, Yukon—Agreed in principle to sale of former Methodist Church site to the Government of the Yukon Territory for \$500 as site for a Senior Citizens' Home; matter of transfer and negotiations to be referred to the proper Courts of the Church.

# PRINCE RUPERT

Hazelton, Addition to Hospital—Draft of the Construction Contract was submitted and the Secretary was instructed to forward to Dr. Whiting two changes suggested by Mr. R. S. Mills, Q.C.:

- (1 Page 12, Article 37, second paragraph, two corrections as follows: (i) the phrase "at the Owner's Expense" should read "at his own expense". (ii) the small "c" in "contractor" as it now stands would refer to the separate contractor, where a capital "C" would refer to your Contractor, who is the person who should pay and satisfy.
- (2) Page 13, Article 42, third paragraph: after the phrase "to apply to the cost of arbitration", there should be added a sentence as follows: "If security is not provided, Court action may be taken".

# Church Extension

# FREDERICTON

Oromocto, Church—Subject to Presbytery's approval of the application of Oromocto Charge for a further loan of \$28,350, urgently required to meet the indebtedness to the Contractor, the following action was taken:

- (a) That the Board of Home Missions out of its Church Extension funds make available the sum of \$28,350 as a short-term loan repayable December 31st, 1961, bearing interest at 4½%.
- (b) That if on December 31st, 1961, the Congregation will repay a total amount of \$24,000, then the Board will regard the balance of the loan in the amount of \$4,350 as a special emergency grant.
- (c) That if the Oromocto Congregation will repay the above-mentioned loan of \$24,000 by December 31st, 1961, then no interest will be charged on any portion of this short-term loan.
- (d) That the Secretaries be instructed as follows:
  - (i) To use the \$4,560 on deposit to the credit of Truro Presbytery as part of this short-term loan. This instruction is based on the action already taken by Truro Presbytery in releasing their funds so that the Board may use this money wherever it is urgently required.
  - (ii) To approach the neighbouring Presbytery of Woodstock to find out if it will consent to making available the \$4,690 on deposit to its credit for Extension work, in order to assist the very needy Oromocto Congregation.

# Letters of Sympathy

Smith, on the death of his wife; Rev. George Wright, on the death of his son; and Mrs. Rule, on the death of her husband, Mr. John Rule, Lay Supply, at Hornepayne, Ontario.

# Institutional Missions

- 1. Toronto, Queen Street—Church of All Nations: It was agreed to confirm the appointment of Dr. H. E. Campbell as Acting Superintendent, effective August 1st, 1961, with the understanding that he will assume such duties at the Toronto Harbour Commission Chaplaincy as are assigned to him by the Board and the Superintendent of Missions.
- 2. Hamilton, All People's Church: Information regarding the resignation of Mrs. George Robinson, which took effect August 31st, was received with regret; and the appointment of a successor was referred with power to the Secretaries and the Superintendent of Missions.

# Hospital Chaplaincies and Police Court Work

- 1. Pilot Projects: It was agreed to confirm July 1st as the date on which the Board's grant of one-half cost of Hospital Chaplaincies became operative.
- 2. Toronto: It was agreed: (a) That Rev. J. A. H. Hodgson be responsible for Police Court Work exclusively as of September 15th; and (b) that the Hospital for Tuberculosis be served by Rev. Gilbert Ivany as one of the three hospitals assigned to him, on the understanding that this Board will pay one-third of cost as its responsibility at the Hospital for Tuberculosis; the arrangement to be subject to approval of Toronto West Presbytery.

# Hospital Work

- 1. The Sub-Executive learned with regret of the illness of Dr. George E. Darby, Co-Ordinator of Church Hospitals, and requested the Secretaries to convey to him the heartfelt sympathy of the Board and its renewed appreciation for the exemplary Christian service he has rendered our Home Mission cause during his many years as a Medical Missionary.
  - 2. Queen Charlotte Islands General Hospital: Re signing officers:
- (a) Hospital Account: On motion, the following resolution was adopted. Be It Resolved: That Rev. William Bell, Dr. R. Bruce Palmer and Mrs. Haydn Turner, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of the Queen Charlotte Islands General Hospital, Queen Charlotte City, B.C., to sign cheques upon The Bank of Montreal, Prince Rupert, on behalf of the said Hospital;

Also That, the said William Bell, R. Bruce Palmer and Haydn Turner, or any two of the aforenamed, are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital Account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promisory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also, from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank, and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

And That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be and are hereby revoked.

(b) United Church Medical Services Fund: On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Be It Resolved: That Rev. William Bell, Dr. R. Bruce Palmer and Miss Velma Fairbairn, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of the United Church Medical Services Fund to sign cheques upon The Royal Bank of Canada, Prince Rupert, on behalf of the said United Church Medical Services Fund;

Also That, the said William Bell, R. Bruce Palmer and Velma Fairbairn, or any two of the aforenamed, are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Fund to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said United Church Medical Services Fund only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said

purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Fund, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and Negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also, from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said United Church Medical Services Fund and the Bank, and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balance and release.

And That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be and are hereby revoked.

# Indian Work

- 1. Brandon Residential School: It was agreed, subject to approval of Presbytery, to increase the grant for Christian Education to \$1,800 for the period July 1st, 1961, to June 30th, 1962.
- 2. Re Autoboggans: It was agreed that the basis for payment of depreciation allowance, effective for the conference year 1961-62, be as follows: that the Board provide a depreciation allowance at the rate of \$150 a year to a minister owning and operating an autoboggan.
- 3. Re Propane Gas: It was agreed that, effective for the conference year 1961-62, the Board (a) pay the charges on each cylinder in excess of \$6.00, and (b) continue to pay the deposit of \$30 per cylinder.
- 4. Vancouver: Agreed, subject to approval of Presbytery, to confirm the appointment of Mr. Robert T. Sullivan, succeeding Miss Ruth Honegger; Mr. Sullivan to be paid by W.M.S. at S.L.S. rate of \$3,000, plus city car allowance, with the understanding the Secretaries be authorized to provide rent allowance, if necessary, from Home Mission funds.
- 5. Education Grant: Agreed that assistance (estimated at \$750) be made available from the Maude Raley Memorial Fund and Eleanor Hemmings Legacy for leadership training at Naramata for Mr. C. Robinson, elder of Hartley Bay congregation.

# Forest Fire Situation, Newfoundland

Dr. Macdonald reported on the situation created by forest fires in Newfoundland. Its was agreed to confirm the Secretaries' action in forwarding \$500 to the Superintendent of Missions to be used for relief work at his discretion, and to authorize increase in amount up to \$1,000 if required.

# 4 Milla eth French Work St. Anne Des Monts, Quebec

Dr. Macdenald reported on a communication received from Ste. Anne Des Monts regarding opening of work by the United Church in

this area and stated that Rev. Carson Duquette had been sent to evaluate the situation. Authority was given to the Secretaries and Superintendent to take action, if deemed advisable following the report from Presbytery and Mr. Duquette.

# Church Extension Work

Ottawa Presbytery: It was agreed that, in addition to grant already approved for Rev. Norman Coll, Church Extension Director (salary \$3,000, travel \$250), a grant at \$300 for office maintenance be provided, all of which is effective from August 15th, 1961.

# Fund For Retired Workers

It was agreed that an allowance of \$25 per month from the Fund for Retired Workers be made to Mr. Herbert Lander from September 1st, 1961.

# Language Publications

It was agreed to vote a grant up to \$500, to December 31st, towards cost of publication of German language paper, to be entitled "The Open Door".

  - (b) Loan \$15,000 to Fredericton Presbytery for Oromocto Church, and Grant \$5,000 to Oromocto Congregation.

Oromocto, Manse—(a) It was agreed to transfer from Property Fund to Church Extension Fund the loan and grant voted by Executive in June 1960 and renewed by Executive in June 1961.

(b) Authority was given to reduce amount of assistance to a maximum loan of \$3,500 and a grant of \$2,500, in view of information that manse will not cost over \$14,000 instead of the \$20,000 previously estimated.

- (b) Trinity Institutional Church, Calgary—Power was given to the Secretaries to increase grant for salary and travel for additional worker appointed to staff, pending official application from Presbytery.
- (c) St. John's Hall, Quebec—The Secretary reported on the action taken at its last meeting by the Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery. In view of this action, the Executive requests that:
  - (i) The Local Board of St. John's Hall convene at the earliest possible date so it may consult with representatives of the Board of Home Missions, in view of the suggestion made to relocate and rebuild the Hall.
  - (ii) Two representatives of Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery be invited to participate in such a meeting, one of whom shall be the Home Mission Convener.
  - (iii) The Board of Home Missions representatives give a report to the next meeting of the Executive, or, failing that, to the Annual Meeting in April.

(iv) If the consultation results in a recommendation to consider relocating and rebuilding, the Board of Home Missions indicate the degree of priority capital assistance to this project would have on the list of demands being made on its property and project funds.

- (d) Finnish Radio Work, Port Arthur—It was agreed to provide up to \$500 to finance the continued radio service for 1961-62.
- (e) Brunswick Street, Halifax—It was agreed to provide up to \$200 for relief work to the end of the year.
- (f) All People's, Hamilton—Confirmation was granted for the appointment of Mr. Paul Dempsey and authorization for salary of \$3,000, plus travel at \$250, from September 24th, 1961, salary and travel to be paid by W.M.S.
- (g) Queent St. Church of All Nations, Toronto-German Congregation-
  - (i) The Secretary reported that the Rev. Hans Gruppe had tendered his resignation as Minister of the German Congregation of the Queen St. Church of All Nations. Authority was given to the Secretaries to confer with representatives of the Presbytery concerned regarding the presentation of the problem to Presbytery. If Presbytery accepted the resignation and requested the Board of Home Missions to find other work for Mr. Gruppe where his knowledge of German and English could be used, then the Secretaries were given authority to take the necessary steps to find employment for him.

Bruce Palmer and Mrs. Haydn Turner, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of the Queen Charlotte Islands General Hospital, Queen Charlotte City, B.C., to sign cheques upon the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, Queen Charlotte City, B.C., on behalf of the said Hospital, and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00). Also, That, the said the Rev. William Bell, Doctor R. Bruce Palmer and Mrs. Haydn Turner, or any two of the aforenamed, are hereby authorized, on behalf of the said Hospital, to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit to the said Hospital Account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, Cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to

- 3. It was requested that the Secretaries report to the Executive on January 31st, 1962.

# Indian

- 1. Approval was given to the re-appointment of Mr. A. E. Caldwell to Edmonton Residential School until the new Principal is appointed, or for a period of up to six months to June 30th.
- 2. Approval was given for the payment of vacation travel to Indian Lay Supplies serving in isloated areas, as follows:

# Sunday School in the Home

Rev. R. K. Shorten was appointed to replace Dr. Leng on the Committee of The Sunday School in the Home; Miss Highfield to represent us also.

In view of the probable large contribution to be made by the new Board, it was suggested that consideration be given to increased representation.

# Use of Aircraft

- (a) The Secretaries were given authority to spend up to \$300 for an on-the-spot survey for isolated Northern Saskatchewan communities, as requested by Prince Albert Presbytery.
- (b) The Secretaries were requested to present to the January Executive a statement of policy respecting the use of aircraft on Board business.

# Canadian Council of Churches

It was agreed to pay \$175 to the Canadian Council of Churches as the Board of Home Missions' share of 1961 contribution to the Committee on Missionary Education.

# Compassionate Grant

At the request of Kamloops-Okanagan Presbytery for a compassionate grant for Mr. G. M. Van Herwaarden, in view of the continued illness of his wife, it was agreed to pay \$175.

# Authorization for Conference of Institutional Workers for the Spring of 1962

Action was deferred until the January Executive, when Secretaries are to present information as to cost, to be determined in the light of prospects for increased grants for 1962.

# · Language Papers

Approval of special grant up to \$500 to December 31st, 1961, to assist Ukrainian Evangelical Alliance to establish "Evangelical Ranok", successor to "Canadian Ranok".

# Literature

Approval was given for the payment of \$750 in the Literature Account to cover unforeseen expenses to December 31st, 1961.

# French Work

- (a) Dr. Macdonald gave a progress report re Ste. Anne des Monts. It was agreed to express our concern and our willingness to support any reasonable proposition from the Committee, which is to meet in the near future, and that Rev. M. Ouellet and Rev. Robert Shorten should be asked to attend this meeting. It was recommended that Mr. Duquette should spend some time at Ste. Anne des Monts (at least a month).
- (b) Approved payment of \$125 travelling expenses to Rev. J. R. McCullough for transporting children to Pointe-aux-Trembles School.

(c) Alumni Association of Pointe-aux-Trembles. The Board of Home Missions commends the Alumni Association of Institut Français Evangelique, Point-aux-Trembles, for its initiative in promoting an appeal for \$100,000 to constitute a Loan of Honor Fund to assist promising pupils from our French Protestant constituency to further their education.

It is understood that in launching this appeal the Alumni Association has cleared with the proper authorities and of the Montreal and Ottawa Conference and the Board of Finance of The United Church of Canada and further that this will be a Special Names Campaign and not an appeal to individual congregations.

In commending this appeal, the Board of Home Missions not only wishes the Alumni Association every success in this enterprise but also draws the attention of those approached and concerned to the splendid work being done by the Institut Francais Evangelique, Point-aux-Trembles, the Alumni Association and our French Pastors in providing educational training, moral and spiritual influence among a promising group of young people who desire and deserve constructive and helpful leadership.

(d) Dr. Macdonald reported on a communication received from Mount Albert, Quebec.

# Division of Home Missions, National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.

Mr. Joblin was named our representative to attend the Assembly in Atlantic City on December 11th, 1961, it being understood that Miss Esther Highfield would be going as representative of the W.M.S.

# Basis for Advances for Grants, 1962

Approval was given for the payment of grants for the first quarter of 1962 at the present rates.

# **Education Grant**

After discussion of the request for an Education Grant for Rev. R. L. Norman of Dalston for his son to attend either Radio College of Canada or Ryerson Institute of Technology for a radio and T.V. course, authority was given to the Secretaries to provide such a grant if it is found that the course is comparable to a University course or a course at Teachers' College.

# **Holiday Travel**

The principle of procedure re holiday travel for men in isolated areas was approved and left to Secretaries, who should bring doubtful cases to the Executive.

# Fire Insurance

Approved reduction of 12% in rate of premium on insurance carried by Reed, Shaw & McNaught, subject to any adjustments necessary in the interests of public relations.

## VANCOUVER-WESTMINSTER

Vancouver-Westminster Metropolitan Council for Church Extension—Consideration was given to the Council's financial situation and the Executive took the following action:

- (a) The Council should continue to borrow locally, building up to a floating loan of \$100,000.
- (b) We should regard Vancouver as an emergency area in Church Extension, and would hope to provide grants up to \$25,000 each year under our Policy of Assistance if assistance from the Missionary and Maintenance Fund continues at the rate of \$400,000 per annum.

- (c) That \$150,000 of the existing total of loans (\$190,000) be renegotiated on an amortized basis over 5 years at 4½%; the balance of the loan, \$40,000, to bear simple interest and to be cancelled at the rate of \$10,000 per annum if the conditions in (d) and (e) below are met to the Board's satisfaction.
- (d) We urgently request that the Council make definite repayment arrangements with local congregations; that at least for all future loans firm repayment schedules should be set up; that in addition, the Council make every effort to firm up the repayment of existing loans.
- (e) That cancellation of loan, (c) above, and offer of grant, (b) above, be definitely conditional upon the Council revising its policy with respect to bank borrowing, and with respect to loan repayments from the congregations it assists.

# SUB-EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS MINUTES

December 8th, 1961

The Sub-Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the office of the Secretary, The United Church House, Toronto, at 12:00 noon on Friday, December 8th, 1961. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Present: Revs. W. M. Mustard, M. C. Macdonald, E. E. M. Joblin, George M. Morrison, Robert K. Shorten, Emerson G. Knowles, Messrs. Ralph S. Mills and E. D. Kingsbury.

Rev. E. E. M. Joblin was appointed Minute Secretary.

## French Work

1. Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute: On nomination of the two Presbyteries concerned, the following appointments to the Board of Management were approved:

Montreal Presbytery: Revs. E. G. Tenneson, Jacques Beaudon, J. E. Boucher, Matthieu Ouellet, Carson W. Duquette, W. Charles Pelletier, L. C. Edmonds, Messrs. Louis Perron, Robert A. Gordon, H. A. Lariviere, H. T. Findlay, B. H. Brown, Charles Amyot, Louis Foisy-Foley, Mrs. W. H. Rey, two representatives from the Woman's Missionary Society. Ex-officio: The Directress, Miss Regina Boucher; the Secretary of the Board of Home Mission, Rev. M. C. Macdonald; Chairman of Presbytery Home Mission Committee, Rev. R. Douglas Smith; and Superintendent of Home Missions, Rev. K. G. MacMillan; Ottawa Presbytery: Rev. Maurice E. Nerny.

- 2. Ste. Anne des Monts, Quebec: The Sub-Executive, having received a report on the meeting held at Metis Beach re Ste. Anne des Monts on November 23rd, recommends that:
  - (i) The terms of reference for Rev. Carson Duquette's work as French Evangelist at large include this part of the Province (which is now part of the Miramichi Presbytery)—the change to become effective as soon as possible.

- (ii) Rev. Carson Duquette be asked to go to Ste. Anne for a period of three or four weeks, beginning early in January, to live in the area and to see at first-hand what support there would be for work.
- (iii) Regular services be held in the homes of the people by the Minister from Murdochville over the next few months.
- (iv) Provision be made for a trial period for a lay teachermissionary in the French language to live in this community.
- (v) The possibility of establishing a school among the people definitely interested beginning September, 1962, be explored and an investigation be made of the measure of support that we are entitled to receive from the Department of Education of the Province of Quebec.
- (vi) Re-alignment be made of the work in this part of the Gaspe Peninsula to include the ministry of Ste. Anne des Monts along with that of Murdochville and the Gaspe-Cap-aux-Os Charge. This team ministry, with one ordained minister, a lay minister, and a teacher-missionary serving the whole area with the widest possible ministry and with the most efficient use of manpower.
- (vii) We approve work done at Ste. Anne to date and provision be made for its continuance from Murdochville for the interim period.
- (viii) Reimbursement for travel and costs involved in the work to date by our local minister be made in the amount of \$150.
  - (ix) (a) Monthly grants be made for travel to Mr. McCullough at the rate of \$35 beginning November, 1961.
    - (b) Monthly grants be made for welfare, social service work at the rate of \$15 beginning November, 1961.

## Congratulations and Greetings

It was agreed to send congratulations and greetings to the ministers and congregations of the following:

- (a) The Hungarian United Church, Montreal, on their 35th Anniversary.
- (b) Robertson Church, Winnipeg, on their 60th Anniversary.

## Transportation Expenses

At the request of Wesley Congregation of the Synod of Bermuda for assistance in transportation expenses in the event that an invitation is extended to Rev. L. Rex Pedlow of Belfast, Ireland, it was agreed to apply the same rule as for ministers coming to Canada from the Old Country.

## B.C. Marine Planning Conference .

It was agreed to pay up to \$50 for travel costs for the Marine Planning Conference to be held at Kelsey Bay in January, 1962.

## Hospital Work

It was agreed to confirm the purchase of a Bell and Howell 16 mm Projector for Bella Coola General Hospital at the reduced price of \$575, \$287 to be taken from the Medical Services Fund.

## Bequest From Estate of F. A. Blain of Saskatoon

It was agreed to use the bequest received from the Estate of the late F. A. Blain of Saskatoon in the amount of \$2,819.74 to furnish the new Church at Hurricane Hills (Indian).

## Fund-Raising Service

It was agreed to enter into negotiations with the Board of Finance to see if it is reasonable from their standpoint to co-ordinate our fund-raising service with that of the Board of Finance, Mr. Morrison to be made a member of the Committee of Direction.

## National Council of Churches

Agreed to a grant of \$2,400 from the new Board of Home Missions to the Division of Home Missions of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.

## School For Lay Supplies

A progress report was made by the Secretaries on arrangements for a School for Lay Supplies this coming summer. In view of the large number eligible to attend such a School and also to save overhead cost, it was decided to hold a School at Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, for up to thirty lay supplies who now serve in the Conferences from Ontario east to Newfoundland (it being understood that a similar School will be in one of the Western centres for the four Western Conferences in 1963). Authority was given to the Secretaries to complete all arrangements for the School, in such matters as staff, boarding arrangements, dates and supply provision for fields that will be vacated by Lay Supplies attending the School. An estimated net cost for this School is \$12,000.

## Conference For Institutional Workers

A progress report was made on a Western Conference of Institutional Workers to be held in the summer of 1962, if budget funds permit. The personnel of such Conference will be recruited from Institutional work in the four Western Conferences. (If such a conference is held, then in 1963 an Eastern Conference will be held for workers in the

Eastern Conferences of the Church.) Authority was given to the Secretaries to make a decision on the Conference for 1962.

## Indian Work

- (i) Agreed to a grant of \$200 to assist with travel costs of two delegates from Indian communities in Hudson Bay Presbytery to attend the Indian-Metis Conference in Winnipeg, February 6th to 9th, 1962.
- (ii) Approved payment of costs of the induction as Cross Lake in the amount of \$43.09.
- (iii) Manitoba Conference requests cost of Presbytery Conveners for Hudson Bay Presbytery and Kenora-Rainy River Presbytery—grant of up to \$300 each. It was agreed that this Board should be responsible for supervision costs of conveners; subject to the consent of Superintendent and Secretaries.
- (iv) The request for cost of room and meals for sub-committee on Indian Work for the weekend prior to annual Conference was deferred to the January Executive.

## January 31st, 1962

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in Committee Room 712, The United Church House, Toronto, at 9:30 a.m., Wednesday, January 31st.

The Rev. R. K. Shorten was appointed Minute Secretary.

Present: Revs. R. Douglas Smith, M. C. Macdonald, George Morrison, Miss Esther Highfield, Revs. R. K. Shorten, W. M. Mustard, George Soutar, R. H. Rowley, E. G. Turnbull, Mrs. Charles Bevers, Mrs. W. The Chairman, Dr. Smith, constituted this first meeting of the new Executive of the Board of Home Missions with prayer and introduced each member present to the rest of the group. Formal recognition of this new phase of Home Mission organization will be made at the time of the Annual Meeting of the Board in April. Mr. Morrison reported briefly on the Charter Night service to be held April 4th in this connection.

## Communications

The Secretary presented letters from Rev. F. Y. Louie and the Superintendents of Institutions, the former being in appreciation of

the pension made possible for Mr. Louie through grants to the Pension Fund and the latter in appreciation of the special salary grants made possible at the end of the year 1961.

## Resolutions

1. The death of the Rev. Dr. J. C. Cochrane was noted with regret and it was agreed that the following minute should be recorded, expressing our loss and the contribution made by this former Superintendent of Home Missions to the life of the Church:

On the morning of December 29th, 1961, at the age of eighty-three, Dr. J. C. Cochrane found his release from his latter years of retirement and suffering. Simultaneously, there was brought to its conclusion a ministry which, at his funeral service on New Year's Day, was described as the greatest in the tradition of the Church in Northern Ontario in this generation.

At the age of twenty-two, John C. Cochrane felt called to the full-time ministry and the Methodist Church urged this young Presbyterian to accept appointment to the fast-growing mining camp of Gowganda. Thus began that marvellous ministry which continued unbroken save for three years at Victoria University and service with the Y.M.C.A. toward the end of World War I, culminating in his appointment as Superintendent of Home Missions in 1929, which he relinquished in 1942 to become Secretary to the Department of Pensions.

Whilst his work in the pastorate was outstanding, it was far excelled in his record as Superintendent. For this task, he had everything ready to hand: an intimate knowledge of the North and the needs of its people; á restless pioneering spirit; a passion to make the church a charter member of every new community; a genius for leadership which rallied men to his side; and, through it all, an unswerving devotion to the policy and direction of the Home Mission Board.

In the 'lean thirties' he kept the needy rural areas well supplied with clothing and White Gifts. Above all, he was counsellor to the younger ministers whose 'hearts he swayed' like Amasa of old, 'as one man'. The people of the North, and of the whole Church, will not soon forget his gracious and self-sacrificing spirit, or the manner of his life as he moved and worked amongst them, whose greatest memorial is the high point of efficiency and development to which he raised every phase of our Home Mission work in the North. When shall we see such rare gifts in such happy combination in one man again? Preacher, author, poet, musician, builder, historian, counseller—a Christ-like man, a man's man.

#### French Work

- (a) Ste. Anne des Monts—Rev. R. K. Shorten reported progress in the community of Ste. Anne des Monts where the missionary-at-large in French work plans to visit in the month of February and where, based on his survey, it will be proposed that the next step taken toward the possible establishment of a school and church. The immediate move, if Mr. Duquette's visit justifies this development, will be a recommendation that the French Work Committee of the Board appoint a Missionary-Teacher to this area with the pastoral work to be supervised from the neighbouring charge of Murdochville.
- (b) Missionary-at-large in French Work—The question of locating the head-quarters of the itinerant missionary is to be carefully considered by the French Work Committee of the Board and that a report

be made to the Board in this connection in April. If Presbytery action is needed, this should be explored also.

- (c) (i) Manuel du Culte public—Approval was given to provision of additional \$89.11 to cover costs of printing the French translation of portions of The Book of Common Order. Five hundred copies have been printed at a total cost of \$469.11.
- (ii) Price of translation and policy of refunds—It was agreed that the price of \$1.25 be set for this book and that copies be handled through the office of the Superintendent of Home Missions in Montreal as well as through the office of the Board. The amounts paid for these books will be refunded to the Board of Home Missions to offset costs of printing.

## Immigration

- (a) Dr. Murray's trip overseas as an Immigration Chaplain on board Ship. It was agreed that, since this return trip can be made possible for 1962, the transportation being provided in return for the services rendered, that Dr. Murray should make this trip. It was also determined that Dr. Fraser, Immigration Chaplain at Halifax, cover the work in Montreal during Dr. Murray's absence, since he has transporation privileges to make this possible.
- (b) Authority was given to print a Welcome Leaflet in the Yugo-slav language for the use of Immigration workers.

#### Oriental

The resignation of Miss Joan McLean, former W.M.S. worker with Vancouver Chinese, was accepted with regret and Miss Highfield was instructed to write to her on behalf of the Board of Home Missions.

## Indian Work

Regarding the request for assistance with the proposed meetings of the Sub-committee on Churches in Indian Communities prior to the sessions of Manitoba Conference, authority was given to the Secretaries to issue and to report back to the Board.

## Hospital Chaplaincy

- (a) Toronto—The request for an appointment made earlier by the Toronto Home Missions Council was renewed.
- (b) Edmonton—A motion was passed accepting the recommendation to appoint Rev. R. K. Dougan as Hospital Chaplain in Edmonton following the resignation of Rev. F. Jennings due to illness. A letter expressing appreciation for Mr. Jennings' work and concern for him in his time of illness will be written on behalf of the Executive.

## Bursaries For Visits To Institutional Centres

The accepted policy will be followed in Eastern Canada where Rev. A. W. Verrall, of Brunswick Street United Church, Halifax, will visit other Institutional work centres in Canada and the United States in 1962. The Western appointment will be determined at the time of the Annual Meeting of the Board in April.

## Confirmation For Payments Out Of Euphemia Mitchell Trust

- (a) Approval was given for the payment of \$70.00 to St. Paul's Avenue Road Church to assist with the initial plans in connection with the survey to be conducted.
- (b) Approved payment of \$57.50 re expenses of meeting with Institutional Workers.

## School For Lay Supplies

A report was given of arrangements made to date for Lay School at Pine Hill Divinity Hall during the summer of 1962 for a nine-week period. A preliminary survey shows that there are approximately 65 lay supplies in the Church who could take advantage of this type of training so that during the current year 30 will attend from Ontario and the East. In 1963, an equal number of the men will attend a similar school to be conducted in the West for the four Western Conferences.

## Car Subsidy

It was agreed to cancel the balance of \$125.00 outstanding on the loan portion of the Car Subsidy given to Rev. C. J. Paton who has returned to Australia. It was agreed that, through Rev. C. D. Powell, we advise Mr. Paton of his original agreement made with the Board of Home Missions in this regard.

# Aircraft Policy Statement Of The Board Of Home Missions On The Operation And Ownership Of Aircraft In Church Work

- 1. The Board is aware that, as we are called to serve some parts of our land which are more isolated, it is possible that savings in both time and in manpower may be effected with the use of aircraft.
  - 2. From the standpoint of economy as well as safety, it is preferable that the Board provide grants for air travel with licensed commercial operators on a contract or on individual flight basis as the programme of work demands.
  - 3. Until a definite area of need is determined and it is proven that existing facilities are not adequate to do the work, the Board of Home Missions should not move towards outright ownership of aircraft;

likewise, it recommends that individuals adopt the same attitude of policy. Morover if, in exceptional circumstances, ownership appears warranted, the Board is to be satisfied that the specific regulations of the Department of Transport re Air Services are strictly adhered to.

- 4. The Board should encourage Presbyteries to make surveys of frontier areas (and provide the necessary funds) to determine if there are unchurched folk within their bounds who should have the pastoral oversight that air travel would permit.
- 5. The Board should constitute an Air craft Advisory Committee comprised of at least two of its Secretaries and two United Church laymen well conversant with the national airways picture, to advise it when surveys have been completed and requests for grants for air travel are presented. In fact, in the whole aircraft picture, this Committee would be available to advise the Board or its Executive.

## Committee On Co-Ordination Of Adult Work

It was agreed that Rev. H. M. Bailey be the representative from the Board of Home Missions at the Conference on "The Ministry of the Laity" to be held May 11-13 at Westminster College, London, Ontario; Miss Esther Highfield to be alternate representative in the event that Mr. Bailey cannot attend.

## National Committee On Church Extension

Miss Highfield, Mrs. Ault, Mrs. Fleuty and Mrs. Bevers were asked to consult and to bring in recommendations for four women to be members of the National Committee on Church Extension.

## Charter Night Service

The formal recognition of the newly-formed Board of Home Missions will take the form of a special service to be held April 4th in Trinity United Church. The offering that night will be used to offset expenses incurred, with any balance going to the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, but, in the meantime, an advance will be needed for promotion and arrangement of the event. An amount of up to \$500 was approved.

## Compassionate Grant

The meeting was informed of the recent serious accident involving Mr. and Mrs. Fred Withers of Weymouth-Digby Neck, Nova Scotia, where Mr. Withers is our Lay Supply. The Executive voted a compassionate grant totalling \$250.00 to assist in replacing the car and other expenses incurred as a result of the accident.

It was agreed that this assistance be given with the understanding that the General Council office be contacted as to the wisdom of making the existing auto insurance limits applicable in the case of lay supplies as well as what has already been suggested in the case of ordained ministers. The Secretaries will report to the Board in this connection.

## Loan Of Honour Campaign — Pointe-aux-Trembles

Dr. Macdonald asked for advice from the Executive as to the advisability of allowing his name to stand in connection with the new, enlarged objective for their campaign since the new goal was beyond the terms of reference originally presented to the Board through its Executive. It was felt that this permission should be given.

## Lamont Hospital Fiftieth Anniversary Celebrations

- (a) To assist with the observance of this historic event in the life of Lamont Hospital and the whole Church, it was agreed that a contribution of up to \$500.00 be made available for these celebrations.
- (b) It was felt that a representative of the Board of Home Missions should be present at Lamont during the celebrations, if possible, and, since Dr. Smith, Chairman of the Board, will be in Western Canada at that time, it was unanimously agreed that he be asked to attend.

## Special Grants For 1961

#### It was agreed that:

- 1. The Secretaries be authorized to deal with special grants on salary and/or travel for 1961 with the understanding that exceptional cases be reported to the Board for action.
- 2. Special grants be voted for salary and/or travel in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board and recorded on pages 127-131 of the 1961 Digest of Minutes.
  - 3. Requests for special grants on salary and/or travel to be paid out of the 1961 appropriations be in the hands of the Secretaries not later than June 30th, 1962.

## Minister Living Off His Field

The Executive was asked to give consideration to adjustment in salary grant of a minister who feels it necessary to live off his field and is therefore not available to his people in the same manner as a minister resident on his charge. It was requested that the Superintendent of Missions be asked to bring any suggestion re adjustment in salary grant to the meeting of the Secretaries and Superintendents at the time of the meeting of the Board.

## St. John's Hall, Quebec City

As an order-of-the-day, the Executive welcomed the Very Rev. George Dorey and Rev. K. G. MacMillan to the meeting in order to report, along with Dr. Smith and Dr. Macdonald, on the meeting held in Quebec City on November 28th, 1961, in connection with this residence for students in Quebec City.

Considerable discussion followed these reports and the following motions were passed:

- 1. That an inspection be carried out on the St. John's Hall building by Mr. A. Leslie Perry, Architect, of Montreal. If the inspection indicated that the building is structurally sound and useable, Mr. Perry is to give an outline of repairs and alterations needed, together with estimates of the overall cost.
- 2. That the Executive make it clear to the Board of St. John's Hall and to Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery that the examination and inspection of the building by the Architect named does not preclude further study on their part of the possible support to be expected locally and on a Presbytery and Conference basis for the future of the work.

## **Expenses of Members**

The following was adopted as the scale of expenses of members of the Board:

- 1. Travelling by rail, a minister shall use his clergy certificate and shall be allowed for a return trip the cost of a standard first-class single fare by the most direct route; a layman shall be allowed the cost of a standard first-class return fare; and, in each case, the cost of a lower birth or a roomette and up to \$6.00 per day for meals shall be allowed.
- 2. Laymen and ministers travelling from Moncton, N.B., and points East, or from the head of the Great Lakes and points West, may travel by plane and shall be allowed the cost of the economy fare, plus the cost of regular ground transportation to and from an airport.
- 3. Those who, with the consent of the Board, travel by air from points west/of Moncton or east of Fort William and Port Arthur shall be allowed an amount equal to the cost of a standard first-class railway fare, plus berth and meals as in Recommendation 1.
- 4. Those driving cars from nearby points shall be allowed six cents per mile travelled.
- 5. The allowance for hotel accommodation shall be the amount of the cost, up to \$9.50 per day.
- 6. The allowance for meals, while attending the meetings, shall be the actual cost, up to \$5.00 per day.

#### Bissell Bursary Fund and Other Bursaries

Miss Highfield reported as follows: The Trustees of the Bissell Bursary Fund, meeting on September 12th, 1961, awarded 13 Bursaries of \$75. each and 4 of \$50. each from funds available in the Bissell Bursary, 2 of \$75. each from the Pitts Sustentation Fund for students in Newfoundland, 1 of \$50. from the Edith M. Wilson Estate, to be used in British Columbia, and 1 of \$50. from the Super Gift Account of the Board of Home Missions, as the student in question did not come under the regulations of the Bissell Fund.

A small amount was left in the Bissell Fund for late applications and, later, two amounts of \$75. each were given to two students from the Maritime Provinces; and two amounts of \$75. each were later paid from Super Gift Account to students in Ontario.

## Report of Committee on Rural Work

- 1. A general statement on the Rural Work of the Church was made by the Chairman of the Committee, Rev. D. A. Brydon.
  - 2. The following recommendations of the Committee were approved:
- (a) That membership of Joint Committee on Evangelism in the Rural Church from the Board of Home Missions be as follows: Rev. H. M. Bailey, Rev. A. E. MacKenzie, Rev. Arthur F. Gardner, Rev. E. G. Knowles and Mr. Robert Taylor and that, in addition, two laymen be named.
- (b) That grants totalling \$1,950 be provided for the holding of Rural Life Conferences and Lay Supply Schools under the direction of the Superintendents, as follows:

- (c) That five ministers be nominated to attend the Garrett School for Rural Leaders, Evanston, Ill., the representatives of our Church to be chosen from the nominations received through the Superintendents of Missions for 1962, and that a grant of \$1,000. be made for assistance to those who will attend this School.
- (d) That the Consolidated Rural Church Pilot Projects report of the Sub-Committee of the Joint Committee on Evangelism in the Rural Church be approved, as follows:
  - (i) Whereas the Eighteenth General Council, 1958, asked the Joint Committee on the Rural Church to "take into consideration the advisability of establishing a Consolidated Rural Church and Christian Education Centre as a Pilot Project in close co-operation with the Presbyteries concerned";
  - (ii) Whereas a significant project of this nature would involve, in all likelihood, a substantial capital investment and the discarding of existing small church buildings with little or no sale value;
  - (iii) Whereas the Joint Committee on the Rural Church has outlined a series of principles to be followed in the establishment of such a project, including a statement that a significant portion of them would have to be accepted by the area concerned;

- (iv) Whereas a policy of assistance from the Church as a whole has not been established as yet; and
- (v) Whereas, in the opinion of the Joint Committee, such a policy is needed if encouragement is to be given to such projects in the rural areas,

It is therefore recommended that the following policy be adopted:

- (1) That the Board of Home Missions provide capital assistance by way of grant and loan up to one-third of a cost agreed upon by the Charge, the Presbytery and the Board of Home Missions; two-thirds of the cost to be financed by the Charge; And that in areas where Presbyteries have established funds for this purpose, the Presbytery might be asked to share in providing the above assistance.
- (2) That in order to qualify for the above assistance, the following conditions would have to be met:
  - (a) The project to have the active and continued support of the Presbytery.
  - (b) The holding of rural life conferences and the conduct of a thorough survey of the area to be served in accordance with the principles of survey laid down in the Survey Guide, "Realizing New Prospects".
  - (c) The salary of the minister not to exceed the prevailing maximum for the Superintendents of Home Mission Institutions, (see Digest of Minutes, 1961, pages 124-125).
  - (d) The conduct of a thorough financial canvass on the local level resulting in cash and pledges (including equity that may be realized from sale of existing church properties) amounting to at least two-thirds of the cost of the project.
  - (e) The amalgamation of congregations to be involved.
  - (f) That the correspondence received from Mr. V. W. Larson of the Centre for Community Studies, University of Saskatchewan, dealing with his offer to make an analysis of the Rural Church picture, outlining trends and opportunities, in return for one month's salary from the Board of Home Missions, be referred to the Joint Committee in consultation with the Office of the General Council for further information and determination of the need and value of such a study being undertaken at this time.
  - (g) That the Rural Life Sunday service bulletin and Order of Worship for 1962 be used on May 27th, or an appropriate Sunday, by both urban and rural congregations.
  - (h) That a budget of \$4,200 be approved for the year 1962.

## Report of Committee on Immigration

A general statement on the work was made by the Rev. D. A. Brydon, Chairman of the Committee.

The following recommendations of the Committee were adopted:

- (a) That the budget for 1962 be \$22,000.
- (b) That the following be members of the Continuing Committee on Immigration, to meet and study during the year: Rev. J. R. Leng, Mrs. C. S. Patterson, Rev. D. A. Brydon, Rev. G. M. Morrison, Rev. R. K. Shorten, Rev. K. G. MacMillan; with power to add two members.
- (c) That authority by given to the Secretaries to prepare a statement on the whole refugee problem, to be sumbitted to the Executive for approval.

## Report of Committee on Appointment of Students

The Report of the Committee was presented by the Rev. R. K. Shorten and adopted as follows:

## 1. A Look at Last Year

During the summer of 1961, 250 students were appointed by the Board of Home Missions under the 'Student Pool' arrangements. Of this total number, 207 served on regular fields, while the remaining 43 were engaged in Church Extension activities, Institutional Missions and in survey work.

The payment of salaries and allowances for student work this past year was handled, as in former years, through the Plan for the Coordination of Student Salaries which we refer to as the 'Student Pool'. Some phases of this Mission venture in 1961 are noted as follows:

- —An interim payment of \$37.00 per week was made with an additional \$3.00 per week added from the 'Pool'. In the case of experienced students, allowances of \$1.00 to \$3.00 per week were also provided.
- —The allowance for married students, car depreciation allowances and supplements for longer terms of service proved helpful in adjusting our procedures to meet changing conditions in this student work.

## 2. Our Opportunity in 1962

Again this year a greater number of students have made application for summer work than we are able to appoint. Of a total of 292 applications received, 255 have come from candidates for Church vocations, and of all the requests, 142 come from young people who are applying for this work for the first time.

With the integration of the Woman's Missionary Society work leading to the new chapter in the life of this Board, the appointment of students from The United Church Training School now comes under this system. This year there will be 8 of these young ladies at work in 6 different provinces.

The Committee recommends that a total of 240 students be appointed by the Board of Home Missions under the 'Student Pool' for the current year if at all possible. In addition to the above, but not included in the 'Student Pool', there will be six and possibly seven student appointments to hospital internships.

- 1. Salary Rates: That these be as follows: Basic rate—\$37.00 weekly. Suggested supplement—\$3.00 weekly (if 'Student Pool' permits). Allowance for three or more terms served—same as in 1961—\$10. per week.
- 2. Allowances: That rates for the following be as in 1961 (see Digest of Minutes, P. 119).

Travel to the field-single and married students.

Travel on the field: Regular fields.

Travel on the field: Institutions and Church Extension.

Car depreciation.

Married Students' board allowance.

- 3. Interim Payments: That when assignments are completed the forms be sent to the Superintendent of Home Missions who shall forward copies to the Presbytery Convener and to the Board.
- 4. Early Leavings: That every effort be made to lengthen terms of service.
- 5. Final Payments: That these be made only when reports have been completed and returned.

## 6. Materials: That:

- —The Literature Committee be asked to include an amount of \$2,500 for Vacation Church School texts, copies of the Interpreter's Bibles and other supplies needed for students in 1962.
- -The Handbook for Students and Lay Supplies be revised in 1962.
- —The use of Stewardship materials, You and Your Students (revised in 1961) be advocated (quantities of this are available).
- 7. Adoption Plan: That the 'adoption plan' for summer students be encouraged as far as possible.

8. Statistical Reports: That it be noted that this year student forms have been revised to conform with the regular statistical schedules of the Church. (The regular schedule will be used with instructions given as to where copies are to be sent).

Also, that report forms for the Committee's use will include sections to be completed by the student, depending on the type of field served; the Superintedent of Home Missions to complete the final section of this form when forwarding it to the Board.

9. Budget: That the appropriation for student work in 1962 be \$190,000, providing 240 students are appointed.

- 3. With regard to the renewal of licences for lay supplies who will be remaining on their present fields, it was decided to appoint a committee, consisting of Rev. E. E. M. Joblin, Rev. H. M. Bailey and Rev. L. G. Sieber, to consider the matter and bring in a report. The report of the committee, presented at a later sessions, was adopted as follows:
- (a) That authority be given the Secretaries of the Board of Home Missions to recommend to the Executive of General Council the renewal of licences to administer the Sacraments for lay supplies who will be remaining on the same field, upon receipt of recommendations from the Presbytery and the Superintendent of Missions.

## Indian Work

The Rev. E. E. M. Joblin made a general statement on the Indian Work.

The recommendations of the Committee were considered seriatim and action taken as noted below:

- (a) Norway House: Agreed that Norway House Charge be constitued as an Institutional Charge, and that a suitable budget be prepared for presentation to the June Executive.
- (b) Norway House, Power Costs: Agreed to refer to the Secretaries and Superintendent the request for a supplementary grant to the James Evans Memorial Church towards power costs for 1961.
- (c) Saskatchewan: Agreed:
  - (i) Regina: That the proposed grant to the Indian-Metis Friendship Centre be left to the Secretaries and Superintendent for report to the June Executive.

- (ii) Assinibola Girls' Residence: That the continuation of the Residence be referred to the June Executive, pending Presbytery action.
- (iii) Leask Experiment: To confirm grant of \$100 to June 30th to help local congregation to set up a Friendship Centre for Indians and to authorize Secretaries and Superintendent to deal with further developments.
- (d) Edmonton, Friendship Centre: Agreed to vote a grant of \$500, since the project is being supported by the Junior League and needs more permanent support.

Bussanich, the President of the Presbyterial United Church Women, the Presbytery Home Mission Convener and Rev. G. Keenleyside.
- 7. Indian Work Conferences:
- (a) Five Oaks, Ontario: Agreed to vote a grant of \$250 for the Annual Conference.
- (b) British Columbia Indian Workers' Conference Agreed to vote a grant of up to \$300.00.
- 8. Recommendations of Manitoba Conference Home Mission Committee:
- (a) Orientation programme for Missionaries on isolated Indian Reserves:
  Agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendents,
  with the suggestion that tape records might be provided from other
  sources.
- (b) Re Plan for Training of Lay Leaders, as proposed by Kenora-Rainy River Presbytery: Agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent.
- (c) Training Schools, Hudson Bay Presbytery: Agreed that an amount up to \$500 be provided.
- (d) Re payment of salary grants, Northern Indian communities: Agreed that the full salary for all missionaries on isolated Indian fields in the Northern part of Manitoba Conference be paid by the Board, the fields to refund to the Board at least \$100, perhaps quarterly.
- (e) Summer Supply, Travel Grants in isolated Indian communities in Manitoba Conference: Agreed to approve a grant of up to \$200.
- 9. Vancouver, Native Indian Service Council: Agreed to vote grant of \$600.

- (b) to authorize payment of membership fee of \$25.

Miss E. M. Highfield made a general statement on the Oriental Work.

- 1. Chinese Work:
- (a) Newfoundland: (i) Request for itinerant ministry; and (ii) suggested use of tape recordings: Agreed that these be referred to the Superintendent and the Home Mission Committee of Avalon Presbytery for further consideration.
- (b) Ottawa: Agreed: (i) to concur in the suggestion to the Executive of Presbytery that it recommend to Presbytery that the Ottawa Chinese Mission be admitted to The United Church of Canada; and (ii) to nominate Mr. S. K. Choo (who will receive special ordination) as its minister.
- (c) Toronto, Chinese Work: Agreed that no action relative to staff be taken at this time.
- (d) Hamilton, Chinese: Agreed that Rev. Y. S. Szeto be nominated to the Settlement Committee as minister and that the necessary grant be provided through the Appropriations Committee.
- (e) Winnipeg: Agreed: (a) to concur in the action of Winnipeg Presbytery that the Chinese Pastoral Charge be discontinued and that the congregation be included in the Central Winnipeg Parish, with the understanding that suitable plans for a Group Ministry in the area be worked out; and (b) to refer plans for the future to the Secretaries and Superintendent.
- (f) Saskatoon, Chinese: Agreed that the appointment of a Woman Worker, preferably with the Cantonese language, be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent.
- (g) Calgary, Chinese: Agreed to approve the appointment of Mr. Terry Mah.
- (h) Victoria: Agreed that the Chinese work be integrated into other congregations.
- (i) Nanaimo, Chinese: Agreed that the question of a successor to Mrs. Mabel Johansen; who is retiring after having served the Church for twenty years, be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent.
- (j) Vancouver: Agreed that no action be taken re the integration of the former W.M.S. work with the Chinese Church.
- (k) Conference of Workers: Agreed to approve the proposal that a Conference of Chinese Workers be held in 1963.
- 12. Japanese Work:
- (a) Montreal, Japanese: Agreed that Rev. Y. One be nominated to the Settlement Committee, to succeed Rev. Gordon Imai.
- (b) Winnipeg, Japanese: Agreed that Rev. Cam Furuya be allowed, in addition to one month's holiday, one month's leave of absence, with pay, provided one of the months be July or August in 1962 or 1963.

- (c) Kamloops-Okanagan Presbytery, Re-arrangement of work: Agreed to approve, in principle, proposed re-arrangement of work, whereby the Kelowna Deaconess be made available to give assistance in Anglo-Saxon aid-receiving charges in the Kelowna district, that she coordinate hospital visiting and that she work half-time with the Japanese.

- (e) That Rev. W. O. MacKenzie be transferred to the West Coast Marine Mission at July 1st, to operate the "Melvin Swartout" and to study, for one year, the best use of Aircraft on the West Coast of Vancouver Island.

A report was made by Mr. Morrison. It was agreed that appreciation be expressed to Rev. Dr. D. H. Telfer for his fine work in connection with the Vancouver Survey.

### Banking Authority Former W.M.S. Residences

Miss Highfield presented the following recommendation, which was approved: "That the Secretaries be empowered to authorize Signing Officers for the former Woman's Missionary Society's work as each situation arises and that ratification be given by the Executive or Sub-Executive."

### Report of Hospital Committee

The Report of the Committee was presented by Rev. R. W. Henderson. The following action was taken on its recommendations:

### General Statement

Dr. Macdonald gave a brief review of the Hospital Work. A list of the medical personnel and medical students appointed as summer interns was received for information.

### Recommendations from Conference of Doctors, January 1962

1. Expanding Hospital Services: (a) Hazelton, Wrinch Memorial: Suggestion that some of the hospital bed space be converted to a care unit for the chronically ill; also, that church-owned land adjacent to the hospital might be used to establish cottage-type homes for foster children; (b) Burns Lake: Suggestion that the old hospital building might be used for care of the chronically ill; (c) Lamont-Smoky Lake: Report re construction of Auxiliary Hospital for chronically ill; (d) Elizabeth M. Crowe Memorial Hospital, Eriksdale, Man.: Suggestion re converting of old hospital building into a Senior Citizens' Home. These four items were

referred to a joint committee of the Board of Home Missions and the Board of Evangelism and Social Service on the care of the Chronically Ill for report to this Board.

The recommendations of this committee were adopted as follows:

- (a) That in the case of Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton, Burns Lake Hospital, and Elizabeth M. Crowe Memorial Hospital, Eriksdale, Man., the proposals be referred to the Secretaries for continuing conversation with the Board of Evangelism and Social Service and for report to the Long Range Planning Committee.
- (b) Re Lamont-Smoky Lake: The following report, submitted by Chief Judge Nelles Buchanan, was received for information:

"The Alberta Hospital Insurance Plan came into effect in Alberta on April 1, 1958. Shortly thereafter, the Minister of Health stated the attitude of his Department toward the hospitalization of the chronically ill, or, as we in Alberta prefer to describe them, long-term care patients. He indicated that there would be no interference with those hospitals then caring for the chronically ill, but that the Department of Health would not approve construction by agencies, other than those appointed under Alberta legislation, of any new hospitals designed for chronic care; that the Government itself by special legislation would set up what were to be known as Auxiliary Hospital Districts—bodies corporate, which as the need arose would erect and operate auxiliary hospitals for the care of the chronically ill.

"That erection of government-sponsored auxiliary hospitals in various parts of the province is now proceeding. For convenience, in the case of chronic patients suddenly requiring active hospital treatment, it has become the practice to locate new auxiliary hospitals in close proximity to active treatment hospitals. To care for those patients deemed suitable for treatment in an auxiliary hospital, the Lamont-Smoky Lake Auxiliary Hospital District No. 23 has been constituted to serve the Lamont-Smoky Lake area and to erect an auxiliary hospital at Lamont, immediately west of Archer Memorial Hospital, connected physically with it and serviced in part by installations in that Hospital, such as laundry, x-ray, heating, dietary services.

"Contemporaneously with the erection by the Lamont-Smoky Lake Auxiliary Hospital District No. 23 of the new Auxiliary Hospital at Lamont, under the direction of the Archer Memorial Hospital Board, construction of a new wing will proceed, to replace the oldest portion of Archer Memorial Hospital. Construction of the new Auxiliary Hospital and of the new wing to Archer Memorial Hospital, though authorized and approved by the Department of Health, has not yet begun."

2. Revision of Regulations re Post-Graduate Allowance for Doctors: Agreed that the following be approved:

- (a) That permanent Home Mission Board doctors, eligible for post-graduate refresher leave on the general principle of six months' time for every five years of service, the expenses of this leave to be paid up to a maximum of \$500 for each year of service; and the doctor's regular salary to be paid during that period.
- (b) That, in lieu of taking this six months' refresher course at the end of five years of service, part or all of this may be used on an annual basis, at the doctor's discretion, at the rate of five weeks per year, and up to \$500 per year of expenses involved.
- (c) That for those doctors whose stated intention is not to remain indefinitely with the Board of Home Missions and who plan to work for one or two years only, there be no post-graduate provision; but that brief leave for short-term courses may be granted at the discretion of the Medical Superintendent and at the expense of the doctor concerned.
- (d) That those who are uncertain about their term of future service, but who are willing to serve more than two years, shall be eligible for post-graduate expense allowance up to \$500 for each year of completed service, but that no salary shall be paid during their leave.
- (e) That in the case of a doctor who takes his post-graduate training and salary on an annual basis and decides to leave with less than five years of total service, the salary paid to him during periods of postgraduate training shall be repayable to the Medical Services Fund concerned.
- (f) That in the event that a doctor gives five years of service or more he shall be eligible for post-graduate allowance and satisfy for each year of service whether or not he remains in the service of the Board of Home Missions.
- (g) That at the beginning of each calendar year, each hospital shall send to the office of the Board of Home Missions in Toronto the full amount of \$500 for each doctor on staff, whether permanent or not;

That, if subsequent to this a new doctor is engaged before the end of the year, an amount, at the rate of \$500 per year for that portion of the year in which he started, shall be included with the amount forwarded at the beginning of the next year;

And that this money be held in trust to the credit of each doctor concerned; and when a doctor who is eligible desires to take post-graduate studies and has obtained clearance from the Board, he shall then apply to the office of the Board for an advance, which will be paid to him by cheque and charged against his accumulated credit.

Further, that at the conclusion of such studies the doctor shall submit his expense account, when any extra expense incurred, over and above the amount received as an advance, shall be paid, up to the maximum of \$500 for each year of service.

- 3. Post-Graduate Allowance for Nurses: Agreed to adopt the following: That any nurse who serves for two years or more Bella, Bella, one year) and desires to take post-graduate training for periods up to a year, may be granted leave of absence, without salary, while the Hospital maintains her seniority, employer's share of Pension Plan and employer's share of Medical Insurance.
- 4. Annual Holiday: Agreed to approve the following: That, in connection with the provision by the Medical Services Fund of expenses for an annual trip for each doctor and his wife to Vancouver (or equivalent), the expenses to be paid should cover transportation costs only and should not include hotel or meals (except on boats when the latter are included in fare).
- 5. Salary Scale, Junior Doctors: Agreed that the following schedule be established for Junior Doctors:

Initial salary \$6,000 per year, with living accommodation, furnished on same basis as manses on aid-receiving charges; with four annual increments of \$400 each to a maximum of \$8,000 per year.

This scale to apply to those who enter the work after one year of internship without previous experience in practice; with provision that the Board of Home Missions might give special consideration to a doctor with more experience or more training.

- 6. Construction Contracts: Agreed that the Secretaries confer with the Hospital authorities concerned in the letting of construction contracts.
- 7. Medical Services to Indigent Indians: In connection with the policy of the Indian Health Services to pay for medical services to indigent Indians only, it was agreed to approve the plan of prepaid medical services for Indians, instituted at Bella Bella and at Bella Coola, and to commend the Medical Superintendents of these Hospitals for their efforts in this attempt to implement the policy of the Indian Health Services.
- 8. Pemberton, B.C.: Agreed that no action be taken on the request by the people of Pemberton that the United Church consider providing hospital care and medical service for this area.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton, B.C.

Signing Officers: Agreed to approve request for change in signing officers for banking purposes, to implement which the following resolution was adopted:

Be It Resolved: That Mr. A. H. Markuson, Chairman, Dr. John E. Whiting, Medical Superintendent, and Dr. Donald F. Butt, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of The Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton, B.C., to sign cheques upon The Royal Bank of Canada, Hazelton, B.C., on behalf of the said Hospital; and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000) Dollars;

Also that, the said A. H. Markuson, John E. Whiting and Donald F. Butt, or any two of the aforenamed, are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital Account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also, from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank, and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

And that all other powers heretofore given in this matter be and are hereby revoked.

Katherine H. Prittie Hospital, Bonnyville, Alberta

Agreed to adopt the following resolution:

Whereas, we are assured by the Hospital Division of the Department of Health of the Province of Alberta that the St. Louis Hospital is large enough to provide adequate hospitalization for the community;

Whereas, the Government will neither finance nor approve any further expenditure for improvements or repairs on buildings, nor approve the erection of a new hospital;

And Whereas, there is a United church and a minister in Bonnyville to give pastoral oversight to the Protestant people in the area;

Therefore, we recommend that the Katherine H. Prittie Hospital be closed, the date for closing to be set as early as possible after consultation with the Hospitals Division of the Department of Health of the Province of Alberta, with due regard to the interests of Dr. R. R. Roy and other employees.

# John Neil Hospital, Cold Lake, Alberta

- 1. Opening of Nurses' Residence: Agreed to request the local Board of the John Neil Hospital to defer the official opening of the new Nurses' Residence, if possible, from May to early July of this year, and that we name Dr. Douglas Smith, Miss E. Highfield, Dr. George Darby, Rev. C. D. Powell, Mrs. F. Scoffield and Chief Judge Nelles Buchanan to be the Board's representatives at the opening ceremonies.
- 2. Re Administrator: Agreed: (a) that Miss Florence Taylor, R.N. (transferring from the Board of World Mission) be appointed Administrator of the John Neil Hospital, effective June 1st, 1962; and (b) having noted that Miss K. Metheral, R.N., presently Administrator of this Hospital commences her furlough as of June 1st, 1962, when she is to be

transferred to the Board of World Mission, to complete her furlough and be appointed to Overseas Work, agreed that the necessary steps be taken between the Board of World Mission, the Board of Home Missions and the Department of Pensions to effect the necessary changes.

## Bella Coola General Hospital

Agreed that the need for a new engineer's residence be given priority consideration by the Board in 1963.

## **Hospital Boards**

## Special Grants'

Saskatoon, Survey Work: Agreed to make \$500 available for survey work in Saskatoon.

Winnipeg Presbytery, Bissett: Agreed to vote special grant of \$400 for 1961 — Salary \$150; travel \$250.

Winnipeg Presbytery, Kirkland Park: Agreed to vote \$300 towards deficit in manse rental for period July-December, 1961.

Battleford Presbytery, St. Walburg: Agreed to refer to Secretaries and Superintendent, with power, request for grant to help effect settlement with Rev. Blaine Smith.

Kootenay, Presbytery, Windermere: Agreed to uphold the principle involved in the action taken by the Executive at its meeting January 31st, 1962, in the matter of adjustment in the salary grant of a minister who feels it necessary to live off his field and is therefore not available to his people in the same manner as a minister resident on the charge.

## Pacific North-West Missionary Conference

It was agreed to vote a grant of \$300 for transportation expenses of delegates to the Pacific North-West Missionary Conference.

## New Sunday School Curriculum

The Rev. Peter Gordon White and the Rev. Dr. D. T. I. Forsyth made brief statements with regard to the new Sunday School Curriculum. The Rev. Dr. C. H. Dickinson called attention to the publication, "The Word and the Way", and presented copies to the Chairman of the Board and the Superintendents of Missions.

## Report of Committee on French Work

The Report of the Committee was presented by Rev. K. G. MacMillan, who also gave a brief review of the French Work. The recommendations of the Committee were adopted as follows:

### St. Anne des Monts

Whereas a direct appeal was made by representatives from the community of St. Anne des Monts to The United Church of Canada for help; and

Whereas the Rev. Ronald McCullough, the United Church minister at Murdochville, Que., has provided assistance to the people at Ste. Anne des Monts in the form of food and clothing; and

Whereas our field evangelist, the Rev. Carson Duquette, has visited the area and has carried out an investigation; and

Whereas a committee, which included representatives from the Miramichi Presbytery of the Maritime Conference and the Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery of the Montreal and Ottawa Conference, the Superintendents of Missions from the two Conferences mentioned above, and the Rev. R. K. Shorten, has studied the situation, and the respective Presbyteries have considered the matter and arrived at the conclusion that the time has come for The United Church of Canada to provide leadership in the community of Ste. Anne des Monts;

Be It Resolved, therefore, that steps be taken to establish a school at Ste. Anne des Monts and at the same time provide religious leadership among the people;

And, further, that financial support for such a building project be provided by the Board of Home Missions in the amount of \$7,500, and that, if this amount is found to be inadequate the matter be referred to the June Executive.

## Nominations and Appointments

Agreed that, since Rev. Marc Nelis of Antwerpt, Belgium, has expressed a desire to come to Canada and has indicated an interest in our Church, he be appointed in a dual capacity — as a teacher on the staff of Pointe-aux-Trembles School, if acceptable to the local Committee

on Staff, and as Chaplain to the School — effective July 1st, 1962; that he be given the status of Ordained Supply; that he and his family occupy the principal's residence, which will become vacant at the end of June; and that details regarding furnishings be worked out by the Secretaries and Superintendent of Missions.

### Literature

It was agreed that the French Work Committees in the Presbyteries of Montreal and Ottawa should submit requests and recommendations, as to priorities, when selecting literature for translation and printing, and that the Boards of Information and Stewardship and Evangelism and Social Service be consulted as to their sharing in the cost of producing the required material.

With regard to the recommendation of the Board of Information and Stewardship "that a bilingual person be employed, so that more materials can be translated into French and that this become a matter of consultation with the Board of Home Missions and other Boards of the Church," it was agreed to recommend the use of competent persons part time, in consultation with the Board of Information and Stewardship, for this type of work.

## L'Institut Français Evangelique de la Pointe-Aux-Trembles

- 1. Agreed that the policy of providing bursaries, established by The Woman's Missionary Society many years ago, be continued by the Board of Home Missions.
- 2. A brief statement regarding the `"Loan of Honour" Fund was made by the Rev. J. V. M. Beaudon.

## L'Eglise Unie du Sauveur, Montreal

Agreed that approval be given to the attempt of the congregation of L'Eglise Unie du Sauveur to relocate and to purchase a building, subject to the recommendation of Montreal Presbytery, with the understanding that, in the financial responsibility involved, the congregation will accept a reasonable share in capital costs, in addition to the assistance given by the Board of Home Missions.

#### Field Evangelist

Agreed that Rev. Carson Duquette, Field Evangelist in French Work, be asked to move to Quebec City, as it is believed travel costs will be reduced, since Quebec City appears to be more nearly the geographic centre of the area in which he serves, and that he be offered the opportunity of purchasing the furniture now in the Principal's residence at Pointe-aux-Trembles.

## Missionary to Deaf, Manitoba Area

Agreed to refer to Committee of Secretaries and Superintendents the suggestion of nominating Mr. Donald Wilson, 1962 ordinand in the London Conference, and asking for his transfer to the Manitoba Conference, so that he may be settled near Winnipeg and be available for work among the deaf in the Manitoba area.

## Vacancies and Available Supply

Mr. Hugh D. Campbell presented a statement, showing estimated Vacancies and available Supply. It was agreed that the Revs. A. S. Butt, J. M. Fraser, A. D. Stade, R. M. Warne and Mr. H. D. Campbell be a committee to study this matter further and report of the Committee of Secretaries and Superintendents.

### Church Extension

The recommendations of the National Committee on Church Extension, as contained in its Report, presented by the Rev. H. M. Bailey, were adopted as follows:

- 1. That all Conferences, Presbyteries, Extension Councils, and Ministers be asked to impart, at least once a year, the fullest information on Church Extension within the Presbytery and throughout the Church; and that each Standing Committee note its duties outlined on Page 91 of the Digest of the Minutes of the Board of Home Missions for 1957, copies of which duties are available.
- 2. That all Presbyteries, Councils and Congregations be reminded of the urgent need of completing their objectives in existing campaigns for Church Extension funds, and promoting campaigns to meet new and urgent requirements.
- 3. That the General Council request the Board of Finance to make available annually to the Board of Home Missions, to carry on Church Extension work, a minimum of \$350,000. in the Basic Appropriation section; and further, to give Church Extension a high priority in the Guaranteed and Contingent Projects in view of the need to continue, both in urban and frontier areas, the existing policy of assistance in the purchase of lots, provision of manses, aid to Councils, and assistance in areas where there are no Councils to provide local assistance.
- 4. That The National Committee on Church Extension ask the Board of Finance to make a special study of all the possibilities in regard to financing our Church Extension projects.
- 5. That the General Council instruct the Board of Home Missions to nominate to the Executive of General Council the personnel of The National Committee on Church Extension for the next biennium.

Survey, North York: There was brought to the attention of the Board a notice in the public press to the effect that North York Planning Board had engaged an Anglican Church student, who is also an Engineering graduate, to do a church survey. It was noted that this study involves all denominations.

It was agreed that as a Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada, we should commend North York and pledge our hearty co-operation. Recommendations From Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents

It was agreed that the following action be taken on recommendations from the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents:

Minimum Salary Scale, 1963-64

Agreed that the recommendation be amended and adopted as follows:

That we recommend to General Council an increase of \$100 for 1963, to bring the scale up to \$3,900; and we recommend, further, that this Board set up a Commission, on which there would be representation from the Board of Finance, to study the whole question of minimum salaries in all its divisions, giving careful consideration to the principle of increments for years of service, etc.; such Commission to report to the January Executive of the Board of Home Missions in 1963, and, at the same time, to the Executive of the Board of Finance, so that these two bodies may recommend to the Executive of General Council the minimum salary scale for 1964.

Agreed, also, that the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents be asked to suggest the names of those who should represent this Board on the above Commission on Salaries.

Lay Supplies, Salary Scale

Re regulation of the Board, adopted in 1961, namely — That in the case of Lay Supplies appointed to full-time work and being under the age of twenty-eight, the salary be set at \$200 below the regular scale for the first year of service, it was agreed that the following clause be added — "except when the Presbytery and Superintendent recommend that up to the maximum salary be paid."

Home Mission Workers, Salary Scale

Re recommendation of Winnipeg Presbytery that the salary and benefits of Home Mission Workers be upgraded to equal those received by former W.M.S. Workers: It was agreed that, in view of the provision to set up a Commission to study the whole salary question, no action be taken.

Moving Expenses of Ordinands

It was agreed to adopt the following:

- 1. That Charges be expected to refund moving expenses according to the following scale—
  - (a) Aid-receiving and self-supporting Charges paying not more than the prevailing minimum salary and travel \$100 to \$200.
  - (b) Charges paying more than the minimum \$200 to \$300.
- That in determining the exact amount to be refunded, the Superintendent will take into account the ability of the Charge to pay; and that in no case will the amount requested exceed the actual cost of the move.

3. That in January of each year, the Superintendents will be expected to write to the Secretaries of the Presbyteries within their superintendencies, explaining the procedures to be followed in meeting the moving expenses of Ordinands and Ministers returning to their home Conference after serving in the Conference to which they were appointed by the Transfer Committee.

### Commission on Manse Policy

The Rev. H. M. Bailey reported on the work of the General Council's Commission on Manse Policy. This statement was received for information.

## School for Lay Supplies

The Rev. E. E. M. Joblin made a brief statement re plans for the School for Lay Supplies, to be held at Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, June 26th to August 24th, 1962. This was received for information.

## Lay Supplies, Automobile Insurance

Agreed that General Council be consulted with regard to the wisdom of making existing auto insurance limits applicable in the case of Lay Supplies.

### Car Finance Loans

Agreed that the term "Car Subsidy" be changed to "Car Finance Loan" and that new regulations be adopted as follows:

- 1. A \$700.00 loan is available to each Ordinand after being assigned to a Pastoral Charge by the Settlement Committee, conditional upon ownership of an automobile or intention to procure one.
- 2. \$200.00 of the \$700.00 is to be unconditionally repaid within two years at \$25.00 per quarter with the first payment due by the end of the quarter immediately following that in which the loan is received.
- 3. The remaining \$500.00 will be cancelled at the end of the twenty-fourth month following receipt of the loan, providing that the Ordinand is still in the Pastorate and the \$200.00 has been repaid. If less than \$200.00 has been repaid, the cancellation will be at the rate of \$2.50 for each \$1.00 repaid, and any balance still remaining will all be repayable without benefit of further cancellations, and with interest added at 3% per annum. Additional interest will be added to any unpaid balance remaining at the end of each subsequent 12 month period until the loan is repaid.
- 4. If an Ordinand leaves the Pastorate for post-graduate studies or any other reason before the end of the twenty-fourth month, he will receive a maximum cancellation of \$62.50 for each quarter he served in the Pastorate if his payments are not in arrears, but if the payments are in arrears the cancellation will be at the rate of \$2.50 for each \$1.00 repaid. In both instances he will be required to repay all of the balance remaining.

- 5. An Ordinand may take \$500.00 only if he wishes, but it must be understood that this is also a loan, the cancellation of which is conditional upon his continuing to serve in the Pastorate until after the end of the twenty-fourth month. If he should leave the Pastorate before that time he will receive a cancellation of \$62.50 per quarter for the period of his Pastorate and will be required to repay the balance at the same rate of repayment, including interest, as provided above.
- 6. Any failure on the part of an Ordinand to carry out any of the terms of the Covenant which he is required to sign will be reported by the Board to the Presbytery which he serves.

## Use of Aircraft

The following statement on the operation and ownership of aircraft in Church work was presented and approved:

- 1. The Board is aware that, as we are called to serve some parts of our land which are more isolated, it is possible that savings in both time and manpower may be effected with the use of aircraft.
- From the standpoint of economy, as well as safety, it is preferable that the Board provide grants for air travel with licensed commercial operators on a contract or on individual flight basis, as the programme of work demands.
- 3. Until a definite area of need is determined and it is proven that existing facilities are not adequate to do the work, the Board of Home Missions should not move towards outright ownership of aircraft; likewise it recommends that individuals adopt the same attitude of policy. Moreover, if, in exceptional circumstances, ownership appears warranted, the Board is to be satisfied that the specific regulations of the Department of Transport re Air Services are strictly adhered to.
- 4. The Board should encourage Presbyteries to make surveys of frontier areas (and provide the necessary funds) to determine if there are unchurched folk within their bounds who should have the pastoral oversight that air travel would permit.
- 5. The Board should constitute an Aircraft Advisory Committee comprised of at least 2 of its Secretaries and 2 United Church laymen well conversant with the national airways picture, to advise it when surveys have been completed and requests for grants for air travel are presented. In fact in the whole aircraft picture this Committee would be available to advise the Board or its Executive.
- 6. We recommend the following personnel:

### Department of Fund-Raising

Re request of the Maritime Conference H.M. Committee for the appointment of "a representative from the Fund-Raising Department to the Maritimes for a period of two years," it was agreed that, in view of the integration of the Fund-Raising Department of the Board of Home Missions with the Capital Funds Service Committee of the Board of Finance, no action be taken.

## Expenses, Lay Delegates to Presbytery

Re request of Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery: Agreed that the Board care for expenses of lay delegates from frontier charges to two meetings of Presbytery per year (but not including the Conference meeting of Presbytery), on the same basis as in the case of ministerial delegates. It was directed, further, that each Superintendent be asked to indicate the charges involved within his superintendency.

## Integration Policy, W.M.S. and H.M.B. Work

1. Furloughs: Agreed that the following statement be included in the records of the Board and that the Regulations governing Furloughs be approved:

Growing out of The Commission on The Integration of Home Mission Work of The Woman's Missionary Society and the Board of Home Missions, General Council and its Executive have approved continuing furlough for those persons who were Missionaries and Associate Workers under The Woman's Missionary Society as at December 31, 1961.

## Regulations:

After six years of service each Missionary is entitled to one full year's furlough.

After six years of service each Associate Worker is entitled to three months' furlough.

It is understood that furlough is not cumulative.

A missionary who returns to her field after regular furlough and reaches the retiring age after serving a partial term of service, shall be entitled to six months' furlough if the partial term of service is one-half or more of the full term. If the retirement takes place after less than one-half of the term of service, no furlough will be granted.

All missionaries are expected to take their regular furlough at the regular time. Exigencies of the work or of health or other personal reasons may make it expedient to lengthen or to shorter term of service, to be determined by the Board of Home Missions.

As missionaries on the field approach the age fixed for retirement, their furloughs should be arranged and undertaken with that fact in view.

That no furloughs be granted to persons whose appointments became effective after December 31st, 1961.

Furlough Salary: Regular salary shall continue during the furlough year.

Use of Furlough: It is suggested that a 12-month furlough should be used as follows:

Rest: 3 months (2 at the beginning of furlough and at least one prior to returning to the field).

Deputation Work: 3 months. The following information with regard to "Deputation Work for Missionaries" has been approved by the Executive of General Council:

"Whereas there has been deputation work done in the past by missionaries of The Woman's Missionary Society and of the Board of Home Missions and both Boards see great value in this, not just for the purpose of raising funds but even more for the purpose of spreading knowledge of the Church and its work across the country and imparting Missionary Education;

"Whereas for the missionaries under The Woman's Missionary Society it is part of the furlough plan, which the women would like to see continued; and

"Whereas the Commission envisages a more comprehensive plan that would involve a number of the Boards of the Church;

"The Commission recommends to the Executive of General Council that the Executive of the Board of Information and Stewardship study the whole question of deputation work for missionaries and bring recommendations to the Executive of the General Council."

Study: 6 months. Decisions as to the nature of furlough study shall be made between the Missionary and the Board of Home Missions.

Expenditure in 1961: Furlough salaries \$36,083.88; study \$3,597.82; travel, \$1,313.87.

Estimated Budget for 1962: Furlough salaries and travel, \$40,000.00 Furlough study, \$1,500.00.

1962-1963: That we authorize the regular one-year furlough for the following Missionaries and the regular three-month furlough for the following Associate Workers:

Miss Annie Bishop

Mrs. Pearl Budge (Associate Worker)

Miss Stella A. Burry-followed by retirement

Miss Henrietta Campbell

Miss Agatha Coultes, R.N.

Miss Maimie E. Gollan - followed by retirement.

Miss Belva J. Howatt, B.A. (Associate Worker)

Mrs. Mabel C. Johansen — followed by retirement

Miss Kathleen Metheral, R.N.—9 months' furlough, then transfer to Board of World Mission.

Miss Annie G. Mulley Miss Grace Namba Miss J. Gertu Staples—followed by retirement Miss Elizabeth Stephen.

That, as they are nearing retirement, we defer furlough of the following for one year: Miss Annie Bishop, Miss Annie G. Mulley, Miss Elizabeth Stephen.

That as Miss Stella A. Burry, Miss Maimie E. Gollan, Mrs. Mabel C. Johansen and Miss J. Gertu Staples will be retiring following furlough, we express to them our sincere appreciation for their long years of service.

That we express appreciation, also, to Miss Edith Clark, Missionary under the Board of World Mission, for the year given to the Board of Home Missions serving in Skidegate Mission and Sandspit, B.C. (Miss Clark retires following her furlough and the major portion of furlough expenses will be carried by the Board of World Mission).

- 2. Bursaries and Scholarships: That the Board of Home Missions continue the practice of the former Woman's Missionary Society—namely, to provide funds to assist needy Indian and other non-Anglo-Saxon people to further their education; and that estimated budget of \$3,500 for 1962 be approved.
  - 3. Candidates: That the following be approved:

Whereas formerly The Woman's Missionary Society accepted and sponsored young women candidates and recommend them to the United Church Training School for study;

Whereas presently the Church has an Interim Committee on Applications for Women Workers in The United Church of Canada, appointed by Executive of General Council; this Committee reviewing applications, collecting references and medicals, examining educational qualifications and, if satisfied, recommending the applicant to the United Church Training School for study; and

Whereas presently the United Church Training School is prepared to accept an applicant with less than the required academic standing for a special one-year course, when recommended by a Board of the Church;

Therefore, it is recommended that the Board of Home Missions continue this practice and that the following procedure for accepting candidates for training be adopted:

- (a) Applications received by the Board of Home Missions shall be referred to the Interim Committee on Applications for Women Workers in the United Church of Canada for screening and establishing eligibility and desirability for full-time work in The United Church of Canada.
- (b-1) The Interim Committee shall refer back to the Board of Home Missions for acceptance as a Canadidate and referral to the United Church Training School for the special one-year course those applicants who have less than the required academic qualifications.

(b-2) The Interim Committee shall refer back to the Board of Home Missions for acceptance as a candidate and referral to the United Church Training School for the regular two-year course those for whom the Board of Home Missions has indicated willingness to assist financially through the Canadidate Fund.

It shall be understood that when an applicant is received as a Canadidate by the Board of Home Missions, she shall give at least three years service to the Church under the Board of Home

Missions after completing her training.

In accord with the foregoing, it is recommended that the following persons be received as Candidates under the Board of Home Missions and referred to the United Church Training School: Miss Doreen Pitt, presently on staff of All People's Churches, Hamilton, Ontario; and Miss. Margaret Taylor, R.N., presently on staff of Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton, B.C.

That estimated Budget of \$950 for 1962 be approved

4. Missionaries for Prayer: That we approve the recommendation of the Executive of General Council that the Missionary Education Committee of the Board of Information and Stewardship be asked to work out a satisfactory plan for allotting missionaries for prayer, and that this matter be referred to the Executive of the Board of Information and Stewardship; and, further, that we urge that a policy be established without delay.

Deputation Work.

Agreed to refer to the Executive nomination of two representatives to the Committee on Deputation Work.

Building Administrator

Re recommendation of Manitoba Conference H.M. Committee, urging the immediate appointment of a "full-time Administrator of Buildings and Equipment for the Home Mission Work in Manitoba Conference", agreed to adopt the following:

That, in the light of the action of the Sub-Executive of General O Council which directs "that no new appointments of personnel which would not come within the salary jurisdiction of the Staff and Salaries Council, until the Long Range Planning Committee has made a report of its thorough study on Co-ordination of Field Co-ordination of Field

- (a) That any unused portion of the allotment of \$75,000 for new construction in Indian communities in 1962 may be used by the Conference Home Mission Committee towards the cost of temporary supervision or administration of property in Indian communities;
- (b) That general approval be given to a similar use of such funds as may be allotted to Manitoba Conference for the year 1963.

- (c) That the matter be now referred back to the Executive of the Home Mission Committee of Manitoba Conference for further study.
- (d) That the responsibility for this programme will rest primarily with the Conference H.M. Committee, but that plans should be submitted to the Executive or Sub-Executive of the Board for approval.

## Report of Appropriations Committee

The Report of the Appropriations Committee was presented by Dr. M. C. Macdonald and adopted as follows:

- I. Salary and Travel Allowance:
- (1) That we carry out the instructions of the Nineteenth General Council in reference to the minimum salary and travel allowance as follows:

That the General Council increase the minimum salary for married ordained ministers from \$3,500 to \$3,800, together with a free furnished house, and that the Board of Home Missions be asked to implement this increase over a two-year period, \$150 in 1961 and \$150 in 1962. (Single ordained ministers on the same basis as married ordained ministers in salary and travel only.)

- (2) That for 1962 the salaries be built up to \$3,800 and that the travel allowance in force in 1961 be continued.
- (3) That all aid-receiving charges be notified, through the Presbytery Home Mission Convener and the Superintendent of Home Missions, of the new salary and travel scale for 1962.

The realization of this scale will depend on each charge fulfilling its salary promise and increasing it where possible.

- (4) That charges not now aid-receiving anad whose salary scale is below \$3,800 and whose car travel allowance is below the 1962 travel scale, through proper Presbytery action, make application to the Board of Home Missions for adjustment by way of special grant as soon as possible after the end of the calendar year. That to qualify for such special grants, these charges must conform to the regulations re canvass, as follows:
  - (a) Conduct an every-person and family canvass as soon as possible, but in any case before the fall meeting of the Presbytery concerned. Such canvass must produce a minimum increase in contributions towards the salary of \$100 over the amount paid in 1961.
  - (b) Further, these charges are expected to pay, in addition to salary, a car travel allowance equivalent to the Home Mission scale.
- (5) That car travel allowance will be made only where the minister owns and operates his car in the pursuit of his duties.

(6) That, to assist charges in reaching the General Council scale, each Presbytery be asked to appoint a Committee on Salaries (composed of three or more laymen and the Home Mission Convener), which will visit all charges requesting salary and/or travel grants. This Committee will advise and inform the charges concerned on matters of church finance, but especially on the salary and travel scale and the regulations, and also the method of conducting a proper canvass.

Before recommending that the Board of Home Missions pay a special grant on salary and/or travel to any charge not now on the list, Presbytery should be certain that a proper canvass was conducted and that the assistance requested is fully justified.

- (7) That on the basis of estimates of contributions from congregations, the scale of salaries for 1962 be as on Schedule 1, below.
- (8) That the Secretaries and Superintendents be authorized to review grants for Women Workers who are serving as Lay Supplies and revise, if necessary.

### II. Education Grant:

- (a) That a special grant of \$175 be made to any married, ordained minister or lay supply, in receipt of salary not above the Home Mission minimum, for each child who has to leave home to pursue undergraduate studies at any University or Teacher's College, and that it be understood that such a grant is not applicable to students taking a Theological course; special cases to be dealt with on their merits.
- (b) That a grant be made for not more than four years for a student in Arts or Science course and for not more than five years in a Medical or Dental course; and that if a student fails in his year, the grant will not be paid for the year in which he repeats the course.
- (c) That in making application a prescribed course be defined and the required university term be indicated.
- (d) That payment of the grant shall be made in two instalments—the first on receipt of a certificate of enrolment or attendance for the Fall term from the Registrar of the institution; the second on receipt of similar certification that the student is enrolled and in attendance for the term following the New Year.

## III. Travel Allowance for Transportation on Fields:

(a) In applying the scale it is understood that the total travel allowance given will be that which is nearest to the five-mile division. For example, if a minister's mileage is 26 or 27 miles he will get the 25-mile rate, but if it is 28 or 29 miles he will get the 30-mile rate. The same principle will apply at other divisional points in the schedule.

- (b) An ordained minister in the active work, serving a 1-point charge with 150 or more families, and on which a minister (in the active work) would normally be settled, and which cannot be linked up by Presbytery with another appointment to make a larger charge, shall receive \$500 a year towards car maintenance and depreciation.
- (c) An ordained minister on a charge of two or more appointments, where the Sunday drive is less than 10 miles, and where Presbytery, re-arrangement is impossible, shall receive \$500 a year towards his car maintenance and depreciation.
- (d) In charges where the summer and winter travel vary, the travel allowance will be worked out on the basis of three-quarters summer travel and one-quarter winter travel.
- (e) Charges, large or small, with exceptional conditions as to travel and location, and where re-arrangement by Presbytery is impossible, shall be dealt with on their merits.
- (f) Where there are two or more appointments and the minister is unable to operate a car to reach his preaching appointments or in the performance of pastoral duties, he be allowed up to the rate for Sunday mileage, with depreciation, after submitting accounts to the Board of Home Missions; each case to be dealt with on its merits.

The travel allowance to be as on Schedule 2 below.

## Report of Resolutions Committee

The Rev. L. G. Sieber presented the Report of the Resolutions Committee which was adopted as follows:

## Appreciation

Rev. W. M. Mustard, D.C.M., M.A., B.D., D.D.: The Board of Home Missions records with deep appreciation the services of the Rev. Dr. W. M. Mustard, Chairman of the Board from 1950 to December 31st, 1961. No one in our Home Mission circle has had a larger connection with Home Mission work than Dr. Mustard, his first association with the Board dating from 1941. Without interruption, he has served our cause in one or more capacities—sometimes as Presbytery Convener, Conference Convener, Board member, or on special Committees and Commissions set up by the Board.

We remember, with appreciation, his eminent fairness and skill as a Chairman, his wide knowledge of all areas of our work and his unfailing co-operation and support of every effort for advancement of our Home Mission cause.

Dr. David R. Preston: Resolved that a message of appreciation be sent to Dr. David R. Preston for his services as Superintendent of the R. W. Large Memorial Hospital at Bella Bella, B.C., during the two and a half years he has spent there. During this time, he has, in addition to his Hospital administration, not only carried on a medical practice, but has initiated and supervised the building of an out-patient department and an engineer's residence.

The Board appreciates his help with the mission work and his co-operation with our minister. The Board also wishes to express its regret that Dr. Preston has found it necessary to relinquish this position and wishes him success in his new field.

Miss Stella Burry: Born in Newfoundland, Miss Burry returned to serve in St. John's after completing the course at the United Church Training School and serving as Deaconess at Carlton Street United Church, Toronto. During her years in St. John's, she made a valuable contribution to the Church at large as well as to the local community. For a term she was a member of the General Council, serving on the Executive.

Miss Burry had completed twenty-three years of service on January 1st, 1962, and after her furlough year she will enter upon a well-earned retirement. We know that Miss Burry will continue to serve her Church for many years to come.

Miss Edith Clark: Miss Clark was appointed to Angola in 1925. For most of her years of service she was on the staff of Means School for Girls at Dondi and acted as Principal for a number of years. Miss Clark returned to Canada last year due to conditions in Angola. Since

September, 1961, she has been serving in the Queen Charlotte Islands. We are grateful for the year given to the Church in the homeland by this Overseas Missionary and wish Miss Clark well as she commences her furlough year, followed by retirement.

Miss Maimie Gollan: Miss Gollan is a graduate in Social Science, University of Toronto, and of the former Presbyterian Training Home. She commenced work under The Woman's Missionary Society of The United Church of Canada in 1927 at the Church of All Nations, Toronto, and served faithfully at this location until a year ago, when she transferred to College Street United Church. This summer, Miss Gollan will begin a well-earned furlough year, which will be followed by retirement, after serving her Church for forty years. "Well done thou good and faithful servant."

Mrs. Mabel Johansen: Mrs. Johansen was Miss Mabel Carroll when she commenced service in South China under The Woman's Missionary Society in May, 1926. She completed two full terms of service in China and returned to Canada on furlough when war was darkening in 1939. After a thirteen-year interval following her marriage, Mrs. Johansen again became one of our most valuable Occidental workers amongst the Chinese people, serving in Nanaimo, B.C. During the tragic fire last year in Nanaimo, Mrs. Johnansen was the key figure moving amongst the Chinese and Occidental people.

Miss Gertu Staples: Miss Staples was born in Balsam Lake, Ontario, and when she retires, following her furlough this year, will have served under The Woman's Missionary Society and the Church for thirty-three years. In 1929, she was appointed as Church Extension Worker in Toronto and since that time has served many Home Mission fields. Many boys and girls, now men and women, will remember Gertu Staples with gratitude, as do we all.

Miss Kathleen Metheral, Reg.N.: We wish to express our appreciation to Miss Kathleen Metheral, an Overseas Missionary Nurse, who has served for a term in the John Neil Hospital, Cold Lake, Alta. We extend to her our very best wishes as she prepares to return to India.

- Mrs. C. S. Patterson: The present would seem to be a most appropriate time for the Board to place on record its appreciation of the work of Mrs. C. S. Patterson in making Integration possible and effective. Her tireless efforts, her spirit of hearty co-operation and splendid leadership deserve our sincere thanks.
- Rev. D. H. Telfer, D.D.: Resolved, That the Board of Home Missions express to the Rev. D. H. Telfer its appreciation of the special services he rendered to the Church in connection with the survey of downtown churches in the City of Vancouver. The gathering of information and patient consultation with many congregations which he undertook laid the foundation for important future planning.

Interdenominational School for Rural Clergy: Resolved, That the Board of Home Missions, at its Annual Session, express its profound gratitude to the Interdenominational School for Rural Clergy at Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Ill. We wish to express our thanks for the welcome that has been extended to Canadians for twenty years, for the thoughtful, provocative, inspirational and academic leadership in the classroom, for the opportunity to share in residence life and consequent fellowship and association with representatives from the various denominations, and for the bursaries that have helped our men from time to time.

The Secretaries: To Dr. M. C. Macdonald and his colleagues we express, our thanks and appreciation for the wisdom and harmony with which they have consummated the work of Integration, and for the vision and faith with which they continually challenge us to meet the needs of our Church and Nation.

The Superintendents of Missions. Through the whole history of our United Church of Canada and back into the traditions that we incorporate, the Home Mission superintendency has been an important feature of our congregational life. Indeed, the effectiveness of our Church, especially on the frontier, has been largely due to the leadership of these wise and indefatigable men. Nor is the present generation of Superintendents in any way lacking in the leadership qualities of their predecessors. We record our appreciation of the services and leadership of our fourteen Home Mission Superintendents:

Charter Night: This Annual Meeting of the Board of Home Missions desires to express its appreciation to the Rev. George M. Morrison and his committees for their careful provision in making the Charter Night of this new Board an impressive and moving experience. We request Mr. Morrison to convey to all concerned our sincere gratitude, including the Minister and Officers of Trinity United Church.

### Greetings

It is requested that a letter of greeting and good wishes be sent to Mrs. T. E. Bissell, once again assuring her of our appreciation of her continued interest in the work of our Board, and particularly in the sons and daughters of our ministers who are helped from the Bissell Bursary Fund.

It is requested, also, that greetings be extended to all retired Superintendents of Missions, namely: Dr. W. S. Godfrey, Dr. J. I. MacKay, Dr. S. B. Stokes, Dr. C. H. Best, Dr. J. R. McDonald, Dr. J. L. Nicol and Dr. W. P. Bunt.
