WESLEYAN METHODISM.—No. II.

Mr. Editor,—A somewhat lengthened period has intervened between my last and this; but absence from home and other engagements must plead my excuse.

I proposed to speak of the Scriptural character of Methodism—its facilities for doing good—and the unfounded nature of objections against it. The first of these topics I considered in the former No. as far as Doctrines were concerned. I proceed now to contemplate—

2. The Institutions of Methodism.—And on this part of the subject let me premise, that I hold no exact system of church order or government to be laid down in the Holy Scriptures; but that that system which secures to the church an enlightened, converted membership—the regular and orderly dissemination of the Sacraments—and the enforcement of a sound and salutary discipline, is not to be gainsaid. I know the opposite of this position is held by many.

3. Another characteristic of Methodism is its Connexional structure. This is not exclusively peculiar to her—it is to be found, to some extent, in Episcopacy and Presbyterianism, especially the latter. The Free Church in Scotland, for instance, very nearly represents, in several respects, our Methodist connexion.

4. The last particular I shall mention as characteristic of Methodism is, the employment of special or extra means and efforts for the revival of religion and conversion of sinners—such as Camp, Protracted, Watch-Night Meetings, &c. These are sneered at by many as unwarranted by Scripture. But I would ask, is there anything connected with them which is unscriptural?

As this communication is already sufficiently long, let what has been said on the Scriptural character of Methodism suffice. Its facilities for doing good will form the subject of the succeeding number. With many prayers for the success and continuance of Scriptural Methodism, I am, yours, &c.,
