MINUTES

THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS MAY 15th, 1941

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Committee Room of the Home Mission Offices on Thursday, May 15th, 1941, at 2:00 p.m.

Members present: Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., Rev. R. B. Cochrane, D.D., Rev. George Dorey, D.D., Rev. M. C. Macdonald, Rev. J. G. Gorwill, Rev. Hiram Hull, D.D., Messrs. Fred Mann and J. F. Maine.

In the absence of the Chairman of the Board, Dr. W. H. Sedgewick was appointed to the Chair and constituted the meeting with prayer.

Dr. Hiram Hull was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

Communications were received from Rev. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., and Mr. K. M. Kilbourn, regretting their inability to be present.

Indisposition of Rev. R. J. McDonald, D.D.

Reference was made to the indisposition of Rev. R. J. McDonald, D.D. It was agreed that the matter of extra holidays be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Progress Report of Commission on Hafford Hospital

The Commission appointed to visit the Hafford Hospital presented a progress report.

Literature for Student Missionaries

It was agreed to vote \$75.00 to provide literature to help student missionaries in the presentation of the Missionary and Maintenance work on their fields.

Situation at Italian Church, Montreal

The situation at the Italian Church, Montreal, was discussed. The Secretaries were given power to make such arrangements for the supply of this, and other Italian work, as they may deem necessary.

Return Expenses to the East

It was decided to make a grant up to \$100.00 each, toward return travelling expenses to the East of Rev. G. F. Dangerfield and Rev. E. B. Bugden, who have been serving fields in Saskatchewan.

Property Claims

QUEBEC-

St. John's Hall, Quebec.—In connection with the extension of the building, an additional grant of \$3,000 was requested towards new wiring . and heating, etc. Agreed to vote \$2,000. MUSKOKA—

MUSKOKA---

Gibson Indian Mission.—Agreed to grant up to \$100.00 for repairs to parsonage and for new linoleum.

MIDDLESEX---

Caradoc Indian Mission.—The Board referred to the Executive the recommendation of Middlesex Presbytery that a new building should be erected for the work of the church on the Oneida Reserve. It was reported that a plan and estimates had been received, as follows: Total cost, \$10,000; to be raised by people, \$1,000; grant requested \$9,000. It was agreed to vote \$7,000. PRINCE RUPERT—

"Thomas Crosby," Ocean Falls.—On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

That, on the basis of the report made to the Marine Committee on the hull of the "Thomas Crosby IV" by Mr. Clark of the Board of Marine Underwriters which is contained in Mr. Bunt's letter of May 12th, 1941, as follows:

"In respect of the hull of the 'Thomas Crosby IV' we had it thoroughly gone over by the representative of the Board of Marine Underwriters, and accompanying him was Mr. Menchions, the boat builder who built the 'Crosby.' Dr. Wilson, Capt. Hilton, Mr. Kelly, and I were also present, and a very thorough inspection of the hull was made. Owing to certain regulations of the Board of Marine Underwriters, Mr. Clark, who inspected the hull, is not permitted to put into writing his report of our boat, inasmuch as the inspection was not made with a view to placing insurance upon the boat. However, Mr. Clark made the following statement to our Committee:

- (1) The hull is apparently as sound as the day it was built, and there is no need of any major repairs to it; and furthermore no indication of other than minor repairs being needed within the next eight or ten years.
- (2) Mr. Clark said that he would have no hesitation whatever in placing a new engine in the present hull as he was confident that barring accidents the hull would outlast another new engine."

authority be given for the purchase of a 6-cylinder, 102 horsepower Gardner Diesel engine, details of which are given in Mr. Bunt's letter of May 7th, and its installation in the "Crosby" at a total estimated cost of \$8,000;

That this sum be advanced from the Property Fund;

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the home of Mr. Fred Mann, at Cainsville, on Thursday, June 26th, 1941, at 11:00 a.m. The Chairman presided and constituted the meeting by prayer.

Members present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., R. B. Cochrane, D.D., George Dorey, D.D., M. C. Macdonald, S. H. Greenslade, J. G. Gorwill, Hiram Hull, D.D., Messrs. Fred Mann and J. F. Maine. Rev. H. A. Graham was made a corresponding member.

Rev. Hiram Hull was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following-

Investment of Home Mission Funds By Treasurer

The Secretary presented a statement from the Treasurer to the effect that at May 31st there was owing to the various Funds of the Home Mission Board by the Treasurer's Department an amount of \$979,431.33. However, since that date this amount has been reduced by \$162,000, which has been invested in Victory Loan Bonds.

The Executive expressed approval of this action of the Finance Committee.

Further, the Executive noted that, according to Sec. 133 (P.107) of the Manual, it is the duty of the Finance Committee "to invest and re-invest the funds of the Church and of its Boards when and for such times as the particular Board concerned desires such funds to be invested," and expressed the hope that the approval of the Board of Home Missions or its Executive might be sought before the investment or re-investment of its funds; and any one of the Secretaries was authorized, when asked to do so by the Treasurer's Office, between meetings of the Board and its Executive, to approve investments in the name of the Board of Home Missions.

Report of Committee on Superintendency of Missions in Montreal and Ottawa and Bay of Quinte Conferences

The Committee reported that it was still unable to make a unanimous report and recommended:

- (1) That it be continued, to report again at the next meeting of the Executive; and
- (2) That Rev. J. U. Tanner, D.D., be asked to continue as Superintendent of Missions until the end of September, at his present salary. (It was intimated that Dr. Tanner was willing to do so.) The recommendations were adopted.

Report of Commission on Hafford Hospital

The Commission, appointed by the Board to visit the Hafford Hospital, presented its Report, as follows:

The Commission visited Saskatoon and Hafford. After spending an entire day in conference with the local Board of Directors at Saskatoon, the members of the Commission went on to Hafford and gave another day to inspecting the hospital and grounds, interviewing members of the hospital staff and representatives of the adjoining Municipalities and the Villages surrounding the Hospital.

Later, the Commission, together with the Board of Directors, held a meeting with representatives of the Rural Municipalities and the Villages around the Hospital.

Comments of the Commission-

1. The Commission on its brief visit to Hafford Hospital was impressed by the foresight and wisdom of The Missionary Society of the Methodist Church which, nearly twenty years ago, chose this strategic centre as the site of a Church Hospital. We learned that even today the hospitals nearest to Hafford are in Saskatoon, 75 miles one way, and Battleford, 40 miles the other. Our information is that there are at the present time from 5,000 to 8,000 people who, when they need hospitalization, are nearer to Hafford than to any other centre.

2. The Commission feels that the Board of Home Missions has not fully realized the amount of thought given by Dr. Nicol to the oversight of the two hospitals in his superintendency. We understand that he estimated that at least one-third of his time in recent years has been taken up with the affairs of these two institutions. It is fortunate that we have in Dr. Nicol a man of such fine executive and administrative ability.

3. The Commission was impressed with the great interest the Board of Directors in Saskatoon has taken in Hafford Hospital. The members are leading citizens, nearly all of them busy men, yet they have given days to the intricate problems of the hospital business and to guiding its affairs through troublous times. The Church is very much indebted to this group of men for all they have done and are doing.

4. We were much impressed with the physical appearance of the Hospital, both inside and out. Its condition reflects great credit on the staff in charge. We were pleased to learn that further improvements to the grounds are contemplated.

5. Our visit confirmed our impression that each of the previous Medical Superintendents still has a following among the people of the communities contiguous to the Hospital, and the misunderstandings and controversy in connection with their resignation are still remembered, affecting adversely even till now the work of the Board and the present staff.

6. The Commission on its visit to the Hospital soon discovered that there has existed and still exists a lack of harmony between the medical section of the staff and those in charge of the household responsibilities. This lack of co-operation weakens the work of the Hospital within and without.

7. We found that everyone speaks in highest terms of the character of Dr. Runnells and recognizes that he is a fine type of Christian gentleman, but for some reason or other there has arisen among the people what seems to be a lack of confidence in him as a medical man. This is evidenced perhaps by the fact that during the month of April Dr. Runnells received only two calls to go to the country, and that we heard stories of some more serious cases being sent to Saskatoon or Battleford. When we were in Hafford there were six patints, and last week three only.

8. The representatives of the Municipalities at the Conference with the Board and the Commission impressed us as men of intelligence and sincerity, men who held definite opinions and were quite able to express them.

9. When the proposal for a co-operative plan of management for a term of years was suggested at the meeting in Hafford, it was evident that the Municipalities would be very much pleased if they had some say in the administration of the Hospital in the future. At the same time, it was also clear that the representatives felt that the stage of development had not been reached when they could undertake the maintenance of the Hospital by themselves.

10. It is clear from the action taken by the representatives of the Municipalities on June 14th, 1941, that a municipal hospital scheme in this area is probable, but that the securing of municipal doctors is unlikely. In view of this, it would seem evident that we may in the future expect much fuller co-operation from the people of the neighbourhood if we have in Hafford a doctor who, besides being a Christian gentleman, is also one who, as a medical man, has the complete confidence of the people in the municipality.

Recommendations-

The Commission recommends:

1. That the Executive in the name of the Board express its thanks to the local Board of Directors in Saskatoon for all their painstaking and efficient administration of the affairs of the Hospital during very perplexing and difficult years, and to Dr. Nicol, Secretary, for his competent leadership;

2. That meanwhile the Board of Home Missions continue to operate Hafford Hospital;

3. That as a goal to be reached within a reasonable time, the Board keep before it the probability that one of the Municipalities, or several of them together, will be able to take over the Hospital.on generous financial terms and look after the medical and hospital needs of the area to be served;

4. That for the next five years, the Board of the Hospital be increased in number to make possible the adding of representatives of the neighboring municipalities (the number to be decided by the local Board) as well as the addition of more representatives of the United Church from Saskatoon and rural areas to the north. This plan is to make possible the experiment of co-operative management of the institution and should be looked upon as a step towards the goal set forth in the previous paragraph.

- 5. That on the re-constituted Board, the United Church be represented:

7. That there shall be an Executive of the Board consisting of the members resident in Saskatoon, together with two others chosen by the local Board from the representatives of the Municipalities;

8. That the Board of Directors shall meet alternately in Saskatoon and Hafford. When the meeting is held in Hafford, the Home Missión Board shall be responsible for the expenses of the members of the Board nominated by the Church, and when the meeting is held in Saskatoon, each municipality shall be responsible for the expenses of their own representatives on the Board. The first meeting of the full Board shall be held at Saskatoon at the call of the Chairman;

9. That the local Board of Management seek to get an assurance from the Municipalities co-operating at as early a date as possible, that they will pay fully and promptly the fees decided upon as fair and reasonable;

10. That for the sake of harmony within the Hospital and because of the need of complete co-operation on the part of the Municipalities (which seems to be impossible with the present staff) there should be at an early date a re-organization of the staff to include a change in:

(a) the Medical Superintendent,

- (b) the Secretary,
- (c) the Cook.

11. The Commission is of the opinion that the Matron and the nursing staff should be asked to remain, but will be quite satisfied with any action the local Board may take with regard to the members of the staff who are not referred to in Section 10.

12. The Commission is convinced that the successful operation of the Hospital in the future is dependent upon securing a young and very competent doctor, who would not only commend himself because of his Christian character, but who would be able to command the confidence of the people in the Municipalities surrounding the Hospital. We recommend that the local Board and the Secretaries co-operate at the earliest possible moment in seeking a new medical head for the institution. The Commission desires to make it plain that it does not hold Dr. Runnells solely responsible for the lack of harmony within the Hospital, or the lack of confidence in the institution outside. Dr. Runnells has apparently not been receiving as full co-operation from some members of the staff as should have been given to him. Some of the criticism may have resulted from statements made outside by some disloyal member of the staff within. We are convinced, however, that there will have to be sweeping changes in the staff if any co-operative arrangement for management is to be successful. We would recommend that the Board treat Dr. Runnells in a generous way financially, and that the date of the changes in staff should not be so hurried that it will do any injustice to Dr. Runnells or anyone else;

- 13. (a) If in the future the Municipalities, in connection with their socialized medical scheme, secure a competent doctor or doctors, the local Board shall be given authority to arrange on what terms these doctors might follow their patients into Hafford Hospital;
 - (b) If we cannot find a competent doctor to be our, Medical Superintendent, and if a Municipal Doctor is found, the local Board shall be authorized to consider, as an experiment, the operation of the Hospital without a Medical Superintendent of our own, in much the same way, for example, as the Women's Missionary Society hospitals are carried on.

On motion, the thanks of the Executive were extended to the Commission and the Report was adopted.

The Secretaries were given power, together with the local Board, to give effect to the recommendations contained in the Report.

Work Among Czecho-Slovaks in Ontario

It was decided that Rev. H. C. Vaclavik be continued in the work among Czecho-Slovaks in Ontario until the end of December, next.

Retirement of Mrs. Bertha Brocklesby

The Secretary reported that Mrs. Bertha Brocklesby had resigned from the staff of the Home Mission Office; and that, as had been done in similar cases previously, an honorarium of \$50.00 had been paid to her. This action was ratified, and the Executive recorded its appreciation of Mrs. Brocklesby's long and faithful services.

Report re Action of Executive of the General Council re Matters Referred to It By the Board of Home Missions

Re Attitude of Canadian Christians to Non-Anglo-Saxon Citizens—

The Executive approved the principle of the resolution and requested the Secretary of General Council to give it as wide publicity as possible through the Observer, the United Churchman, the Western Recorder, and through press releases.

Re Pension Fund for Lay Workers-

The Executive approved the recommendation and instructed the Sub-Executive to appoint a committee to study the problems and report to the Executive.

Re Co-operation with Other Churches-

The Executive of the General Council approved the resolution in principle and referred it to the Sub-Executive for consideration and action. The Sub-Executive referred the matter to the Board of Home Missions to formulate definite plans as to how such co-operation might be worked out, for the guidance of the Sub-Executive.

This was referred to the Secretaries.

Re Licenses for Lay Workers to Administer the Sacraments-

The following resolution of the Executive of the General Council was referred to the Board: "That the Board of Home Missions be requested to consider the possibility of having a suitable service of recognition in cases where lay workers are granted a license from year to year to administer the sacraments of the Church."

Military Developments at Suffield, Alberta

It was reported that extensive military developments were in process at Suffield, Alberta, involving up to 5,000 men. The matter was referred to Dr. George Dorey.

Special Course of Study For Native Indian Workers

The General Council adopted the following resolution: "That a joint committee to be named by the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Home Missions deal with the question of the training and status as Local Preachers of Native Indian Workers relative to a special course of study, with power to issue."

Revs. George Dorey and M. C. Macdonald were appointed the Board's representatives on this joint committee.

John Milton Society For The Blind

It was decided to make a grant of \$10.00 to The John Milton Society for the Blind.

Re Acting Chairman For Committee on Rural Work

Rev. J. G. Gorwill was appointed Acting Chairman of the Committee on Rural Work, in the illness of Dr. J. R. Watts.

Fund For Retired Workers

The Board referred to the Executive the question of a grant to Miss M. M. Sleeth. It was decided to vote \$100.00.

Scholarships For Superintendents of Institutions

In accordance with the decision of the Board that three Scholarships of \$100.00 each should be given to Superintendents of City Mission Institutions for special study this year, scholarships were awarded to the following: Rev. R. G. Katsunoff, D.D., Montreal; Rev. J. K. Brown, Fort William, and Rev. Walter Ward, Regina.

Hospital Work

Re Bella Coola Hospital Board.—The resignation of Mr. J. P. Jorgensen from membership on the Board was accepted, and it was agreed that Miss Sally Tretiak be appointed in his place.

Marine Work-Pacific Coast

Recommendations from the Marine Committee were presented. After discussion, the recommendations were amended and adopted as follows:

- (1) That we continue, as rapidly as possible, to strengthen our Marine Work, as it is our considered opinion that we should not withdraw from any of the three fields served by our mission boats.
- (2) That the "Broadcaster" be sold.
- (3) That the "Sky Pilot" be sold.

Ł

- (4) That the proceeds from these sales be deposited in the Property Fund and applied as decided by the Board for the furtherance of the recommendation contained in Item No. 1.
- (5) That, if possible, a missionary with navigating experience be secured for the West Coast, as none is at present available in the British Columbia Conference.
- (6) That, inasmuch as the United Church has pioneered on the West Coast, and no other Protestant Church is conducting work on this important field, therefore work should be resumed with as little delay as possible.
- (7) That the "Melvin Swartout" be transferred, temporarily, to the East Coast, with headquarters at Alert Bay, and that Rev. Hugh Herbison be appointed missionary.
- (8) That before the "Sky Pilot" is sold, we take the necessary legal steps to change her name.
- (9) That we rent the manse at Banfield, on a monthly basis, to Mr. A. N. Wells, of the Cable Station Staff, at a rate to be arrived at after, consultation with Rev. U. Laite.

Indian Work

Re Leave of Absence for Mr. Fred Stevens, Cross Lake.—A request was received that Mr. Fred Stevens, missionary at Cross Lake, be given leave of absence to take studies in the United College, Winnipeg, this winter; Dr. F. G. Stevens to supply the work, and Mr. Fred Stevens' salary to be paid in full. No action was taken.

Gift of the Late Mrs. H. L. Thompson

The Secretary reported that the late Mrs. H. L. Thompson, of Toronto, had bequeathed \$1,000 to the Board of Home Missions, the amount to be spent in the Province of Ontario.

It was agreed that the gift be accepted; that the thanks of the Executive be conveyed to Mrs. Thompson's daughter; and that Dr. W. H. Sedgewick and the Secretaries be asked to explore a suitable use for this money.

Re St. Christopher House, Toronto

The Secretary submitted two communications from Mr. H. W. Crossin, the Chairman of the Board of Management of St. Christopher House, the first giving the details of a charter issued in 1920, which set up a self-perpetuating Board of Trustees to hold St. Christopher House property; and the second dealing with certain difficulties which the Board of Management of St. Christopher House found in trying to reconcile the conditions under which the grants towards the work were made by the Federation for Community Service, on the one hand, and by the Board of Home Missions, on the other hand.

After discussion, Revs. W. H. Sedgewick, Hiram Hull, George Dorey and S. H. Greenslade were appointed a committee to confer with the Board of Management of St. Christopher House and report to the next meeting of the Executive. Meanwhile, the Executive, following its usual policy, declined to vary in any way the decision of the Board a few months ago in reference to the grant to St. Christopher House.

Re Transfer' of Ordinands

The Secretary reported that twenty Ordinands had been transferred by the Transfer Committee to fields in Western Canada. He also reported that, according to information received from the Superintendents of Missions and the Settlement Committees, after appointing all available ministers and laymen, there still remained forty-nine vacancies in all Conferences.

Continuation of Special Grants

It was decided, in accordance with authority given by the Board, that special grants to aid-receiving charges should be continued for the last six months of 1941, subject to any adjustments necessary because of change of status.

Re Transfer From Maintenance Account to Home Mission Emergency Salary Account

The Secretary explained that-

The question of the manner of giving effect to the resolution of the Executive of the Board of Home Missions at its meeting held January 30th, 1941, dealing with a transfer from Maintenance Account to Home Mission Emergency Salary Account was discussed with Mr. H. L. Arnup, Assistant to the Treasurer, and the Auditor.

The Auditor pointed out that the proposed action was similar to one taken at the January, 1933 meeting of the Executive in connection with the 1932 accounts, when a specific sum of \$2,000 was transferred from Maintenance to Home Mission Emergency Salary Account, and recommended that the same method be followed in this instance.

A sum of \$10,000 was, therefore, agreed upon as being ample to provide for all such contingencies which might arise in connection with the 1940 accounts.

As this transfer leaves the Board underspent for 1940, there is no necessity of a transfer back to the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, as authorized at the last meeting of the Board.

Upon motion, the above action of the Secretary was approved.

- (2) Re Cranberry-Westview.—Grant at the rate of \$150.00 for this newly arranged field was voted for last half of year.
- (3) Re Blubber Bay and Vananda.—Grant at the rate of \$150.00 was allowed.

DIGEST OF MINUTES

THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS SEPTEMBER 25th, 1941

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room of the Home Missions Offices, Toronto, on Thursday, September 25th, at 10:30 a.m.

The Chairman presided and constituted the meeting by prayer.

Members present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., R. B. Cochrane, D.D., George Dorey, D.D., M. C. Macdonald, W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., Hiram Hull, D.D., S. H. Greenslade, J. G. Gorwill, and Messrs. Fred Mann, J. F. Maine and K. M. Kilbourn.

Rev. Hiram Hull, D.D., was appointed Minute Secretary.

Confirmation of Minutes

The Minutes of meetings of the Executive held May'15th and June 26th, 1941, were confirmed.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

(1) Lady Woods, thanking the Executive for its resolution in regard to the late Sir James Woods.

- (2) Rev. M. C. Macdonald, expressing appreciation of the flowers sent on behalf of the Board on the occasion of his mother's death.
- (3) Dr. R. J. McDonald, expressing gratitude to Dr. Dorey, personally, and to the Executive, for the consideration shown in the arrangements made for the carrying on of his work during his illness.
- (4) Rev. Hugh Miller and Dr. A. E. Archer, in appreciation of congratulations extended by the Executive.
- (5) The Secretary of the John Milton Society for the Blind, thanking the Executive for the small grant made to the Society.
- (6) The Secretary of the General Council, notifying the Board of the appointment by the Sub-Executive of Rev. Bryce H. Wallace to the Board of Home Missions, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Rev. H. E. Horton,
- (7) The Secretary of the General Council, advising that the Sub-Executive had appointed a committee to draw up recommendations re the provision of a pension for Lay Workers, to be considered at the next annual meeting of the Executive.
- (8) The Secretary of the General Council, advising that the Sub-Executive on June 24th had expressed the opinion that the Board of Home Missions has the right to make payments on compassionate grounds for the relief of the dependents of interned ministers.
- (9) The Treasurer's Department, advising that amounts paid into Home Mission Reserve during the six months ended June 30th totalled: Legacies, \$8,937.00; Home Mission Annuity, \$50.00.
- (10) The Oil Controller (in reply to communication from the Secretary of the Board), intimating that "if and when individual rationing of gasoline becomes a necessity, full consideration will be given to the rural ministers throughout Canada, and, if possible, sufficient gasoline will be made available for them to carry on their work."
- (11) The Secretary of the Saskatchewan Conference, forwarding a resolution of the Conference, asking that the Home Mission Board seriously consider raising their basic minimum salary to thirteen hundred dollars.

Sympathy

- (1) The Executive extended sympathy to Rev. M. C. Macdonald in the recent passing of his mother.
- (2) 'It was directed that a letter of sympathy be sent to Mrs. R. B. Steinhauer, on the occasion of the death of her husband, the late Rev. R. B. Steinhauer, D.D., and to the family of the late Rev. Frank Sanders, who recently passed away.
- (3) It was also directed that the sympathy of the Executive be extended to the family of the late Mr. E. E. Reid, Chairman of the Board of Pensions, who passed away yesterday, and that Mr. J. F. Maine be appointed to represent the Board of Home Missions at his funeral.
- (4) The Chairman was asked to convey the sympathy of this Executive to Dr. F. C. Stephenson, who suffered a serious accident two days ago.

Borrowings From Uninvested Balances of Home Mission Funds

A memorandum was presented from the Treasurer's Department, showing that at July 31st, 1941, borrowings from the various Home Mission Funds, to help finance the Missionary and Maintenance deficit, totalled \$952,676.12.

On motion, this action was confirmed.

Statement by Dr. Dorey re Situation on the Prairies

Dr. George Dorey, who had spent July and August in Saskatchewan, carrying on the work of the superintendency during the illness of Dr. R. J. McDonald, made a statement with regard to conditions there, and also in the other prairie provinces, so far as he had ascertained them through a conference held in Regina with the Superintendents of Missions.

The Chairman expressed the gratitude of the Executive to Dr. Dorey.

Proposed Christian World Mission Convocation

. The Board referred to the Executive the question of participation in and grant towards expenses of a proposed Christian World Mission Convocation, to be sponsored by the Home Missions Council of North America and the Foreign Missions Conference of North America, and to be held at Cleveland, Ohio, May 3-7, 1942.

It was decided to take no action.

Florence Thompson Trust

The Committee, appointed by the last Executive to consider a suitable use for the \$1,000 bequeathed by the late Mrs. Florence Thompson, of Toronto, for Home Mission Work in Ontario, presented the following recommendation:

That the interest from the amount be used annually to assist a candidate for the ministry from Northern Ontario during his Arts course; the recipient to be recommended each year by a Committee consisting of the Superintendent of Missions in Northern Ontario, the Conveners of the Home Mission Committees of the Toronto, Hamilton and London Conferences, the Secretary of the Board of Home Missions and the Minister of Westminster-Central Church, Toronto.

On motion, the recommendation was adopted.

Co-operation With Other Churches

The Secretary submitted for information a letter sent by the Moderator to the official heads of other Protestant Churches in Canada, suggesting conferences in regard to co-operation. He also reported that the Moderator had communicated with the Presidents of Conferences and the Chairmen of Presbyterics, suggesting that they co-operate with the Home Mission Superintendents and the Conference and Presbytery Home Mission Conveners in conducting a survey in their respective areas, to ascertain where, in their opinion, readjustment of work among the different communions is both desirable and feasible.

Report of Committee on Superintendency of Missions in the Montreal and Ottawa and the Bay of Quinte Conferences

Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, Chairman of the Committee, reported that the Committee was not yet in a position to make a recommendation regarding a successor to Rev. Dr. J. U. Tanner. He also reported that Dr. Tanner was willing to continue as Superintendent on a half-time basis, . at half-salary, until the end of the year.

It was agreed to accept Dr. Tanner's suggestion.

Request For Appointment of Missionary Under The Woman's Missionary Society

'A request was received from the Lethbridge Presbytery, endorsed by the Conference Home Mission Committee, that the Woman's Missionary Society be asked to appoint a woman worker to cover the rural areas surrounding the city of Lethbridge.

It was agreed to pass this recommendation on to the Woman's Missionary Society, with the approval of the Executive, and to suggest—

- (1) That the appointment be for two years, at the end of that time the situation to be reviewed.
- (2) That their missionary work under the direction of the Minister and Session of Southminster United Church, Lethbridge; and
- (3) That they modify their regulations so as to permit of the constituency served being asked to contribute towards the support of the missionary.

Dr. Dorey reported that he had attended the first meeting of the new Hafford Hospital Board, held at Saskatoon.

It was agreed to accept the resignation of the Medical Superintendent, Dr. George W. Runnells, as soon as he has written his Dominion Council examinations this Fall, and that the making of necessary financial arrangements with him be referred to the Secretaries.

Mitchell Memorial Hospital, Carrot River-

It was reported that a municipal doctor having been secured, the Hospital was open and the arrangment was working out very satisfactorily.

Change of Name and Constitution of "The Lakehead Mission"

It was reported that the Superior Presbytery had approved of the change of the name of "The Lakehead Mission" to "Wayside United Church," and had also approved a change of Constitution.

The matter was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Bequest of the Late Rev. Dr. W. A. Wilson

The Secretary reported that under the will of the late Dr. W. A. Wilson one-tenth of the residue of his estate was bequeathed to "The Home Missions and Social Service Board of the United Church"; the amount being \$1,673.00.

This matter was referred to the Secretaries, for consultation with the Secretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service, with the suggestion that the bequest be divided between the two Boards on the basis of the amount each receives from the Missionary and Maintenance Fund.

Method of Reporting Salaries of Ministers

It was decided to refer to the Sub-Executive of the General Council for its serious consideration the question of instituting a different method of reporting the salaries of ministers—i.e., dividing the total into two parts: (1) Transportation; (2) Salary.

;

Policy re Cost of Living Bonus to Men on Aid-Receiving Charges and Mission Fields

After discussion, the following resolution was adopted:

That, in view of the recognized increase in the cost of transportation and of living, affecting all our ministers and creating an excessive hardship to many of our underpaid ministers, the Executive of the Board of Home Missions would urge upon all Presbyteries and pastoral charges the primary responsibility which rests upon them for ministerial support, and their obligation in the present circumstances to make some special addition to salary, to offset the burden thus laid upon the ministers;

And that, having heard a statement from the Secretary with regard to the financial difficulties which the increased cost of living has brought to so many of our ministers, the Executive receive it sympathetically and instruct the Secretaries to continue their investigation and to bring to the next meeting of the Executive a further report in regard to the possibility of a cost of living bonus.

It was decided that this resolution should be given publicity in "The United Church Observer," and that a copy of it be sent to Secretaries of Presbyteries and Home Mission Conveners of Presbyteries.

Re Proposed Increase in Office Rent

It was reported for information that the Executive of the Board of Publications had notified the various Boards of the Church that office rental would be increased 10% from October 1st, and that the Sub-Executive of the General Council had advised that no action should be taken by the Departments until further notice by the Sub-Executive.

The Executive concurred in the attitude of the Secretary in opposing this increase at the present time.

Special License For Lay Supply

A request was received that the Board of Home Missions recommend that a special license to administer the Sacraments be given to Mr. G. T. Ralph, of St. Ola, and Mr. N. R. Flower, of Bancroft—both in the Belleville Presbytery.

No action was taken.

- (3) That the Secretaries explore further the possibility of securing Mr. Gualtieri for the Italian Work in Montreal.
- (4) That, in view of the pending sale of Shaw Memorial Church and the consequent necessity of securing immediately new premises for our Italian congregation, the Executive ask the Home Mission Committee of Montreal Presbytery to consider the advisability of approaching the Finance and Extension Board with the suggestion, that, because of the unexpected situation forced on the Board of Home Missions, the Finance and Extension Board consider the fairness of repaying, not only the \$5,000 cash contributed by our Board toward the purchase of the Shaw Memorial Church, but also the amount received from the sale of the Alma Street property.

The Late Rev. F. C. Stephenson, M.D., D.D.

The Executive adopted the following resolution in appreciation of the late Rev. Dr. F. C. Stephenson:

Resolved: That this Executive Committee record its high estimation of the service rendered to the Church and the cause of Christian Missions by the late Dr. F. C. Stephenson. His originality, initiative, extraordinary talent and unreserved consecration enabled him to provide a quality of missionary leadership unsurpassed by any Canadian in his generation. By what he did himself and by what he was able to inspire others to attempt; by his urgency for immediate action and by his patient persistence in long term methods, he won a unique place among missionary statesmen and contributed to the advancement of missionary policy throughout the world. It is one of the glories of the Church in Canada that it has given to the cause of Christianity a man of such outstanding talent and indefatigable spirit. His name will endure in grateful, reverent and affectionate memory.

The Late Professor A. Primeau-Robert

Reference was made to the recent death of Professor Primeau-Robert, of Montreal, and it was directed that a letter of sympahy be sent to his widow.

Home Mission Reserve-

High Cost of Living Bonus for Office Staff-

Dr. Dorey made a statement in reference to the recommendations of an inter-departmental committee on the giving of a cost-of-living bonus to the members of the staffs of the offices in the building. The Executive decided, after discussion, to defer this matter until the January Executive, when the whole question of cost of living bonus for men on aid-receiving charges and mission fields would be considered.

Bequest of the Late Rev. Dr. W. A. Wilson

The Secretary reported that, as instructed by the Executive, he had had conference with the Secretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service regarding basis for division of \$1,673.00, bequeathed, under Dr. Wilson's will, to "The Home Missions and Social Service Board of the United Church." He stated that the Board of Evangelism and Social Service would be pleased to receive \$250.00 as its share, but would be satisfied with \$200.00. On motion, it was decided to accept the following as the basis of division of this bequest: \$1,473.00 to the Board of Home Missions and \$200.00 to the Board of Evangelism and Social Service.

Rural Work

Rev. J. G. Gorwill made a statement with regard to the Rural Life Conferences, recently held in Ontario under the sponsorship of the Board of Home Missions, all of which were addressed by the Rev. Mark A. Dawber, D.D., of New York.

On motion, this Executive decided to ask the Secretary to express its gratitude to Dr. Dawber and to all who had responsibility for the setting up of the Rural Life Conferences.

It was agreed that one of the Secretaries be instructed to visit Alberta, to consult with the proper authorities of the Conference with regard to filling the vacancy, as directed by Sec. 170 of the Manual; report to be submitted to the Board.

Report of the Committee on the Superintendency of Missions in the Montreal and Ottawa and the Bay of Quinte Conferences

Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, Chairman of the Committee, reported that the Committee was not yet in a position to make a recommendation regarding a successor to Rev. Dr. Tanner.

On motion of Dr. Sedgewick, it was agreed that the committee be continued.

Moved by Mr. Fred Mann, and agreed, that Dr. Tanner be asked to continue his work on a half-time basis until the appointment of his successor, the Secretaries meanwhile to assume certain responsibility for field work in the area.

- (2) A formal resolution was adopted, giving Mr. Walter Engelstad, Business Manager, the necessary authority to conduct business with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, on behalf of the Lamont Hospital.

DIGEST OF MINUTES

THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS JANUARY 21st-22nd, 1942

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Wednesday, January 21st, 1942, at 10:00 a.m., the Chairman presiding.

The meeting was constituted with prayer by Rev. Dr. John L. Nicol.

The following members were present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., R. B. Cochrane, D.D., George Dorey, D.D., W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., Hiram Hull, D.D., J. G. Gorwill, B.A., B.D., S. H. Greenslade, B.A., Messrs. K. M. Kilbourn, J. F. Maine and Fred Mann.

On motion, the following were made corresponding members of the Executive: The Superintendents of Missions present—Revs. W. S. Godfrey, B.A., J. U. Tanner, D.D., J. C. Cochrane, D.D., J. A. Cormie, D.D., R. J. McDonald, D.D., J. L. Nicol, D.D., Thomas Powell, D.D., and W. P. Bunt, B.A., B.D.; also Rev. W. D. Noyes, D.D., Rev. J. C. Torrance, and Mr. W. B. Brandon.

Reference was made to the absence, on account of illness, of Rev. M. C. Macdonald. The Chairman was requested to convey to Mr. Macdonald the regrets of the members of the Executive and their good wishes for his speedy recovery.

The Secretary was directed to send a letter of greeting to Dr. J. R. Watts on behalf of the Executive and to express to him the pleasure of the members at the good progress he is making towards recovery.

Rev. Hiram Hull, D.D., was appointed Minute Secretary.

Confirmation of Minutes

The Minutes of the meeting of the Executive held November 18th, 1941, were confirmed.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) Mrs. James N. Shannon, in appreciation of flowers sent on behalf of the Board on the occasion of Mr. Shannon's death.
- (2) The Chairman of the Students' Theological Committee of United College, Montreal, expressing gratitude for the increase in remuneration for the summer's work on mission fields.
- (3) Rev. Walter Ward, of Settlement House, Regina, and Rev. J. K. Brown, of Wayside United Church, Fort William, in appreciation of

the opportunity given them through the scholarships granted by the Board to visit Social Service and Home Mission Institutions in the United States and reporting on the studies taken.

Re the Late Mr. James N. Shannon

The action of the Secretary in continuing payment of Mr. Shannon's annuity to Mrs. Shannon to December 31st, 1941, was approved.

Resolutions and Letters of Sympathy

The Late Hon. N. W. Rowell-

Reference was made to the death of the Hon. N. W. Rowell, and, on motion, the following resolution was adopted:

In the death of Hon. N. W. Rowell, K.C., the United Church of Canada and, indeed, the Christian forces of Canada generally, lost an almost incomparable leader. His outstanding gifts of head and heart, his personal religious devotion and his unbroken lovalty to his Church bore fruit in a lifetime of conspicuous and conscientious public service. His professional pre-eminence, his career in the Provincial Legislature, the Dominion Parliament and Government, and his service as Canada's representative at the League of Nations, are matters of public knowledge. Our concern is to point out that all his gifts and honours were held by him as a trust for service to the Kingdom of God. For many years Mr. Rowell was identified with almost every important enterprise of the Methodist Church but his particular attachment was to its Missionary Society, to which he gave freely large blocks of his time. Perhaps no layman had more influence in shaping the general policy of the Society. In matters of detail, too, he was always available for consultation. He was also one of the earliest leaders and ablest advocates of the Laymen's Missionary Movement and toured the country on its behalf. In this capacity he was as popular and as effective in the United States as in his own land. He was a leader of the Church Union movement from the beginning and became an ardent member of the United Church.

His illness and subsequent death have left a great gap in the foremost rank of lay Christian leaders in Canada and beyond.

To Mrs. Rowell and family we extend our heartfelt sympathy in the loss of a husband and father.

, It was directed that a copy of this resolution be sent to Mrs. Rowell.

The Late Rev. J. Macdonald Webster, D.D.-

ł

The Secretary called attention to the death of Rev. Dr. Macdonald Webster, General Sccretary of the Colonial and Continental Committee of the Church of Scotland.

The Executive, on motion, adopted the following resolution:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada notes with deep regret the announcement of the recent death of Rev. J. Macdonald Webster, D.D., General Secretary of the Colonial and Continental Committee of The Church of Scotland Overseas Department. The Executive is mindful of Dr. Webster's long and great concern for the Protestant groups in the continental countries of Europe, as well as of his unflagging interest in all the daughter Churches of Scotland in the different colonies throughout the world. Canada and the United Church had no better friend in Scotland than Dr. Webster. His frequent letters were sources of inspiration to all the Home Mission Executives, and he showed many kindnesses to the representatives of the Canadian Churches who had the privilege of visiting the Old Land, especially at the time of the General Assembly.

The Executive records its sense of loss at the passing of Dr. Webster and desires to express sincere and heart-felt sympathy to The Church of Scotland, to the Department he served, and to his immediate family circle, and instructs the Secretary to send this resolution to the Colonial and Continental Committee and to his family.

The Late Mr. James N. Shannon-

The Secretary was requested to write to Mrs. Shannon, conveying the sympathy of the Executive in her bereavement by the death of her husband.

Grant From Church of Scotland

The Secretary reported that a grant of \$331.00 had been received from the Church of Scotland and called attention to the decision of the Board that such amounts should be turned over to The Aid to British Churches Fund. It was decided that this amount should be returned directly to the Church of Scotland.

Report of Committee on Supérintendency of Missions

Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., presented the report of the Committee on the Superintendency of Missions in the Montreal and Ottawa and the Bay of Quinte Conferences. On motion, the recommendations of the Committee were adopted as follows:

- (1) That the Rev. J. I. MacKay, B.A., B.D., be appointed Superintendent of Home Missions for the Conference of Montreal and Ottawa and the Conference of the Bay of Quinte.
- (2) That the recommendation of a successor to Mr. MacKay at the Church of All Nations, Toronto, be left, as is usual in such matters, to the Secretaries, in consultation with the Chairman of the Board and Dr. Sedgewick.
- (3) That the date at which Mr. MacKay shall take over the work of the Superintendency, and all other matters involved, be left to the same Committee.

Mr. MacKay was later introduced to the Executive and was informed of his appointment as Superintendent of Missions. Mr. MacKay expressed appreciation of the confidence of the Executive and announced that he was ready to accept the appointment. The Chairman expressed the gratification of the members at his decision.

On motion, Mr. MacKay was made a corresponding member of the Executive.

Situation of the Japanese in Canada

Mr. Bunt made a statement with regard to the situation of the Japanese in British Columbia.

It was decided that the Secretaries should be given power, in consultation with Mr. Bunt, to take whatever action is necessary to provide for the continuance of the work of our Japanese Missions, when details of the Government's regulations are made public; and that the Secretaries send a letter of encouragement to the ministers of the Japanese churches, to be read to their congregations.

Re Oil and Gasoline Priorities

The Secretary reported on the representations he had made to the Oil Controller for Canada in regard to oil and gasoline priorities for rural ministers, superintendents, and secretaries, and stated that the reply received contained satisfactory assurance that ministers, where necessary, would receive consideration.

Re Automobile Tires for Rural Ministers and Superintendents

The Secretary was requested to communicate with the authorities, with a view to securing special consideration for rural ministers and superintendents of missions.

Student Missionaries and Student Fields

Report re Payment-

The Secretary reported that, by adding a further \$162.45 to the \$600.00 which the Executive in November had granted in addition to the \$31,000 voted by the Board in April, it had been possible to pay student missionaries at the rate of \$11.50 per week for their summer's work in 1941.

On motion, this extra amount of \$162.45 was voted.

Students Available for 1942-

It was reported that approximately 190 application's had been received from students for summer work and that the Superintendents desired that 206 fields be supplied this coming summer.

Anticipating that, because of military service and for other reasons, there would be a further decrease in the number of students actually available, it was decided—

- (1) That the Sub-Executive of the General Council be asked to request city congregations to release Assistant Ministers for service on vacant charges and mission fields for as long a term as possible.
- (2) That the Secretaries be instructed to take any other suitable measures to see that all student fields are supplied in the summer of 1942.'

Method of Payment-

It was agreed to continue the Plan for the Co-ordination of Students' Salaries for the summer of 1942.

Suggestion of Calgary Presbytery-

The suggestion of Calgary Presbytery that "the Manual be changed

so that each student shall spend three summers on a mission field before Ordination" was referred to the Board.

Medical Expenses, Mr. Donald MacRae-

It was reported that Mr. Donald MacRae had become seriously ill while serving on a mission field in Northern Alberta and had incurred heavy medical and hospital expenses. On motion, it was agreed to make a grant of \$150.00 towards these expenses.

Vacant Fields and Need of Ordained Men

Statement re Needs-

A statement was presented from the Superintendents of Missions to the effect that at the beginning of the next conference year approximately 131 fields would be left without ordained ministers.

Suggestion re Special Summer Course-

A proposal was presented that the Executive recommend to the Sub-Executive of the General Council that a special summer course be provided in 1942 for students now in second year Theology, so that they might be eligible for ordination in September, 1942, instead of in the Spring of 1943.

After discussion, it was agreed, on motion, that this whole question should be referred to a committee, to be appointed by the Chairman, for study and report to the Board.

The Chairman named the following committee: The Secretaries, Revs. W. H. Sedgewick, J. G. Gorwill, Hiram Hull, J. C. Cochrane and J. A. Cormie.

Reading Course for Lay Supplies_

On motion, a committee, consisting of the Secretaries, with power to add, was appointed to draft a Course of Reading for Lay Supplies, to be taken on their fields.

Fund for Retired Workers

Miss M. Bawden-

The question of continuance of grant of \$25.00 a month to Miss M. Bawden, which had been referred to the Executive, was considered. It was agreed that the Secretaries should continue to make further enquiries into Miss Bawden's circumstances and that in the meantime the grant be paid to December 31st, 1941.

Mr. John Davies-

The question of a grant from this Fund to Mr. John Davies was referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent for Northern Ontario.

Request for Appointment of Missionary under W.M.S.

Belleville Presbytery requested reconsideration of the Executive's decision to take no action on its recommendation that a woman missionary-at-large be appointed to the North Hastings area. It was decided to adhere to the action of the Executive in November.

Ministry to Military Camps and Areas Surrounding Munition Plants

A resolution was presented from Simcoe Presbytery, urging that the Boards of Home Missions and Evangelism and Social Service "initiate a campaign calling upon the generosity of our people to establish:

- (1) Such facilities as are needed, but are beyond the means of the local Church and people, to provide wholesome and homelike social surroundings in the small towns in the vicinity of large military camps.
- (2) Such full-time assistance as may be necessary, working in co-operation with the minister or ministers on the field.

It was agreed that this whole matter, including consideration of ministry to areas surrounding munition plants, should be referred to the Secretaries of the Boards of Home Missions and Evangelism and Social Service, and any others they may wish to have associated with them, for conference, and that a report be made to the meeting of the Board in April; the Superintendents of Missions in the meantime to gather information for the use of this committee.

Closing of Hafford Hospital

Dr. Dorey made a statement with regard to the temporary closing of the Hafford Hospital, because of the impossibility of securing a medical superintendent. On motion, it was decided to refer the matter to the Hospital Committee for study and report to the Board.

Special Licenses for Lay Workers

It was agreed to recommend to the Sub-Executive of the General Council that a special license to administer the Sacraments, for one year, be granted to:

Basis for Applications by Presbyteries for 1942 Grants

It was decided to instruct Presbyteries to make applications for grants for 1942 on the same basis as for 1941.

Basis for Special Emergency Grants and Cost of Living Bonus

The basis for special emergency grants and the question of cost-ofliving bonus were discussed. On motion, it was decided—

- I. To vote special emergency grants so as to build up salaries, as far as possible, to the scale adopted by the Board in 1941.
- II. To adopt the principle of paying a cost-of-living bonus for 1941 of-
 - 1. \$100.00 To
 - (a) Men on aid-receiving charges and Home Mission fields.
 - (b) Superintendents of Institutions and members of their staffs, except St. Christopher House, whose staff is already in receipt of a bonus from another source.
 - (c) Medical Superintendents of Hospitals—(In this case it is hoped that the bonus can be met from the ordinary revenue of the hospital).
 - 2. 81/2 % of Salary To
 - (a) Staff of Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute.
 - (b) Janitors in the Institutions.
 - 5% of Salary To Nurses and Staffs in Home Mission Hospitals.
 - 4. Re Office Staffs:

It was decided that the office staffs should receive the same bonus as was decided upon-by a Conference of the Secretaris of all the Departments—this bonus to be paid to the Home Mission Staffs on account of 1941.

Cost of Living Bonus, Secretaries and Superintendents

On motion of Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, seconded by Mr. J. F. Maine, the following resolution was adopted:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions expresses the opinion that all Secretaries and Superintendents serving under the various Boards of the United Church should receive a cost-of-living bonus for 1941, and requests the Sub-Executive of the General Council to empower the several Boards to pay such bonus.

Dr. Sedgewick was asked to present this resolution to the next meeting of the Sub-Executive.

The Secretaries were instructed to ask the Treasurer's Office to keep the books open for a sufficient length of time to enable payments to be completed.

Property

Authority to Write Off Balances.—Authority was given to write off balances on the books in connection with properties sold during the year for less than the amounts carried in the respective accounts.

BONAVISTA-

Greenspond—Boat, "Northern Messenger."—The action of the Secretaries in authorizing transfer of an unused engine from St. Anthony, and purchase of new batteries, at a total cost of \$25.00 plus freight, was confirmed.

Essex---

Windsor, Ottawa Church.—Agreed to cancel interest on loan for 1941, provided the congregation pay \$200.00 on principal.

LAMBTON-

Walpole Island, Church.—A grant of \$200 was voted towards moving and repairing the church building—estimated cost \$600.00.

Walpole Island, Parsonage.—Agreed to make the necessary grant to replace plaster on the ceiling of the living-room.

SUPERIOR-

Port Arthur, Fourth Ave. Mission.—Agreed to confirm action of the Secretaries in authorizing repairs to the foundations of the building, at a cost of \$80.00.

WINNIPEG-

Pine Falls—Loan.—It was requested that no interest be charged for 1941; the congregation to pay \$500 on principal and be given credit for an additional \$500 on principal. Agreed.

North Winnipeg Mission.—Agreed to pay \$43.20 to cover cost of changing the signboards on the Stella Ave. and Sutherland Ave. Missions.

BATTLEFORD-

Rothermere.—Agreed to vote \$66.00, being two-thirds of cost of painting the church and manse.

KAMLOOPS-OKANAGAN-

Malakwa.—\$50.00 was voted towards cost of manse, erected for use of the student missionary.

KOOTENAY-

Michel.—A request for a grant of \$200.00 for repairs to the church was referred to the Board; further information to be obtained.

PRINCE RUPERT-

Port Essington, Mission House.—Agreed to vote an amount sufficient for purchase of three mattresses and one set of springs.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton.—It was agreed that the Secretaries should correspond with Dr. Austin to ascertain whether, in the event of a grant being made from the Property Fund towards the purchase of a new engine for the generating plant, there could be a reduction in the grant from the Board for maintenance.

Bella Coola Hospital.—It was reported that the local Hospital Board was requesting three grants—\$250 from the Provincial Government, \$250 from the Dominion Government, and \$100 from the Home Mission Board —for the purchase of a new sterilizer. This was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

VICTORIA-

Union Bay, Manse.—The Executive in November considered a request for a loan of \$500 and a grant of \$300, to assist in building a new manse, and voted a loan of \$700 and a grant of \$100. (b) Grant at the rate of \$5 per Sunday was allowed for student supply, when necessary, between now and June—total not to exceed \$25.00.

Canterbury.—Special grant of \$50 was voted towards salary of Rev. F. W. Sawdon, who supplied for three months.

MONTREAL-

Return Expenses to the East, Rev. J. R. Burt.—No action was taken on request for grant towards these expenses.

QUEBEC-SHERBROOKE-

Lake Megantic.—Grant was allowed at the rate of \$2.00 per week towards expenses of supply from Lennoxville, from December 1st, till superannuated minister can be secured.

Kent-

Moraviantown.—Presbytery endorsed request for increase of \$75.00 in the grant to the missionary-teacher. Agreed to pay cost-of-living bonus for 1941 at the rate of \$100.00, less bonus paid by Government, as decided upon in similar cases.

SUPERIOR-

Travelling Missionary.---No action was taken on request for special grant of \$75 for 1941, owing to increased cost of transportation.

GRANDE PRAIRIE-

Montney.—Grant at the rate of \$20 per trip was voted for supply of Montney from Grande Prairie during the winter.

KOOTENAY-

Proctor and Castlegar.—Presbytery requested honorarium of \$100 for Mr. Ferguson, who supplied these fields on alternate Sundays during the year. Agreed to vote additional \$100 towards Mr. Ferguson's expenses.

MARINE-

Salaries of Engineers.—Recommendations of the Marine Committee were considered, and it was agreed:

(1) That, until revised, the basic salary for the Engineer on the "Melvin Swartout" be \$85.00 per month, plus cost of living bonus of 10%; and on the "Thomas Crosby," \$90.00 per month, without cost of living bonus; to be effective as from January 1st, 1942.

(2) That further adjustments in salary be made later, if necessary.

DIGEST OF MINUTES THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS APRIL 15th-17th, 1942

The Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Wednesday, April 15th, 1942, at 10:00 a.m.

The Chairman, Rev. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., presided and conducted the devotional exercises.

Rev. Hiram Hull, D.D., was appointed Minute Secretary.

Roll Call

The following members were present: Rev. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., Rev. R. B. Cochrane, D.D., Rev. George Dorey, D.D., Rev. M. C. Macdonald, Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., Rev. Hiram Hull, D.D., Rev. J. G. Gorwill, Mr. K. M. Kilbourn, Mr. Walter Little, Mr. J. F. Maine, Mr. Robert S. Dunlop, Rev. H. M. Davis, Rev. Hugh Miller, Rev. H. A. Carson, Mr. W. B. Brandon, Rev. S. H. Greenslade, Mr. Fred Mann, Rev. G. C. Raymer, Mr. J. E. Matthews, M.P., Rev. W. H. Black, Rev. Thos. Hart, D.Th., Rev. Bryce H. Wallace, Mrs. C. M. Loveys. *Corresponding Members*: Revs. H. Rev. R. A. Felton, Ph.D., Professor of Rural Sociology at Drew Theological Seminary, was welcomed and made a corresponding member.

Regrets were presented from Mrs. J. Erle Jones, and the Secretary explained the absence of Rev. R. J. McDonald on account of illness. It was requested that the greetings of the Board be conveyed to Dr. Mc-Donald and to Dr. J. R. Watts. The Minutes of the meetings of the Executive held May 15th, June 26th, September 25th and November 18th, 1941, and January 21st, 1942, were, on motion, confirmed.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (a) Mrs. Rowell, thanking the Executive for its resolution with regard to the late Hon. N. W. Rowell.
- (b) Rev. Alex. King, Secretary of the Colonial and Continental Committee of The Church of Scotland, in appreciation of the resolution' with regard to the death of his predecessor, the late Dr. Macdonald Webster; and also thanking the Board for the return of the grant of \$331.00 on account of Mission Work in Canada.
- (c) Mrs. J. R. Watts, expressing Dr. Watts' appreciation of the letter of greeting sent in the name of the Executive.
- (d) The Presbyteries of Kingston, Assiniboia, Elrose, Shaunavon, Arcola, Battleford, Swift Current, Yorkton, Regina, Victoria, Westminster, Kamloops-Okanagan and Vancouver, in appreciation of the cost-ofliving bonus voted by the Executive. (The Secretary also reported that letters of appreciation had been received from sixty individual recipients of the bonus.)
- (e) Secretary of the General Council, re proposed changes in the method of presenting the work of the various Departments of the Church to the General Council.
- (f) Secretary of the General Council, advising that the resolution of the Executive of the Board with regard to cost-of-living bonus for Secretaries and Superintendents serving under the various Boards of the Church had been referred by the Sub-Executive to the Executive of General Council.
- (g) Secretary of the General Council, advising that the Sub-Executive had referred to this Board a communication from Rev. A. J. Terrill, with regard to the activities of certain Sects in Ontario. This was referred to the Committee on Rural Work.

Appointment of Committees

The following committees were named:

Presentation of Reports

Stencilled Reports of Superintendents of Missions, Superintendents of Institutions, Principals of Residential Schools, and of the Treasurer, were presented to the members of the Board.

Superintendency of Missions in Central and Northern Alberta

Retirement of Rev. Thomas Powell, D.D.-

The Secretary explained that he had intimated to the Executive at its meeting in January that Dr. Powell had written to say that, since he would be seventy before June 30th next, he would, under the regulation of the Board, retire at that date.

Resolutions of Presbyteries-

The Secretary reported that resolutions had been received from the Presbyteries of Camrose, St. Paul and Vermilion, and also a communication from members of Lacombe Presbytery, recommending that Dr. Powell be continued in office for the duration of the war.

Report re Meeting in Alberta-

The Secretary also reported on his meeting with Representatives of the Alberta Conference and the Conference Home Mission Committee.

On motion, it was agreed that the Chairman should nominate a committee to consider and report on the appointment of a Superintendent of Missions to succeed Dr. Powell.

The following were accepted as the Committee: Rev. W. H. Sedgewick (Convener), Rev. Hiram Hull, Mr. Fred Mann, Mr. J. F. Maine, Rev. W. H. Black, Rev. B. H. Wallace, Rev. Hugh Miller, Mr. J. E. Matthews, the Secretaries and the Chairman.

It was agreed that two additional matters should be referred to this Committee, namely—

- (1) The relation of Rev. J. C. Torrance, Secretary of the Toronto Home Missions Council, to this Board; and
- (2) The status of Rev. M. C. Macdonald.
- Report of Committee on Superintendency and Other Matters referred to it—

Re Superintendency of Missions in Alberta: The Recommendations of the Committee were considered seriatim and adopted as follows:

- (1) That the Rev. Thos. Powell, D.D., having reached the age for retirement, be permitted to retire, as from August 31st, 1942; that his salary be continued for three months after that date; and that the Resolutions Committee be requested to prepare a suitable resolution.
- (2) That the Rev. J. M. Pritchard, D.D., be appointed Superintendent of Home Missions for Central and Northern Alberta, as from September 1st, 1942, he to reside in Edmonton.

Re Other Matters referred to this Committee: After amendment, the Recommendations of the Committee were adopted as follows:

- (1) That Rev. J. C. Torrance, B.A., be appointed Superintendent of Home Missions for the three Toronto Presbyteries, retaining as heretofore the office of Secretary of the Toronto Home Missions Council.
- (2) That the salary of Rev. M. C. Macdonald be increased to \$3,000 as from May 1st, 1942, and that his status remain the same.

Statements by Superintendents

Brief statements regarding their work were made by the Superintendents of Missions, and also Rev. W. D. Noyes and Rev. J. C. Torrance.

Home Department Extension of Sunday School

A Report was presented showing that in 1941, 115 requests for supplies had been received—a decrease of 55 from the year before. Materials were sent out which, at regular retail prices, would have cost over \$650.00, but which, in view of the discount granted by The United Church Publishing House and the contributions from the fields served, cost the Boards of Home Missions and Christian Education only \$154.00. It was pointed out that there was a falling off in the number of Home Department Extension organizations being left by the students on the fields at the close of their summer term, and it was suggested that the attention of student missionaries be called to the importance of this work.

A grant of \$250.00 was voted for 1942.

Home Missions Council of North America

On motion, a grant of \$400.00 was voted to The Home Missions Council of North America for 1942.

Report re Bissell Bursary Fund -

The Secretary reported that for the academic year of 1941-42, the Trustees of the Bissell Burşary Fund had awarded 12 Bursaries, totalling \$975.00, as follows:

Owing to the fact that the applications for assistance from children of men on aid-receiving charges in the Prairie Provinces were considerably fewer than in previous years, the Trustees, with the approval of Mrs. Bissell, had included British Columbia last year and two of the Bursaries had been awarded to children of ministers in that Province.

On motion, the Report was received and adopted.

Fund for Retired Workers

Appropriation for 1942-

It was decided to appropriate \$3,000 for the Fund for Retired Workers for 1942.

Grant from Fund-

It was agreed to continue the grant of \$25.00 per month to Miss M. Bawden for the first six months of 1942, and to refer to the Executive the question of further grant.

Report of Committee on Appointment of Students

The Report of the Committee on the Appointment of Student Missionaries for summer work was presented and adopted as follows:

(1) During the summer of 1941, 198 students served the Board under its co-operative plan (ordinarily called the "Students' Pool"), and 8 others were appointed on a special basis. Once again the Board is indebted to the Minister and members of Chalmers Church, Ottawa, for extra money for the support of 4 students during the summer.

(2) The Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students was carried out again in 1941. With the aid of \$1,090.70 from Designated Gifts and an extra grant by the Executive of \$762.45, together with the regular appropriation of \$31,000.00, we were able to pay each man \$11.50 per week, plus allowance for board and travel on the field. The previous year the students received only \$10.50 per week.

(3) The Executive decided that the Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students should be continued for 1942.

(4) The Committee have appointed to fields this year 196 students. They are distributed in the different Superintendencies as follows:

(5) The Committee was faced with unusual difficulties in connection with the appointment of students for the summer of 1942. Only 195 applications were received at first. Since then about 28 students have withdrawn their applications. In most cases, these withdrawals come from theological students who feel the need of more money than they would earn on summer mission fields, and have taken various kinds of positions in war industries. Fortunately a few more applications from candidates for the ministry have been received recently.

(6) To face the shortage of men, the Executive authorized the Secretaries to see if some deaconesses would accept fields for the summer, and to get in touch with Senior Arts Students and find out if some of them, members of the United Church and definitely interested in religious work, might not be secured. From this class of students 25 applications have been received, and 12 have been appointed. The Committee has been careful to select only those who are highly recommended, and with whom one of the Secretaries has had a personal interview.

(7) The date at which many of those appointed will be able to reach their fields depends on when the Dominion Government arranges for summer military training camps. There is very great uncertainty, not only about the date, but whether or not exemption will be secured by some of the students. The Secretaries have been in constant touch with Ottawa throughout the year in regard to this matter, but have no final reply as yet. It seems clear that if a student, because of military service, is not available for his field until the end of June, if other supply is available, some one else will have to be appointed.

(8) The Committee recommends that the appropriation for this work during the coming summer be \$31,000.00.

Report of the Literature Committee

Rev. M. C. Macdonald presented the Report of the Literature Committee, showing that in 1941-42, 125,000 copies of the booklet, "Building the Nation's Sure Foundations," issued jointly by the Home Mission Board, the Board of Evangelism and Social Service and the Missionary and Maintenance Committee; 125,000 copies of the pamphlet; "Through Home Mission Windows," issued jointly by this Board and the Missionary and Maintenance Department, and 115,000 copies of the pamphlet, "The Touch of His Hand," had been printed. The total net cost of this literature to the Board, including postage and express, was \$2,777.50. Slightly over 50% of the total number of charges, namely 1,406, ordered literature. as against 721 the previous year. The total quantity of each booklet or pamphlet distributed from Toronto was: "Building the Nation's Sure Foundations," 106,282; "Through Home Mission Windows," 106,859; "Touch of His Hand," 89,479, in addition to which orders were filled from Conference Headquarters in Montreal, Winnipeg and British Columbia.

On recommendation of the Committee, the following suggestions re literature to be issued in 1942 were approved:---

- Illustrated Booklet, to be published jointly by the Boards of Home Missions and Evangelism and Social Service and the Missionary and Maintenance Committee, dealing with the services of our Church to the Nation—according to Conferences.
- (2) Pamphlet on the Marine Work of the Church, to be published jointly with the M. & M. Committee.
- (3) Pamphlet, in story form, containing stories of unusual interest regarding Home Mission Work.
- (4) That the Secretaries of the Board explore the advisability of publishing, in conjunction with such other Boards as might be interested, a booklet which would awaken the interest of indifferent persons and non-church-goers in attendance at Church and in the support of the Church's work.

It was also agreed-

- (1) That the present practice of sending out a Monthly Bulletin from the Home Mission Office should be continued; and
- (2) That the possibility of securing regular space in the "Observer," once a month, to be devoted to Home Mission information might be explored.

Report re James Evans Memorial Bursary

Rev. J. A. Cormie, reporting for the James Evans Centenary Committee, stated that the contributions to the James Evans Memorial Bursary were as follows:

On motion, it was decided to make an additional grant from the Board, so as to bring the total amount up to \$3,000.00. The administration of this Fund is in the hands of the following Bursary Committee, appointed by the Executive of General Council: Judge D. A. E. Hamilton, Chairman; Dr. J. A. Cormie, Secretary; Principal W. C. Graham, Prof. R. K. McClung, Mr. L. J. Reycraft, Mr. F. S. Harstone and Rev. R. B. Cochrane.

Radio Broadcasting

The following resolution was presented from the Moose Jaw Presbytery: "Inasmuch as the Radio Gospel Hour arranged by a Committee of Saskatchewan Conference serves the need of people in various parts of Saskatchewan who are not within reach of regular church services, particularly during the winter months, and so is rendering a definite missionary service, this Presbytery requests the Home Mission Board to make provision for the support of this enterprise." It was decided to take no action.

Address by Dr. R. A. Felton

Dr. R. A. Felton, Professor of Rural Sociology at Drew Theological Seminary, addressed the Board, and other invited Home Mission workers, on Rural Problems. The address was followed by a general discussion.

The Chairman conveyed the gratitude of the Board to Dr. Felton, and Rev. J. G. Gorwill, speaking on behalf of the Rural Committee, expressed appreciation of Dr. Felton's visit and of his addresses to the Rural Committee and to the Board.

Introduction of Workers

Before the adjournment of the Board for a social half-hour, the Superintendents of various City Mission Institutions in Toronto and Hamilton introduced their staffs, as follows: Rev. J. I. MacKay, the staff of the Church of All Nations; Rev. W. H. Burgess, the staff of Queen Street Church; Rev. W. A. Hunnisett, the staff of Fred Victor Mission; Miss M. Barnes, the staff of St. Christopher House, Toronto, and Rev. W. H. Pike, the staff of All Peoples' Churches, Hamilton. Rev. L. Sauro, of the Italian Church, Toronto, introduced Mrs. Mercer, the Deaconess at his church. Mrs. C. M. Loveys and Miss Gertrude Rutherford explained the unavoidable absence of women workers under appointment to positions under the Home Mission Board.

Scale of Expenses of Members of Board

On the recommendation of the Committee appointed to consider the scale of expenses of members of the Board, the following was adopted:

- (1) That members be paid the cost of railway and sleeper tickets to Toronto and return; the cost of meals en route—such cost not to exceed \$3.50 per day; and the cost of hotel and meals in Toronto not to exceed \$4.00 per day.
- (2) That those travelling by motor car be paid on the basis of railway fare; and
- (3) That the amount for Sunday supply shall not exceed \$15.00 per Sunday.

Report of Committee on City Mission Work

The Report of this Committee was presented by Rev. J. C. Torrance and was adopted as follows:

(1) Evangelism.

That the Board reaffirm its conviction that, while Social Service activities must necessarily form an important part of the work of our downtown churches and institutions, evangelism and religious education should always be recognized as of essential importance and put in a primary place.

(2) Liquor.

That the Board express its regret that, in these days of war, so little sympathy is manifested in Government circles to the request that the traffic in alcoholic beverages be curbed. Particularly because of the number of young people who have come to the city to work in war industries, and the thousands of members of the armed forces in all our centres of population, we believe that every possible temptation to indulgence in intoxicating liquors should be removed. It is evident that this should be done not only in the interests of sobriety and decency, but for the sake of efficiency in the country's war effort. This Board joins with the other Boards of the Church, and with other denominations, and organizations, in the demand that the Government declare its position and take action to eliminate this unnecessary evil.

(3) Queen Street United Church.

'Inasmuch as Rev. W .H. Burgess, the Superintendent minister of Queen Street United Church, has resigned we recommend(a) That the Secretary of the Board write to Mr. Burgess conveying the deep appreciation of this Board for his many years of devoted service in most difficult downtown areas.

(b) That Rev. Fred Smith, B.A., be nominated to the Settlement Committee of Toronto Conference as Superintendent minister of Queen Street United Church.

(4) Furloughs for Ministers.

Last year the Board voted that three \$100.00 scholarships be made available for the Superintendents of Institutions, in order that they might visit some centre and do some special study, subject to the approval of the Executive; such scholarship to be available to men who have spent at least five years in their specialized field of work, and the period of time to be one month, in addition to their regular holiday. Acting on those instructions scholarships were provided for:-

> Rev. R. G. Katsunoff, Montreal Rev. J. K. Brown, Fort William Rev. Walter Ward, Regina.

In the light of the success of this experiment last year, your Committee recommends that three \$100.00 scholarships be provided for the year 1942.

Treasurer's Report

Mr. H. L. Arnup presented the Treasurer's Report, especially as it relates to the finances of the Board of Home Missions.

The Chairman extended to Mr. Arnup the cordial thanks of the Board.

Uninvested Funds of Home Mission Board

The following memorandum from the Treasurer was presented:

The Treasurer of the Church was authorized by the General Council and its Executive to make provision for financing the work of the Church during the year and for carrying the accumulated deficit on the Missionary and Maintenance Fund and participating funds by advances from liquid balances belonging to the Church or its Departments and by loans from the Banks; and further

The Boards or Committees administering the Funds to which such liquid balances belong were to be advised periodically of the amount of such advances. (Year Book, 1933, Page 19).

In compliance with this resolution the Treasurer reports that at December 31st, 1941 the following uninvested balances of Home Mission Funds were being used for carrying the deficit and financing the work—

Report of the Committee on Indian and Oriental and Marine Work

Rev. W. P. Bunt presented the Report of the Committee. It was considered item by item and adopted as follows:

Indian Work

Appointments and Nominations to Settlement Committees-

(1) That the following nominations be made to the Settlement Committees of the Conferences concerned:

(2) That the following appointments be made:

(3) That all appointments and nominations which cannot be made now be referred to the Secretaries and to the Superintendents concerned, with power.

Appreciation, Mr. G. H. Grieve-

That a letter of appreciation be sent to Mr. G. H. Grieve for his years of service on the Fisher River and Island Lake fields.

Sympathy, Mr. Ewart Monias-

That a letter of sympathy, on account of his illness, be sent to Mr. Ewart Monias.

Grant to Rev. F. G. Stevens, D.D.-

That the grant of \$25.00 per month be continued to Rev. F. G. Stevens, D.D., for one year.

Conference of Indian Workers-

That no action be taken in regard to the proposed Conference of Indian Workers at Mount Elgin Residential School, owing to the lack of accommodation at the School; and

That approval be given for the holding of a Conference at Norway House Residential School, and that a grant of \$300 be made towards expenses.

Resolutions of Prince Rupert Presbytery-

(1) That, with regard to the statement of Prince Rupert Presbytery, outlining a procedure which might be followed in *licensing native local preachers*, the Presbytery be advised that the Manual gives full power to the Presbytery to draw up regulations for the licensing of its native local preachers, and that the Board will meet the cost of preparing suitable certificates to be given each licensee. (2) That, with regard to the recommendation that the salaries of missionary-teachers be increased to \$1,150.00 a year, the Board make a grant, in the case of lay missionary-teachers, to build the basic salary up to \$1,050.00.

Re Chaplain for Coqualeetza Sanitarium-

That the recommendation of Westminster Presbytery, "That a Chaplain to the Coqualeetza Sanitarium be appointed, the Home Mission Board to provide the remuneration, the duties to be to conduct services for the staff and visit the United Church Indians"—be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Disposition of Government Bonus to Residential Schools-

That the Secretaries be given power to disburse the 1941 special Government bonus, after consultation with the Indian Affairs Branch at Ottawa, according to the relative needs of the various residential schools.

Re Relations with Roman Catholic Missionaries-

That very careful consideration be given to the problems arising from the presence of Roman Catholic missionaries on the Reserves, and that the Secretaries be authorized to do what seems wise under the circumstances which develop from time to time.

Oriental Work

Re Japanese Situation-

Statements were made by the Rev. W. P. Bunt and the Rev. Bryce H. Wallace with regard to the Japanese situation on the Pacific Coast. Mr. Bunt reported:

- (1) That at present Japanese women and children from Ocean Falls, Vancouver Island and other places are housed in Hastings Park, Vancouver. This provision is more or less temporary, pending the final decision of the Security Commission of British Columbia.
- (2) That male Japanese nationals are being sent to construction camps in the areas of:
 - (1) Hope-Princeton
 - (2) Sicamous-Revelstoke
 - (3) Jasper
- (3) That male Japanese who are Canadian by birth are being sent to Schreiber and Northern Ontario camps.
- (4) That it is suggested that women and children and older men from all the protected areas be accommodated in certain interior localities, such as Greenwood, Slocan City, Sandon and Kaslo.
- (5) That a number of families will be settled in beet-growing areas in Southern Alberta and Manitoba.
- (6) That these dispositions are by no means final and represent only tentative plans, subject to many changes imposed on the authorities by public sentiment.

The recommendations of the Committee were considered item by item and adopted as follows:

Re Ministers-

- (1) That in the estimates provision be made for the salary of these men, so that they may receive approximately the same amounts as they did in 1941 from their congregations and the Board of Home Missions, plus an amount for contingencies;
- (2) That the Settlement Committee of the British Columbia Conference be requested to leave the Japanese ministers, with the exception of Rev. Y. Yoshioka, without a station for one year, in order that the Secretaries of the Board, in consultation with the Chairman of the Conference Committee and the Superintendent for British Columbia, may appoint them as supply to work in such communities to which the Japanese have been moved, as may be found advisable.
- (3) That in cases where these ministers are moved to Conferences other than British Columbia, the Superintendent of the area shall be advised, in order that he may keep in touch with them and exercise ` supervision over their work; and
- (4) That the Secretaries and Superintendents draw up such rules as may be necessary regarding payment of salaries, expenses, reports, etc.

Re Property—

- (1) Re properties, the Title to which is in the name of the United Church: That these be in Mr. Bunt's custody; insurance, taxes, etc., to be paid by the Board, and revenues, etc., to come to the Board.
- (2) Re properties in the name of Local Trustees: That all these be transferred to the United Church and administered as set forth in (1).
- (3) Re Other Funds: That these be sent to the Secretaries of the Board, and that the Treasurer be asked to set up a Special Japanese Fund, to hold in trust everything that may come in from local property accounts, etc., with a separate account to be kept for each congregation.

Re Maintenance of Japanese Ministers-

(1) That estimate of necessary amounts be accepted as follows:

- (3) That the matter of a cost-of-living bonus be referred to the Executive.

Re Employment for Canadian Japanese Men-

That the Secretaries of the Board be authorized to do what lies in their power to establish contact between Canadian Japanese men who may be recommended by the Superintendent of Missions for British Columbia and the Chairman of the Conference Home Mission Committee and persons outside the protected areas, recommended by our ministers, who may be willing to employ them, the Secretaries not to assume on behalf of the Board any responsibility except as may be agreed upon by the Executive.

Resolution for Presentation to the Executive of General Council-

That the Board adopt the following resolution and forward it to the Executive of the General Council, with the request that it issue, on behalf of the United Church, such a statement as may be deemed wise:

The Board recognizes the need of such action by the Government as will adequately protect the country against subversive activity on the part of any enemy group and commends the vigilance of police authorities throughout the country.

The Board believes that it is the duty of the United Church in these days of terrible upheaval for our Japanese congregations to follow them with its ministry and to assure them of sympathy; that the United Church should, by rendering this service, assure our Japanese fellow-Christians that a great Canadian Church, while realizing that our Government must protect us so far as is possible from insidious attacks, wishes to disassociate itself from vicious and unchristian attitudes and to hold fast the faith that in Christ there is no distinction of race and colour.

The Board commends the statement of policy issued by the Prime Minister's Office on January 14, 1942, but would express concern that there has been some divergence from the principles laid down in that statement. For one thing, we believe that the difficulties of evacuation would have been lessened had the plan to organize a Civilian Corps of Canadian Japanese on a voluntary basis been adopted.

The Board would express the hope that concentration camps for women and children will not be a permanent policy, and that in the very near future provision will be made for their residence under more normal conditions. In this connection, the Board would commend the proposal that large numbers, particularly of women and children, be accommodated in certain localities in the interior from which recession of mining activities has removed population, and particularly that a certain number of selected families be employed in the beet-growing areas of the Prairie Provinces, and in employment of real economic value. Memorandum for Presentation to the Authorities-

That the following memorandum be passed by the Board for presentation to the authorities:

(1) The United Church (and the Methodist Church before 1925) has carried on missionary work among the Japanese people in British Columbia since 1892, and has achieved a gratifying measure of success, not only in interesting the Japanese in the Christian religion, but in building up those Christian Institutions which are found among our own Canadian people.

(2) At the end of 1940 the following organized congregations are reported:

In addition to these congregations, the Woman's Missionary Society has workers at Steveston, Victoria, Duncan, Chemainus, Vancouver (2), New Westminster and Mission City, engaged particularly in work among women and children and in kindergarten work. The Society also maintains the Oriental Home in Victoria, which cares for some 18 Japanese children who have no adequate homes.

(3) The men who minister to these congregations are Japanese except at New Westminster, where a returned missionary is in charge. They are men who are as well trained in their profession as the average United Church minister. Some of them have received their training in Canadian or American Seminaries. The character of these men is above reproach, and it is our honest conviction that they are good citizens who will give that leadership to their people which will be of the greatest value to the authorities.

(4) In view of the fact that the United Church has for so long a time shown a deep interest in the Japanese; that they on their part have responded to the extent that the figures indicate; that the contributions towards the salary of the ministers, local congregational expenses and general funds in 1940 amounted to \$14,568 we feel that we have a right, and a duty to say to the Government that in spiritual things, the United Church considers that it is accepted by the Japanese in Canada as one of their major religious organizations.

(5) We therefore confidently expect:

(a) That the authorities will allow our ministers to continue their ministry:

In the Camps, which are now being established both in British Columbia and in Ontario, and in any which may be set up in other localities;

Among those who may be removed to the selected localities in the interior of British Columbia.

To those families which it is proposed to settle in the beet growing areas on the Prairies;

In general among all our Japanese people.

(b) That the authorities will immediately grant facilities for the free movement of our Missionaries, subject, of course, to the necessity of assurances as to their loyalty.

(6) The United Church, with wide contacts in all parts of the Dominion, further requests that the authorities will permit it through the Woman's Missionary Society, to facilitate the placing of young Canadian Japanese women in such individual employment as may be found outside the protected areas, the Woman's Missionary Society assuming any responsibility that may be involved.

(7) The United Church requests the authorities to allow Canadian Japanese who are in a position to do so to continue their studies at Colleges and Universities outside the protected areas.

Marine Work

That the Committee send on to the Board, simpliciter, the following resolution of the Marine Committee of the British Columbia Conference:

Re Salary of Marine Missionaries-

- (1) That the basic yearly salary be at the rate of \$150.00 above that currently paid to missionaries on aid-receiving fields.
- (2) That at the end of three, five and eight years' effective service there be an increase in salary at the rate of \$100.00 per year.

Note: Marine Missionaries receive their living while their boats are away from the home base on duty.

It was decided to take no action.

The Report as a whole was adopted.

United Church Annuities

Re Proposed Change in Rates-

It was reported that a small committee representing the Departments of the Church and The Woman's Missionary Society had been meeting to review the matter of the rates now being paid on Guaranteed Annuities. Under existing conditions, it was felt that the present rates in effect were too generous. A report received from Mr. H. H. Wolfenden, Actuary, revealed that if a 50% residium was desired, the rates now offered should be considerably reduced, chiefly by reason of the marked decline in the rate of interest obtainable on newly invested funds and the increase in the life expectancy of the age group from which the annuity funds are received. This Committee recommended:

- (1) That the rates be reduced as from June 1st, 1942.
- (2) That Mr. H. H. Wolfenden, Actuary, be asked to strike new tables based on a 3% earning rate and to return to the Church a 50% residium, these tables to cover single lives and joint agreements covering two lives.
- (3) That the Departments be asked to share in the cost of striking these new tables.

These recommendations were accepted by the Finance Committee and by the Sub-Executive of the General Council.

On motion, it was agreed to approve of these proposals.

Re Series of Advertisements in the "Observer"-

The Board agreed to assume its proportion of the cost, \$162.85, of a proposed series of advertisements in "The United Church Observer," this amount to cover five advertisements.

Report of the Hospital Committee

The Report of the Hospital Committee was presented by Dr. J. A. Cormie. On motion, the recommendations of the Committee were adopted as follows:

Re Lamont Hospital-

That the Board express its appreciation of the very distinguished services which Dr. Archer, his associates, and the Lamont Hospital have been able throughout all these years to render to the surrounding community;

That the Board convey to the members of the Alberta Hospital Board its appreciation of the services which they have rendered for many years;

And that in response to the request which has come to us from the Hospital Board and the Home Mission Committee of Alberta Conference for a special grant of \$5,000 and the continuation of a Line of Credit of \$10,000, which will really be an additional grant of \$5,000 from our Board, we respectfully request the Hospital Board to look into the matter of the finances of the Hospital, to see if it would not be possible to improve its financial standing:

- (a) by increased rates for services;
- (b) by pressing its collection policy more vigorously;
- (c) by careful examination of the expenditures, to see if it is at all possible for them to reduce costs.

Re Hafford Hospital-

That, with reference to the Resolution of the Battleford Presbytery, which reads as follows:

"We, the Battleford Presbytery of the United Church of Canada in session, recognizing the policy of The United Church of Canada to assist pioneer communities in the matter of hospitalization, wish to express gratitude for the fine service that the Board of Home Missions has rendered for many years in the Village and District of Hafford. Remembering the growth that has taken place and changed conditions which now exist which make it possible for the community and surrounding Municipalities to take care of their own hospitalization, and in view of the limited resources of the Church for this type of service to the country, we hereby recommend that the Board of Home Missions be asked to place all further responsibility for the financing of the Hafford Hospital upon the community itself. If it should be found that the community desires no longer to be served by a Hospital, and would prefer to travel to larger centres, we would recommend that under such circumstances consideration be given to the possibility of having all equipment and movable property removed to some pioneer district, so that it may have the advantage of the valuable utilities, and that the property itself be taken care of in whatever manner the Board of Home Missions should see fit to adopt."

the Board adopt the following resolution:

That the Secretaries of the Board of Home Missions be instructed to write to the Secretaries of the various Municipalities, represented on the Hospital Board, stating that Hafford Hospital is closed and that the Board has no intention of re-opening on the basis on which it has been carried on hitherto; and that if the local municipalities desire to employ a doctor and operate the hospital, the Board of Home Missions is prepared to rent it to them for a period of years at a nominal rental;

That, if the Secretaries of the Municipalities reply within sixty days' time that they are unable to do this, the Secretaries of this Board approach the Dominion Government and say that there is a Hospital at Hafford, of a certain size, with equipment, and ask if they are interested, and on what terms;

That, if any suitable doctor should desire to undertake professional work at Hafford, using the Hospital facilities, the matter be left in the hands of the Executive of the Home Mission Board; and That if the above fail to secure operation of the Hospital, then the Executive be empowered to give adequate publicity in the Municipalities, and elsewhere to the fact that the Hafford Hospital is not going to be re-opened; and that, if in the judgment of the Executive, no other course is open, after a specified time the Executive shall have power to have the building torn down or otherwise disposed of.

Appreciation, Doctors and Nurses-

The Resolutions Committee was requested to bring in a resolution expressing the Board's appreciation of the services of the Doctors and Nurses in all the Hospitals under its direction.

Report of Committee on Rural Work

The Report of the Committee on Rural Work was presented and adopted section by section, as follows:

The Committee is glad to be able to report the marked progress of Dr. J. R. Watts towards complete recovery and suggests that the Board send him a message of greeting.

The Committee reports further:

(1) That the instructions given by the last meeting of the Board were carried out and two essay competitions were instituted—one for students and the other for ministers—on the subject, "The Religious and Social Conditions on the Field which the Writer Served." Very fine manuscripts were submitted and the office has now a full and detailed statement of the conditions on more of the fields under the Board. For this, we are very much indebted to those who entered the competition. The results were as follows:

Ministers—First —Rev. James Mayne, Morse, Sask. Second—Rev. R. A. Cameron, Watson's Corners, Ont. Third —Rev. E. A. Betts, Malagash, N.S.

Students — First — Mr. W. E. Mann, Victoria College. Second—Mr. Allan R. T. Dixon, Emmanuel College. — Mr. H. J. Miller, Queen's Theological College. (Of equal merit.)

- (2) That in connection with the observance of Rural Life Sunday on May 18th last, Rev. Dr. J. C. Cochrane and Rev. J. G. Gorwill prepared an Order of Service and this was offered to all the congregations of our Church, free of cost. Some 17,500 were used.
- (3) That owing to the lateness of the Board, the Committee found it necessary to proceed with arrangements for the observance of Rural Life Sunday on May 10th next. Samples of a suggested programme have been sent to ministers and already the applications for copies of this are beginning to come in. Steps have been taken, too, to try to secure an interchange of ministers in urban and rural charges in connection with Rural Life Sunday.

The Committee recommends:

 That a somewhat similar essay competition be continued for another year, the subjects to be decided by the Executive of the Committee.

- (2) That the budget of this Committee for 1942 be \$600.
- (3) That \$300 be granted for the Rural Summer Schools in Newfoundland.
- (4) Since we recognize the inefficient functioning of the Church in many of our rural areas, this indicates the need for experimentation in new methods, and it is natural that the Board of Home Missions should give leadership in this movement. We therefore recommend that a Committee be appointed to explore possible areas in which experiment may be made, and that we ask the Board of Evangelism and Social Service, and the Woman's Missionary Society to appoint representatives to this Committee, and further that the co-operation of other religious bodies be enlisted wherever possible.
- (5) That this Board, being convinced that more specific provision must be made for the training of rural ministers in theological colleges, is prepared to co-operate with the theological and agricultural colleges in arranging courses of instruction in rural work and supervised field work both in summer and winter. The Board further expresses its conviction that systematic attempts should be made to recruit candidates for the rural ministry from the agricultural colleges.

That the Committee to be appointed under the preceding resolution (No. 4) be charged with carrying out this resolution as well.

(6) That the Board put on record its appreciation of the co-operation of the Home Missions Council of North America, in making available for this Home Mission Board the services of Dr. Ralph A. Felton of Drew Seminary, Madison, New Jersey.

On motion, the Report as a whole was adopted.

Committee on Rural Experimentation

The following were named as the representatives of the Board of Home Missions on the Joint Committee on Rural Experimentation, referred to in Section (4) of the Committee's Report: The Secretaries of the Board, Dr. J. C. Cochrane, Mr. Walter Little and Rev. J. G. Gorwill.

Licenses for Lay Missionaries

(1) It was agreed to recommend to the Executive of General Council that special licenses to administer the Sacraments be renewed, for one year, in the case of the following:

Recommendation of Executive of General Council-

It was agreed to take no action with regard to the following resolution of the Executive of General Council, referred to the Board by its Executive:

"That the Board of Home Missions be requested to consider the possibility of having a suitable service of recognition in cases where lay workers are granted a license from year to year to administer the Sacraments of the Church."

Resolution of Battleford Presbytery

The following resolution of the Battleford Presbytery was referred to the Appropriations Committee: "That whereas the cost of living has increased by thirteen per cent. and transportation expenses have gone up, we recommend that the Home Mission Board increase the minimum for aid-receiving charges to \$1,350.00." The Board concurred in the decision of the Appropriations Committee that until more money is available, the minimum salary should remain as at present.

Report of Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents

The following Report of the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents was presented, and action was taken as noted:

Salary Basis for Ordinands-

Re Recommendation of the Presbyteries of Montreal, Cochrane and Algoma: that the salary of newly ordained ministers be the same as that paid other ministers—

That this recommendation be adopted. Agreed.

Salary of Superannuated Ministers-

Re Resolution of Algoma Presbytery: "That the Home Mission Board be asked, in view of the need of supply for our northern and western mission fields, to delete the clause of the regulations of the Board which provides for the deduction of the superannuation allowance from the salary received by a minister on the Pension Fund who is supplying a charge, provided the total which he receives equals the salary allowance for a single ordained minister"—

That \$1,150.00, plus use of Manse or Parsonage where there is one, be the salary of such supply ministers. Agreed.

Special Subscription Forms-

Re Resolution of Kamloops-Okanagan Presbytery: "That the Home Mission Board print special subscription forms to be circulated throughout mission fields by the Presbytery Convener and returned to him."

That no action be taken. Agreed.

The Relation of the Church to Camp and War Production Communities-

The Committee recommends the adoption of the following:

(1) Neighborhood of Air Ports, Military Schools, etc.-

The men in the Camps are cared for by Chaplains and part time Chaplains, Y.M.C.A., and other workers. The responsibility of the Church is to provide social contacts outside of the Camps and apparently the local churches have met this need to the limit of their ability. In most centres, it has become apparent that the concentration of wives and families of the armed forces has created housing and other problems with which the local churches have been unable to cope with the same effectiveness. It is recommended that the other Protestant Churches, the W.M.S., and the Y.W.C.A. be approached with a view to the appointment of a competent woman worker, whose duty it would be to give guidance in the organization of the women of the churches for the purpose of enabling them to help the soldiers' dependents to find a church home and congenial social fellowship. Agreed.

(2) War Industries—

In all major centres there has been an influx of population attracted by the opportunities in various types of war industries. The Committee is of the opinion that this is of such importance that the Protestant Churches should be approached with a view to the organization of a cooperative committee which would consider ways and means of meeting the religious and social needs of these centres. Agreed.

(3) New Housing Schemes-

In certain cities new housing schemes have sprung up which do not seem to be receiving adequate ministrations from the Churches. It is therefore recommended that the Presbyteries concerned be requested to initiate new work where such action is justified. Agreed.

(4) Main Ports-

In this connection, the Committee had before it the following recommendation approved by the Maritime Conference Home Mission Committee:

"Saint John Presbytery, having submitted to the Saint John Ministerial Association, with power to act, the question of the appointment of a Port Chaplain, this Ministerial Association hereby approves of such an appointment. It further recommends that an endeavor be made to co-operate with non-Anglican and non-Roman Catholic bodies with a view to the appointment of such an official representing the Baptist, Presbyterian and United Churches. Failing this, the appointment of a United Church chaplain is approved."

It is recommended that consideration be given to the appointment of Chaplains for Merchant Seamen on a co-operative basis. Agreed.

(5) Rural Communities, weakened by the loss of population, due to enlistment in the armed forces and the demands of the war industries—

It is recommended-

- (a) That when the people move to other districts, their minister be requested to notify the ministers of the areas to which they go, in order that immediate contact be made with them; and
- (b) That the Board of Home Missions draw attention to conditions in most rural areas in Canada, created by the removal of their people to the armed forces and war industry, and request the Presbyteries to study all districts affected and to take all necessary steps to make the Church as effective as possible for the sake of the people left at home, as well as for those who may return in the inevitable readjustments of the post war period. Agreed.

In this connection the Board had before it the following resolution of the Executive of The Woman's Missionary Society:

"Re Opening New Work due to War: That, in view of the great need in many areas in Canada where families have moved in for war work or to be near men in the armed forces, we survey the whole situation, attempting to deal fairly with every Conference, and, if possible, place women workers in the most strategic or needy areas without further consultation with the Presbyteries and Conference Branches, but with close consultation and co-operation with the Board of Home Missions."

On motion, it was agreed that, having considered this resolution of The Woman's Missionary Society, the Board express its desire to act in co-operation with The Woman's Missionary Society in carrying on this work, and, with a view to implementing this, suggests that its Secretaries have whatever conference may be necessary with a committee of The Woman's Missionary Society.

Re Post War Conditions-

The Board adopted the following resolution:

While agreeing that every effort should be directed toward the prosecution of the war, the Board of Home Missions is convinced that immediate steps should be taken to plan for the situation with which the country will be confronted when the war is over with regard to the matter of immigration and all related questions and recommends that a Commission be immediately appointed by the Executive of the General Council to study these matters and to make such recommendations as the facts warrant.

Re Student Missionaries-

The Committee recommends as follows:

Re Resolution of Maritime Conference re Gifts to Students, adopted in June, 1941: "Whereas students serving on the Home Mission fields are instructed by the Board of Home Missions that presents received by them should be regarded as part of their salary;

"Resolved that the Maritime Conference express to the Board of Home Missions its opinion that this restriction should not apply in cases where the field has paid the student's salary in full, or when the gift is of a personal nature and would not ordinarily go to the Home Mission account."

That we make no change in policy. Agreed.

Re Suggestion of Calgary Presbytery re Change in Manual: "We suggest to the General Council, through the Home Mission Board, that the Manual be changed so that each student shall spend three summers on a Mission Field before ordination."

That no action be taken. Agreed.

Re Resolution of Wilkie Presbytery re Promotion of M. & M. Fund: "That when Presbyteries, Home Mission Conveners and Superintendents of Missions assess the effectiveness of a student's work, due consideration shall be given to the leadership given in promoting the interests of the M. & M. Fund, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Conference for consideration and necessary action, and to the Board of Home Missions."

That no action be taken, the feeling being that this is already being done. Agreed.

Re Lay Supplies—

,/

The Committee considered the whole question of Lay Supplies, including power of appointment, and had also before it the following resolution of the Estevan Presbytery:

"The Presbytery of Estevan would call the attention of the Home Mission Board to the fact that a lay supply on one of its charges, receiving a large Home Mission grant, left his work, without any consultation with the Presbytery or the Superintendent of Missions, to serve as supply in another Conference.

"The Presbytery would ask the assistance of the Home Mission Board towards securing some arrangement whereby lay supplies receiving a Home Mission grant should understand that they are definitely under the direction of the Presbytery and the Superintendent; and that they cannot relinquish their appointments without the consent of Presbytery and Superintendent if they intend to remain in the service of the Church."

The Committee recommends that the Board adopt the following resolution:

Whereas a careful reading of the Basis of Union and of the Manual seems to indicate that in the formulation of these documents, it was expected that the pastoral charges should be supplied by ministers and candidates for the ministry;

And whereas at the present time there are in The United Church of Canada almost 150 pastoral charges that are ministered to by men who are designated as "Lay Supplies";

And whereas the Manual seems to be far from clear concerning a number of points in connection with the employment of these laymen;

And whereas it would seem advisable that the whole situation should be clarified and suitable amendments made to the Manual;

Therefore Be It Resolved:

That the Board of Home Missions request the Executive of the General Council to appoint a small and representative Commission to study the question and to make recommendations to the forthcoming General Council concerning Lay Supplies, particularly along the following lines:

- (1) Definition of the term "Lay Supply."
- (2) By whom are these appointed?
- (3) Should there be a requirement that they be members of The United Church of Canada, or be asked to declare their esssential agreement with the doctrine of The United Church of Canada, and also their willingness to conform to the government and usages of the Church?
- (4) Should there be some examination conducted by the Presbytery, either before their employment or yearly?
- (5) Should appointment of Lay Supplies be annual, and only when it is clear that there is a temporary vacancy that the Settlement Committee has not been able to fill?
- (6) Should the relation of these Lay Supplies as to membership in Presbytery and Conference be clarified?
- (7) Should there be a direction to Presbyteries not to induct or install these Lay Supplies?
- (8) Should there be a limit to the salary paid to a Lay Supply? That is to say, should a charge be permitted to employ a Lay Supply when it can pay \$1,000 or more towards the salary of an ordained minister?
- (9) Should it be distinctly laid down in the Manual that Lay Supplies are temporarily in the employ of pastoral charges?

together with any other matters which, on consideration of the whole problem, should be referred to the General Council for suitable legislation or regulation.

Agreed to adopt.

The Report as a whole was adopted.

Statement by Secretary of the M. & M. Fund

Rev. Charles Endicott, D.D., addressed the Board. The Chairman expressed the gratitude of the Board to Dr. Endicott and assured him of its co-operation in his efforts to reduce the deficit and increase the givings to the M. & M. Fund.

Re Lack of Ordained Ministers

Statement re Vacant Fields-

The Secretary presented a Statement showing prospective vacancies in each Conference when the Settlement Committees meet in the Spring, totalling 233, to which ordained ministers should be appointed, and for which there were available only 63 ordinands and some 10 ministers returning to work after temporary leave of absence. This left total net vacancies—160.

Report of Committee-

The Report of the Committee appointed by the Executive in January to study the whole question of Vacant Fields and Lack of Ordained Ministers was presented and was adopted as follows: Whereas it is the declared policy of the United Church that every pastoral charge shall have, as far as possible, a pastorate without interruption, and that this is to be made effective through the Settlement Committee in each Conference;

And whereas when the Settlement Committees of the Conferences meet this spring, they will face the fact that there are 233 vacant pastoral charges to which ordained ministers should be appointed;

And whereas there are 63 ordinands, and some 10 ministers requesting settlement after temporary leave of absence, which means 160 pastoral charges will be vacant;

And whereas some of these charges have already been without any supply for some months, and others only partially supplied;

And whereas after a careful survey of the field by the Board of Home Missions, it is clear that additional temporary lay supply is almost unobtainable;

. And whereas due to the demand made upon the Church for Chaplains, more ministers will likely be taken from charges during the coming year, thereby aggravating the situation;

And whereas the ultimate vacancies finally occur in Home Mission areas and in those sections of the country where the ordinances of the Gospel are not only most sorely needed, but where those are not available from the ministry of any other Church;

And whereas the situation is one which needs immediate attention, creating as it does a national emergency;

Therefore Be It Resolved:

"That the Secretary of the Board of Home Missions present these facts to the Executive of the General Council at its forthcoming meeting, and in the name of the Board request the Executive to endorse in principle a plan by which the course of study could be re-arranged to provide:

- for the graduation at December 15th, 1942, of the class which would normally graduate in the spring of 1943;
- (2) for the graduation at June 15th, 1943, of the class which would normally graduate in the spring of 1944;
- (3) that for the duration of the war only the course of study be accelerated so that it may be completed in two instead of three years;

and that the Executive of the General Council arrange a conference between representatives of the Theological Colleges, the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Home Missions, to prepare a plan for presentation to the General Council whereby these changes may be carried out; and that the General Council take the necessary steps \sim that power may be given to the Executive of the Conferences to ordain these candidates immediately upon completion of their studies on December 15th, 1942.

The Board also adopted the following resolutions:

I. Whereas the figures presented to the Ninth General Council, Record of Proceedings, page 195, reveal an alarming situation, as evidenced by the fact that since Union up to December 31, 1940, 1,501 ministers of the United Church have withdrawn from the ministry, retired from the active work, or died, and that in the same period 1,004 new ministers have been ordained;

And whereas this trend has increased during the last five years;

And whereas it is obvious that a continuation of this tendency threatens the very existence of the Church;

Therefore Be It Resolved that this Board of Home Missions request the Executive of the General Council:

- (1) To declare that the Church is in full sympathy with our war effort, and is absolutely convinced that the preservation of such institutions as the Christian Church is of supreme national importance, and therefore asserts that its Ministry is as vital to the well-being of the nation as any war industry for which manpower is needed;
 - (2) To call on Presbyteries and Conferences so to mobilize all our resources of ministers that the Church can do its work with greater effectiveness in the present emergency and to suggest that so far as possible no minister retire from the active work unless compelled to do so by actual physical incapacity or other sufficient reasons; that ministers who are now in secular employment be asked to return to the service of the Church according to the vows which they took at their ordination or resign from the ministry; and to request that any minister who is asked to take employment outside the regular pastorate, except the chaplaincy service, be requested to confer with the Moderator of the Church and the President of his Conference before finally coming to a decision;
 - (3) That the Executive of the General Council take immediate steps to place before all the ministers the great shortage of recruits for the Ministry which now exists, and by publicity and otherwise, acquaint the Church with the actual facts, particularly that whilst in the areas from which recruits for the Ministry may be expected, there is probably no great shortage of men, a wider survey reveals that this condition exists only in the more favoured sections of the Church, and that if it is to continue as a national body, the United Church must have the widest possible vision of the needs of the whole.

II. Whereas it is now apparent that not only under war conditions but in normal times, the United Church has a serious shortage in her ministry and that every possible step must be taken to release ministers where they can be spared and to secure additional recruits for the ministry if our charges are to be manned;

And whereas there seems to be a conviction that many of our young men are prevented from entering the ministry by reason of their inability to finance their college course;

And whereas it is also apparent that in a country where so large a percentage of our charges are rural, there is need for specialized training with practical features if our ministry is to be effective in rural communities; We therefore recommend that steps be taken in rural areas adjacent to our college centres to form collective charges, where one or more students might serve under the supervision of an ordained minister. We believe this would have three desirable results: First, it would provide students of limited financial resources with the opportunity of an income while taking their college course; Secondly, with the collaboration of the colleges, it would introduce into their course the practical training which seems to be indispensable if we are to have an effective rural ministry; and, Thirdly, it would release a number of ordained ministers for service on charges which must otherwise remain vacant.

We further state that the Home Mission Board will enthusiastically support any effort of this kind.

Memorial to General Council-

Rev. J. C. Cochrane presented the following:

"Re the Moderator's Fund: The Toronto Conference Home Mission Committee, in session, requested the Rev. L. I. Hunter, President of the Toronto Conference, and the Superintendent of Missions for Northern Ontario to prepare a resolution to present to the Board of Home Missions with respect to the Moderator's Fund. We submit the following report and recommendation:

"Whereas the Fund, now known as the Moderator's Fund, originated in the early depression period as an Emergency Fund to augment the salaries of ministers on charges paying less than the Home Mission minimum; fields which could not be added to the list of aid-receiving charges without reducing the scale of salaries on such charges below the level of living necessities;

"And whereas this Fund was afterwards continued as a Sustentation Fund and, since the last General Council, as the Moderator's Fund, although it has always been administered by the Home Mission Board;

"And whereas in 1941 the receipts of this Fund, amounting to \$13,857, were entirely inadequate to meet deficits in salaries on this class of charges and to make provision for the payment of a cost of living bonus, despite the fact that the Board of Home Missions made a contribution of \$3,500 from its reserves to the Moderator's Fund;

"And whereas in 1941 the United Church succeeded in balancing its budget and changing conditions should make possible a realignment of appropriations;

Be It Therefore Resolved that we memorialize the General Council in 1942 to add \$50,000 to the appropriation of the Home Mission Board for 1943, and thus enable this Board to care for all the fields paying less than the Home Mission minimum salary, and that the special Fund, now known as the Moderator's Fund, be discontinued at the end of 1942.

On motion, the Report was received and the recommendation adopted.

Co-operation with Other Churches

Resolution of Prince Edward Island Presbytery-

A resolution was presented from the Prince Edward Island Presbytery, setting forth its willingness to "co-operate with other denominations wherever there is unnecessary overlapping, and approving the steps taken by our Moderator and the Home Mission Board to remedy this matter."

Statements re Progress-

The Secretary reported on progress made since the last meeting of the Board. Statements were also made by Revs. J. L. Nicol, J. C. Cochrane, Thos. Powell and W. S. Godfrey. On motion, the Board expressed gratification at the progress made.

Confirmation of Appointment of Missionaries under The Woman's Missionary Society

Request for Appointment of Missionaries under The Woman's Missionary Society

Saint John-

Re Recommendations of the Maritime Conference Home Mission Committee:

(1) "That the Deaconess-at-large be continued in Saint John under the Woman's Missionary Society—the Deaconess to be linked up with Exmouth Church under a committee of W.M.S. representatives of Presbytery and the Minister and Session of the Church concerned."

(2) "That request for Deaconess for Portland Church be sent on simpliciter to the Home Mission Board and The Woman's Missionary Society."

It was agreed to approve the following action by the Executive of The Woman's Missionary Society:

"That in response to the request from Saint John Presbytery for two missionaries or deaconesses for Saint John, and with the approval of the Board of Home Missions and the Maritime Conference Branch, we move our work from the small mission in Saint John and appoint our missionary there to work in co-operation with the two churches, Exmouth and Portland, in Saint John; and further, that a Committee, consisting of representatives of the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery, The Woman's Missionary Society and the Sessions of the Exmouth and Portland Churches, be appointed to supervise the work of our missionary."

Arvida-Kenogami-

The Montreal Conference Home Mission Committee endorsed the request for the appointment of a woman worker to this area. It was agreed that this be referred to the joint committee of the Home Mission Board and The Woman's Missionary Society appointed to consider the opening of New Work due to the War.

Kirkland Lake-

Re Resolutions of Temiskaming Presbytery:

(1) "That we adopt the recommendation of the Presbytery Committee that the present Community Church Council in Kirkland Lake be known as the Teck Township United Church Council and be composed of the ministers of Swastika (Convener), Trinity and All Peoples' Churches and the Superintendent of Missions, with lay representation from each of the three named Churches, viz.—A. Farrell, from West End, H. B. Hawley from Trinity, and Bruce Williams from All Peoples', and that this Council be constituted a committee for directing and advising the work of the United Church in the Kirkland area;

(2) "That the Woman's Missionary Society be asked to place one of its workers in this area under the supervision of this Council."

It was agreed to approve Recommendation No. (1) and to suggest to the Presbytery that the proposed "Teck Township United Church Council" be a sub-committee of the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery.

It was decided to take no action with regard to Recommendation No. (2).

Re Recommendation of Toronto Conference Home Mission Committee: "That The Woman's Missionary Society be asked to assign a worker to Kirkland Lake for a period of three months to assist in making a survey." Agreed to approve. Sault Suburban Charge-

Re, Recommendation of Algoma Presbytery, endorsed by the London Conference Home Mission Committee: "Dealing with the request for a Woman's Missionary Society worker for Sault Suburban charge, your committee recommends the appointment of a Sault Ste. Marie Church Extension Committee, with the following members: the Ministers of the United Churches of Sault Ste. Marie, Mrs. H. Hern, Messrs. J. C. Pinch, J. P. Reed and W. Palmer. We recommend that the Chairman of Presbytery convene the Committee and that they be given power to set up their own organization. We further recommend that this Presbytery apply for a W.M.S. worker to be employed under the direction of this Sault Ste. Marie Church Extension Committee."

It was agreed to suggest to Presbytery that the proposed Sault Sto. Marie Church Extension Committee be a sub-committee of the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery, and to refer to the joint committee of the Home Mission Board and The Woman's Missionary Society, named above, the question of appointment of a woman worker.

Winnipeg, Western Section-

A request was presented from the Winnipeg Presbytery, endorsed by the Conference Home Mission Committee, for the appointment by The Woman's Missionary Society of a worker to the Western Section of Winnipeg. Referred to the joint committee of the Home Mission Board and The Woman's Missionary Society, named above.

Report of Committee on Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

The Report of the Non-Anglo-Saxon Committee was presented by ' Dr. J. L. Nicol. The Recommendations of the Committee were considered seriatim and adopted as follows:

Nominations and Appointments-

(1) That Rev. J. Lavell Smith, B.A., B.D., be nominated to the Church of All Nations, Toronto, his work to begin on Sunday, May 3rd;

It was agreed that the necessary authority be given Mr. Smith to sign cheques on the Bank of Toronto on behalf of the Church of All Nations.

(2) That a married, ordained minister be nominated as Boys' Worker to All Peoples' Churches, Hamilton, and that, in that case, the Deaconess be withdrawn and placed elsewhere.

(3) That the nominations of other workers to Non-Anglo-Saxon fields and Institutions be left to the Secretaries and the Superintendents of Missions in the areas concerned.

(4) That the appointment of Women Workers be left to the Secretaries, the Superintendents of Missions, and the Superintendents of Institutions in the areas concerned.

Missionary Reference Library

It was agreed to make a grant of \$250.00 for 1942 towards rental of the room and other expenses in connection with the Missionary Reference Library.

Report of Committee of Laymen re-Cost of Living Bonus

The Committee of Laymen re Cost of Living Bonus for General Council Officers, Superintendents and Secretaries of the various Boards for the year 1941, presented the following Report: Whereas during the depression years the General Council Officers, Superintendents and Secretaries of the various Boards proposed voluntarily and accepted a substantial reduction in salary, amounting in all to 20% of their original salaries:

And whereas despite the return of better times, the salaries have not been restored;

And whereas a cost of living bonus has been distributed for the year 1941 to the field employees under the various Boards;

And whereas no such bonus has been paid to the officers above referred to;

Now your Committee of Laymen recommends that this Board memorialize the Executive of General Council to authorize the various Boards to pay a cost of living bonus to General Council Officers, Superintendents and Secretaries of the various Boards for the year 1941.

Agreed, on motion.

Re Rev. Ralph A. Felton, M.A., Ph.D.-

Maçaulay Trust Fund

The Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada desires to express its gratitude to Dr. Ralph A. Felton, Professor of Rural Sociology in Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, N.J., for his presence at its gathering and for the contribution that his discussion has made to its vision of the task of the Church. Dr. Archibald Young went to the West when it was still pioneer territory and soon realized that the Church must-play a large part in laying the foundations of the future.

He was well equipped mentally and from first to last gave unsparingly of his fine talents on the various charges he served and in the Church Courts, that the things for which the Church stands might prevail.

He was most highly respected by his brethren, kindly and fair in dealing with the weak, firm in his stand when principle and right were at stake.

The Board of Home Missions desires to express its sympathy to Mrs. Young, her sons and daughter, in this their sad loss.

Re the Late Rev. Hugh Miller, Newport, N.S.-

That a letter of sympathy be sent to Mrs. Hugh Miller and her sons, in the death of Mr. Miller.

Re the Late Mr. J. S. Woodsworth, M.P.-

The Board of Home Missions desires to extend its sympathy to the Rev. J. F. Woodsworth on the death of his brother, Mr. J. S. Woodsworth, M.P.. His passing has removed one who has been prominent in Canadian public life for many years and who once rendered faithful service to the Mission Work of the Church in the City of Winnipeg.

Re Rev. Thomas Powell, D.D.-

Dr. Powell is a product of Eastern Canadian Methodism. Early in the century he travelled West and made a very fine contribution in laying the foundations of the Alberta Conference, holding pastorates along the line of Railway which runs from Calgary to Edmonton. Subsequently he proved himself to be a very successful city pastor in Edmonton and Calgary.

He has been always deeply interested in the work at large and has given unsparingly of his time and talents to the development of the Missions which were rapidly being opened in that formative period of the work of the Church in the Province. This background of experience led to his appointment to the position of Superintendent of Missions for the southern part of the Province of Alberta in the year 1917. He commenced his work in this capacity in 1918 and ever since he has proved to be a faithful leader of the Missionary forces of the Alberta Conference. For several years before the Union he carried this responsibility for the entire Province.

The quality of his service was recognized by St. Stephen's College in 1928, when they conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa.

In 1936, he was elected President of Conference. He had been President of the Methodist Conference in 1913. His name had been suggested on several occasions before this but he consistently refused to stand. He withdrew his opposition on this occasion because he desired to officiate at the ordination of his son, C. D. Powell, B.A., B.D., now serving at Acme, Alberta.

One could never imagine Dr. Powell seeking the easy way in life or trying to curry favour with men or groups. Always efficient as an administrator, he formed independent opinions and would ever stand by them to the end. He has a pleasant disposition and he can say "No" with a smile on his face just as though he were granting an urgent request. He has always been in demand as a preacher and lecturer, gladly giving of his time and talents to the smallest and most isolated Missions.

He has now reached the time of retirement, and his genial personality and reasoned advice will be missed in the Presbyteries of Alberta. We trust, however, that we shall have the benefit of his long experience and wise judgment in the Conference and in the Home Mission work.

We pray that Dr. and Mrs. Powell may be long spared to enjoy the rest so well earned, and the fellowship together that has been so disturbed by the necessities of the task that he has fulfilled so faithfully.

Georgetown.-It was agreed to cancel accrued interest, loan to be without interest on condition congregation pays at least \$25 per year.

MONTREAL-

Montreal, Lilly Memorial.—Agreed to accept \$200 sent for 1941 on principal account, without charging interest for that year.

Pointe-aux-Trembles.—A grant of \$6,000 was asked for repairs. A grant of \$1,500 was voted to improve the sanitary conditions.

KINGSTON-

Zion Manse Loan.—Presbytery recommended cancellation of all past interest and that no further interest be charged until the end of 1943, in order to make repairs. Referred to Executive.

Oshawa-

. Oshawa, Northminster.—Presbytery recommended that the Board grant the request of the Trustees of the Church that the first mortgage of \$1,300 held by the H. M. Board on lots 23 and 24 and part of 25, be postponed to a second mortgage, so that the erection of a parsonage may be financed. Agreed.

COCHRANE-

Stavert, Hearst, Rural.—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$500 for a church. Allowed.

Matheson.—Agreed to cancel accrued interest and not charge interest for 1942 if the balance of the loan is paid this year.

Schumacher.—Agreed to cancel interest for 1941 provided \$500 is paid on principal in 1942.

Connaught.—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$150 to re-roof the manse. \$100 allowed.

TEMISKAMING-

King Kirkland.—Presbytery recommended that the grant of \$300 previously made for building a church but not expended, be renewed. Agreed.

TORONTO CENTRE-

127 Pacific Ave., Toronto.—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$95 for painting the house. Agreed.

LAMBTON---

Walpole Island Indian Mission.—Presbytery recommended the expenditure of \$1,500 to recondition the church, and that it be left with the Board to determine what portion of this should be a grant. Referred to Executive.

MIDDLESEX-

London, Friendship House.-The Board of Friendship House requested-

- (a) \$200 for decorating and cleaning the church.
- (b) Purchase of a sound projector at approximately \$500. Both amounts provided for out of a legacy of the late Samuel King, who left \$1,000 to the Trustees of Friendship House.

Board agreed to the first request but the second was left to the Executive.

Caradoc Indian Church.—Presbytery endorsed a request for a loan of \$1,000 towards meeting the present debt on the new church. Agreed.

HUDSON BAY-

Sherridon Loan.—It was requested that interest be cancelled and principal paid on a basis of \$3 credited for every \$1.00 paid, with not less than \$75 in each year. Board agreed to credit \$3 for every \$1.00 on principal and interest, if at least \$75 is paid each year.

SUPERIOR-

Fort William First Church Loan.—Presbytery recommended that when the congregation paid 600 on principal, the interest be reduced 40%. Agreed.

Lakehead Missions.—(a) Presbytery recommended a grant of \$110 for cement walks, at East Wayside \$35, Bay St. \$50, and \$25 to paint the manse. No action was taken in regard to the first two items, but the \$25 for painting the manse was allowed.

(b) It was reported that the furnace in the Bay St. Mission required repairs and a grant of \$75 was passed.

WINNIPEG-

West Kildonan.—It was agreed to cancel 1941 interest amounting to \$152.12, and to give credit for \$3 for every \$1 paid on the consolidated debt, payment of at least \$100 a year to be made.

Winnipeg, Gordon.—On payment of \$500 in 1942, it was agreed to cancel the notes held as security on the loan and to make no further charges, but not to discharge the mortgage, in the hope that if the building were sold at some future date, the proceeds could be applied to the balance outstanding.

Central Winnipeg and North Winnipeg Missions.—Presbytery recommended the following grant for painting and repairs:

Maclean \$175, Sutherland Ave. \$185, Stella Ave. \$175, and Robertson House \$185. It was agreed to grant \$59 for Maclean, \$104 for Sutherland Ave. and \$60 for Robertson House.

Transcona, Knox.—Conference Committee recommended that the request that \$4 be credited for every \$1 paid, be granted. Agreed, if the whole loan is settled by Dec. 31, 1942.

BATTLEFORD-

Pierceland.—The Superintendent reported that a grant of \$1,000 would be required for a manse. This was referred to the Secretaries for action, after a further report from the Superintendent.

KAMSACK-

Canora, Ukrainian Manse.—It was reported that a grant for shingles and painting was required. The present estimate is \$140. It was left to the office pending a further report from the Superintendent. This is to take the place of the request of a year ago.

Usherville.--Presbytery approved of a request for \$150 towards a church. Action deferred.

REGINA-

Regina, Settlement House.—(a) A grant of approximately \$620 was asked for repairs to foundations, etc. \$500 was voted.

(b) A grant of \$5,000.00 to build a chapel alongside the present building was asked. Referred to Executive.

SASKATOON-

Kinley.—The Board agreed to accept \$300 which the congregation is now prepared to pay, and another \$50 to be raised before the end of 1942, in full settlement of the loan.

- YORKTON-

Insinger.—It was reported that there was an offer for the property. The matter was referred to the Executive pending a report from a committee of Presbytery.

CALGARY-

. Calgary, Pleasant Heights.-It was agreed to accept \$300 per year for three years in full settlement of the debt on the church.

CAMROSE-

Hughenden.—The Board agreed to credit \$2 for every \$1 paid on the loan, the total of which is to be considered at \$900, payment to be made at the rate of \$100 per year.

EDMONTON-

Edmonton, Buchanan Institute.—A grant of \$198 was passed for re-wiring the building.

Referred to Executive.

Consort.—It was agreed to accept \$100 per year for four years in full payment of loan.

Naco.—It was agreed to accept \$100 per year for four years in full settlement of the loan.

VERMILION-

Islay.—The Board agreed to accept \$100 a year for five years in full payment of loan.

Two Hills.—Conference Committee recommended that the rent being received be applied on the reduction of the principal of the debt. Agreed.

CARIBOO---

Smithers.—A grant of \$100 for reshingling the church was allowed, to be paid when the balance of the cost has been met locally.

Williams Lake.—Conference Committee recommended a loan of \$500 and a grant of \$300 if and when the congregation raised the balance of \$464.75 for the repairs and extension to the manse. \$150 had been voted previously for repairs and cleaning. The Board decided to increase this to \$200.

Kamloops-Okanagan----

• East Princeton.—Presbytery requested that the loan on this church of \$204.17 be written off. The Board advised that the building be sold and the proceeds be applied to this debt.

KOOTENAY-

Michel.---A grant of \$200 was requested to repair the church. Agreed.

PRINCE RUPERT-

Kishpioz.—Conference Committee endorsed a request for \$30 to build a chimney. This was voted a year ago but not expended. Agreed.

Kitzegucla.—Conference Committee Minutes state that repairs are necessary, but details were not to hand. Referred to Executive.

PRINCE RUPERT-

Kitamaat, Missionary's Residence.—A grant of \$20.50 was passed to pay for labor required in repairing this house.

Vancouver, Scandinavian Mission.—A loan was made to Presbytery for the heating system of this building. The Board agreed to the request that the balance of \$242.60 outstanding be cancelled.

Cranberry-Westview Manse.—The Board agreed to vote an additional grant of \$100 towards the purchase of this house.

Vancouver, First Church Lots.—An offer of \$4,500 was received for three lots—Terms: \$3,000 cash and balance at 6, 12 and 18 months with interest at 5%. Agreed.

VICTORIA-

Victoria, Chinese Mission.—A grant of \$100 was asked to reshingle the roof, Agreed.

Nanaimo, Chinese.—A repair bill of \$10.77 was received in connection with the water system. Agreed to pay this.

Nanaimo, India.—(a) Permission was asked to sell the Albert St. House. Agreed.

(b) Presbytery recommended purchase of the house occupied by Rev. J. H. Wright as a residence for the missionary, the Board to be reimbursed from the sale of Albert St. The Board decided not to agree until the Albert St. house is sold.
