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# MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE SUB-EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS, MAY 2nd, 1930

The Sub-Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in Room 514, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, at 2.00 p.m., on Friday, May 2nd, 1930.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Chairman, Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D.

Those present—Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., Rev. R. B. Cochrane, D.D., Rev. C. G. Young, D.D., Rev. K. J. Beaton, Rev. J. L. Alexander, B.D., Rev. T. P. Perry, Rev. A. L. Smith, D.D., Rev. Robert Hicks, B.D., Rev. Arthur Barner, Mr. G. T. Graham, Mr. Fred Mann.

A letter, regretting his inability to be present, was received from Rev. R. S. Laidlaw, D.D.

The Chairman welcomed Rev. K. J. Beaton to his new office as Associate Secretary.

# City Mission Work

The Secretary stated that, as directed by the Board, the formulation of a uniform constitution for City Mission Boards was receiving attention and that report would be made at a later meeting.

#### Estate of Sir James Aikins

The Secretary reported that the Investment and Estates Committee and a special committee of the Board had held further conference with Major G. H. Aikins as to items outstanding in the residue of the estate. It was agreed that in the fixing of the total valuation of the residue, the Riverbend Mortgage should be valued at \$17,500 and the General Assets debentures at \$75,000, on the understanding that Major Aikins should arrange that the United Church's share in the residue be paid in cash. The additional asset of Capital Stock of the Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault Ste. Marie Railway was to be sold and divided between the residuary legatees—the United Church to join with Major Aikins in an undertaking with the Trustees of the Estate to meet any unforeseen liabilities.

It was directed that this report should be incorporated in the Minutes.

# Gift of Mr. Macaulay to Hafford Hospital

It was reported that in a letter received from Mr. T. B. Macaulay re his gift of \$25,000 to Hafford Hospital, he had made the following statement:

"If the character of the community served by this Hospital should so change that the United Church should decide to close the institution and carry on similar work in some other locality, or if the municipality should grow strong enough to support a hospital itself, I would then be willing to have the income from this endowment devoted to hospital work among New Canadians in some other frontier community." It was agreed to incorporate this statement in the Minutes.

# Arrangements re General Council

The Chairman and the Secretary were appointed a committee to make arrangements for the presentation of the Board's Report to the General Council, and also to make plans for the Home Mission Night at the Council.

# Haldimand-Norfolk Presbytery

As directed by the Board, a Commission, consisting of Dr. F. L. Brown and Rev. K. J. Beaton, was appointed to visit South Norfolk and report at a later meeting.

# Approval of W.M.S. Appointments

Approval was given to the appointment of the following workers under the Board of the Woman's Missionary Society:

Miss Marjorie W. Gregg, M.A., Miss Alma I. Hickling, Miss Ada M. Chilvers, R.N., Miss Edna P. Brown, R.N., Miss Fanny L. Carlile, R.N., Miss Frances M. Hodgins, Miss Urina R. Churchill.

# Immigration Work

Resignation of Rev. G. N. Maxwell-

It was agreed to accept the resignation of Mr. Maxwell, who had recently been appointed Chaplain at the ports of Quebec and St. John—the same to become effective on the appointment of a successor.

Quebec-St. John, New Chaplain-

The selection of a successor to Mr. Maxwell was left to a Committee consisting of the Secretaries, Dr. Sedgewick and Dr. A. Lloyd Smith.

# Hospital Work

As directed by the Board, the Hospital Board of Alberta made an investigation of the affairs of the George McDougall Hospital and brought in the following recommendations:

- (a) That Mrs. E. J. Gibson, the present Superintendent, be asked to resign at the end of June.
- (b) That Dr. Roy Anderson, the resident Doctor, be appointed Superintendent in her place; Dr. Anderson in the meantime to make enquiries for a suitable head nurse and other staff members to replace two who are leaving of their own accord.

Both of these recommendations were adopted; and it was agreed that grant at the rate of \$5,000 be continued from July 1st, 1930.

# Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Oshawa, Ont., Discontinuance of Work-

A resolution of protest against the discontinuance of the grant to the Church of All Nations, Oshawa, as at June 30th, 1930, was received from the local City Mission Board. No action was taken.

Kirkland Lake, Ont., Finnish Deaconess-

Rev. Edwin A. Kyllonen, Finnish minister at Kirkland Lake, recommended that, should the W.M.S. consider the appointment of a Finnish Deaconess in Northern Ontario, Miss Greta Heikkinen, of Chicago, be given the position. He also enquired whether this Board would consider giving her employment in Northern Ontario for the coming summer. No action.

Regina Settlement House-

The Board discontinued the grant to the Regina Settlement House as at June 30th and recommended that the question of a grant for a

Deaconess be referred to the W.M.S., who have declined to make any grant for this year but have included in their estimates for 1931 an amount of \$1,000 for salary of deaconess.

# It was agreed:

- (a) To make a grant of \$1,100.00 for the salary of Deaconess and maintenance of Settlement House for a period July 1st to December 31st, 1930.
- (b) To recommend the appointment of a student to 6th Avenue Church, to which place Presbytery had suggested an ordained minister might be appointed who would also supervise the work at Settlement House.

# Bonnyville, Alta., French Work-

The question of the appointment of a successor to Dr. J. Duclos, who is retiring at June 30th, was considered, and it was agreed to recommend to the Settlement Committee of the Alberta Conference the appointment of Rev. L. R. Bouchard to Bonnyville.

# All Peoples' Mission, Edmonton-

The Board agreed to recommend to the Settlement Committee of Alberta Conference the appointment of Rev. D. Ponich as Bi-lingual Worker at All Peoples' Mission, Edmonton, to take the place of the present Boys' Worker, against which action Rev. W. H. Pike, Superintendent of the Mission, has protested. No action.

# All Peoples' Mission, Hamilton-

The Home Mission Committee of the Hamilton Conference recommended that, owing to the trying circumstances through which Rev. W. H. Burgess had recently passed in connection with the illness and death of his wife, he be given a special leave of absence for a few weeks. Agreed.

The Secretary was also requested to write a letter of sympathy to Mr. Burgess.

# Deaconesses at Various Churches in Hamilton-

The Hamilton Conference Home Mission Committee recommended that the salary of the W.M.S. Deaconess at Laidlaw Memorial and St. Paul's, who is now on furlough, should be used to provide for a Deaconess now supported by the H.M. Board; that the salary so released should be used at Binkley and Trinity to provide grants for these two fields to the end of the year; and that the time of the Deaconess now at Simcoe Street should be divided between Simcoe Street and St. Paul's.

The principle involved in this recommendation was agreed to—details to be worked out in consultation with the W.M.S. and report made to the Sub-Executive.

# Appointments for Ordained Ministers-

The grants to Otthon, Sask., served by Rev. S. Balla, and to the Ukrainian Mission, Calgary, served by Rev. J. Gregorash, were voted to June 30th only, leaving these men without appointment at that time.

It was agreed to leave with the Secretaries the matter of appointments for Mr. Balla and Mr. Gregorash.

#### Oriental Work

# Montreal, Chinese Mission-

Grant for the salary of Rev. K. Y. Tang, Chinese Missionary, Montreal, who is leaving at the end of July, was made for seven months only. It is proposed to transfer Rev. Ma T. K. Wou from Toronto to Montreal and authority is requested to transfer grant at the rate of \$1,600.00 for salary from Toronto Centre Presbytery to Montreal Presbytery as from July 1st. Agreed.

It was also agreed to recommend to the Settlement Committee the transfer of Rev. Ma T. K. Wou from Toronto to Montreal.

# Hamilton, Chinese Mission-

The Board made a grant for the Chinese Work in Hamilton to June 30th only, continuance of the grant or otherwise being referred to the Sub-Executive. The Home Mission Committee of Hamilton Presbytery recommended continuance of the work under Mr. Shiu until the end of 1930, and that in the meantime steps be taken to secure a returned missionary from China who can speak both languages.

It was agreed to continue the grant to the end of 1930; Mr. Beaton and Dr. Noyes to discuss the question of future policy with the Home Mission Committee of the Presbytery.

# Passing of Rev. J. C. Robertson, D.D.

Dr. Sedgewick and Dr. Cochrane were appointed a Committee to draft a resolution with regard to the loss suffered by the Church in the recent death of Dr. Robertson.

# PROPERTY CLAIMS

#### HALIFAX-

United Memorial—Congregation asked the Board to renew the agreement that interest charges be reduced from 6% to 1% for a period of five years. Agreed to accept 2½% instead of 6% for a period of five years.

# MONTREAL-

Montreal—Permission was asked to sell the old Community House, or to rent it, the proceeds to be used for similar work within the Presbytery. Agreed to sell subject to approval of the General Council, the proceeds to be used within the Presbytery in consultation with this Board.

#### OTTAWA-

Gatineau—A new church has been erected and Presbytery asked the Board to cancel mortgage now held on the property. Agreed to accept a second mortgage for the amount already loaned.

#### ESSEX-

Ottawa Church, Walkerville—Request was made for an advance of \$2,500 on the loan and grant already voted. Agreed to send \$2,500 on account of the loan and that \$2,500 be sent on account of the grant when a similar amount is raised in the Border Cities or portions of this \$2,500, from time to time when an equal amount is raised locally.

# WINNIPEG-

Poplar River Mission—An additional grant of \$1,500 was asked for this building. Agreed.

#### MOOSE JAW---

Mawer—Presbytery recommended cancellation of the debt of \$505.27 or at least generous consideration. Agreed to accept \$200 and cancel balance.

#### SASKATOON-

Mayfair—Presbytery recommended that loan of \$1,500 be cancelled on condition that a new building be erected to cost not less than \$4,650. Action deferred, pending further information.

#### KAMLOOPS-

Okanagan Falls—Permission was asked to sell ten lots of this church property. Title to which is held as security for a loan. Agreed.

# PRINCE RUPERT-

Hazelton Hospital—A credit at the Bank was requested in connection with the building fund and the Board was asked to guarantee the Bank against loss, of \$25,000. The H.M.B. is responsible for \$5,000 grant in each of the years 1931, 1932 and 1933. Agreed to give the Secretary authority to sign document guaranteeing \$25,000 to Royal Bank in Hazelton.

#### VANCOUVER-

"Sky Pilot"—Request was made for \$125 for towing this boat, also purchase of a new engine and repairs to hull at approximate cost of \$3,500. Agreed to grant \$125 from maintenance for towing and \$3,500 for new engine and repairs.

#### VICTORIA-

Alberni, Opetchesaht Reserve—The Indians of this Reserve would like to have the land returned to them which they transferred to the Foreign Mission Board of the Presbyterian Church in 1902, on which to erect a church. As the building is not being used, it was suggested that transfer might be made and building sold to the Indians on condition they make it over into a house, or keep it as a Community Hall on the understanding that its control be in the hands of a committee consisting of the Chief, the Principal of Alberni School and the Indian Agent. This proposal agreed to.

### SPECIAL CLAIMS

#### INVERNESS-GUYSBORO-

Whitehead asked payment of \$50 balance of regular grant for 1929 which was not called for previously. Agreed:

#### DUNDAS-GRENVILLE-

Bishop's Mills asked grant at rate of \$325 from July 1st. Agreed.

Tory Hall asked \$143 balance due for winter supply. Agreed.

#### MUSKOKA-

Baysville—It was reported that the minister of this field has been attending College and serving for week-ends only, but Presbytery felt that the Board should pay the full grant. Agreed to pay for this quarter, only for the time the minister resides on his field.

#### SUDBURY---

Finnish Mission—Request was made for the appointment of Mr. Halinen, Finnish student, for 15 months rather than for the summer only, necessitating an increase in grant from \$500 to the rate of \$1,200 per year. It was agreed that Mr. Halinen should be appointed to Dunblane, Sask., from October 1st.

#### TEMISKAMING-

Kirkland Lake—It was agreed to pay \$31.75 to cover balance due Mr. Kyllonen on travelling expenses for 1929, also to allow up to \$100 for his expenses for 1930.

#### TORONTO WEST-

Presbytery asked reconsideration of the grants to Long Branch, North Runnymede, Prospect Park and the Ukrainian Mission. No action.

# GUELPH-

Wallace—Presbytery asked reconsideration of the grant voted for 1930, allowing \$375 to June 30th, then \$300, instead of \$300 for the year. No action.

# OXFORD-

Dereham asked that grant at the rate of \$300 be continued until June 30th. Agreed.

#### PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE-

Edrans—Confirmation was asked of payment of \$48.25 for winter supply by three students. Agreed.

#### RAINY RIVER-

La Vallee asked \$92 to cover Mr. Rayner's moving expenses. Agreed.

#### BATTLEFORD....

Minnehaha—It was agreed that Mr. A. J. Frederickson should be appointed to this field for the summer, and that the grant should be \$15 per week.

#### MOOSE JAW-

Parkbeg—The request of Presbytery for a special of \$200 on account of which the Conference Committee recommended \$110, was referred by the Board to the Sub-Executive. It was decided to leave this matter to the Secretaries with power to issue when a report is received from the Superintendent.

#### PRINCE ALBERT-

White Fox—It was agreed to advance \$600, balance of the year's grant, to Mr. May.

Pleasantdale—It was reported that after advancing \$152.10 to Rev. P. H. Neville, it was found that he was receiving aid from the Pension Fund, and expected to draw \$1,500 or \$1,600 salary as well. Finding that this was not possible, he desired to withdraw from the field and asked that the Board pay his return transportation. It was agreed to confirm the advances made and to pay his return fare subject to the approval of the Home Mission Convener.

Dana—It was agreed that Mr. M. Urbanovitch should be appointed to this field for the summer and that the grant should be \$12 per week.

#### REGINA-

Settlement House—It was decided to allow \$1,100 for the salary of a deaconess and maintenance of the Settlement House for the last six months of 1930.

#### LETHRRIDGE-

Raymond, Japanese Mission—On recommendation of Presbytery, it was agreed to appoint Mr. M. Honda to work amongst the Japanese in this district, the Ladies' Aid of Knox Church, Lethbridge, having agreed to supplement the givings of the Japanese people up to \$75 per month, and that the balance of the expense should be borne by the Home Mission Board.

#### KAMLOOPS-OKANAGAN-

Peachland asked \$155 towards purchase of furniture, the congregation having expended an equal amount. The house is reported furnished. Referred to Secretaries.

#### VANCOUVER-

Alert Bay—\$125 was asked for towing the "Sky Pilot" to Vancouver. Agreed.

#### VICTORIA-

Barclay Sound—The Superintendent reported that it would cost \$95 to paint the "Broadcaster" and put it in good shape instead of the \$25 voted by the Board. Agreed to vote \$70 additional.

#### WESTMINSTER-

Coqualectza Institute—It was reported that the W.M.S. were unable to carry out the agreement made at a conference with representatives of the Board of Home Missions to the effect that they should pay the full salary of the nurse-deaconess for this year, as their 1930 estimates were completed a year ago and no additional grant could be made. It was agreed to allow \$485 for this purpose.

Agassiz—An urgent request for a special of \$200 to cover salary advanced, was made on behalf of this self-sustaining charge. Referred to Secretaries with power to grant an amount not exceeding \$100 when full information was received.

Mt. Lehman—It was reported that the minister had received \$1,900' from all sources for 1929, but owing to readjustment of fields, he had had a very large territory to cover and the Board was asked to allow the extra \$100 to go towards his expenses. Agreed.

The Committee adjourned at 5.10 p.m., the benediction being pronounced by Dr. Sedgewick.

# MINUTES OF EMERGENCY MEETING OF THE TORONTO-MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS, MAY 19th, 1930

An emergency meeting of the members of the Board of Home Missions resident in Toronto was held on Monday, May 19th, at 10.30 a.m., to deal with a few urgent matters.

Those present—Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., Rev. Colin Young, D.D., Rev. K. J. Beaton, Rev. R. S. Laidlaw, D.D., Mr. George T. Graham.

By invitation, Dr. Laird was also present.

Rev. Dr. Sedgewick occupied the Chair.

# Request For Increased Grants to Missions in B.C.

It was reported that a telegram from Dr. G. A. Wilson stated that the B.C. Settlement Committee faced a serious situation, having sixty applicants for fifty-one appointments, and urged additional grants of \$300.00 to Prince Rupert East, \$200.00 to Port Kells, and \$100.00 to Ruskin, for half year beginning July 1st, which would create openings for three additional men.

After full discussion, it was decided to wire Dr. Wilson as follows:

"Cannot accept responsibility for increasing grants. Situation in other Conferences similar. Would favor adjustment of grants if not increasing total for Conference on recommendation of Conference Home Mission Committee."

#### Situation at Cape Mudge

Re resignation of Rev. George Knox from the Marine Mission work, Mr. Beaton reported that he had wired Dr. Wilson to ask whether a grant for the education of Mr. Knox's child would relieve the situation, as the Government were entirely satisfied with the services of the teacher of the Indian Day School at Cape Mudge.

It was decided that, in the absence of Mr. Barner, no action could be taken.

### Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

With regard to the transfer of Institutional Workers, Dr. Young reported that Rev. T. D. Jones of Sudbury had accepted a call to Smooth Rock Falls.

It was agreed that Rev. F. A. Sayles of Welland should be asked to go to Sudbury at a salary not to exceed \$2,000, and that Rev. J. F. A. Bewell of Sault Ste. Marie should be offered appointment to Welland at the regular minimum salary.

# PROPERTY CLAIMS

#### SYDNEY-

Loch Lomond—Loan of \$500 was voted for one year, but as only \$300 is required, the Board is asked to accept the personal note of the Trustees in order to save expense. Agreed.

#### NORTH BAY-

Rutherglen—A loan and grant of \$500 each were voted for a manse. As the loan is not required, permission was asked to use it towards the erection of a church. Agreed.

#### ESSEX-

Ottawa St. Church, Walkerville—The office having received a guarantee from the Trustees of this church, that the loan would be repaid, the Secretary was instructed to make the first payment of \$1,000.

The meeting adjourned at noon and was closed with the benediction by Dr. Sedgewick.

# MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE SUB-EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS, JUNE 24th, 1930

The Sub-Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in Room 514, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, at 2.00 p.m., on Tuesday, June 24th.

Rev. D. C. MacGregor, D.D., occupied the Chair, and opened the meeting with prayer.

Those present—Rev. D. C. MacGregor, D.D.; Rev. R. B. Cochrane, D.D.; Rev. C. G. Young, D.D.; Rev. T. P. Perry; Rev. J. L. Alexander; Mr. F. Mann; Mr. G. Graham; Rev. A. L. Smith, D.D.; Rev. R. S. Laidlaw, D.D.; and Rev. Robert Hicks.

A letter was read from Rev. Dr. Sedgewick, regretting his inability to be present.

# Travelling Student Missionaries

The Secretary made a short statement regarding the appointment of two travelling missionaries, Messrs. Maxwell and Hotson, to Northern Alberta in the joint interests of the Home Mission Board and the Board of Religious Education. This was made possible by the generous gift of a motor car and other equipment by Mr. J. D. Storie of Oshawa, the Young People's Societies of the three Toronto Presbyteries, and some other churches having promised to raise sufficient to meet their expenses for the summer.

The authority of the Sub-Executive was requested for the payment of advances on account of salary, pending the receipt of the expected funds.

It was resolved (a) to send a letter to Mr. Storie expressing our thanks for the gift of the car; and (b) to authorize the advance of a sufficient amount to pay the students until the promised funds were received.

Authority for Rev. K. J. Beaton to Sign Requisitions for Cheques

Rev. K. J. Beaton was granted authority to sign requisitions for cheques on behalf of the Board.

# Representation on Executive of the General Council

Rev. Dr. Cochrane was nominated representative of the Board on the Executive of the General Council.

# Representatives of the W.M.S. on the Home Mission Board

The Secretary reported that at the Annual Meeting of the Dominion Board of the W.M.S., Mrs. J. Erle Jones and Mrs. Anson Spotton were appointed representatives of their Society to the Board of Home Missions.

#### Personnel of Settlement Committees

On receiving representations that the Toronto Conference Settlement Committee had refused to appoint the Superintendents of Missions to the Interim Settlement Committee, it was decided to send a letter to the Chairman of the Settlement Committee, expressing regret at their action, and the hope that the matter would be re-considered, and, in the interests of Home Mission work, Dr. Brown and Mr. Cochrane appointed to the Interim Settlement Committee.

Dr. Cochrane and Dr. A. L. Smith were appointed a committee to represent the Board in the matter with the Toronto Settlement Committee.

#### Re Summer Session in Theology

The Secretary reported that he had been in correspondence with Principal Brown of Union College, Vancouver, regarding the possibility of holding a summer session in Theology, but that no proposition of a practicable nature had been made.

The Secretary was requested to continue correspondence, and submit to the Board, or one of its Committees, any definite proposition made.

# Repairs to Motor Car of Rev. W. E. Sieber

It was agreed to allow \$50.00 toward the repair of Mr. Sieber's motor car, the total bill submitted by him amounting to \$137.25.

# Visit of Rev. D. G. Ridout to Mission Fields in Western Canada

The payment of \$100.00 from the amount appropriated for Literature and Publicity was authorized toward the expenses of Rev. D. G. Ridout, on his proposed visit to outstanding Mission Fields in the Prairie Provinces, when he will take photographs to be used for publicity purposes. The total expenses are estimated at a little over \$200.00.

# Rent of Superintendent's Office in Winnipeg

The Board reduced the grant for the rent of the office of our Superintendent of Missions in Winnipeg from \$1,500.00 to \$750.00 per annum, beginning with July 1st, 1930. It was reported that an office had been secured at \$65.00 per month from April 1st, 1930, being at the rate of \$780.00 per annum. Authority was requested for payment of the difference of \$30.00 per annum. Agreed.

# Audit of Books-St. John's Hall

Approval of the audit of the books of St. John's Hall, Que., by Mr. Fred Walker, Accountant of the Quebec Power Co., and Professor C. Amaron of the High School, was requested. Agreed.

# Salary of Ministers of Other Churches Serving This Board

The Board at its last meeting directed that ministers of other churches serving under our Board should receive salary at the rate of \$1,500.00 until received into the ministry of the United Church. Direction was requested as to whether the regulation should be retroactive to January 1st, 1930, or to April 1st, or whether it should apply from July 1st. It was agreed that the regulation should not become effective until July 1st. 1930.

# St. Christopher House, Toronto

The opinion of the Sub-Executive was requested in regard to a suggestion that St. Christopher House, Toronto, should apply for admission to the Federation for Community Service, in which case our grant would be discontinued.

It was agreed that the Secretaries and members of the Board resident in Toronto should be a committee to confer with the Board of St. Christopher House, and report to the Executive; and that we should ask the Home Mission Committee of Toronto Centre Presbytery to appoint representatives to confer with us and the Board of St. Christopher House.

# Amendments in Regulations

- (1) No. 15, Section (a), Page 6.—It was agreed to add the words "or lay supply" after the words "married minister" in the last sentence, so that it should read: "In case of a married minister or lay supply, railway fare is provided for the family to the field."
- (2) No. 15, Section (c), Page 6.—A similar amendment was agreed to by the addition of the words "or lay supply" after the words "ordained minister" in the last sentence, which will read: "In addition, the wife of an ordained minister or lay supply is allowed two-thirds of the amount given her husband."

An additional grant of \$1,000 was voted to the "Canadian-Ranok" for 1930, on Dr. Cormie's representation that the amount of \$7,000 was voted by the Board in error—it should have been \$8,000—the same as the grant for the previous year.

# Publication of Annual Report—

It was agreed that 1,000 separate copies of our Annual Report for 1929 should be printed.

### Publication of Other Literature-

Authority was given for the publication of 1,000 copies of the story of a Frontier Settlement in Saskatchewan entitled "Beaver Lodge"; also, for the publication of a series of four-page pamphlets on various phases of Home Mission Work, after consultation with the Promotion Committee of the M. & M. Department.

#### Michel-Natal Field

The B. C. Conference Home Mission Committee at its meeting in May passed the following resolution: "That we re-affirm our action regarding Michel and Natal, asking that the W.M.S. property at Natal be made available for our minister at July 1st."

This item was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

#### Indian Work

Furlough for Rev. S. D. Gaudin-

The Presbytery of Hudson Bay recommended that Rev. and Mrs. S. D. Gaudin, who have given forty years' continuous service in Indian work, should be granted three months' leave of absence, and that they should be allowed travelling expenses to Ontario and return.

The following resolution was adopted: That on leaving their work at Norway House we pay Mr. and Mrs. Gaudin three months' salary in recognition of their long and faithful service, and that we ask them both to do deputation work while in the east.

# Kispiox Indian Mission-

The Board discontinued the grant to Kispiox at June 30th,—the field to be supplied from Hazelton after that date. At a meeting of the Prince Rupert Presbytery it was urged that the Board reconsider its decision, and appoint a resident missionary for the balance of 1930, for whom a grant of \$700.00 was asked. The resolution of Presbytery was forwarded by the Conference Home Mission Committee, with the following recommendation: "If this be found impossible, we would urge the appointment of a married missionary teacher."

It was decided to take no action.

### Oriental Work

Resignation of Rev. Ma T. K. Wou, Toronto-

- (a) It was agreed to accept the resignation of Rev. Ma T. K. Wou, Chinese Missionary, Toronto, to take effect June 30th, 1930.
- (b) The travelling expenses of Mr. Ma and family from China last spring amounted to approximately \$1,310.00. It was suggested that the Presbyterian Church might be requested to take responsibility for part of these expenses—should they appoint Mr. Ma to work in Toronto. Referred to Secretaries, with power.
- (c) The Board in 1929 expended \$67.00 for the purchase of furniture for Mr. Ma. It was left to the Secretaries to decide whether we should ask for a refund of the amount.

# Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Resignation of Rev. V. S. Tigges-

- (a) It was agreed to accept the resignation of Dr. Tigges from the Church of All Nations, Toronto, to take effect July 31st, 1930.
- (b) It was decided to recommend Dr. Tigges to the Settlement Committee of the Alberta Conference for appointment to a German field.

Appointment of French Minister to Bonnyville-

Mr. Bouchard, who was appointed French minister at Bonnyville by the Settlement Committee of the Alberta Conference, having declined the appointment, it was decided to recommend that Rev. H. Fresque, of Compton, Quebec, be appointed to Bonnyville.

It was agreed that we should pay Mr. Fresque's moving expenses.

Discontinuance of services of Rev. S. Balla-

The Board at its meeting in March having decided to discontinue the grant to Otthon at the end of June, leaving Mr. Balla without a field, the Superintendent of Missions suggested that he should be given some financial consideration.

It was agreed to give Mr. Balla the use of the parsonage for two months and one month's salary.

Appointment for Rev. John Gregorash-

The Settlement Committee of the Alberta Conference having failed to find an appointment for Mr. Gregorash, it was decided to recommend to that Committee the appointment of Mr. Gregorash to Andrew mission field, for which a grant of \$1,200.00 was made by the Board.

Edmonton, All People's Mission-

The Board at its last meeting recommended that Rev. James Mayne, the Boys' Worker at All People's Mission, should be appointed to a regular charge, and that Rev. D. Ponich, of Bellis, should be appointed Bi-lingual Worker in that institution, discontinuing the grant to Bellis at June 30th. The Settlement Committee of the Conference continued Mr. Mayne as Boys' Worker at All People's, and Mr. Ponich as Ukrainian minister at Bellis.

In view of the financial situation, the Sub-Executive felt that it could not amend the action of the Board.

Resolutions of Conference of Non-Anglo-Saxon Workers-

At a Conference of Non-Anglo-Saxon Workers held in Winnipeg on June 2nd, it was recommended:

- (a) That Rev. M. P. Berezynski should be continued as minister-atlarge among the Ukrainians in the Western Provinces. No action.
- (b) That Principal MacKay, Rev. J. M. Shaver and Mr. Berezynski be associated in the preparation of pamphlets suitable for distribution among the Ukrainian people. Referred to Secretaries with power.

#### Hospital Work

# Hafford Hospital—

Dr. Rose has requested the immediate use of the proceeds of Mr. T. B. Macaulay's gift—\$1,500.00 per annum.

The following resolution was adopted: That the Secretaries be instructed to convey to Dr. Rose and the Hafford Hospital Committee our opinion that certainly for this year of such unparallelled financial stringency, the income from Mr. T. P. Macaulay's gift be included in the grant already made by the Board, viz., \$5,200.00 to Hafford Hospital—and to explain to Dr. Rose and the Hospital Committee that the terms of the gift as made by Mr. Macaulay were, that it should be for the support of the Hospital, and not for any specific piece of work.

# George McDougall Hospital-

- (1) Dr. Roy L. Anderson was authorized to conduct all banking business for the Hospital.
- (2) Authority was given for renewal of the line of credit with the Canadian Bank of Commerce for \$2,500.00, which expired on June 1st.

# Lamont Hospital-

It was reported that, owing to adverse crop conditions, the Hospital was finding it extremely difficult to make collections, and request was made that its borrowing power at the Bank be increased from \$5,000 to \$10,000. Agreed.

#### PROPERTY CLAIMS

#### PICTOU-

Lochaber asked a grant of \$500 and a loan of \$500 for a church.

Action deferred.

#### SYDNEY-

Reserve Mine asked a loan of \$500 for repairs to church. Agreed.

#### MONTREAL-

Amherst Square Mission—An account of \$130.37 approved by Presbytery, for roof repairs, was considered. Agreed to payment.

Italian Mission, Alma St., asked \$100 to cover repairs ordered by the City to comply with sanitary regulations. Allowed.

An account for \$70.90, fee for valuation of French Institute was forwarded by Secretary of Presbytery. Agreed to pay this amount.

#### OTTAWA-

Gatineau—The H.M. Convener of Presbytery asked if the Board would guarantee the new loan of \$3,000, which the congregation hope to secure in Ottawa. Agreed.

#### ALGOMA-

Bruce Hill—Presbytery recommended that \$1,500 of the loan on this Mission be cancelled on condition that the balance be paid in seven equal annual instalments. Agreed.

#### TEMISKAMING-

Uno Park requested loan of \$500 and a grant of \$200 to purchase two buildings which will be joined for a church. Agreed, the loan to be repaid at rate of \$100 yearly plus interest.

Temagami—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$500 and a loan of \$500 for church. Agreed.

McCool—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$500 and a loan of \$500 without interest for two years, then loan to be repaid at rate of \$100 per year with interest. Agreed.

Swastika—A grant of \$300 was asked for repairs to the manse. Agreed subject to approval of Presbytery.

#### TORONTO WEST ....

Eastwood Park requests an additional loan of \$300 with interest at 5% after this year, and repayment of principal at rate of \$50 per year beginning 1932. Agreed.

# TORONTO CHURCH EXTENSION UNION-

Property Budget for 1930 was approved by the Board with exception of payments for interest and principal on Church of All Nations and Queen St. Church.

It was requested that the Board pay the interest on the Church of All Nations mortgage amounting to \$1,478.75.

Agreed that the grant to the Extension Union be \$55,540, \$13,181.82 to be paid from Property Fund and \$42,358.97 from Maintenance Account.

#### GUELPH---

Kitchener—Request was made for best possible terms in connection with the loan on Albert St. Mission made some years ago.

Agreed to let this loan stand for two years longer without interest, and that interest accrued up to the present be cancelled, subject to approval of Presbytery.

#### ESSEX-

Ottawa Street, Walkerville—At the request of the congregation it was agreed that the \$5,000 loan voted in April be exempt from interest for five years.

#### SUPERIOR-

Fort William—Request was made for \$100 to purchase materials for a garage for the Superintendent of Wayside Mission. Agreed subject to approval of Presbytery.

Fort William—Permission was asked to sell the Ukrainian Church for \$1,000. Agreed subject to approval of the Executive of the General Council.

#### BATTLEFORD-

Meadow Lake—It was intimated that \$52 of the Property grant for a manse had been used to purchase a stove. Agreed to transfer this amount from Maintenance account to the Property Fund.

#### KAMSACK-

Sturgis—Congregation promised to repay the principal of their loan at the rate of \$100 per year if all interest is dropped. Agreed to accept this arrangement.

Stenen asked a grant of \$415 to assist in completing the church. Agreed.

Veregin loan of \$250. Agreed that no interest be charged on overdue note.

# PRINCE ALBERT-

Hudson Bay Junction asked a grant of \$1,400 and a loan of \$1,300 to assist in building a church. Agreed, the loan to be without interest for two years.

#### REGINA-

Rosemont—Request was made for a grant of \$1,000 and a loan of \$1,000 for removing and enlarging the church. Agreed to grant of \$500 and loan of \$1,000.

#### SWIFT CURRENT-

Golden Prairie asked a grant of \$200 to build a student manse. Agreed subject to approval of Presbytery.

#### EDMONTON-

Stony Plain asked a loan of \$800 to assist in remodelling the church. Agreed to a loan of \$400.

### MEDICINE HAT-

Winnifred asked that balance of the loan be cancelled if the congregation pays \$700—\$300 during the summer and \$400 in 1931. Agreed to cancel \$720 on condition balance be paid in two instalments, one in 1930 and the other in 1931.

#### VERMILION-

Two Hills asked a loan of \$250 and a grant of \$100 to assist in erecting a church. Agreed.

#### KOOTENAY-

Michel—Convener of H.M. Committee recommended "that whatever part of the grant of \$1,500 that was passed be made available for renovating the present building taken over from the W.M.S." Referred to Secretary with power.

# VANCOUVER-

Scandinavian Building—Information received that it was necessary to have a new roof at a cost of \$175. Agreed to confirm action of office in authorizing these repairs.

Cordova Street Property, formerly Knox Church—Permission was asked to have the interest on the proceeds of sale of this building made available for the new building project of First Church, as well as the proceeds. Agreed.

# VICTORIA-

The "Broadcaster"—As it has not been possible to sell this boat it was suggested that it be moved to Kootenay Lakes for mission work there, and that a new engine be installed. Agreed to grant \$575 for new engine, and \$150 for installation, and to transfer the boat to Kootenay, the transportation cost of \$175 to be paid from maintenance account.

Port Alberni asked a loan of \$2,000 towards a manse. Loan of \$1,800 voted, the congregation to give a mortgage of \$2,800 including the \$1,000 at present on the church, to be repaid at rate of \$300 per year with interest at 5%.

Fairfield, Victoria, asked a loan of \$9,000 covering church and parsonage in order to pay off existing mortgages. No action.

Bear River asked grant at the rate of \$600 from July 1st. Agreed.

Upper Keswick asked grant at rate of \$615. Referred to Executive.

#### INVERNESS AND GUYSBORO-

Mabou, Margaree and Strathlorne—Presbytery asked restoration of grants for these charges as asked in the spring. No action.

# PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND-

Wellington asked grant at the rate of \$400 from July 1st. Referred to Executive. (This request was later withdrawn.)

#### St. John-

As a result of readjustment of East St. John, Silver Falls, Hammond River and Hampton charges, the following grants were asked from July 1st, instead of those voted by the Board: East St. John at the rate of \$675; Silver Falls at the rate of \$305; Hammond River and Hampton at the rate of \$575; Golden Grove \$100 for student. Agreed.

#### ST. STEPHEN-

Presbytery asked that the reduction of \$100 made in the Scotch Ridge grant be divided amongst all the aid-receiving charges in the Presbytery. No action.

# SYDNEY-

Cape North and Ingonish—Presbytery asked reconsideration of the grant to this field, allowing \$700 for salary and \$200 for travel. Referred to Executive.

Leitches Creek renewed request for grant at rate of \$300 rather than \$200 voted by the Board. Referred to Executive.

#### Truro-

Presbytery protested the cuts made in grant to Maitland, Noel and Upper Stewiacke and requested that the total reduction of \$200 be spread over all the aid-receiving charges at \$20 each except Belmont and Onslow, which would mean the restoration of \$40 of the total reduction. No action.

Belmont and Onslow asked grant at the rate of \$200, the fields to be supplied by a minister with student assistance. No action.

#### Truro-

Great Village asked continuation of the grant at rate of \$300 from July 1st. Agreed.

# WOODSTOCK-

Grand Falls renewed request for grant at rate of \$400 as asked in March, rather than \$350. No action.

# YARMOUTH-

Barrington renewed request at rate of \$685 rather than \$650. No action.

#### MONTREAL-

Secretarial Assistance—Request was made for \$15 per month as may be required for clerical assistance for the Convener and Secretary of the Home Mission Committee. Referred to Dr. Cochrane to confer with Superintendent and Presbytery.

Eglise du Sauveur asked continuation of grant at rate of \$1,025 rather than \$850 after July 1st. Agreed.

Hampstead asked \$40 per month rent of store used as place of worship from May 1st. Allowed.

Lacroix asked \$75 to meet coal bill. No action.

Italian Mission, Alma Street, asked grant at rate of \$1,800 rather than \$1,500 from date of minister's marriage. Agreed.

Arundel asked grant at rate of \$700 from July 1st. Agreed.

Montreal North and Ahuntzic asked grant at rate of \$600 from July 1st. Action deferred.

Cote des Neiges asked grant at rate of \$500 from July 1st. Agreed.

Tetreaultville—It was suggested that the grant at the rate of \$600 should be continued after June. Action deferred.

#### OSHAWA-

Ukrainian Mission—Presbytery asked that this work be continued and that until a regular minister can be supplied the most satisfactory arrangement possible be made for weekly service. Agreed to grant \$10 per week for lay supply from Toronto.

### LINDSAY-

North Verulam—It was agreed to confirm payment of \$78.35 for winter supply by student.

#### ALGOMA---

All People's Mission, Sault Ste. Marie—Mr. Perkins asked that the rent to be received from the house formerly occupied by his assistant be allowed to pay a boys' worker. Agreed that this rental must be sent to Toronto for deposit in the Property Fund, also that rent from the Italian Mission must come to the Property Fund, and that an additional maintenance grant of \$300 be given the Institution in lieu of this.

#### TORONTO CENTRE-

Schomberg—Presbytery asked special grant of \$100 for this selfsustaining charge. No action.

Toronto Japanese—The matter of remuneration to be allowed for this work was referred to Mr. Beaton and Dr. Noyes.

#### TORONTO EAST-

Lemonville asked grant at rate of \$400 from July 1st. Allowed.

#### BRANTFORD-

Grand River and Six Nations—Continuation of grant at rate of \$1,725 was asked from July 1st. Grant at rate of \$1,575 allowed, the field having agreed to raise \$150.

#### GUELPH-

Goldstone asked grant at rate of \$300 rather than \$150 for the Conference year 1930-31. No action.

Kitchener, Deaconess—Presbytery urged continuation of the grant for this work and conference with the W.M.S. re joint support. Agreed to continue grant from month to month, the Secretaries to confer with the W.M.S. and report to the Executive.

#### HALDIMAND-NORFOLK-

South Cayuga—It was reported that the grant allowed by the Board at the rate of \$725 to June 30th, then \$525, would give the minister \$100 more than the minimum salary. It was agreed that the grant should be \$525 for the full year.

Arthur asked grant at rate of \$500 rather than \$300 for the year. Grant at rate of \$400 allowed.

Hodgeville asked special of \$75, half of deficit for nine months ending March. Agreed.

#### PRINCE ALBERT-

Blaine Lake and Leask—It was reported that these two fields would be joined and that a grant at rate of \$500 from July 1st would be required rather than the total of \$1,075 voted by the Board. Agreed.

#### REGINA-

Findlater asked that the full grant for the June quarter be allowed to the missionary who left early in March. No action.

Chalmers and North Regina—Readjustment of the grant was asked allowing \$500 for the year, also up to \$200 to provide an evening service for Rosemont. Agreed.

Disley—A grant of \$75 was asked for first six months of 1930, which would make a salary of \$1,450 for lay supply. No action.

# SWIFT CURRENT-

Hatton-Irvine—A special of \$130 was asked for house rent for lay supply. Agreed to allow \$60 for travelling expenses on the field.

#### HANNA-

Richdale asked \$21 for supply for seven Sundays during winter. Agreed.

#### ST. PAUL-

Bellis asked continuation of grant at rate of \$1,720. No action.

Bonnyville—It was agreed to pay moving expenses of Rev. H. Fresque, who has been asked by the Board to go to Bonnyville.

Dr. Duclos' Work—Presbytery asked that the grant be continued for July and August to enable Dr. Duclos to complete work he has undertaken and to give some service to Lacorey. Agreed to continue grant to end of July.

#### THREE HILLS-

Carbon asked to be placed on the aid-receiving list with a grant at the rate of \$200 from Jan: 1, 1930. \$150 allowed.

# KAMLOOPS-OKANAGAN-

Malakwa and Arrowhead asked that grant at the rate of \$1,450 be continued from July 1st rather than \$1,250. Referred to Executive.

#### Prince Rupert—

Stewart—It was agreed to confirm payment of \$60 for supply of Anyox from Stewart and to grant \$35 additional for the same purpose.

Kispiox—Presbytery asked that the Board's action regarding removal of the missionary from this field be reconsidered and that the resident missionary be continued, and a grant of \$700 allowed for the last six months of 1930. Conference Committee recommended as an alternative that a married missionary-teacher be appointed. No action.

#### Vancouver-

Alert Bay—Special salary of \$1,725 was recommended for Mr. Ashford, although he is unmarried. \$1,700 allowed.

VICTORIA-

Cowichan Lake—A special of \$100 towards arrears was asked. Allowed.

Esquimalt (White and Indian) and James Bay—A grant at the rate of \$700 was asked from July 1st, these fields to be amalgamated into one charge. Allowed.

The Committee adjourned, Rev. Dr. Laidlaw pronouncing the benediction.

# MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE SUB-EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS, TORONTO, SEPTEMBER 5th, 1930

At Toronto, and within the Home Mission Office of The United Church of Canada, on Friday, September 5th, the Sub-Executive of the Board of Home Missions met pursuant to notice, at 2 p.m., and was opened with prayer by Dr. Sedgwick.

Those present—Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D.; Rev. R. B. Cochrane, D.D.; Rev. Colin G. Young, D.D.; Rev. K. J. Beaton; Mr. Fred Mann; Rev. J. L. Alexander; Rev. A. L. Smith, D.D.; Rev. R. S. Laidlaw, D.D.; Rev. T. P. Perry; Rev. Robt. Hicks.

Rev. Arthur Barner, Superintendent of Indian Missions, was also present.

# Statement re Expenditure of the Board

The Secretary reported that for the first six months of 1930 the Home Mission Board had spent \$30,000 more than its allocation, but \$60,000 less than in the first six months of 1929.

No action necessary.

# Legacies

The Treasurer reported the following legacies received and credited to the Home Mission Reserve Fund: Estate of C. J. Findlay, Smith's Falls, \$400.00 for Home Missions; Estate of J. F. McEwen, Kingston, \$1,000 to be used for missionary work in Canada. No action necessary.

# Re Will of Miss C. McTavish

The Executors request permission to make certain small bequests not provided for in the Will.

Referred to Dr. Cochrane and Dr. Laird with power to issue.

# Date of Meeting of Executive

It was agreed that the Executive should be called to meet on October 21st, 1930.

# Request of Dr. Osterhout

Dr. Osterhout asked that he be excused from attendance at the approaching meeting of the Executive. Agreed.

# Proposed Appointment of Rev. H. A. Mutchmor

It has been suggested that Rev. H. A. Mutchmor, Superintendent of Wayside House, might be appointed as judge of the Juvenile Court which may be established in Fort William, and if this materializes, Mr. Mutchmor should receive an honorarium of \$50 per month, \$25 of which could be used to pay the salary of a part-time worker for Wayside House, and the balance for additional expenses incurred by Mr. Mutchmor, subject to rearrangement in six months or a year.

It was agreed that approval be given to the appointment of Mr. Mutchmor as Judge of the Juvenile Court, should it be established, and that the honorarium be used as suggested.

# Resolution of Sympathy

The Secretary was requested to send a letter to Rev. T. Hunter Boyd, expressing the sincere sympathy of the Committee in the recent death of his wife.

# Re Situation at All People's Mission, Edmonton

A statement was made re the situation at this Mission, in connection with Mr. Mayne and Mr. Ponich.

It was decided that no further action was necessary at present.

#### Hospitals

# Hafford Hospital-

A letter from Dr. Chas. Endicott urged the payment to the Hospital of \$1,500 per annum, proceeds of Mr. T. B. Macaulay's gift, over and above the grant from the Board. Agreed to re-affirm former action in this connection.

' Agreed also to give a line of credit at the Bank up to \$1,500 if necessary.

#### Smoky Lake Hospital-

It was reported that there was a total indebtedness of \$3,200, and request was made for a grant of \$1,500, their line of credit having been overdrawn.

Agreed to increase the line of credit at the Bank by \$1,000, making a total of \$3,500.

#### Lamont Hospital—

Intimation was received that in a resolution passed on June 24th, 1930, the word "or" should be substituted for the word "and" in the following: "That Dr. A. E. Archer, Medical Superintendent and Rev. C. W. W. Ross, Secretary-Treasurer of Lamont, Alberta, be and is hereby authorized . . . " Agreed.

# Bonnyville and Cold Lake Hospitals-

It was decided to accept the resignation of Dr. Grafton, which had just been received, and to request the Secretaries to co-operate with the W.M.S. in regard to the appointment of his successor.

#### Indian Work

#### Re Mr. J. E. Rendle's Death-

Mr. Barner stated that Mr. Rendle, newly appointed missionary to Kitamaat Indian Mission, had died suddenly after twenty-six years service on Indian Missions in B. C.

The Secretaries were requested to send Mrs. Rendle a letter, expressing the sincere sympathy of the members of the Committee. It was agreed also to pay Mrs. Rendle the grant for the quarter following the death of her husband, with an additional \$50, making \$400 in all.

### Nanaimo Indian Mission-

Permission was asked to allow Rev. H. S. Hastings, pastor at Wellington, to occupy this building.

Agreed, on condition that he keep the house in repair, and pay the taxes.

# Immigration

Mr. Beaton raised the question of the Immigration Policy of the Board, in view of the new regulations just issued by the Dominion Government.

It was decided that the Secretaries should be asked to prepare a statement for the meeting of the Executive.

#### Oriental Work

# Re Case of Dr. Philip Y. Chu-

Mr. Beaton reported that after he had been completely exonerated by the courts in Vancouver, the Medical Association took up the case and suspended him for three months. He is now established in the new Mission Building, and is taking an increased interest in church work. No action necessary.

# Exchange of Edmonton and New Westminster ministers-

On account of the delicate health of Mrs. Leung, wife of Rev. C. P. Leung, of Edmonton, it was recommended that Mr. Leung exchange charges with Rev. F. Dickman of New Westminster. Agreed to transfer these missionaries and pay moving expenses up to \$409.45.

#### Chinese, Montreal-

Rev. K. Y. Tang having agreed to remain in Montreal until the end of July, 1931, the Superintendent of Chinese work recommends that Mr. Tang should visit the Maritime Province this autumn, and requests that authority be given for the necessary expenses. No action.

### PROPERTY CLAIMS

#### HALIFAX-

Bedford Congregation asked that payment of principal of loan be deferred for a year. Agreed subject to approval of Presbytery.

#### COCHRANE-

Matheson asked a grant of \$500 for a manse. Referred to Executive.

#### NIAGARA---

Westminster, St. Catharines, asked guarantee of a loan of \$5,000 from the Bank which is overdue, and which will not be extended without such security. Referred to the Executive, the Secretaries to take up matter with Presbytery and the congregation.

# KENT-

Moraviantown—Request was made by the tenant who rents a farm owned by the Church, for permission to do some tiling and apply the cost against the rent. Agreed to allow \$32 for tile, to be credited on the rent, the expense of laying it to be borne by the tenant.

#### WINNIPEG-

Stafford Mission—Tax bills covering 1929 and 1930 were sent by Superintendent and paid, the amount, \$165.45, being charged against the loan on the property. Agreed that the Board assume taxes for 1929 amounting to \$74.49 and the balance for 1930 be charged to Congregation.

# MOOSE JAW-

Shamrock—A lumber company claimed \$161.95 for materials not paid by the contractor for this frontier manse, but later agreed to accept \$130 cash in full of account. Agreed to pay this amount.

#### GRANDE PRAIRIE-

White Mountain asked a loan of \$600 to complete the church. A loan of \$300 approved on condition the congregation raise sufficient to complete the building.

Pouce Coupe asked an increase in the loan and grant passed a year ago. They now request a loan of \$500 and a grant of \$500. Agreed.

#### PEACE RIVER-

Notikewin—Request was made for grant of \$200 for garage. Agreed to vote this amount from the balance remaining of grant for church and manse.

#### KOOTENAY-

Michel—Information received that the W.M.S. will accept \$3,000 for the buildings. Alterations would amount to \$2,000, of which the congregation would pay \$500. Agreed to recommendations of Presbytery and Superintendent, and that the house be purchased for \$3,000, divided in three annual payments of \$1,000 each.

# PRINCE RUPERT-

Stewart—Presbytery endorsed an application for a grant of \$1,000 and a loan of \$1,000 to assist in building a church. Agreed to vote a loan of \$500 and a grant of \$500.

The Dominion Government officials have been writing in regard to various parcels of land which were given the former Methodist and Presbyterian churches by the Crown. They require that where these lands have not been used for church purposes, transfers be made to the Government, or in cases where the land has been sold, they are claiming \$3 per acre and assurance that the money received from the sale was used for church purposes. Agreed to refer the matter to the Secretaries with power to issue.

#### MAINTENANCE CLAIMS

# REV. T. C. CROSBY AND REV. J. M. HOOKER-

The Martime Conference Committee Executive asked special grant of \$250 each for these men in final settlement of all claims. Agreed.

### MONCTON-

Dorchester—\$105 was asked for supply from July 1st to September 14th. Agreed.

# WINDSOR-

Walton—Executive of Conference Committee recommended a grant of \$500. Referred to Executive.

#### MONTREAL-

Ahuntzic—Request was made for grant at rate of \$600 from July 1st. Referred to Executive.

#### OTTAWA-

Bristol—A special grant of \$200 was asked to liquidate debts. Referred to Executive.

East Templeton—A grant of \$625 was asked including \$300 for rent. Agreed to grant at rate of \$325 for salary.

Ottawa, St. Marks-\$200 additional was asked. Referred to Executive.

#### BELLEVILLE-

Bridgewater—A complaint was received re the reduction of grant from \$700 last year to \$400 this year. No action.

#### Peterboro-

Hiawatha Indian—It was agreed to refer the matter of supply to Mr. Barner in consultation with Rev. T. P. Perry, and to allow \$25 additional grant if necessary.

### COCHRANE-

Nakina—Mr. Kell's moving expenses amounted to \$115.80. Agreed to pay \$57.90, subject to approval of Presbytery.

Connaught—Presbytery asked a grant at rate of \$550 for lay supply from July 1st. Agreed to grant at rate of \$550.

Matheson—Presbytery asked grant from July 1st to make up the salary of an ordained minister. Agreed to grant at rate of \$675 for six months.

South Porcupine—Presbytery asked a loan of \$1,000 to assist this congregation to liquidate its indebtedness. Referred to the Secretaries and the H.M. Superintendent with power to give such temporary relief as may be necessary and the whole case referred to Executive.

#### SUDBURY-

Worthington—Presbytery asked a grant of \$50 for Mr. Jackson as he lost his house furnishings by fire. Agreed.

#### TEMISKAMING-

Elk Lake—\$117.80 was asked for moving expenses. Agreed to pay \$75, the office to correspond further with the Superintendent.

#### TORONTO EAST-

Toronto, Weish Church—Presbytery recommended a grant at the rate of \$600 from date of settlement, August 10th. Agreed.

#### Brantford—

New Durham—Grant at the rate of \$200 was asked from July 1st. Agreed.

# HAMILTON-

Binkley, Trinity—Presbytery asked a grant at rate of \$600 from July 1st, but the Conference Committee increased this to \$800. Agreed to a grant at rate of \$800.

Salary of Social Workers—An increase from \$80 to \$90 per month was asked, dating from May 15th for Miss Ansell, and a similar increase for Miss Mounce from September 15th. Agreed when Presbytery has approved.

#### NORFOLK-

King Lake—Continuation of grant at rate of \$710 was asked from July 1st for O. M. Agreed.

#### WINNIPEG-

Winter supply by students—\$25 was asked for supply of Morse Place for the winter of 1929-30, and \$79.04 for Great Falls. Agreed.

Finnish Work—Continuation was asked of the grant at the rate of \$2,280 for salary and rent, less collections, from July 1st. Agreed.

MacLean Mission—Continuation of grant at rate of \$1,900 after July 1st for salary of Superintendent, was asked. Agreed.

# Moose Jaw-

Shamrock—The Convener reported Mr. Brown's moving expenses, amounting to \$87.50. Agreed to pay moving expenses subject to approval of Presbytery.

#### SASKATOON-

Lockwood—Presbytery asked that grant of \$5 per week be allowed for the full year rather than just for summer. Agreed.

#### CALGARY-

Ukrainian—Presbytery asked a special grant for Mr. Gregorash of \$300, as he has been left without charge since June. Agreed.

# GRANDE PRAIRIE-

Rolla—Mr. Rogers' moving expenses amounted to \$58, which he has been unable to collect from the field. Agreed to pay \$58.

# HANNA-

Wayne—Grant at the rate of \$1,000 was voted to June 30th, then lay supply, but as the same minister was left in charge the continuation of the grant was asked. Agreed.

Bethel-Neuburg—It was reported that Dr. Tigges' moving expenses amounted to \$125.30. Agreed to pay the full amount, subject to action of Presbytery.

# MEDICINE HAT-

German Work—Mr. Schultheiss was obliged to leave his field and being destitute, request was made for a grant of \$50 out of the regular grant, the field having been vacant 3 months. Agreed.

#### PEACE RIVER-

Moving expenses were asked as follows, and allowed: Whitelaw, Rev. G. S. Cassmore \$43.90; McLennan, Rev. W. A. Deeprose \$25.00; Notikewin, Rev. H. E. Parker \$79.65; Berwyn, Rev. L. A. Thompson \$25.00.

High Prairie—A special of \$50 was asked towards deficit in Mr. Adams' salary. Agreed.

Furniture Grants, Berwyn and Peace River—As the manses at both these places were reported inadequately furnished, on approval of Presbytery a grant of \$100 for each was sent in July. Presbytery now asks \$150 for each charge. Sub-Executive agreed to grant of only \$100 each.

#### VERMILION-

Oxville—Application was made for the amount of Mr. Binning's moving expenses, totalling \$49.31. Agreed to pay \$37.31, \$12 ordinary allowance having been paid, subject to approval of Presbytery.

#### VANCOUVER-

Adjustment of small charges—As it was not possible to effect certain re-adjustments of fields as soon as expected, additional amounts were required for supply as follows: Capilano \$31.80, and Renfrew \$50. Both allowed.

#### Victoria-

Cowichan-Shawinigan—Request was made in June for \$75 balance of regular grant for 1929. Agreed.

#### WESTMINSTER-

East Burnaby—\$150 was agreed for this charge for purchase of furniture, under the special regulation. Agreed.

The meeting adjourned at 5 p.m. with prayer by Rev. J. L. Alexander.

# MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS, OCTOBER 21-24, 1930.

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada convened in the Board Room of Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Tuesday, October 21st, 1930, at 9.30 a.m., with Rev. Dr. Sedgewick presiding.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises.

Rev. Robert Hicks was appointed Minute Secretary.

#### Communications

Letters expressing regret at their inability to be present were read from Revs. A. L. Smith, D.D., Rev. R. J. McDonald, B.D., and Rev. J. L. Alexander.

The Secretary reported that at Dr. Osterhout's request he had been excused from attendance by the Sub-Executive.

A letter was read from the Prince Albert Presbytery, expressing appreciation of the treatment received from the Home Mission Board.

Rev. S. D. Gaudin wrote conveying his gratitude for the furlough granted him by the Sub-Executive, and it was agreed that, since Mr. and Mrs. Gaudin found themselves unable to take the holiday this year, the privilege should be extended to them next year.

A communication was read from Rev. John Chisholm, D.D., with regard to the admission of certain Mennonites to Canada. It was decided to take no action.

# **Expenses of Members**

On recommendation of a committee appointed to consider a scale of expenses for members, the following was adopted:

Cost of Return Ticket to Toronto; cost of Sleeper both ways; meals en route at maximum of \$4.00 per day; hotel expenses in Toronto at maximum of \$4.50 per day.

# Treasurer's Statement

The Treasurer reported that the Board had expended during the first nine months of 1930 the sum of \$983,164.42, of which \$889,587.53 had been received from the M. and M. Fund, and \$93,576.89 from other sources. As the revised appropriation from the M. and M. Fund for 9 months was \$855,000, the Board had spent in that period \$34,587.53 over its allocation. However, in the first nine months of 1930 the Board had expended \$82,929.68 less than in the same period of 1929.

Dr. Laird expressed the appreciation of the Finance Committee at the effort made by the Board to keep down expenditures to the lowest possible minimum.

# Statements by the Secretary

Property Fund—

Dr. Cochrane reported that if applications on the agenda of this Executive for loans and grants from the Property Fund were voted, a balance would be left of only \$42,903.96.

Division of Responsibility Among Secretaries-

The Secretary outlined the manner in which responsibility was divided among the three Secretaries of the Board.

Re Super-gifts to Home Missions-

The Secretary reported that \$5,261.85 had been given to date in supergifts to Home Missions.

#### Conditions in Southern Saskatchewan

Rev. George Dorey made a short statement, describing distressing economic conditions prevailing in the dried-out area of Southern Saskatchewan.

# Report re Missionary and Maintenance Fund

Dr. Peter Bryce made a short report regarding the present state of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund.

# Report of Action of General Council on Recommendations From Home Mission Board

The following recommendations were adopted by the General Council:

- (1) That appointment of ministers to be Missionaries to the Indians or Superintendents of Institutions largely supported by the Board of Home Missions ought to be made by the Settlement Committees only on the recommendation of the Board itself.
- (2) That monies raised in the Institutions supported by the Board of Home Missions should be included in the estimated revenues in connection with the applications for grants.
- (3) That after the grants have been finally fixed by the Board of Home Missions on the recommendation of Presbytery and Conference Home Mission Committee, Settlement Committees ought not to make appointments requiring larger grants without the consent of the Board of Home Missions.
- (4) That the General Council recommend each Conference to invite the Convener of the Conference Home Mission Committee to be a corresponding member of the Settlement Committee of the Conference.

The following was referred to the Board of Home Missions to consult with the Committee of Direction of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund:

(5) That the attention of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund Committee be drawn to the fact that many Home Mission grants requested by aid-receiving fields are manifestly larger than necessary owing to the pressure felt by the field to meet its Missionary and Maintenance allocation, and that this Board of Home Missions suggest to the Missionary and Maintenance Department that while still maintaining the congregation's interest in the wider missionary work of the Church, Presbyteries be advised to avoid allocating to aid-receiving fields amounts that militate against the said fields reaching as large a measure of self-support as possible.

The Secretaries were asked to confer with the Missionary and Maintenance Fund Committee regarding Item (5) and report to the Board at its meeting in the Spring.

# Report of Action of General Council re Matters Affecting Work of the Home Mission Board

- (1) Administration of W.M.S. Work-
  - (a) Approval of the principle of the recommendation of the Special Committee on Relation of Work and Workers of the W.M.S. and other Boards of the Church to the Presbytery, as follows:

"The Committee recommends for the consideration of the Woman's Missionary Society and the Executive of the General Council, that the Woman's Missionary Society should administer its work and direct its workers within the bounds of a Presbytery in consultation with the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee, on the membership of which the Woman's Missionary Society shall have two representatives who shall be constituent members of the Committee."

(b) That this Special Committee be re-appointed or a new Committee appointed to seek further conference with the Dominion Board of the W.M.S., with a view to coming to a common understanding on the matter. Approved by General Council.

It was agreed that when the Special Committee is re-appointed by the Executive of the General Council, the Secretaries should arrange for representation of this Board.

- (2) Resolutions remitted to General Council by the London Conference—
  - (a) Border Cities Church Extension and Mission Union—Approval of Constitution—The General Council referred this matter to the Board of Home Missions and the Executive of the General Council, with power.

Reported for information only.

- (b) Re Volunteers for Home Mission Work—The following resolutions were adopted by the Council:—
  - (i) That any ordinand or minister of the Church volunteering for service on the Home Mission field of our Church outside his own Conference for a period of at least three years, shall have the right, if he so desires, to be transferred back to his own Conference at the end of such period.
  - (ii) That the Board of Home Missions meet the travelling expenses of such men when they return to serve aid-receiving charges, the question of moving expenses to be dealt with as provided in regulation 16 of the Home Mission Regulations.
  - (iii) That generous consideration be given by the Transfer Committee to men who have given lengthy and efficient service on Mission fields and aid-receiving charges in Home Mission areas, who desire to be transferred to Eastern and Central Conferences.

Reported for information only.

Salaries of Ministers Living in Furnished Manses or Parsonages
The following resolution was referred by the General Council to the
Board of Home Missions, with power:—

"That the matter of the salaries of those Home Missionaries who are living in parsonages or manses, reported as being furnished, and on account of which the Board of Home Missions makes a deduction of \$75.00 from the yearly grant, be referred to the Board of Home Missions with the request that a more equitable amount than that now obtaining be fixed, beginning January 1931."

It was directed that the Superintendents of Missions and Conveners of Conference Home Mission Committees should be a committee to enquire into this matter and report to the Board.

# Regulations of Board

#### Amendments-

It was reported that amendments to the Regulations as passed by the Board in the Spring had been submitted to the General Council and approval obtained.

Amendments to existing regulations were agreed upon as follows:-

Section 16, Clause (c) ii, to read:-

"Student missionaries shall receive travelling expenses to the field of labor from all points in Canada and the United States, and return transportation, provided it is requested and used at the expiration of the period of service."

Section 15, Clause (b), to read:-

"A single, ordained minister shall receive \$1,600 per year, without residence."

Section 15, Clause (e), to read:

"The salary of a Layman or Student or Candidate for the Ministry under yearly appointment shall be \$1,200, and the use of the manse or parsonage where there is one . . . ."

#### Interpretation-

Section 19, Clause (c), "Furnishing of Manses or Parsonages."

Peachland, B.C., was the case under discussion. \$155.00 had been granted for furniture under this regulation. They requested that the manse be regarded as "one-third" furnished and that the salary be \$1,775.00 instead of \$1,725.00, involving a special grant of \$50.00 for the year. The Conference Home Mission Committee Executive recommended that the congregation complete the furnishing. This recommendation was concurred in.

#### Special Grants

It was agreed that no special grants should be passed by the Sub-Executive without the endorsation of the Conference Home Mission Committee or its Executive.

# **Duties of Supervising Pastors**

A Committee appointed to make recommendations concerning the duties of Supervising Pastors reported as follows:—

"Whereas, the scope of the duties of supervising pastors differs with the nature of the work done in the various Presbyteries across Canada;

"We therefore recommend that the matter of outlining the duties of Supervising Pastors be left in the hands of the Presbyteries concerned."

This Report was adopted.

#### Allowance to Widows of Missionaries

It was agreed to recommend to the Board that sub-section (1) of the section "Allowance to Widows of Missionaries" on page 73 of the 1930 Digest of Minutes be changed to read:—

"That the widows of missionaries employed by this Board at the time of death should receive an amount equal to the grant for six months from the date of the death of the husband."

#### Insurance of Missionaries

Men in Marine Mission Work-

It was decided that only the engineers on our boats should be insured, in compliance with the requirements of the Workmen's Compensation Act of British Columbia.

Students-

The question of insurance of our students serving mission fields against accidents and sickness was referred to the Sub-Executive.

#### Estates

Kelley Will and Chebogue Church, N.S .-

The advisability of instituting legal proceedings to establish our right to interest on \$20,000 devised under this will to the Chebogue Congregational Church, which has been in dispute since 1926, was considered.

It was decided that the matter should be remitted to the Executive of the General Council.

Will of Miss Sabra Wiltse-

It was agreed to waive any claim to the sum of \$200.00 bequeathed to "the Missionary Society of the United Church of Canada" and paid by the Executor to the local W.M.S., who forwarded the amount to the W.M.S. offices in Toronto.

Susanah B. Smith Estate-

The consent of the Board as one of the residuary legatees was requested to the acceptance of immediate payment of a mortgage for \$2,000, bearing interest at  $4\frac{1}{2}$ %, and not maturing for ten years, at a discount of \$400.00. Agreed.

#### Itinerary for Visit of Home Mission Fields by Moderator

Arrangement of intinerary for the Moderator on his visitation of Home Mission Fields in 1931 was left with the Secretaries and the Chairman, in consultation with the Superintendents of Missions.

#### Inter-Conference Vacation Pulpit Exchange

At the suggestion of the Moderator, the Executive considered a plan for the inauguration in 1931 of:—

(1) An Inter-Conference Vacation Pulpit exchange, particularly as between Eastern, Central and Western Canada.

# (2) Furloughs for Frontier Missionaries.

It was resolved to endorse this proposal as a principle of action, and to instruct the Sub-Executive to co-operate with the Secretary, and the Moderator to make the scheme effective.

#### Resolution of Maritime Conference re Reductions in Grants

In June 1930, the Maritime Conference adopted the following resolution:—

"This Conference recommends to the Board of Home Missions that, in making then ecessary reductions in grants to aid-receiving charges throughout the whole Church, some plan of equalization be adopted whereby such reductions should fall equally upon all such charges, rather than upon a few to the exclusion of others."

No action was taken.

# Delegates to North American Home Missions Congress

The Board at its last meeting decided not to send delegates to the North American Home Missions Congress to be held in Washington, D.C., in December, 1930. On reconsideration, the appointment of five delegates was agreed to: The Moderator, Rev. K. J. Beaton and Rev. H. H. Eaton, the selection of two additional delegates being left with the Secretaries. It was understood that the delegates were to care for their own expenses.

# Overlapping With Other Churches

The Secretary reported in regard to the unsuccessful attempt to have conference with the Presbyterian Church in regard to over-lapping.

# Need for Clothing in Western Provinces

It was agreed to ask the Woman's Missionary Society to appeal to their Auxiliaries for clothing for territories where there is hardship, and to confer with them re method of distribution; the ministers serving in such communities to be requested to forward particulars re cases of need to the Superintendent in their district.

# Scale of Work in 1931

The following resolution was adopted:-

THAT, in view of the financial situation, the Sub-Executive be asked to consider on what scale the work should be undertaken in 1931; to send a statement of its suggestions to the Superintendents and Presbyteries as early in the year as possible; and to report to the Board in April.

# Ratification of Minutes of Sub-Executive

It was agreed to confirm the action of the Sub-Executive in connection with all business transacted at meetings held since the last meeting of the Board.

# Appointment of Interim Sub-Executive

A Committee appointed to make recommendations for the Sub-Executive submitted the following names, which were approved:— The Chairman, The Secretaries, Rev. J. L. Alexander, Rev. J. J. Coulter, Mr. W. G. Watson, Mr. Morden Neilson, Rev. T. P. Perry, Rev. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., Rev. Robert Hicks, Mr. Fred Mann, Rev. J. R. Watts, D.D., Mr. J. F. Maine.

# Representatives on Inter-Board Committee on Women Workers

Dr. Colin Young and Dr. A. Lloyd Smith were appointed representatives from this Board to the Inter-Board Committee on Women Workers.

# Literature

A resolution was passed, commending to the members of the United Church the Report of the Board of Home Missions, and calling the attention of the Presbyteries to the excellent books on Home Missions now available, special mention being made of "Winning the Frontier" by Dr. Oliver; "The Salt of the Earth" by Rev. R. W. Armstrong; and "Beaver Lodge" by Henry Esmond.

# Home Mission Pamphlets-

Grateful appreciation was expressed to the following for their help in preparing the series of Home Mission Pamphlets issued during the year:—

Rev. Dr. Farquharson, Dr. A. O. Rose, Rev. J. M. Shaver, Rev. J. R. Mutchmor, Rev. Dr. C. Mackinnon, Rev. Dr. G. A. Wilson, Rev. Dr. Cormie, Rev. Dr. Watts.

# Rural Work

Survey of Dufferin County-

Rev. J. R. Watts, D.D., presented a Report of a Rural Survey of Dufferin County which had been made by him.

The thanks of the Committee were extended to Dr. Watts for his excellent work in this connection.

Report of the Commission on Rural Work-

Dr. Cormie submitted a Report containing the following recommenda-

- (1) That the Executive of the Rural Commission be authorized to survey another type of community in Ontario when it is considered necessary. Agreed.
- (2) That the Executive of the Board should be asked to approve in principle of the experiment of a Community Rural Church equipped and manned by the Board, and that it be referred back to the Commission for further consideration and for report to the Board of Home Missions. Agreed.
- (3) That the Executive be requested to instruct the Commission to make arrangements for the discussion of the Rural Question in all the Presbyteries of the Church. Agreed.

The Report as a whole was adopted.

## Immigration-

Policy re Immigration Chaplaincies—

The Secretaries were requested to confer regarding this matter with representatives of the W.M.S. on this Board; and report to Sub-Executive; and were given authority meantime to employ the Chaplains elsewhere if opportunity arose.

Report of the Immigration Committee-

The Committee was represented by Mr. Maclaren, Superintendent of the Boys' Hostel at Norval, and Major Bavin of the Migration Department of the British Y.M.C.A.'s.

Mr. Maclaren presented the Report of the Immigration Committee, and Major Bavin spoke regarding the work of selection in the Old Country. He expressed pleasure with the manner in which the work is being conducted by the United Church, and conveyed the greetings of the British Y.M.C.A.'s.

A resolution was adopted, expressing satisfaction at the reports as presented by Mr. Maclaren and Major Bavin, and giving authority to the Committee to explore the possibilities of extending this work to the Maritimes and British Columbia, report to be made to the Board in the Spring.

It was agreed to recommend to the Immigration Committee that, because of our present economic conditions, the number of young men brought into Canada this year shall be the smallest possible, and that no families shall be brought in.

# Port Simpson Hospital

A request was received from the Board of Port Simpson Hospital that the Home Mission Board take over and operate the Hospital.

The Secretaries were authorized to study the situation and report to the next meeting of the Board.

## Indian Work

Resolutions of Annual Conferences and Conferences of Indian Workers-

A resolution was submitted from the Albert Conference, calling attention to the dissatisfaction of the Indian people in Alberta with the educational policy in that province, and expressing the opinion that the time is ripe to request the Department of Indian Affairs to consider the conditional enfranchisement of the Indians.

It was agreed that this Resolution should be referred back to the Home Mission Committee of the Alberta Conference.

A Resolution passed by the Council of Indian Workers in British Columbia, and endorsed by the B.C. Conference, requested that the Department of Indian Affairs be asked to consider the question of "follow-up" work in the interests of graduates and ex-pupils of Indian Schools.

The Secretaries were requested to forward this resolution, simpliciter, to the Department of Indian Affairs.

A Resolution submitted by the Association of Indian Workers in Saskatchewan recommended closer co-operation between the missions on the Reserves and the Residential Schools; and also that more encouragement and assistance should be given to promising students by the Department of Indian Affairs.

It was agreed that this Resolution, also, should be forwarded, simpliciter, to the Department of Indian Affairs.

Furlough allowance for Mr. J. T. Blackford—

Reconsideration of the matter of Furlough allowance for Mr. J. T. Blackford, former Principal of the Norway House Indian Residential School, was referred to the Board.

# Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Ukrainian Work, Toronto-

It was agreed to endorse the action of the Secretaries in accepting the resignation of Rev. Paul Crath from the Ukrainian Work in Toronto, and appointing Rev. John Roberts in his place.

Ukrainian Work, Canora-

Approval was given to the appointment of Rev. John Gregorash as Ukrainian Worker at Canora, Sask.

# Worker for the Abitibi Canyon

It was recommended that if possible a worker be secured for the camp at Abitibi Canyon; and that his selection and the question of grant be left with the Chairman, the Secretaries, and the Superintendent of Home Missions for Northern Ontario.

# Oriental Work

Chinese Mission, Toronto-

Authority was given to a committee consisting of the Chairman and Secretary of the Toronto Centre Presbytery Home Mission Committee, together with Rev. Kenneth Beaton and Dr. Noyes and representatives of the Woman's Missionary Society, to make temporary arrangements for the housing and carrying on of the Chinese Work of the United Church in Toronto.

Participation of Oriental Missionaries in Pension Fund-

As, under the former Methodist Church, native ministers in the Oriental Work were debarred from the benefits of the Superannuation Fund, a question has arisen as to what provision should be made for those ordained before Union to enable them to participate in the Pension Fund. Referred to the Board.

## Release of Rev. S. A. Martin

It was agreed to ratify the release of Rev. S. A. Martin from his field for Missionary and Maintenance campaign work.

# Greetings to Dr. Byrnes

The Secretary was requested to convey the greetings of this Executive to Rev. J. D. Byrnes, D.D.

# Resolutions of Appreciation

A Resolution was adopted, expressing gratitude to Rev. W. M. Mustard for the service he gave in the interests of Home Mission work during his summer vacation.

# Grants for Winter Supply by Students

Dr. Cochrane reported that the Presbyteries proposed to have students supply a number of fields during the winter, for which grants had been voted only for the summer months. The estimates of amounts needed for these fields were presented. After discussion, it was decided that, in view of the fact that so many ordained ministers in the dried-out area would be several hundreds of dollars short in their salaries this year, and the Board of Home Missions would be unable to vote more than small amounts to help them carry on, the students serving for week-ends this winter should be asked to accept something less than the usual \$10 per Sunday. The following grants were then voted, it being understood that these are maximum amounts and that the Superintendents would arrange for corresponding reductions where grants were voted by the Board for the full year:

# MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE SUB-EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS, DECEMBER 19th, 1930.

The Sub-Executive of the Board of Home Missions convened in Room 514, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, at 2.00 p.m., on Friday, December 19th, with Rev. Dr. Sedgewick in the Chair.

The meeting was constituted with prayer by Rev. Dr. Watts.

Those present—Rev. R. B. Cochrane, D.D., Rev. C. G. Young, D.D., Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., Rev. K. J. Beaton, Rev. J. R. Watts, D.D., Rev. T. P. Perry, Rev. Robert Hicks, Mr. Fred Mann, Rev. A. L. Smith, D.D., Rev. J. J. Coulter.

There were also present Rev. Arthur Barner, Rev. F. L. Brown, D.D., and Rev. S. A. Martin of Churchill, who were accorded the privileges of corresponding members.

# Correspondence

The Secretary read the following communications:

From Rev. J. L. Alexander and Mr. J. F. Maine, regretting inability to be present.

From Mr. J. M. West and his daughter, expressing appreciation of the resolution passed by the Executive Committee in reference to the late Mrs. West.

From Rev. D. K. Burns, of Flin Flon, announcing the decision of the Board of Managers that, beginning January 1st, 1931, Northminster United Church would endeavour to be self-supporting, requesting no further grant towards the pastor's salary.

It was requested that a letter be sent to the Board of Managers of Northminster Church, expressing the appreciation of the members of the Sub-Executive.

# Statement From the Treasurer

The Secretary presented a statement from the Treasurer, showing that the Board of Home Missions had spent in the first eleven months of 1930 \$20,427.60 less than its appropriation from the M. and M. Fund. In the same period all departments of the Church had spent a total of \$25,000 less than the revised appropriations for 1930. On motion report was received.

## Conditions in Western Canada

Re Southern Saskatchewan-

Dr. Cochrane presented a statement from the Superintendent of Missions, showing that in Southern Saskatchewan, since July 1st, 1928, 15 student fields had been closed; 52 preaching points had been dropped; 29 manses or parsonages were vacant; and there were 19 fewer churches open.

Estimate of Extra Amounts needed in 1930 and 1931—

Figures, as compiled by the Western Superintendents, were presented by the Secretary, showing \$29,200 as approximately the extra amount needed for the current year to give every minister in Western Canada on aid-receiving charges and supposedly self-supporting fields full salary and to re-open work closed on account of unusual conditions; \$51,500 as the approximate extra amount needed for the same purposes in 1931—a total of \$80,700.

It was agreed that statements as submitted be received.

Emergent Needs in Western Canada-.

On motion, it was agreed that \$2,500.00 should be placed at the disposal of the Secretaries, in consultation with the Superintendents concerned, to assist in meeting emergent needs in Western Canada between now and the next meeting of the Sub-Executive.

## Requirements From M. and M. Fund for 1931

Estimates were submitted, setting probable requirements from the M. and M. Fund for 1931 at \$1,220,700. Statement received.

# Re Loans to Self-Supporting Charges

The question of making loans out of ordinary Maintenance Fund to Self-supporting Charges was considered. It was agreed that there should be no change in our policy of not making loans to self-supporting fields out of the Maintenance funds.

## Retrenchment in 1931

The Secretaries submitted a statement, prepared at the direction of the Executive, showing how, in their opinion, a reduction of \$141,825 might, if absolutely necessary, be made in the expenditure for 1931.

# Re Hospital Work-

The Secretaries recommended that a temporary Hospital Committee be appointed to consult with the various Hospital Boards in regard to expenditures for 1931, with a view to reporting to the Board in April what reductions, if any, can be made in the grants to hospitals.

It was decided that the above suggestions should be submitted to the Superintendents—report to be made to the Sub-Executive.

# Re Summer Supply by Students

The Secretaries were requested to notify the Colleges that in all probability the Board would not be able to send out as many students for Summer Supply as were appointed last year, and that senior students would be given the preference.

#### Statement to the Church re Financial Situation

After discussion, it was decided that the issuing of a statement to the Church in regard to the present financial situation should be deferred.

## Kilcup Guaranteed Annuity Donation

A request was received from the widow of the late Mr. N. B. Kilcup of Hantsport, N.S., that the interest of 7% on a donation of \$2,000 made to the United Church by her late husband, should be paid, to her in whole or in part. It was decided to leave the matter with the Treasurer and the Secretary.

## Estates

# Margaret Ann Farley Estate—

A specific legacy of \$1,500.00, together with the residue of her estate, was devised to the United Church by the late Mrs. Farley. It was reported to the Treasurer that she made a death-bed request that a portion of her estate should be used for the endowment of a room in the Belleville General Hospital, which was not a beneficiary under her will. It was suggested that each of the beneficiaries should allow a portion of his legacy to be used for this purpose. No action.

# Estate of Dr. F. R. Eccles-

It was agreed to accede to the request of Mrs. Eccles that \$1,000 be set aside from the capital of the Estate, the income from which would be used for the permanent care of the monument and grave.

It was also agreed to accede to Mrs. Eccles' request that the income from 20 shares fully paid stock of the Huron & Erie Mortgage Corporation, amounting to \$40 quarterly, set aside by Dr. Eccles in his lifetime for the use of a Mrs. Reynolds, who has recently died, should be paid to her husband, who is over eighty years of age.

## Leave of Absence for Rev. J. B. MacLeod

The Executive of Montreal Presbytery recommended that Mr. MacLeod, who has been taken seriously ill and has had to undergo an operation, should be given three months' leave of absence on full salary. Agreed.

# Immigration

# Future Policy-

- After presentation of a brief outline of the Immigration situation created by the recent change in Government policy, the Secretaries were asked to make a further study of conditions and report to the Board in the Spring.

# Montreal Chaplaincy-

The Executive of Montreal Presbytery recommended that the services of Rev. D. L. Gordon be made available to carry on the work of City Chaplain during the illness of Rev. J. B. MacLeod.

This was agreed to, in so far as it does not interfere with Mr. Gordon's duties as Immigration Chaplain.

# Winnipeg Chaplaincy-

The Winnipeg Presbytery approved Dr. Cormie's recommendation that Rev. G. F. McCullagh, Immigration Chaplain in Winnipeg, be placed in charge of Stafford Avenue Mission from January 1st, 1931, or at any rate not later than April 1st, Mr. McCullagh to continue to serve and be known as the Immigration Chaplain. Agreed, in so far as Mr. McCullagh's duties as Immigration Chaplain will permit.

# Quebec-St. John Chaplaincy-

The Executive of the Home Mission Committee of the Maritime Conference recommended that Rev. W. H. Stevens be placed "at the disposal of the Saint John Presbytery for Hospital, Deputation, or any other work that the Presbytery may determine."

It was agreed that Rev. W. H. Stevens, in so far as his duties as Immigration Chaplain will permit, be allowed to engage in deputation work for the M. and M. Fund.

# Hospital Work

# Port Simpson Hospital-

The question of the future of Port Simpson Hospital and the appointment of a successor to Dr. R. Geddes Large, was referred to a Committee consisting of Dr. A. Lloyd Smith, Revs. J. J. Coulter and K. J. Beaton, report to be made at the next meeting of the Sub-Executive.

# Lamont Hospital-

A request was considered for authority to borrow an additional \$10,000 from the Bank, making total line of credit \$20,000. It was agreed to increase the present line of credit by \$2,500, making the total borrowing power \$12,500.

# St. Columba House, Montreal

It was reported that the staff of St. Columba House had resigned. It was decided that if the resignations were not withdrawn, the same should take effect at such time as would be mutually agreed upon, and the Secretaries were given authority, in consultation with the Presbytery of Montreal, to appoint their successors.

# Re Winter Supply by Students

The Home Mission Committee of the Montreal Presbytery recommended reconsideration of the action taken by the Executive in reducing the grants to students for winter supply. No action.

# Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

All People's Mission, Welland-

At the request of Rev. H. G. Forster, Superintendent of All People's Mission, Welland, it was agreed to transfer Mr. A. Babiuk from Brandon, Man., to Welland as Ukrainian worker, the understanding being that his salary would be taken care of without an additional grant, and that no objection would be raised to a decrease in grant to All People's for 1931, to be shared pro rata with other like institutions, if found necessary.

It was also agreed to pay Mr. Babiuk's moving expenses.

## Indian Work

Re Oka Indians-

The Executive of the Montreal Presbytery forwarded to the Executive of the General Council a letter from Mr. W. D. Lighthall of Montreal, setting forth certain wrongs which the Indians at Oka allege they are suffering at the hands of the Seminary of St. Sulpice.

It was decided to request Rev. A. Barner and Dr. Leslie Pidgeon to investigate this matter and report.

#### Oriental Work

Chinese Mission, Hamilton-

It was agreed that the Chinese Mission in Hamilton should be closed from December 31st, 1930.

Stationing of Chinese Missionaries-

Montreal Presbytery recommended that Rev. C. C. Shiu, who had been serving the Chinese Mission in Hamilton, should be stationed in Montreal as from January 1st, and that Rev. K. Y. Tang should be released during the rest of the period of his residence in Canada for service elsewhere. Referred to the Secretaries, in consultation with Dr. Noyes.

Old Perlican—Superintendent suggested that payment of interest and principal be deferred for two years. Agreed to defer for one year.

Timmins—Grant of \$2,000 was asked for non-Anglo-Saxon building and referred to Sub-Executive. Agreed to vote this grant.

Massey congregation requested that Board cancel \$191.43 of their loan and they will send \$200 by December 1st and pay balance in 1931. Agreed to cancel \$91.43.

Agreed to transfer property described as lot 36 on West side of Oakwood Ave. according to Plan No. 1487 to Trustees of Oakwood Presbyterian congregation, provided that John Wanless, the younger, releases The United Church of Canada from the trusts therein imposed and that the consent of the Oakwood congregation, including the Unionist minority be obtained.

#### WINNIPEG-

Dominion City asked that interest for 1930 be cancelled. Agreed subject to approval of Presbytery.

#### ASSINIBOIA-

Meyronne—Superintendent reported this field in the dried-out area and asked that payment of interest be deferred for one year. Agreed.

Woodrow—Superintendent asked that interest on the loan be deferred for one year. Agreed.

McCord asked an additional loan of \$3,500 on church. Action deferred.

# SASKATOON-

Viscount asked for an additional loan of \$1,700 or at least \$1,000. No action.

# YORKTON-

Calder asked that \$90 be allowed from the money received from the sale of the McNutt manse, to purchase lots for the church. Agreed.

# MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE SUB-EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS, FEBRUARY 12th, 1931.

The Sub-Executive Committee of the Board of Home Missions met in the Committee Room of the Home Mission Offices at 2.00 p.m., on Thursday, February 12th, 1931, Rev. Dr. Sedgewick presiding. The meeting was constituted with prayer by Rev. T. P. Perry.

Those present—Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., Rev. R. B. Cochrane, D.D., Rev. Colin Young, D.D., Rev. T. P. Perry, Rev. R. Hicks, Mr. Fred. Mann, Mr. W. G. Watson, Mr. J. F. Maine, Rev. A. L. Smith, D.D., Rev. J. J. Coulter. Rev. F. L. Brown, D.D., was also present.

Letters of regret were received from Rev. J. R. Watts, D.D., and Rev. J. L. Alexander.

## Expenditure for 1930

The Secretary reported that, according to a preliminary statement received from the Treasurer, the expenditure of the Home Mission Board for 1930 was \$1,302,663.44 as against \$1,448,978.20 in 1929, a decrease of \$146,314.76. Receipts from other sources for 1930, including Government grants, interest, etc., were estimated at \$180,000, leaving an amount of \$1,122,663.44 required from the M. and M. Fund—or \$17,336.56 less than our revised appropriation. On motion statement was received.

# Situation in Western Canada

The Secretary reported attendance at a Conference in Regina the first week of January, to gather facts about the situation on our fields in the Prairie Provinces. Deficits in salaries of ministers in the three Prairie Conferences in 1930 were estimated at \$52,000, and the additional amount required for 1931, if work is to be undertaken on the same basis as in the past, was set at approximately \$41,000. On motion report was received.

## Gifts for Fields in Southern Saskatchewan

The Secretary reported that extra gifts by individuals and congregations for special fields in Southern Saskatchewan totalled \$7,050.

# Request for Extra Amount in M. and M. Appropriations for 1931

The following resolution was adopted: "That, in view of the situation in Western Canada, especially in the dried-out areas of Southern Saskatchewan, and the large amounts contributed by congregations and individuals in the East at the end of the year to keep open our Churches there, the Sub-Executive request that after the regular appropriations for 1931 are finally fixed, the Finance Committee of the Executive of the General Council be asked to set aside an extra \$60,000 to enable the Board of Home Missions to meet deficits in salaries in the West for 1930 and the special emergency grants required for the first six months of 1931."

# Appointment of Students

It was agreed to appoint not more than 250 students in the regular way, but to approve of the appointment of twenty-five additional, provided that funds for their support were made available through special gifts given for this purpose.

The appointment of the students was left with the Secretaries.

# Statement re Property Fund

The Secretary reported a balance of \$142,571.38 in Property Fund as at February 9th, 1931. Receipts on account of principal and interest on loans amounted in 1930 to \$67,383.64—about \$17,000 less than in 1929.

The following resolution was adopted: "That, in view of the large number of congregations who have asked for the cancellation or deferring of payments on interest and principal during 1930, we express the opinion that no loans and grants should be made out of the Property Fund in 1931, except in cases of extreme urgency, and direct the Secretary to send a copy of this resolution to all our Superintendents."

# Meetings of H. M. Committees of Five Central Conferences

The question of calling the Home Mission Committees of the five Central Conferences to meet in Toronto at the same time in March was considered. It was recommended that, instead of holding a central meeting, the Secretaries should arrange to visit these Conference Home Mission Committees.

#### Estates

# Christena Duncanson Estate-

It was agreed to approve the appointment of Mr. Frank Fingland as administrator of this Estate, the Executor having died.

# J. H. Benn Estate and John Drummond Will-

It was agreed that we should pay our share of the following accounts: Rowell' Reid & Co., \$815.95; Marquis, Pepler & Co., \$958.45.

It was also agreed to authorize the employment of Mr. Rowell to act for us in the appeal.

# Annie Campbell Estate-

The Pine Hill Divinity Hall, administrators of this Estate, being prepared to pay over to the United Church the residue, which was bequeathed to the Home and Foreign Mission schemes of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, in equal shares, requested a guarantee that it will not be held liable should any party or parties subsequently claim that it should not have been paid to the United Church. Our solicitor advised that the United Church should give a Bond of Indemnity to Pine Hill Divinity Hall and that a similar bond should be secured from the Trustees for the non-Concurring Presbyterian Church, to protect the Treasurer as touching their share, before such share is passed over to them. Agreed.

# Re Az Otthon-

It was reported that the appropriation of \$1,700 for publication expenses of this paper in 1930 had been overpaid by \$28, and that there were outstanding bills of \$450.79, payment of which was requested by Dr. Nicol—the amount to be regarded as an advance on the grant for 1931. The bill for January was \$117.69.

It was agreed to pay the January bill amounting to \$117.69 and also \$250 on the bills outstanding, and to notify Dr. Nicol to have publication of the paper suspended until the meeting of the Board.

# Resignation of Miss Lydia Gruchy

On receiving report of the resignation of Miss Lydia Gruchy, worker at Wakaw, Sask., which is now a self-supporting field, it was resolved that the Committee express its regret to Miss Gruchy and assure her that the Board of Home Missions would do its utmost to secure another appointment for her at the expiration of her leave of absence.

# Visit to Canada of Rev. T. Hunter Boyd

A request was received from Rev. T. Hunter Boyd, Immigration Chaplain at Glasgow, that he be allowed to visit Canada this year. The Secretary was requested to write Mr. Boyd, explaining why a visit to Canada was not practicable this year.

## Illness of Mrs. R. H. Goodridge

A communication was received from Dr. H. C. Wrinch regarding the serious illness of Mrs. R. H. Goodridge, wife of our missionary at Kitzegucla, B.C. It was left with the Secretaries to do what they considered best in the way of making it possible for Mrs. Goodridge to secure hospital treatment.

# Re Port Simpson Hospital

Dr. A. L. Smith presented the Report of the Committee appointed by the Sub-Executive to consider future policy re Port Simpson Hospital and the appointment of a successor to Dr. R. G. Large:

Having carefully considered the statement presented by Dr. R. G. Large and the financial reports of the Port Simpson Hospital over a period of years, we recommend:

- (a) That we accept the offer of the Board of Management of the Port Simpson Hospital to turn over the Hospital and Doctor's Residence to the Board of Home Missions of the United Church of Canada as a going concern, entirely free from all encumbrance.
- (b) That the Doctor who is appointed as successor to Dr. R. G. Large be appointed under the same terms as the Hospital has always been carried on, namely, that he be responsible—
  - (1) For the care and upkeep of the plant:
  - (2) For the payment of all current running expenses, and
    - (3) For the purchase of the practice and the boat necessary to carry on the same.

- , (c) That at the ensuing session of the Board of Home Missions Dr. A. E. Perry be appointed our Doctor at Port Simpson, and that we give him a Letter of Credit at the Bank at Prince Rupert, sufficient to enable him to make arrangements with Dr. Large for the taking over of the practice and the boat.
- (d) That the Home Mission Committee of the British Columbia Conference, through its Conference, at the next session, appoint a Board of Management to manage the Port Simpson Hospital in the name of the Board of Home Missions.

It was agreed that the words "and that the appointment of the Board be confirmed by the Home Mission Board" should be added at the end of section (d).

The Report as amended was adopted.

# PROPERTY CLAIMS

# ST. JOHN-

Newtown—Waterford Presbytery recommended a grant of \$800 and a loan of \$1,000 to assist in purchasing a manse. Congregation have decided that they will try to get along with a grant of \$500. Agreed to vote a grant of \$250 and a loan of \$250.

Trinity, East Windsor—A grant of \$839.84 was requested to cover indebtedness on church. Referred to Board.

Brandon—Presbytery has recommended the sale of the former Congregational manse for \$1,500. The Superintendent has written that he has had an offer of \$2,500 since Presbytery met. Agreed to sell the manse, the Secretaries to negotiate the terms.

Andrew—The minister asked permission to take wood free of charge for the use of the church and manse at Andrew, from the land belonging to The United Church of Canada at Pakan nearby. Recommended by the H.M. Convener on the understanding that permission must be renewed another winter. Agreed.

## VANCOUVER-

"William Oliver"—(a) Accounts totalling \$85.55 have been received for repairs to this boat on account of an accident. Agreed to pay \$85.55. (b) New equipment, cost of which amounted to \$142.50, was paid out of maintenance account. Agreed to transfer this to Property account.

Transfer of Oriental properties to the Oriental Missions Society. In this connection statement of legal fees amounting to \$76.65 has been received, of which \$30 has been paid. Agreed to pay \$46.65 from the surplus of maintenance grant to Oriental Missions for 1930.

From the Secretary of the Cochrane Presbytery, also expressing appreciation of Rev. J. C. Cochrane and their confidence in all the leading officials of the Church.

From Miss H. Shipley, Superintendent of Bonnyville Hospital, and Miss Emily L. Latimer, expressing appreciation of the services of Dr. Duclos.

The Secretary read a letter from the Moderator, intimating his willingness to visit Home Mission fields and asking that an itinerary be mapped out for him. The Secretaries were requested to arrange an itinerary for the Moderator.

A petition was received from the people of Canora Ukrainian Mission, asking for the return of their former pastor, Rev. J. Roberts. It was agreed that the petition should be filed and an explanation sent to the petitioners.

Notice was received from the Secretary of the Toronto Conference that Rev. Hiram Hull had been nominated Chairman of the Home Mission Committee of the Conference to succeed Dr. A. Lloyd Smith; also from the Secretary of the Alberta Conference that Rev. G. D. Armstrong, D.D., had been nominated Chairman of the Home Mission Committee of that Conference to succeed Rev. R. McGillivray. It was agreed that Mr. Hull and Dr. Armstrong should be invited to sit as corresponding members.

The Secretary reported receipt of a letter from Rev. Harold H. Gilbart, asking whether his services could be made use of as a travelling Evangelist on weak circuits or in new districts. Referred to the Sub-Executive.

## Confirmation of Minutes

The minutes of meetings of the Executive and Sub-Executive, held since the previous meeting of the Board, were confirmed.

# Expenses of Members

Scale of expenses for members was adopted as follows: Cost of ticket to Toronto and return, sleeper both ways, meals en route, at maximum of \$4.00 per day; hotel expenses in Toronto at maximum of \$4.50 per day; and, where necessary, \$25.00 per Sunday for pulpit supply.

# Treasurer's Statement

The Treasurer reported that for the year ended December 31st, 1930, the Board of Home Missions had expended on the maintenance of its work \$1,303,163.44, being \$145,814.76 less than in the previous year. This amount was met by an appropriation of \$1,112,846.61 from the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, by a grant from the Woman's Missionary Society of \$7,208.33, by Dominion Government grants for Indian Work of \$148,376.38, and by interest on Reserve and Trust Funds and other miscellaneous receipts of \$34,732.12. The amount required from the M. and M. Fund was less by \$27,153.39 than the amount allocated by the Finance Committee to this Board.

Contributions to the Missionary and Maintenance Fund for 1930, including the Self-Denial Offering, were \$2,721,269.87, or \$24,559 more than in 1929. Special gifts for the reduction of the accumulated deficit totalled \$24,626.65.

The Home Mission Reserve, consisting of bequests and other amounts donated for the purposes of the Board, showed a credit balance as at December 31st, 1930, of \$120,311.40. During the year \$15,556.41 was received from bequests.

The Home Mission Annuity and Trust Fund had at December 31st, 1930, a credit balance of \$845,836.33. This Fund consists partly of be-

quests on which life annuities are payable and partly of trusts which are at the disposal of the Board as to interest only. Legacies received in 1930 amounted to \$441.956.21.

During the year 1930, loans totalling \$35,980 and grants amounting to \$84,118, were given from Property Fund. This assistance enabled the communities concerned to build 23 churches, 24 manses, a hospital, and a new boat for our Marine Mission.

## Transfer From Reserve Fund

On motion the following resolution was adopted: That the Board of Home Missions agree to transfer from the Reserve Fund to Maintenance account the sum of \$30,000 to help meet the deficit on the 1930 Budget, this transfer to be made on two conditions, namely: (1) That this amount be refunded to the Home Mission Reserve as soon as possible out of the income from the Legacies of our Home Mission Annuity and Trust Fund; and (2) that this proposed transfer be made only if the Executive of the General Council adopt the recommendation of its Finance Committee in regard to the matter.

# Appropriation From M. and M. Fund For 1931

On motion it was agreed to accept the appropriation of \$1,060,000 from the M. and M. Fund for 1931, plus a special amount of \$40,000 for the dried-out areas.

# Method of Itemizing Expenditures

- . (a) Should the salary and expenses of Superintendents be included in the total grants to the Conferences in which they serve, or should the present method be continued? It was decided to make no change.
- (b) Should the travelling expenses of students and missionaries be included in the total for the Conferences where they serve? or should they be entered separately as at present? It was agreed that the travelling expenses of students and missionaries should be charged as an item of expenditure in connection with the fields served.

## Bequests

Estate of Margaret Ann Farley- .

The Executors requested the consent of the residuary legatee, The United Church of Canada, to their handing over to Miss Martha Hamilton, a friend of the late Mrs. Farley, a few small articles of a personal nature and of comparatively little value. Agreed.

# Date of Board Meeting

On motion it was agreed that the next meeting of the Board should be held on April 6th, 1932.

# Meeting of Executive in the Fall

The Manitoba Conference Home Mission Committee recommended that, in view of the financial situation confronting the Church, the Executive of the Board of Home Missions should not meet this fall. Similar resolutions were received from the Saskatchewan and Alberta Conference Committees, with the additional recommendation that, should any matter of great importance arise in regard to any of the conferences, the Superintendent of Missions, or such other persons as might be deemed necessary, should be called to attend the Sub-Executive in Toronto.

After full discussion, it was decided to hold a meeting of the Executive in the fall as usual, the Sub-Executive being given power to fix a date in October.

# Home Missions Council

Request for Grant-

It was agreed to make a grant of \$200.00 for 1931.

Meeting of Council in 1932-

It was agreed that the Sub-Executive should be responsible for making arrangements for the meeting of the Council in Toronto in January, 1932.

# Co-Operative Plan For Sunday School Extension

The Secretary reported that a plan was being worked out whereby the Board of Home Missions and the Board of Religious Education might co-operate in a plan for extension of Sunday School work by helping to organize new Sunday Schools, promoting Home Department of Sunday School, utilizing surplus Sunday School supplies, etc. Reported for information.

# Radio Broadcasting in Western Canada

It was agreed to approve expenditure up to \$500.00 for broadcasting in the Western Provinces during the season 1931-32.

On the recommendation of Calgary Presbytery, it was agreed that \$200.00 of this amount should be allowed for broadcasting in Calgary.

# Appointment of Students

Report of Committee on Appointment of Students-

The Secretary presented the Report of this Committee, which on motion was adopted:—

- 1. 387 men applied for fields for the summer, but only 249 were appointed, as that was the total number of fields available.
- 2. Following the direction of the Sub-Executive, the Committee adhered to the rule that appointments should be made in order of academic seniority. This means that a number of second year Arts men did not receive appointments and that with three exceptions, no men with first year or matriculation standing were given fields.
- 3. The Committee recommends that the Board of Home Missions inform the Executive of the General Council that because of prevailing economic conditions and consequently lessened revenue, the Board has not been able to find appointments for over one hundred of the students in our Colleges who applied this year, and also that a considerable proportion of the men graduating from our Theological Colleges are not able to find fields or charges, either East or West.
- 4. The Committee suggests that the Board urge the Executive of the General Council to canvass this situation carefully and take any steps that are possible to retain for the work of the Church in the future these undergraduates and graduates who are in perplexity now because of the situation in which they find themselves.

Appointments for Non-Anglo-Saxon Students-

The matter of finding appointments for non-Anglo-Saxon students who are preparing for the ministry of the United Church of Canada was left to a committee, consisting of the Secretaries and the Western Superintendents.

# Report of the Commission on Rural Work

The Report of the Commission on Rural Work was presented by the Chairman, Rev. J. R. Watts, D.D. It contained the following recommendations which were considered seriatim and adopted:—

- 1. That the Commission be continued to complete the work committed to it.
- 2. That the Board confirm the action of its Executive in authorizing the survey of another type of community in Ontario when it considers it necessary.
- 3. That the Board confirm the action of its Executive in approving in principle of the experiment of a Community Rural Church equipped and manned by the Board.
- 4. That one or two of the Robertson Memorial Essays of this year on the subject of the Rural Church be published, and that the Executive of the Commission be instructed to make the selection.
- 5. That one thousand copies of Dr. Cormie's articles originally published in "Social Welfare," and now out of print, be republished as soon as possible.
- 6. That the Executive of the Commission arrange a series of articles in "The New Outlook," to be written by Rural Ministers on experiences in rural charges.
- 7. That the Board approve of a "Rural Life Sunday", and that the Executive be instructed to confer with the Board of Religious Education regarding a date for such Sunday to be set by the Executive of the General Council, and make any necessary arrangements for its observance.
- 8. That, if wound feasible after consultation with Dr. Solandt, a few libraries of approved books on the rural question be provided, for circulation in selected rural Presbyteries.
- 9. That, whereas proper reading habits in the home are of the greatest importance; and whereas under modern conditions it is becoming increasingly difficult to develop such habits; and whereas an adequate supply of suitable books is very frequently not available, and this is especially true in rural homes; therefore be it resolved:—That each Presbytery be asked to promote arrangements whereby adequate book service may be made available to all, these arrangements being such as: the introduction of a county or regional library system, whereby from one central library fresh books may be sent out at regular intervals to suitable distributing points, such as schools, shops, municipal offices, etc., or by distributing books directly from book wagons, or any other plan that may be found suitable.

On motion the Report as a whole was adopted.

Rev. George Dorey gave a brief report of a rural survey which was being undertaken in Saskatchewan.

It was agreed that the Rural Commission should be authorized to prepare a pamphlet to aid such Presbyteries as might desire to make a rural survey.

# Report of the Non-Anglo-Saxon Commission

The Report of the Commission on Non-Anglo-Saxon Work was presented by Rev. George Dorey, and, after amendment, the following recommendations were adopted:—

#### Literature—

- That the Home Mission Board should in the meantime issue some kind of literature regularly in Ukrainian, Finnish, Hungarian and French.
- 2. That, as in the opinion of the Commission the publications for Non-Anglo-Saxon people have not adequately met the need, and the whole policy should be reconsidered, the Commission be continued, and be instructed to canvass the whole situation and report to the Sub-Executive at the earliest possible date, with a view to having a more satisfactory policy put in operation by the beginning of 1932.
- 3. That a Committee be appointed by the Board to carry out the foregoing resolution, and that it be composed of the following members:—Eastern Section: The Secretaries, Rev. J. I. MacKay, Dr. J. U. Tanner and Rev. J. C. Cochrane. Western Section: Dr. J. A. Cormie, Dr. J. L. Nicol, Rev. Geo. Dorey, Dr. M. H. Wilson, Rev. J. M. Shaver and Rev. J. R. Mutchmor.
- 4. (a) "Canadian-Ranok".—That a grant of \$6,500.00 be made for a bi-monthly paper.
  - (b) "Az Otthon".—That a grant of \$1,000 be made—this amount to include \$350.00 now owing to publishers.
  - (c) "The Herald"—Hungarian newspaper.—That a sum of \$200.00 be voted to Mr. Feher, in consideration of his having published the "Reformed Herald" in 1930, it being distinctly understood that it is without admitting any liability or any future responsibilty.
  - (d) "L'Aurore".-That we make a grant of \$1,000.00.
  - (e) Finnish Literature.—That \$200.00 be set aside for this purpose.

## Holidays for Workers-

That all Non-Anglo-Saxon Workers should have an annual holiday.

# Aim of our Work-

The aim of the United Church is to create a distinctively Christian community. While there are various ways in which Christian character and citizenship may be developed, experience shows that the most fruitful means is the public services of worship provided by the Church. The people, therefore, should be encouraged to cultivate the habit of worship and to make profession of faith in Christ by becoming members of His Church.

On motion the Report as a whole was adopted.

#### Literature

Secretaries' Recommendations re Promotion Literature-

The following recommendations were adopted:-- `

- That the Report as now tabled, after editing, be published in the Year Book as the Annual Report of the Board of Home Missions for 1930.
- 2. That, inasmuch as 1931 marks the Fiftieth Anniversary of the beginning of Dr. James Robertson's Superintendency in Western Canada, and the Forty-fourth Anniversary of that of Rev. James Woodsworth, an illustrated booklet of, say, 64 pages, under the caption of "Half a Century" be published, dealing in a racy and informative way with the historial development and present prospects and problems of Home Missions.
- That the number of Pamphlets to be published in 1931 be retricted to four, the suggestion being that they deal with the following topics:—
  - (a) A revised edition of the material included in the one of a year ago "A New Church at the Old Task."
  - (b) "The Non-Anglo-Saxon."
  - (c) "The Student Missionary."
  - (d) "The Rural Problem."

That the course followed last year be adopted, namely, the sending out of samples to the ministers, and the providing only of those that are asked for.

Literature for Orientals—

It was agreed to make a grant of \$100.00.

Literature for Non-Anglo-Saxons—

(See Report of Non-Anglo-Saxon Commission.)

# Report of the Committee on City Mission Work

This Committee reported through its Chairman, Rev. J. Geo. Miller. D.D. The items were considered seriatim and adopted as follows:—

- That the Board once again records its judgment that among the frontiers which face us to-day, none is greater than the large centres of population East and West, and would suggest that the Secretaries should continue to focus the attention of the Church upon the many moral, social and religious problems which face us in the midst of our great cities.
- 2. That, in the deteriorating areas in the larger cities, the Board of Home Missions may assist self-sustaining charges by contributing a worker, where, in the judgment of Presbytery, such assistance should be given.
- That the Board approve the constitution, now submitted, for the formation of City Mission Boards, and that it be referred to the Sub-Executive for any further revision which they may consider advisable.

On motion the Report as a whole was adopted.

# Question of Including Our Institutional Work in the Federated Charities' Budget of the Various Cities

A communication from Dr. G. A. Wilson reported that a special committee appointed in Vancouver to consider this matter recommended that application be made to have part of our institutional and marine work included in the Community Chest of that city, as similar work carried on by other churches was included in that fund.

The Manitoba Conference Home Mission Committee recommended that all our work in city institutions should remain under the direct control of the Board.

The following resolution was adopted:—That the Board is of the opinion that as a general policy the Social Service Departments of the City Institutions under the direction of the Board of Home Missions should continue to be financed entirely by the Church.

# Formation of Goodwill Industries in Canada

A suggestion was received from Rev. J. R. Craig that the establishment of stores for the sale of reconditioned clothing, furniture, etc., become part of the downtown programme of the United Church in connection with our City Mission Work. Referred to the Committee on City Mission Work.

# Holidays For Home Mission Workers

The recommendations of the Secretaries were received, and after amendment adopted as follows:—

- That every worker connected with the institutions under the Board
  of Home Missions should have an annual holiday after one year
  of service. Agreed, with the addition of the following clause:

  And that such holiday shall be not less than two weeks and not
  more than one month.
- 2. That each Superintendent be instructed to so arrange the work of the institution as to make this holiday possible. Agreed.
- 3. That the Official Board of charges receiving aid from the Board of Home Missions be urged to make provision for an adequate holiday each year for their minister. Agreed.
- 4. That in accord with the views expressed by the Moderator, we approve the principle of a six months' furlough for Home Missionaries engaged in special work, or on isolated or arduous fields, after seven years of continuous service. Agreed.
- 5. That, inasmuch as it is impossible to begin such a movement without further detailed study of all that is involved, the question be referred to a Committee to report at the next meeting of the Board. Agreed.

# Re Uniform Salary Scale For Workers in Institutions and Qualifications Required

The recommendations of the Secretaries were considered and, after amendment, were adopted as follows:—

- 1. That the qualifications of Superintendents should be:
  - (a) Ordained man, graduate in Arts and Theology;

- (b) Some experience in pastoral work;
- (c) Special training in the application of the principles of Christianity to social and moral problems;
- (d) Evangelistic fervour;
- (e) Qualities of leadership.
- 2. That the qualifications of Boys' Workers should be:
  - (a) Ordained man, recent graduate in Arts and Theology;
    - (b) Knowledge of boys and success in handling them;
    - (c) Looking forward to institutional work as life work.
- 3. That the qualifications of Head Women Workers should be:
  - (a) Preferably University graduate;
  - (b) Specialized training in Social Service and English Bible;
  - (c) Experience in administration;
  - (d) Qualities of leadership;
  - (e) Some platform gifts.
- 4. That the qualifications of Women Assistants should be:
  - (a) Good preliminary education and training;
  - (b) Specially interested in girls and children's work;
  - (c) Some musical ability;
  - (d) Adaptability and capacity for development.
- 5. That the salaries of Superintendents should be:
  - (a) Minimum—\$2,000 and a house;
  - (b) Maximum—\$2,500 and a house, except under very exceptional circumstances.
- 6. That the salaries of Boys' Workers should be:
  - (a) Minimum—\$1,600;
  - (b) Maximum-\$2,000 and a house.
- 7. That the salaries of Head Women Workers should be:
  - (a) Minimum-\$1,200 and a room:
  - (b) Maximum, \$1,500 and a room.
- 8. That the salaries of Women Assistants should be:
  - (a) Minimum—\$900 and a room;
  - (b) Maximum—\$1,100 and a room.
- 9. Re Scholarships—That a maximum of \$900.00 be provided annually to assist experienced workers in taking post-graduate studies; or to help graduates, who have chosen special Home Mission tasks as a life work, to get the necessary training.
- 10. That all APPLICATIONS for positions in our institutions be on file in the Home Mission Office at Toronto, and that all APPOINTMENTS should be made by the Board or its Executive, after nomination by 'the local Board and Presbytery.

It was agreed that Items 1 to 9 should become effective at the discretion of the Board; Item 10 to become effective at once.

On motion the Report as amended was adopted.

# Resolutions Referred to the Board by the General Council Re M. and M. Allocation to Aid-receiving Fields—

The Board at its previous meeting remitted to the General Council a recommendation that the Missionary and Maintenance Department should avoid allocating to aid-receiving fields amounts that militate against the said fields reaching as large a measure of self-support as possible. (See Digest, March 1930, Page 83.) The Council referred this resolution to the Board of Home Missions for consultation with the Committee of Direction of the M. and M. Fund.

The Chairman, Rev. J. J. Coulter, and the Secretaries were appointed a Committee to consult with the M. and M. Committee.

# Re Salaries of Ministers occupying Furnished Manses-

A resolution requesting reconsideration of the deduction of \$75.00 from the grant to a minister reported as living in a furnished manse or parsonage was remitted by the General Council to the Board of Home Missions. (See Minutes Executive, October, 1930.)

On motion it was agreed that the difference in salary because of a minister occupying a furnished manse or parsonage be only \$50.00 instead of \$75.00 as heretofore.

## Allowance to Widows of Missionaries

The Executive recommended that the regulation of the Board re allowance to widow of missionaries (See March, 1930, Digest, Page 73) should be amended to read: That the widows of missionaries employed by this Board at the time of death should receive an amount equal to the grant for six months from the date of the death of the husband. Agreed.

## Insurance of Workers

# Insurance of Students-

The Secretary reported that, at the direction of the Executive, he had made enquiry of various Insurance Companies and found it was not possible to insure our students against accident or sickness.

# Insurance of Hospitals against Liability—

At the direction of the Board, figures were secured by the office to show approximate cost of insuring our doctors and hospitals against actions for damages. On account of the high cost of such insurance it was 'decided to take no action.

# Report of Inter-Board Committee on Women Workers

A statement by Miss Thomas regarding the work of this Committee was received with interest, and the thanks of the Board were extended to her.

## Resignation of Rev. Mark Fenwick, D.D.

The resignation of Rev. Mark Fenwick, D.D., Superintendent of Missions for Newfoundland, was received with sincere regret. A Committee appointed by the Chair to consider the matter presented a resolution, which was unanimously adopted, placing on record the Board's high appreciation of Dr. Fenwick's services to the Church in general, and to this Board in particular.

It was agreed that Dr. Fenwick's resignation should become effective on October 30th, 1931, and that his salary should be continued to December 31st, 1931.

The Secretary was requested to consult with the Home Mission Committee of Newfoundland Conference re the matter of the vacancy to be created by the resignation of Dr. Fenwick and report to the Sub-Executive.

# Immigration

Report of the Immigration Committee-

The Report of the Immigration Committee was presented by Mr. A. Maclaren. In 1930, owing to the falling off in demand caused by the financial depression, the Committee placed only 329 boys, 137 single men and 5 families. Their programme for 1931-32 confined itself entirely to the placement of boys, their quota having been set at 200, in conference with the Department of Immigration. No single men or families would be brought to Canada this year. Of the total number of 977 boys placed since the inauguration of the scheme, 718 or 86.4% of the 831 still in Canada were on farms.

On motion the Report was adopted, the thanks of the Board were extended to the Immigration Committee, and growing appreciation of Mr. Maclaren's services was recorded.

# Report of the Department of the Stranger—

The Report of the Department of the Stranger was presented by Rev. K. J. Beaton. The total number of immigrants from the British Isles welcomed by our Chaplains in 1930 was 11,908, and from other European countries, 18,613.

On motion the Report was adopted.

## Immigration Chaplaincies—

The following recommendations were adopted:-

That Rev. T. Hunter Boyd, our Chaplain Overseas, go on half salary as from July 1st.

That Rev. S. S. Thompson, Chaplain at Halifax, continue as at present, giving half time to hospital visitation.

That Rev. W. H. Stevens, Chaplain at Saint John and Quebec, superannuate and continue as Chaplain.

That Rev. D. L. Gordon, Chaplain at Montreal, combine the duties of Immigration Chaplain and Hospital Visitor for this year.

That Rev. G. F. McCullagh, Chaplain at Winnipeg, superannuate and continue as Immigration Chaplain, with the added responsibility of supplying the Harrow United Church.

# Hospital Visitor, Montreal

The Executive of the Monreal Presbytery recommended that Rev. J. C. MacLeod, then minister of Trinity Church, should be appointed City Chaplain as successor to the late Rev. J. B. MacLeod, his term of office to begin July 1st, 1931.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:-

That we reply to the request of the Montreal Presbytery for the appointment of a successor to Rev. J. B. MacLeod as Hospital Chaplain from July 1st, 1931, that we are unable for this year to comply with the request for the following reasons:—

- Our allocation from the Finance Committee of the General Council makes drastic retrenchment in our expenditures imperative.
- 2. The whole policy of the Board of Home Missions in regard to providing Chaplains for hospitals and sanitaria has been committed to a special committee for investigation and report.
- Immigration is at a low ebb and we have an Immigration Chaplain in Montreal who has been combining these duties with his own during recent months.

And that, in view of these facts, we adopt the following resolution:— That for the Conference year beginning July 1st, 1931, Rev. D. L. Gordon continue to act as Hospital Visitor and Immigration Chaplain in the City of Montreal.

## Recommendations From Conference Home Mission Committees

Re Relations of Board of Home Missions and Toronto Church Extension and Mission Union—

The H.M. Committee of Toronto Conference recommended "that the relations of the Board of Home Missions and the Toronto Church Extension and Mission Union should be surveyed by the Executive of the General Council, with a view to delimiting the respective spheres of work; and, further that the Executive of the General Council be requested to consider the possibility of restoring to the Toronto Church Extension and Mission Union the right of appeal to the Congregations in Toronto for the support of its work." Adopted.

Re Equalizing of Reductions in Various Departments of Work-

The H.M. Committee of Manitoba Conference passed a resolution urging the Board of Home Missions to see that the reductions, growing out of adverse financial conditions, should "be made equitable over the different departments of Home Mission Work, viz., Domestic Missions, New Canadian Work, Indian Missions, Work among the Orientals, and Medical and Educational Work". The Secretaries were instructed to point out that the Board is trying to carry out this principle to the best of its ability.

Re Equalization of Grants to the Various Boards of the Church-

The H.M. Committee of Manitoba Conference recommended that the Board "approach the Executive of the General Council with a view to arriving at a reduction in grants which will fall equally upon each and all of the spending Boards of the Church". No action.

Re Placing of Ordinands on Mission Fields in the West-

A resolution passed by the H.M. Committee of Alberta Conference called attention to the "steady drift towards irreligion manifest in the rural areas of our Province," and deprecated "the withdrawal of our church work from many frontier appointments". It was recommended

that a "more aggressive policy be adopted by the Home Mission Board," and that the Board communicate with the many young men being ordained this year without prospective appointments, calling their attention to "the opportunity for real Christian service for a definite period of from one to three years, and guaranteeing them \$600.00 per year over and above what they raise for salary on the field". It was agreed that this resolution should be forwarded to the Executive of the General Council, with the request that they provide the money which will make it possible to place ordinands as suggested in this resolution.

Re Application of Special Fund raised to meet Emergent Needs in the West—

A resolution from the H.M. Committee of the Alberta Conference expressed "disappointment that the monies raised in support of the special Fund of One Hundred Thousand Dollars, which was particularly specified as being for the payment of deficits of salaries in the West, have not been applied specifically to that object," and it was suggested that "the National Committee of the M. and M. be asked to make a clear and full statement in regard to the payments made out of this Fund at the earliest possible moment".

It was decided that Dr. Powell should be added to the Committee already appointed by the M. and M. Fund Committee, in order to assist in preparing a reply to this resolution.

Re Problem of Providing for Surplus Men-

A resolution forwarded by the B.C. Conference Committee called attention to the fact that the United Church is likely to have for a number of years a surplus of men over charges, and that the burden of providing for these men falls for the most part on the Home Mission Board, whereas it should be a problem for the whole church. The Committee recommended "that all such cases should be reported to the Executive of the General Council, and that this body should concern itself with the better distribution of men so as to avoid undue congestion in any one conference. Also that where money is required in the way of extra grants to care for these men, the problem of securing such moneys should be the problem of the Executive of the General Council, representing all Departments of the Church". It was also recommended that this resolution be forwarded by the Board to the Executive of General Council.

Recommendation adopted.

# Resolutions From Presbyteries

Re Provision of Minimum Salary for Missionaries-

Resolution of Weyburn Presbytery requested "the Board of Home Missions to, as speedily as conditions permit, bring into effect the policy of The United Church to supply a furnished manse and a minimum salary of \$1,800.00 to all mission fields supplied by married ordained ministers".

It was agreed that the Weyburn Presbytery should be informed that this policy is being carried out as rapidly as possible.

Re Salary Status of Missionaries-

The Victoria Presbytery recommended "that the Home Mission Board be asked to review the salary status of our missionaries, with a view to a more favourable adjustment to those whose work demands the use of a car". Referred to Sub-Executive.

Re Monthly Payment of Grants-

Victoria Presbytery also requested that the Board pay monthly all grants of \$500.00 or more. No action.

## Re Ineffective Ministers

A Special Committee appointed by the Saskatchewan Conference to consider the problem of ineffective ministers requested "the President as a member of the Home Mission Board to explore with that Board the possibility of making some temporary financial provision for men whom it is expedient not to appoint to a charge on the ground of ministerial ineffeciency".

It was agreed that this is the responsibility of the whole Church, and that the matter should be referred to the Executive of the General Council, requesting that the possibility of such temporary financial provision for men deemed inefficient be explored.

# Re Unemployment Situation

Rev. T. P. Perry introduced a resolution recording the Board's deep sense of the gravity of unemployment as it affects thousands of our people and their pastors.

A Committee appointed by the Chair to consider this resolution recommended that the Board express its thanks to Mr. Perry for bringing this matter to its attention, and further recommended that the resolution be forwarded to the Executive of the General Council, with the request that they frame a suitable resolution on the subject if they consider the time opportune. Report of Committee adopted.

# Approval of Appointment of W.M.S. Workers

Approval was given to the appointment of the following workers under the Board of the Woman's Missionary Society:—

Miss Elsie Perry, R.N., who has been accepted as a candidate for medical work in Canada.

Miss Hannah Nicholson, appointed to St. Luke's-Harwood Mission, Toronto.

Miss Mae Forrest, who will be appointed to Home Mission work.

## Re Parsonage For Nanaimo Suburban Charge

The Victoria Presbytery recommended that the minister of the newly amalgamated charge to be known as Nanaimo Suburban be allowed the use of the former Indian Mission Parsonage at Nanaimo. Agreed.

# Supplies For Vacant Fields in Newfoundland

The Home Mission Committee of Newfoundland Conference requested instruction as to securing the required number of supplies for vacancies, estimated at twenty-two, for which only four local candidate were recommended. It was agreed to leave this matter with Dr. Cochrane, Dr. Fenwick, and the representatives of Newfoundland Conference on the Board.

# Hospital Work

Resolution of H.M. Committee of Saskatchewan Conference-

This Committee recommended that the Hospital Work of the Church be brought in line with all other missionary work by having grants passed by the Presbyteries in the regular way. Agreed.

# Lamont Hospital-

The Conference Hospital Board recommended that authority be given for an extended line of credit with the Bank up to \$20,000.00. No action.

Bonnyville and Cold Lake Hospitals-

The W.M.S. requested that we pay half the travelling expenses of Dr. Arkinstall, who is under appointment to serve these hospitals, and for one-half of whose salary the Board is responsible, also that we give a grant of \$100.00 toward equipment for the doctor.

The Board approved the appointment of Dr. Arkinstall and agreed to make a grant of \$100.00 for travelling expenses and \$100.00 for equipment.

# Port Simpson Hospital-

The recommendations of the Sub-Executive (see Minutes of Meeting, February 12th, page 70) re the taking over of Port Simpson Hospital by the Board, and the appointment of a new Doctor were adopted, with the following amendments:—That in section (c) the words "of \$2,500" be substituted for the "sufficient"; and that to section (d) the following be added:—"It is understood that this is without prejudice to any policy decided upon by this Board in the future."

The B.C. Conference Committee recommended that the Conference appoint a Board of Management to manage the Hospital in the name of the Board, to consist of the following:—Mr. Boyd Young, Dr. W. T. Kergin, Dr. R. G. Large, Dr. G. A. Wilson, United Church ministers at Port Simpson and Prince Rupert, Indian Agent at Port Simpson, Conference Convener of Home Missions, Medical Superintendent of Hospital Superintendent of Provincial Hospitals. Approved.

# Plan for Centralizing the Purchasing of Hospital Supplies-

At the last meeting of the Board, Dr. Archer was asked to investigate the possibilty of forming a plan for centralizing the purchasing of hospital supplies. He reported that a saving could probably be effected in the purchase of many standard articles, and suggested that Rev. C. W. W. Ross be asked to take a month or six weeks to make investigations, and that he be allowed something for travelling expenses. Referred to Sub-Executive.

# Executive of the Hospital Committee-

It was agreed that the Executive of the Hospital Committee should consist of Rev. J. J. Coulter, Rev. C. G. Young, D.D., Rev. R. B. Cochrane, D.D., Rev. Kenneth Beaton, Rev. Arthur Barner and Mr. W. G. Watson.

It was also agreed that Rev. J. J. Coulter should be Chairman of the Hospital Committee.

# Report Re Hospital and Sanitarium Visitation

The Secretary presented a Report showing cities in Canada where the United Church has visitors for the Hospitals and Sanitaria, and the amount expended; also what is being done by other organizations in this connection. On motion the Report was adopted and the Hospital Committee was requested to go into the question fully, and report to the Board or one of its Committees.

# Summer Session in Theology

The Secretary, who had been directed by the Sub-Executive to gather information regarding the advantage or otherwise of holding a Summer Session in Theology in one of our Collèges, presented a summary of réplies to a Questionnaire sent to the Superintendents.

This whole question, together with the matter of a year's probation on a field, was referred to a Committee, consisting of the following who were named by the Chair:—Dr. G. A. Wilson, Dr. J. W. McConnell, Dr. J. R. Watts, Rev. Hiram Hull, Dr. R. J. McDonald, Mr. T. P. Maxwell, the Chairman and the Secretaries.

# Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Montreal, Syrian Worker-

Montreal Presbytery recommended the appointment of Miss Julia Saigh for one year to undertake work among the Syrians of Montreal, on condition that half her salary be paid by the W.M.S. and the other half by the local Syrians interested. Referred to Sub-Executive for conference with the W.M.S.

# Oshawa, All People's Mission-

A recommendation was received from the Bay of Quinte Conference Committee, endorsed by the Oshawa City Mission Board, that the Board of Home Missions request the W.M.S. to give a grant equivalent to that now given for a deaconees in the Ukrainian Mission, Oshawa, toward the support of an ordained minister for an All People's Mission in that city. Referred to the Sub-Executive for conference with the W.M.S.

## Ukrainian Work, Sudbury district—

It was reported that Rev. J. F. A. Bewell had written regarding the desire of the Ukrainians in the Sudbury area for the appointment of a minister. He enquired whether it would be possible to appoint a student for the summer. Referred to Sub-Executive.

# Regina, Settlement House-

The Conference H.M. Committee endorsed the recommendation of the Presbytery that an ordained, married minister should be appointed to Settlement House, and that a grant of \$1,600.00 be made for salary. The appointment of an ordained minister was agreed to, arrangements to be worked out by the Sub-Executive in consultation with the W.M.S.

# Vancouver, First Church, Girls' Worker-

The Conference Committee recommended that the W.M.S. be asked to 'make provision for a Girls' Worker at First Church. Referred to Sub-Executive for consultation with the W.M.S.

Scandinavian Work in Canada-

A Committee, appointed by the Norwegian Danish Conference in the U.S. to consider the question of taking up missionary work among Scandinavians in Canada, made the following recommendations:—(1) That this Board be asked to extend its work among the Scandinavian people in Canada as soon as its financial resources permit; and (2) that in case this Board should not be able to support a worker among the Scandinavians this year, their Conference should try to raise the money necessary to pay the salary of a worker for the summer months at least. Rev. Gustav Kvisgaard offered-his services, and was recommended by his Conference; the question of the locality to be served to be left with this Board. It was agreed to accept this offer.

## Conference on Jewish Work

It was reported that a Conference on Jewish Work would be held in Atlantic City on May 12th to 14th. Dr. Young was appointed the delegate of the Board, it being understood that he would be responsible for his own expenses.

## Indian Work

Establishment of a Day School on the Piapot Reserve-

The Saskatchewan Conference H.M. Committee recommended that the Home Mission Board request the Department of Indian Affairs to establish a Day School on the Piapot Reserve, and that the W.M.S. be asked to take over the work. No action.

New Church for Round Lake Indian Mission-

The Qu'Appelle Presbytery recommended that the Department of Indian Affairs be requested for a grant of land near the School upon which to build a new church, it being understood that the Indians are willing to bear the cost of the building. Agreed.

Plans for Conferences of Indian Leaders in Northern Manitoba, and Training School for New Missionaries—

Mr. Beaton outlined a plan to hold Conferences or Summer Schools of three or four days,' duration at Norway House and Berens River this summer, which would be attended by the leaders among our Indian people, it being the intention that these would take the place of the annual visit of the Superintendent of Indian Missions to the more isolated fields, the cost to be defrayed out of the amount that would ordinarily be expended by him in travelling expenses.

It was also suggested that the new missionaries to be stationed on Indian Missions in the far North should remain at Norway House for about three weeks' instruction in the Cree Language, and for some instruction in First Aid and the use of simple medicines by the local doctor.

Approval was given, the Sub-Executive to arrange the details.

## Oriental Work

Visit of Dr. Noyes to Cuba-

The Board of National Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. requested that Dr. Noyes might be loaned to them for six weeks in order to make a survey of their Chinese Work in Havana, Cuba. Agreed.

Chinese Work in Newfoundland-

A communication from Rev. Chas. H. Johnson, of St. John's, suggested that the time was ripe for the annual visit of a Chinese-speaking missionary to Newfoundland, who would organize the work already being done amongst the Chinese by the Sunday Schools.

The matter was referred to Presbytery for its recommendation.

Participation of Oriental Missionaries in the Pension Fund-

It was agreed to refer this matter to the Sub-Executive for conference with the Secretary of the Pension Fund.

Furloughs for Oriental Missionaries-

The recommendation of the Oriental Committee of British Columbia regarding this matter was considered at the previous meeting of the Board, but was referred back to the Committee for report to the next meeting of the Board. Referred to Executive.

Chinese Work in Hamilton-

It was resolved that the Board should express to the pastor and officials of Wesley United Church, Hamilton, its sincere appreciation of the generosity displayed by them in housing the work among Chinese in that city.

# Pension Fund Assessment For Dr. Paul Villard

It was reported that the Board of Home Missions last year paid \$25.00 as its share of the Pension Fund assessment of Dr. Villard, who is employed for part-time work at the Pointe aux Trembles School, and it was asked whether we would be responsible for a similar amount this year. It was agreed to pay a similar amount this year.

## Reception For Missionaries

A reception was held for the introduction of new missionaries under appointment by the Home Mission Board and the Board of the Woman's Missionary Society. Several W.M.S. Workers returning to their fields after furlough were also introduced to the Board by Mrs. Rutherford, President of the W.M.S., and a cordial welcome was given to all these missionaries.

# Statement For the Church

It was decided that a full and frank statement should be given to the Church, explaining how the Board planned to meet the perplexing and difficult financial situation with which it is faced at the present time, and that a letter containing this information should be sent to all the missionaries, to Conference and Presbytery Conveners, to the Superintendents of Missions, and to the members of the Board.

# Resolutions of Sympathy

Re the late Rev. J. B. MacLeod-

A resolution was passed, expressing sincere regret at the loss suffered by the Board in the death of Rev. J. B. MacLeod, former City Chaplain in Montreal, and sympathy with Mrs. MacLeod and family in their bereavement.

Re the late Rev. J. C. Nethercott-

It was requested that a letter should be sent to Mrs. J. C. Nethercott, of Bothwell, conveying the sympathy of the Board in the recent death of her husband, Rev. J. C. Nethercott, who for many years was our missionary on the Moraviantown Indian Mission, in the Kent Presbytery.

# Thanks For Clothing Sent to Western Canada

It was resolved that hearty thanks should be expressed to the Woman's Missionary Society, Women's Associations and Congregations for the valuable assistance rendered in furnishing large quantities of clothing for needy families in the West.

# Unfinished Business and Correction of Minutes

It was agreed that any necessary corrections in the Minutes should be left to the office and unfinished business referred to the Sub-Executive.

# Re Loans to Self-Sustaining Fields

The following resolution which, at the direction of the Board was prepared by the representatives of Saskatchewan Conference, was adopted and ordered to be sent forward to the Executive of the General Council:—

"Whereas the Board of Home Missions has before it requests for loans on property amounting to \$10,884 from self-sustaining congregations in the West—these loans being for the purpose of repaying bank loans on building account and loans by private persons for building purposes or for material supplied;

"And Whereas these loans are requested to meet emergencies arising from crop failures in the last two years or from the general crisis;

"And Whereas the Property Fund is depleted beyond the margin of safety and far below the point where it is advisable to make loans to assist self-supporting congregations, seeing that the fund was created to assist aid-receiving charges and missions;

"Be it Resolved that the Home Mission Board refer this to the Executive of the General Council with the request that they take such steps as they deem wise to meet the present emergency."

Ashcroft asked \$100 to cover deficit in 1930 salary. No action.

Chase asked \$75 to cover deficit in 1930 salary. No action.

Peachland asked special of \$100 on account of deficit of \$152. \$77 allowed.

# KOOTENAY-

Creston asked special of \$35 to cover deficit in 1930 salary. No action. Proctor asked special of \$134 to cover deficit in 1930 salary. \$59 allowed.

Slocan City asked \$138 to cover deficit in 1930 salary. \$63 allowed. PRINCE RUPERT—

# Report of the Appropriations Committee

The Appropriations Committee reported through its Secretary, Rev. George Dorey, as follows:—

The total estimates for regular grants to Conferences for 1931, as presented to the Committee, amounted to \$904,348.56, and the requests for special grants on account of deficits in 1930 totalled \$49,647. The total estimated expenditure for 1931, exclusive of Government grants for Indian Work, was \$1,203,050.56. The amount available from the M. and M. Fund for 1931 is \$1,060,000, together with a special appropriation of \$40,000 to meet deficits in salaries and other emergencies in the dried-out areas in the Prairie Conferences, and the estimated receipts from other sources, exclusive of Government grants for Indian Work, are \$50,000, making a total of \$1,150,000. This left a discrepancy between estimated expenditure and estimated receipts of \$53,050.56. In order to meet this, your Committee came to the following decision:—

(1) Re deficits in 1930 salaries:—It is recommended that salaries be built up to the following scale:—

(2) Re grants for 1931:—It is recommended that salaries be built up to the following scale:—

Married ministers—unfurnished house	1,750
Married ministers—furnished house	1,700
Single ministers—without house	1,500
Lay Supply, married	1,200
Lay Supply, single	1,100

And that all grants to other workers be reduced 3%.

It was the understanding that, if the field should increase sufficiently the amount contributed, the minister would receive the full minimum salary. The only exceptions made in both years were cases where the Conference Home Mission Committees felt that the charge might reasonably be expected to raise a larger amount than they had previously given.

It was reported that the Secretaries and office staff would aim at making an extra contribution to the M. and M. Fund approximating 5 per cent. of their salaries, and that the Superintendents would also make a similar super-gift.

After prolonged and careful revision, the amount needed was reduced from \$1,203,000 to \$1,145,831.23, the grants asked for Conference being reduced from \$904,348.56 to \$861,328.25, and the requests for Specials to meet deficits for 1930, from \$49,647.00 to \$29,167.98.
