DIGEST OF MINUTES THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS JUNE 24th, 1942

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met at the home of Mr. Fred Mann, Cainsville, at 10.45 a.m., Wednesday, June 24th, 1942. The Chairman presided and the meeting was opened with prayer by Dr. Cormie.

Members present: Rev. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., Chairman, Revs. R. B. Cochrane, D.D., George Dorey, D.D., M. C. Macdonald, S. H. Greenslade, Hiram Hull, D.D., and Mr. Fred Mann.

Rev. J. A. Cormie, D.D., Superintendent of Missions for Manitoba, and Rev. Beverley Oaten were also present and were made corresponding members.

Regrets were received from Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., Rev. J. G. Gorwill, and Mr. K. M. Kilbourn.

Rev. Hiram Hull, D.D., was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) Mrs. Archibald Young, in appreciation of resolution of sympathy sent by the Board on the death of her husband.
- (2) Rev. Mark Dawber, D.D., thanking the Board for its grant to the Home Missions Council of North America, and also commenting on Dr. Felton's enjoyment of his visit to Canada and his appreciation of the treatment accorded him by the United Church.
- (3) Miss Alice Killen, R.N., formerly Matron of the Mitchell Memorial Hospital, in acknowledgment of letter expressing appreciation of the services of the nurses in our Hospitals.
- (4) Secretary of the Alberta Conference, expressing appreciation of the leadership given by the Secretaries, regret that Mr. Macdonald was unable to visit the Alberta Conference, and thanking the Board for the payment of cost-of-living bonuses.
- (5) Secretary of the Portage la Prairie Presbytery, forwarding the findings of Presbytery Committee re Referendum on question of one year's continuous service by Candidates for the Ministry, as adopted by the Presbytery.

Sympathy

Rev. J. M. Pritchard, D.D.-

The Secretary referred to the sudden death of Dr. J. M. Pritchard, recently appointed Superintendent of Missions for Central and Northern Alberta. On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

This Executive of the Board of Home Missions desires to place on record its profound sense of bereavement in the sudden and unexpected passing of the Rev. J. M. Pritchard, B.A., D.D., appointed Superintendent

of Missions for Northern and Central Alberta at the recent meeting of the Home Mission Board.

Dr. Pritchard was looking forward with keen anticipation to active participation in the administration of a work he always loved and to which he had already made faithful and effective contributions as Convener of Home Missions in various Presbyteries in which he labored, as Chairman of the Alberta Conference Home Mission Committee, and as a member of this Board. He impressed all who were associated with him in the work of the Church by the sanity of his judgments, the optimism of his outlook, the geniality of his disposition, and his unfailing Christian courtesy.

Dr. Pritchard's sudden translation in the prime of his manhood and ministry is not only a great loss to the Home Mission Board but to the United Church. We desire to express our sincere sympathy with Mrs. Pritchard and the sons of the home and to assure them that our thoughts and prayers are with them in the sorrow of this separation.

Letters of Sympathy-

It was directed that letters of sympathy be sent to Rev. W. B. McIntosh, of North Thompson, B.C., on the death of his wife, and to Rev. J. G. Gibson, Squamish, B.C., on the death of his wife.

Superintendency of Missions in Central and Northern Alberta

A statement was made regarding the matter of the appointment of a Superintendent of Missions for Central and Northern Alberta, in view of the sudden death of Dr. J. M. Pritchard, appointed by the Board to succeed Dr. Powell.

After discussion, it was agreed-

- (1) That this Executive make no appointment to-day.
- (2) That a Committee, consisting of Rev. W. H. Sedgewick (Convener), Rev. Hiram Hull, Rev. S. H. Greenslade, Mr. Fred Mann, Mr. J. F. Maine, Mr. K. M. Kilbourn, the Chairman and the Secretaries, be appointed to consider the situation further and to report to a regular or special meeting of the Executive.
- (3) That Dr. Powell be asked to continue as Superintendent for two months beyond the end of August or until such time as an appointment is made.

Report of Action of the Executive of General Council re Matters Referred to It By the Board of Home Missions

1. Re Acceleration of Theological Course-

The resolution of the Home Mission Board was adopted in principle, and a committee, with representatives of the Boards of Home Missions and Christian Education, was appointed to consider the matter. This Committee met and agreed to recommend to the General Council:

- A. Regarding the class of students graduating in 1943-
- 1. That the course of study should begin on September 15, 1942, and

continue to such a date as would make it possible for these students to be ordained by March 1st, 1943.

- 2. That the Board of Home Missions pay students of this and the succeeding class (First and Second Year Theology) who are serving Mission Fields in 1942 the same amount as they would have been entitled to receive had they continued to serve up to and including Sunday, September 20th.
- 3. That the General Council take the steps necessary to enable the Conferences and/or their Executives to ordain these candidates immediately on completion of their studies; and that if this authorization is given, the Secretary of the General Council notify all Presbyteries of this action so that they may do their part to give effect to this recommendation by examining and licensing any candidates who have completed their course in this manner.
- 4. That in the event of the adoption of the foregoing, the Secretary of the General Council notify the Chairman of Settlement Committees that these men will be available for Settlement on the above date 'and ask that they be settled accordingly.
- B. Regarding the class normally to graduate in 1944-
- 1. That the course for 1942-1943 begin as stated in A(1) and (2).
- That a session, either in one Theological College or individually or in groups, be held during the Spring and Summer of 1943, during which the students shall complete the Third Year of the Theological Course.
- 3. That the General Council provide ways and means to enable the students to meet the cost of this session."

It was reported that the Board of Christian Education and the Principals of Colleges had unanimously agreed to support this finding.

On motion, it was agreed to approve of Section 2, under A, above.

2. Re (a) Shortage of Ministers and

(b) Adjustment of Rural Charges Adjacent to Colleges-

These resolutions were referred to a Committee consisting of five members each from the Executive of General Council, the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Home Missions.

 Re Cost of Living Bonus for General Council Officers— This was referred to the General Council, simpliciter.

4. Re Evacuation of Japanese-

The Executive of the General Council adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas the United Church (and the Methodist Church before 1925) has carried on missionary work among the Japanese people in British Columbia since 1892, and has achieved a gratifying measure of success, not only in interesting the Japanese in the Christian religion, but in building up those Christian institutions which are found among our own Canadian people;

"And Whereas at the present time, the United Church has 17 congregations, ministered to by 7 Japanese Ministers, which congregations number 1,116 families, comprising 5,500 persons, with a membership of over 1,000;

"And Whereas the war has created a very critical situation, not only for the Japanese people, but for our own Canadian people;

"Therefore Be It Resolved That-

- (1) The Church recognizes the need of such action by the Government as will adequately protect the country against subversive activity on the part of an enemy group and commends the vigilance of police authorities throughout the country. The Church commends the Statement of Policy issued by the Prime Minister's Office on January 14th, 1942, and the appointment of the British Columbia Security Commission.
- (2) The Church believes that it is its duty in these days of terrible upheaval for our Japanese congregations to follow them with its ministry and to assure them of sympathy; that the United Church should, by rendering this service, assure our Japanese fellow-Christians that a great Canadian Church, while realizing that our Government must protect us so far as is possible from insidious attacks, wishes to dissociate itself from vicious and unchristian attitudes, and to hold fast the faith that in Christ there is no distinction of race and colour.
- (3) The Church would express the hope that concentration camps for women and children will not be a permanent policy, and that in the very near future provision will be made for their residence under more normal conditions. In this connection, the Church would commend the proposal that large numbers, particularly of women and children, be accommodated in certain suitable localities in the interior of British Columbia; and particularly that a certain number of selected families be employed in the beet-growing and other agricultural areas of Canada; and in employment of real economic value. And that we appeal to the whole Church to help find positions in homes and on farms for such second-generation Japanese as may be recommended by our Church authorities in British Columbia; subject to such regulations as may be laid down by the Governments concerned."

5. Re Status of Lay Supplies-

The Moderator was requested to appoint a Commission to study this matter. This was done, and Dr. Dorey reported that the Commission had held one meeting.

6. Re Opening of New Work due to the War-

The Executive of the General Council approved in principle the Recommendations of the Board, and also the finding of the Joint Committee of the Board of Home Missions and the Woman's Missionary Society that "it is of the opinion that the United Church of Canada cannot adequately meet the situation unless some one person is definitely appointed to have responsibility for bringing the whole matter to the

attention of local congregations and assisting them in every way possible to meet the needs."

The Executive also directed that a small committee should be appointed to carry out the Recommendations.

Dr. Cochrane made a progress report regarding the work of the Committee on Camp and War Production Communities. He stated that it had been decided to appoint a full-time director, and also a full-time woman worker to assist him. Miss Verda Ullman had been appointed as Field Secretary.

Authority was given for the use by the Committee of such amounts as may be necessary from time to time from the appropriation of \$1,500 made by the Board for work arising out of the War.

7. Re Post War Conditions, including Immigration-

A Committee, representing the Departments of Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Evangelism and Social Service, Christian Education and the Woman's Missionary Society, was appointed, to consider the recommendation and to submit definite proposals to the Sub-Executive for presentation to the General Council.

Wrinch Memorial

Hospital, Hazelton...The resignation of Dr. W. E. Austin, Medical Superintendent, was presented. The resignation was accepted and the Secretaries were asked to send a letter to Dr. Austin, expressing appreciation of his services.

The appointment of a successor was referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent concerned.

Statement By Mr. Macdonald Re Visits to Fields in the Ottawa Valley and Eastern Townships of Quebec

Mr. Macdonald made a statement regarding his visits to charges in the Ottawa Valley and the Eastern Townships of Quebec, when he was accompanied by the Superintendent of Missions for the area. The Chairman expressed the Executive's appreciation of the valuable information secured and presented.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted: That, having had before us a statement of the conditions existing in these areas, so far as the surplus number of churches is concerned, we request our Superintendent of Missions to bring the situation to the attention of the two Presbyteries, with a view to seeing what can be done to remedy it.

Borrowings from Uninvested Balances of Home Mission Funds

It was reported that a total of \$971,862.59, representing uninvested balances of various Home Mission Funds, was, at May 28th, 1942, being used to carry the Church's deficit.

Re Amount Owing By Rev. W. R. MacKay

The Secretary reported that \$146.60 had been advanced to Rev. W. R. MacKay, covering travelling expenses from Ottawa to a Home Mission field in Saskatchewan, and that he had remained on the field only 48 hours. Direction was asked as to what steps might be taken to recover the amount from Mr. MacKay. The matter was left in the hands of the Secretary, for conference with Mr. A. T. Whitehead, the Solicitor for the United Church.

Funeral Expenses of Mr. Simo Hytti

It was agreed to confirm payment of \$55.00, funeral expenses of Mr. Simo Hytti, who had been injured while acting as temporary caretaker of the Church of All Nations, Toronto.

Re Illness of Caretaker, Church of All Nations, Toronto

It was reported that Mr. Andrechuk, the Caretaker of the Church of All Nations, Toronto, had been ill for several months and unable to perform his duties. Direction was asked as to how long his salary should be continued. The matter was referred to the Superintendent of Missions for the Toronto Presbyteries, the Superintendent of the Church of All

Nations and the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery, the Executive expressing the opinion that full salary should be continued for six months from the date of Mr. Andrechuk's illness.

Re Bonds of Knox Church, Swift Current

With regard to Bonds of Knox Church, Swift Current, (par value \$668), held by the Home Mission Property Fund, a request of the Bond Committee was presented that the Board, in common with other bondholders, agree to surrender some of the bonds, waive interest up to a certain date, and lower the interest rate for the future.

It was decided-

- (1) To cancel all interest to December 31st, 1942;
- (2) To reduce the bond indebtedness to \$650.00; and
- (3) To reduce the rate of interest to 4%.

Hospital Work

George McDougall Hospital-

- (1) It was reported for information that the Agreement entered into between the Hospital and the Village of Smoky Lake, May 11th, 1937, would be cancelled at the end of June, 1942.
- (2) Re Request for Increase in Salary of Matron.—It was decided to authorize an increase in the salary of the Matron to \$85.00, or if necessary \$90.00 per month.

Lamont Hospital-

- (1) Re Financial Situation.—Dr. Dorey reported that he had met with the Alberta Hospital Board and had discussed the financial situation of the Lamont Hospital at length. It was agreed to refer the matter to the Board.
- (2) Banking Authority.—It was agreed that Mr. Findlay M. Ross, who has succeeded Mr. Walter Englestad as Business Manager of the Lamont Hospital, be given the necessary authority to conduct business with the Canadian Bank of Commerce on behalf of the Hospital, and that the necessary formal resolution be inscribed in the permanent records of the Board.

Hafford Hospial-

Dr. Dorey read a letter from Mr. N. J. Sawasy, Secretary-Treasurer of the Rural Municipality of Redberry, stating that they were interested in the proposition of taking over the Hospital, but were not yet in a position to give a definite answer.

Request of Skidegate Inlet Hospital Society-

A request was received from the Skidegate Inlet Hospital Society that the Board take over the Hospital which it is operating in Queen Charlotte City. It was decided to take no action.

Nomination of Representatives on Committee on Missionary Education

Revs. George Dorey and M. C. Macdonald and Mr. K. M. Kilbourn were nominated as the Board's representatives on the Committee on Missionary Education.

Scholarships for Superintendents of City Missions Institutions

It was reported that only one Superintendent of a City Mission Institution, Rev. I. G. Perkins, of All Peoples' Church, Sault Ste. Marie, was able to avail himself this year of one of the three \$100.00 scholarships provided by the Board. It was decided that a scholarship be granted to Mr. Perkins.

It was also decided that next January the Secretary should notify the Superintendents of our City Mission Institutions that three scholarships of \$100.00 each will be available next summer.

Situation re Japanese in Canada

Dr. Dorey made a statement regarding-

- (a) Co-operation with the British Columbia Security Commission and his/Interview with the Charman of the Commission while in B.C.
- (b) The Placement of Japanese Ministers in areas in which Japanese had been settled.
- (c) Efforts to get consent of Ontario Municipalities for settlement of Canadian-born Japanese in domestic employment.
- (d) Proposal of the Dominion Government to take over the Edmonton Indian Residential School to house Japanese.

It was agreed-

- (1) That the Board would be responsible for the rent of a house for the Japanese minister at Raymond, Alta., and for the Japanese minister at Morris, Man., and for the salary of Rev. T. Komiyama, who was ordained this year.
- (2) That the question of repairs and expenses in connection with the church at Kaslo, which is being used for Japanese work, be referred to the Secretaries.
- (3) That the matter of the taking over of the Edmonton Residential School by the Dominion Government be left in the hands of the Secretaries.

Italian Work

Re-Arrangement of Italian Work, * Hamilton and Niagara Peninsula—

The following proposed temporary re-arrangement of the Italian work in the Niagara Peninsula and Hamilton was confirmed: That the two areas be served by one minister, Rev. M. di Stasi, who will live in Hamilton, preach there on Sunday morning, and in Niagara Falls in the evening, making one trip to Welland during the week. The Secretaries were authorized to care for the necessary expenses.

Italian Work, Montreal-

Rev. D. R. Gualtieri was nominated to the Italian Church, Montreal, as from September 1st, 1942.

Grant to John Milton Society for the Blind

A grant of \$10.00 was made to the John Milton Society for the Blind.

License for Lay Missionary

On recommendation of the Conference Home Mission Committee, approved by the Alberta Conference, it was decided to recommend that Mr. B. Richards, Lay Missionary at Evansburgh, in the Edmonton Presbytery, be given a license, for one year, to administer the Sacraments.

Proposal re Rural Conference

It was reported that the Town and Country Committee of the Home Missions Council of North America had agreed to hold its Rural Conference in Canada in September, if this were considered advisable. The Executive suggested that it would be better to postpone the gathering until October.

Re Need of Ordained Men

A statement was presented showing that approximately 100 ordained men were needed for charges that should have this type of supply immediately.

Payment of Expenses of Ordinands to Their Fields

The Secretaries were authorized to take up with the Sub-Executive of the General Council the question of a revision of its regulation with regard to the payment of travelling expenses of ordinands to their fields.

Communication From Chairman of War Savings Committee

The Secretary read a letter from Dr. J. J. Gibson, Chairman of the War Savings Committee. In view of the fact that there was only a fifty per cent. attendance at this meeting of the Executive, it was decided not to discuss the matter, but to refer it to the next meeting. The General opinion seemed to be that the Executive would not be likely to do other than refer a final decision to the Board at its next regular meeting.

Re Insurance on Hospital Properties

A Schedule was presented by Mr. Macdonald, showing the inventory values and the present insurance on Hospital properties at Bella Bella and Hazelton.

It was decided to cover all units of the above hospitals with blanker insurance to the value of 90% of the inventory values.

Resolution of Toronto West Presbytery

The following resolution of the Toronto West Presbytery was presented:

"That owing to the increased cost of living the Home Mission Board be respectfully asked to consider the revision of its regulations regarding the grants to aid-receiving charges, more particularly as to its policy regarding any remuneration which the Presbyteries may desire to give to their Secretaries." It was decided to take no action.

Report to General Council

It was agreed that the Secretaries and the Chairman of the Board should be charged with the responsibility of preparing the Report of the Board of Home Missions for presentation to the General Council.

Property Claims

Montreal, Chinese Mission.—Information was received that there is a possibility of selling this building for \$4,500—\$1,500 cash and balance at rate of \$500 a year. Agreed to accept, if offer is made.

KINGSTON-

COCHRANE-

Timmins, Mountjoy Church.—Application was made for a loan of \$550 to enable the congregation to care for indebtedness on the church. No action.

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Committee Room of the Home Mission Offices on Tuesday, September 8th, 1942, at 2:00 p.m.

Members present: Revs. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D. (who was elected to the Chair in the absence of the Chairman), R. B. Cochrane, D.D., George Dorey, D.D., M. C. Macdonald, S. H. Greenslade, J. G. Gorwill, Hiram Hull, D.D., and Mr. Fred Mann. Rev. J. C. Cochrane, D.D., was made a corresponding member.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Dr. Sedgewick.

Rev. Hiram Hull, D.D., was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

Regrets for absence were received from Dr. A. Lloyd Smith, Mr. K. M. Kilbourn, and Mr. J. F. Maine, who was absent on account of the celebration that day of his fiftieth wedding anniversary. It was decided to send a telegram, congratulating Mr., and Mrs. Maine on the happy occasion.

An acknowledgment of the resolution of sympathy and the flowers sent in the name of the Board was received from Mrs. J. M. Pritchard.

Letters of Sympathy .

It was directed that letters of sympathy be sent to: Mrs. A. E. Waghorne, on the occasion of the death of her husband; Rev. W. E. Wilson, whose wife died a short time ago; and Mrs. Ewart Monias, whose husband died recently.

Superintendency of Missions in Central and Northern Alberta

Consideration was given to the appointment of a Superintendent of Missions for Central and Northern Alberta.

On motion, duly seconded, it was decided that Rev. Thomas Hart, M.A., D.Th., be appointed Superintendent of Missions for this area, with residence in Edmonton.

Thanks to Congregations and Individuals Who Assisted in Supply of Student Fields

The Executive extended thanks to Principal G. G. D. Kilpatrick, Professor A. S. Orton, and Rev. K. A. Moyer, who had assisted in supplying student mission fields during the summer; and also to Erskine and American Church, Montreal, who paid Dr. 'Kilpatrick's expenses, and to Chalmers Church, Ottawa; who made it possible for Mr. Moyer to do this work.

Re St. John's Hall, Quebec

It was reported that there had been further correspondence with members of the local board with regard to their desire to increase the salaries of the Superintendent, Rev. H. McPhail, and Mrs. McPhail. It was decided to take no action.

John Neil Estate

It was reported that the Sub-Executive of the General Council had approved the sale for the sum of \$5,000 cash of the premises known as 141 Lawton Blvd., Toronto, one of the unrealized assets of the John Neil Estate in which the Board of Home Missions has a one-fifth interest, and it was requested that this Executive give its approval. Agreed.

Sale of Zion Church, Toronto

On motion of Mr. Fred Mann, seconded by Rev. S. H. Greenslade, it was agreed to give consent to the sale of the former Zion Congregational Church property, Toronto, now occupied by the Christian Unity Mission, the Sub-Executive of the General Council having already given its approyal.

After discussion, it was decided to refer this whole matter to the Toronto members of the Executive for consultation with the Toronto Home Missions Council.

Return Expenses of Rev. A. F. Thrower from the West

The question of a grant towards the travelling expenses of Rev. A. F. Thrower from Alberta to a charge in the London Conference was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Medical Expenses, Mr. Robert McKinley

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) Mr. J. C. Pinch, of Sault Ste. Marie, regretting his inability to be present at this meeting but hoping to be able to attend future meetings of the Executive.
- (2) Mrs. A. T. Waghorn, thanking the Executive for letter of sympathy with regard to the death of her husband.
- (3) The Presbytery of Swift Current, expressing appreciation of the work of the students within the Presbytery during the past summer.
- (4) The Presbytery of Rock Lake, recording its satisfaction at the payment of cost-of-living bonus to aid-receiving charges.
- (5) Rev. R. J. McDonald, calling attention to the severe handicap suffered by some of the ministers on aid-receiving charges by the reduction of their gasoline ration category from B to A, and also by the cutting down of the gasoline unit.

The Secretary was requested to take the matter up with the Regional Control Office in Regina, and, failing a satisfactory response from that source, to correspond with the Oil Controller, Mr. G. R. Cottrelle.

Letter of Sympathy

The Secretary was directed to write to Mrs. Curtis, of St. John's, Newfoundland, expressing the sympathy of the Executive on the recent death of her husband, the late Rev. Levi Curtis, D.D.

Congratulations

The Secretary was requested to write to Rev. Gordon Pringle, D.D., of Kincardine, N.B., conveying the congratulations of the Executive on his recent celebration of the Golden Jubilee of his ordination.

Commencement of Work By New Superintendent of Missions for Central and Northern Alberta

The Secretary reported that Rev. Dr. Hart had assumed the duties of Superintendent of Missions in Central and Northern Alberta on October 1st.

Superintendency of Missions in Northern Ontario

Statement of Secretary—

The Secretary reported that Dr. J. C. Cochrane, the Superintendent of Missions in Northern, Ontario and North-Western Quebec, had been appointed Secretary of the Board of Pensions by the General Council and would take over his new duties on January 1st, 1943.

Resolution of Appreciation-

The following resolution in appreciation of the services of Dr. J. C. Cochrane to the Board of Home Missions was passed unanimously:

This Executive desires to place on record its high appreciation of the services rendered by the Reverend John C. Cochrane, D.D., during his tenure of office as Superintendent of Missions for Northern Ontario. Dr. Cochrane came into the ministry with a thorough understanding of the conditions and problems of the pioneer people in the Northland, and, though he added to his experience by a successful pastorate in Toronto, it was the opportunitiess and obligations in the North that laid hold on his conscience and imagination. To a ministry there he has now given twenty-two years, during more than thirteen of which he has been Superintendent of Missions.

His practical ability has been of immeasurable value to the Church, and, as a result of his inspiration and organizing genius, together with his skill as a master-workman, the Church has been given a visibility which for generations will perpetuate his memory.

His keen sympathy with the problems of the ministers on the frontier has endeared him to them and has made him their trusted counsellor. His ardent enterprise has tried to keep pace with the expansion of settlement and, if the Church had been able to do for the North all that he has urged as needful, the religious situation there would be much better than it is, but we have the satisfaction of knowing that the restricted supply of men and money has been used to the very best advantage.

Or. Cochrane has worthily represented the desire of the United Church to work in close co-operation with other Communions and, through his inspiration, some gratifying progress in this direction has been made.

Everywhere he has gone over his large Superintendency he has set an example for his co-workers as a good minister of Jesus Christ and, in addition, by voice and camera and nimble pen, he has made the needs and opportunities of the Northland to be known far and wide.

In short, Dr. Cochrane has not only been an able administrator, but an effective preacher and an outstanding advocate of Home Missions.

The charm of his personality, his sparkling humour, his pungent and incomparable verse, and his wise counsel will be greatly missed from missionary deliberations, but we rejoice that what is loss to us is gain to others and in the eminently important and difficult post to which he has recently been elected, we wish him Godspeed.

It was directed that a copy of the resolution be sent to Dr. Cochrane, with a covering letter, intimating that it was the hope of the Executive that he would be the guest of the Board at a dinner in his honour at the time of its meeting in the spring.

Report re Meeting with Conference Representatives-

The Secretary made a statement with regard to a meeting held with representatives of the Three Conferences served by the Superintendent for this area, when it was decided to send forward the names of five men for consideration by the Executive.

Appointment of Superintendent-

After discussion, it was unanimously decided that Rev. James A. Lyttle, of South Porcupine, be appointed Superintendent of Missions for Northern Ontario and North-Western Quebec, his duties to begin on January 1st, 1943.

Appointment of Interim Committees of the Board

The Secretaries and the Toronto Members of the Executive were appointed a committee to name Interim Committees of the Board and to report to the next meeting of the Executive.

Appointment of Delegates to Meetings of Home Missions Council of North America and Federal Council of Churches of Christ

On motion, Rev. Dr. Dorey and Rev. M. C. Macdonald were appointed delegates to the meetings of the Home Missions Council of North America and the Federal Council of Churches of Christ, to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, December 5-12.

Survey of Situation on the New Alaska Highway

The Executive approved payment of \$100 for survey of the situation on the new Alaska Highway from Dawson Creek northward.

Committee on Rural Experimentation

It was decided that the name of Rev. James Lyttle be substituted for that of Dr. J. C. Cochrane, and the name of Rev. James Scobie for that of Mr. Walter Little, on the Committee on Rural Experimentation, appointed by the Board at its meeting in April.

Question of Annuity for Mr. Herbert Goodland

Dr. Dorey reported that a request had been received that consideration be given to the matter of granting an annuity to Mr. Herbert Goodland, Farm Instructor at the Edmonton Indian Residential School, who would shortly be retiring after forty-two years' service. This was referred to the Board,—the Secretaries in the meantime to go more fully into the matter, and also to confer with the Committee to be appointed by the Executive of General Council to study the question of Pensions for Lay Workers.

Report re Literature

Mr. Macdonald presented an interim report regarding the distribution of literature published this fall. It was agreed to authorize an additional grant up to \$500, if required.

Conference of Indian Workers, Norway House

Dr. Dorey reported that a very successful Conference of Indian Workers, as authorized by the Board, had been held at Norway House in August. It was directed that the thanks of the Executive should be conveyed to Mr. Caldwell, Principal of the Norway House Residential School, Mr. Lazenby, the Indian Agent, and others, who had contributed to the success of the Conference.

Licenses for Lay Missionaries

0

- (1) It was agreed to recommend to the Sub-Executive of the General Council that special licenses to administer the Sacraments be granted to the following, for one year: Mr. Charles E. Freake, Change Islands; Mr. Silas Loder, Fogo; Mr. Alfred B. LeGrow, Musgrave Harbor,—all in the Twillingate Presbytery; and that the licence of Mr. Chesley Laite, Greenspond, Bonavista Presbytery, be renewed for one year.
- (2) No action was taken on the request of Windsor Presbytery that license be granted to Mr. Allen MacIntosh, lay supply on the Walton charge.
- (3) The request of Kamsack Presbytery that the question of granting a license to Mr. David Marshall, Invermay-Margo charge; be reconsidered, was referred to the Board.

Nisbet Memorial School Home

Mr. Macdonald reported regarding the situation at the Nisbet Memorial School Home, Prince Albert.

The whole matter was referred to the Secretaries, in consultation with the Superintendent of Missions, with power to pay additional amount for maintenance, if necessary, and to study the question of future policy and report to the Board.

Question of Bringing Ordinands From Northern Ireland .

The Secretary reported that Rev. Dr. Cormie had received a communication from Rev. R. H. Gilmour, formerly a minister in Manitoba, now living in Northern Ireland, suggesting that perhaps licentiates might be brought from Northern Ireland to fill some of the vacancies in the United Church. This matter was referred to the Board.

Statement With Regard to Japanese in Canada

Dr. Dorey made a statement with regard to the situation of the Japanese in Canada and stated that the Office was keeping in close touch with developments.

Statement by Director of Committee on Camp and War Production Communities

Rev. Wm. Fingland reported on the work being carried on by the Committee on Camp and War Production Communities, its problems and opportunities.

Representative on Board of Management of the United Church Training School

Rev. S. H. Greenslade was nominated the representative of the Board of Home Missions on the Board of Management of the United Church Training School.

Hospital Work

Problem of Keeping and Securing Doctors-

It was decided that the Secretary should write to Dr. A. E. Archer, President of the Canadian Medical Association, and also a member of a Committee representing the Medical Association and the Government Services, setting forth the difficulties with which the Board is faced in war time in so far as the medical personnel of its hospitals is concerned.

Banking Authority, Dr. D. M. D. Murphy—

It was agreed that the necessary authority be given to Dr. D. M. D. Murphy, Acting Superintendent of the Wrinch Memorial Hospital, to transact business on behalf of the Hospital with the Royal Bank of Canada, Smithers, B.C.

Appointments

- (1) The appointment of Miss Ruth MacLeod as Deaconess at Brunswick St. United Church, Halifax, was reported for information.
- (2) The appointment of Mr. U. Cronhielm as missionary on the Grand River and New Credit Indian Mission, Brantford Presbytery, was confirmed.
- (3) It was agreed that Rev. Jer Tse Sang be released from the Chinese Mission, Moose Jaw, and appointed to the Chinese Mission, Vancouver.

Request for Survey of Situation in Northern Saskatchewan

The following resolution of the Kamsack Presbytery was presented:

"That Presbytery request the Home Mission Board to have a man appointed to survey the whole situation of Northern Saskatchewan; that he do this in conjunction with the different ministers and school boards; that he collect this data and an account of how the people are being served or neglected by Christian teaching. That when this is done the Board will know just where to place their men where they are most needed."

This was referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent, for report to the next meeting of the Executive.

Marine Work

The Executive directed that the Secretary write to Mr. W. A. Gleason, expressing appreciation of his many years of service on the Marine Committee.

Re Military Service, Candidates for the Ministry

It was reported for information that, under a regulation of the National War Services, bona fide candidates or students for the Ministry of a religious denomination eligible to supply chaplains to the armed forces shall, in the discretion of the Board, be excepted from being called up.

Re Parliament St., Church Property

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions suggests to the members of the Toronto Home Missions Council that the matter of selling Parliament Street church property be delayed until the policy and plan of setting up a Centre of Evangelism and Social Service in that area be given further study and clarified.

Date of Board Meeting

It was decided that the date of the Board meeting in the Spring should be set for, April 7th, 1943.

Basis for Advances on Grants for 1943

It was agreed that advances on grants for the first quarter of 1943 should be made on the basis of the 1942 grants.

Basis for Applications by Presbyteries

It was decided to instruct Presbyteries to make applications for grants for 1943 on the same basis as for 1942.

Cape Croker, Parsonage.—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$30 for repairs to the chimney and the purchase of a congoleum rug and paint. Agreed.

ESSEX-

Roseland.—The Executive of Presbytery recommended that the Board credit to the Capital accounts of Westminster, Riverside and Ottawa congregations any sums contributed by individuals of these churches to the Roseland Building Fund. It was agreed that any monies paid toward this project in 1942 by members or adherents of churches in Windsor now indebted to the Board of Home Missions and which have not made any arrangement with the Board, be credited on the total indebtedness of these churches to the Board, and in addition the \$200 to be paid by Ottawa Church.

Windsor, Ottawa St. Church.—It was agreed, on request, to cancel interest for 1942 if \$200 is paid on the debt this year.

KENT-

Moraviantown, New Fairfield Church.—Presbytery approved of a request that a grant of \$100 from the rent of the farm at Moraviantown be given towards the repairs to this church—which will cost \$275. Agreed.

NORWAY HOUSE-

Gods' Lake.—(a) It was agreed to authorize purchase of another bed, springs and mattress. (b) It was also agreed to pay \$20—half the cost of moving the tool-house to a new site.

MOOSE JAW-

Moose Jaw, Chinese Mission.—The building at present occupied by the Mission is for sale. \$3,000 is asked. No action.

REGINA-

Regina, Chalmers Manse.—An offer of \$2,200 was received. It was decided not to accept this, but to refer the matter to the Secretaries, with power, in the event of another offer being received for the same amount or more, from a suitable purchaser.

DIGEST OF MINUTES

THE INTERIM EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS JANUARY 21st, 1943

The Interim Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Committee Room of the Home Mission Offices on Thursday, January 21st, 1943, at 10:00 a.m. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

APPOINTMENT OF MINUTE SECRETARY

Rev. S. H. Greenslade was appointed Minute Secretary.

Confirmation of Minutes

On Motion Minutes of the Meetings of the Executive held June 24th and September 8th, 1942, and of the Interim-Executive, held October 22nd, 1942, were confirmed.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) Rev. A. G. Donald, Sault Ste. Marie, intimating that, owing to illness, Mr. J. C. Pinch would be unable to attend this meeting of, the Executive.
- (2) Dr. J. C. Cochrane, expressing appreciation of the resolution regarding his services, passed by the Executive at its last meeting.
- (3) Mr. W. A. Gleason, thanking the Executive for letter of appreciation in regard to his services on the Marine Committee.
- (4) The Treasurer, advising that a total of \$7,080.14 had been received as legacies for Home Missions during the quarter ended September 30th, 1942.

Resolutions

Sympathy—

The Secretary was requested to convey the sympathy of the Executive to Mrs. Kinley, on the death of her husband, Captain W. T. Kinley, who served on our Marine Committee; and to Mrs. L. C. Fulcher, a former member of the office Staff, on the death of her husband.

Congratulations-

It was directed that the congratulations of the Executive should be extended to Rev. S. P. and Mrs. Rondeau on the celebration of their Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary.

Re Illness of Dr. R. J. McDonald

The Secretary made a statement regarding the illness of Dr. R. J. McDonald and reported that-he was making a good recovery. The Secretary was requested to write to Dr. McDonald, expressing the sympathy of the members of the Executive in his illness and their pleasure at his progress towards recovery.

It was left with the Secretaries to confer with Dr. McDonald as to any assistance necessary.

Re Death of Mr. A. B. Campbell, Lay Supply at Monteith

Sympathy—

It was directed that the sympathy of the Executive be conveyed to the family of the late Mr. A. B. Campbell, who was burned to death while serving as lay supply on the Monteith field.

Funeral Expenses-

It was greed to vote \$200 towards funeral expenses and to give authority to the Secretaries to make any further financial adjustment that may be necessary.

Appointment of Worker to Alaska Highway

Confirmation of Appointment-

The Executive confirmed the appointment of Rev. D. C. Amos to serve on the Alaska Highway for five months as the representative of the United, Anglican, Baptist and Presbyterian Churches, and directed that its gratitude should be conveyed to the Officials of Sydenham Street Church, Brantford, for their willingness to release Mr. Amos for this service.

Appropriation—

It was agreed to vote up to \$1,000 for expenses of supply of Sydenham St. Church, travelling expenses and equipment of Mr. Amos, etc.

Re Sale of Italian Church Property, Toronto

Statements were made by Dr. Dorey and Rev. J. C. Torrance regarding the sale of the Italian Church property in Toronto and the disposition of the proceeds of sale.

It was agreed that Dr. Dorey should represent the Board of Home Missions when the matter comes up for arbitration.

Fund for Retired Workers

It was agreed that a grant of \$100 from the Fund for Retired Workers should be placed in the hands of the Secretaries for Miss M. M. Sleeth. $^{\circ}$

Student Missionaries

Report re Payment-

The Secretary reported that student missionaries had been paid at the rate of \$13.00 per week for their summer's work, making necessary a small additional grant from the Board.

On motion, it was agreed to vote whatever extra amount was needed over and above the \$30,000 voted by the Board.

Appointment of Students-

Authority was given to the Secretaries to appoint Students to summer fields in 1943, if this should be thought necessary, between now and the meeting of the Board.

Cost of Summer Session for Theological Students

The Secretary reported that the committee which met to consider certain matters arising out of the instructions of General Council to provide for a summer course or courses in connection with the acceleration of theological studies had estimated that about forty-five students would be enrolled; that in the judgment of the committee there should be a summer course in the following places: Halifax, Toronto and Saskatoon; and that the approximate cost would be \$11,000.

It was agreed that the Board should pay one-half the cost of the summer courses for theological students, and that for this purpose the sum of \$6,000, from our 1942 apropriation, should be placed in a special account to be opened by the Treasurer.

Bequest of the Late John Sidney Arnold

The Secretary stated that the following provision was contained in the Will of the late John Sidney Arnold:

"The remaining one-fourth share of the residue is to be paid to the United Church of Canada, and to be specifically used in the furtherance of Home Mission work within the jurisdiction of the Alberta Conference and particularly applied in the erection and maintenance of church and manse buildings throughout the mission field of that Church within the boundaries of the Alberta Conference."

The Executive decided to recommend to the Sub-Executive of the General Council that, in carrying out the provisions of the bequest, it be guided by the advice of the Solicitor of the United Church, and that the Secretary should notify the Officials of the Alberta Conference that the Board is anxious to co-operate in every way possible.

Appointments

- (1) The appointment of Mr. R. A. Argue as Missionary-teacher on the Kitzegucla Indian Mission, Prince Rupert Presbytery, was confirmed.
- (2) It was agreed to approve the appointment of Rev. Harold Wilding as Missionary on the Port Simpson Indian Mission, Prince Rupert

Presbytery, on the understanding that, although his wife cannot live on the field, he shall be paid at the rate of a married, ordained minister.

Licenses for Lay Missionaries

The following recommendations for the granting of Licenses to administer the Sacraments were considered:

(1) By Cobourg Presbytery—for Mr. Herbert Lander, Lay Supply on the Alderville and Hiawatha Missions.

It was decided to recommend that Mr. Lander be granted a License to administer the Sacrament of Baptism only.

(2) By the Executive of the Bay of Quinte Conference—for Mr. N. R. Flower, Lay Supply, Bancroft Charge, Belleville Presbytery.

It was agreed to take no action.

(3) By Yorkton Presbytery—for Mr. E. J. Smith, Lay Supply on the Theodore Charge.

It was agreed to take no action.

Re St. John's Hall, Quebec

The following resolutions were presented:

- (1) Resolutions of the Home Mission Committee of Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery, adopted by Presbytery: "That this Presbytery respectfull urge upon the Home Mission Board the reconsideration of its decision with respect to the request of the Committee of St. John's Hall, with a view to allowing some greater measure of latitude to the Local Committee in the solution of this present problem."
- (2) Request of St. John's Hall Committee: "In view of the fact that the Committee will probably have a credit balance of over \$700 at the close of the current year, if it draws the amounts to which it is entitled (\$3,400 accepted by your Board in the budget submitted; made up of \$2,500 Morrin College grant-in-aid, \$540 from the Woman's Board for the Matron, \$360 from Home Mission Funds), the Committee reiterates its desire to be free to utilize this balance (1) to give a well-deserved bonus to the Superintendent and Matron;
 - (2) for pupil aid, if necessary; (3) for further improvements in the building and equipment; and (4) as a reserve against a possible decrease in the Morrin College grant, owing to reduced dividends from investments. The Committee regards the balance of \$700 as an unexpended portion of the Morrin College grant-in-aid."

On motion, it was decided to refer the matter to the Board, with the recommendation that favorable consideration be given to the request for an increase in the salaries of the Superintendent and the Matron.

Japanese Work

Statement re Work-

Dr. Dorey made a statement with regard to the situation so far as the Japanese are concerned and the work of our Japanese ministers.

Letter of Thanks-

It was directed that the thanks of the Executive should be conveyed to Rev. H. J. Armitage and the Official Board of Kaslo United Church, B.C., for their co-operation with the Japanese minister and for the use of the church by the Japanese.

Re Proposed Pamphlet-

Dr. Dorey referred to the proposed publication of a pamphlet on Japanese Problems. It was decided that the Secretaries be asked to explore the matter further with a view to having a draft of the proposed pamphlet presented to the Board for consideration.

Radio Broadcasting

The following resolution, passed by a Special Committee of Sas-katchewan Conference, was presented:

"That we approach the Board of Home Missions with the request that they establish a Radio Broadcast Service through the Prince Albert Station CBKI, and that for this purpose they set aside a sufficient grant to cover the cost of the same."

It was agreed to refer this matter to the Secretaries for conference with Dr. J. R. Mutchmor and the National Religious Advisory Council of the C.B.C., and report to the Board.

Bella Coola Hospital-

The Local Hospital Board recommended that an increase in salary of \$500 be given to Dr. J. E. Whiting. This was referred to the Board.

Basis for Special Emergency Grants and Cost of Living Bonus

The basis for special emergency grants and the question of costof-living bonus were considered. On motion, it was decided:

- To vote special emergency grants so as to build up salaries, as far as possible, to the scale adopted by the Board in 1942.
- II. To adopt the principle of paying a cost-of-living bonus for 1942 of
 - (1) \$100.00 to:
 - (a) Men on aid-receiving charges and home mission fields.
 - (b) Superintendents of Institutions and members of their staffs, except St. Christopher House, in the case of whose staff the Secretaries are to enquire as to the bonus paid from other sources. Should this not have been paid, the staff is to be paid at the same rate as other institutions.
 - (c) Medical Superintendents of Hospitals. (In this case it is hoped that the bonus can be met from the ordinary revenue of the hospital).

- (2) 81/2% of Salary to:
 - (a) Staff of Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute.
 - (b) Janitors in the Institutions.
- (3) 5% of salary—to: Nurses and Staffs in Home Mission Hospitals.

(4) Re Office Staffs:

It was decided that the office staffs should receive the same bonus as was decided upon by a Conference of the Secretaries of all the Departments—this bonus to be paid to the Home Mission Staffs on account of 1942.

The Secretaries were given authority to draw from Reserves, if necessary, an amount sufficient to balance the current account for 1942.

Request to Treasurer's Office

The Secretaries were instructed to ask the Treasurer's Office to keep the books open for a sufficient length of time to enable payments to be completed.

Committee on Camp and War Production Communities

It was agreed that the Secretaries be given power to draw upon the Treasurer for any funds which may be needed for the work of the Com-

mittee on Camp and War Production Communities until such time as the Executive of the General Council makes financial provision.

Property Claims

BURIN-

Pool's Cove.—(a) Parsonage: Agreed to vote Board's share of cost of making repairs to the Parsonage and providing kitchen stove—estimated at \$350.00, and providing new batteries and minor parts for Delco Light Plant, to cost \$400.00; the Public Health Department having agreed to bear one-half cost of repairs and stove, and one-third cost of new batteries. (b) Church: It was reported that extensive repairs were required—estimated cost at least \$350. Referred to Board.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND-

O'Leary.—It was agreed to give a discount of \$30 on the \$880 still due on condition that the whole balance is paid immediately.

MONTREAL-

Montreal, Lilly Memorial.—It was decided that agreement providing for remission of interest, on condition that \$500 is paid annually on principal, be continued for 1942 and 1943.

KINGSTON-

Kingston, Zion.—Agreed to accept \$100 on principal in 1943 and that no interest be charged.

Renfrew-

Calabogie-Horton.—Presbytery's Home Mission Committee recommended that the Board purchase the house in which the minister now lives in Renfrew. Referred to the Board.

COCHRANE-

Hearst.—Agreed to make a loan of \$300, repayable in 5 yearly instalments, towards cost of repairs to the church.

Porcupine.—It was agreed that interest on the loan be cancelled for the duration of the war and that any payments made during that period be applied on principal.

ESSEX-

Windsor, Ottawa Church.—Agreed to accept \$750 in full payment of loan.

NORWAY HOUSE-

Island Lake.—The Secretaries and Superintendent were given authority to make a settlement with Rev. J. A. McKim regarding equipment purchased by him, at a total cost of \$167.38.

Pekangecum.—(a) Agrèed to pay \$25.98, freight on rubberoid shipped last summer. (b) The purchase of furniture for the parsonage was referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent.

WINNIPEG-

West Winnipeg—New Site—Sargent and Garfield or Ingersoll.—It was agreed to vote a grant of \$900 to cover cost of site and to assume taxes for the duration of the war, the understanding being that the Board is not'involved in any way for the building of the church.

Winnipeg, Regent's Park.—Agreed to accept \$500 on principal of loan and give credit for \$750.

Pine Falls.—Agreed that for \$500 paid on principal in December credit be given for \$1,000.

BATTLEFORD-

Radisson.—It was agreed to accept \$25.00 in full payment of the loan.

Pierceland.—It was decided to refer to the Board a request for grant of \$1,000 towards a new manse.

Moose Jaw-

Moose Jaw, Chinese Mission.—Agreed to make an offer of \$2,500 to purchase the property now occupied by the Chinese Mission; the Chinese to contribute \$500 and take care of taxes and repairs.

Drumheller-

Hanna, Zion Church—German.—It was agreed to extend to 1943 agreement under which two payments of \$65 each would be accepted in full settlement of loan, one payment having been made.

PRINCE RUPERT-

Skidegate.—The Executive confirmed payment of \$132.82, expenditure covering furnishings for bachelor apartment, built by the missionary at the rear of the church.

Bella Coola, Manse.—Agreed to reimburse Rev. Hillis Wright for expenditure of \$400, made by him to complete the manse.

"Thomas Crosby".—Agreed to vote \$57.05, covering bill for repairs to the propeller, and \$45 for the use of the ways, painting, etc.

VANCOUVER-

Vancouver, Chinese Parsonage.—Agreed that unexpended balance of \$50 of grant of \$100, voted by the Board for shingling this house, should be allowed for papering, decorating, etc.

Vancouver, Powell St. Japanese Property.—Mr. Bunt reported that the building was now being looked after by First Church. There was also a letter, stating that Dr. Roddan estimated that he would need an extra \$1,200 a year to finance the work and saying that, inasmuch as he has already received \$2,100 from the Welfare Federation for the Fresh Air Camp, they be allowed to ask for the increased sum of \$1,200 to take care of this department of the work.

This was referred to the Secretaries, with power, in case a decision should be needed before the Board met.

"Melvin Swartout".—(a) The Secretaries reported that subsequent to the last meeting of the Executive, a letter had been received from Mr. Bunt, stating that they could find no missionary for the "Swartout" and asking the mind of the Secretaries re the possibility of chartering it to the Navy. The Secretaries authorized Mr. Bunt and the Marine Committee to explore the possibility of chartering the boat.

The Executive approved of the action so far and referred further negotiations to the Secretaries.

(b) Repairs amounting to \$250 or \$300 were necessary due to dry rot in certain parts of the boat, before it can be chartered. The Marine Committee had put the work in hand. It was agreed to authorize payment of these accounts when presented.

VICTORIA-

Bamfield Manse.—Mr. Bunt reported that about \$300 would be needed for repairs. Agreed to allow this amount, if necessary.

Koksilah.—Presbytery recommended the sale of 15 acres for the sum of \$400. Agreed to approve; proceeds of sale to be returned to the Property Fund.

Westminster-

New Westminster, Chinese Mission.—Agreed to confirm acceptance of an offer to purchase for \$1,500; terms: one-third cash and balance in one and two years, with interest at 5%.

New Westminster, Japanese Property.—It was agreed to sell this property; the money to be held in trust for the re-opening of the Japanese work when circumstances permit.

New Westminster, Chinese Mission.—Agreed to approve new electric wiring, at an estimated cost of \$75.

Maintenance Claims

St. John's-

Blackhead Road and Fort Amherst.—Presbytery requested grant at rate of \$6.00 per week for student to open mission work. Agreed to confirm payment made at the rate of \$4.00 per week for the period, November 15th to December 31st, and to continue grant until the meeting of the Board.

Marine Missions, Newfoundland.—Conference Home Mission Committee requested that grants for boat expenses on Marine Mission fields be increased to cover increased cost of gasoline, from June, 1942. Referred to the Board.

INVERNESS-GUYSBORO-

Mabou.—Presbytery and Superintendent recommended grant at the rate of \$350 for this field from January to November, 1942. Agreed.

MONCTON-

Hillsboro.—Payment of \$50 for supply for first six months of 1942 was confirmed.

OTTAWA-

Aylwin.-Agreed to allow travel grant at rate of \$50 for 1942.

MONTREAL-

Montreal, Italian Mission.—Agreed to vote \$25 towards settlement of account for material, reported to have been purchased by Mr. Bersani, allegedly for repairs to the Shaw Memorial Church, on condition that the Italian Congregation and the Finance and Extension Board pay like amounts.

COBOURG-

Alderville.—It was agreed that grant be raised to rate of \$200 for the last nine months of 1942.

LINDSAY-

Carnarvon-Minden.-Agreed to pay \$14, balance of moving expenses.

OSHAWA---

Scugog.—Agreed to allow grant of \$5.00 per week for student supply until the meeting of the board; this being necessary due to illness of the minister.

NORTH BAY-

Sprucedale.—The Executive decided that the regulations of the Board did not permit of Rev. W. R. Lacey being paid at a higher rate of salary than that of a single, ordained minister.

NORWAY HOUSE-

Cross Lake.—A travel allowance of \$50 was voted for 1942.

Pekangecum.—A bill of \$90 was presented from the Hudson's Bay Company for the transportation of Mr. William Everett and his effects from Berens River to Pekangecum, where he was to act as Interpreter for the missionary. Referred to the Board.

WINNIPEG-

Winnipeg, All Peoples'.—It was reported that the caretaker had retired because of ill health, after thirty years' service. It was agreed to vote \$300, being approximately three months' salary, in recognition of long and faithful service.

PRINCE ALBERT WEST-

Davis.—It was decided that Mr. Walter Poulton should be paid for week-end supply on the same basis as all the other students.

SWIFT CURRENT-

Neville-Vanguard.—The question of overpayment to Rev. R. A. MacDonald, who left the field November 1st to enlist, was referred to the Secretaries.

GRANDE PRAIRIE-

Hythe and Beaverlodge.—Agreed that travel grants at the rate of \$50 be allowed for each of these fields.

ST. PAUL-

Bonnyville—A grant of \$50 was voted for moving expenses.

THREE HILLS-

Trochu.—It was agreed to pay one-half cost of furniture purchased for the manse, at a total cost of \$199.67; the understanding being that the manse will now be classed as "furnished".

WAINWRIGHT-

Edgerton.—Presbytery requested favorable consideration of moving expenses of \$75. Referred to Secretaries, with power.

KOOTENAY-

Nakusp and New Denver.—Agreed to allow travel grant at rate of \$75 for 1942.

PRINCE RUPERT-

Kispiox—Educational Grant.—Educational grant of \$20 a month was voted for the missionary's daughter for the school year 1942-43.

VANCOUVER-

Alert Bay.—It was requested that grant at the rate of \$410 be allowed to make up salary of retired minister; and also that the Board underwrite the moving expenses. Referred to the Board.

VICTORIA-

Ucluelet.—(a) Moving Expenses.—A grant of \$21 was voted for moving expenses. (b) Salary Grant.—Agreed that salary be at rate of \$1,250 instead of \$1,050, from July 1st, 1942.

Koksilah.—Agreed to pay three-quarters of moving expenses, totalling \$172.

Statements By Superintendents of Missions

Brief statements regarding the work in their respective areas were made by the Superintendents of Missions.

Greetings to Retired Superintendents

The Secretary reported that Rev. Mark Fenwick, D.D., whose health prevented his being present at any of the sessions of the Board, had requested that his greetings be conveyed to the members.

The Secretary was rquested to extend greetings from the Board to Dr. Fenwick, to all other retired Superintendents of Missions, and to the former Chairman of the Board, Rev. D. C. MacGregor, D.D.

Home Department Extension of Sunday School

Report for 1942-

A Report was presented, showing that in 1942, 105 requests for supplies for Sunday Schools in various Conferences had been received. Materials were sent out which, at regular retail prices, would have cost over \$600.00; but, in view of the discount granted by the Publishing House and the contributions received from the places served, the net cost amounted to only \$160.59, one-half of which was paid by the Board of Home Missions and one-half by the Board of Christian Education.

Grant for 1943-

It was agreed that this co-operative effort be continued and that a grant up to \$250 be placed in the estimates.

Re Further Extension of Work-

The Secretary reported that conferences on the possibility of further extending this work had been held with the Secretaries of the Board of Christian Education. The following outline of a new proposal was submitted by the Board of Christian Education and is now presented to the Board:

The following plan is under consideration:

- 1. NAME.—"Home Department Extension" is not a very attractive name. The Anglican term "Sunday School by Post" is better, but we would not likely wish to use the same caption. If we could get a name which would include the three ideas—the "Home", the "Sunday School" and the "King's Mail", it would serve.
- 2. PURPOSE.—The purpose of the department is two-fold: (a) to reach as large a number as possible of isolated families and individuals, particularly families with children out of touch with Church and Sunday School services, with a view to supplying them with a means of studying the Bible through the use of Sunday School lesson material, and providing a means of review and report by personal visit or mail; (b) to encourage the formation of a "preaching point" and "Sunday School" in as many of these situations as possible.
- 3. ORGANIZATION.—If this work is to be enlarged to any serious extent we will need a much more definite plan of organization and administration than we now have. Would some such organization as the following be suitable?
- (a) National.—An Inter-Board Committee consisting of, say, one Secretary and one other representative from each of the Boards concerned, namely: Home Missions, Christian Education, Publication, and the Woman's Missionary Society to give general supervision.
- (b) District.—An area committee in each Home Mission Superintendent's district consisting of, say, the Superintendent of Home Missions, the Field Secretary for Christian Education where one exists, a supervisor and a group of three or four key workers.

- 4. SUPERVISION.—Close supervision will be necessary, and will require careful study and the expenditure of some money. Would the following suit?
- (a) National.—A Supervisor appointed by the National Committee set up under 2(a) above, who would be located in one of the headquarters offices, and would give at least part-time supervision to this work.
- (b) District Supervisor.—Nominated by the district Committee and appointed by the National Co-operative Committee, probably on parttime, with whom would be associated a group of voluntary workers for supervising and administering the work in the area concerned. Such a person would at first be on a minimum part-time paid basis.
- 5. LITERATURE.—Present lesson helps could be used until a sufficiently large constituency was built up to consider the provision of a special issue of our Sunday School papers and periodicals adapted to this particular type of work along somewhat the lines provided by the "Sunday School by Post".
- on by the groups interested, on some agreed upon plan, so as to avoid overlapping and overlooking of any needy territory. Ministers in Home Mission areas and student missionaries would be encouraged to develop within the local church the promotion and supervision of the plan. Consideration may also be given as time goes on to the employment of vans for the aggressive promotion of this work, particularly in the more inaccessible Home Mission areas.
- 7. BUDGET.—Careful consideration would need to be given to the necessary budget for this work. This would not need to be very large at first, but would grow as the work developed.

On motion, it was agreed that general approval be given to these recommendations and that the Secretaries be given power to have further conference with the Secretaries of the Board of Christian Education; the matter of appropriation to be left to the Executive.

Installation of Superintendents of Missions

Attention was drawn to the direction of the Ninth General Council that all General Council Officers and Field Secretaries, Superintendents of Missions, etc., shall be inducted to their offices in the name of the General Council or by the Boards they serve.

It was decided that the Secretaries be asked to prepare an Order of Service which may be used for the Induction of Superintendents of Missions in the future.

Report Re Bissell Bursary Fund

· The Secretary reported that for the academic year 1942-43 the Trustees of the Bissell Bursary Fund had awarded 14 Bursaries, totalling \$950, as follows:

On motion, the Report was received and adopted.

Gift of Fairfield Property to the United Church of Canada

Dr. Dorey made a statement regarding the gift of a sum of money by Mr. W. A. McGeachy to purchase the 13 acres of land on which the original Fairfield village and church were established by the Moravian Church in 1792. This gift is, on condition that when a cairn is erected to commemorate the arrival of the Moravian missionaries, there be also a tablet to the memory of Mr. McGeachy's parents, who made their home in the neighborhood.

It was agreed-

- (1) That the Board recommend to the Executive of the General Council the acceptance of Mr. McGeachy's gift, and that sincere thanks be extended to him for his generosity.
- (2) That the Board of Home Missions accept administration of the property.
- (3) That a letter be sent to both Mr. McGeachy and Mr. J. R. MacNicol, M.P., conveying the Board's appreciation of their very great interest in having this historic site restored to the Church.

Treasurer's Report

The Report of the Treasurer was presented by Rev. V. T. Mooney, D.D.

Scale of Expenses of Members

On recommendation of the Committee appointed to consider the scale of expenses of members of the Board, the following was adopted:

- (1) That members be paid the cost of railway and sleeper tickets to Toronto and return; the cost of meals en route—such cost not to exceed \$3.50 per day; and the cost of hotel and meals in Toronto—not to exceed \$4.50 per day.
- (2) That those travelling by motor car be paid on the basis of railway fare.
- (3) That the amount for Sunday Supply shall not exceed \$15.00 per Sunday.

Fund for Retired Lay Workers

Appropriation for 1943-

It was decided to appropriate \$3,000 for the Fund for Retired Lay Workers for 1943.

Grant to Miss M. Bawden-

It was agreed to make a grant from this Fund of \$25.00 per month to Miss M. Bawden for 1943.

Re Gasoline Quota

On motion, it was decided that the Secretaries be given authority to take whatever action they deem necessary regarding the matter of gasoline rationing so far as the Superintendents of Missions and other workers under the Board of Home Missions are concerned.

Appointment of Representatives of Home Mission Board

It was decided that no action should be taken regarding this suggestion but that the Secretary be requested to write to Mr. Gilmour, thanking him for his interest in the matter.

Introduction of Workers

Before the adjournment of the Board for a social half-hour, the following Superintendents of City Mission Institutions in Toronto, together with their staffs, were welcomed and introduced to the Board: Rev. W. A. Hunnisett, Fred Victor Mission; Rev. J. Lavell Smith, Church of All Nations; Rev. Fred Smith, Queen Street Church; Rev. W. E. Wilson, King Street Church; Miss M. Barnes, St. Christopher House; Rev. and Mrs. L. Sauro, of the Italian Church, and Mrs. M. E. L. Mercer.

Mrs. C M Loveys introduced Miss Evelyn E. Mathews, under appointment to Kirkland Lake, Ontario; and Dr. Cochrane introduced four recent graduates who have been appointed to fields in the West—Rev. John W. Wilkinson, Rev. A. Glen Eagle, Rev. A. E. Young and his wife, and Rev. H. Donald Joyce and his wife, as well as three young women, representative of those appointed to supply mission fields for the summer.

Address By Dr. A. E. Archer

Dr. A. E. Archer, Superintendent of the Lamont Hospital, addressed the Board on "The New Canadian Problem in Canada To-day.".

The Chairman expressed the thanks of the Board to Dr. Archer.

Report of Committee on Appointment of Students

The Report of the Committee on the Appointment of Student Missionaries was presented by Rev. M. C. Macdonald, as follows:

- 1. During the summer of 1942, 178 students served the Board under its co-operative plan (ordinarily called the "Students' Pool") and 17 others were appointed on a special basis. Once again the Board is indebted to the Minister and members of Chalmers Church, Ottawa, for some extra money for the support of four students during the summer.
- 2. The Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students was carried out again in 1942. With the aid of \$1,054.77 from Designated Gifts and an extra grant by the Executive of \$277.80, together with the regular appropriation of \$30,000, we were able to pay each student \$13 per week, plus allowance for board and travel on the field. The previous year the students received \$11.50 per week.
- 3. The Executive decided that the Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students should be continued for 1943.
 - 4. The Committee have appointed to fields this year 169 Students.

They are distributed in the different Superintendencies as follows:

In addition to those appointed for full-time service, upwards of 20 students will give week-end supply from college centres.

- 5. A difficult situation confronted the Committee to secure a sufficient number of students to man the fields for the summer of 1943. The accelerated theological course made it impossible to appoint students in Second Year Theology. The sources of supply were therefore limited to those in First Year Theology and those in Arts. This meant that many who have been appointed have little or no experience. Of the total of 193 who made application 16 have withdrawn. It should be stated that since the meeting of the Committee a few additional applications have been received.
- 6. To help out in the emergency the Secretaries, with the co-operation of the Superintendents, have been able to secure a number of students from other sources than those who are candidates for the ministry. Of the 169 so far appointed 21 are not candidates for the ministry. They are young men and women who, in view of the emergency, volunteered their services to the Church. Our difficult situation was further solved by the Superintendents reducing the number of their requests for students and thus making appointments only to the most needy fields in their Superintendencies. We are pleased to report that a reasonably fair distribution has been made of the students available and that only a very limited number of fields will be left without some form of service this coming summer.
- 7. The Secretaries, in co-operation with the Superintendents of Missions, have taken up with the Officers Commanding in the different college centres, the matter of securing for our student missionaries postponement of attendance at summer military training camps. The position we took was that the work done by our students on mission fields was a real national service. (It should be added here that all of these students take the 110 hours' required military training during the college term.) We are glad to report that our efforts in this direction have been most successful and that the Officers approached have given us every encouragement to believe that students who will serve on mission fields will be able to secure postponement of the two weeks' camps. Only one Commanding Officer has definitely refused to grant postponement to students at his college centre.
- 8. The Committee recommends that the appropriation for student work for this coming summer be \$30,000.

On motion, the Report was adopted and a grant of \$30,000 was approved for 1943.

Statement Re Arrangements for Accelerated Summer Course

The Secretary reported the arrangements made by the Sub-Executive of the General Council for three summer courses for the third year students in the Theological Colleges, in accordance with the decision of the General Council to accelerate the training, in order that some more of the vacant fields might be supplied by ordained men in 1943.

The Board resolved:

- (1) To direct the Secretary to write to the Executive of the Council, expressing gratification that the Church had thus helped so materially the work of Home Missions this year.
- (2) To suggest to the Executive of the General Council that, if the war continue into next year, careful consideration be given to the question of holding a further summer course for third year men in 1944.
- (3) To inform the Executive of the General Council that it had been reported to the Home Mission Board that several first year men were being admitted to the 1943 summer course, and to ask the Executive to express an opinion as to whether the action of the General Council permits such students to enroll in this accelerated course and thus finish their theological studies in eighteen continuous months.

Re Suggestion to Amalgamate the Mission Boards of the Church

The Secretary introduced the matter of the suggestion to amalgamate the Mission Boards of the Church.

The Chairman made a statement regarding the proposal and asked the Board to express its opinion.

On motion, it was resolved that the Board disapprove of the suggestion to amalgamate the Mission Boards of the Church.

Request for Appointment of Missionary Under the W.M.S.

A request was presented from the Burin Presbyterial, endorsed by the Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee, that a missionary-at-large be appointed in the Burin Presbytery, to serve under the joint supervision of the Woman's Missionary Society and the Superintendent of Missions.

It was agreed to refer this request to the Executive.

Confirmation of Appointment of Missionaries Under the W.M.S.

On motion, the following appointments of missionaries under the Woman's Missionary Society to Home Mission Institutions were confirmed:

The Secretary made reference to the conferring of the degree of Doctor of Divinity by Victoria University upon Rev. K. J. Beaton, Secretary of the Committee on Missionary Education, and the Board expressed to Dr. Beaton its appreciation of the honour conferred on him by his Alma Mater.

Dr. Beaton addressed the Board and presented lantern slides and movie films of various phases of missionary work.

Suggestion Re Sharing of Services of Ministers

Rev. J. I. MacKay presented a statement regarding this matter.

On motion, it was resolved that the Board submit the following suggestion to the Executive of the General Council as worthy of its serious consideration:

That any community that has at least two United Churches should be willing to release one of its ministers for a period of five or six months (perhaps May to October) to undertake work on a vacant field, ont merely to preach on Sundays but to live there and look after all the pastoral work. The two congregations would unite for the period, having alternate services in the two churches and yet carrying on all the regular church activities. Perhaps each of the two ministers could be away for two and a half or three months. It would be up to the minister himself to decide whether or not he would take his family with him. His congregation would be expected to pay his full salary and the field to which he went would look after his board, transportation and car expenses on the field, and turn over whatever else could be raised to the Missionary and Maintenance Fund or the Board of Home Missions.

The minister undertaking to help in this way would be able to give such service on some fields as they have not received for years and would undoubtedly be the means of greatly improving their condition.

Congregations entering into such a plan with understanding and enthusiasm would manifest fine unselfishness and have the privilege of sharing in a great enterprise.

Report of the Literature Committee

Rev. M. C. Macdonald presented the Report of the Literature Committee, showing that in 1942-43 110,000 copies of the booklet, "Homeland Ministries," issued jointly by the Home Mission Board, the Missionary and Maintenance Committee and the Board of Evangelism and Social Service (War Services); 110,000 copies of the pamphlet, "Pathways of Light in Newfoundland and Labrador," issued jointly by the Board of Home Missions and the M. and M. Committee; and 110,000 copies of the pamphlet, "Sharing His Service", had been printed. The total net cost of literature and publicity, including publications issued, Monthly Bulletin, Slides and Lantern Supplies, postage, etc., was \$3,178.70. Orders for literature were received from 1,357 pastoral charges—slightly under 50% of the total number.

The following recommendations of the Committee were approved:

- (1) That the following be issued in 1943:
 - (a) Large illustrated booklet, entitled "From Lakes to Northern' Lights," to be published jointly by the Home Mission Board, M. and M. Committee and War Service Committee, dealing with the 12 different phases of Home Mission activity carried on by our Church from the Atlantic to the Pacific, with the emphasis on a new dimension of responsibility, namely, the Northern development in the different sections of the Church.
 - (b) Eight-page pamphlet, dealing with Home Mission Work in the Maritime Conference.
 - (c) Eight-page pamphlet—in story form, relating outstanding instances or experiences, as recorded by our workers in different parts of the Church.
 - (d) Brief leaflet, telling facts about Home Mission Work—in question and answer form.
 - (e) Leaflet for pastoral use, to meet need for literature to be circulated among people who are indifferent regarding their obligations to the Church.
- (2) That the total budget for Literature and Publicity be \$4,500, with suggested distribution as follows:

Estates

Charles H. Burritt Estate—

It was agreed to confirm the action of the Secretary in consenting, on behalf of the Board (which is a beneficiary under this Will) to the transfer of a small property in California to Mr. Wilfred B. Verity, nephew of the deceased, and to have a deed and assignment of sale agreement re Manitoba property made to the Executor personally—the action having been taken in each case in order to avoid the expense of taking out ancillary letters in California and Manitoba, respectively.

Alexander Scott Estate-

It was reported that the late Alexander Scott had bequeathed to the Home Mission Board one-third of his estate, the income from which would amount to approximately \$300 annually, this amount to be used for the prosecution of such Missionary work as the deceased had supported during his lifetime. The Board was requested to make suggestions regarding the use which should be made of this money.

١

This matter was referred to the Secretaries, with power, and it was directed that the gratitude of the Board be conveyed to the members of the Scott family.

Statement By Director of the Committee on Camp and War Production Communities

Rev. Wm. Fingland, Director of the Committee on Camp and War Production Communities, gave a detailed report regarding this work. Miss Ullman, Field Secretary, also made a brief statement regarding her work.

On motion, the Board adopted the following resolutions:

- (1) That we express appreciation of Mr. Fingland's address.
- (2) That we express gratification that this organization has been set up and that it is functioning so satisfactorily, not only in our own Church, but also inter-denominationally.
- (3) That \$1,000 be placed in the Budget for this work until funds are realized from the Church campaign.
- (4) That the thanks of the Board be extended to St. Andrew's Church, Niagara Falls, for the release of their minister in order that he might undertake this work.

Co-Operation With Other Churches

The Secretary presented a Memorandum as to a Reply by the House of Bishops to a Communication from the United Church of Canada on Co-operation along certain lines.

On motion, it was resolved:

- (1) That the Board express its gratification that approaches have been made to the Church of England in regard to Co-operation and that the conversations are to continue throughout the year.
- (2) That the Board record its appréciation of the fact that approaches in regard to co-operation have also been made to other Communions; and
- (3) That we ask the Superintendents and Conference Home Mission Conveners to get official representatives of local areas together, in order that they may report to the Secretary of the Board all the areas where in the opinion of the United Church co-operative arrangements are desirable or possible.

Report of the Committee on Hospital Work

The Report of the Committee was presented by Dr. J. A. Cormie. It was considered item by item and adopted as follows:

Statement re Hospital Work-

Hafford Hospital.—Pursuant to the resolution of the Board, the Secretaries during the year have investigated the possibility of making use of this hospital. It was offered to the Department of Labour in connection with the evacuation of the Japanese, but the offer was not accepted. The Municipalities were written to, to ask if they were prepared to take it over, and finally word was received that they had passed hospitalization by-laws, but that no doctor was available. The Secretaries communicated with the Department of Health in Saskatchewan and with the Federal Government, with a view to finding out if this hospital could be used, and have received word to the effect that it does not seem to be needed. Consequently, it still remains closed.

George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake.—At the end of November, Dr. W. C. Powell notified the Secretaries that he had bought a practice in Ontario and was leaving right away. Steps were taken to try to find a successor, and finally Dr. Albert Dobson, who had completed his work as an intern in the Vancouver General Hospital, was appointed, and his services began on January 1st.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton.—In the fall, Dr. Eric Austin was called up for military service and left the hospital. The Executive appointed Dr. Donald Murphy, the Assistant, as Acting Superintendent—which is in effect up to the present. There should be a second doctor appointed to this hospital.

Radio Broadcasting

The Secretary presented:

- (1) Resolution of Special Committee of Saskatchewan Conference, requesting establishment of Radio Broadcast Service through the Prince Albert Station CBKI and sufficient grant to cover cost of same.
- (2) Communication from Special Committee of Alberta Conference, re setting up of Radio Committee for the whole Church.
- (3) Communication from Grande Prairie Presbytery, re setting up of "Correspondence Broadcasting Sunday School" for the Peace River Area.
- (4) Recommendations as adopted by the Board of Evangelism and Social Service.

On motion, it was resolved that this Board-

- (1) Record its approval of the work of the National Religious Advisory Council to date and express the hope that the policy of the Council, including its responsibility under the CBC of this Council representing all Canadian Churches in religious broadcasting, be further clarified.
- (2) Recommend, in conjunction with possible similar action of the Boards of Christian Education and Evangelism and Social Service, that the Executive of General Council appoint a Commission on Church and Radio to study the general field of religious broadcasting, with the understanding that every Conference of the Church be represented on the Commission and that the Report be made to the Executive of the General Council as soon as possible.
- (3) Send warm greetings and good wishes to Rev. Dr. J. S. Thomson, General Manager of the CBC.

- (4) Heartily approve of the action of the CBC in appointing a labour representative and urge that a representative be chosen for agriculture.
- (5) Heartily commend the CBC for the Forum programmes, Farm, Labour, and more recently the Forum on Reconstruction, and further urge that the place of religion be recognized by arranging for one or more programmes of the Forum on Reconstruction to be presented by representatives of Canadian Churches.
- (6) Give hearty approval to the "Dramas from the Bible" series.
- (7) Recommend that special broadcasts should feature:
 - (a) Distinctive United Church Ministry.
 - (b) Other Languages than English.
 - (c) Greater use of local stations.
 - (d) Some possible immediate experiments.

Report of the Committee on Rural Work

The Report of the Committee on Rural Work was presented by Rev. J. G. Gorwill. It was considered item by item and adopted as follows:

The Committee reports as follows:

(1) The essay competition ordered by the Board a year ago was held but it met with very little response from ministers and students. Only four essays were submitted and of these some were very sketchy. Awards have been made as follows:

Ministers—1st—R. R. W. McGregor, Kelliher, Sask. 2nd—W. L. Cullis, Kirkland Lake, Ont.

Students-W. E. Mann, Emmanuel College.

Your committee feels that this failure of the competition to attract the attention of our workers does not indicate any lack of interest in rural problems among the more thoughtful men in the service of the Board. Evidence of real interest and research in this field is not lacking in letters that come in, and in contacts with our men. It appears, however, that for this one year, the essay competition failed to appeal to any considerable number of men.

(2) Rural Life Conferences were held last fall in four centres in Ontario,—in Brant-Wentworth, Oxford, Lambton and Essex—and each of them met with surprisingly good response. In one or two cases there is evidence of real development of interest in rural life and its problems since the conference was held. Each of the Conferences was visited by Dr. W. J. Walton, of the Town and Country Committee of the Methodist Church, U.S.A.

Your Committee attempted to organize similar conferences in Western Canada but met with no success. This Committee was also responsible for securing Rev. T. L. Tripp, Secretary for Rural Work in the Congregational Churches across the Line, as a Leader at the Lorrain Fellowship in September.

- A similar series of conferences is to be held in the Maritimes in May, with Dr. Mark Dawber as visiting leader.
- (3) An order of service for Rural Life Sunday has been prepared this year by Revs. G. W. Morrison of Wyevale and A. G. Reynolds of Annan, and they are being offered to the Church free of cost. About 20,000 copies of last year's order were circulated.
- (4) Some small progress has been made in establishing experimental larger parishes. Since the last meeting of the Board, Rev. Theodore Tucker was appointed to an area surrounding Huntsville, which includes the former Aspdin, Utterson and Hillside charges. He has had the help of a W.M.S. worker and a part-time student. Another experiment is being made within Toronto East Presbytery, under very different conditions. The minister of Stouffville, Rev. Douglas Davis, has undertaken supervision of the former Goodwood and Lemonville charges, and is to have year-round student assistance.

The Committee recommends-

- (1) That the matter of an essay competition for this year be left in the hands of the secretaries and the chairman of the committee, and that, prior to setting up the competition, consultation be had with superintendents and others as to the form it should take.
- (2) That further experiment be made in the setting-up of larger parishes, it being clearly recognized that they are experimental pieces of work and that special supervision must be given them. It is the opinion of your committee that, even though shortages in the supply of ministers are serious, these charges should be given adequate supply and equipment, to give their work a chance of success.
- (3) That every effort be made to correlate the rural work of this Board with adult education work under other auspices, e.g., the Farm Radio Forums, the Canadian Association for Adult Education, etc. We are convinced that Home Mission Committees of Presbyteries should undertake to secure the interest of Church groups in these undertakings.
- (4) That \$300 be granted for the Rural Summer Schools in Newfoundland.
- (5) That the Budget of this Committee for 1943 be \$600.
- (6) That the Board record its appreciation of the help given by Dr. Mark A. Dawber, Dr. W. J. Walton and Dr. T. L. Tripp, to this Committee, and that our thanks be expressed to the Home Missions Council for securing these men for us.
- (7) That it be an instruction to the Secretaries of the Board to prepare, for the use of the Church, a pamphlet on Rural Work and its Problems, as dealt with by the Speakers at the meeting of the Committee on Rural Work, Rav. Norman H. MacKenzie and Rev. Douglas A. Brydon.

Address By Dr. E. A. Corbett

In connection with the presentation of the Report of the Committee on Rural Work, Dr. E. A. Corbett, Secretary of the Canadian Association for Adult Education, addressed the Board on the subject, "Education for Action".

The thanks of the Board were expressed to Dr. Corbett for his very informative and stimulating address.

Home Missions Council of North America

On motion, a grant of \$400 was voted for 1943.

Proposal to Form the North American Council of the Churches of Christ

Rev. Gordon Sisco, D.D., Secretary of the General Council, spoke on the proposal to form "The North American Council of the Churches of Christ".

Statement Re Commission on the Church, the Nation and World Order.

Dr. Sisco made a brief statement regarding the work of the Commission on the Church, the Nation and World Order, which was set up by the General Council.

The Chairman expressed the thanks of the Board to Dr. Sisco.

Report of the Committee on Indian, Oriental and Marine Work

The Report of this Committee was presented by Rev. W. P. Bunt. It was considered item by item and after amendment was adopted as follows:

Indian Work

Statement re Work-

During the year the following changes in appointments have been made:

Grand River.—Rev. W. W. Shoup retired on account of ill health and was replaced by Rev. U. Cronhielm, a missionary of the China Inland Mission, on furlough in Canada.

Moraviantown.—This year marked the 150th Anniversary of the first Communion Service held by the Moravians at Fairfield on July 12th, 1792. A service celebrating the event was held in the church at New Fairfield on Sunday, July 12th, 1942, which was largely attended.

Berens River.—Mr. L. I. Schuetze left the service of the Church after many years of faithful work. Rev. F. G. Stevens, D.D., was appointed to take his place, temporarily.

Fisher River.—During the year Mr. C. D. Street, who has been in the Indian work for many years, enlisted. He was replaced by Mr. C. E. Bickle.

Round Plains.—Mr. Fetch, the missionary-teacher, went into the army and has been replaced by Mrs. Hilliard.

Bella Coola.—Rev. Hillis Wright retired from the ministry. Rev. Thomas Moore was settled by the British Columbia Settlement Committee in his stead

Kispiox.—Rev. D. More, who taught the school for four years, went back to Ocean Falls into the regular pastorate, and has been succeeded by Rev. Andrew Rutherford as missionary-teacher.

Kitzegucla.—This field was vacant from July 1st to December 31st. Mr. R. A. Argue was appointed missionary-teacher and began his work about January 1st.

Klemtu.—This field is temporarily supplied by Mr. A. Neasloss, native preacher.

Port Simpson.—Vacant from July 1st until the end of February—has been filled by the appointment as missionary of Rev. G. Harold Wilding, from Oil Springs, Ontario.

The thanks of the Board are due to Dr. Fiddes and Miss French of the W.M.S. for carrying on the services during the vacancy.

Indian Education.—Residential Schools have carried on their work under very great difficulties.

- (1) Attendance.—Many of the Indians took advantage of the possibility of getting employment in the harvest field and in other work during the summer, and consequently they were very late in getting back to their reserves, with the result that the average attendance at the Residential Schools for the last two quarters of 1942 was exceedingly low. Some Schools, of course, suffered more than others, and in a great many cases, whilst there was some reason for delay in the children's returning, it must be said that the Indians took advantage of the situation and made it the excuse rather than the reason for their children not returning.
- (2) Staff.—Fortunately there have been no changes in the principalships, but there have been very many amongst the staffs. Military service has called many men and higher wages have induced many other men and women to leave.
- (3) Supplies.—Priorities and the curtailment of many lines have made the problem of supplying the needs of the Schools very difficult. The fine co-operation of the Wholesale Houses with which the Principals do business is greatly appreciated.
- (4) Finances.—The general increase in costs has made the problem of carrying on the work of the schools very difficult. The Committee representing the Churches co-operating with the Government in Indian Education, (Anglican, Presbyterian, R.C., United) waited on the Minister on January 12th, and presented their case for increased grants, restoration of cuts in pupilage, and for an increase of school accommodation after the war. The Minister has promised serious consideration of these requests.

Oriental Work

Statement re Japanese in Canada-

The following statement is presented:

When the Board adjourned last April, the general outline of the re-location of the Japanese was more or less indicated. In any event, the matter was carried through in the following way: The Japanese were all evacuated from the protected areas, although the last movement only took place towards the end of the year. They are now located as follows:

- 1. Tashme.—This is a large concentration camp, in which there are about 2,500 Japanese 15 miles inland from Hope, B.C. It was formerly the 14 Mile Ranch. The Japanese are accommodated in temporary houses 14x28, of which there are many, and a smaller number in single rooms, with a community kitchen, made out of some large barns which were on the property.
- 2. Greenwood.—There are about 1,000 Japanese located at Greenwood, which is an abandoned mining town along the line of the Kettle Valley Railway. A considerable proportion of the people of Greenwood are Roman Catholic.
- 3. Grand Forks.—This is not the same type of settlement. The people went there from the coast on their own initiative and at their own expense. About 350 Japanese people have found homes in farm houses and employment on the land around Grand Forks. There is a settlement at Alpine Inn on Christine Lake, not very far off, where the people are also self-supporting.
- 4. Slocan Valley.—Beginning a few miles south of Slocan City, there are the following settlements: Lemon Creek, Popoff, Bay Farm, Slocan City, New Denver, Rosebery. The housing in these centres is practically all in new temporary houses. There are about 5,000 Japanese in this area.
 - 5. Sandon.—This is an abandoned mining town, half-way between New Denver and Kaslo. The people there are all accommodated in the abandoned buildings.
 - 6. Kaslo.—This town, located on Kootenay Lake, has not been altogether abandoned by the population, but there has been a very considerable movement caway from the town, and consequently there were many vacant buildings. These have been occupied by the Japanese, of whom there are about 1,000 in Kaslo.
 - '7. Minto.—This is a small community of Japanese who are self- supporting. Minto is located near Bridge River, on the P.G.E.
 - 8. There are in addition some road camps still in existence in B.C., particularly between Revelstoke and Sicamous, and they are engaged in highway building, and in the road project from Hope to Princeton. A few Japanese are left in Camps in the neighborhood of Blue River, working on the highway in that section.

- 9. The next project of re-location took some 1,200 Japanese to work in the Sugar Beet farms in the irrigated area immediately north and south of Lethbridge. The centre of this activity is Raymond and Picture Butte to the north. These people have all found accommodation in houses originally occupied by Hungarian laborers who worked in the sugar beet area, and they have had a more or less normal family life during the year.
- 10. A similar project is being carried out in Manitoba, but due to the fact that there is no irrigation in that Province, the settlement has been more widespread. The Japanese have been located in å large number of communities—roughly between the main line of the C.P.R. and the international boundary, the Red River and a line drawn north and south through Portage la Prairie. In that area there have been approximately 1,200 Japanese employed. During the winter a number of these moved from Southern Manitoba to Northern Manitoba and were employed in a lumber mill, and a considerable number found temporary employment in Winnipeg.
- 11. In Ontario, during the summer of 1942, some 360 single Japanese men, mainly Canadian-born, were employed in eight or nine centres in sugar beet and agricultural work. They were housed in buildings which either existed or were put up temporarily for their accommodation, and they were taken out to work each day by the farmers. The meals were provided by competent cooks. Centres of these operations were Glencoe, Centralia, Chatham, and other places, particularly in Kent County.

Religious Work-

Our missionaries have been engaged as follows:

Tashme.—Rev. W. R. McWilliams is in charge of the work. He has not yet been able to get a house, but his family is living in Vancouver. He divides his time between Tashme and the Camps at Revelstoke, B.C. The services of Mr. McWilliams have been invaluable—not only to the Church, but to the Canadian authorities during the year. He has done a great deal to interpret the point of view of the Canadian authorities to the Japanese. In addition, he has been indefatigable in his work as a missionary.

Grand Forks.—Mr. Ogura has been looking after the Japanese at Grand Forks and Greenwood.

Slocan Valley.—Mr. Komiyama has been living at Lemon Creek, and Mr. Nomoto at New Denver, but they have alternated their services, so that Mr. Komiyama could preach in English to the second-generation Japanese, and Mr. Nomoto to the Japanese who understand that language best.

Kaslo.—Mr. Shimizu has been serving here, and has carried on the very fine work which he did in Powell St. Church, Vancouver. He has a fine organization amongst the Japanese Christians.

Minto.—Miss Olivia Lindsay, an ordained minister and a missionary of the W.M.S., has carried on work amongst the people here.

Southern Alberta.—Mr. Kabayama has itinerated amongst the Japanese. He has a bicycle and has covered considerable territory.

In Manitoba, Mr. Akagawa, who used to be our missionary in the Fraser Valley, has represented the Church. He has been living at Morris and has visited the people as much as possible; but he has been somewhat handicapped by wet weather, and, of course, during the winter he has not been able to get around as much as he desired. He has made one or two trips to the Northern mills and has been well received.

In Ontario, Rev. L. S. Albright served the Camps until his appointment to a position in New York. Following this, no one was found to do this work, and in any case these camps were all closed in the fall.

In addition to the missionaries enumerated above, the W.M.S. have workers at Tashme, Lemon Creek, New Denver and Kaslo, and Miss H. Bartling, who is their missionary-at-large in the Lethbridge area, has also assisted in organizing work amongst the Japanese.

There are many problems in connection with the whole question of the relation of the Japanese to the Canadian people that have not been solved. The above is simply a statement of the present location of the Japanese.

Recommendations-

- (1) That, in the name of the Board, a letter of appreciation and Christian goodwill be sent to each of our Japanese pastors.
- (2) That the following statement be sent forward to the Executive of the General Council, with the request that a delegation be appointed to go to Ottawa and present it to the Prime Minister of Canada:

Re Japanese in Canada

We should, in the first place, like to express our appreciation of two matters in connection with the evacuation:

- (1) The decent, humane attitude of the individual officers, who have been responsible for the personal contact with the Japanese people. From reports that have come to us and from the observation made by officers of this Board, we feel that the Canadian people have no cause to be ashamed of the actions of the representatives, who have been dealing with the Japanese.
- (2) We should like to commend the Government and all the agencies concerned for the provision made for the medical and health care of these people. It is our opinion that this has been adquate and that the health of the various communities has been well looked after.

On the basis that all enemy aliens in Canada should be treated according to one principle, we regret that the Japanese group has received different and harsher treatment than that meted out to other alien enemy groups in Canada. We appreciate the fact that the gathering of large Japanese colonies in a particularly vulnerable area necessitated evacuation, but we feel that the methods employed—the mass evacuation, the concentration in large camps, the limits put on the movement from one place to another, the prohibition against owning or

leasing land (all of which have been applied not only to Japanese nationals, but to thousands of Canadian-born Japanese)—are wrong. No other alien group has been so treated.

I. Housing-

We particularly wish to place before the Government the fact that in our judgment the housing of the Japanese people in all the re-location centres in British Columbia is deplorable. We recognize that haste was necessary, although we are not prepared to admit that a wiser provision could not have been made, but in any event, the present housing of these people is not such as can be considered to be in any way adequate, except as a very temporary measure. We regret to note that in spite of this there is no evidence that this situation is likely to be remedied.

II. Education-

We regret that no provision was made for public school education for many months after the Japanese had been moved away from the protected area. We would draw the attention of the Government to the fact that a very large percentage of these people own property in the Province of British Columbia, which property was paying taxes for education. They had contributed, through the years of their residence in British Columbia, towards the building and equipment ef schools which their children attended, and now they were transferred to areas where there was no public school education. We are glad to note that some provision has been made in most of the communities for some form of education, but we regret to note that this education is being carried on, for the most part, by untrained teachers and is not at all in keeping with the standards of education which obtain in other communities, and particularly that the Japanese people are the only enemy alien group in Canada which is denied the ordinary privilege of public school education.

We would also draw the attention of the Government to the fact that provision for secondary education is practically non-existent in these re-location centres, and such as does exist is for the most part carried on voluntarily by the Japanese people themselves at extremely high cost and under tremendous handicaps. We are not asking that this group of enemy aliens be selected for special treatment, but we do want to emphasize that the chief sufferers from this lack of provision are all Canadian-born Japanese, who have every right to expect that they will be able to obtain the same secondary education as is given to every other Canadian. We are of the opinion that nothing is more calculated to create a feeling of unrest among the second generation Japanese, who know no country but Canada, than this denial of secondary education facilities.

III. Property-

We have noted with dismay that an Order-in-Council was passed authorizing the seting up of a Commission to proceed with the sale of all Japanese-held property in the protected area, and that the definition of this is such as to include the property of all individual Japanese, whether born in Japan or born in Canada, and that the proposal envisages the sale of the homes, the furniture, and every vestige of property which the Japanese were not able to carry with them into the re-location centres.

We would say to the Government that this method of dealing with the troublesome minority problem in Canada is fashioned altogether too much after the pattern of those against whom we are at war to be acceptable to the Christian conscience. We cannot believe that the Dominion Government, which we understand subscribes to the principles of the Atlantic Charter, can fully appreciate the effect that this Order-in-Council is producing among the Japanese people themselves, and among all those who value civil liberty and freedom in this country, and we urge that the utmost consideration be given before proceeding with this sale. We believe that this forced sale should not be proceeded with in the case of the property of individual home owners, unless they themselves request it.

IV. Occupation-

We view with the utmost alarm the fact that hundreds of Japanese will, now that the period of construction in the camps has come to an end, be without useful occupation. We realize that the Japanese people themselves have not been too eager to venture into new employment in parts of Canada unknown to them. We have noted that some have found employment in considerable number in Alberta and Manitoba.

Nevertheless, we believe that no real progress can be made in turning these thousands of "boarders" into producers until the regulations that constitute them virtual serfs are repealed. It is our belief that they should not be compelled as the only way of life to work for some other person or corporation, particularly when in too many cases they cannot in this way make a satisfactory living.

V. Enlistments-

We commend to the Government of Canada the example of the Government of the United States, which allows American Japanese to enlist in the Armed Forces. We believe that there are numbers of young Japanese Canadians, who wish to fight for our country and to serve it, and we are of the opinion that the enlistment of these men in some form of service would be a great step in allaying the fears and suspicions, which inevitably arise when they are under the present regulations.

VI. Sécond Generation Japanese-

We would urge the Dominion Government to further the establishment of Committees representing the Nisci Japanese in all the re-location communities. We believe that the dependence on the older people, which was perhaps inevitable as representatives of the communities, is not in the best interests of Canada, and the younger generation should be encouraged to set up Committees which would be recognized by the Government as the representatives of Canadian-born Japanese in their dealings with them.

Marine Work

Re Use of "Thomas Crosby" at Rivers Inlet-

Re request of the R. W. Large Memorial Hospital Board for use of the "Thomas Crosby" for the summer's work on Rivers Inlet.

That authority be given the Marine Committee of the British Columbia Conference to grant this request and to work out the details of the arrangement.

Salary of Rev. Peter R. Kelly-

Re request of Prince Rupert Presbytery, "That Rev. Peter R. Kelly, entering on his tenth year of service on the Central Mainland Marine Mission, be granted an increase of \$150 in his basic salary."

That the resolution be adopted after it has been amended to read "an increase of \$100" instead of \$150.

Statement By Rev. D. G. Ridout

Rev. D. G. Ridout, Associate Secretary of the Missionary and Maintenance Department, made a statement regarding the Fund. The Chairman expressed the thanks of the Board to Mr. Ridout.

Report of the Non-Anglo-Saxon Committee

Rev. J. I. MacKay presented the Report of the Committee on Non-Anglo-Saxon Work. The recommendations of the Committee were considered seriatim and, after amendment, were adopted as follows:

Nominations to Settlement Committees—

That nominations to St. Columba House, Montreal, Lakehead Mission, and Friendship House, London, as well as to any other vacancies which may occur, be referred to the Superintendent of the area and the Secretaries.

Appointment of Women Workers -

That this be referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent of the area concerned.

Non Anglo-Saxon Publications-

(1) That grants for 1943 be as follows:

Re Use of St. Columba House as Day Nursery-

That the proposed agréement with the Government for use of part of St. Columba House, Montreal, as a Day Nursery, be approved, when a letter is given to satisfy the Secretaries and Superintendent of Missions; and further that Rev. J. I. MacKay be the Board's representative in the signing of the contract.

French Work-

 Re Protestant Work Among French Canadians.—That Rev. J. I. MacKay make a statement to the Board.

Mr. MacKay made a statement on work among French Protestants in Quebec.

- (2) Re Recommendations of Montreal and Otawa Conference Committee—
 - (a) That \$150 be given towards obtaining French literature.
 - (b) That \$100 be requested to help in carrying on French Preaching Missions in the Province of Quebec.

It is recommended-

- (a) That \$150 be given towards obtaining French literature.
- (b) That a grant of \$500 be given to help in carrying on French Preaching Missions in the Province of Quebec.
- (3) Re Radio.—That this matter be referred to the Radio Committee.
- (4) Re Lia Croix.—That approval be given to the use of the La Croix building for the carrying on of the co-operative experiment in preaching missions during the summer months.
- (5) Placement of French-Canadian Students.—That the Superintendent and the Secretaries of the Board should arrange for the placement of the two young French-Canadian students who will be ordained in September, subject to the action of the Transfer and Settlement Committees.

Recommendations of Executive of Temiskaming Presbytery-

That the Recommendations of the Executive of Temiskaming Presbytery, as amended by the Toronto Conference Home Mission Committee, be adopted as follows:

(1) That All Peoples' (Kirkland Lake) continue as an aid-receiving charge under Rev. W. L. Cullis for another year.

- (2) That, in further consultation with Trinity, we establish a Sunday School in the south-west section of the town, under Mr. Cullis, to be staffed jointly by Trinity and All Peoples'; this to lead to regular church service.
- (3) That steps be taken to rent the Finnish Lutheran Church for meetings.
- (4) That we recommend to the Teck Township United Church Council that a thorough survey be made, to be used as a guide for future action.
- (5) That the Home Mission grant be requested for the full year at the same rate as last year.
- (6) That the grants for the support of Miss Hjelt and the W.M.S.. Worker be requested respectively as for last year.
- (7) That the Teck Township United Church Council be constituted as follows: the ministers of Trinity, Swastika and All Peoples'; the Superintendent of Missions, the President of Temiskaming Presbyterial W.M.S., three lay representatives from Trinity, and two each from Swastika and All Peoples'.
- (8) That it is the opinion of this Committee that Miss Churchill or her successor should be a community deaconess and work under the direction of the Teck Township United Church Council.

Lakehead Mission-

Re Recommendation of Superior Presbytery.—"That the work carried on at Bay Street be assumed by St. Paul's and Trinity, and that the Bay Street building be sold as soon as possible; and that the Fourth Avenue building be moved for use in the Oliver Road area on a site to be selected."

That this matter be referred to the proposed Commission on City Mission Institutions.

Re Commission on Non-Anglo-Saxon Work-

Re Recommendation of Manitoba Conference Home Mission Committee.—"That the Board of Home Missions appoint a commission to review and re-value the whole Non-Anglo-Saxon work in the light of the recent census returns and the reports of the work generally and make such recommendations as may be necessary."

That this be approved and that it be considered by the Board along with the recommendation of the City Mission Committee for the appointment of a Commission on City Mission Institutions.

Nisbet Memorial School Home-

(a) Future Policy.—That the grant be continued until the end of June, the Superintendent in the meantime exploring the possibility of sale of the property; and that the Secretaries and Superintendent then study the whole situation and report to the Executive.

(b) Banking Authority.—That Mrs. Daisy I. Tyndal be given authority to conduct business with the Royal Bank of Canada, Prince Albert, on behalf of the School Home, and that the necessary resolution be inscribed in the Minutes.

Re Work in Powell St. Japanese Building, Vancouver-

Re Recommendation of the British Columbia Conference Committee.—"That, in the opinion of this Committee, the Home Mission Board should grant permission to First United Church to make application to the Vancouver Welfare Federation for a grant of \$1,400.00 to carry on the work, such as described by Dr. Roddan, in the former Japanese building at 500 Powell Street; and further, that if such consent be not given, or if the Welfare Federation refuses to make this grant, the Home Mission Board make a grant to this work of \$1,400."

That the work which is being carried on by Rev. Andrew Roddan, D.D., in the former Japanese buildings at 500 Powell Street be continued and that the matter of grant be left to the Secretaries and the Superintendent of Missions for British Columbia.

The Appropriations Committee was asked to include \$1,800 in the Budget for this purpose.

Use of Name "New Canadian"-

That the use of the name "New Canadian" instead of "Non-Anglo-Saxon" be referred to the proposed Commission on City Mission and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work.

Re Present and Future Supply of Ministers

The following report was presented from the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents:

Your Committee has met and considered recommendations of the General Council and the Board of Home Missions and is of the opinion that little can be added to the positions previously taken.

Your Committee, however, believes that there may be in the Armed Forces a number of men brought up in Christian homes, who have not made up their minds as to how they will invest their lives when the war is over, and recommends that United Church Chaplains be urged, as opportunity arises, to place before such men the Ministry as a life work.

Your Committee further believes that on every College campus there is a group of young men of pre-military age, whose decision for life work has not yet been made, and urges that the challenge of the Ministry be presented to them.

It was resolved that Report be adopted and that Rev. J. G. Gorwill be asked to present the matter to the Committee on Recruits for the Ministry.

Report of the Committee on City Mission Work

Rev. J. C. Torrance presented the Report of the Committee on City Mission Work. It was considered item by item and adopted as follows:

Liquor-

That the Board again express its grave concern over the harmful and degrading results of the traffic in alcoholic beverages. We reiterate our statement of a year ago that, particularly because of the number of young people who have come to the towns and cities to work in war industries, and the thousands of members of the Armed Forces in all our centres of population, we believe that every possible temptation to indulge in intoxicating liquors should be removed. It is evident that this should be done, not only in the interests of sobriety and decency, but for the sake of efficiency in the country's war effort.

We express our appreciation of the stand taken by the Prime Minister of Canada in his radio address of December 16th, 1942, and pledge our support to him in maintaining the stand he has taken.

We regret exceedingly that the Province of Ontario has thus far failed to carry out the request of the Prime Minister that hours of sale of liquor be curtailed.

War Production Communities—

INASMUCH as over 750,000 Canadian citizens have removed from their homes in the towns, villages and rural districts from Atlantic to Pacific and are crowded into the industrial centres, chiefly in Central Canada, and into the areas in the vicinity of military camps and ports; and

INASMUCH as a large percentage of these are women—over 225,000 women being engaged directly or indirectly in war industries;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT we call upon our ministers and churches in these congested areas to do their utmost to meet the church and religious needs of the Newcomers, to explore new ways of Christian service, to take the ministrations of the church to the people even though they may not attend the regular services and organizations in large numbers, and to exhibit the grace of friendliness to the 'strangers within our gates'.

Your Committee recommends that a copy of the above resolution be forwarded to the Official Boards of the Churches in the areas chiefly concerned.

Appreciation of City Mission Staffs-

The Church at Large owes a deep debt of gratitude to the Superintendent and staffs of our various city missions for their unceasing devotion and loyalty to the difficult tasks and discouraging problems with which they are constantly confronted.

Resolution Re Commission on City Missions-

WHEREAS all the work carried on in the City Missions and Institutions under the Board of Home Missions was started before 1925 or shortly after Union;

Whereas the recommendations of the Committee on Non-Anglo-Saxon work in 1933-36 have not been fully considered in the years since, because of the pressure of other problems caused primarily by the depression, drought and the war;

WHEREAS recommendations of the Urban Commission of 1936-38 in regard to City Missions were referred to the Board of Home Missions among other bodies for further study;

AND WHEREAS it does not seem fair to our faithful and effective workers in our City Missions to ask them to continue year by year unless the Board acquaints itself more thoroughly with the objectives, the methods and the future of these Institutions;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT-

- (a) The Board appoint a Commission or Committee to evaluate the work of our City Missions and Institutions in both the Anglo-Saxon and Non-Anglo-Saxon communities, inquiring into their methods of work and their objectives, and suggesting any changes thought desirable;
- (b) The Commission, or Committee, be authorized to study, also, all of the Non-Anglo-Saxon work of the Board—rural and urban.
- (c) The Committee, or Commission, report at the meeting of the Board in 1944;
- (d) The Committee, or Commission, be named by a committee consisting of the Chairman and the members of the Board in Toronto.

Post War Immigration As Related to Home Mission Work

A recommendation was presented from the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents, which, after amendment, was adopted as follows:

That the Board request the Executive of the General Council to refer to the Committee on the Church, the Nation and World Order the recommendations and suggestions herewith submitted:

- (1) That we request the Dominion Government to declare its willingness to bear its fair share of whatever burden may be involved if an international Commission thinks a post war redistribution of population to be necessary for world peace and welfare.
- (2) That the Government of Canada be requested to appoint a commission to make a careful scientific examination as to the number of immigrants for whom, under post war conditions, this country can reasonably be expected to provide a satisfactory livelihood, and that on this commission there be representation from the Churches, labour, agriculture, business and other elements in our national life.
- (3) That upon receiving the report of the above Committee the Government be asked to declare its policy as to the number of immigrants we are willing to receive within the decade following the conclusion of the war.
- (4) That, while expressing the hope that we may have a considerable immigration from Great Britain, we call upon the Government to enact that, in establishing reasonable quota limits for admission to

this country, there shall be no discrimination because of racial origin when guarantees have been received as to good character and sound health.

- (5) That commercial interests be not permitted to promote immigration, and that per capita payments for immigrants be not made to any agency interested in promoting the entry to this country of particular groups of people.
- (6) That the United Church of Canada, possibly in co-operation with other Protestant denominations, make thorough preparation to care for its fair proportion of whatever immigrants come to this country.

Miscellaneous Resolutions of Presbyteries and Conference Committees

It was agreed that the following resolutions be referred to the Apropriations Committee:

- (1) Resolutions of Halifax and Montreal Presbyteries, recommending that while the minimum salary for ministers on aid-receiving pastoral charges remains at \$1,300 per annum, with unfurnished manse, a maximum of \$1,500 be set towards which a congregation may aim without experiencing a reduction in the Home Mission grant.
- (2) Resolution of Battleford Presbytery, urging that charges of that Presbytery give serious consideration to the need for raising the salary of ministers as nearly as possible to the minimum of \$1,800, and recommending that, in any case where a charge finds it impossible to raise this amount, the Board of Home Missions supplement the salary so as to bring it as near to this standard as possible.
- (3) Resolutions of Ottawa Presbytery and the Bay of Quinte Conference Home Mission Committee, urging revision of the Board's policy re travel grant on the field.
- (4) Resolution of Carbonear Presbytery, approved by the Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee: "Whereas the cost of living for the pastoral charges in the Carbonear Presbytery has risen between 50% and 70% over that of 1939;

"And whereas even at that date the minimum salary provided a standard of living making possible only the ordinary necessities of life;

"And whereas the cost of living bonus paid in 1941 and 1942 is an increase of only 8%;

"We therefore recommend-

- "(a) That all our charges raise the highest possible amount for ministerial support, thereby leaving the Board of Home Missions free from the payment of much as possible of the regular grants.
- "(b) That the Board of Home Missions be given all possible facts as to the cost of living so that it may know the actual situation faced by the ministers and their families.

"(c) That the Board of Home Missions be asked to take into account the higher rate of increase in the cost of living which we have reason to believe has occurred in Newfoundland as compared with the rate of increase in Canada."

(For action, see Report of Appropriations Committee.)

The following Resolutions are covered by action taken in reference to the Moderator's Fund:

(5) Resolution of Prince Albert Presbytery, referred by the Board of Finance to the Home Mission Board: "Whereas General Council made provision for augmentation of salaries in case of need (Record of Proceedings 1942, P. 62 f.);

"And whereas for 1942 men on aid-receiving charges generally speaking received \$1,350, made up of salary \$1,250, and cost of living bonus of \$100;

'And whereas men on so-called self-sustaining charges where necessary received assistance to bring their remuneration up to \$1,250, but did not receive cost of living bonus;

"And whereas this difference in remuneration should not exist;

'Be it resolved that this Presbytery urge upon the Executive of General Council that it make available funds sufficient to implement the intent of General Council and remove this inequity;

"And that this provision be made retroactive for the year 1942."

(6) Resolution of Regina Presbytery.—"That this Presbytery send a letter to the Home Mission Board or some suitable authority to the effect that, if there should be, in any-year, a surplus of funds available for bonus, such bonus be not confined to aid-receiving charges, but be so used as to raise, by no matter how small an amount, the salaries of all men who are on a salary minimum basis."

It was directed that the following resolution of Yorkton Presbytery be referred to the Executive of the General Council:

- (7) "Inasmuch as it was decreed by the General Council of the United Church at its meeting in Belleville in 1942, that any surplus in Missionary and Maintenance givings up to \$50,000 per year over the revenue for 1941 should be given to the Home Mission Board to be administered by them along with the Moderator's Fund, we deplore the effort made by certain officials to divert these funds toward the wiping out of the Deficit. We feel that any such action would be a grave error:
 - (a) Because it would detract from the efficiency of the men whose salaries would be affected by depriving them of sorely needed means for meeting the present higher costs of living;
 - (b) Because while some contributors may have expected any such surplus to be used in that way,—most congregations made their contributions toward the deficit through the separate channels for that purpose and sought through the Missionary and Maintenance Fund to make better provision for meeting the present needs of our workers and our work.

(c) Because it is utterly unfair and unbrotherly for any institution to pay off a comparatively small debt at the expense of underpaid workers in its service, we feel that such action would be a poor demonstration of the principles of fairness and brotherhood which we preach and contrary to the spirit of the Master we seek to serve."

Statement by Secretary-

The Secretary made the following explanatory statement in regard to the Moderator's Fund:

- 1. The Fund was set up in 1943 by the Sub-Executive of the General Council to help ministers on supposedly self-supporting congregations who were receiving less than the Home Mission minimum. Because of the great reduction in the appropriations to Home Missions from the Missionary and Maintenance Fund the Sub-Executive of General Council realized it was impossible for the Board of Home Missions to take on these fields if the minimum salary was to be kept up even to its low level.
- 2. The administration of the Fund was committed to the Board of Home Missions.
- 3. This Fund has since its institution been carried on under three different names—the Central Emergency Fund 1936-1937, the Sustentation Fund 1938-1939, and the Moderator's Fund 1940-1942. The frequent change of name has hindered the success of the appeal. The term Moderator's Fund has misled the Church as to its purpose.
- 4. Another difficulty has been that successive Councils changed the basis of appeal. First, congregations, individuals and ministers were asked to contribute, then ministers only, and finally a change was made back to the congregations and individuals.
- 5. Another difficulty of administration arose from the fact that the Board of Home Missions did not know until the end of each year how much money was available, so it has been impossible to decide at the beginning of the year how much the grants would be. The

result has been that many men on supposedly self-supporting congregations have felt unfairly treated when compared with men on aid-receiving charges, so a number have refused to make application for a grant from the Moderator's Fund and it has been difficult to find out exactly how many men should be receiving aid.

- 6. Before giving grants from the Moderator's Fund the regulation, as adopted by the Sub-Executive of General Council, only required that the application form should be signed by the Chairman of Presbytery, the Superintendent of Missions, the Secretary of the Church and the minister himself. There was no regulation, as in the case of aid-receiving charges, that the matter should be considered and passed on by the Presbytery.
- 7. Year after year a number of congregations asked for help, and received it, where in the opinion of the Executive of the Board no real effort had been made to increase the salary, and in other cases the fields had not much excuse for a separate existence and could hardly be expected to take the full time of an ordained minister.
- 8. The last General Council, September, 1942, passed the following resolution about the Moderator's Fund:

"That the Moderator's Fund be continued and administered by the Board of Home Missions.

"That the Board of Finance be instructed to contribute to the Board of Home Missions the whole portion of increase up to \$50,000 in the receipts of 1942 over 1941 of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund. Likewise the whole portion of increase up to \$50,000 in the receipts of 1943 over 1941 of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund.

"In the event of there being no increase of the Missionary and Maintenance, receipts of 1942 over 1941 or of 1943 over 1941, the Board of Finance shall contribute to the Board of Home Missions for 1943 and 1944 (each year) the amount of the general receipts of the Moderator's Fund for 1941, viz., \$13,500.

"And, further, that the General Council instruct the Presbyteries of our Church to arrange for an official visit of every pastoral charge giving a salary of less than \$1,500 a year, urging them to raise the salary of their minister to at least \$1,500."

The Treasurer reports that there was a surplus for the Missionary and Maintenance Fund for 1942 over 1941 of \$30,500. If and when this is placed to the credit of the Moderator's Fund, the Board of Home Missions will know for the first time exactly what amount will be available for 1943, and the amount of the surplus mentioned above is more than double what has been received by subscriptions to this Fund in any year since it was instituted. At the Board of Finance, however, a resolution was passed asking the Sub-Executive to approve of giving the surplus of \$30,500 to the Debt Reduction Committee, but authorized the Treasurer to put to the credit of the Moderator's Fund immediately the same amount as would have been given if the instructions of the General Council had been followed.

Re Administration for, 1943-

The Board unanimously decided to adopt the following regulations for the administration of the Moderator's Fund in 1943:

- (a) In future the Moderator's Fund be administered, as far as grants to congregations are concerned, through Presbyteries and under the same regulations as grants to Home Mission charges are made from Home Mission funds.
- (b) Any grants decided upon from this Fund for 1943 be paid quarterly as Home Mission grants are paid.
- (c) Presbyteries be informed at once regarding this new method of administering this Fund and asked to send in requests duly completed as soon as possible.
- (d) As soon as these requests are received the Secretaries be authorized to determine what grants should be paid quarterly for 1943 retroactive to the first of the year, and their action be submitted to the first meeting of the Executive for its approval:
- (e) An effort be made to raise ministers or supplies on the Moderator's Fund in 1943 to the same level of salary as the men receiving grants from Home Mission funds, and that if at the end of the year it is found that more money is needed to do this than is at the credit of the Moderator's Fund, the Executive be authorized to make available from Home Mission money, either from regular allocation or from reserves, sufficient to carry out the above plan.

Estimates for 1944

Estimates, totalling \$680,932, were adopted for 1944.

Letters to Fields Assuming Self-Support

On motion, it was agreed that a letter of congratulation be sent to fields assuming self-support.

Report of the Resolutions Committee

The Report of the Resolutions Committee, which was presented by Rev. W. M. Mustard, was adopted as follows:

Re the Late Rev. C. W. W. Ross-

Rev. C. W. W. Ross served for most of his ministerial life among the Ukrainian people in Northern Alberta. He was Secretary and Chaplain in the Lamont Hospital for many years, and, knowing the language, was enabled to bring cheer and comfort into the lives of the sick strangers. His genial personality enabled him to break down opposition and establish friendly relations with them, so that a fine spirit was engendered and an atmosphere of cordiality maintained. Of late years he has been minister of Smoky Lake, where his ministry was highly valued and successful. Toward the end of last summer he had to give up active work. He went into Lamont Hospital in October and passed away on January 23rd, 1943. The Board of Home Missions desires to express its sincere sympathy to Mrs. Ross and her sons and daughters in their great loss.

Re the Late Dr. George Arthur, B.Sc.-

Dr. George Arthur was a medical missionary under the former Presbyterian Church in Canada. He was responsible for founding the Mission Hospital in Wakaw, Sask. He later came to Vegreville, Alberta, as Superintendent of the School Home there. This property remained with the Presbyterian Church at Union and Dr. Arthur moved to Lavoy, opened a Drug Store, and became Postmaster. His keen mind and earnest spirit made him a valued member of the local United Church and of the Presbytery of Vermilion. The Board of Home Missions extends sincere sympathy to Mrs. Arthur in her bereavement.

Re the Late Rev. Milton W. Tyndal, M.A., B.D.—

The Board of Home Missions desires to put on record its appreciation of the service of Rev. Milton W. Tyndal, M.A., B.D. After taking training at McMaster and Columbia Universities, where he distinguished himself as an able scholar, he gave himself to work in the Conference of Saskatchewan. He served very successfully at different charges and nine years ago was asked to assume the Principalship of Nisbet Memorial School Home at Prince Albert. Here his scholarship, his experience in church leadership, his splendid administrative ability, led to eminent success with the young people under his charge, as many of the graduates testify. The sympathy of this Board goes out to Mrs. Tyndal and her son, Franklin, in the hour of their bereavement.

Re the Late Mr. J., T. Blackford-

The Board of Home Missions records its sorrow in learning of the death of Mr. J. T. Blackford, for many years missionary to the Indians of Northern Manitoba. For some years he was principal of the Norway House Indian Residential School and for six years until his death on April 7th, 1943, was missionary on the Indian Reserve at Nelson House, the most northerly of our Indian Missions in Manitoba. Mr. Blackford was a devoted servant of the Church and rendered a great service to Canadian Indians. The Board extends its sympathy to Mrs. Blackford and his family and commends them for comfort to the care of Almighty God.

Sympathy—

The Secretaries are asked to send a letter of sympathy to Mr. R. M. Dingwall, of Thornloe, Ontario, on the death of his wife; to Mr. J. T. Ross, of Quebec City, who has lost his son; to Rev. A. E. Millson, of Windsor, whose son has been reported missing; and to Rev. George Pringle, D.D., whose son has been killed in action.

We would record our deep sympathy with Miss Cornforth of the Office Staff in the loss of her sister.

Appreciation-

(1) The Board of Home Missions desires to place on record its sincere appreciation of the fine missionary spirit so manifest in the army of devoted men and women serving under this Board of the Church. The Board rejoices that this year its appreciation finds tangible expression in increased grants.

- (2) To the Moderator, Dr. J. R. P. Sclater, to our Chairman, Dr. A. Lloyd Smith, and to our former Superintendent, Dr. J. C. Cochrane, this Board expresses its sincere gratitude for refreshing our souls in our periods of Devotion.
- (3) The Board records its sincere appreciation to Revs. Norman Mac-Kenzie, D. A. Brydon, William Fingland, D. G. Ridout, Kenneth Beaton, Gordon Sisco and V. T. Mooney, and to Drs. A. E. Archer and E. A. Corbett for helpful and interesting addresses during the Board meetings.
- (4) The Board expresses its thanks to the Chairman for the efficient and expeditious manner in which he has conducted the business of the Board, and to the Minute Secretary for his valuable services.
- (5) The Board expresses its appreciation of the Secretaries, Superintendents of Missions and Office Staff for their zeal, consecration and their sympathy with those who labour for the Church all across Canada and Newfoundland.

Communication From the Chairman of the War Savings Committee

A communication was presented from the Chairman of the War Savings Committee, suggesting that the Board make a contribution towards the Deficit from its Reserves.

It was decided to defer action.

Missionary Reference Library

It was agreed to vote grant at the rate of \$250 towards rental of the Missionary Reference Library and other expenses, to June 30th; question of continuance after that date to be referred to the Executive.

Report of Appropriations Committee

The Report of this Committee was presented by Dr. Dorey and adopted as follows:

Eglise du Sauveur.-Agreed to vote \$28.12 for repairs to church.

Hungarian Property.—The Finance and Extension Board requested that \$1,000 be made available from the proceeds of the sale of Community House to help complete and equip the building, which the Hungarians have purchased in the name of the Magyar Reformed Congregation of the United Church of Canada, in actord with the Model Trust Deed. Presbytery approved of the using of these premises for services of worship. It was decided to refer this matter to Montreal Presbytery for its recommendation, and then to the Executive, with power to issue.

'OTTAWA---

Gatineau.—Presbytery recommended cancellation of debt of \$3,000 on the church. Agreed that no action be taken at present.

OSHAWA-

Scugog.—The Executive referred to the Board request for grant of \$1,000 and loan of \$1,000 for new church building. No action.

RENFREW-

Calabogie.—Agreed to vote \$1,500 towards purchase price of \$2,000 for residence of minister, on condition that the congregation raise \$500.

SIMCOE-

Christian Island.—(a) Repairs to Mission House.—Agreed that repairs be made when details are received, together with a report from the Superintendent of Missions. (b) Agreed to reimburse missionary for amount of \$9.70 expended on paint and brushes. (c) Repairs to Church.—Agreed that proceeds of sale of clubhouse be used for repairs to the church.

TORONTO CENTRE-

127 Pacific Ave., Toronto.—Agreed that Secretaries have power to pay up to \$75 for repairs, but that details of proposed expenditure be submitted to the office before the work is authorized.

TORONTO EAST-

306 Woodbine Ave., Toronto.—Agreed to vote up to \$152 for reroofing house.

TORONTO WEST-

> Springhill.—Agreed to accept \$250 in full payment of amount of \$1,602 outstanding on loan.

SUPERIOR-

Fort William, First Church.—Agreed that payment of \$2,000 by June 1st, 1943, would be accepted in full settlement of the loan.

Presbytery recommended (a) that the Fourth Ave. Church, Port Arthur, be moved to the Oliver Road area; and (b) that the Bay St. buildings be sold and the work carried on by St. Paul's and Trinity.

Agreed that action be deferred until the report of the proposed Commission on City Mission Institutions has been received.

Kakabeka Falls.—Agreed to defer action on request of the Ladies Aid for loan of \$100, for completing and decorating interior of church, provided they pay off the balance of the present loan, amounting to \$28.18.

WINNIPEG-

Winnipeg, MacLean Mission.—Agreed to vote \$135 for painting exterior.

Winnipeg, Robertson House.—Agreed to vote \$100 for repairs.

BATTLEFORD-

Turtleford.—Agreed to accept \$700 in full settlement of loan; to be paid at rate of \$100 a year, without interest.

Pierceland.—(a) Manse—Agreed to grant up to \$700 for new manse; Dr. Nicol to visit the field and report. (b) Church—Action was deferred on request for loan of \$300 for equipping the building purchased for church purposes, pending report of Superintendent.

PRINCE ALBERT-

Brushwood, Hall.—Agreed to accept offer of \$200, cash, for this building.

REGINA-
