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DIGEST OF MINUTES
EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS
JUNE 23rd, 1948

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Wednesday, June 23rd, at 9:30 a.m.

The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Present: Revs. A. LLOYD Smith, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, J. R. Leng, S. H. Greenslade, A. M. Stuart, Waldemar Williams, Geo. Telford, J. G. Gorwill, and Mr. K. M. Kilbourn.

Revs. J. I. MacKay and J. A. Lyttle were present as corresponding members. Regrets were received from Mr. C. R. Racine.

Dr. S. H. Greenslade was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) Dr. Thos. Powell, in appreciation of letter of sympathy sent on behalf of the Board.
- (2) Revs. Drs. L. B. Campbell, E. Lockhart, Samuel Baggs, T. B. Pearson and Elias Eustace, in acknowledgment of letters of congratulation sent on behalf of the Board.
- (3) The Home Missions Council of North America and The John Milton Society for the Blind, expressing thanks for grants from the Board.

Sympathy

Rev. Andrew Roddan, D.D.—

The Secretary referred to the sudden passing of Dr. Andrew Roddan, Superintendent of First United Church, Vancouver. The Executive, by a standing vote, adopted the following resolution, after which prayer was offered by the Chairman:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions places on record its sorrow at the death of the late Rev. Andrew Roddan, D.D.

Dr. Roddan's ministry at First Church, Vancouver, has been outstanding. Through the medium of the Radio he became the voice of comfort, of hope and of good courage to hundreds who listened to his broadcast services.

Through the work of the Welfare Department, Dr. Roddan supplied clothing to thousands of needy persons. Through his influence as a man of God, he has greatly extended the place of the Church and the Kingdom in the city of Vancouver, and indeed throughout British Columbia.

The Executive expresses its sorrow at what seems to be the untimely passing of this Great-Heart, and its sympathy to Mrs. Roddan and the members of his family.

Reference was also made to the passing of Dr. J. H. White, former Superintendent of Missions, Dr. George N. Hazen, formerly a member of this Board, Rev. W. H. Pierce, for many years a missionary to the Indians on the British Columbia coast, and Dr. J. M. Shaver, most of whose ministry was spent in serving the New Canadians at Fort William and in Winnipeg institutional missions. It was directed that the sympathy of the Executive should be extended to the members of the family in each case.

Congratulations

The Executive extended its congratulations to the Rev. J. D. McCrae, B.A., B.D., on his election to the presidency of the Montreal and Ottawa Conference, and to Revs. Drs. J. I. MacKay, W. M. Mustard, C. D. Donald and J. W. Churchill, all of whom had been recently honoured by the conferring of the Degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Report of Action of Executive of General Council

It was reported that the Executive of the General Council had taken action on matters referred to it by the Board of Home Missions, as follows:

(1) *Re Provision of Pensions for Lay Pastors*—Referred to the Committee on Pensions for Lay Supplies which was set up by the Twelfth General Council.

(2) *Re Request for Direction* so that there might be uniformity of policy with regard to *appeals for grants by Religious Organizations*:

The Department of the Treasury was asked to consider the problem and report to the Board of Finance.

(3) *Re Income Tax Discrimination*—Referred to the Canadian Council of Churches or its Executive as a subject that might be dealt with by the delegation appointed to visit the Prime Minister.

(4) *Re Request for granting of Licenses to Administer the Sacraments to Lay Pastors* who have taken the Special Course of Study: No action was taken.

With regard to Item (4), on motion of Dr. Macdonald, it was resolved that this Executive make a representation to the General Council, expressing the strong feeling of the Board of Home Missions regarding the necessity of this permission being granted.

Secretarial Assistance Committee on Ministerial Salaries

The Secretary reported that the Committee on Ministerial salaries had requested that the Board of Home Missions provide the Committee with Secretarial assistance for a temporary period.

On motion, it was decided that the Secretaries be authorized to offer to the Committee on Ministerial Salaries the services of Dr. J. I. MacKay, for a maximum period of six months, and to adjust all details in connection with expenses, etc., as between the Committee and this Board.

Appointments

(1) It was reported that Rev. W. S. Cooke had been appointed to the Berens River Indian Mission, Norway House Presbytery.

(2) The following appointments were confirmed:

Report by Dr. Macdonald

Dr. M. C. Macdonald reported briefly on his visit to the Indian Missions and Hospitals in British Columbia and his attendance at the four Western Conferences.

Licenses to Administer the Sacraments

(1) At the request of the Newfoundland Conference, it was agreed to recommend:

- (a) That Licenses to administer the Sacrament of Baptism be granted to all Lay Supplies in Newfoundland; and
- (b) That Licenses to administer the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper be also granted to the Lay Supplies appointed to serve the following charges:

(2) It was agreed to approve the granting of a License to administer the Sacraments to Miss Ethel M. Lake, Missionary-teacher, Christian Island Indian Mission, Simcoe Presbytery,—which had been granted by the Executive of General Council, subject to recommendation of this Executive.

(3) With regard to the request of Dauphin Presbytery that this Executive recommend that Licenses to administer the Sacraments be granted to Mr. Charles

Simpson, Makaroff, and Mr. H. G. Smith, Minitonas,—no action was taken as these charges cannot be regarded as 'remote' and the regulations governing the granting of such Licenses do not apply in either case.

(4) It was agreed to recommend that a license to administer the Sacraments be granted to Mr. J. B. Glover, missionary-teacher, Ucluelet Indian Mission, Victoria Presbytery.

Radio

It was reported that the Executive of the General Council had adopted the Report of the Committee on the Re-organization of the Radio Committee to the effect that it should be reorganized along the following lines:

- (1) The Executive of the General Council shall appoint a Committee on Radio to be composed as follows: two representatives each from the Board of Home Missions, the Board of Evangelism and Social Service and the Committee on Missionary Education, with an equal number of members-at-large, chosen both from among those who are broadcasting and those who are listeners, one of whom shall be chairman.
- (2) This Committee shall have the power to appoint an Executive, which shall perform such duties as may be assigned to it.
- (3) This Committee shall be responsible for the policy and general oversight of the radio programme of The United Church of Canada. It shall prepare a budget for presentation to the Board of Finance and apportion it to the three sub-committees mentioned below. This general committee shall meet at least three times a year to receive reports from sub-committees and deal

with matters of policy. It shall be represented in the Conferences by a Committee composed of representatives from the Committee on Home Missions, the Committee on Evangelism and Social Service, the Committee on Missionary Education and Overseas Missions, and such other committees as the Conference in its discretion may decide.

- (4) The administrative work of the Committee shall be divided as follows:

First: The representatives from the Board of Home Missions, plus such other members as the Executive of that Board shall decide, will be responsible for the administration of that share of the budget which provides radio ministry in distinctively Home Mission areas. Final decision as to the areas to be included shall be in the hands of the Committee on Radio on recommendation of the Board of Home Missions or its Executive.

Second: The representatives from the Board of Evangelism and Social Service shall be responsible for the relationships of the United Church to the National Religious Advisory Council and to the various forums, etc., sponsored by the CBC; the Committee on Radio of The Canadian Council of Churches; and any other inter-denominational agencies working in the radio field in Canada.

Third: The representatives of the Committee on Missionary Education, assisted by one member each from the Board of Christian Education, the Missionary and Maintenance Department, The Woman's Missionary Society, and such members-at-large with special technical knowledge as this group may deem essential, shall be responsible for contacts with the Joint Religious Radio Committee, the Protestant Radio Commission when organized, purchase, preparation and distribution of records for use in local stations, the conduct of Training Institutes for ministers and lay readers in radio techniques, and help to United Church ministers who broadcast regularly.

It was also reported that the Radio Committee had agreed that all Radio in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia be regarded as being in Home Mission areas and thus under the Board of Home Missions.

On motion, it was agreed:

(1) That Dr. George Dorey and Dr. M. C. Macdonald be the Board's representatives on the Committee on Radio.

(2) That the Radio Committee of the Board of Home Missions consist of the following: the Secretaries, Dr. Philip Duncan, Rev. J. K. Moffat; and that the nomination of two lay representatives be referred to the Secretaries for report to the next meeting of the Executive.

Hospital Work

Mitchell Memorial Hospital—

On motion, it was resolved that this Executive authorize the sale of the Mitchell Memorial Hospital at Carrot River, Sask., with such land as may be mutually agreed upon, to the Union Hospital Board.

It was also agreed that the proceeds of the sale of the Mitchell Memorial Hospital be placed in the Property Fund to be added to the amount now held to the credit of the Mitchell Trust for Carrot River.

George McDougall Hospital—

(1) Re renewal of terms of employment of Dr. L. M. Edmunds as Superintendent: Agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries.

(2) Re Banking Authority: The local Hospital Board requested that authority be given for the replacement of Mr. C. B. Thomas by Mr. J. E. McLean as one of the signatories for the transaction of business with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Smoky Lake, Alberta.

On motion, it was resolved that the request be granted, and the following resolution was adopted:

Be It Resolved: That any two of the following three persons: Dr. L. M. Edmunds, Superintendent of the George McDougall Hospital, Miss Agnes G. McKinnon, Matron of the said Hospital, and Mr. J. E. McLean, be and they are hereby authorized for and in the name of The George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake, Alberta, to sign cheques upon the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Smoky Lake, Alberta, on behalf of the said Hospital.

Also That any two of the three persons aforementioned be and they are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to deposit with or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques, or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

And That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be hereby revoked.

(3) Building Accounts: It was reported that there was nothing further to report regarding the Building Accounts of the Hospital, which had been referred to the Executive by the Board. Agreed to refer to the next Executive.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital—

(1) Re Dr. Murphy: Dr. Dorey reported that, on the advice of the Solicitor for the United Church, Mr. A. T. Whitehead, the action of the Board in deciding that Dr. Murphy be given three months' salary in lieu of notice, was referred to a lawyer in British Columbia. Mr. Oscar Lundell, to whom the matter was referred, advised that Dr. Murphy should be given five months' salary. A meeting of the members of the Hospital Committee in Toronto was called and this was agreed to. A cheque for five months' salary and a letter terminating his employment with the Board from the date of its receipt were accordingly sent to Dr. Murphy. It was agreed to confirm the action taken by the Committee.

(2) Appointment of Superintendent: *Referred to the Secretaries*, in consultation with the Toronto members of the Hospital Committee.

(3) It was agreed that the salary of Dr. F. H. Prouse should be at the rate of \$3,500.00, with travel allowance at the rate of \$400.00, from May 1st.

(4) Residence for Second Doctor: *Referred to Secretaries*, for consultation with Mr. Bunt.

(5) Re Water Works: It was agreed to authorize the connecting of the Hospital with the water system which is to be installed by the Department of Indian Affairs; the cost to the Hospital to be approximately 10% of \$3,200.00.

(6) It was agreed to authorize the installation of a Refrigeration Unit in the Hospital, and to refer to the next *Executive* the request for an Ex-Ray Machine, Esse Stove and Automatic Stoker.

Institutional Missions

St. Paul's Italian Church, Toronto—

It was reported that Rev. L. Sauro had recovered from his recent illness and was now carrying on his duties.

All People's Missions, Niagara Presbytery—

The Secretary reported that the Executive of the Niagara Presbytery and the Home Mission Committee of the Presbytery had held a joint meeting to consider certain correspondence regarding the All People's Missions, which had been forwarded to the Presbytery by the Board of Home Missions.

It was directed that the findings of this joint meeting, which were read to the Executive, should be sent to all the members of the Board, and also the Secretary of The Missionary and Maintenance Committee, with an accompanying letter.

First Church, Vancouver—

Re Appointment of Superintendent: The Secretary reported that he had sent forward to Vancouver the names of those who had either written applying for appointment as Superintendent of First Church, or whose names had been suggested by others. A meeting of the Home Mission Committee of the Vancouver Presbytery, at which were present, also, representatives of First Church and several interested ministers and laymen, was held on June 8th. After consideration of all the names before it, the Committee decided to send forward to the Executive of the Home Mission Board the names of Rev. W. P. Bunt and Rev. H. E. D. Ashford.

After discussion, the Executive decided:

- (1) That the salary of the Superintendent of First Church should be the same as that of other Superintendents of Institutions under the Board—that is, a maximum of \$2,500.00, plus \$50.00 a month for house rent.
- (2) That a committee consisting of the Chairman, the Secretaries and Rev. Waldemar Williams, be appointed to consider the question of the appointment of a Superintendent and report to this meeting.

The Committee presented the following report, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved:

(1) That, in the judgment of this Executive, Rev. W. P. Bunt's name should not be considered for appointment as Superintendent, because of the greater importance and responsibility of his work as Superintendent of Missions in the British Columbia Conference, which constitutes a much wider field of service.

(2) That this Executive does not consider it advisable to consider the name of Rev. H. E. D. Ashford, Field Secretary of the Missionary and Maintenance Committee, inasmuch as he serves another Board of the Church and has been in his present position only two years.

(3) That, on the basis of information given and the very favourable recommendations made with regard to the Rev. R. P. Stobie (all from within the British Columbia Conference), this Executive is prepared to recommend his appointment as Superintendent of First Church.

Be it further resolved that, since the Executive believes that it is not in the best interests of this Institutional Church that the vacancy be prolonged and, if the Committee in British Columbia is agreeable to the nomination of Mr. Stobie and does not desire an extension of time to consider the matter further or to submit other names,—the Secretaries of the Board approach Mr. Stobie as soon as possible with a view to completing his appointment as Superintendent of First United Church.

Indian Work

Re Edmonton Residential School: It was reported that the Presbytery Committee on the School had recommended to the Executive:

- (a) Payment of unpaid salary of Rev. E. J. Staley, amounting to \$2,500.00.
- (b) Payment of \$3,000.00 to the School toward the present unpaid bills.

It was agreed that the matter be referred to the Secretaries, with instructions that an audited statement of the School accounts be secured and that the situation be examined by the Edmonton Presbytery and report made to the next meeting of the Executive.

Marine Work

Central Mainland Marine Mission—

(1) It was agreed to authorize the overhaul of the "Thomas Crosby" and payment of the account.

(2) It was reported that, owing to the condition of his health, the Marine Committee had requested that Captain Peter Kelly be given three months' leave of absence. It was decided that Captain Kelly should be given four months'

leave of absence, that his salary be paid during this time, and that Captain R. C. Scott be appointed to supply the work during Captain Kelly's absence.

(3) Re possible sale of "*Thomas Crosby*": Dr. Macdonald reported that the Indian Superintendent at Alert Bay had approached him regarding the possible purchase of this boat. On the recommendation of the Marine Committee, it was agreed that the boat be not sold.

Alert Bay—

Dr. Macdonald reported that while in Vancouver he had had an interview with Mr. Rayburn H. McColl, a candidate for the ministry, who was formerly in the Navy and has had special training in navigation. It was agreed that the Secretaries be authorized to approach Mr. McColl with a view to his appointment by the Settlement Committee, after his ordination, either to the Alert Bay Mission, when plans for its re-opening are completed, or to some other Marine Mission.

Immigration Work

Dr. Dorey reported on the Immigration work being carried on at the ports of Halifax, Quebec and Montreal, and also that Rev. Dr. J. J. Stam and Rev. Leon Bruijn, of the Netherlands Reformed Church, had arrived in Canada and were now engaged, under the direction of the Home Mission Board, in visiting the Dutch settlers in Ontario for the purpose of linking them up with the local United Churches.

Date of Board Meeting

It was decided that the Annual Meeting of the Board should be held April 6th-8th, 1949.

Modernizing of Manses

Adoption of Regulations—

The Board referred to the Executive the adoption of regulations for the administration of the Fund for the Modernizing of Manses. It was agreed to adopt the following:

That the Board shall consider the following items as constituting the modernization of Manses:

1. Bathroom and fixtures; and where there is no water or sewerage, the installation of pressure-tank with pump and septic tank.
2. Electric light and power.

It was also decided that all applications be approved by the Executive before payment is made.

Requests for Grants—

MONCTON PRESBYTERY:

- (a) *Little Shemogue*.—Agreed to grant \$127.50, being one-half of estimated cost of installing electric light, fixtures, etc., and pump and plumbing for bathroom.

WOODSTOCK PRESBYTERY:

- (b) *Kincardine*.—Agreed to grant \$75.00 towards cost of wiring the manse for electricity.

SASKATOON PRESBYTERY:

- (c) *Naicam*.—Request for grant towards improvements. Referred to Secretaries for report to the next Executive.

YORKTON PRESBYTERY:

- (d) *Spy Hill*.—Request for grant towards improvements. Referred to Secretaries for report to Executive.

CARIBOO PRESBYTERY:

- (e) *Smithers*.—Agreed to vote loan of \$150.00 for modernizing manse, in addition to grant voted by the Board.

KAMLOOPS-OKANAGAN PRESBYTERY:

- (f) *Keremeos*.—Agreed to vote grant of \$312.50 towards modernization of manse installation of bathroom, etc.

Property Claims

BONAVISTA:

Greenspond—Boat.—Agreed (a) to vote up to \$2,500 for the purchase of a new cabin boat and engine; and (b) that the "*Messenger*" be sold and proceeds used for the equipment of a new boat.

BURIN:

Epworth.—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,500 and grant of \$500 towards cost of new church.

Burin Bay Arm—Epworth Charge.—Agreed to vote loan of \$750.00 and grant of \$350.00 towards new church building.

Petites.—Agreed to make grant of \$500 for rebuilding of the church.

TWILLINGATE:

Western Head—Moreton's Harbour Charge.—Agreed to vote grant of \$250.00 towards cost of new church.

Change Islands.—Agreed to make grant of \$500.00 to purchase an engine for boat to be used on this field—the people to undertake cost of supplying boat, and the engine to be the property of the Home Mission Board.

HALIFAX:

Edgewood.—Presbytery requested grant of \$3,000 in addition to grant of \$2,000 already voted towards project, which included purchase of site and a hut

from the War Assets Corporation. A hut not being available, a building is being erected and there is considerable extra cost. Referred to Secretaries, with power.

SYDNEY:

Sydney, United Mission:

- (a) Agreed to confirm payment of one-half of \$38.28, cost of new water pipe, the W.M.S. also paying one-half.
- (b) Estimates of cost of necessary repairs, totalling \$146.00, were presented. Referred to Secretaries, with power.

Passchandaale, 'Glace Bay—Newsome Hall.—Payment of \$51.75 for purchase of electric light guards was confirmed.

TRURO:

Bible Hill.—Agreed to vote grant of \$1,500 and loan of \$1,500 towards proposed Church Hall, to cost \$10,000.

OTTAWA:

Woodroffe.—Agreed to vote grant of \$4,000 and loan of \$1,000 towards building a basement for new church; the erection of a portable church not having been feasible.

BELLEVILLE:

McGarry—Maynooth Charge.—Agreed to place \$200.00 in the hands of the Secretaries towards cost of new church; the building to be owned jointly by The Church of England in Canada and The United Church of Canada (providing legal arrangements can be effected satisfactorily).

PETERBOROUGH:

Peterborough—Portable Church.—Agreed to vote loan sufficient to cover cost of foundation and any expense in connection with the setting up of the portable church; the loan to be repaid as soon as possible.

COCHRANE:

Smooth Rock Falls.—The request for grant of \$1,000 and loan of \$1,500 to Trinity United Church, for purpose of adding basement and extension to present building, was referred to the next meeting of the Executive.

MUSKOKA:

Aspin Manse—Huntsville Charge.—Agreed to grant \$300.00 to reinforce the basement walls, on the understanding that the Secretaries notify Presbytery that the Board cannot consider further requests for grants for improvement of this manse.

TEMISKAMING:

Kirkland Lake—Manse.—Agreed to make grant to cover cost of heavy duty wiring in order to connect electric range; the understanding being that rent will be increased.

TORONTO CENTRE:

Toronto—131 Ivy Avenue.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$159.50, cost of redecorating rooms, and \$20.00 for repairs to the chimney.

Toronto—104 Millwood Road.—Agreed to vote grant for purchase of paint and other necessary materials to redecorate rooms; the work being done without cost to the Board.

Georgina Island—Parsonage.—It was agreed (a) to confirm payment of \$254.29, cost of materials for repairs; and (b) to authorize purchase of an Iron Horse Engine at cost of \$70.00.

NIAGARA:

St. David's.—No action was taken on request for additional loan of \$5,000 towards cost of new church.

SUDBURY:

Sudbury—St. Paul's Church.—Agreed to vote grant of \$2,250.00 towards purchase of the James' property, immediately north of the present church property.

BRUCE:

Saugeen—Manse.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$200.00 for furnishings.

ALGOMA:

Sault Ste. Marie—Lot 32, Pine Park A.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$82.01, taxes on lots purchased for extension work.

ESSEX:

Windsor, St. James.—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,000.00 (to be repaid in four years, with interest) to assist in making the following repairs to the church: new roof, insulbric siding, finishing basement, chimney; and also painting.

Roseland—Church.—Agreed to vote loan of \$7,000.00; to be free of interest for first three years, after which interest to be at 4%.

LAMBTON:

St. Clair Church.—Agreed that request for grant and loan to assist in building a new church be referred to the next Executive.

MIDDLESEX:

London—Extension Work.—Agreed to advance \$1,720.00 for purchase of lots; the understanding being that the Board will be reimbursed from proceeds of the sale of the Beecher Church.

CARMAN:

Indian Springs.—Agreed to vote \$425.00 to provide furniture for the manse.

DAUPHIN:

Ethelbert.—Agreed to vote \$250.00 for redecoration of manse and purchase of linoleum and screen door.

Re "The R. J. Campbell Mission Fund". In connection with the amounts voted to Harrow Church, St. Andrew's Church and Sturgeon Creek Church, the Executive adopted the following resolution:

Whereas by Trust Deed, dated May 23rd, 1919, Robert Joseph Campbell did establish a Trust Fund under the name of "The R. J. Campbell Mission Fund", to be held by The Northern Trusts Company as trustees;

And Whereas in the said Deed of Trust it is provided further, "that in case the Boards, or other recognized authorities of either or both of the present Mission schemes, or of such substituted organizations as herein indicated, shall at any time formally and decisively resolve in favour of applying any part or all of the capital of the said fund to certain defined purposes of their respective schemes in furtherance of the general objects of the respective Missions and of the Donor's purposes, and shall make request to the Trustee for payment to them respectively of part or all of the capital for such purposes, then, and in such event, the Trustee, upon being satisfied that the same will be a reasonable and proper disposition of the funds, may accordingly pay over the capital held for the respective schemes in part or in whole to the Boards or other authorities then having the control of such respective schemes and making such requests;"

Therefore Be It Resolved That the Executive of the Board of Home Missions do formally and decisively resolve in favour of applying Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000) of the capital of the said fund for the defined purpose of repairs to *St. Andrew's Church*, Elgin Avenue, Winnipeg, and the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000) to be a grant towards the erection of a new church on *Harrow Street, Winnipeg*, and the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) towards the erection of a new church at *Sturgeon Creek, Winnipeg*; all being part of the purposes of the respective schemes of the Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada.

Point Douglas—Church.—Agreed to vote grant of \$160.00 for repairs to roof.

KAMSACK:

Canora.—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,500 and grant of \$2,500 towards new church, estimated cost of which is \$11,786.00.

On motion, the Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive, held June 23rd, were confirmed.

Communications

The Secretary reported receipt of communications from the following:

- (1) Mr. Samuel Roddan, son of the late Dr. Andrew Roddan, in appreciation of resolution of sympathy sent from the Executive.
- (2) Mrs. J. H. White, widow of the late Dr. J. H. White, thanking the Executive for letter of sympathy sent on its behalf.
- (3) Rev. J. D. McCrae, in acknowledgment of congratulations on his elevation to the presidency of the Montreal and Ottawa Conference.
- (4) Revs. Drs. W. M. Mustard, M. N. Omond, J. I. MacKay and J. W. Churchill, thanking the Executive for congratulations on their having received the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Resolutions of Sympathy

The Secretary reported that Rev. S. D. Gaudin, D.D., who had devoted his life to work amongst the Crees of Northern Manitoba, had passed away in August. The Executive expressed its sympathy with the son and daughters of the late Dr. Gaudin.

The Executive also directed that a letter of sympathy should be sent to Mrs. Anderson, widow of the late Mr. J. Gordon Anderson, lay supply at Tillston, Man., who passed away in Toronto while in attendance at the School for Lay Ministers; to Mrs. Pritchard, widow of the late Rev. Dr. H. J. Pritchard, who had died recently; to the widow of the late Rev. Y. T. Chan, Chinese missionary in New Westminster, who died early in October; and to the daughter of the late Mrs. Peter Strang, widow of the late Dr. Peter Strang, former Superintendent of Missions in Saskatchewan.

Report re Action of General Council

It was reported that action had been taken by the General Council at its recent meeting on the following:

(1) *Re Immigration*: A resolution was before the Sessional Committee on Home Missions, sent forward by the Toronto Conference, simpliciter, urging—

- “(1) That the Government of Canada authorize the immigration into this country of adoptable children;
- “(2) That the Board of Home Missions be made responsible for the securing of responsible homes for them; and
- “(3) That the clergy and laity of the Church be acquainted with the action and a plea made to our people to open their homes and hearts.”

There was also a resolution from the Saskatchewan Conference bearing on the same subject:

The action of the General Council was as follows:

"The General Council requests the Board of Home Missions through its Executive to give careful study to this situation so that it can be brought before the Board of Home Missions at its meeting in April, 1949, for whatever action is deemed advisable."

(2) *Re Candidates from Hungary:* The General Council also asked that a Committee, consisting of the Secretary of the General Council, the Secretary of the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the Secretary of the Board of Home Missions and Dr. Harvey G. Forster, be asked to look into the matter of getting some students for the ministry of the Reformed Church in Hungary to come to Canada, in order that information may be given to the Executive of the General Council as to—(1) the educational qualifications of these men; (2) their knowledge of English; (3) the possibility of securing exit permits from Hungary and entry permits into Canada; (4) the cost of passage; and (5) such other relevant information as will make it possible for the Executive of the General Council to formulate plans necessary to enable the coming to Canada of these men."

Dr. Dorey reported that the Committee appointed by the General Council would meet as soon as possible.

Marine Work

Central Mainland Marine Mission—

(1) It was agreed to pay account of \$45.00, rendered by Dr. Strong for two examinations of Dr. Peter Kelly and report on his condition.

(2) With regard to the recommendation of the Marine Committee that Captain Kelly be given leave of absence for the balance of the Conference year and be asked to do deputation work in Ontario, it was agreed—

- (a) That the Executive does not approve of the proposal that Captain Kelly be given leave of absence to do deputation work; and
- (b) That if no other solution offers, the Marine Committee be asked to continue Dr. Kelly's employment (which is in accord with his own wishes) on the "Thomas Crosby" for this Conference year, on the understanding that his services terminate on May 31st, and that his salary be paid until June 30th, 1949.

Cape Mudge—

(1) Authority was given for the purchase of a boat for use on this Mission, at an estimated cost of \$3,500, the amount to be taken from the Projects Fund.

(2) The question of a name for the boat was referred to the Secretaries.

Hospital Work

Lamont Hospital—

Dr. Dorcy reported that in August, following the receipt of a letter from Mr. Nelles Buchanan relative to the financial difficulties in which the Hospital found itself, he had called together the members of the Executive that were available, as a result of which it was agreed to authorize the Hospital to negotiate a loan with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, not to exceed \$20,000, such authority to be operative only until the meeting of the Executive in January. The present situation, as reported to the Secretaries, was that the total estimated cost of the building, including certain new equipment which was necessary, would be almost \$200,000. The original action of the Board of Home Missions was to vote a grant of \$50,000 and a loan of \$65,000, with the understanding that \$65,000 would be raised in Alberta. The amount raised by subscription in Alberta, to date, was \$40,000, and Mr. Buchanan estimated that another \$10,000 would be raised this Fall. It was expected that the Hospital would receive in grants from the Dominion and Provincial Governments an amount of \$35,000 to \$40,000. The line of credit of \$20,000 authorized in August was not sufficient for the present emergency, and it was requested that the Executive authorize a line of credit with the Bank up to \$40,000.

After considerable discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried:

That, having heard with great concern the request from the Alberta Hospitals Board that the Lamont Hospital be given authority to borrow from the Bank an amount up to \$40,000, it is the judgment of this Executive that, in the light of the limited funds available in the Property Fund, the Board of Home Missions has been exceedingly generous in the amount of grant and loan made available for the Hospital extension, namely \$115,000;

That we draw to the attention of the Alberta Hospitals Board that, since our Property Fund is so seriously depleted, it is not now possible to honor all the applications for grants and loans for building new churches, manses and parsonages; many will have to be refused and others reduced;

That, being so, we feel it is not fair for the Board of Home Missions to obligate itself in any way to extend further assistance to the Lamont Hospital; but that, in view of the emergency situation confronting the Hospital, we give authority to the Lamont Hospital to increase its present loan at the Bank from \$20,000 to \$35,000, on the following conditions:

- (1) That this authority terminate on April 15th, 1949.
- (2) That the Alberta Hospitals Board make a special effort immediately (not later than February 28th) to collect within the Alberta Conference the balance of the \$65,000, which it undertook to raise within the Conference; and that a special effort be made to exceed this undertaking in view of the increased cost of the construction work at the Hospital; and
- (3) That any Government grants received be used: (1) to repay the Bank loan; and (2) to apply on the loan made by the Board of Home Missions.

In order to meet the requirements of the Bank, the following resolution was, on motion, adopted:

Be It Resolved:

That Dr. A. E. Archer, Superintendent, Dr. M. A. R. Young, and Findlay M. Ross, Business Manager, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of the Lamont Public Hospital to sign cheques upon the Canadian Bank of Commerce on behalf of the said Hospital, and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000);

Also That Dr. A. E. Archer, Superintendent, Dr. M. A. R. Young, and Findlay M. Ross, Business Manager, or any two of them be and are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to negotiate with, deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques, or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also that the Board hereby authorizes the said Dr. A. E. Archer, Dr. M. A. R. Young, and Findlay M. Ross, or any two of them to open a payroll account for the Lamont Public Hospital with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, Alberta; monies to be deposited to the credit of the said payroll account only by means of transfers from the main or regular account of the said Hospital at the Lamont Branch of the Bank; and the said Bank is hereby authorized to accept the signature of Dr. A. E. Archer, Superintendent, Dr. M. A. R. Young, and Findlay M. Ross, Business Manager, or any one of them on cheques drawn upon such payroll account;

Also the said Dr. A. E. Archer, Dr. M. A. R. Young, and Findlay M. Ross, or any one of them, from time to time, to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank and to receive all

paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release.

George McDougall Hospital—

1. *Re Building Project:* Dr. Dorey reported that the building of the Extension had been completed at a cost of within \$2,500 of the amount estimated. It was agreed to make a loan to the Hospital of \$2,500, to be paid from a Special Hospital Account, held by the Treasurer in "Sundry Funds related to Home Missions."

2. *Terms of Employment of Superintendent:* It was reported that the Doctor had asked for a change in the terms of his employment. The Secretaries were empowered to take this matter up with Dr. Edmunds and arrange details with regard to salary, etc., with the understanding that the principle laid down by the Board with regard to terms of employment of Doctors be adhered to; any suggested change in policy to be referred to the Board.

3. *Re Nurses:* Dr. Dorey reported that the shortage of nurses was seriously affecting the Hospital.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital—

1. *Re Financial Situation:* Dr. Dorey stated that the British Columbia Government would shortly put into effect a new Hospital Insurance Plan, whereby every Hospital would receive enough money for its operation. In the case of Indian patients,—they would be entitled to hospitalization and the Federal Government would reimburse the Province. The present financial situation was not good and a further line of credit at the Bank was requested.

It was agreed that the line of credit be increased from \$2,000 to \$4,000, and, on motion, the following resolution was adopted.

Be It Resolved: That Dr. F. H. Prouse and Mr. Selwyn Simons, Executive Secretary, are hereby authorized for and in the name of The Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton, B.C., to borrow money, on behalf of the said Hospital, from The Royal Bank of Canada, Smithers, B.C., either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00).

2. *Re Doctor's Residence:* The Secretaries were requested to secure specific plans and estimates for the erection of a bungalow, and to report to the January meeting of the Executive.

3. *Re Installation of Alternating Electric Current,* in co-operation with the B.C. Electric Power Commission:—This was referred to the Secretaries, with power to act.

4. *Re Proposed New Constitution for Hospital:* Referred to the Secretaries for study and report to the January meeting of the Executive.

Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Conference of Non-Anglo-Saxon Workers—

Dr. Dorey reported that a Conference of Non-Anglo-Saxon Workers, at which he was present, had been held in Winnipeg early in October. It included Workers

from the Head of the Lakes to Edmonton. The findings had not yet been received but would be presented to the January meeting of the Executive.

First United Church, Vancouver—

It was stated that the recommendation made by the Executive in June with regard to the appointment of a Superintendent had not been acceptable to the Committee in British Columbia, and that, after correspondence with the Secretaries, the Rev. R. A. Redman, B.Th., had been nominated and had accepted the appointment.

Sudbury, All Peoples' Mission—

Dr. Macdonald reported that Rev. G. F. Ficko had resigned as Superintendent, and that Rev. J. R. MacCrimmon had agreed to act as temporary supply, from November 1st to the end of the Conference year. This action was approved.

Missionary-at-Large, Sudbury Area—

It was agreed that the recommendation of Sudbury Presbytery to "The Woman's Missionary Society and the Board of Home Missions that Miss Mayowna be made a missionary-at-large, in the Sudbury area in particular, with headquarters at Sudbury All Peoples', but free to make contact with New Canadians in other areas,"—be referred to the Secretaries, with power to issue, after conference with The Woman's Missionary Society.

Central Winnipeg Mission—

The Executive approved the arrangements whereby, instead of one full-time Woman Worker, three Workers will be employed, namely, Miss Lois Freeman, on student basis; Mrs. George Taylor, on a part-time basis, with remuneration at the rate of 50.00 per month; and a third worker to be employed on a part-time basis, at \$28.00 a month.

Literature

It was agreed to make a grant of \$250.00 towards the cost of publication of the autobiography of Rev. Dr. Oliver Darwin,—the Committee on Missionary Education having agreed to publish the book if it had a guarantee of \$500.00.

Immigration Work

Central Committee—

It was reported that a Central Committee on Immigration had been set up, as directed by the Board, consisting of the following: Mr. Arthur Creighton, Mr. George W. Ritchie, Rev. J. I. MacKay, Mrs. A. A. Outram, Mr. Carl A. Voaden, Mr. Alex. Maclaren, and the Secretaries.

Re Dutch Immigrants—

It was reported that Dr. J. J. Stam had just recently left Canada to return to Holland and that Rev. L. P. Bruijn was carrying on the work amongst the Dutch people in Ontario. Mimeographed reports of Dr. Stam and Mr. Bruijn were presented to the members of the Executive. It was agreed that these Reports be referred to the Immigration Committee.

It was further decided that Mr. Bruijn should be related to the Church of All Nations, Toronto, and work under the direction of the Superintendent of the Institution,—that portion of his work which is not related to the Church of All Nations to be directed by the Immigration Committee.

Publications in Dutch Language—

1. *Booklet*: Mr. Leng reported regarding the proposed publication of a booklet in the Dutch language, containing information about Canada and the United Church, and also a small Dutch-English Vocabulary,—with the idea that this might be placed in the hands of all Dutch immigrants. It was agreed to authorize publication of this booklet.

2. *Hymn Book*: It was agreed to approve the publication of one thousand copies of a Hymn Book in the Dutch language, to contain 25 hymns at a cost of approximately \$350.00.

**Residence of Superintendent, Montreal and Ottawa
and Bay of Quinte Conferences**

The Executive approved the suggestion that permission be given to Dr. J. I. MacKay to transfer his residence from Montreal to Ottawa, as soon as this is found to be convenient.

Radio

1. *Prince Albert Radio*: Dr. Dorey reported that Rev. W. H. Pike had agreed to continue in this work. The question of rent allowance for Mr. Pike was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

2. *Battleford Presbytery*: The request of Presbytery for a grant of \$100.00 towards the Sunday School of the Air, (Interdenominational) Broadcast, carried on by Rev. C. A. S. Elliott, was referred to the General Council's Committee on Radio.

Student Missionaries

It was agreed:

(1) To approve payment of \$50.00 medical expenses for Mr. Arthur Lewis, incurred for emergency operation while serving the Mankota field, Assiniboia Presbytery.

(2) To approve payment of \$62.50, hospital expenses incurred by Mr. Burnham, while serving the Arrowhead-Malakwa field, Kamloops-Okanagan Presbytery.

School for Lay Ministers

Dr. Macdonald reported that the School for Lay Ministers, held in Toronto during the summer, had been very successful. There had been an enrolment of forty men—an increase of nine over the previous year, with all the Conferences of the Church represented.

It was resolved to request the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools to arrange for the holding of a similar School in 1949, in co-operation with the Board of Home Missions.

Insurance of Secretaries' and Superintendents' Cars

The Secretaries requested further instruction regarding limitations of insurance on Secretaries' and Superintendents' cars, concerning which it was directed that particulars be furnished so that a portion might be paid by the Board.

It was decided that—

Representation at Meeting of Home Missions Council

The matter of representation of the Board at the meeting of the Home Missions Council of North America, to be held at Buck Hill Falls, Pa., January 11-13, was referred to the Secretaries.

Indian Work

Edmonton Residential School—

Dr. Dorey made a statement with regard to the financial situation at the School, which matter had been referred by the June Executive to the Secretaries, for report to this Executive. It was agreed to give authority for an overdraft of \$4,000 at the Bank, Dr. Dorey having stated that the assets of the School were quite sufficient to cover this amount, and that instructions should be given that the salary of the Principal should be paid each month.

On motion, the following resolution, was adopted:

Be It Resolved: That the Rev. E. J. Staley, Principal, be and is hereby authorized for and in the name of the Edmonton Indian Residential School to sign cheques upon the Imperial Bank of Canada on behalf of the said School; and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000);

Also That the said Rev. E. J. Staley be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the said School to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said School account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said School, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper

to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also, from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said School and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release.

Alberni Residential School—

It was stated that the Principal had reported his inability to finance the School with the present line of credit of \$4,000. It was agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Interim Standing Committees of the Board

The Nomination of Interim Standing Committees of the Board was referred to the Secretaries, for report to the January meeting of the Executive.

Basis for Advances on Grants for 1949

It was directed that advances on grants for the first quarter of 1949 should be on the basis of the 1948 grants as now being paid.

Basis for Applications for Grants by Presbyteries

It was agreed to instruct Presbyteries to make applications for grants for 1949 at the rate of payment to which salaries will be built up by the Executive at its January meeting.

Car Subsidies

1. Re Loans in Arrears: It was agreed that the Secretaries should be instructed to inform men, whose payments are in serious arrears, that unless reasonable payments are made, it will be necessary to carry out the terms of the covenant and refer the matter to their Presbyteries.

2. It was agreed to take no action re request for a car subsidy in the case of Rev. J. L. Warke—a Presbyterian minister, giving service to Inverness in the Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery.

3. Re case of Miss Doreen Agnew, a W.M.S. Worker serving in the Muskoka-Parry Sound area. This was referred to the Secretaries, for consultation with The Woman's Missionary Society.

Representation on Committee on Missionary Education

The Secretaries were authorized to name three representatives of the Board—two ministers and one layman—to serve on the Committee on Missionary Education.

Retirement of Dr. R. J. McDonald

Dr. Dorey reported that, under the regulation of the Board, the retirement of Rev. R. J. McDonald, D.D., as Superintendent of Missions for Southern Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta, would take effect on June 30th, 1949.

It was agreed that the Secretaries should correspond with the Conferences concerned, with a view to the appointment of a joint committee, which would meet at the time of the meeting of the Conference Home Mission Committees in the Spring, for the purpose of making recommendations regarding a successor.

Modernization of Manses

Requests for grants for modernization of manses were considered and action was taken as follows:

OTTAWA:

Gatineau, Church—Agreed to approve proposition made by Secretaries to

congregation that they repay \$1,200 over a period of eight or ten years, without interest; this Board to write off balance of loan and interest.

QUEBEC-SHERBROOKE:

St. John's Hall—Agreed to confirm payment of \$850.00 towards repairs, and that legacy of \$500.00 from the Estate of Elizabeth H. Seifert be applied on this expenditure.

Toronto, 131 Ivy Avenue—Agreed to confirm payment of \$47.70 for repairs to fence.

Toronto, 104 Millwood Road—(a) It was reported that repairs, authorized by the June Executive, had cost \$109.71. Payment was confirmed. (b) Agreed to vote \$94.00, cost of new cement walk between Nos. 104 and 106.

Winnipeg, Chinese Church—Agreed to make a grant of \$5,000 towards new church,—amount to be paid from the R. J. Campbell Fund.

Winnipeg, Point Douglas, Church—(a) Agreed to confirm payment of \$40 for caulking, in excess of amount voted by the June Executive; and (b) agreed to vote grant of \$430 for purchase of used furnace and installation.

Winnipeg, Gordon Church—Agreed to discharge mortgage held by this Board on 50 feet of lot, sold by congregation with Presbytery's permission, proceeds of sale to be used for repairs.

ASSINIBOIA:

Constance and Coronach—It was agreed to accept the offer of \$1,400 made by the Coronach Official Board for the church building at Constance, on which there is an indebtedness of \$1,865 principal and \$1,537 interest; that this indebtedness be cancelled; and that the amount of \$1,400 be repaid over a period of ten years, with interest at 4 per cent.

BATTLEFORD:

Loon Lake—Agreed to confirm payment of \$240.00, advanced for necessary repairs and alterations to basement.

Edmonton, Buchanan Church—Presbytery recommended loan of \$500.00 for the purpose of renovating the old institute building so that it may be more suitable for use as a church. Referred to Secretaries, for consultation with Presbytery.

Fort Assiniboia, Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$1,000 towards cost of new church,—to be paid from Arnold Estate.

HIGH RIVER:

Milo, Church—Agreed to make loan of \$500 to assist congregation in purchasing Baptist church building, at cost of \$2,000 on condition that they can present a statement of subscriptions amounting to at least \$1,000.

RED DEER:

Hobbema, Manse—Agreed to confirm payment of the following amounts: furniture—\$411.35; rewiring house, \$164.24; sewing machine, \$81.95; washing machine, \$152.55.

ST. PAUL:

Bonnyville, Church—The Superintendent reported that total cost of moving church was about \$500.00 more than estimated and that congregation enquired if they could secure an additional loan of this amount. Referred to Secretaries.

Saddle Lake, Manse—Agreed to confirm payment of the following: cost of digging well, \$171.30; gas washer, \$179.55; materials for decorating interior, \$38.30.

CARIBOO:

Prince George, Extension Work—Agreed to vote grant of \$500 and loan of \$500 towards purchase of lots and building for extension project in West end of Prince George.

PRINCE RUPERT:

Bella Bella Hospital—"Wm. H. Pierce"—The Secretary reported that he had called together the members of the Board in attendance at the General Council to consider an emergency request for authority to purchase a new engine for this boat, as recommended by the Marine Committee. The purchase of a 75 h.p. Buda Engine, at an estimated cost of \$4,500, was recommended. On motion, this action was homologated.

Hazelton, Winch Memorial Hospital—Insurance of Nurses' Home and Doctor's Residence: The Secretaries were authorized to take out sufficient insurance for the proper coverage of these buildings.

Port Essington, Mission House—Agreed to accept offer of \$500.00 cash for this house.

Skidegate, Mission House—The Board having already approved the building of a house, the Secretaries were authorized to decide on location and proceed with the building as soon as feasible.

VANCOUVER:

Vancouver, First Church—It was reported that the total cost of painting and redecorating, for which authority was given to the Secretaries, had amounted to \$5,002, being \$617.00 more than originally estimated. Payment of this amount was confirmed.

Vancouver, Fairview 'Japanese' Building—Request for grant to meet one-half cost of re-roofing, redecorating, repairs and painting exterior,—the W.M.S. to be asked to provide balance,—was referred to the Secretaries, after consultation with The Woman's Missionary Society.

Sambro—Payment of \$17.96, for week-end supply by student, was confirmed.

SYDNEY:

New Aberdeen, Wesley Hall—No action was taken on request for extra maintenance grant of \$28.00, to cover bill for clearing away debris after the fire.

DUNDAS-GRENVILLE:

North Augusta—Agreed to allow grant up to \$8.00 per week for student supply until January 31st.

MONTREAL:

Montreal, Church of Redeemer—Agreed to approve payment of \$100.00 to purchase paint for minister's house; work to be done without cost to the Board.

Lakeside Heights—New Work—The question of assistance towards the opening up of work in this area was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

OTTAWA:

Fort Cowlunge and Chenaux Power Development—Agreed to make grant at rate of \$400.00 and \$100.00 travel, for combined field.

Rockcliffe and Uplands—It was agreed (a) to give a grant of \$50.00 to assist in the inter-church work carried on by Mr. G. H. Wilms in the summer; and (b) should the two congregations be unable to raise the cost of week-end supply during the winter months, to give consideration to bringing the remuneration up to the required scale.

COBOURG:

Rapide Des Joachimi—Agreed (a) to confirm payment of \$197.00 for supply from July 1st to September 15th; and (b) to vote grant at rate of \$1,200 for S.L.S., from October 24th, the Hydro Commission providing room and Board.

MUSKOKA:

Windermere and Rosseau—Agreed to vote grant for M.O. sufficient to build scale up to the present minimum.

TORONTO CENTRE:

Toronto; Church of All Nations—Agreed that Rev. H. C. Vaclavik be allowed salary and rent for the holiday month of July, less amount received from the Czechoslovak congregation.

NIAGARA:

All Peoples' Mission—It was reported that the Board had paid \$613.88 for expenses of Mr. Pietro Moncada and family from Italy to Niagara Falls, of which Mr. Moncada is to refund \$300, being expenses of Mrs. Moncada. It was decided to contribute \$50.00 towards \$250.00 advanced by Mr. Moncada's cousin in Newburgh, N.Y., for expenses incurred in getting the Moncada family into Canada from the U.S.

MIDDLESEX:

Bellwood Park—Agreed that grant be at rate of \$125.00 per month, plus receipts from the field, from September 1st until the end of the year.

CARMAN:

Indian Springs—Agreed that grant be at rate of \$500.00 for married missionary-teacher.

DAUPHIN:

Ethelbert—Travel grant at the rate of \$80.00 was requested. Referred to Secretaries and Superintendent.

NORWAY HOUSE:

Berens River—Agreed that grant from July 1st be at rate of \$1,800 for M.O.

WINNIPEG:

North Winnipeg—Agreed to confirm payment of \$50.00 to Rev. K. C. McLeod, being an extra month's rent which he was obligated to pay because of the housing situation.

ASSINIBOIA:

Readlyn-Verwood—Agreed to vote grant at rate of \$200.00 for M.O., for the last six months of 1948.

KAMSACK:

Canora—Agreed to vote grant at rate of \$400.00, and \$120.00 for travel for M.O.

**THE INTERIM EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS
JANUARY 20th, 1949**

The Interim Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Thursday, January 20th, 1949, at 9:30 a.m.

The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Rev. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, J. R. Leng, Waldemar Williams, George Telford, A. M. Stuart, Mrs. C. M. Loveys, Messrs. C. R. Racine and Ralph S. Mills.

On motion, Revs. C. H. Best, J. I. MacKay, Robert Hall, R. J. McDonald, Thos. Hart, W. S. Godfrey and J. C. Torrance were made corresponding members.

Regrets: Regrets were received from Rev. M. N. Omond and Rev. G. W. Morrison.

Resolutions of Sympathy

It was requested that, in cases where this had not already been done, letters of sympathy should be sent on behalf of the Executive to the families of the following, who have recently passed away: Rev. A. J. Law, Rev. R. G. Wood, Rev. A. J. Radley, Mr. J. Erle Jones and Mrs. T. W. Neal.

Licenses to Administer the Sacraments

1. It was reported that licenses enabling them to perform the Sacraments, for one year, were granted by the Sub-Executive of the General Council to the following, subject to recommendation of this Executive:

It was agreed to approve the granting of these licenses.

2. The Home Mission Superintendents in attendance at the meeting of the Executive of the Board of Home Missions on January 20th, 1949, gave expression to their serious concern for the areas served by lay supply. The Executive feels strongly that these laymen should be granted permission to administer the Sacraments when recommendation is made by the Board of Home Missions, or its Executive, on the application of Presbytery. It should be pointed out that great care is exercised by the Board, or its Executive, in making these recommendations so that the conditions governing the granting of them as laid down in the Manual are safeguarded. It is the combined conviction of the Executive of the Board and its Superintendents of Missions that this matter is of particular importance today when so many laymen are rendering excellent service and when evidence comes to us that people often leave our Church when they discover that laymen serving them are unable to perform these functions while leaders of other bodies with inferior training and standing are able to administer the Sacraments.

Specifically, at the present time we urge that permission to conduct the Sacraments be granted, for one year, to—

Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

1. It was reported that the findings of the Conference of Non-Anglo-Saxon Workers held in Winnipeg, October, 1948, had not yet been received.

2. *North Winnipeg Missions*: The Secretaries were empowered to make arrangements for Rev. K. C. McLeod to use the residence at 712 Alfred Street.

Office Accommodation of Superintendents of Missions

Vancouver—

Dr. Dorey reported that he had been in communication with the Committee in charge of the office in Vancouver. It had been agreed that no increase of the amount now paid would be necessary.

Winnipeg—

Dr. Dorey reported that the rent was set at \$50.00 per month from May 1st, 1948. Payment of this was authorized for 1948. Dr. Best said that negotiations were in progress about this but that the rate would continue to June 30th, 1949. This was authorized.

Saskatoon—

Mr. Hall reported that there would probably be an increase in rent. The Secretaries were given authority to deal with this.

Supervision of Home Mission Work, Hamilton and London Conferences

Dr. Macdonald reported on the meeting of the Committee set up by the Board to study the possibility of adding to the duties of the Rev. J. C. Torrance, Secretary of the Toronto Home Missions Council, responsibility for supervision of Home Mission work in the Hamilton and London Conferences. The findings of that Committee were as follows:

(1) That the present arrangement be continued whereby Mr. Torrance serves as Secretary of the Toronto Home Missions Council and carries on the functions of Superintendent of Missions in the three Toronto Presbyteries.

(2) That the Board of Home Missions consider with the Hamilton and London Conference authorities the possibility of the appointment of a Superintendent of Missions.

(3) That a committee, consisting of the Secretaries of the Board and Rev. Waldemar Williams, enter into negotiations with the Toronto Home Missions Council regarding the division of financial responsibility that should be borne by the Toronto Home Missions Council and the Board of Home Missions for the salary of the Secretary as he serves in the dual capacity. This committee will also suggest, in the light of that division, the duties that the Secretary of the Toronto Home Missions Council would perform as Superintendent in the three Toronto Presbyteries.

The report was adopted and the recommendations of the Committee accepted.

It was agreed that an approach should be made to the Executives of the Hamilton and London Conferences to ascertain their wishes in this matter, and that such negotiations as may be necessary in order to bring the matter to the Board at its meeting in April, should be carried out.

Hospital Work

Wrinch Memorial Hospital—

1. *Medical Superintendency:* The resignation of Dr. F. H. Prouse was accepted and it was agreed that he be paid salary for a month and a half in lieu of holidays. The matter of a successor was left in the hands of the Secretaries.

2. *Line of Credit and Banking Authority:* It was agreed—

- (a) To homologate the action of the Secretaries in authorizing an increase in the line of credit with the Royal Bank of \$4,000.00 (as passed by the Executive in October) to \$6,000.00; and
- (b) To authorize a change in the signing officers, substituting the name of Miss Myrtle McLeod for that of Dr. Prouse. For this purpose the following resolution was adopted:

Be It Resolved: That Mr. Selwyn Simons, Executive Secretary, and Miss Myrtle McLeod are hereby authorized for and in the name of The Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton, B.C., to sign cheques upon The Royal Bank of Canada, Smithers, B.C., on behalf of the said Hospital; and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000);

Also That the said Mr. Selwyn Simons and the said Miss Myrtle McLeod—or either one of them—be and are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also, from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

Also That all other powers heretofore given in this matter are hereby revoked.

Representative on Personnel Committee for Women Workers

A request having been received that the Board name a representative to this Committee, it was agreed that Dr. Dorey should attend the next meeting of the Committee and report.

Appointment Under W.M.S.

It was agreed that the request of Hamilton Presbytery for the appointment of a Deaconess for full-time service, to be shared equally by Wesley and Grace Churches, be forwarded to The Woman's Missionary Society, with approval.

Marine Work

Central Mainland Marine—

It was reported that Dr. Peter Kelly had gone back on the "Thomas Crosby" until May 31st.

Cape Mudge—

It was reported that, as authorized by the Executive, the boat was purchased, and that it had been registered under the name of "Robert C. Scott." This action was confirmed.

Immigration

A general report on the work was given by the Secretary.

Any matters which might require attention were referred to the Immigration Committee.

Provision of Slide Lanterns

The Secretaries were given power to provide a lantern for Rapides des Joachims or for any other project where such action was warranted.

Student Missionary Work

Dr. Macdonald reported that out of a total of 196 student missionaries serving in the student 'pool' arrangement, only three or four were reported as unsatisfactory. The students were paid at the highest rate ever paid, namely, \$18.00 per week, plus board and expenses, the more experienced students serving their third, fourth and fifth terms receiving \$19, \$20, and \$21 a week respectively. In addition, \$5 per week was paid for every Sunday a student served over 18 Sundays. There was a remarkable advance in field givings. In 1946, 195 fields contributed \$61,000, in 1947, 213 fields contributed \$70,000, and in 1948, 196 fields contributed \$73,000. The total cost of student work this year was \$113,000 as compared with \$110,000 in 1947 for 17 fewer fields, and for this work a grant of approximately \$40,000 was needed. A phase of the student work which gives some concern is the falling off this year in accessions to membership. In 1946, 82 students reported a total of 590 members received; in 1947, 95 students reported a total of 700, and this year 80 students reported a total of 568 (361 by profession of faith and 207 by certificate) members received.

Communication from Dr. E. G. D. Freeman—

The Secretary stated that a communication had been received from Dr. Freeman, Dean of United College, Winnipeg, with regard to the method of appointment of students and general policy. The Secretaries were authorized to reply to the effect that (1) every effort was being made to expedite the appointment of students; and (2) it would be recommended to the Board that the interim payment to students this year should be \$16 a week instead of \$10.

Special Course for Lay Ministers

Dr. Macdonald reported that the School held last year had been highly successful. The total cost of the School was \$17,908.64, of which \$7,738.00 was for Student supply of the fields while the laymen were at the School. Authorization was given to transfer from the Appropriation for Student Work to this Fund \$238.00 to cover the over-expenditure.

It was resolved that the Board of Colleges be asked to continue the Special Course for Lay Ministers until the next General Council.

Car Subsidies

It was agreed that if the recipient of a car subsidy were two payments in arrears and no satisfactory explanation had been given, the case should be referred to Presbytery for action.

Statement re Finances

An Interim Financial Statement was presented, showing unexpended balance of Home Mission funds of approximately \$43,000.00.

Basis for Special Grants

After discussion, the Executive adopted the following resolutions:

(1) That in the light of reports from the Pastoral Charges, the Executive authorize additional payments so that the scale of salaries adopted by the Board in 1948 be reached,—each case to be decided on its merits.

(2) That a maximum cost of living bonus of \$100 be paid to all ministers and supplies, including Superintendents of Institutions, and \$50 to retired ministers and women workers.

(3) That fields not now on the list be dealt with on the same basis as above, and that authority be given to the Secretaries to deal with all cases which will arise between now and the meeting of the Board.

Transfer to Reserves

It was agreed that, because reports from the fields are as yet very incomplete, and since this Executive has no idea of the number of charges not on the Home Mission list which will be eligible for consideration under Section 117 (a) iv of the Manual, the Treasurer be requested to transfer to Reserves any balance of the Missionary and Maintenance appropriation unexpended on the closing of the Treasurer's books.

Transfer From Reserves

The Secretaries were authorized to transfer from Reserves amounts necessary to meet additional expenditures until the Board Meeting.

- (b) That the Board will take no action to augment these salaries until the Presbytery Committee on Ministerial salaries has completed its work of visitation of the charges for which the application is made.

Recommendation to the Board of Finance

On motion, the Executive adopted the following resolution:

Whereas at the meeting of the Executive of the Board of Home Missions, held on January 20th, 1949, consideration was given to the action of the General Council in setting the minimum salary for married, ordained ministers for 1949 at \$2,100, with a furnished house (\$2,200 in 1950 and \$2,400 in 1951);

And Whereas the only hope of implementing the decision of the General Council, and the Campaign of the National Committee of Laymen on Ministerial Salaries, is in the assurance that the Board will receive a larger appropriation from the Missionary and Maintenance Fund than it received in 1948;

And Whereas it is the judgment of the Executive and the Superintendents, after a careful review of the facts concerning funds presently available that, at least, 150,000 more will be needed;

The Executive of the Board urges, therefore, that when appropriations for 1949 are made, priority be given to this request for at least \$750,000 in the allocation to the Board of Home Missions, and thus avoid frustration of the campaign now launched by the laymen of the Church and disillusionment and bitter disappointment in the hearts of ministers in the lower salary brackets.

Torrance acts in a dual capacity as Secretary of the Toronto Home Missions Council and Superintendent of Missions for the three Toronto Presbyteries, and is entitled to the cost-of-living bonus voted by the General Council to Secretaries of the Boards and Superintendents of Missions, it was agreed to confirm payment of \$525.00 made to Mr. Torrance.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE:

Plumas-Mekewin.—The question of the status of the car subsidy given to Rev. E. A. McIlwain was referred to the Board.

SUPERIOR:

Beardmore (separated from Nipigon).—Agreed to vote grant sufficient to build salary up to rate of \$1,550.00 from October 10th, for Retired Minister.

Travelling Missionary.—Agreed to approve payment at rate of \$9.00 per Sunday, plus \$80.38 travelling expenses for 14 Sundays served by Mr. McIvor, less collections.

WINNIPEG:

St. Charles.—Agreed to vote \$50.00 for expenses of survey of this area made by Rev. James Wallace.

SASKATOON:

Hungarian Missions.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$21.19, balance of expenses re survey of this area.

CALGARY:

Calgary, Extension Work in North Sections.—Presbytery requested grant of \$100.00, each, for the two sections—Crescent Heights and North Hill, where work has recently been started. Referred to Secretaries, with power.

EDMONTON:

Devon.—Request for grant for week-end supply was referred to Secretaries, with power.

MEDICINE HAT:

Bow Island.—It was agreed: (a) to approve payment of grant to the widow of the late Rev. R. G. Wood to the end of 1948; payment from January 1st to be at rate to be decided by Board; and (b) to approve grant at rate of \$5.00 per week for supply.

CARIBOO:

Vanderhoof.—Agreed to confirm payment of grant at rate of \$900.00, for S O, from October 1st.

KOOTENAY:

Wardner.—Agreed that grant for winter supply be at rate of \$150.00—not "\$150.00 less offerings" as previously provided.

VANCOUVER:

Bowen Island.—Agreed to confirm payment of additional amount of \$52.25 for week-end supply for 1948.

Texada Island.—Agreed that grant be at rate of \$350.00 and \$80.00 travel, for M.L.S.

Willingdon Heights.—Agreed to confirm payment of grant at rate of \$600.00 for last quarter of 1948 and that grant be continued at this rate until the meeting of the Board.

DIGEST OF MINUTES THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS APRIL 6-8, 1949

The Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Wednesday, April 6th, 1949, at 10:00 a.m. The Chairman, Rev. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., presided and conducted devotions.

Rev. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Roll Call

The following were present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, J. R. Leng, George W. Morrison, W. M. Mustard, Waldemar Williams, S. I. Murley, B. D. Earle, J. H. Hamilton, George Telford, A. M. Stuart, T. H. Sendall, W. Bainbridge, J. C. Jackson; Messrs. R. A. Stewart, N. V. Buchanan, D. A. Morrison, C. R. Racine, Ralph S. Mills, Fred Mann; Dr. J. C. Pincock, Mrs. F. R. Snarr and Mrs. C. M. Loveys.

Corresponding Members: Revs. H. M. Dawe, W. S. Godfrey, J. I. MacKay, James A. Lyttle, J. C. Torrance, C. H. Best, R. J. McDonald, Robert Hall, Thos. Hart, and W. P. Bunt. The following were also given the privileges of corresponding membership: Dr. W. D. Noyes and Rev. J. A. Miller.

Regrets for absence were presented from Mr. C. A. Voaden.

Dr. Dorey reported that Rev. M. N. Omond, D.D., who had been appointed to the Board of Home Missions as a member-at-large by the last General Council, had passed away in February, and that the Sub-Executive had appointed Rev.

W. M. Mustard, D.D., to take Dr. Omond's place on the Board. It was requested that the sincere sympathy of the members of the Board be extended to Mrs. Omond.

Hours of Meeting and Adjournment

On motion, it was agreed—

- (1) That, unless otherwise arranged, the Board meet from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30; from 2:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.; and from 7:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- (2) That the half hour from 12 noon to 12:30 on Wednesday be reserved for devotions, to be conducted by the Moderator.

Ratification of Minutes

It was agreed that the minutes of the meeting of the Executive, held June 23, 1948, and of the Interim Executive, held October 21, 1948, and January 23, 1949, be confirmed.

Communications

The Secretary presented communications from the following:

- (1) Mrs. J. Erle Jones, formerly W.M.S. representative on the Board, in appreciation of sympathy extended by the Executive on the death of her husband.
- (2) Rev. Dr. T. W. Neal, in acknowledgment of expression of sympathy by the Executive on the death of Mrs. Neal.
- (3) Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee and the Presbyteries of St. John's and Bonavista, expressing appreciation of the cost of living bonus provided for married, ordained ministers and married lay supplies.

Appointment of Committees

Resolutions Committee—

The following were appointed on nomination of the Chairman: Rev. Waldemar Williams, Dr. T. H. Sendall, Rev. J. H. Hamilton, Mr. D. A. Morrison, and Mr. R. A. Stewart.

Executive—

It was agreed that the Interim-Executive as appointed by the General Council, be the Executive of this Board until the next meeting of the General Council.

Scale of Expenses of Members

The following scale of expenses for members of the Board was adopted:

- (1) That members be paid the cost of railway and sleeper tickets to Toronto and return; the cost of meals en route—such cost not to exceed \$4.25 per day; and the cost of hotel and meals in Toronto.
- (2) That those travelling by motor be paid on the basis of railway fare.
- (3) That the amount for Sunday supply shall not exceed \$15.00 per Sunday.

Presentation of Reports

Mimeographed Reports of the Superintendents of Missions and Superintendents of Institutions were distributed to the members of the Board.

Superintendency of Missions, Southern Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta

Retirement of Rev. R. J. McDonald, D.D.—

The Secretary referred to the forthcoming retirement of Dr. McDonald, and submitted the following resolution, which was adopted by the Board:

That the Board regrets that the time has come when, under the regulations of the Board, it has become necessary for Rev. R. J. McDonald, M.A., D.D., to relinquish his position as Superintendent of Missions for Southern Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta,—to take effect June 30th, 1949;

That the Board requests the Committee on Resolutions to prepare a suitable resolution;

That the report of the meeting of representatives of the Executives and of the Home Mission Committees of the Saskatchewan and Alberta Conferences be referred to a committee, which shall later present a nomination or nominations to fill the vacancy; and

That in accordance with the usual practice of the Board, Dr. McDonald's salary and cost-of-living bonus be continued to September 30th, 1949.

Committee on Superintendency—

The following committee was appointed: the Chairman, the Secretaries, Dr. T. H. Sendall, Rev. W. Bainbridge, Rev. J. C. Jackson, Dr. W. M. Mustard, Mr. Fred Mann, Mr. R. S. Mills, Dr. J. C. Pincock.

Dr. J. C. Pincock later presented the unanimous recommendation of the committee that Rev. R. W. K. Elliott, B.A., B.D., of Saskatoon, be asked to accept the Superintendency of Missions for Southern Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta.

It was directed that a wire to this effect be sent to Mr. Elliott. It was later reported that a reply had been received from Mr. Elliott, accepting the appointment but asking that it do not take effect until August 1st.

Moved and carried—

- (1) That the appointment of Rev. R. W. K. Elliott, B.A., B.D., as Superintendent of Missions for Southern Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta take effect August 1st; and
- (2) That we request Rev. R. J. McDonald, D.D. to continue in office till July 31st, and that payment of salary be therefore continued to October 31st, 1949.

Supervision of Home Mission Work in Hamilton and London Conferences

It was agreed that the findings of the committee (see minutes, January Executive) set up by the Board in 1948 to consider the request for the appoint-

ment of a Home Mission Superintendent for the Hamilton and London Conferences, be referred to the above-named Committee on the Superintendency, together with the recommendation of the Toronto Conference Home Mission Committee—"That the Presbyteries of Dufferin and Peel, Grey and Simcoe come under the care of the Superintendent of Missions for the Hamilton and London Conferences, when appointed."

The Report of the Committee, presented later, was adopted as follows:-

- (1) That Rev. R. T. Richards, D.D., of Centennial Church, London, be appointed Superintendent of Missions.
- (2) That the area to be served comprise all of the London Conference except the Presbytery of Algoma; all of the Hamilton Conference except the Presbytery of Sudbury; and the Presbyteries of Dufferin and Peel and Grey in the Toronto Conference; and that the newly appointed Superintendent reside in London.
- (3) That authority be given the Secretaries, in association with Rev. George Telford and Rev. Waldemar Williams, to confer with the Toronto Home Missions Council regarding a definition of the Home Mission duties of the Rev. J. C. Torrance and a fair division of the cost of his services as between the Toronto Home Missions Council and the Board of Home Missions.

Dr. Richards was later introduced to the Board and made a brief statement, indicating his willingness to accept the responsibilities of Superintendent of Missions.

Superintendency of Indian Missions

It was agreed that the question of the appointment of a Superintendent of Indian Missions, to which the Board in 1948 had directed that consideration be given by the Executive, be referred to the Committee on the Superintendencies.

The Committee presented the following recommendation which was, on motion, adopted:

That, in view of the fact that a Superintendent of Missions for Southern Ontario—which appointment was not contemplated last year—has been appointed; and, in view also of the continued shortage of ministers and the desirability of further study of the question, the appointment of a Superintendent of Indian Missions be deferred and referred to the Executive for study and report to the next meeting of the Board.

Statements by Superintendents

Brief statements were made by the Superintendents of Missions on the work in their respective areas. The Chairman expressed the appreciation of the Board.

Celebration of 25th Anniversary of Church Union

Dr. Sisco, having been invited to make a statement, outlined the plans for celebration of the 25th Anniversary of Church Union in 1950, as proposed by the Committee. -

Dr. Doré spoke of the part which might be taken by the Board of Home Missions in connection with the Celebration, and suggested that arrangements might be made to hold a public meeting at the time of the Annual Meeting of the Board in 1950. The proposal was seconded by Dr. Macdonald, and it was agreed that a committee be appointed to consider this matter and make plans.

The appointment of the committee was referred to the Executive.

Bissell Bursary Fund

The Secretary presented the following Report:

The Trustees of the Bissell Bursary Fund, at their meeting on September 9th, 1948, considered 17 applications and awarded 16 Bursaries—10 of \$50.00 and 6 of \$75.00; and two others were awarded later—one of \$75.00 and one of \$50.00.

Shortly after the meeting, Mr. David A. Keyes, who had previously received Bursaries totalling \$150.00, refunded \$160.00, making possible the awarding of four additional Bursaries—two of \$50.00 and two of \$25.00—to students whose applications had been received late.

Mr. Abraham M. Kabayama, who was given \$50.00, refunded the amount early in the New Year, having been awarded a \$300.00 Scholarship from the Ubukata Fund, on the understanding that he receive no aid from any other body.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INDIAN, ORIENTAL AND MARINE WORK

The Report of the Committee was presented by Rev. W. P. Bunt and adopted as follows:

Indian Work

Survey of Work—

A brief survey of the work of the Indian Missions in Northern Manitoba was given by Dr. Best, referring especially to changing conditions and the difficulty of finding suitable workers. Mr. Bunt described the situation in British Columbia, stressing the need for more ordained ministers.

Appointments and Nominations—

That Rev. Roy C. Taylor be nominated to the Settlement Committee of Alberta Conference for appointment to Eden Valley, and that all other nominations or appointments be referred, with power, to the Secretaries in consultation with the Superintendent of the area concerned.

Appreciation, Rev. J. W. Churchill, D.D.—

That a letter of appreciation be sent by the Secretary of the Board to Dr. Churchill for two years of consecrated service at Skidegate Mission.

Need of Workers—

That the Superintendents be asked to survey their areas to see if three or four laymen who are teachers could be found who would be willing to do Indian work,—

these teachers to attend the Special Course for Lay Ministers and receive special training in missionary work.

Residential Schools—

(1) Dr. Dorey made a short statement on the general situation, reporting that last year had been the best for some time so far as financial support from the Department of Indian Affairs was concerned.

(2) *Morley*: That a grant of \$4,900 be voted for 1949, and \$96.00 for insurance.

(3) *Norway House*: Dr. Dorey reported that plans for the building of a new Residential School were under way by the Department, and that it was probable the building would be erected within two or three years.

(4) *Edmonton*: That the present line of credit of \$4,000 at the Bank be continued until June 30th; and beyond that date only on condition that a budget for 1949 is presented to the Executive.

(5) *Alberni*: That a grant of \$3,000 be made, subject to presentation of 1949 budget to the Executive, and ratification by Victoria Presbytery; and that the line of credit of \$4,000 be continued.

(6) *Principals' Salaries*: That authority be given to the Principals of the Residential Schools to increase their salaries by \$150.00 per year.

Superintendency, Indian Missions—

That no action be taken on the recommendation of Prince Rupert Presbytery that in considering the need for additional help in oversight of all aid-receiving charges and mission fields, any appointment of another Superintendent of Missions made by the Board should be "on the basis not of a racial group or groups, but on that of a geographical area."

Crosby Girls' Home—

That the resolution of Prince Rupert Presbytery, asking for conference with the Indian Affairs Branch "as to having the Crosby Girls' Home turned into a home for aged natives, who otherwise would be homeless or forced to live in already overcrowded dwellings with relatives—such home to be financed by the Indian Department,"—be referred to Mrs. Loveys and the Secretaries of the Board for presentation to the Indian Affairs Branch, Ottawa.

Conferences of Indian Workers—

That the question of the holding of Conferences of Indian Workers in the summer of 1949 be referred to the Secretaries, with power, in consultation with the Superintendents of the areas concerned.

Fellowship of Indian Workers—

That, if a Superintendent of Indian Missions is appointed, he be asked to attend the National Conference of the Fellowship of Indian Workers, Bacone, Oklahoma, June 6-11, 1949, along with a worker from either Manitoba or British Columbia; the second delegate to be appointed by the Secretaries, after consultation with the Superintendent concerned.

Oriental Work

Toronto Chinese Mission—

That we request Toronto Centre Presbytery to appoint Rev. Lei Yu Shan as single ordained supply, as from April 1st, 1949.

Calgary Chinese Mission—

That the proposal to bring a young man from China, who will spend one year in one of our Theological Colleges and then supply the Calgary Chinese Church, be referred, with power, to the Secretaries.

Co-operation with Other Churches—

With regard to the recommendation of the B.C. Conference Home Mission Committee that there be discussion with leaders in the Chinese Church regarding the possibility of co-operation with the Presbyterian Church in Chinese work, it was agreed to approve the resolution and ask the Secretaries to confer with the corresponding officers of the Church of England and Presbyterian Church.

Nominations or Appointments—

That these be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Japanese Work, Kamloops and Revelstoke—

Re recommendation of Conference Home Mission Committee,—“That the request of Presbytery for a W.M.S. Worker to make a survey of the area be referred for further study to The Woman's Missionary Society and the Board of Home Missions,”—it was agreed that the request be implemented by the appointment of Rev. David Chung, B.A., B.D., as summer supply, to work under the direction of the ministers at Revelstoke and Kamloops and the Superintendent of Missions.

Nominations or Appointments—

That these be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Marine Work

Central Mainland Marine—

(1) Re request of Dr. Peter Kelly for a change of pastoral relations,—That we ask the Secretary of the Board to convey to Rev. Peter R. Kelly, D.D., the appreciation of the Board for his years of service on this mission.

(2) *Nomination:* That the Transfer Committee be asked to allot Mr. Rayburn H. McColl (ordinand) to the Conference of British Columbia, and that the Secretaries be authorized to nominate Mr. McColl for appointment to the Central Mainland Marine Mission by the Settlement Committee of the B.C. Conference.

Report of the Committee on the Appointment of Students

Dr. M. C. Macdonald presented the Report of the Committee, which was adopted as follows:

(1) During the summer of 1948, 176 students served the Board under its co-

operative plan (ordinarily called the "Students' Pool") and 10 others were appointed on a special basis. In addition 29 students substituted for laymen taking the Special Course for Lay Ministers.

- (2) The Committee has appointed to fields this year 221 students. They are distributed in the different Superintendencies as follows:

- (3) To date 234 students have made application for fields. Of the applicants 25 were young women and of these 21 have received appointments; 47 are non-candidates.
- (4) The Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students was carried out in 1948. Our Board instituted a new policy of setting allocations to fields. The response to this was so good that we were able to advance the payment of our student missionaries to \$18 a week plus board and travel on the field. The more experienced students serving their 3rd, 4th and 5th terms, were paid at the rate of \$19, \$20 and \$21 per week, respectively, plus board and travel on the field. An additional \$5 per Sunday was paid to those students who served over 18 Sundays.
- (5) As many as possible of the students not now appointed will be given employment to supply the charges of the laymen who are taking the Special Course for Lay Ministers during June, July and August.

It was agreed:

- (1) That the Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students should be continued for 1949.
- (2) That the appropriation for student work for the summer of 1949 be up to \$48,000.00, having regard to the number of students appointed.

Report of Literature Committee

The Report of the Committee, presented by Mr. Leng, was adopted as follows:

"Go Ye" was a joint publication of all Boards and Departments. The Board of Home Missions had 6 pp. of this and shared the cost proportionately.

Statement by Secretary of the M. & M. Department

Rev. D. G. Ridout, D.D., who was introduced by the Chairman, addressed the Board on the work of his Department during the past year.

The Chairman thanked Dr. Ridout and offered congratulations on behalf of the Board on the splendid attainments of his Department in 1948.

Statement by the Treasurer

The Chairman welcomed Dr. V. T. Mooney, who gave a general outline of the financial situation of the Church, with special reference to the work of the Board of Home Missions. The thanks of the Board were extended to Dr. Mooney.

Uninvested Balances of Home Mission Board Funds

The Treasurer reported that the following uninvested balances of Home Mission Funds were at December 31st, 1948, being used for financing the work of the Church:

It was agreed to approve the action of the Board of Finance in this regard and to authorize the use of an amount up to \$500,000 for this purpose during the current year.

Transfer From Reserves

It was moved and agreed,—That the Secretaries be authorized to transfer from Reserves the amount necessary to meet the balance expended in 1949 to care for the 1948 Special Claims, up to May 15th, 1949.

Promotion of Bequests and Annuity Gifts

The Treasurer presented the following resolution, which had been passed by the Treasury Department and endorsed by the Board of Finance:

- “(a) That 2% of the annual receipts of The United Church Reserve from bequests and matured annuity gifts be paid into a fund for the promotion of further bequests and annuity gifts;
- “(b) That, with the consent of the Boards and Departments concerned, an annual sum equal to 2% of each's annual receipts for the year from bequests and matured annuity gifts be paid into such promotion fund; and

"(c) That promotion undertakings and expenditures from the fund so established shall be authorized by a Promotion Committee to be appointed by the Treasury Department."

It was agreed to approve the principle contained in the suggestion of the Treasury Department and to authorize the payment of a yearly sum equal to 2% of the Board's annual receipts from bequests and matured annuity gifts into such promotion fund.

It was agreed that Dr. Dorey be the representative of the Board on the Promotion Committee, which it is proposed to set up.

Special Course for Lay Ministers

Dr. Macdonald reported that the 1948 School for Lay Ministers had been the most successful yet held; that plans had been made for the continuation of the Special Course this year, when Dr. Elias Andrews would again act as Principal, lectures would be given in Emmanuel College, and the men would be housed in the United Church Training School, as last year. It had been decided to limit the number to thirty-five men.

It was agreed:

- (1) That this Board endorse and support the Special Course for Lay Ministers in 1949 and that it do all in its power to enlist the best possible men.
- (2) That the Board recommend to the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools that any man who is recommended for a four-year course leading to ordination and who has taken two terms at the School for Lay Ministers be given credit for one year on the four year course.

It was requested that the sincere appreciation of the Board be conveyed to Mrs. J. D. H. Hutchinson, Principal of the United Church Training School, for their courteous co-operation in this project, and also to Dr. Elias Andrews and the members of his staff.

Radio Broadcasting

Dr. Dorey presented a Report setting forth the responsibility of the Board of Home Missions with regard to Radio Broadcasting in the Conferences and including Estimates for 1949 as adopted by the Executive of the Radio Committee. This was received for information.

It was agreed to accede to the request of Prince Albert Presbytery that the arrangement whereby Rev. W. H. Pike visits the Sanatorium and gives services and oversight to Colleston, Davis and Henribourg fields, be continued, but that the amount allowed him in lieu of rent be \$50 a month instead of \$40.

Report of the Hospital Committee

Dr. Best presented the Report of the Hospital Committee. The Board adopted the following recommendations of the Committee.

Lamont Hospital—

- (1) That authority be given to extend the Bank loan until the Federal Construction grant is paid.
- (2) That when this grant is received, it be disbursed as follows:
 - (a) Outstanding accounts be paid.
 - (b) Bank loan be retired.
 - (c) Balance be paid on loan from Board of Home Missions.
- (3) That authority be given to increase the Bank loan to \$50,000.

Incorporation, Hospitals Board—

That the matter of incorporation of the Alberta Hospitals Board be referred to a committee, consisting of the Secretaries and Mr. Buchanan, to report to the Board next year.

George McDougall Hospital—

(1) *Salary, Medical Superintendent:* That we offer Dr. L. M. Edmunds the following arrangement regarding fees—

First \$4,500	100% to Doctor
Second \$4,000	75% to Doctor and 25% to Hospital
Above this amount	50% to Doctor and 50% to Hospital

And that the Doctor occupy the Residence, rent free, and have office space in the hospital, paying his own expenses.

(2) *Banking Authority:* That the name of Mr. C. J. Alke be substituted for that of Mr. J. E. McLean as one of the signing officers, in connection with the transaction of business with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Smoky Lake.

Salaries of Doctors—

That, in view of representations made by the Board of the R. W. Large Memorial Hospital, Bella Bella, following the inauguration of the British Columbia Hospital Insurance Scheme, the Secretaries review the salaries paid to Doctors in our Home Mission Hospitals and report to the Executive.

B.C. Hospital Insurance Scheme—

Mr. Bunt gave a brief outline of the services available under this Scheme.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital—

(1) That, in view of the report made concerning the condition of the building, any action be postponed until receipt of further information as a result of the survey of the Provincial Government Commission; and that a committee consisting of the Secretaries, Rev. Geo. Telford, Rev. W. Williams, Dr. A. M. Stuart, Mr. R. S. Mills and Mrs. C. M. Loveys deal with any matters that may arise.

(2) *Medical Superintendency:* That Dr. G. W. Fiddes be appointed Medical Superintendent and Dr. Don Lim Assistant Doctor.

(3) Re recommendation of Prince Rupert Presbytery that no action be taken in the adoption of a policy to bring the administration of the Hospital into conformity with the general provincial policy—viz., that the business administration be separate from the medical administration,—That this matter

be referred to Mr. Bunt to work out a plan that would be satisfactory to the parties concerned and report be made to the Executive.

Bella Coola Hospital—

That the appointment of Miss Pauline Pickering as Matron be confirmed.

Skidegate Inlet Hospital—

Re Resignation of Dr. G. H. Burgess as Medical Superintendent: That Dr. Burgess be asked to reconsider his resignation and that we seek to retain his services; that he be offered one year's leave of absence; and that negotiations be entered into concerning his future relations to the Hospital Work and to the Board of Home Missions.

Port Simpson Hospital Buildings—

That the following recommendations of the Prince Rupert Presbytery be adopted and that authority be given to the Secretaries to complete the arrangements:

- "(1) That the Home Mission Board make such disposition of the hospital as seems best, at the earliest possible date, and that such salvaged material as has value be used to improve the natives' homes in Port Simpson.
- "(2) That (1) apply also to the doctor's residence, at such time as it may be returned to the Board of Home Missions.
- "(3) That at such time as the new mission house is built, the house now occupied by the missionary ('engineer's residence') be offered for sale."

Service to Lumber Camps in Thunder Bay District

The request of the Superior Presbytery that the Board give consideration to the appointment of a Chaplain to serve the Lumber Camps in the Thunder Bay district, together with a letter from the Home Mission Convener of the Presbytery, suggesting the possibility of a Radio Ministry from Fort William, was before the Board.

It was suggested that if a man were appointed, he might serve in a three-fold capacity, combining the work among the Lumber Camps, the Radio Ministry, and the work of the Travelling Missionary. After discussion, it was agreed to refer the matter to the Secretaries for consultation with the Presbytery and the Superintendent of Missions.

Rural Work

Dr. R. J. McDonald presented the Report of the Committee on Rural Work. It was considered section by section and adopted as follows:

- (1) That the offer of two Scholarships of \$45.00 each, for attendance at the Inter-Denominational School for Rural Leaders, to be held at Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Illinois, July 25 to August 26, be accepted; that the selection of ministers to take advantage of these scholarships be referred to the Secretaries; and that, in addition to the Scholarship, \$105.00 be provided for each.
- (2) Re request of the Conference of Rural Ministers of the Toronto, Hamilton and Bay of Quinte Conferences that the Board make a grant in aid of a Conference or Conferences of Rural Ministers, to which some outstanding leader in this field might be invited.
 - (a) That \$300 be placed at the disposal of the Secretaries and the Chairman of the Committee to assist in the arranging of a series of Rural Life Conferences across older Ontario.
 - (b) That we offer the Ministers' Annual Summer Conferences in Saskatchewan and Alberta assistance to the amount of \$100 each, in order to strengthen the Rural Life aspects of these Conferences; and that a similar amount be available to assist in promoting a like Conference in Manitoba.
 - (c) That \$100 be made available to promote a Rural Life Conference in Prince Edward Island; also, \$150 to promote a Rural Life Conference in connection with the meeting next spring of the Maritime Conference Home Mission Committee.
 - (d) That a grant of \$50.00 be given to the Lorraine Fellowship for Rural Life study.

- (3) That a grant of \$300 be given towards the work of the Summer Schools in Newfoundland.
- (4) That the Conference Home Mission Committees be requested, with the aid of a questionnaire to be prepared by the Chairman of the Rural Life Committee and the Secretaries, to make a study of the Rural Church situation in their respective Conferences and report to the Board in 1950, and that, in the cases where studies were made before, specific note be taken of changes that have occurred since these studies were prepared.
- (5) That the Board of Home Missions communicate with the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools, suggesting that the Theological Colleges be asked to endeavour to effect a closer liaison between these Colleges on the one hand and, on the other, the Agricultural Colleges, Government Agencies and the various farm organizations; also that the Theological Colleges be requested to furnish a course of lectures on rural pastoral theology.
- (6) That ministers be recommended to observe Rural Life Sunday and that the co-operation of the Editor of the Observer be secured, to the end that the matter be publicized there, including an outline order of service.

Report of Committee on Institutional Missions & Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Dr. J. I. MacKay presented the Report of this Committee. It was adopted as follows:

Nominations and Appointments—

- (a) That the suggestion re the appointment of an Assistant to Rev. Wesley A. Hunnisett of Fred Victor Mission be left in the hands of the Secretaries and Mr. Torrance to issue.
- (b) Re St. Paul's Italian, Toronto: That the situation caused by Rev. L. Sauro's health condition and the future care of the work be referred to the Secretaries, with power.
- (c) That Rev. Bruce W. Hall be nominated to the Settlement Committee of Hamilton Conference as Superintendent of All People's Church, Sudbury; and that, in the event of Mr. Hall's not accepting the appointment, the matter be referred to the Secretaries, with power.
- (d) That Rev. Harold M. Bailey be nominated to the Settlement Committee of the London Conference as Superintendent of All People's Church, Sault Ste. Marie.
- (e) That appointments of Women Workers that may be necessary be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Recommendations of Conference of Non-Anglo-Saxon and Institutional Mission Workers—

Recommendations of the Conference held in Winnipeg, October 5-6, 1948 were presented.

- (1) Re recommendation that "similar conferences should be planned to be held alternately in each Province and that representation in favour of this should be

made to the Home Mission Board and The Woman's Missionary Society." Agreed that this be referred to the Executive for action.

(2) Re need for services in languages other than English and recommendation of the Conference that, as a United Church we ought to be vitally concerned with non-English speaking groups and "ought to give service in their languages as far as our leadership makes possible, and in a degree consistent with their steady progress in the use of English, which needs to be intelligently and consistently encouraged." Agreed to adopt.

(3) Re Relationship with National Groups: The Conference urged that the United Church seek for an honest appreciation and cultivation of the best of the inherited cultural traditions of such groups and encourage them not to become separate forces, but rather part of a greater Canadian citizenship; and that the Government be urged to share responsibility for this,—particularly as related to new immigrants. Agreed to adopt.

(4) Re recommendation that the "Church explore the possibility of finding young men or women interested in Evangelical Christian work who may now be in D.P. camps or elsewhere in Europe, who would be able to come to Canada, complete their education, and enter into the full-time service of the Church." Agreed to adopt.

(5) Re recommendation that "steps be taken toward co-operation with other communions so that the Protestant Church may present a united invitation to the unchurched." Agreed to adopt.

(6) Re recommendation that "in our Missions we work increasingly towards the development of Boards and use of democratic procedure in the making of policy." Agreed to adopt.

(7) Re recommendation that "in relationship to Social Agencies, we acknowledge the contribution that they make to the community and urge upon the Church responsibility on the policy forming level." Agreed to adopt.

City Church Convocation, Columbus, Ohio—

That the question of participation in the City Church Convocation, to be held in Columbus, Ohio, January, 1950, be referred to the Executive of the General Council, with a view to securing a co-operative approach to the matter by various Boards of the Church.

Queen Street United Church, Toronto—

That if, during the year, an adjustment or re-arrangement of the work is made, the matter of the grant be referred to the Executive.

Church of All Nations, Toronto—

That a communication be sent to the Ukrainian congregation, asking that \$200 be raised towards ministerial support; that the Finnish congregation be asked to raise an additional \$150, and the Hungarian congregation an additional \$50, towards ministerial support; and that the Church of All Nations be advised that its budget is not responsible for these additional amounts assigned to the above-mentioned congregations.

Community House, Sydney—

That the action of the Secretaries in suggesting that the Board of Control

of Community House, Sydney, ask the City of Sydney School Board for an annual donation in view of the use of the gymnasium and other facilities by basketball teams of the six city schools, be confirmed.

Hungarian Presbyterian Congregation, Windsor—

That the approach of this Congregation with a view to possible reception into the United Church be referred to the Secretaries for consideration.

French Work—

(1) *Appointments and Nominations:* That these be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

(2) *Literature:* That a grant of \$300.00 be voted for the production of French literature, if required.

(3) *Hymnary:* That the matter of a contribution towards the publication of a new Hymnary in French, in co-operation with other Churches, be referred to the Secretaries, with power—the grant not to exceed \$500.00.

(4) *Special Worker:* Dr. MacKay made a statement regarding the large numbers leaving the Roman Catholic Church, most of whom drifted into atheism and indifference. He suggested consideration of the appointment of some suitable person to follow up such people,—possibly a layman. Agreed to approve the suggestion in principle and refer it to the Executive, with the understanding that any appointee should work under the minister of St. John's Church, Montreal, (or some other church), the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery and the Superintendent of Missions.

Immigration

Mr. Leng presented the Report of the Immigration Committee and outlined the services to newcomers, carried on at the Ports of Halifax, Quebec and Montreal, and the ministry among the Dutch immigrants.

Port Chaplaincies—

On recommendation of the Committee, it was agreed:

(1) That the work of the Immigration Committee at Halifax be continued and that the following comprise the Committee: Dr. Elias Andrews; the Chairman of the Halifax Presbytery, Dr. W. S. Godfrey, Mrs. Roy Vail, Dr. A. G. Pentz, Rev. B. R. Tupper, Dr. Ian Mackinnon, Rev. H. E. Campbell, Dr. J. A. MacKeigan, the President of the Presbyterial, and the W.M.S. worker.

(2) That the work of the Immigration Committee at Montreal be continued and that it be comprised as follows: Rev. J. I. MacKay; the Chairman of the Montreal Presbytery, Dr. A. Lloyd Smith, Rev. R. DeWitt Scott, Dr. R. G. Katsunoff, Rev. D. R. Morrison, Rev. M. Feher, Rev. K. T. Smits, Rev. Ralph E. Spencer, Mrs. F. H. Stephen (President of the Presbyterial), Mrs. C. V. Curtis, Miss I. R. Nourse, and Miss Jeannie King.

(3) That the appointment of an ordained minister as Immigration Chaplain, to be centered at Montreal, be left to the Secretaries, with power, and that in the meantime Rev. K. T. Smits do this work under the direct supervision of Dr. J. I. MacKay.

Dutch Immigration—

Dr. Dorey made a statement regarding the situation and read a letter from the Secretary of the Board of Domestic Missions of the Reformed Church in America, stating that their Committee on Holland Immigrants to Canada had recommended that the Reformed Church undertake work among the Dutch settlers in Canada "in fraternal relation with The United Church of Canada and the Reformed Churches of the Netherlands and other evangelical churches."

On recommendation of the Committee, it was agreed to adopt the following resolution:

That, having heard the letter from the Board of Domestic Missions of the Reformed Church in America, the Secretaries write to Dr. Vandenberg, informing him that the United Church will be glad to receive whatever co-operation the Reformed Church in America can offer in the care of Dutch Immigrants,—at the same time informing him that what we are now doing and the policy followed has been undertaken at the request of the Netherlands Reformed Church; and that the Secretaries confer with the Netherlands Reformed Church, to ascertain what it desires the United Church to do for the Immigrants belonging to that Church and whether there is any change of policy on its part.

Child Immigration—

Dr. Dorey stated that, the General Council having referred to the Board for consideration two Memorials, urging that the Government of Canada authorize the immigration into this country of adoptable children, that the Board of Home Missions be made responsible for securing responsible homes for them, and that the clergy and laity of the Church be acquainted with the action and a plea made to our people to open their homes and hearts,—the Secretary of the Board had interviewed the Commissioner of Immigration and had ascertained that adoptable children can only be brought to Canada by Churches or Institutions which maintain orphanages or homes, approved by provincial authorities, for the care of children. It has also been ascertained that the laws governing the adoption of

children are different in practically every province and that there are difficulties in the way of persons in one province adopting children who are in the care of an Institution in another province. Compliance with the regulations of the Department would entail the establishment of an orphanage in some central province of Canada and the expenditure of a considerable amount of money in capital funds and for upkeep.

On recommendation of the Committee, it was agreed that, as it does not seem that at the present time funds would be available for this purpose, the Board recommends to the Executive of the General Council that the matter be not proceeded with.

Displaced Persons—

On recommendation of the Committee, it was agreed that we ask our church membership to sponsor displaced persons and to make use of the channels provided by the Canadian Council of Churches with the Refugee Division of the World Council of Churches.

Introduction of Dutch Ministers—

Mr. Leng introduced to the Board Rev. L. P. Bruijn, a minister of the Reformed Church in America, who, on behalf of the United Church and the Netherlands Reformed Church, has been working among the Dutch people in Southern Ontario, and Rev. K. T. Smits, a minister of the United Church, who has been serving as Chaplain at the Ports of Montréal and Quebec.

Mr. Bruijn gave a brief outline of his work amongst the Dutch immigrants, of whom approximately 8,000 had recently arrived in Canada. Mr. Smits described his recent visit to Holland and his efforts to give a true picture to the people there of the United Church and Canadian conditions.

The Chairman expressed the appreciation of the Board to Mr. Bruijn and Mr. Smits.

Fund for Retired Workers

Appropriation—

It was agreed that the appropriation to this Fund for 1949 be \$4,500.00.

Special Home Mission Projects for 1949

The Secretaries were given authority to present a list of special projects for the Board of Home Missions to the Committee on Projects, which makes recommendations to the Board of Finance as to the projects to be included in the Missionary and Maintenance Fund objective for 1949.

National Committee on Ministerial Salaries

Dr. J. I. MacKay, the Director, made a statement regarding the progress of the Campaign to increase ministerial salaries throughout the Church.

It was moved and carried unanimously,—That this Board express to Dr. MacKay its appreciation of the unselfish spirit evidenced by his ready acceptance of greatly increased work, its admiration for the way in which he has discharged the responsibilities, and its congratulations on the measure of success achieved.

Report of Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents

Car Subsidy Fund—

Dr. Dorey reported that a total of 127 car subsidies, totalling \$57,700, had been given in 1948, and that, in addition, 10 power-bikes had been purchased for student missionaries, at a total cost of \$1,980. There was available in the Fund at the end of December approximately \$37,000.

It was agreed that the policy of giving car subsidies be continued, and, on recommendation of the Secretaries and Superintendents, certain revisions were made in the regulations governing the Fund, which now are as follows:—

- (1) Every minister on a rural charge of two or more appointments and where a car is necessary, and where the salary on a married ordained basis does not exceed \$2,100, plus such travel allowance as applies to the charge, shall be eligible for a car subsidy of \$500.00, part of which shall be a loan and part of which may be cancelled in accordance with the provisions hereinafter set forth.
- (2) The subsidy shall be available to a minister who qualifies as in (1) when he is able to purchase a new car or a good used one. His application must be endorsed by the Superintendent of Missions and the Home Mission Convener of Presbytery. In cases where a used car to be purchased is priced at \$500.00 or less, the Secretaries shall have discretion to reduce the amount of the subsidy.
- (3) While the cost of cars remains at the present level and in case of new cars, \$200.00 of the subsidy shall be a loan, repayable at the rate of \$100.00 a year, in quarterly instalments of \$25.00.

In case of men on aid-receiving charges, quarterly payments shall be deducted from the quarterly grants. Repayment will begin in the quarter following that in which the subsidy has been paid.

When the total subsidy is less than \$500.00, the proportion of it which shall be a loan shall be left to the discretion of the Secretaries. This provision to be retroactive in the case of men who have purchased new cars.

- (4) Interest on the loan shall be at the rate of 3% per annum on that part of the loan remaining unpaid at the end of each calendar year.
- (5) The balance of the car subsidy shall be dealt with as follows:

If a minister who has received a subsidy continues to serve a charge paying \$2,100 or less, on a married ordained basis, then the balance of the subsidy, i.e., \$300.00, shall be cancelled as follows—if he continues to serve, as above:

- to June 30th, 1950—25% of the balance
- to June 30th, 1951—a further 25%
- to June 30th, 1952—a further 25%
- to June 30th, 1953—a further 25%

This shall apply to subsidies paid before December 31st, 1949. Cancellation of part of the subsidy paid after January 1st, 1950, shall be conditional on the minister's remaining on a charge, as above, for a year beyond the dates set forth.

- (6) If a minister does not continue to serve a charge, as above, but is settled on a charge paying a higher salary than \$2,100, on a married, ordained basis, then the balance of the subsidy shall be repayable at the same rate as the loan above mentioned.
- (7) In addition to the subsidy as above, ministers serving in the Newfoundland and British Columbia Conferences, and in the Grande Prairie and Peace River Presbyteries of the Alberta Conference, who take delivery of a new car in the area in which they serve shall receive a special allowance of \$150.00, which shall be an outright grant; and, similarly, ministers serving in the rest of the Alberta Conference shall receive \$125.00; and ministers serving in the Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Maritime Conferences shall receive \$100.00.
- (8) Should a minister die or retire before payment is completed, the Executive shall decide what proportion of the subsidy shall be cancelled.
- (9) No minister shall be eligible for a further subsidy until four years have elapsed.

The following recommendations of the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents were also adopted:

Allowances for Incidental Travelling Expenses—

That the scale of allowances for Incidental Travelling Expenses be revised, as follows:

- (a) *Student Missionaries*: Berth at tourist rate, where necessary and available, plus \$4.25 per day for meals en route; and when necessary for student to spend the night or longer in a city before completing the journey to his field, \$2.50 for hotel and 75 cents for each meal. If no tourist berth available, then upper standard.
- (b) *Ordained Ministers*: Same allowance as for students but with standard sleeper; expenses for wife to be at same rate.

Regulations re Grants for Manse Furniture—

That on the dollar for dollar basis the amount to be contributed by the

Board shall be increased from \$200 to \$300. In the case of manses being furnished for the first time, the Board may contribute up to \$400, on condition that the charge shall raise at least \$300 within the first year. The Secretaries shall have authority to go beyond these figures in special cases.

Regulations re Modernization of Manses or Parsonages—

That the regulations governing the administration of the Fund for the Modernization of Manses or Parsonages be revised as follows:

I. That the following items shall be considered as constituting the modernization of manses or parsonages:

- (1) Bathroom and fixtures; and where there is no water or sewerage, the installation of pressure-tank with pump and septic tank.
- (2) Electric light and power.
- (3) In special cases, where these items are not possible, the installation (for the first time) of a furnace may receive consideration. Grants for this purpose shall be 50% of the total cost, but in no case shall the grant exceed \$125.00.

II. That financial assistance shall be given on the following basis:

- (1) A grant on the basis of dollar for dollar—not to exceed \$350.00; but in cases where in addition to the first two items, a furnace is installed (for the first time) and the house is fully insulated, the maximum grant may be \$450.00.
- (2) In cases where the total cost is considerably over \$700.00—or \$900.00, as the case may be, the charge may in addition make application for a loan—not to exceed the amount of the grant.
- (3) In cases where only partial modernization is undertaken, the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned shall have discretion as to what proportion of the grant shall be given.
- (4) All applications must be approved by Presbytery and by the Executive of the Board before payment is made.

Re Vacancies and New Work

Dr. Dorey reported that there were upwards of 170 vacancies in the various Conferences which should be filled by ordained ministers.

Statements by the Superintendents of Missions indicated that new work should be undertaken immediately at various places, naming a total of sixty-six.

Sunday School in the Home by Mail and Air

Rev. D. T. Forsyth, Secretary of the Board of Christian Education, addressed the Board on the work of the Inter-Board Committee on The Sunday School in the Home by Mail and Air. He stated that in 1948 there was a total enrolment of 7,392, representing 3,200 families.

A grant of \$2,800 was voted for this work in 1949.

Youth Caravans

Mr. Forsyth outlined the work being carried on by groups consisting of four consecrated young people and an adult counsellor, in new housing areas. Vacation Schools were conducted, surveys made, visitation carried out, in places designated by the Home Mission Superintendents.

The Chairman thanked Mr. Forsyth for his presentation and expressed, on behalf of the Board, appreciation of the work being carried on both by the Sunday School in the Home and by the Youth Caravans.

Report of Resolutions Committee

Rev. Waldemar Williams presented the Report of the Committee, which was adopted as follows:

Appreciation, Rev. R. J. McDonald, M.A., D.D.—

We express to Rev. R. J. McDonald, M.A. D.D., our very warm and sincere appreciation for the sacrificial and valuable service he has rendered to the Church and the work of the Board of Home Missions, in particular, during his term as Superintendent of Home Missions in Southern Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta.

During the thirteen years he has held this office Dr. McDonald has given without stint of his many gifts and strength. His wise judgment, statesmanlike leadership, kindly spirit and understanding have meant much in the work of the Kingdom. His gracious personality, untiring zeal and far-seeing counsel have been of inestimable value during years which have been most difficult in the history of our Church:

We wish Dr. and Mrs. McDonald many years of happy and fruitful retirement to enjoy the rich memories of the past which must be theirs, after the long and useful years they have served the Church.

The Late Rev. M. N. Omond, D.D.—

The Board has learned with sincere regret of the death of one of its members, Rev. M. N. Omond, D.D., whose passing is a great loss, not only to the Church as a whole, but particularly to the Board of Home Missions, in whose work he had always taken a deep interest, having given many years of efficient service both as Conference and Presbytery Home Mission Convener. To Mrs. Omond the Board extends its heartfelt sympathy in her bereavement.

The Late Rev. A. D. MacKinnon, D.D.—

The Board records its sense of loss in the passing of Rev. A. D. MacKinnon, D.D., whose notable ministry in the Cariboo takes a high place among the great contributions of our Church to Canadian pioneer life.

The Late Rev. W. R. Butler—

The Board requests that a letter, conveying the sympathy of the members be sent to Mrs. Butler and her family, Twillingate, Newfoundland, in the loss they have sustained in the death of husband and father. Mr. Butler, through his

entire ministry, served the Church on aid-receiving and home mission charges in Newfoundland.

Appreciation, Dr. Pidgeon—

The Board records its deep gratitude to the Very Reverend George C. Pidgeon, D.D., LL.D., for his timely and masterly address to the Board at its Annual Supper Meeting. We express the hope that it may be possible for him to make this available to a wider audience as part of the background and history of The United Church of Canada.

Thanks to Kirk Club—

We express to the Kirk Club of Bloor Street United Church our heartiest thanks for their courtesy in catering for the Annual Supper Meeting.

Appreciation, Rev. J. W. Churchill, D.D.—

The Board requests that a letter be sent to Dr. Churchill, conveying its appreciation of the fine service he has rendered at Skidegate Mission and of his willingness to continue in the work after reaching the age of retirement, in order that this field might not be left vacant.

Appreciation, Rev. Peter Kelly, D.D.—

The Board expresses its sincere appreciation of the splendid service rendered by the Rev. Peter R. Kelly, D.D., in the wide field of Marine Missions in British Columbia. The faithfulness and efficiency which have marked his work are hereby recognized and we trust that many years of fruitful endeavour may still be his.

Appreciation, Chairman and Others—

The Board records its hearty and sincere thanks to our genial Chairman for the capable manner in which he has guided its deliberations throughout the sessions of the Board; to the Minute Secretary; to the Office Staff for their part in making it possible for the Board and Committee meetings to proceed so smoothly; and to the Secretaries and Superintendents for the clear, concise and informative reports presented, and for the devotion, energy and wise leadership they are giving in the discharge of the many and varied responsibilities with which they are faced as representatives of our great Church and particularly in its Home Mission activities.

Date of Meeting of Board in 1950

Decision re the date of the meeting of the Board in 1950 was referred to the Executive.

Report of the Appropriations Committee

The Report of the Appropriations Committee was adopted as follows:

1. That, on the basis of estimates of contributions from congregations, the following be the scale of salaries for 1949:

Married Ordained—with unfurnished house	\$2,150
Married Ordained—with furnished house	2,100

Single Ordained—without house	1,950*
Single Ordained—with house	1,900
Married Lay Supply (2 terms at Lay School)	1,800
Married Lay Supply (others)	1,750
Single Lay Supply (2 terms at Lay School)	1,600
Single Lay Supply (others)	1,550
Special Fields—with unfurnished house	1,700
Special Fields—with furnished house	1,650

Retired Ministers—to be set for each field in the light of all the circumstances.

Where retired ministers are temporarily giving full-time service to pastoral charges which normally have the service of married, ordained ministers, the salary may be built up to the above scale. In other cases, the scale shall not exceed \$1,700. In all cases including pension but not cost of living bonus.

Students—\$11.00 per week-end supply, except in cases where a lower rate has been agreed upon by the Appropriations Committee or may be arranged between the Superintendent and the office.

Superintendents of Institutions—Maximum \$2,800.

Women Workers—Maximum \$1,750—Minimum \$1,500.

2. *Re Special Allowance for Transportation on Fields:*

(a) That, in harmony with the intent of Sec. 104 (e) of the Manual, there be a travel allowance for all ministers on aid-receiving charges who find it necessary to operate a car in the performance of their duties.

(b) That the basis for 1949 be as follows:

Where the average Sunday drive over the year is up to 25 miles, the grant be	\$100
Over 25 and up to 40 miles	140
Over 40 and up to 50 miles	200
Over 50 and up to 60 miles	230
Over 60 and up to 70 miles	260
Over 70 miles	300
Special fields with exceptional travel to be dealt with on Their merits.	

3. *Re Charges Not on the List:*

(a) That at the first meeting following the Annual Conferences, each Presbytery be requested to examine the salaries being paid by the respective charges to discover any charge or charges paying less than the scale set by the Board of Home Missions, and to arrange for a visitation by the Presbytery in co-operation with the Lay Committee on Ministerial Salaries.

(b) That such visitation shall be arranged at latest at the first regular meeting of Presbytery following Conference. Applications for grants from charges not already on the Home Mission list should not be endorsed by Presbytery unless and until the following requirements have been fulfilled:

(1) Presbytery visitation as above.

(2) Every person canvass within the calendar year.

- (3) Application on the proper form (Annual Report and Request for Grant) completely filled out, from the Official Board of the Charge. Presbytery should be satisfied that such pastoral charges have made reasonable increases in salary responsibility in the past two or three years before recommending that they be brought up to the established minimum.

Charges that fall within the classification known as special fields shall be dealt with on their merits by the Secretaries in consultation with the Superintendents concerned.

- (c) That this information be sent to Lay Associations as well as to Presbyteries.

Letter to Fields Assuming Self-Support

It was directed that a letter of congratulation should be sent to fields which have become self-supporting during the year.

Transfer to Property Fund

The following resolution was, on motion, adopted:

That the Secretaries furnish to the Executive at each meeting a statement of the Property Fund;

That in case the balance has fallen below \$125,000, the transfer from Reserves to Property Fund of the amount considered necessary to maintain this balance be authorized;

That the total so transferred until the next annual meeting of the Board shall not exceed \$150,000; and

That the Board draw the attention of the Executive of the General Council to the serious situation confronting the Board in the administration of the Property Fund: namely—

That, at the end of 1946 the Board had available for grants and loans some \$300,000, and that on December 31st, 1948, this amounted to \$1,900.

That the legitimate requests for grants and loans continue to increase, due partly to the growth of suburban areas and industrial communities;

That the needs for rehabilitation of Indian Mission houses and other properties detailed to the Board of Finance in 1948 as totalling \$920,000 have not been met by the meagre amounts available from Projects;

That the diversion of Project money—for 1949 \$333,000—to current needs further aggravates the situation;

That the Board will this year have to transfer \$150,000 from Reserves;

That reasonable expenditures at the rate of the last two years will exhaust this amount in a short time; and

That it is the opinion of the Board that unless sizeable amounts are made available for the Property Fund, it will be necessary to curtail and even cease making loans and grants;

Therefore, we request the Executive to give consideration to this really perilous situation that faces the work of the Church.
