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DIGEST OF MINUTES
THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS
JUNE 23rd, 1950

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Church of All Nations, 423 Queen St. West, Toronto, on Friday, June 23rd, 1950, at 9.30 a.m. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, J. R. Leng, Waldemar Williams, George Telford, A. M. Stuart, and Mrs. C. M. Loveys.

On motion, Revs. J. A. Lyttle, J. I. MacKay, J. C. Torrance and R. T. Richards were made corresponding members.

Regrets: Regrets were presented from Rev. W. M. Mustard, Mr. C. R. Racine and Mr. Ralph S. Mills.

Rev. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) Mrs. J. A. Miller and daughters, in appreciation of expression of sympathy from the Board.
- (2) Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee, recording appreciation of the Board's continued allocations for travel allowances, subsidies for the purchase of motor cars, and the cost of living bonus for married men.

The Secretary drew attention to the fact that Mr. H. N. Burt had resigned from the chairmanship of the Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee after having served for twenty-one years in that capacity. The Executive requested that a letter be sent to Mr. Burt, expressing appreciation for his many years of service to the cause of Home Missions in Newfoundland.

Sympathy

Reference was made to the sudden passing of Rev. George Morrison, a member of the Executive and the Chairman of the Board's Committee on Rural Work. The following resolution was adopted and it was directed that it be inscribed in the Minutes of the Executive and a copy forwarded to Mrs. Morrison:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions records with sincere sorrow the sudden passing of one of its most faithful members, Rev. George W. Morrison, of Wyevale, Ontario. While Mr. Morrison was a member of our Board and its Executive for only two years, yet his intimate connection with Home Missions dates back through many years on a number of committees dealing with the Rural Church and its work.

Mr. Morrison was in the truest sense a great rural pastor and leader. He loved the countryside and the country people. He cherished a fine idealism for the Rural Church. He possessed a fund of knowledge and vital information through his study and experience, and his insight into the problems of rural people, the country church, and agriculture. He sought with fine devotion and resourcefulness to improve and enrich the ministry of the Church to the rural areas of Canada. As Chairman of the Rural Life Committee of our Board, he was constructive in his leadership and unceasing in his efforts to equip and inspire rural churches and ministers to perform the widest and most effective type of **Christian** ministry to that great section of our population whose lives are rooted in the soil.

The Executive records with gratitude its appreciation of Mr. Morrison's services and extends to the inner circle of the family, and especially to his widow and children, its deepest sympathy.

The late Rev. Arthur Barner, D.D.

The Secretary reported that the Rev. Arthur Barner, D.D., formerly Superintendent of Indian Missions, had passed away very suddenly in Vancouver. It was directed that the sympathy of the Executive be conveyed to the members of Dr. Barner's family and that the following resolution be inscribed in the Minutes and a copy forwarded to Mrs. Barner:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions has learned with regret of the sudden passing of the Rev. Arthur Barner, D.D.

Dr. Barner officially retired from the Superintendency of Indian Missions at the time of the Board Meeting in 1935. The word 'officially' is used with the clear intent of marking the fact that Dr. Barner never ceased to be interested in the welfare of the native people of Canada and continued to show his interest as he acted as Hospital Visitor at the Coqualeetza Sanitarium.

We would always think of Dr. Barner as a good man. He probably would have preferred to be thought of as one in whom and for whom the Grace of God had done great things. He adorned the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ and was in the most real sense a deeply religious man. If any man can be said to have been ready to meet his Lord Dr. Barner was that man.

To Mrs. Barner, Dr. Herbert Barner and Mrs. F. Anfield the Executive would offer its sympathy, at the same rejoicing in the pleasure given to its members to have numbered Dr. Barner as one of their dearest friends.

Letters of Sympathy

The Secretaries were requested to send letters of sympathy on behalf of the Executive to the families of the following persons who have recently passed away: Rev. George Kemlo, Rev. F. J. Bailey, and Rev. G. Tymchuk; also to Rev. F. G. Joblin on the death of Mrs. Joblin; to Rev. Douglas Smith on the death of his mother; and to Mr. K. M. Kilbourn, on the death of his father.

Congratulations

(1) The Executive extended congratulations to the following on their election to the presidency of their respective Conferences: Dr. W. P. Bunt, Dr. Thos. Hart, Dr. W. S. Godfrey, Rev. John MacKay, and Rev. C. E. Dyer.

(2) Congratulations were also extended to the following, recently honoured by the conferring of the Degree of Doctor of Divinity: Rev. H. M. Dawe, Rev. Lester L. Burry, Rev. A. A. MacLeod, Rev. Charles Johnson, Rev. J. D. McCrae, Rev. H. G. Forster, Rev. W. A. Beecroft, Rev. Peter Henderson, and Rev. R. C. Scott; and to Lieut. Rupert Jackson, son of the late Rev. Oliver Jackson, recently made a Member of the Military Division of the Order of the British Empire.

Report of Action of Executive of General Council

It was reported that the Executive of the General Council had taken action on matters referred to it by or affecting the Board of Home Missions, as follows:

(1) *Re Committee on Capital Needs*: The Executive (a) appointed an interim committee on the Promotion of Local Church Extension Campaigns, of which Dr. M. C. Macdonald is Convener; the persons constituting the committee, as built up by the time of the September meeting of the General Council, to be nominated for appointment by the Council; and (b) recommended that the Committee on Capital Needs be continued and that it review from time to time the working out of the plans to meet capital needs and report to the Executive or Sub-Executive of General Council.

(2) *Re Chinese Immigration*: The Executive adopted a resolution requesting the Federal Government to modify "such rules for the admission of Orientals as P.C. 2115 as will remove racial discrimination or any unfairness and injustice without permitting such mass migration as might change the fundamental composition of the Canadian people."

(3) *Re Committee on Ministerial Salaries*: The Executive adopted the resolution sent forward by the Board.

(4) *Administration, Euphemia Mitchell Trust Fund*: The Executive adopted the following resolution: "That the Euphemia Mitchell Trust Fund be placed under the administration of the Board of Home Missions, and that the income derived therefrom be used for the purpose, or purposes, within the terms of the Trust as recommended by one or more of the Toronto Presbyteries and by the Toronto Home Missions Council according to procedure now obtaining for Home Mission grants."

This report was received for information.

Manitoba Flood Situation

1. *Report by Dr. Dorey*: Dr. Dorey, who had recently spent several days in Winnipeg and attended the meeting of the Manitoba Conference, reported in some detail regarding the areas suffering damage by flood, both in Winnipeg and other parts of Manitoba, with special reference to United Church property and our Institutional Missions. He stated that an estimate of \$34,000 had been submitted to the Government as the amount needed to cover the cost of emergency repairs and relief supplies for United Churches in Greater Winnipeg and the Red River Valley.

The Secretaries were given authority to take such steps as might seem necessary to protect the interests of the Board so far as damage to its church or institutional property was concerned.

2. *Release of Rev. Fred J. Douglas*: The Executive approved the release of Rev. Fred J. Douglas, Superintendent of Central Winnipeg Mission, for a short period of relief work, and authorized payment of grant—approximately \$100.00—for temporary supply in his absence.

3. *Re Emergency Grants*: The Secretaries were given authority to deal with requests for emergency grants arising from flood damage.

Extension Work, Vancouver-Westminster Metropolitan Area

Dr. Dorey reported that, as directed by the Board, he had conferred with representatives of the Vancouver and Westminster Presbyteries and other interested persons with regard to Extension Work in the above area and the need for the appointment of a Secretary of Extension Work. He asked that his statement be accepted as a progress report and that the matter be referred to the Secretaries for further negotiation. This was agreed.

Hospital Work

Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont—

It was agreed to accede to the request of the Alberta Hospitals Board that a line of credit of \$10,000 be authorized during the period of construction, in accordance with which the following resolution was adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED: That Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Superintendent, Mr. Nelles V. Buchanan, K.C., Mr. M. Nemirsky and Mr. J. Matwichuk, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of The Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont, Alberta, operated by The United Church of Canada, to borrow money from the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, Alberta, on behalf of the said Hospital, either by over-drawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars.

George McDougall Hospital—

The Executive voted a grant to cover six months' salary of Miss Agnes McKinnon, R.N., who is resigning as Matron of the Hospital, this having been authorized by the Board.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital—

1. *Re Doctors:* Dr. Dorey stated that he had just been advised by Dr. W. T. Bunt that the two Doctors Kennedy (man and wife) who had agreed to go to Hazelton, one as Doctor for the Indian patients and the other to carry on private practice, had withdrawn. The matter of securing doctors was referred to the Secretaries.

2. *Banking Authority:* It was agreed to make a change in the Banking authority issued last October by substituting the name of Rev. J. H. Matthews for that of Dr. G. W. Fiddes, and for that purpose to adopt the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED: That Mr. Selwyn B. G. Simons, Miss Myrtle McLeod and Rev. J. H. Matthews, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of The Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton, B.C., to sign cheques upon The Royal Bank of Canada, Smithers, B.C., on behalf of the said Hospital; and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000);

Also That the said Mr. Selwyn B. G. Simons, Miss Myrtle McLeod and Rev. J. H. Matthews, or any two of them, be and are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also, from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

Also That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be and are hereby revoked."

Bella Coola Hospital—

It was agreed that the salary of the Medical Superintendent, Dr. J. E. Whiting, should be at the rate of \$4,000, as from January 1st, 1950.

Skidegate Inlet Hospital—

1. *Report:* Dr. Dorey presented the following report of a conference he had had in Vancouver with representatives of Pacific Mills and of the Powell River Paper Company, to discuss the hospital situation at Queen Charlotte:—

(a) At the conference, the following facts emerged:

- (i) The present hospital building is inadequate and not worth doing anything with.
- (ii) The programme of the Companies envisages a long period of operations.
- (iii) On the whole and taking a long term view of logging operations and of settlement, the present location is the best.
- (iv) There is a 20-22 bed hospital building at Aliford Bay—built in war time for service personnel, which is now the property of the Powell River Company.

(b) The representative of the Company said he would recommend to his Company that the building be given to us on the following conditions:

- (i) We would have it moved and set up at Queen Charlotte City.
 - (ii) We would engage to keep it in operation and we would do all we could to have a doctor at Queen Charlotte City.
 - (iii) In the event of our failure to maintain the hospital and medical services in operation, the ownership of the building would revert to the Company.
- (c) It is understood that the cost of moving and re-establishing the hospital might be \$10,000-\$12,000, and that the Company has a man and equipment available.
- (d) There is a possibility of help from Pacific Mills and from the Government, but these sources are not yet assured.

Dr. Dorey further stated that an amount of \$8,000, which was held in a Special Hospital account, would be available to apply on the cost of moving the hospital.

On motion, it was agreed that the Secretaries be given authority to proceed with plans for moving the hospital building from Aliford Bay to Queen Charlotte.

2. *Doctor's Residence*: It was agreed that Dr. G. E. Singer, the new Medical Superintendent, should be given free use of the doctor's residence for a period of six months.

Report re Conference of Doctors—

Dr. Dorey stated that a conference with the doctors of our British Columbia Hospitals had been held in Vancouver, which was also attended by Mr. Selwyn Simons from Wrinch Memorial Hospital. A full discussion had taken place regarding the relation of the Hospitals to the B.C. Hospital Insurance Scheme and some useful decisions had been arrived at.

Representation at Home Missions Council of North America

It was decided that the Secretary and Associate Secretary should represent the Board at the meeting of the Home Missions Council of North America, to be held at Cleveland, Ohio, November 27-28, 1950.

Special Course for Lay Ministers

Dr. Macdonald reported that the School for Lay Ministers had got under way on June 6th, with twenty-eight men in attendance and two still to come.

As directed by the Board at its meeting in March, Dr. Macdonald submitted the following Memorial to the General Council for approval of the Executive:

That this Executive request the General Council to make provision for the continuance of the Special Course for Lay Ministers for the years 1951 and 1952, in a modified plan, as follows:

- (a) That there be set up, if possible, two Courses of about one month each year—one East and the other West—in areas where the greatest numbers of Lay Supplies are used.
- (b) That the Board of Finance be requested to provide an appropriation each year to finance the Courses.
- (c) That the administration of the Courses be under the direction of the Board of Home Missions; and that all arrangements—recruiting laymen, selecting locations for the Courses, staffing the Schools—be the responsibility of that Board.

It was agreed to approve the resolution and direct that it be transmitted to the General Council.

It was also agreed to adopt the following resolution, for transmission to the General Council:

That this Executive recommend to the General Council that laymen who have already taken the two terms of the Special Course for Lay Ministers, and who are recommended to go on to ordination and take the 2-B Course, be credited with one year in lieu of the work and study already done in the two terms of the Special Course for Lay Ministers.

Student Missionaries

1. It was reported that Miss Ileen James, student missionary on the Knee Hill Valley field, Alberta, had incurred hospital and medical bills totalling \$151.50 and had had to leave the field. The matter of a grant towards these expenses was referred to the Secretaries.

2. An enquiry was presented from the Superintendent of Missions as to whether the Executive would authorize the reimbursement of Mr. Arthur J. Griffin, married student serving the Port Kells field, B.C., for moving expenses of some furniture, amounting to \$20.00, this expense having been incurred because the only accommodation available for a married student was an unfurnished house. Referred to Secretaries.

Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute

It was agreed to authorize the placing of Public Liability Insurance on the teaching staff, pupils and employees of the Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute.

Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Church of All Nations, Toronto, Hungarian Work—

Rev. J. C. Torrance reported that, for reasons of health, Dr. A. Czako had signified his intention of seeking retirement at the end of this Conference year.

It was agreed:

- (a) That Dr. Czako's salary be continued for three months from date of retirement (June 30th).
- (b) That the grant for editorial duties in connection with "Tarogato" be increased to \$300.00 from October 1st, 1950.
- (c) That the Secretaries be given authority to secure a successor to Dr. Czako in the Hungarian Work.

Re 104 Millwood Road, Toronto—

The Secretaries were given authority to secure possession of the property at 104 Millwood Road, Toronto.

Conference of Non-Anglo-Saxon Workers—

Dr. Dorey reported that a conference, lasting the whole of one day, had been held at Yorkton, at which there were present representatives of our New Canadian Work in Saskatchewan and Manitoba, along with Dr. C. H. Best, Rev. Robert Hall and himself. The report was received for information.

Non-Anglo-Saxon Publications—

The fixing of grants for "Tarogato", "La Favilla" and "Viesti" was referred to the Secretaries.

Chaplaincy Services, Byron Sanatorium

Enquiry was made as to whether the Board would consider making a grant towards chaplaincy services for the Byron Sanatorium. Agreed that this be referred to the meeting of the Board.

Radio

Prince Albert Radio Ministry: Dr. Dorey reported that it was proposed to consolidate the work of the Radio Ministry with that of the Nisbet School Home, with the idea that one man should combine the duties of the principalship of the School Home and the work of the Radio Ministry. This was received for information.

Oriental Work

Japanese Work, Toronto—

It was requested that a letter be sent to Rev. Peter Bryce, D.D., expressing appreciation of the services rendered by the Metropolitan Church to the Japanese congregation in Toronto; and also that a letter be sent to Rev. K. Shimizu, complimenting the Japanese congregation on the splendid beginning made in its new home at Queen Street United Church.

Japanese Work, Hamilton—

It was agreed to authorize payment of supply for the Japanese Work in Hamilton.

Requests for Appointment of Women Workers

(1) *Happy Valley, Labrador*: The request for the appointment of a Woman Worker to this area was referred to the Secretaries in cooperation with The Woman's Missionary Society.

(2) *Montreal, Westminster-Central*: A request was presented from Presbytery for the appointment of a Woman Worker by The Woman's Missionary Society.

It was agreed to approve an arrangement whereby, after consultation with Dr. R. G. Katsunoff, Miss Donaldda Jardine, at present W.M.S. Worker at the Church of All Nations, shall be appointed to the Westminster-Central area; with the understanding that Miss Louise Mayova give as much time as possible to the Women's Group and the Church School at the Church of All Nations, and that The Woman's Missionary Society will give financial support towards provision of secretarial assistance to Dr. Katsunoff.

3. *Montreal, Italian Work*: It was agreed that Dr. J. I. MacKay and the officials of The Woman's Missionary Society should have consultation regarding the relationship of the Woman Worker to the Church of the Redeemer, and that report be made to the Board.

Indian Work

Re Bill to Amend The Indian Act—

The question of whether any representations should be made to the Federal Government regarding the proposed Amendments to The Indian Act was referred to the October meeting of the Executive.

Edmonton Residential School—

Dr. Dorey reported that the erection of Day Schools on the Reserves would seriously affect enrolment at the Edmonton School, reducing it by about 50 per cent. The Secretaries were authorized to take this matter up with the officials of the Indian Affairs Branch in Ottawa.

Immigration

It was agreed to explore the possibilities of a plan for promoting British Youth immigration to Canada; and that, should this plan prove feasible, after consideration by the Immigration Committee, to give the Secretaries power to proceed; a report to be presented to the October meeting of the Executive.

Date of Board Meeting

It was decided that the Annual Meeting of the Board should be held April 4th-6th, 1951.

Authority to Deal with Emergent Matters

It was resolved that the Secretaries, Rev. Waldemar Williams and Rev. George Telford, be given authority to deal with any emergent matters which might arise between meetings of the Executive.

Thanks to Church of All Nations

It was requested that appreciation be expressed to Rev. J. Lavell Smith for having provided a room in the Church of All Nations for the meeting of the Executive.

Archibald Cowan Church Extension Fund

The Executive authorized payment of the following grants and loans from the Archibald Cowan Church Extension Fund, as recommended by the Saskatchewan Conference:

- (1) *Moose Jaw, Minto Church*: Grant of \$1,500 and loan of \$1,000, with interest at 4%; the interest for the first three years to be applied on principal. (See also item under Property Claims). This is in place of previous action by October Executive, 1949, and Board, 1950.

- (2) *Moose Jaw, Trinity Church*: Grant of \$2,500. (See also item under Property Claims). This is in place of previous action by October Executive, 1949, and Board, 1950.
- (3) *Prince Albert, Wesley Church*: Loan of \$3,000, with interest at 5%; to be repaid in five annual instalments; for the purpose of assisting in the erection of a basement which will ultimately be part of the new church.
- (4) *Regina, Extension Work*: Grant of \$3,000 for the general purpose of extension work, with the understanding that the whole matter shall be reviewed each year.
- (5) *Saskatoon, Second Street Church*: Grant of \$2,500 and loan of \$2,500, with the understanding that a definite plan will be submitted and application form completed.

Property Claims

BONAVISTA:

Glovertown, Church.—Re request for extension of time for repayment of loan of \$3,000, voted by the Board.—Agreed that terms of repayment be as follows: \$150.00 a year for first two years, and \$300.00 a year for nine years, with interest at 4%, beginning immediately.

BURIN:

Burin, Manse.—Agreed to vote loan of \$3,000 and grant of \$1,500, towards building a new manse; loan repayable at rate of \$500.00 a year.

Flat Islands, Manse.—Agreed to vote loan of \$500 and grant of \$500, towards cost of new manse; loan repayable at rate of \$100 per year, with interest at 4%.

GRAND FALLS:

Curling, Church.—Re request for change in terms of repayment of loan of \$5,000, voted by Executive in October, 1946: Agreed (1) to waive the outstanding interest amounting to \$712.78; (2) that payment of first instalment of principal be made December 31st, 1950; and (3) that loan be without interest for the next five years only; namely, from January 1st, 1950, to December 31st, 1954.

ST. JOHN'S:

Hamilton Inlet, New Boat.—Agreed to authorize building of new boat, to replace "Glad Tidings II". Further details to be supplied by Superintendent.

TWILLINGATE:

St. Laurent, Church.—Agreed to cancel indebtedness of \$2,372.00, on the understanding that the Montreal Finance and Extension Board will also cancel amount owing to it.

Verdun, Bethanie Manse.—Agreed to vote loan of \$200.00, repayable in two years, without interest, for repairs to manse.

COCHRANE:

Nakina, Manse.—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,500 towards rebuilding of manse, repayable at rate of \$300 a year, with interest at 4%. (See grant under "Modernization of Manses").

MUSKOKA:

Gibson Reserve, Mission House.—Agreed to vote grant of \$277.00, covering purchase of necessary equipment.

NORTH BAY:

Toronto, 104 Millwood Road.—Agreed to authorize the purchase of the interest of the Presbyterian Church in this house for \$2,500 to \$3,000.

Toronto, 306 Woodbine Avenue.—Request for redecorating of interior of house was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

TORONTO EAST:

Wanstead Manse, 74 Robinson Avenue.—Agreed to vote amount up to \$175.00 to provide a fence around the back yard.

TORONTO WEST:

Elverside Manse, 23 Parkchester Road, Tp. of North York.—The Board referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent the question of provision of a manse. DIGEST OF MINUTES

OCTOBER 17th, 1950

The Interim Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Tuesday, October 17th, 1950, at 10.00 a.m. (D.S.T.). The Chairman, Rev. W. M. Mustard, D.D., presided, and opened the meeting with prayer.

The Secretary introduced the members of the Executive.

Regrets: Dr Dorey reported that Rev. J. R. Leng was in Alberta, attending Presbytery meetings, and read a letter from Mr. Ralph S. Mills, who is recovering from injuries suffered in a motor accident. The Executive requested that the greetings and best wishes of the members should be sent to Mr. Mills.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

(1) Mrs. Arthur Barner, Rev. F. G. Joblin, Rev. R. Douglas Smith, and Mrs. C. J. Bailey, in appreciation of letters of sympathy in recent bereavements, sent on behalf of the Executive.

(2) Revs. Drs. W. P. Bunt, Thos. Hart, W. S. Godfrey, and Rev. John MacKay, in acknowledgment of congratulations extended by the Executive on election to the Presidency of their respective Conferences.

(3) Revs. H. M. Dawe, A. A. MacLeod, J. D. McCrae and W. A. Beecroft, acknowledging congratulations on the conferring of the Degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Resolutions of Sympathy

The Secretaries were asked to extend the sympathy of the Executive to the following, who have recently suffered bereavement: Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Godfrey, on the death of Mrs. Godfrey's mother; Dr. S. H. Greenslade, on the death of Mrs. Greenslade; Mr. Lloyd Hooper, missionary at Cape Mudge, whose father passed away in August; Rev. Alfred Pollard, on the death of Mrs. Pollard as the result of a car accident; and to the family of the late Rev. S. W. Dean, D.D., who passed away in September.

Report of Action of General Council

Dr. M. C. Macdonald reported on the action taken by the General Council at its meeting in September on certain matters affecting Home Missions:—

(1) *Re Special Course for Lay Ministers*: The Council approved the recommendations of the Board (a) that the Special Course be continued for 1951 and 1952, under a modified plan; and (b) that laymen who have taken two terms of the Special Course and are going on for ordination, taking the 2-B Course, be credited with one year in lieu of the work already done. (See Minutes of June Executive).

(2) *Re Promotion of Local Church Extension Campaigns*: The Council endorsed the plan whereby, of the \$3,375,000 which is to be raised by the Church over a five year period for Capital needs, \$2,288,500 will be used for local church extension purposes, and that of this latter amount \$1,500,000 at least is to be raised by the promotion of campaigns in local centres, particularly in centres where extension work is required. Included in the \$1,500,000 is Toronto's objective of \$500,000 and Montreal's of \$350,000. A National Committee for the Promotion of Local Church Extension Campaigns was named by the Council.

(3) *Review of Pastoral Boundaries*: The following resolution was adopted by the Council: "That the General Council, recognizing the serious lack of ministers in many areas of our Church, feels that this problem could to a large measure be overcome if Presbyteries were acquainted with this fact. It suggests, therefore, that every Presbytery be asked to review their pastoral boundaries with a view to making available more men for areas presently in need of pastors."

The Executive asked the Secretaries to confer with the Secretary of the General Council in order to arrange for the sending of a communication to the Presbyteries concerned, calling attention to the action of the Council; and also that the Secretaries write to Superintendents of Missions and Home Mission Conveners, emphasizing the need for giving leadership in this undertaking.

(4) *Re Minimum Salary for 1951*: The Council adopted the following:

- “(a) That the information regarding the establishment of a new minimum salary of \$2,400 with free furnished manse, plus travel allowance, for 1951, be communicated to all pastoral charges of the Church.
- “(b) That the General Council request all Presbyteries to communicate with all pastoral charges which are now and will be below the new minimum and acquaint them with instructions regarding canvass prior to application for grants.”

(5) *Re Summer Employment of Candidates*: The Council adopted the following:

“That a communication from the Board of Home Missions of the Church be addressed to Secretaries of Presbyteries in time for the spring meeting of Presbyteries, reminding the Presbytery Committee on Candidates for the Ministry that the Church is anxious to have each Candidate examine his plan for summer employment in the light of the calling to which he has committed himself or herself, and further that the Presbytery Committee on Candidates seek at all times to encourage Candidates to apply for summer mission fields throughout their years of training for the Christian ministry.”

Rural Work

It was reported that the General Council had passed the following resolution:

“That General Council request the Board of Home Missions through its Rural Life Committee, with power to add, to study regionally the question of rural depopulation and related problems and their effect upon the life and work of our Rural Church, the information to be gained through its study and findings to be made available to the whole Church through press and Church papers, and the recommendation of the Board to be submitted to the General Council for necessary action.”

It was agreed that this be referred to a committee, consisting of the Chairman, the Secretaries, and Rev. J. M. Boyd, with power to draft terms of reference and to appoint both the Committee on Rural Work and additional members; a report to be presented to the January Executive.

3.—A recommendation was submitted from the Home Mission Committee of Vancouver Presbytery that an ordained assistant to Rev. R. A. Redman, Superintendent of First Church, be appointed. This was referred to the Board.

Request for W.M.S. Worker

It was agreed to recommend to The Woman’s Missionary Society that Miss Daphne Dymond be appointed to the Muskoka United Charge as W.M.S. Worker.

Appointment Executive Secretary Vancouver-Westminster Metropolitan Council

The following resolution was submitted:

"That this Interim Executive of the Metropolitan Council recommend to the Home Mission Board of The United Church of Canada that Rev. Douglas H. Telfer, D.D., be appointed Executive Secretary and Director of the Metropolitan Council of Vancouver and Westminster Presbyteries of The United Church of Canada, and that his salary be equal to that of a Home Mission Superintendent."

It was moved and agreed: That this matter be referred to a committee, consisting of the Chairman, the Secretaries, Rev. George Telford, Rev. R. Douglas Smith, and Mr. George Copeland, to report at the afternoon session.

The report was presented and adopted as follows:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions has received the communication from the Interim Executive of the Metropolitan Council of Vancouver and Westminster Presbyteries. After careful study and review, it respectfully submits the following observations as to its position in the matter:

Inasmuch as the right of appointment and the payment (at first) of the major portion of the salary of the new appointee are the responsibility of the Board, the following procedure should be observed before any names are considered or individuals approached—

- (a) The Board of Home Missions should outline its views on the duties of the Secretary of the Metropolitan Council.
- (b) The new Secretary's relation to the Superintendent of Home Missions should be clearly defined in order to avoid any conflict in authority or function.
- (c) The salary to be paid should be determined by the Board of Home Missions, which will consult with the Metropolitan Council in determining the proportion to be borne by the Council and the Board, respectively.
- (d) There should be a definite understanding as to how long the office of the Secretary will be required, thus fixing a reasonable time limit.

The Executive has appointed a Special Committee, with instruction that it outline the duties of the office of the Secretary of the Metropolitan Council, determine salary to be paid, give direction re rental of office space, etc. In these items the Committee will consult with the Interim Executive of the Metropolitan Council.

The Special Committee, named above, is given power to issue in the matter if definite action is deemed advisable before the January meeting of the Executive.

In stating the above position, it is taken for granted that the Board of Home Missions is expected to provide a major portion of the funds necessary for the salary and maintenance of the Secretary of the Metropolitan Council, for a period at least. If this is not correct and if it is the intention of the Metropolitan Council to assume full financial responsibility locally, then the above suggested procedure does not apply.

Chaplaincy Services

It was decided that the following be referred to the Board:

(1) The request of the Toronto Home Missions Council that the Board of Home Missions provide a full-time Chaplain for the Toronto Hospital, Weston, in which there are some 673 patients.

(2) The request of Portage la Prairie Presbytery that a small grant be given towards expenses of minister of McCreary, to enable him to visit the Grey Nuns' Hospital at St. Rose, a French community 22 miles north of McCreary, twice a month.

Re Student Missionaries

(1) *Conference at Battleford*: It was agreed to contribute \$35.00 towards the out-of-pocket expenses of Supervising Pastors in connection with a conference of Student Missionaries and their Supervising Pastors of the Battleford Presbytery, held at Battleford in June, with the understanding that this must not be regarded as setting a precedent.

(2) *Hospital and Medical Expenses*: Dr. Macdonald reported regarding students who, while serving mission fields during the summer, had incurred medical and hospital expenses, and requested direction as to payment or part payment by the Board of these expenses. The following is the list:

The Secretaries were authorized to pay up to \$50.00, where necessary, in each case, and the question of further financial assistance was left to the discretion of the Secretaries where the amount involved is large.

(3) It was agreed that any Students who had suffered financial loss from inability to start work on their fields at the regular time, owing to flood conditions in Manitoba, should be reimbursed from the Manitoba Flood Relief Fund.

Hospital Work

Cruise Memorial Hospital, Vita—

It was reported that, on receiving representations from the local Hospital Board with regard to the need for considerable expenditure on capital account for the purchase of new equipment, the Manitoba Government had agreed to make a grant to the Hospital of \$25,000, payable over a period of five years at the rate of \$5,000 per year; and that, in addition, the Government would probably install a new X-Ray machine without cost to the Hospital.

It was agreed that this offer be accepted with gratitude and that a letter of appreciation be sent to the Honourable Ivan Schultz, K.C., Minister of Health and Public Welfare of the Manitoba Government.

Mitchell Memorial Hospital, Carrot River—

A request was presented from the Secretary-Treasurer of the Carrot River Union Hospital District that the Board of Home Missions donate the equipment now in our Hospital to the Carrot River Hospital Board and add an amount sufficient to cover any donations made to our Hospital by local residents.

It was agreed to refer the matter to the United Church Hospital Board in Saskatoon for its recommendation; and, if that Board so recommends, that the Secretaries be empowered to donate the equipment to the Carrot River Union Hospital Board, with the proviso that no cash donation should be made.

Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont—

Because of the change in the name of the Hospital, the Alberta Hospitals Board advised that a new resolution authorizing the transaction of business in the name of the "Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont, Alberta," with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, was necessary. The Hospitals Board also requested authority for the transaction of business with The Treasury Branch, Andrew, Alberta. In compliance with these requests, the Executive adopted the following resolutions:

I. BE IT RESOLVED: That Mr. Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of the Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont, Alberta, to sign cheques upon the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, Alberta, on behalf of the said Hospital, and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00);

Also That the said Mr. Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, be and are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to negotiate with, deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques, or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also That the said Mr. Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, are hereby authorized to open a payroll account for the Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont, with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, Alberta; monies to be deposited to the credit of the said payroll account only by means of transfers from the main or regular account of the said Hospital at the Lamont Branch of the Bank; and the said Bank is hereby authorized to accept the signatures of Mr. Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, on cheques drawn upon such payroll account;

Also the said Mr. Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, from time to time, to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

And That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be hereby revoked.

II. BE IT RESOLVED: That Mr. Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, are hereby authorised for and in the name of the Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont, Alberta, to sign cheques upon The Treasury Branch, Andrew, Alberta, on behalf of the said Archer Memorial Hospital;

Also That the said Mr. Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, be and are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to negotiate with, deposit with, or transfer to the said Treasury Branch (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques, or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Treasury Branch;

Also the said Mr. Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, from time to time, to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Archer Memorial Hospital and the said Treasury Branch and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the form of settlement of balances and release of the said Treasury Branch.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton—

Dr. Dorey reported that Dr. Leon Komar had recently taken over the medical practice at Hazelton, and asked that the Executive ratify the arrangement whereby Dr. Komar would be given the use of the bungalow belonging to the Hospital, at a rental of \$25.00 per month, with free light and water, and that he pay \$50.00 a month for office space in the Hospital, with the understanding that, to a large extent, he furnish his own equipment and all his supplies. It was agreed to approve this arrangement.

Skidegate Inlet Hospital, Q.C. Islands—

It was reported that since this matter was before the Executive in June, Dr. Bunt had interviewed representatives of the Powell River Company, Pacific Mills, and the Provincial Government, with regard to the proposal to move the hospital building at Aliford Bay (which is the property of the Powell River Company and will be donated by the Company) to a site in Queen Charlotte City, where it would be operated by the Board of Home Missions, replacing the present Skidegate Inlet Hospital building. Dr. Bunt reported that the Companies had submitted the following:

- (1) That the Hospital—which is L-shaped, 150ft. in one direction, 90ft. in the other—be placed on the Western half of Block 10, between Third Avenue and Skidegate Inlet. (This is the property of the Skidegate Inlet Hospital).

- (2) The estimated cost of moving the hospital is \$7,000.
- (3) The cost of placing the building on permanent cement blocks, re-assembling, installing furnace room, connecting water system, and generally putting the building on the new site, other than moving, is likely to be about \$7,000:

If the project is undertaken, the understanding was that the cost would be shared by Pacific Mills, the local community, the Provincial Government and the Board of Home Missions, on which basis the Board's share would not likely exceed \$6,000.

It was agreed that the Secretaries be given authority to proceed with this project along the lines indicated in Dr. Bunt's report.

Tupper, Chairman; the Chairman of the Halifax Presbytery; Dr. W. S. Godfrey, Mrs. Roy Vail, Dr. A. G. Pentz, Dr. Ian Mackinnon, Rev. H. E. Campbell, Dr. J. A. MacKeigan, Mrs. W. G. Robertson; the President of the Presbyterial; and the Immigration Workers.

Appointment of Interim Standing Committees

The appointment of Interim Standing Committees of the Board was referred to the Secretaries, for report to the January meeting of the Executive.

Retired Minister: Where retired ministers are temporarily giving full time service to pastoral charges normally served by married ordained ministers, the salary may be built up to the above scale. In other cases, the salary scale to be set for each field in the light of all the circumstances but not to exceed \$2,000.

Students: \$13.00 per week-end supply.

Superintendents of Institutions: Maximum \$3,000.00.

Women Workers: Maximum \$2,000.00. Minimum \$1,700.00.

Literature

It was agreed to confirm payment of \$31.50 for paper supplied to Rev. H. B. Gibson, Gods' Lake, for a Cree periodical mimeographed by him and distributed to Indians in the Norway House Presbytery.

United Church Council, Porcupine Area

It was agreed to approve the plan submitted by the Cochrane Presbytery for the setting up of a United Church Council for Extension Work in the Porcupine area, as follows:

That the duties of the Porcupine United Church Council be:

- (a) To co-ordinate the work of The United Church of Canada in the area of the Porcupine Camp.
- (b) To survey each area in the Porcupine Camp with a view to the development of new work where such is needed; and
- (c) To have oversight and direction of the W.M.S. Worker in the area.

That the Porcupine United Church Council be composed of the following:

- (a) All United Church Ministers in the area.
- (b) The Home Mission Convener of Presbytery.
- (c) The Home Mission Superintendent.
- (d) A representative of the W.M.S. appointed by the Cochrane Presbyterial.
- (e) Two members appointed by the Sessions of each of the following charges: Timmins-First; Timmins-Mountjoy; Schumacher; South Porcupine; and Porcupine.

Transfer to Property Fund

The Secretary reported regarding the state of the Property Fund.

On motion, it was agreed: (1) to request the transfer of \$50,000 from Reserves to Property Fund, as authorized by the Board; and (2) to request the Treasurer to transfer to Property Fund \$50,000 of the amount set aside for the Board of Home Missions from the Missionary and Maintenance Fund.

Property Claims

BURIN:

Pool's Cove, "Ryerson" Boat.—Agreed to vote \$90.85 for spring outfitting of boat, mast headlight, bulbs and fire extinguishers.

ST. JOHN'S:

Hamilton Inlet, "Glad Tidings" Boat.—Moved by Mr. George Copeland, seconded by Rev. R. D. Smith, and agreed, That the Executive approve the recommendation of Presbytery and Conference Committee that a new boat be built to replace the "Glad Tidings"; and that in view of the adequacy and acceptability of a boat built in Newfoundland at a cost of approximately \$6,000.00, we recommend that this Board proceed to procure such a boat.

It was further agreed that the mover and seconder of the above resolution and the Secretaries of the Board should meet with Rev. H. W. Vaughan of Zion Church, Brantford, who has undertaken to raise money towards this project.

HALIFAX:

Halifax, Brunswick Street, Manse.—Agreed to vote grant of \$2,000 and loan of \$2,500, repayable over a 5-year period with interest at 4%, towards purchase of the house now occupied by the minister; with the understanding that if unusually heavy expenditure for repairs should be incurred, additional assistance up to a grant of \$500 will be given.

MONCTON:

Mountain View (Moncton Suburban) Church Hall.—Agreed to vote grant of \$2,500 and loan of \$2,000, repayable in five years with interest at 4%, towards cost of building first unit of church hall, at estimated cost of \$8,000; and that Secretaries be authorized to increase grant up to \$3,000, if the cost should be found to exceed the present estimate.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND:

Borden (Bedeque Charge) Church.—Agreed to accede to request of the congregation that of the grant and loan voted by the Board in March, grant of \$3,000 only be paid, as a loan can be secured locally at a lower rate of interest.

SYDNEY:

Sydney, Community House.—Agreed to vote additional grant of \$47.31 for repairs.

MONTREAL:

Montreal, Eglise Unie du Sauveur, Church.—Agreed to authorize payment of \$155.00 for repairs, voted by the Executive in June, to be paid on receipt of Presbytery action, which has not yet been received, the matter having been overlooked by Presbytery but will be approved at the next meeting of the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery.

East Greenfield, Church.—Agreed to refer to Secretaries request for grant to assist in making building habitable for the winter, the understanding being that the Montreal Finance and Extension Board will also make a grant for this purpose.

Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute.—It was reported that the lowest tender received for the rebuilding of the West Wing of the Institute was \$228,534, or \$53,534 more than the Architect's estimate of \$175,000, which was before the Executive in June. In view of this Dr. Dorey had met with the Committee in Montreal early in September, at which time it was decided to modify the plans and to call for new tenders. The lowest received on the new basis was \$192,182, and it was estimated that certain other expenditures would probably bring the total cost up to \$200,000.

In view of the necessity for action, the Secretaries had authorized the Pointe-aux-Trembles Board to proceed with the project, although a question—which had not then been decided—had arisen as to whether the work would be undertaken now or in the Spring.

The Executive agreed to authorize the work, a letter having been received from the Chairman of the Pointe-aux-Trembles Board to the effect that the work should be undertaken now.

QUEBEC-SHERBROOKE:

St. Martyrs, Chapel.—Agreed to vote grant up to \$1,000 for materials and expert labor required to rebuild the chapel.

Sherbrooke, Sangster Memorial Church.—Agreed to accede to request of congregation that time for first payment of principal of loan be postponed for one year, but that there be no postponement in the payment of interest.

COBOURG:

Batawa, Church.—Agreed that first payment on principal of loan, voted in June, 1947, and which is due on December 31st, 1950, be deferred until the end of 1951, and that interest be paid meantime. This request is made because the exterior of the church is not yet finished and because of the necessity of making certain changes in the basement.

KINGSTON:

Godfrey (Verona Charge) Church.—Agreed to make loan of \$600.00 if congregation fails to obtain the money locally, for the purpose of extensive alterations to the church building, which is in a state of deterioration.

COCHRANE:

Smooth Rock Falls, Church.—Agreed to vote grant of \$800.00 and loan of \$1,500, for enlarging and renovating church; loan to be repaid in five annual instalments, with interest at 4%.

MUSKOKA:

Gibson Reserve, Church.—Payment of \$16.90 for paint for the exterior of the church, being in excess of grant previously voted, was confirmed.

NORTH BAY:

Loring, Church.—It was agreed to refer to the January Executive the request for a grant of \$1,000, towards cost of new church.

North Bay, Laurier Avenue, Church.—Improvements to the church having amounted to \$4,000 more than originally estimated, the total cost, after remission of \$1,500 by the Company, stands at \$9,000 towards which the congregation has on hand \$6,000, made up of \$3,000 grant and loan from the Board of Home Missions and \$3,000 provided by the congregation. Application, approved by Presbytery, for additional loan of \$3,000 was before the Executive. Agreed to vote an additional loan of \$1,000 provided the congregation raises a similar amount immediately; the additional loan to be increased to \$1,500 if the congregation will raise \$1,500 on or before December 31st, 1950.

SIMCOE:

Christian Island, Mission House.—Agreed to approve the sale of this house, as recommended by Presbytery, provided the building is moved from the site.

Rama, Parsonage.—Agreed to vote grant of \$364.50 to provide rock-wool insulation throughout house, as outlined in a letter from Mr. Doolittle of Orillia.

TEMISKAMING:

Kirkland Lake, Finnish Church.—The question of moving the building from its present site to a position in the south-west section of Kirkland Lake was referred to the Secretaries, with power, on receipt of report from Superintendent and Presbytery.

Kirkland Lake (Teck Township Charge) Manse.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$108.00 for interior decorating.

Normetal (North-Western Quebec Charge) Church.—Agreed to vote grant of \$500.00 towards cost of church building, the Anglican Church having agreed to provide a like amount.

TORONTO EAST:

Dawes Road, Manse.—The recommendation of Presbytery re the purchase of a minister's residence in the Dawes Road area was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

TORONTO CENTRE:

Toronto, 209 Crawford Street (Church of All Nations, Queen Street Parsonage).—(a) Authority was given to the Secretaries to complete the improvements, estimated at \$220.00; and (b) re the claim of the City of Toronto for payment of \$25 per year for right-of-way over park roadway, authority was given to the Secretaries to make this payment if, after investigation, it is found to be necessary.

Toronto, 104 Millwood Road—Parsonage for Italian Minister.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$1,260.66 for necessary repairs and to authorize payment of any small accounts still outstanding.

Toronto, 306 Woodbine Avenue.—Agreed to vote \$19.00 for repairs to furnace.

TORONTO WEST:

Toronto, Dupont Street (formerly Ukrainian) Church.—Decision re the acceptance of any offer to purchase this building was referred to the Secretaries, with power; it being understood that they would sell to the best advantage and, as far as possible, respect the wishes of the Ukrainian congregation which has just vacated the building.

BRUCE:

Cape Croker, Parsonage.—It was agreed (a) to vote \$100 to provide new windows for front porch, some new foundation work, and to replace part of roof; and (b) to confirm payment of \$50.00 for stove.

HALTON:

Port Nelson (Burlington) Church.—Re application for grant of \$6,000 towards cost of new church. Agreed to authorize advance of grant of \$3,000, and that further information be sought regarding plans, etc.

HAMILTON:

Hamilton, Parkdale—Building.—It was reported that fire regulations would not permit the use of a portable church in this area, which the Executive in June, 1949, had agreed to provide, together with some assistance in the purchase of a site. It was decided, as an alternative, to vote a grant of \$2,000 towards cost of building.

SUDBURY:

Sudbury, Church Site.—Agreed to vote grant of \$650.00 for purchase of lot or lots, to be used as site for a church.

ALGOMA:

Sault Ste. Marie, 134 Hudson Street.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$68.45 for repairs to plumbing.

ESSEX:

Windsor, Westminster Church.—Agreed to accede to request of congregation that terms of original agreement be adhered to, namely, that yearly payments of \$500.00 be applied to principal, and not to outstanding interest as decided by June Executive.

KENT:

Moraviantown, Teacherage.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$53.00, cost of desk provided for missionary-teacher.

Moraviantown, Farm.—On recommendation of Presbytery, it was decided that present lease should not be renewed when it expires at December 31st, 1951, and the Secretaries were authorized so to advise the lessee, Mr. W. R. Leverton.

LAMBTON:

St. Clair, Church.—Agreed to vote an additional grant of \$750.00 towards cost of church.

MIDDLESEX:

Muncey, Bear Creek, Church.—Agreed to vote an additional grant of \$200.00 for putting floor in hall.

Muncey, Parsonage.—Agreed to authorize purchase of a bathtub.

CARMAN:

Indian Springs, Mission House.—Agreed (a) to confirm payment of \$19.23 for furnace parts; and (b) to authorize purchase of material to repair steps at back of house and for new floor for back porch.

NORWAY HOUSE:

Berens River, Mission House.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$43.15 for ladders, roofing, chairs, etc.

Cross Lake, Mission House.—Payment of \$60.00 for automatic control to start motor was confirmed.

Gods' Lake, Mission House.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$10.98 for parts for stove and freight on hardware, and \$39.20 for paint, etc.

Norway House.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$20.09 for dishes, etc., and \$16.70 for fire extinguisher and refill.

SUPERIOR:

Current River, Church.—The question of erection of a temporary church building on lot donated by a member of the congregation was referred to the Secretaries.

Kakabeka Falls (Murillo Charge) Church Hall.—Agreed to vote additional loan of \$250.00 to finish work on interior of hall.

WINNIPEG:

Cruise Memorial Hospital, Vita.—Agreed to approve purchase of a water softener to cost \$750.00, amount to be paid from Cruise Memorial Fund.

Winnipeg, 712 Alfred Avenue.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$108.00 for furnishings purchased from Rev. K. C. McLeod.

Winnipeg, North Winnipeg Mission.—Agreed (a) to confirm payment of \$30.00 in excess of grant of \$4,000, voted by Board for repairs to three buildings; and (b) to confirm payment of \$135.00 for repairs to buildings, following wind storm on August 6th.

Winnipeg, Shaughnessy Church.—Agreed to vote grant of \$2,000 for installation of complete sanitary facilities, as required by city, in army hut purchased for use as a church; also to include provision of basement, installation of heating plant (already owned), provision of room for class and other purposes, etc.

Kelvington, Manse.—Agreed to vote loan of \$800.00 towards cost of improvements to manse; to be repaid in five annual instalments.

Dummer, Manse.—Agreed to approve sale of house to present tenant for \$900.00, subject to approval of Presbytery and sub-Executive of General Council.

PRINCE ALBERT WEST:

Prince Albert, Nisbet Memorial School Home.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$104.78 for purchase of blankets and for sundry items of repairs.

QU'APPELLE:

Kennedy, Church.—Agreed to vote grant of \$350.00, replacing loan of \$500 and grant of \$500, towards cost of new church, voted by Executive in October, 1949; the congregation having found that they did not need as much assistance as at first estimated.

REGINA:

Regina, Settlement House.—Agreed: (a) to vote \$113.70, cost of renewing coil, boiler and rebuilding showers; and (b) \$115.05, estimated cost of material and rebuilding of back steps, when Presbytery approval is given.

SASKATOON:

Saskatoon, Bethel—Site.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$645.89, being \$600.00 purchase price and \$46.89 taxes, for new site for Bethel congregation.

SWIFT CURRENT:

Abbey, Manse.—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,500, towards purchase of new house; to be repaid in five annual instalments.

YORKTON:

Foam Lake, Church.—Agreed to vote loan of \$4,000 towards cost of new church; to be repaid in five annual instalments, beginning November 1st, 1951.

EDMONTON:

Devon, Church.—No terms of repayment having been mentioned for loan of \$3,000, voted by the Board in March, congregation asks that payments be spread over a ten year period. Agreed that first payment be \$300.00, to be made December 31st, 1951, and that terms be reviewed at the Board.

Fort Assiniboine, Student's Cabin.—Agreed to vote grant of \$200.00 towards cost of cabin, cash outlay for which will be between \$500 and \$600.

Mercoal, Church.—It was reported that the mine at Mountain Park having closed down, the church building (which has three or four rooms associated with it) had been offered to the Mercoal congregation. Prior to this a grant of \$200 had been voted and paid (for the erection of a two-room cabin for use of the student at Mercoal). Agreed to refer to Secretaries, pending report of Presbytery.

PEACE RIVER:

McLennan.—Agreed to vote grant of \$200 and loan of \$1,500, towards purchase of manse; loan to be repaid in five annual instalments.

Notikewin, Manse.—Agreed to approve sale of house, if fair price offered.

Widewater (Kinuso Charge) Church.—Agreed to vote grant of \$500 towards church, to cost \$3,000.

RED DEER:

Hobbema, Mission House.—Agreed: (a) to confirm payment of \$11.45 for glass and paint; and (b) to authorize installation of gas in house and connection of water with that supplied to school and teacherage, and also purchase of linoleum for kitchen.

Alert Bay, Boat.—Agreed to authorize purchase of boat, in time for re-opening of the work in the Spring, if missionary is available.

Deep Cove, Church.—Agreed to vote grant of \$2,000 and loan of \$2,500, to be made available when \$2,000 cash has been raised locally, towards cost of new church; loan to be repayable in five annual instalments.

Vancouver, First Church, Community House.—Agreed to authorize necessary improvements to meet requirements of the Vancouver Fire Department.

VICTORIA:

Cowichan Lake, Manse.—Agreed to confirm action of Secretaries, who, after consultation with members of the Board present at the General Council, made available a grant of \$1,300 and loan of \$1,300 towards purchase of new manse; loan to be repaid in five annual instalments.

Port Kells, Manse.—Agreed that application for loan of \$1,000 and grant of \$2,000, for purchase and moving of building, etc., be deferred to the Board.

WESTMINSTER:

South Burnaby, Manse (2111 Maple St., New Westminster).—Agreed to confirm action of Secretaries in advancing \$2,800—\$1,400 loan and \$1,400 grant—towards purchase of manse; loan to be repaid at rate of \$280.00 per year, beginning December 31st, 1951.

Repairs to Congregational Property

The following requests for assistance in repairs to congregational property were before the Executive:

1. *Hant's Harbour, Church, Carbonear* Presbytery: Presbytery requested loan of \$500.00 for repairs, it being necessary to re-roof the building in order to keep it from deteriorating. Superintendent stated that it was not possible to obtain a loan locally, and that extensive repairs were being made to the manse which are being financed locally.
2. *Carmanville, Manse, Twillingate* Presbytery: Superintendent reported that manse needed complete re-shingling and a new foundation and suggested loan of \$150.00, to be repaid, if possible, within a year. This was an emergency.

That, in view of the declared policy of the Board not to make grants towards such repairs and in the light of representations that these were cases of emergency which could not otherwise be cared for, the Secretaries be authorized to deal with requests for grants or loans for repairs to congregational property which are strictly of an emergency nature and which cannot be financed by the congregation, provided that the total amount made available for this purpose shall not exceed an expenditure of \$1,250 prior to the next Board meeting; and

That the Secretaries report any expenditures to the next meeting of the Executive.

Peterborough, Grace Church.—June Executive voted to continue grant at rate of \$400 until new arrangement made. Ethelbert.—Agreed to vote travel grant at rate of \$140.00.

SUPERIOR:

Current River—Winter Supply.—Agreed to vote grant sufficient for weekend supply during the winter.

BATTLEFORD:

St. Walburg.—Agreed that salary basis for Rev. M. A. Swaren, ordained minister of the Swedish Baptist Church, be \$100.00 below the regular standard of the Board.

ESTEVAN:

North Portal.—Agreed that grant be at rate of \$200.00, plus travel.

PRINCE ALBERT WEST:

Shell Lake.—Agreed to vote special grant of \$300 towards arrears of \$498, January to September.

Chaplaincy and Supervision of Fields.—Agreed to vote grant of \$50 per month for Rev. D. G. Rice, who will visit the Sanatorium, and also supervise the Colleston, Davis and Henribourg student fields.

SWIFT CURRENT:

Pennant and Ohioville.—Agreed to vote grant at rate of \$550.00 for single lay supply.

YORKTON:

Dubuc.—Agreed that grant be at rate of \$550, on M.L.S. basis, no grant being needed for travel.

CALGARY:

Ebenezer, German.—Agreed to vote grant at rate of \$1,000, on "special field" basis.

EDMONTON:

Duffield.—Agreed that grant be at rate of \$1,500 for M.L.S.

HIGH RIVER:

Eden Valley.—Agreed to refer to Secretaries request that grant be increased above \$300.00.

PEACE RIVER:

High Prairie.—Agreed that grant be at rate of \$250 and \$140 travel, from July 1st, for M.L.S. (field to pay \$1,600).

CARIBOO:

McBride.—Adjustment of grant, from appointment of lay supply, was referred to Secretaries.

Barkerville-Wells.—No action was taken on request for grant of \$58.80 towards moving expenses of \$144.60.

VANCOUVER:

Fraserview.—Agreed to appointment of student, full-time Sunday and two periods during the week, at \$16.00 per week, plus transportation; field to be asked to assume more responsibility than at present.

Renfrew.—Question of appointment of Student was referred to Secretaries.

VICTORIA:

Nanaimo Indian Mission and Hospital.—Agreed to refer to Secretaries decision re remuneration of Dr. R. C. Scott, in case arrangement is made whereby he spends Friday to Sunday at Nanaimo, visiting the Hospital and taking Sunday services.

WESTMINSTER:

Coqualeetza Sanatorium.—The question of remuneration for Rev. J. F. Shaw, in the event of his taking over visitation of the Sanatorium, was referred to the Secretaries.

Car Subsidies

1. *Re English Cars:* The question of differential to be paid in car subsidies when new car purchased is English built, was referred to Secretaries; each Superintendent to be asked to secure list of prices of English cars in his area.

2. *Re Cancellations as of June 30th, 1950:* The Secretaries were authorised to make reasonable adjustments in cases where the 1950 Year Book reports the 1949 salary paid by the field as above the Home Mission minimum.

3. The question^g of the salary basis on which men serving fields and also attending college would be entitled to cancellations, was referred to the Board, after discussion by Secretaries and Superintendents.

4. *Special Cases:*

- (i) Rev. J. D. N. MacDonald, Woodlawn, N.S.—Agreed to accede to request for subsidy.
- (ii) Rev. M. Jaremko, Ethelbert, Man.—Agreed to authorize subsidy of \$400.00.
- (iii) Rev. A. D. Pringle, Oyen, Alta.—Agreed to cancel balance of \$25 due on loan.

Transfer of Balance in Project Fund to Car Subsidies

The Secretaries were authorized to request the Treasurer to transfer to Car Subsidy Fund \$20,109.59, balance of the \$100,000 priority project allotted to the Board for 1949.

INTERIM EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS DIGEST OF MINUTES JANUARY 24th, 1951

The Interim Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Wednesday, January 24th, 1951, at 9.30 a.m. The Chairman, Rev. W. M. Mustard, D.D., presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

On motion, Rev. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Present: Revs. W. M. Mustard, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, J. R. Leng, R. Douglas Smith, J. H. Hamilton, J. M. Boyd, George Telford, W. R. Auld, Messrs. R. S. Mills and George Copeland.

On motion, Revs. J. A. Lyttle, J. I. MacKay, J. C. Torrance and R. T. Richards were made corresponding members.

The Secretary reported that Mr. C. M. Doxsey was absent on account of illness.

Confirmation of Minutes

The Minutes of the meetings of the Executive, held June 23rd and October 17th, 1950, which had previously been circulated, were confirmed.

Communications

A communication was presented from Rev. S. H. Greenslade, D.D., in appreciation of the letter of sympathy sent on behalf of the Executive; and from Miss Ruth Dean, expressing appreciation of the sympathy extended on behalf of the Executive on the death of her father, the late Dr. S. W. Dean.

Resolutions

Sympathy—

(1) It was requested that the sympathy of the Executive be conveyed to Rev. and Mrs. G. W. Tilley, of Harcourt, N.B., who are both in hospital in Montreal.

(2) The Secretaries were asked to send letters of sympathy, in cases where this has not already been done, to the following, who have recently suffered bereavement: the family of the late Rev. E. J. L. Hughes, who passed away in October; Rev. Dr. J. A. Doyle, on the death of Mrs. Doyle; the family of the late Rev. Dr. Peter Bryce; the family of the late Dr. C. A. Munro; the family of the late Rev. R. E. Cribb; Rev. Jabez Rice, on the death of Mrs. Rice; Rev. Jack Breckenridge, on the death of his father; the family of the late Mr. F. J. Joblin.

Congratulations—

It was requested that the congratulations of the Executive be extended to Rev. and Mrs. J. A. Lousley, who recently celebrated their Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary.

Appointments and Nominations

It was agreed:

(1) To approve the nomination of Rev. Edmond Perret to Eglise Unie du Sauveur, Montreal.

(2) To nominate to the Settlement Committee of the London Conference the Rev. Alex. G. Rice as Superintendent of All People's Church, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., to succeed Rev. H. M. Bailey, whose resignation takes effect at the end of February; Mr. Rice's appointment to be from the beginning of the Conference year, and salary to be at the same rate as paid to Mr. Bailey. (Dr. Macdonald reported that in the interim the charge would be supplied by Rev. J. R. MacCrimmon).

(3) To nominate to the Executive of the Settlement Committee of the Manitoba Conference the Rev. R. C. Matthews as missionary at Island Lake Indian Mission, Norway House Presbytery; appointment to take effect in February.

(4) To appoint to Sandy Lake Indian Mission, Norway House Presbytery, Mr. Wm. T. Towers, at present lay missionary at Island Lake; Mr. Towers to remain at Island Lake to assist Mr. Matthews until breakup, after which he may proceed to Sandy Lake.

(5) To confirm the appointment of Miss Lillian Tate as Deaconess at All People's Mission, Edmonton, from January 1st; salary to be at the rate of \$1,800 until the meeting of the Board, when, if necessary, it will be revised.

Appointment Executive-Secretary, Vancouver-Westminster Metropolitan Council

It was reported that the Special Committee appointed by the Executive in October, with power to issue, had approved the following recommendations of the Interim Executive of the Vancouver--Westminster Metropolitan Council:

"That we invite Rev. Douglas H. Telfer, M.A., B.D., D.D., to undertake the office of Executive Secretary of the Vancouver--Westminster Metropolitan Council, with the following provisions:—

- "1. That the salary be \$4,000.00 per annum, commencing at a date to be mutually agreed upon; with four weeks' vacation, and the payment of the Employer's share of the Pension Fund. The engagement shall be for a period of four years, to terminate, approximately, December 31st, 1954.
- "2. *Duties of Executive Secretary:* The duties of the Executive Secretary shall be to direct the campaign for funds, including all promotion, records, and follow-up. To give counsel and direction to congregations and charges, on building, extension and rehabilitation, and to direct the work of extension in the areas covered by the Metropolitan Council; to recommend sites, and generally promote extension. It is understood that the Executive Secretary will consult with the Superintendent of Home Missions regarding such areas of responsibility where it would appear to be in the interests of both.
- "3. *Office and Secretarial Help, etc.:* The Executive Secretary shall share the office presently occupied by the Superintendent of Home Missions, and the services of Miss Agnes Murray, on a basis to be arranged by the Interim Executive of the Metropolitan Council in consultation with the Superintendent of Home Missions.
- "4. *Travelling Expenses:* The Metropolitan Council recognizes its responsibility for expenses incidental to travel incurred in the promotion of the work."

It was agreed that the Report be received and the action of the Special Committee confirmed.

It was further agreed that the Board of Home Missions would pay the salary of the Executive Secretary, from February 1st (the date of his appointment) until the meeting of the Board, when this would be reviewed and when it was hoped that the Metropolitan Council would be in a position to assume its share of the salary. . .

Licences to Administer Sacraments

1. It was agreed to recommend to the Sub-Executive of the General Council that special licences to administer the Sacraments, for one year, be granted to the following lay supplies:

2. The Executive also had before it a request from the Niagara Presbytery that a special licence to administer the Sacraments be issued to Mr. Douglas Pilkey, the student in charge of the Crystal Beach United Church (formerly People's Church, Crystal Beach). On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

The Executive, after careful consideration, expressed the opinion that this application does not come within the provisions of Sec. 117 (u) iii of the Manual and therefore sends it forward to the Sub-Executive of the General Council simpliciter.

Immigration

Proposed Immigration Policy—

Mr. Leng stated that a lengthy document, setting out a proposed Immigration Policy for the Board, had been prepared by Mr. Alex. Maclaren. On his suggestion, it was agreed that this be synopsized and sent to the members of the Board for study, so that action could be taken at the annual meeting; with the understanding that, in the meantime, Mr. Maclaren be authorized to do preliminary work on the promotion of youth immigration from the British Isles.

Saint John—

The membership of the Immigration Committee was confirmed as follows: Rev. Hugh MacLean, Chairman; Rev. W. E. Aitken, Rev. H. L. Chappell, and a representative of the W.M.S. Presbyterial, with power to add.

Halifax—

(1) The appointment of Rev. W. D. Van Zoost as part-time port chaplain to the Dutch, and of Dr. Ian F. MacKinnon as part-time port chaplain, was confirmed.

(2) It was agreed that the name of Rev. W. D. Van Zoost be added to the members of the Halifax Immigration Committee.

Land Settlement Scheme, Dutch Immigrants—

An enquiry was presented from Dr. W. S. Godfrey as to whether the United Church would consider co-operating with the Land Settlement Board of the Nova Scotia Government in the settlement of Dutch Protestant immigrants. It was decided to take no action.

Indian Work*Re Rev. Frank Burgess—*

It was agreed that as Mr. Burgess will, on June 30th next, have reached the age at which he has the right of retirement, he be asked to seek retirement at that time.

Indian Residential Schools—

The Secretary reported that the Indian Affairs Branch of the Dominion Government was proposing to assume entire responsibility for the payment of salaries of teachers in Indian Residential Schools, which had hitherto been included in the per capita grants to the schools. The Executive gave its approval and authorized the Secretaries to conclude any necessary arrangements.

Cree Hymn Book and Primer

1. Dr. Dorey reported that the first edition of 1,000 copies of the Cree Hymn Book had been sold and asked for authority to have it reprinted. It was agreed to authorize the reprinting of 1,000 copies at a cost of \$1,340.00.

2. Authority was also given for the reproduction of 200 copies of the English-Cree Primer and Vocabulary, originally prepared by the late Dr. F. G. Stevens, at a cost of approximately \$150.00.

Church Extension

Report—

Dr. M. C. Macdonald reported that a meeting of the Executive of the National Committee on Church Extension had been held the previous week, when an encouraging review had been presented of the results of the campaigns which had been launched or were now under way in certain areas.

Policy re Administration of Funds—

The question of the clarification of the policy with regard to the administration of funds raised in local Church Extension campaigns was considered, and it was decided to appoint a committee, consisting of Mr. R. S. Mills, Dr. M. C. Macdonald, Dr. J. I. MacKay, Dr. R. T. Richards and Mr. George Copeland, to draft a resolution and report.

The report of the committee was received later and adopted as follows:

“The Executive of the Board of Home Missions is of the opinion that there needs to be clarification of the policy with regard to the administration of funds raised in local Church Extension campaigns and respectfully submits to the Sub-Executive a request that the following policy be adopted:

- “(1) That, where in the opinion of the Presbytery concerned, local church extension is required, the Presbytery shall determine the method of raising and administering the money needed, having in mind both local needs and those of the Property Fund of the Board of Home Missions;
- “(2) That where, in the opinion of the Presbytery concerned, local church extension is not immediately required, all the money raised shall be turned over to the Property Fund of the Board of Home Missions, where it shall be kept in a special Church Extension Fund; and
- “(3) That Presbyteries be urged, also, to report to Conference, for necessary action, any funds being held from the sale of unused churches, having in mind the need for church extension elsewhere”.

It was agreed to request, further, that Dr. M. C. Macdonald, the Chairman of the National Committee, be heard by the Sub-Executive.

Advances to Toronto Home Missions Council—

It was moved and agreed, That, in the event of The Toronto Home Missions Council finding it necessary to purchase sites for churches or manses before it is able to realize on its campaign for Church Extension, the Secretaries be authorized to make advances from Property Fund, to bear interest at 4 per cent. and to be repaid as soon as possible out of campaign receipts.

Manitoba Flood Relief

1. It was agreed to authorize an increase of \$235.00, if necessary, in the maintenance budget of All People's, Winnipeg, for 1950, additional expenditure having been incurred for heating purposes during the flood crisis, and to request that any payment made should be reimbursed from the Manitoba Flood Relief Fund.

2. *Re Morris Manse*: It was reported that assistance to the extent of \$17,119.74 had been given from the Manitoba Flood Relief Fund towards the building of this manse; that the agreement was that of this amount \$3,500.00 was to be regarded as a loan from the Property Fund of the Board of Home Missions; and that any amount realized from the sale of the old building would be refunded, as well as any amount received from the Manitoba Government by way of compensation.

Marine Work

Hamilton Inlet, Labrador, "Glad Tidings"—

Dr. Dorey reported that it had been decided not to purchase a steel boat but to have a boat built in Newfoundland for this Mission.

Alert Bay, B.C.—

1. It was reported that, as authorized by the October Executive, a boat—the M/V "Meander"—had been purchased at a cost of \$25,000.

2. It was agreed to send forward to the Settlement Committee of the British Columbia Conference the nomination of Rev. Roy Rodgers, B.A., of Lewisporte, Nfld., as missionary at Alert Bay.

3. The appointment of Mr. Richard Pardy as Engineer was approved, and it was agreed that the Board would be responsible for his travelling expenses from Newfoundland to Alert Bay. The rate of salary was referred to the Secretaries in consultation with the B.C. Marine Committee.

4. *Name of Boat*: The matter of naming the boat was referred to the Secretaries in consultation with the B.C. Marine Committee, with the suggestion that the name "George Pringle" be considered.

Institutional Missions

Halifax, Brunswick Street Church: Dr. Macdonald reported that Miss Jean MacMillan, the Deaconess at this church, had found it necessary, on account of home responsibilities, to ask that her resignation be accepted as from January 1st. It was agreed that this be referred to the Board and to approve the arrangement whereby the work would be supplied by a student in the meantime.

Hospital Work

Cruise Memorial Hospital, Vita—

It was agreed to confirm the appointment of Dr. C. N. Edwards as Assistant Doctor, at a salary of \$425.00 a month, plus apartment and laundry.

George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake—

1. It was agreed that the resignation of Dr. L. M. Edmunds as Medical Superintendent of the Hospital be accepted, to take effect within the next few weeks, and that the securing of a successor be referred to the Secretaries.

2. Dr. Dorey reported that the Hospital was having difficulty in financing, partially as a result of the poor crop conditions in the area.

It was agreed to make a further grant of \$1,000 to the Hospital for 1950; to accede to the request for an extension of the line of credit at the Bank from \$2,000 to \$3,500; and that any further assistance by way of extension of line of credit which might be necessary be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

3. In compliance with the request of the Alberta Hospitals Board that certain changes be made in the names of persons authorized to sign cheques and transact business with the Bank, the following resolution was adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED:

That Dr. L. M. Edmunds, Superintendent of the George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake, the Matron of the said Hospital, Miss Sandra Fischuk, Office Manager, and Mr. Steve Antoniuk, or two of the aforesaid, one of whom shall be the Superintendent or the Matron, be and they are hereby authorized for and in the name of the said Hospital to sign cheques upon the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Smoky Lake, Alberta, on behalf of the said Hospital; and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00);

Also That the persons aforementioned, or two of them, one of whom shall be the Superintendent or the Matron of the said Hospital, together with one of the other two persons aforementioned, be and they are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to deposit with or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques, or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bill of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

And That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be hereby revoked.

It was agreed that the Secretaries be given power to make the necessary changes in the names of the signing officers consequent upon Dr. Edmunds' resignation, when that takes effect.

Alberta Hospitals Board—

The appointment of Mr. Reginald Adshead to the Alberta Hospitals Board was confirmed.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton—

The resignation of Dr. Leon Komar was accepted and the matter of the appointment of a doctor to succeed him was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Radio and Nisbet Memorial School Home, Prince Albert

It was reported that the Radio Committee of the Saskatchewan Conference had requested that consideration be given to approaching a minister by take over the Radio work at Prince Albert, which is now being carried on by Rev. E. J. Rainey, who is Principal of the Nisbet School Home.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

That, in the judgment of this Executive an effort should be made to consolidate the work of Radio Broadcasting in Prince Albert with that of the Nisbet Memorial School Home, so that only one ordained minister be employed, and that the Secretaries be asked to confer with the Radio Committee with a view to securing a man who can fill both positions.

Chaplaincy Services

The need for the replacement of the late Rev. J. A. Miller as Police Court Chaplain in Toronto was presented to the Executive, and the Secretaries requested that, in view of the possibility of there being available a man who might fill both positions, reconsideration be given to the request of the Toronto Home Missions Council for the appointment of a Chaplain to the Weston Sanatorium, which the Executive in October referred to the Board.

It was agreed to refer the matter to the Secretaries, in consultation with Rev. J. C. Torrance, so that they might make an approach to the Rev. Fred Smith, with a view to his appointment to the dual position; report to be made to the Board.

Organization of Schools for Lay Supplies

On motion, it was resolved that authority be given to the Secretaries to set up, if necessary, one or both of the regional Schools for Lay Supplies, as authorized by the last General Council.

Student Work

Report re Summer of 1950—

Dr. Macdonald made a brief statement regarding the work of the student missionaries during the past summer. A total of 212 students had served under the "pool" arrangement, as compared with 203 in 1949. In addition, eight served in institutional churches and sixteen substituted for lay supplies. Reports on the work of the students had, on the whole, been very satisfactory. The basic rate of \$21.00 per week was the highest ever paid student missionaries, while the total raised by the fields for maintenance of the students was \$90,322 as compared with \$82,123 the previous year. The total budget for the work was \$139,087, which included \$49,000, the portion of the Board's allocation of \$52,000 which was required.

The Executive expressed its appreciation to Dr. Macdonald for his effective direction of this work, as evidenced by the results obtained, and requested, also, that appreciation be conveyed to the Superintendents of Missions, Home Mission Conveners and Supervising pastors for the time and effort expended by them in the supervision of the student work.

Vacation School "Kits"—

It was requested that the thanks of the Executive be expressed to The Woman's Missionary Society for the Vacation School "Kits" supplied to student missionaries in 1950, with the hope that the same policy would be continued in 1951.

Rural Work

As directed by the Executive in October, the Committee appointed to carry out the instructions of the General Council re the appointment of a committee to study the question of rural depopulation and related problems, presented the following report:—

"Terms of reference (Record of Proceedings, page 101, item No. 7) were as follows:—

'That General Council request the Board of Home Missions, through its Rural Life Committee, with power to add, to study regionally the question of rural depopulation and related problems and their effect upon the life and work of our Rural Church, the information to be gained through its study and findings to be made available to the whole Church through press and church papers, and the recommendation of the Board to be submitted to the General Council for necessary action.'

"It is recommended:

"1. That in accord with the direction of the General Council, this Executive appoint the following as committees responsible, in the various Conferences, to set up Regional Committees to study rural depopulation and related problems as outlined in the terms of reference above:—

- "2. These Committees will add to their number so that each Presbytery will have one representative.
- "3. They will make a study of Item 7 in the Sessional Report on Home Missions, page 101, Record of Proceedings, in accord with terms of reference and suggestions submitted by the Rural Committee of the Board.
- "4. (a) From the Maritime group, in addition to those who are members of the Board of Home Missions or the Rural Life Committee, Rev. E. V. Moriarty, Rev. Lewis M. Murray and Prin. Kenneth Cox will be members of the Church-wide Committee.
- (b) In the three Prairie Provinces—Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta—those persons named to appoint the larger committees in their respective Conferences will meet together in the fall of 1951 to study the findings of their respective Conference Committees. From them will be selected three (one from each Province) to be members of the Church-wide Committee, in addition to those who are now members of the Board of Home Missions or on its Rural Life Committee.
- (c) From the British Columbia Committee, in addition to those who are members of the Board, one will be a member of the Church-wide, or National Committee.
- "5. The Committees referred to in 1 (a) (b) (c) (d) and (e) will name the members of the enlarged Conference committees at the Annual meeting of the Conference Home Mission Committees in the spring of 1951.

Insurance of Church Properties

It was reported that the Sub-Executive had adopted the following as the terms of reference for the Standing Committee on Insurance, appointed by the General Council:

“It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee on Insurance to secure that congregations adequately insure their properties both as to amount and as to type of insurance. It may function through Conference and Presbytery Committees, or make direct representations to congregations, or use publicity channels, provided that the total cost of all such promotion work is within the annual appropriation provided through the General Council office. It may act as an Advisory Committee to Boards administering property, if so requested by the Board concerned.”

It was agreed to request that the Standing Committee on Insurance act in an advisory capacity so far as this Board is concerned; and also to request that Rev. J. R. Leng be added to the Standing Committee.

Policy re Hostels for Transients

The Secretaries requested that the Executive appoint a Committee to consider the question of a policy with regard to Hostels for transients, in accordance with the following recommendation of the Commission on City Missions, which was adopted by the Board in 1944; the Committee to report to the Board:

"That the Board of Home Missions be asked to study the whole matter of the development of a sound and Christian policy for the care of homeless or transient men (at present so large a part of the work carried on at the Fred Victor Mission) and to make such approaches and representations to the Civic, Provincial and Federal authorities as may be deemed necessary."

The naming of this Committee was referred to the Chairman, the Secretaries, Rev. J. C. Torrance and Mr. R. S. Mills.

Request for Appointment of W.M.S. Worker

It was agreed to transmit to The Woman's Missionary Society, with approval, the request of the Hamilton Presbytery that a Woman Worker be assigned to assist in the development of United Church activities in the outlying areas of the eastern section of the city.

Statement re Property Fund

The Secretary reported that there was in the Property Fund at the present time \$42,506 which was available for the making of loans and grants.

- (1) That, in the light of reports from the pastoral charges, the Executive authorize additional payments so that the scale of salaries adopted by the Board in 1950 be reached; each case to be decided on its merits.

EDMONTON:

Assiniboine, Student's Quarters.—Agreed to vote grant of \$200 for completing building, to be occupied by student.

Devon, Church.—Agreed to increase loan from \$3,000 to \$5,000, and grant from \$1,000 to \$2,000, originally voted in 1949, and to refer terms of repayment to the Board.

Duffield, Mission House.—Payment of \$52.00 for bed, etc., was confirmed.

Edmonton, Bissell Memorial Institute.—Agreed (a) to confirm payment of \$94.91 for repairs to heating system; (b) to authorize purchase of incinerator (for use at Bissell Memorial Institute) at cost of \$81.00.

Edmonton, Jasper Place, Church.—Agreed that loan of \$7,000, voted by the Board in 1950, shall be a second charge on the property, so that the congregation may be free to borrow \$5,000 locally, in order to complete church building.

Edmonton, Scona Place.—Agreed that congregation shall be free to accept payment of grant of \$2,500, without loan of \$2,500, previously voted, as they can borrow a sufficient amount locally to enable them to complete their church building.

RED DEER:

Hobbema, Church.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$202.84 for installation of gas.

VERMILION:

Lamont, Parsonage.—Agreed to approve sale of the parsonage for \$600.00.

CARIBOO:

Lone Butte (Williams Lake Charge) Church.—Agreed to accept payment of balance of \$450, due on purchase price of \$500, in monthly instalments of \$20, plus interest.

PRINCE RUPERT:

Bella Bella, R.W. Large Memorial Hospital.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$230.63 for insulation of hospital, nurses' and engineer's homes.

Skidegate, Mission House.—Agreed to confirm purchase of furnace, at cost of \$300.00, for new house.

WESTMINSTER:

Coquitlam, Central.—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,200, to bear interest at 4%, to cover cost of new site; to be repaid when old church and site are sold, which will be just as soon as the new building is ready for use.

Northport.—It was reported that congregation was considering possibility of installing waterworks, but neither estimate nor Presbytery action has been received. No action.

TEMISKAMING:

Charlton.—Agreed to vote an additional grant of \$50 towards cost of re-wiring manse.

KENORA-RAINY RIVER:

Emo.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$350 towards cost of installing complete bathroom facilities, kitchen sink, electric pump, pressure tank, septic tank, etc.

KAMSACK:

Preceville.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$350 towards cost of installing furnace and bathroom facilities.

SIAUNAVON:

Eastend.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$100.00 towards modernization costs, including installation of furnace.

SWIFT CURRENT:

Sceptre.—Agreed to refer to Board request for assistance towards modernization costs, totalling \$251.22; detailed information to be secured in the meantime.

WEYBURN:

Radville.—Agreed to vote \$125.00 towards cost of digging basement and installing furnace.

EDMONTON:

Thorhild.—Agreed to vote \$125.00 towards cost of installing furnace.

PEACE RIVER:

Sexsmith.—Agreed to vote \$125.00 towards cost of installing furnace.

ST. PAUL:

St. Paul-Ashmont.—Agreed to refer to Secretaries, with power, request for assistance towards cost of laying sewer and piping water to manse, as project is not yet complete.

Northport.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$25.00 to Rev. J. P. Travis, to defray expenses of student assistance during his illness.

LUNENBURG-QUEEN'S:

The Rocks.—No action was taken on request for furniture grant towards purchases totalling \$173.00.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND:

Winsloe.—No action was taken on request for grant of \$50 for manse furnishings.

SYDNEY:

Ingonish.—Secretaries were given authority to deal with matter of deficit in salary of Presbyterian minister who supplied this field from July 1st to November 30th.

Wesley Hall, New Aberdeen.—Agreed to vote additional grant of \$114.72 for 1950.

MONTREAL:

Montreal, Special French Work.—Agreed to vote grant sufficient to cover difference between salary paid Miss Gloria Martineau by The Woman's Missionary Society and the Home Mission scale, from date of her appointment.

Eglise Unie du Sauveur.—Agreed to vote rent allowance of \$50 per month for Rev. Edmond Perret, who is supplying this charge from January 1st.

Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute.—Agreed to vote \$1,864.19, to cover deficit for 1950.

MUSKOKA:

Otter Lake-Orrville-Berriedale.—Agreed to vote grant at rate of \$350 for salary and \$300 for travel, from November 1st, 1950, to April 30th, 1951, for Mr. R. L. Willson, who is serving this area.

BRANTFORD:

Fairview.—Agreed to vote grant of \$25 per month, for three months' period beginning November 1st, 1950, towards services of Miss Vanchie Hamilton in the Fairview area north of Brantford, The Woman's Missionary Society having contributed a like amount, and to ask the Society if it would consider assuming responsibility for the whole grant from February 1st, 1951, for a further period of three months; and, failing this, if it would continue to pay one-half the grant as previously.

BRUCE:

Salem-Riverdale.—Agreed to vote travel grant of \$150.00 for nine months of 1950.

NORWAY HOUSE:

Island Lake.—Agreed to continue grant to Mr. W. T. Towers, who will remain to assist the new missionary, Rev. R. C. Matthews, until break-up, when it is expected he will proceed to Sandy Lake to take up work there.

WINNIPEG:

Shaughnessy.—Agreed to confirm payment of \$173 advanced to student for supply in October, November and December.

Winnipeg, Haskins and Lanark.—Agreed to vote grant of \$100 per month for January and February, then \$50 per month to June 30th, to pay personnel in connection with the organization of this new congregation.

Manitoba, Japanese.—It was reported that Rev. J. Akagawa was retiring, due to ill health. Agreed to continue payment of salary grant to Mr. Akagawa to March 31st, 1951.

PRINCE ALBERT WEST:

Nisbet Memorial School Home.—(a) Agreed to authorize purchase of new range at estimated cost of \$160.00, less \$30.00 trade-in, plus 3% tax. (b) The matter of debit balance for 1950 was referred to Secretaries, with power.

EDMONTON:

Edmonton, All People's Mission.—Agreed that Miss Hickerson be paid salary in full for June, July and August, 1950, less amount paid for supply during that period.

PEACE RIVER:

Grande Prairie.—The enquiry of Rev. H. G. Pritchard as to whether the Board would make a grant towards salary of Miss Barbara Redwood, who would be employed as Director of Christian Education and Secretary for the charge, so that he might be free to visit the more isolated families, was referred to the Board.

KAMLOOPS-OKANAGAN:

North Kamloops.—It was agreed to refer to the Board the suggestion that Rev. S. W. Porteous, who has been appointed part-time Chaplain to the R.C.A.F. Depot, 15 miles North of Kamloops, be allowed to retain one-half of the honorarium of \$10.00 per week which he receives, the other half to be regarded as part of his salary, thus reducing the grant by \$260.00 a year from January 1st.

VANCOUVER:

Alert Bay—M/V Meander.—Agreed: (a) To vote grant sufficient to cover insurance from November 27th, 1950, date of Board's taking over this boat. (b) To make advance of \$600 to take care of immediate costs—watchman \$100 a month from November 27th, wharfage charges, etc.

VICTORIA:

Survey of Growing Areas.—No action was taken on request of Presbytery Executive that Board assume payment of out-of-pocket expenses of Committee appointed to make surveys in growing areas in the southern part of the Presbytery.

Car Subsidies

The following special cases were considered:

(a) Mr. George H. Cahoon, M.L.S., Webbwood charge: Agreed that subsidy of \$400 given be made \$200 loan and \$200 grant.

(b) Rev. G. W. Wright: Agreed that conditional grant of \$50.00 be written off next June.

(c) Late Rev. R. E. Cribb: Agreed to cancel \$50.00, balance of cancellable portion of subsidy.

(d) Rev. H. J. Bevan: Agreed to cancel \$50.00, balance owing on loan made in June, 1949.

(e) Rev. Edwin Keam: Agreed to cancel, as of June 30th, 1950, \$50.00 of conditional grant.

(f) Rev. Bryan Colwell: Agreed to cancel \$50 of loan portion of car subsidy, Mr. and Mrs. Colwell having been injured in an accident and the car demolished.

(g) Rev. R. C. Matthews: Mr. Matthews having been appointed to Island Lake Indian Mission as from January, 1951, it was agreed to accept \$100 on the \$187.50 due on the conditional grant, plus loan portion, and to cancel balance of conditional grant, \$87.50.

THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS

April 4-6, 1951

The Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Wednesday, April 4th, at 10.00 a.m. The Chairman, Rev. W. M. Mustard, D.D., presided and conducted the devotional period.

Rev. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

The Secretary introduced the new members of the Board, who were welcomed by the Chairman.

Roll Call

Hours of Meeting and Adjournment

It was agreed:

That, unless otherwise arranged, the Board meet from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30; from 2.00 p.m. to 5.30 p.m., and from 7.30 to 10.00 p.m.

Ratification of Minutes

Moved and agreed: That the Minutes of the meetings of the Interim Executive, held June 23rd and October 17th, 1950, and January 24th, 1951, be confirmed.

Communications

The Secretary presented communications from the following:

- (a) The Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee, expressing thanks for the cost of living bonus given during the past years and recommending that the men on fields in that Conference be placed on the same basis as those in the other Conferences of the Church.
- (b) The Annual Congregational Meeting of the Robertson Memorial Church, Winnipeg, conveying a vote of thanks to the Board of Home Missions for all the kindnesses shown and help given to their church.

Appointment of Committees

Executive.—

It was agreed that the Interim Executive as named by the General Council be the Executive of the Board. (See Minutes of, October Executive).

Resolutions Committee.—

The Resolutions Committee was named by the Chairman, as follows: Rev. R. Douglas Smith, Rev. H. S. Forbes and Dr. A. B. Campbell.

Scale of Expenses of Members

On motion, the following was adopted as the scale of expenses of members of the Board:

- (1) That members be paid the cost of railway and sleeper tickets to Toronto and return; the cost of meals en route—such cost not to exceed \$5.00 per day; and the cost of hotel and meals in Toronto.
- (2) That those travelling by motor be paid on the basis of railway fare.
- (3) That the amount for Sunday supply shall not exceed \$15.00 per Sunday.

Presentation of Reports

Mimeographed Reports of Superintendents of Missions and Superintendents of Institutions were distributed to the members of the Board.

Statements by Superintendents

The Superintendents of Missions made brief statements on the work in their respective areas. The Chairman expressed the appreciation of the Board.

Grants to Organizations

Division of Home Missions, N.C. of C. of C.—

It was agreed to vote a grant of \$400.00 for 1951 to the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., Division of Home Missions.

Interdenominational Bureau of Architecture.—

Agreed to vote \$50.00 for 1951.

John Milton Society for the Blind—

Agreed to vote a grant of \$25.00 for 1951.

Bissell Bursary Fund

The Secretary reported that the Trustees of the Bissell Bursary Fund, at their meeting on September 7th, 1950, had awarded ten bursaries—two of \$50.00; six of \$60.00; one of \$75.00; and one of \$100.00. A sum of \$250.00 had been held in reserve, pending the receipt of applications from other students; and, later, three bursaries of \$50.00 and one of \$60.00 had been awarded.

The report was received for information.

Special Course for Lay Supplies*Report re 1950—*

Dr. Macdonald reported that the School, which was held in Toronto in the summer of 1950 and which was attended by twenty-five laymen, was the last which would be held under the original plan. During the years which the School had been in operation, 100 to 125 laymen had received valuable training, and of this number six or seven were going on to take the Shorter Course of Studies leading to ordination.

Future Plans—

As authorized by the General Council, Dr. Macdonald stated that arrangements had been made to carry on the Lay School, in a modified form, under the direction of this Board, in 1951 and 1952. In 1951, the School would be held in Newfoundland under the principalship of Dr. Elias Andrews. In 1952, it was planned to hold a School in the West especially for workers amongst the Indians.

Vancouver-Westminster Metropolitan Council

Dr. Bunt reported regarding the organization and incorporation of the Metropolitan Council.

It was agreed that the Board should continue its responsibility for the payment of the salary of the Executive Secretary of the Vancouver-Westminster Metropolitan Council until June 30th, 1951.

Church Extension

Dr. Macdonald made a comprehensive statement regarding the work of the National Committee on Church Extension and on the success of the campaigns which had already been undertaken in various centres. He reported that the meetings held during his recent visit to the Western Conferences had been well attended and the laymen were very enthusiastic.

Over the five year period a total of at least \$3,288,500 will be required to assist new areas in providing churches and manses. Of this amount, \$2,500,000 must be raised through Local Campaigns in the congregations of cities requiring new churches and from strong congregations in other cities.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the following resolution be adopted:

Whereas the General Council has authorized the securing of funds for capital purposes, including Church Extension, to assist in providing churches in urban centres, their suburbs, and communities without places of worship;

And Whereas these funds are to be derived from:

- (a) General Reserves of the Church;
- (b) Reserves of the Board of Home Missions;
- (c) Annual contributions from the Missionary and Maintenance Fund;
- (d) Local Church Extension campaigns.

And Whereas, in connection with (d), there may be cities where more money is subscribed than is presently needed;

And Whereas the General Council recommended "that in other cities and larger towns where there are strong congregations, but where new churches may not be required, financial drives be undertaken under direction of Presbytery to secure special contributions for this nation-wide work of our Church";

And Whereas it is desirable that such funds be separated from the general Property Fund of the Board of Home Missions;

And Whereas certain amounts of money are now in the General Projects Fund of the Board of Home Missions;

BE IT RESOLVED:

(1) That we request the Treasurer to set up a new account to be known as the Special Church Extension Account;

(2) That there be placed in this fund the sum of \$283,414 from the Projects Fund, and any other amounts as may from time to time be contributed to Special Church Extension by—

- (a) The Board of Home Missions;
- (b) The Reserves of the General Council;
- (c) The Missionary and Maintenance Fund;
- (d) Campaigns in urban centres, which forward to headquarters their funds, to be held for Church Extension in specific areas;
- (e) Individual Gifts.

(3) That payments from this Fund be made in conformity with the usual regulations of the Board of Home Missions to assist in the building or purchase of churches and manses for congregations in such cities, suburban and new areas as may be designated by the Board or its Executive;

(4) That assistance from this Fund may be by grant or loan, or both, in accordance with the general regulations of the Board. In the case of loans, these regulations regarding payments, security, terms of repayment, and rate of interest shall apply.

Appreciation, Dr. M. C. Macdonald—

It was moved and carried: That the thanks of the Board be extended to Dr. M. C. Macdonald for his valuable services in connection with the work of the National Committee on Church Extension.

Inter-Board Committee on Special Services

Mrs. J. L. Halpenny was introduced and addressed the Board briefly on the work of this Committee, carried on chiefly among veterans in hospitals and their families in new housing areas. The Chairman thanked Mrs. Halpenny on behalf of the Board.

Radio Broadcasting

1. Dr. Dorey made a statement regarding the work of the Committee on Radio.

2. *Prince Albert Radio Ministry*: The following recommendation of the Saskatchewan Conference Home Mission Committee was referred to the Radio Committee for sympathetic consideration:

"That the work now being done by The United Church of Canada in the Prince Albert area through the Nisbet Memorial School Home, the summer mission fields, and the Radio Ministry, be thoroughly reviewed by the Boards of the Church concerned and an over-all policy decided upon which in the future will provide the maximum amount of efficient leadership to the constituency concerned."

Fund for Retired Workers

Appropriation—

It was agreed that the appropriation to this Fund for 1951 be \$4,500.00.

Grants for 1951—

It was agreed that the following grants be continued for 1951, with the understanding that the Secretaries are empowered to make any adjustments necessary in the case of those eligible to receive the Government old age pension:

Immigration Work

Mr. Alex Maclaren was introduced and made a brief statement regarding the work under his direction, touching on the work carried on at the various ports; the follow-up work; and the promotion work undertaken by the Immigration Committee. The Chairman thanked Mr. Maclaren on behalf of the Board.

Mr. Leng reported that the total number of immigrants admitted to Canada during the period 1945-1950 was 453,111 (British 199,000). During 1950, Canada opened her gates to 73,912 immigrants. Comparing this total to that of the previous year, a decrease of 22.4% is noted. Europe is still the continent supplying the largest number of immigrants. Great Britain sent 13,427 persons; Italy came second with 9,058 immigrants. Following this country, Holland and Poland supplied 7,404 and 6,612 persons respectively. Canada received also 5,825 Germans, 3,769 Ukrainians and 1,188 French immigrants. During the year, the United States provided our country with 7,799 immigrants, a small increase of 0.7% over 1949. Of these 73,912 newcomers, nearly one-third belonged to the farming class, whilst about one-sixth were skilled workers.

Proposed Immigration Policy—

A statement containing a proposed Immigration Policy for the Board was presented. It was considered section by section and, after amendment, was adopted as follows:

General Introduction

A committee of the Board of Home Missions shall be established, the particular function of which shall be to promote and develop an Immigration Programme on a long term basis. This Comitétee, subject to the approval of the Board or its Executive, may appoint a person to be known as Director of Immigration.

Port Work

It is desirable that an ordained minister be named or appointed for each port. Such chaplains will have authority to deal with governmental Immigration Authorities and others working in this field. The duties shall be as follows:

- (a) The welcoming of immigrants at ports of entry.
- (b) The rendering of other services, such as assembling baggage, explaining strange customs, bolstering morale of timid and confused newcomers, etc.
- (c) The development of a public relations programme in order to present the United Church favourably to immigrants and inform our church membership of our immigration work.
- (d) The administration of an Expense Account for emergency relief and other supplies.
- (e) To suggest to the authorities the improvement of port facilities for the reception of immigrants.

Follow-up of Immigrants

Immigration Slips containing information re marital status, church affiliation, etc., will be sent to local ministers at the immigrant's final destination.

Lines of Communication from Immigrants' Homes to Places of Settlement

An endeavour shall be made to establish lines of communication to maintain contact with the immigrant from the time he first thinks of coming to Canada until he is finally settled. To achieve this the following is suggested:

- (a) That articles, letters and pamphlets be prepared, outlining what the United Church is doing and planning for immigrants; these to be given wide circulation through overseas church channels.
- (b) That emigrants at overseas ports-of-embarkation be informed of the ministries available from the United Church.
- (c) That lists of immigrants be secured overseas and sent by airmail.
- (d) That a church-wide publicity programme be developed in order to inform our membership on immigration matters.

Service to "Year-Old" Immigrants—

It is suggested that we move slowly in developing plans to serve those who have completed their one-year contract. Those desiring to be on their own must be given guidance by the Church in order to avoid as far as possible decisions harmful to their future.

Promotion of Immigration—

- (a) The Board of Home Missions shall co-operate with all agencies and church interested in facilitating the movement of immigrants to this country.
- (b) The Board approves in principle the suggestion that a hostel be established to care for British Youth, with an adequate staff, including a supervisor; the maximum cost not to exceed \$10,000 for the first year; and refers the matter to the Executive for further consideration and action, if deemed practicable.
- (c) The Board approves the recommendation that the Federal Government be approached in regard to assisted passages; or, failing this, be requested to extend the loan system now in operation to include British Youth.

Child Immigration—

No action was taken regarding the suggestion that an approach be made to the Provincial and Federal Governments with respect to our undertaking to bring in children as immigrants.

Immigration of the Handicapped—

The following should be attempted in order to have some of the handicapped, such as tubercular persons, amputees, blind, indigents, etc., admitted to Canada:

- (a) Request made to the Federal Government to accept responsibility for a percentage of such persons; securing assistance from friends and relatives and Canadian organizations interested in them.
- (b) The work to be undertaken through The Canadian Council of Churches and The World Council of Churches.

Inter-Communion Co-operation—

It is suggested that The United Church of Canada confer with the Netherlands Reformed Church and The Reformed Church of America to develop a more satisfactory basis for co-operation in ministering to Dutch immigrants.

Treasurer's Statement

Rev. Dr. V. T. Mooney addressed the Board, giving a general outline of the financial situation of the Church, with special reference to the funds of the Board of Home Missions.

It was moved and carried, That the Board express its appreciation of the services rendered by Dr. Mooney and the Department of the Treasury.

Uninvested Balances of Home Mission Funds

The Treasurer reported that, as at December 31st, 1950, there was being used to finance the work of the Church a net amount of \$538,256.20, representing uninvested balances of Home Mission funds, as follows:

It was agreed to approve the action of the Board of Finance in this regard and to authorize the use of an amount up to \$500,000 for this purpose during the current year.

Sunday School in the Home—By Mail and Air

The Chairman welcomed Miss Gertrude Patmore, Supervisor of the Inter-Board Committee on the Sunday School in the Home. Miss Patmore made a brief statement regarding the work carried on by this Committee. It was moved and carried, That the Board express its appreciation to Miss Patmore for the services she is rendering in this important sphere.

It was agreed that the grant for this work be \$2,600.00 for 1951.

Requests for Appointment of Women Workers

(1) *Sydney Mines, Carman United Church*: Request for appointment of Deaconess or other qualified worker, for the extension of Christian education, etc.—No action was taken.

(2) *Moncton, Suburban*: Agreed to approve the request for appointment by The Woman's Missionary Society of a Deaconess who would serve in four new areas.

(3) *Grande Prairie*: Agreed to approve, in principle, the request that a Woman Worker be appointed to assist the minister; the Secretaries to make every effort to find a suitable person, it being understood that maintenance would be provided by the Board of Home Missions, The Woman's Missionary Society and the Radio Committee.

(4) *Bienfait, Estevan Presbytery*: Agreed to approve the request for the appointment of a Woman Worker by The Woman's Missionary Society.

(5) *Regina, St. John's-Pasqua*: Agreed to approve the request for the appointment of a Woman Worker by The Woman's Missionary Society.

Worker Among the Deaf, Winnipeg

A communication was presented, requesting that consideration be given to the appointment of a Worker among the Deaf Community in Winnipeg. No action was taken, pending receipt of further information.

Statement Re Vacancies

The Secretary made a statement regarding vacancies in the various Conferences. The approximate total, without making provision for new work, was 220. To meet this situation about 90 ordained men were available.

It was decided that a committee be appointed to draft a resolution regarding this matter. The Chairman named the following committee: Rev. J. R. Leng, Dr. M. C. Macdonald, Rev. J. A. Lyttle, Rev. R. W. K. Elliott, Dr. J. I. MacKay and Rev. R. Douglas Smith.

The Committee, later, presented the following resolution, which was adopted by the Board:

In view of the fact that there are 220 vacant pastoral charges—over one-half of this total being in the Maritimes, Northern Ontario and Saskatchewan, and that there is an unestimated number of ministers required for new work, assistant ministers and directors of Christian education, with only approximately 90 ordinands available in 1951;

BE IT RESOLVED:

- (1) That this most critical situation be brought to the attention of the Executive of General Council; that we urge it to set up a committee to bring to the attention of Presbyteries the possibility of the re-adjustment of pastoral charges, and to give assistance to Presbytery committees endeavouring to re-adjust work in order to effect a more equitable distribution of ministerial supply throughout the conferences of the Church. It is our conviction that such a policy will strengthen a large number of pastoral charges and make it possible for the Church to perform its duty more effectively.

- (2) That this Board express its gratification at learning from the Secretary of the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools that there has been a commendable increase in the number of candidates for the ministry. It is apparent, however, from the number of vacancies and the promises of growth through the establishment of new congregations that we have not yet reached the point in recruiting where an adequate supply of ministers is being ordained annually to meet the needs of our Church. It is imperative, therefore, that the tempo of recruiting be increased.

Modification of Theological Course—

Rev. J. A. Lyttle raised the question of some modification of the present theological training course, to meet the situation caused by the large number of vacant charges. It was agreed to remit this matter to the Secretaries and Superintendents.

Report of Committee on Appointment of Students

The Report of the Committee was presented by Dr. Macdonald and was adopted as follows:

- (1) During the summer of 1950, 196 students served the Board under its co-operative plan (ordinarily called the "Students' Pool") and 9 others were appointed on a special basis. In addition, 17 students substituted for laymen taking the Special Course for Lay Ministers. A total of 222 served under this Board.
- (2) The Committee, to date, has appointed to fields this year 210 students. They are distributed in the different Superintendencies as follows:

- (3) To date 216 students have made application for fields. Of these 166 are candidates for the Ministry (Arts 91, Theology 75). Of the applicants 36 were young women and of these 33 received appointments; 50 are non-candidates.
- (4) The Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students was carried out in 1950. The policy of setting allocations to the fields continued to prove satisfactory. The response enabled us to advance the payment of our student missionaries to \$20 a week plus board and travel on the field. The more experi-

enced students serving their 3rd, 4th and 5th terms were paid at the rate of \$22, \$23, and \$24 per week, respectively, plus board and travel on the field. An additional \$5 per Sunday was paid to those students who served over 18 Sundays.

- (5) This year we experienced serious difficulty in securing an adequate number of candidates for the ministry to serve our mission fields. This aspect of the work was disappointing in view of the increase in the number of candidates for the ministry across the Church. The total is reported as over 500. The failure of so many candidates to volunteer for service in Home Mission work means that several fields must be left vacant. Here is a situation the Church must face if it expects the Board of Home Missions to perform the duties assigned to it.

It is recommended:

- (1) That the Plan for the Co-Ordination of Salaries of Students should be continued for 1951.
- (2) That the appropriation for student work for the summer of 1951 be up to \$53,000, having regard to the number of students appointed and the total weeks served.
- (3) That if young women can be secured for work in the new areas of our larger centres, authority be given to make appointments in co-operation with the Superintendent concerned, and that we request The Woman's Missionary Society to accept responsibility for one-half the cost of maintenance involved.

Report of Literature Committee

The Report of the Literature Committee was presented by Rev. J. R. Leng and was adopted as follows:

Recommendation to the Committee on Missionary Education—

The Board requests the Committee on Missionary Education to increase its catalogue of transparencies, slides and film strips on Home Mission subjects.

Commendation of Dr. M. C. Macdonald—

The Board unanimously records its appreciation and commendation of Dr. M. C. Macdonald, Associate Secretary, for his painstaking work in writing the new study book on Home Missions, "From Lakes to Northern Lights". The Church is indebted to Dr. Macdonald for this long overdue and comprehensive study of our Home Mission enterprises.

Report of Committee on Indian, Oriental and Marine Work

Dr. W. P. Bunt presented the Report of this Committee. It was considered item by item and adopted as follows:

Indian Work

General Survey—

The Board heard brief statements by Dr. Best, regarding the Indian Work in Northern Manitoba; by Dr. Hart, on the work in Alberta; by Rev. H. S. Forbes, with particular reference to the work in Prince Rupert Presbytery; and by Dr. Bunt, regarding the work in British Columbia generally.

Appointments and Nominations—

That the following appointments and nomination be approved:

and that authority to issue be given to the Secretaries and the Superintendent concerned in respect of: Muskoka Presbytery, Gibson; Simcoe Presbytery, Rama; Bruce Presbytery, Saugeen; Lambton Presbytery, St. Clair and Walpole Island; St. Paul Presbytery, Saddle Lake; Prince Rupert Presbytery, Port Simpson, Kitamaat and Hazelton.

Residential Schools—

Morley: That a grant of \$4,900.00 be voted for 1950.

Norway House: Dr. Dorey made a statement regarding the re-building of this School, provision for which has been made in the Government Estimates and on which the officials have promised that a start will be made this year.

Edmonton: Re request for leave of absence by Rev. E. J. Staley.— That the Secretaries and the Superintendent of Missions be given authority to work out a solution to the problem created by the necessity of a period of leave for Rev. E. J. Staley.

Salaries of Principals: That authority be given for an increase of \$200.00 in the salaries of the Principals of Residential Schools, effective January 1st, 1951.

Recommendations of Conference of Indian Workers, Norway House Presbytery—

That the Board take the following action with regard to recommendations sent forward from the Conference of Indian Workers, held at Norway House in January.

(1) *Re Norway House Residential School*: Concur in the recommendation that the Indian Affairs Branch be urged to build the School in 1951 according to the plans already accepted.

(2) *Accumulation of Holidays*: Concur in the request that the Board recognize the principle of accumulation of holidays for missionaries in the Norway House Presbytery—the Board to be responsible for transportation of the missionary and his family to Winnipeg every two years and for supply of the field during the missionary's absence; with the provision that the accumulation of holidays does not exceed three years, and that Fisher River and Berens River be not included therein.

(3) *Salary Scale, Missionary-Teachers*: Authorize the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned to work out an adequate basis for each case on its own merits.

(4) *Allowance for Travel on Field*: Approve the following scale of allowances: Cross Lake—\$150; Gods' Lake—\$300; Nelson House—\$300; Norway House—\$200; Oxford House—\$150.

(5) *Freight Allowances*: Refer the matter of freight allowances, where necessary, to the Secretaries and Superintendent, with power.

(6) *Operating Expenses, Lighting Plant in the North*: Refer this matter to the Secretaries and Superintendent for study and report to the June Executive.

(7) *Conferences of Missionaries, Norway House Presbytery*: Recommend the holding of a biennial, instead of an annual, conference of Indian Workers.

(8) *Purchase of Wood*: Refer to the Secretaries and Superintendent the matter of purchase of five cords of wood for use of new missionaries, to be paid for by the missionary.

(9) *Summer Travel Equipment*: Authorize grant of \$100 per annum to each missionary for purchase and maintenance of canoe, motor and summer travel equipment.

(10) *Re Government Statistics*: Refer to the Manitoba Conference, for consideration and necessary action, the request that the Provincial Government be asked to relieve all Churches of responsibility of caring for Government statistics and that the sub-Indian Agent be made Registrar of Statistics.

(11) *Youth Caravans*: Send forward to the Board of Christian Education the request that if Youth Caravans are available in Manitoba, one be sent to the Norway House Presbytery.

Re School for Lay Supplies—

That the Secretaries be asked to explore the possibility of holding a School for Lay Supplies in Winnipeg in 1952, having in mind particularly the Workers on Indian fields; and that the Superintendents be asked to send in the names of prospective students by December, 1951.

Training of Workers—

That the Secretaries, Superintendents and The Woman's Missionary Society be asked to study the whole problem of our Indian Work in the hope that some volunteers for full-time work might be found from among the Indian people, and that a report be made to the Board in 1952.

Oriental Work*Winnipeg and Calgary, Chinese—*

Dr. Dorey explained the situation regarding the Chinese Missions in Winnipeg and Calgary and the relation of Mr. Thos. Choy to the work in Winnipeg, where he is now serving, and his obligation to the Calgary congregation who were instrumental in bringing him to Canada. Agreed that this matter be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendents concerned, with power.

Edmonton, Chinese—

Dr. Hart reported regarding this situation. Agreed that action be left to the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned.

It was also agreed that Edmonton Presbytery be asked to survey its Chinese work and report its findings to the Board in 1952; and that the matter of financial assistance towards the survey be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Nominations and Appointments—

That Mr. Thos. Choy be appointed to Calgary and that the Winnipeg vacancy be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Manitoba, Japanese—

It was reported that Rev. Y. Akagawa had retired from the Manitoba Japanese work, as at March 31st, due to ill health, and that the congregation had invited Rev. Y. Yoshioka of Kelowna to become their minister. Agreed that the matter of supply for the Manitoba Japanese, and any other vacancies that may arise, be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendents concerned.

Vancouver, Japanese—

That the Board approve the appointment of Rev. W. R. McWilliams as missionary to the Japanese in Vancouver and surrounding areas; and that the Secretaries, Mrs. Loveys, and the Superintendent of Missions be asked to confer and advise the Presbytery concerning the details of the work.

Marine Work*Hamilton Inlet, Labrador—"Glad Tidings"—*

Dr. Dorey reported that the securing of a new boat was in process.

Central Mainland, B.C.—“Thomas Crosby IV”—

Dr. Bunt stated that the work was being carried on very satisfactorily under Rev. Rayburn McColl.

Alert Bay, B.C.—

Dr. Bunt reported regarding the purchase of a new boat. It was agreed that the name of the boat be the “Melvin Swartout”.

The Report as a whole was adopted.

Resignation of Rev. J. R. Leng

The Chairman read a letter from Rev. J. R. Leng, submitting his resignation as Assistant Secretary of the Board of Home Missions, to take effect May 31st, 1952.

Dr. Dorey and Dr. Macdonald spoke in appreciation of the great service which Mr. Leng has been rendering to the Board and expressed their profound personal regret at the coming severance of the happy relationship now existing. Dr. MacKay voiced the sincere regret of all the members of the Board.

It was moved and carried, That the resignation of Rev. J. R. Leng be accepted and that it be transmitted to the Executive of the General Council, so that it may be brought before the Committee on vacancies.

Rural Work

Rev. J. M. Boyd, Chairman of the Committee on Rural Work, made a brief statement, outlining some of the problems which would be studied by the Commission on Rural Problems during the coming year.

Report of Committee and Commission—

Dr. W. S. Godfrey presented the Report of the joint meeting of the Committee on Rural Work and the Commission on Rural Depopulation and Related Problems, set up at the direction of the General Council. The following recommendations were considered seriatim and adopted:

The Late Rev. George W. Morrison—

That we place on record our great sense of loss in the death of Rev. George W. Morrison, Chairman of the Rural Life Committee of this Board.

Mr. Morrison spent thirteen years in the rural charge at Wyevale, Ontario. Having decided to spend his life in the rural ministry, he became a student of the farmer and his problems and was soon looked

to by Farm Groups and the Church for leadership and help in all rural matters. This he gave generously—far too generously for the good of his own health. Mr. Morrison possessed a keen mind; he was a tireless worker and a devoted servant of the Church and the Master. The effects of his ministry will long be felt in Simcoe County, where he served with distinction to himself and with much value to the rural church.

Summer Schools—

That a grant of \$200.00, if needed, be voted for the Newfoundland Summer School.

Scholarships, Garrett Biblical Institute—

That the Board accept the offer of three Scholarships from the Garrett Biblical Institute, covering cost of tuition and room at the School for Rural Leaders, to be held at Evanston, Illinois, June 18 to July 20; that the Board augment each scholarship by an amount sufficient to pay for travel and board; and that the choice of the men to whom the scholarships will be offered be left with the Secretaries and Superintendents.

General Council's Commission on Rural Problems—

- (a) That Regional Committees, as set up by the Executive, be appointed and that two representatives of The Woman's Missionary Society be added to each Regional or Conference Committee.
- (b) That a Steering Committee of five—Rev. J. M. Boyd, Chairman, Rev. M. C. Macdonald, Secretary, Mr. Melvin Breen, Rev. D. M. J. Buttars and Rev. R. T. Richards—be appointed to receive findings from Regional Committees, clarify these and send them out as guides to further study.
- (c) That when the Home Mission Committees report to Conferences they include emphasis on General Council's instructions to the Board of Home Missions in reference to rural problems.
- (d) That when the 1952 meeting of the Board is planned, provision be made for one whole day to be devoted to Rural Problems and that members of Conference Committees specially chosen be asked to attend.

Plans for Rural Work Conferences—

That, if possible, four Rural Work Conferences be held in the Central Conferences and that plans and promotion in connection with these be referred to the Executive of the Board; and that the Steering Committee prepare a mimeographed copy of the terms of reference and a summary of this Committee's findings, to be forwarded for use in these Conferences.

Rural Work at Summer Schools of Theology and Ministerial Conferences—

That \$100.00, each, be made available to St. Andrew's College, Saskatoon, and St. Stephen's College, Edmonton, on the understanding that rural emphasis be made at Summer Schools and that the outlines of courses be submitted to the Secretaries.

Rural Life Sunday Observance—

That Rural Life Sunday be observed on April 29th, with Rural Life Calendars available to all congregations; and that the thanks of the Board be extended to Rev. D. M. J. Buttars for his work in the preparation of the calendar.

The Report as a whole was adopted.

Ministerial Salaries

Dr. Dorey referred to a feeling among some of the laymen of the Church that the salaries of ministers were still inadequate. It was agreed that Rev. J. R. Leng and Dr. J. I. MacKay be named to bring in suggestions re the personnel of a committee to study this matter. Later, Mr. Leng presented the following report, which was adopted:

That the personnel of the committee to study the question of Ministerial Salaries be:

Report of the Hospital Committee

Dr. C. H. Best presented the Report of the Committee, which was adopted as follows:

Wm. Edmund Cruise & Wm. Forestt Cruise Memorial Hospital, Vita—

(1) *Salary of Superintendent:* That the salary of Dr. H. V. Waldon be \$6,000 for 1951 and that there be a retroactive increase of \$1,000 for 1950, to bring the salary up to \$5,000.

(2) That Dr. Harold Coburn be appointed Assistant Doctor from July 1st.

Mitchell Memorial Hospital, Carrot River—

(1) That the question of disposition of the property in Carrot River be referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent of Missions, with the understanding that the building is to be held for use by the pastoral charge.

(2) That, with regard to disposition of the money in the Hospital account in the Bank of Nova Scotia, Saskatoon, \$1,700 be remitted to the Board of Home Missions and that the account be kept open for further collection of accounts.

George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake—

(1) That the appointment of a Doctor and Matron be left to the Secretaries and the Alberta Hospitals Board; and

(2) That, having heard general proposals for the unification of the work of George McDougall and Archer Memorial Hospitals, approval in principle be given and the Secretaries given power to issue.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton—

(1) Dr. Dorey made a statement regarding the situation. After discussion, it was moved and agreed, That a copy of the letter from Dr. P. E. Moore, Director of Indian Health Services, be sent to Mr. S. Simons, Administrator of the Hospital, and that Dr. Bunt and Rev. H. S. Forbes be a committee to meet with Mr. Simons to discuss the whole matter; this meeting to be held in Prince Rupert and Dr. Bunt to have authority to add Dr. Darby and Rev. J. H. Matthews to the committee; and that when the Committee has met and prepared its report, it be submitted to a special committee of the Board, consisting of: the Chairman, the Secretaries, Mr. R. S. Mills, Rev. W. R. Auld, Rev. R. D. Smith, Rev. George Telford, Mr. George Copeland (or Rev. A. R. Taylor).

(2) *Engineer's House:* That permission be given to the Engineer to build a house on the hospital grounds, with the understanding that plans, etc., shall be satisfactory to the Board; and that for this purpose he be given a loan of \$1,000. to be repaid out of wages.

Skidegate Inlet Hospital—

Dr. Bunt reported regarding the progress of negotiations with the Powell River Company, Pacific Mills, and the Provincial Government, with regard to moving the former Air Force hospital building to a site in Queen Charlotte City.

Bella Coola: Mr. Odin Pedersen, Mr. Gunval Vestivick, Mr. Andy Schooner, Mr. Tommy Walkus, Miss Jean Duncan, Rev. L. L. Schuetze.

Wrinch Memorial: Referred to Secretaries and Superintendent for report to Executive.

Skidegate Inlet: Referred to Secretaries and Superintendent for report to Executive.

And that Hospital Boards include the following *ex-officio* members: Members of the Board of Home Missions in the Conferences concerned, the Convener of the Conference Home Mission Committee (in B.C. the Presbytery Convener), the Superintendent of Missions for the area, one of the Secretaries of the Board of Home Missions, the Superintendent of the Hospital; and in B.C., a representative of the Indian Health Services and of the Provincial Government.

Hospital Chaplaincies—

(1) *Greater Montreal:* That the Board send forward to The Woman's Missionary Society, with approval, the request of the Montreal Presbytery for the appointment of a special worker in connection with Hospital Chaplaincy Services in Greater Montreal.

(2) *Toronto Hospital, Weston:* That the request of the Toronto Home Missions Council for the provision of a full-time or part-time Chaplain be referred to the Executive, in view of the steps which have been taken to try to meet this need.

BE IT RESOLVED: That this Board request that the Alberta Hospitals Board:—

- (a) Take immediate steps to appoint a competent business manager for this hospital.
- (b) Give serious consideration to devise ways and means whereby some of the responsibility in whole or in part, and beyond the ordinary grant from the Board of Home Missions, should be undertaken either by the Provincial Government or by such arrangement with the Rural Municipality as would make possible not only a stable revenue but provision for meeting the major part of the expenses of operating the hospital in the future, without the necessity of the Board of Home Missions assuming the full responsibility arising from deficits due to uncontrollable circumstances.

George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake—

It was agreed to vote a grant of \$1,000 towards deficit incurred on operations of the hospital for 1950.

Report of Committee on Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Dr. J. I. MacKay presented the Report of the Committee. The recommendations were considered seriatim and adopted as follows:

Appointments and Nominations—

(1) That the Secretaries and Superintendent nominate a minister for Oak Church, Toronto, to the Settlement Committee.

(2) That the appointment of a Police Court Chaplain be referred to the Secretaries, the Superintendent and the Toronto Home Missions Council to issue, having in mind the possibility of linking this work with the Chaplaincy at Toronto Hospital, Weston.

Brunswick St. Church, Halifax—

That the salary of Rev. H. E. Campbell of Brunswick Street Church, including travel allowance, be \$3,000 for 1951; that Miss Frances McLelland be paid at the rate of \$60 per month for January, February and March; and that the budget be adjusted accordingly.

Calgary, Trinity Church—

That Trinity Church, Calgary, be given the status of an institutional church, and that the salary of Rev. H. R. Ross should be set by the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned, in conformity with the appropriate scale.

Edmonton, All Peoples' Mission—

That, in view of the intended retirement of Dr. J. T. Stephens in 1952, we request Miss Mina George to continue until June 30th, 1952; and that we employ Miss Edith Hickerson on a half-salary basis to June 30th, 1951; the disposition of her case thereafter being left to the Executive.

Vancouver, First Church—

That the following action be taken on the recommendations of the First Church Survey Committee:

(1) Re request for appointment of an Assistant for full-time duty: That this be referred to the Executive for consideration and action.

(2) Re request for appointment of trained Worker for Girls' Work: That we request The Woman's Missionary Society to make such change as will provide a worker able to give leadership in developing a programme for girls, as well as for children.

(3) Re request (a) for permission to sell former Japanese church property, Jackson Ave. and Powell St.; and (b) that a grant equal to the proceeds of the sale of this property be made available for the making of alterations to First Church property: That (a) and (b) be referred to the Executive.

(c) Request for appointment of Architect: That the Board authorize the appointment of an architect who would explore the possibility of making major alterations to the First Church building, and that further study be made by the Presbytery's Committee of the possibilities of the building and site at Jackson Ave. and Powell Street, and that this Committee submit its findings and the recommendations of the Architect to the Executive of the Board for consideration.

Conference of Non-Anglo-Saxon Workers—

That the Executive be instructed to plan, in co-operation with The Woman's Missionary Society, for the holding of a conference of Non-Anglo-Saxon Workers in Eastern Canada within the next year.

It was agreed to refer to the Executive decision re the date of the meeting of the Board in 1952.

Report of Resolutions Committee

The Report of the Resolutions Committee was presented by Rev. R. Douglas Smith and was adopted as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED:

(1) That the Board record its sense of the loss sustained by the Church in the death in February, last, of Mr. Robert Smith, lay supply at Elk Point, Alberta, and extend sincere sympathy to Mrs. Smith.

(2) That the sympathy of the Board be extended to the families of the following who have recently passed away: The late Rev. T. P. Shaver, the late Rev. Edwin Moore, the late Rev. R. T. Harden, the late Mrs. Gustave Heuer, and the late Rev. J. R. Bick.

(3) That we extend congratulations and cordial good wishes to Rev. James A. Lyttle and Rev. George Telford on the announcement that Queen's University is to confer upon them the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

(4) That we felicitate the three Superintendents of this Board who were honoured by being elected President of Conference: Rev. W. P. Bunt, B.A., B.D., D.D., of British Columbia Conference; Rev. Thos. Hart, M.A., B.D., D.Th., of Alberta Conference; and Rev. W. S. Godfrey, B.A., D.D., of the Maritime Conference.

(5) That congratulations and good wishes be extended to the Rev. S. P. Rondeau, Ph.D., D.D., who recently celebrated his eighty-fifth birthday.

(6) That the members of the Board express their gratitude to those who made possible the delightful dinner and social gathering in Bloor Street United Church on Wednesday evening, and in particular to Dr. E. M. Howse, Minister of the Church, to the officials for providing the hospitality of their church rooms, and to the members of the Kirk Club who served a most delicious dinner.

(7) That the Board also express its appreciation of the address delivered by Dr. A. B. B. Moore, President of Victoria University, who spoke on the theme, "Making the Christian Church Canadian". The address was most appropriate for a gathering sponsored by the Board of Home Missions and was warmly received by all present.

(8) That the Board record its recognition of the fine spirit and splendid efficiency of its Chairman in his conduct of the business of the Board, of its Minute Secretary, of the Secretaries and the Office Staff.

Special Maintenance Claims

(1) *Vancouver Presbytery, Columbia Street*: Agreed to confirm payment of \$39.00 for winter supply.

(2) *Vancouver, Chinese Mission*: Agreed to confirm payment of \$144.00 for student assistance, October 14 to December 31.

Car Subsidies

Statement—

Dr. Dorey reported that in the four years since the inauguration of the Fund, 523 subsidies had been given; the total sum paid was \$248,310, of which there had been repaid a total of \$80,230.

Revision of Regulations—

On the recommendation of the Secretaries and Superintendents, it was agreed:

- (1) That paragraph 5 of the Regulations (1949 Digest, p. 93) be amended so that the cancellation be on the basis of the financial year rather than the pastoral year.
- (2) That the regulation (1950 Digest, p. 96) re Subsidies for Ordinands be amended so that the full amount of the subsidy may be made available to students coming up for ordination, at the discretion of the Secretaries.
- (3) That the Secretaries give further study to regulations regarding freight on cars and recommend to the June Executive any changes in the scale which may be deemed advisable.

Special Cases—

- (a) *Rev. D. A. Clugston*: Agreed to cancel balance of \$50.00.
- (b) *Rev. D. F. Summers*: Agreed to cancel balance of \$57.50.
- (c) *Rev. F. A. McPhee*: Agreed that, because of special circumstances, Mr. McPhee, who received a subsidy in 1947, be given a subsidy this year.
- (4) Re case of *Rev. J. A. Jardine*: The following report of a Committee of the Superintendents was adopted:

“Having studied the correspondence between *Rev. J. A. Jardine* and the Home Mission Office, re car subsidy payments, we recommend as follows:

- (1) That *Mr. Jardine* be informed that his case has been under study by a committee of the Board of Home Missions, and that we greatly regret his attitude. Since the institution of the car subsidy arrangement a number of years ago, he is the only one of nearly 600 recipients who has accused the Board and its Secretaries of niggardliness and unfairness in the administration of the Fund.
- (2) That the Board finds that the action of the Secretary in this case was entirely in accordance with regulations and that he was carrying out his duty as a Secretary of the Board.
- (3) That a cheque recently received from *Mr. Jardine* be returned to him in view of the spirit of protest in which it was sent, and that the Secretary be instructed to cancel any balance that the Board believes to be owing.”

Report of Appropriations Committee

The Report of the Appropriations Committee was considered section by section and, after amendment, was adopted as follows:

- 1. That on the basis of estimates of contributions from congregations, the following be the scale of salaries for 1951:

Retired Ministers: Where retired ministers are temporarily giving full time service to pastoral charges normally served by married ordained ministers, the salary may be built up to the above scale. In other cases, the salary scale to be set for each field in the light of all the circumstances but not to exceed \$2,000. In these figures, pension is to be included.

Students: \$13.00 per week-end supply.

Superintendents of Institutions: Maximum \$3,100.00.

Women Workers: Maximum \$2,000.00. Minimum \$1,700.00.

2. That a special grant of \$100 be added to the amount voted for 1951, either by the Board or which may later be voted by the Executive, to those charges of three or more preaching appointments on which the necessary Sunday drive is 35 miles or over, and on which a Married Ordained Minister or a Married Lay Supply had, on December 31st, 1950, completed two years of service either on that pastoral charge or on an aid-receiving charge in the same Conference; and that special cases be considered on their merits.
3. That for Married, Ordained Ministers and Married Lay Supplies serving in Newfoundland, there be added \$50 to the grant voted.
4. That the Secretaries be asked to gather information and to submit same to the Executive in June, so that if it is found possible, the following additional grants may be made: That is to say, that a Married, Ordained Minister or a Married Lay Supply serving a charge paying not above the Home Mission minimum for the pastoral year, a member or members of whose family are obliged to leave home to pursue any University course or to attend a Normal School, shall receive a special grant of \$100 per member—special cases to be dealt with on their merits.
5. *Special Allowance for Transportation on Fields—*
 - (a) That in harmony with the intent of Sec. 104 (e) of the Manual, there be a travel allowance for all ministers on aid-receiving charges who find it necessary to operate a car in the performance of their duties.
 - (b) That the basis for 1951 be as follows:

Where the average Sunday drive over the year is

Up to 20 miles	\$125.00
Over 20 and up to 25 miles	150.00
Over 25 and up to 35 miles	200.00
Over 35 and up to 45 miles	250.00

Charges with exceptional conditions of travel to be dealt with on their merits.

6. *Re Charges Not On The List—*

(a) That at the first meeting following the Annual Conference, each Presbytery be requested to examine the salaries being paid by the respective charges to discover any charge or charges paying less than the scale set by the Board of Home Missions, and to arrange for a visitation by the Presbytery in co-operation with the Lay Committee on Ministerial Salaries.

(b) That such visitation shall be arranged at latest at the first regular meeting of Presbytery following Conference. Applications for grants from charges not already on the Home Mission list should not be endorsed by Presbytery unless and until the following requirements have been fulfilled:

- (i) Presbytery visitation as above.
- (ii) Every person canvass within the calendar year.
- (iii) Application on the proper form (Annual Report and Request for Grant) completely filled out, from the Official Board of the Charge. Presbytery should be satisfied that such pastoral charges have made reasonable increases in salary responsibility in the past two or three years before recommending that they be brought up to the established minimum.

Charges that fall within the classification known as "special fields" shall be dealt with on their merits by the Secretaries in consultation with the Superintendents concerned.

(c) That this information be sent to Lay Associations as well as to Presbyteries.

Incidental Travelling Expenses

On recommendation of the Secretaries and Superintendents, it was agreed that the scale of allowances for Incidental Travelling Expenses be revised as follows:

1. *Student Missionaries*: Berth at tourist rate, where necessary and available, plus \$5.00 per day for meals en route; and when necessary for student to spend the night or longer in a city before completing the journey to his field, \$3.00 for hotel and 75 cents for each meal. If no tourist berth available, then upper standard.

2. *Ordained Ministers*: Same allowance as for students but with standard sleeper; expenses for wife to be at same rate.

Mileage Allowance, Secretaries and Superintendents

It was moved and agreed, that the mileage rate for motor travel allowed to Secretaries and Superintendents be considered and report made to the Executive.

Transaction of Business by Executive

On motion, the Executive was authorized to transact business between meetings of the Board.
