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DIGEST OF MINUTES

THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS

June 26th, 1953

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Friday, June 26th, 1953, at 9.30 a.m. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Present: Revs. W. M. Mustard, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, J. R. Leng, A. B. Irwin, George Telford, E. C. Armstrong, and Mr. Kenneth Campbell.

Regrets were presented from Mr. P. M. McCarrell, Mr. A. W. Zurbrigg, and Mr. Arthur Webster.

Rev. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

A letter was received from the Rev. Dr. Oliver Darwin, in appreciation of the expression of sympathy on the death of his daughter, sent on behalf of the Board.

Resolutions

Sympathy

The Secretary referred to the recent passing of the following: Rev. Dr. Philip Duncan, Rev. Robert Simons, Mrs. C. A. Myers, Rev. Dr. R. C. Pollock, Mrs. H. A. Kent, Major D. M. MacKay and Mrs. Alex. Mills. It was requested that letters of sympathy be sent on behalf of the Executive to the families who have thus suffered bereavement.

The Secretary referred also to the fact that Mrs. Thos. Hart and the daughter of Rev. R. W. K. Elliott had recently undergone operations, and that Dr. J. C. Cochrane was ill in hospital in North Bay. The Executive-requested that its sympathy and good wishes for a speedy recovery be expressed in each case.

Congratulations

- (1) The Executive extended congratulations to the following on their election to the presidency of their respective Conferences: Rev. F. E. Archibald, Maritime Conference, Rev. K. G. MacMillan, Manitoba, and Rev. R. W. K. Elliott, Saskatchewan.

- (3) It was agreed to refer to the Secretaries and Superintendent the nomination of a Missionary-Teacher for Christian Island Indian Mission, Simcoe Presbytery.
- (4) It was decided to refer to the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned the suggestion that The Woman's Missionary Society be asked to appoint a Woman Worker to Murdochville, Miramichi Presbytery, to take effect after the Student Missionary leaves and to be for one year.

Licences to Administer Sacraments

- (1) On the recommendation of the Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee, it was agreed to request the Sub-Executive of General Council to issue licences to administer the Sacrament of Baptism to all lay supplies appointed to regular pastoral charges in that Conference for the year 1953-54.
 - (2) It was agreed to confirm the granting of Licences to administer the Sacraments, for one year, to the following, action having been taken by the Executive or Sub-Executive of General Council, subject to approval of this Executive:

Presbytery

Superintendencies of Missions

(1) Dr. Dorey reported that Dr. J. A. Lyttle had made a good recovery from his recent illness and had resumed his duties after receiving permission from the doctor. He stated, also, that Dr. J. I. MacKay had suffered a heart attack at the beginning of June but was making good.

progress and expected to be able to resume his work at the beginning of August. The Secretary was asked to convey the sympathy of the members of the Executive to Dr. MacKay and their satisfaction at knowing that he is making a good recovery.

- (2) Southern Ontario. On motion, it was agreed to accede to the request of Dr. S. B. Stokes, Superintendent of Missions for Southern Ontario, that he be permitted to change his place of residence from London to Aldershot.
- (3) Supervision of Abernethy-Yorkton Presbytery: It was decided that Rev. R. W. K. Elliott should have supervision of the newly formed Presbytery of Abernethy-Yorkton; Abernethy Presbytery having been broken up, part of the area going to Saskatoon Presbytery, part to the newly formed Presbytery, and the balance to the Regina Presbytery.

Hospital Work

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton

- (1) It was agreed that the Constitution and By-Laws of the Wrinch Memorial Hospital, as submitted, be approved.
- (2) Banking Authority: It was agreed that the name of Rev. E. B. Arrol be substituted for that of Rev. H. I. Hare as one of the signing officers authorized to conduct business with the Royal Bank of Canada, Smithers, on behalf of the Wrinch Memorial Hospital.
- (3) Re X-Ray Technician: Dr. Dorey reported that some difficulty had arisen with regard to the employment of the X-Ray Technician. The matter was referred to the Secretaries.

Port Simpson Hospital

It was agreed to authorize the proper officers to sign a transfer from Port Simpson General Hospital to The United Church of Canada of an amount of \$534.31, which is at the credit of the Hospital account in the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Prince Rupert.

Re John Edward Moody Bequest

The Board referred to the Executive, for recommendation to the Sub-Executive, of the General Council, the matter of the disposition of the bequest of the late Mr. Moody to the Port Simpson General Hospital. It was reported that the following recommendations had been made by the Committee set up by the British Columbia Conference Home Mission Committee to consider the matter:

- "(1) Up to \$1,000 for nursing station at Port Simpson.
- "(2) \$1,000 for Miller Bay Hospital.
- "(3) \$5,000, plus the unrequired portion of the amount appropriated for the nursing station at Port Simpson, to the Prince Rupert General Hospital.
- "(4) Balance of the fund to be used for providing some special equipment for the new Skidegate Inlet Hospital at Queen Charlotte City."

On motion, it was agreed that the Secretaries be given authority to deal with the matter.

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Indian Work

Norway House Residential School

Dr. Dorey reported that the nomination of Rev. K. C. McLeod as Principal of the School had been approved by the Department of Indian Affairs, but that it had been learned recently that the School would not be ready for operation until the fall of 1954. Under these circumstances, Mr. McLeod was continuing as Missionary at Norway House and Rev. A. I. Avery, who was to take over the mission work, would remain at Asquith and take Normal School training during the winter.

Morley Residential School

- (1) Grant: The matter of grant from July 1st was referred to the Secretaries, with power.
- (2) Banking Authority: On motion, the following resolution was adopted.

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Rev. Hugh MacPhail, Principal, is hereby authorized for and in the name of the Morley Indian Residential School, Morley, Alberta, to sign cheques upon the Imperial Bank of Canada, Calgary, Alberta, on behalf of the said School; and

Also that the said Rev. Hugh MacPhail be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the said Morley Indian Residential School to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said School account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said School provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said School and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

AND THAT all other powers heretofore given in this matter be and are hereby revoked.

Marine Work

Central Mainland: Dr. Dorey reported that no missionary had as yet been secured for the "Thomas Crosby IV," but that the Rev. Hugh Rose was acting as missionary for the summer months, the Engineer, Mr. John Moore, being qualified to act as skipper.

Immigration Work

- (1) Resolutions were presented from the British Columbia Conference, recommending that there be:
 - "(a) A closer tie between our representatives in the Home Land, the port chaplains and workers, and the church in the community of the newcomers' residence.
 - "(b) A Roving Chaplain in the Ports who will do liaison work between the newcomers and the community in which they settle."

- It was agreed that these recommendations be referred to the Secretaries.
- (2) Rev. J. R. Leng referred to the fact that in 1952 about 45,000 young people under 18 years of age had been admitted to Canada. This was received for information and it was directed that it be brought to the attention of the Board of Christian Education.

Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Ukrainian and Slavic Work, Toronto and Hamilton

Dr. Macdonald reported that a re-arrangement had been effected whereby the Ukrainian Work in Toronto would be linked up with the Slavic Work in Hamilton and Guelph. Rev. V. Kvasheninikoff would be the minister in charge of the services in the three centres. He would live in Hamilton but would hold a service every Sunday morning in Toronto and devote at least two days a week to the work there. The amount of time to be given to the work in Guelph would be decided by arrangement between committees in Hamilton and Guelph.

First Church, Vancouver

It was agreed that the Rev. R. A. Redman, Superintendent of First United Church, Vancouver, be given an extra month's holiday and that it be suggested that arrangements for supply be made locally.

Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute

- (1) Dr. Dorey reported that he had met with the Board of the Institute on April 23rd and had gone into all the points in the resolution which had been adopted by the Board of Home Missions. After very full discussion, he had stated that he would recommend to the Executive of the Board of Home Missions that the School be continued for another year on a maximum budget the same as for 1952 and that no responsibility be assumed for any deficit which might occur. It was agreed that this be approved.
- (2) Grant for 1953: It was agreed that grant be voted at the rate of \$37,200 and that it be a requirement that a financial statement be furnished monthly.
- (3) Resignation of Principal: Dr. Dorey stated that he had received a letter from the Rev. J. E. Boucher, resigning from the principalship of the school, to take effect as soon as the Board saw fit to release him. It was agreed that this be referred to the October meeting of the Executive.
- (4) Re Mrs. I. Cole: It was agreed that Mrs. Cole's enquiry as to whether she would be entitled to a pension on termination of her services with the Institute be referred to the Secretaries for study and report to the October meeting of the Executive.

Estate, Cynthia E. Oulton

It was agreed to recommend to the Treasurer of the Church that the Board of Home Missions accept \$500 in lieu of its interest in certain real estate situate at Point de Bute, in the Province of New Brunswick, bequeathed to it under the Will of the late Mrs. Cynthia E. Oulton.

Pension Payments, Rev. Hugh MacPhail

An enquiry was presented from the Department of Pensions regarding the payment of the employers' equivalent on behalf of Rev. Hugh MacPhail, covering the period of his service as Superintendent of St. John's Hall, Quebec.

On motion, it was agreed that the Board pay \$500 for the period named—twelve-and-a-half years at the rate of \$40 a year.

Rural Work

It was agreed that Dr. S. B. Stokes should substitute for Dr. J. I. MacKay on the Steering Committee representing this Board re Plan for Rural Evangelism to be carried out jointly with the Board of Evangelism and Social Service, Dr. MacKay being unable to act on account of illness.

Student Mission Work

Dr. M. C. Macdonald reported regarding the inability of the Board to collect amounts owing by two former candidates for the ministry—Mr. Murray Barnerd and Mr. Peter Mihalchan—who had received advances on appointment to summer mission fields, to which they failed to go, the former in 1951 and the latter in 1952.

It was decided that in each case the matter should be placed in the hands of the Solicitor for the United Church.

Date of Meeting of Board

The date of the meeting of the Board in 1953 was confirmed as April 6-8.

Memorial Cairn, Rama

It was agreed to refer to the Secretaries, with power, the request that the Board make a contribution towards the cost of a Cairn which it is proposed to erect on the Rama Indian Reserve, to mark the site of the Old Stone Church.

Car Subsidies

The following special cases were considered:

- (1) Mr. Mark Parsons, Dominion City, Man.: It was agreed that the original loan of \$400 be made a subsidy, with \$200 cancellable and \$200 loan.
- (2) Rev. R. L. Norman, Thomasburg, Ont.: The Secretaries were authorized to deal with the request that payments on subsidy of \$500 given in June, 1952, be postponed to a later date.

Property

BONAVISTA PRESBYTERY

Lumsden North (Newtown Charge) Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$750 towards cost of new church.

Newtown, Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$1,000 towards cost of new church, to replace building demolished by storm.

CARBONEAR

Hant's Harbour, Manse—Agreed' to vote grant of \$1,000 and loan of \$2,000 towards cost of new manse.

New Perlican (Heart's Content Charge) Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$300 towards cost of removing church tower.

GRAND FALLS

Stephenville (St. George's Charge) Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$2.000 and loan of \$3.000 towards cost of new church.

ST. JOHN'S

Woody Island (Sound Island Charge), Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$1,250 and loan of \$1,250 and to recommend that the congregation be requested to raise more money before proceeding with the building.

TWILLINGATE

Glenwood (Gander Charge) Church—Agreed that request for loan of \$1,000 and grant of \$1,500 towards new church building be referred to the October meeting of the Executive.

Griquet, Church—Agreed to renew grant of \$500 and loan of \$500, voted in June, 1951, for new church building, but not called for.

HALIFAX .

Echo Lake (Fort Wallis Charge) Protestant Church—No action was taken re request for assistance towards erection of a new church.

Halifax, Brunswick Street Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$400 towards cost of minor repairs and alterations and to authorize the Secretaries to deal with the matter of further extensive repairs which may be needed, if action should be necessary before the next meeting of the Executive.

Halifax, Oxford Street Manse—Agreed to vote grant of \$1,000 towards purchase of manse.

MIRAMICHI

Lower Neguac. Shore Road—Church Basement—Agreed that request for assistance towards cost of basement hall be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Murdochville, Church—Agreed that the matter of assistance towards erection of church be referred to the Secretaries, with power, on receipt of Presbytery action and application form.

New Carlisle, Church—Agreed that no action be taken re enquiry as to the possibility of the Board's making a loan of \$1,000, being amount expended by the congregation for repairs and improvements.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Alberton, Manse—The Executive had before it the request of the congregation that, in order that it may borrow funds locally, it be allowed

to repay the \$1,500 which has been advanced on loan of \$2,000 previously voted, and that \$250, the balance of the grant of \$500 which was previously voted, be forwarded.

It was decided that, since the total of \$2,500 in loan and grant was not now required, the grant should bear the same relation to the loan as it did previously, which would reduce the grant to \$375, leaving a balance of \$125 available, and that the congregation be given an opportunity to decide whether or not, under this revised action, it wishes to repay the \$1,500 already advanced on the loan.

SYDNEY

Ingonish North, Church—Agreed that, as the congregation does not wish to have any indebtedness on the church, the amount of \$500, advanced as a loan, be written off the books and made a grant.

Sydney River, Church—Agreed to make an additional grant of \$10,000 to the Church Extension Committees of the Sydney and Inverness-Guysboro Presbyteries, this amount to be earmarked for Sydney River; with the understanding that this advance, as well as the balance still owing on the previous advance of \$10,000, will be repaid from funds raised for Church Extension by the two Presbyteries.

MONTREAL

Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute—(a) Request for grant of \$3,500 for repairs was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

(b) Agreed to vote \$676.51, in payment of bills of William Kilgour, plumbing and heating contractor.

Shawbridge, Manse—Agreed to vote grant of \$2,500 towards cost of new manse.

OTTAWA

Carleton Memorial and Eastview, Manse—Agreed to vote grant of \$3,000 and loan of \$7,500 towards cost of purchasing or building manse.

Manotick, Church Hall—Agreed to vote loan of \$4,000, to be repaid in five years and to bear interest at five per cent.

QUEBEC-SHERBROOKE

Quebec, St. John's Hall—Agreed to vote grant of \$1,250, being one-half of estimated cost of alterations.

Seven Islands, Manse—Agreed to confirm payment of \$125 for stove and \$42.84 for fire extinguisher.

KINGSTON

Kingston, Cooke's Church—No action was taken regarding the request that Cooke's Church building be turned over to the Board of Home. Missions for \$50,000. The Executive recommended that this congregation begin with a first unit, using financial resources on hand, together with proceeds from sale of present church.

OSHAWA

 $\it Courtice, Church$ —Agreed to vote loan of \$5,000 towards erection of new church.

Peterborough

Peterborough, Grace Church—Agreed that, if request for assistance should be received, the Secretaries be authorized to deal with it.

RENFREW

Chalk River, Church Addition—Agreed to vote loan of \$5,000 and to recommend that more money be raised locally.

COCHRANE

Porcupine, Manse—Enquiry re manse for this charge was referred by the Board to the Executive. No action was taken, as no further information available.

MUSKOKA

Huntsville, Aspdin Manse—Agreed to offer manse to congregation for \$4,700 (amount actually expended for purchase and repairs), \$2,500 of which will be cash and the balance payable over a five year period, with interest at four per cent, or, alternatively, to accept a cash payment of \$4,500; on condition that the decision of the congregation is received by July 15th.

It was further agreed that if either of these offers is accepted, the Board will waive the rental of \$40 a month, which by action of the Board at its annual meeting, was to be charged, beginning May 1st.

NORTH BAY

Ferris (Callander-Ferris) Church—The Executive had before it a request for a loan of \$13,500, to be used to consolidate all outstanding loans. It was decided to offer to advance \$5,500 to the North Bay Presbytery Church Extension Committee, to be earmarked for the Ferris congregation and to be used to pay off two loans—one to the Billington Estate—\$3,500, and the other to J. W. Billington—\$2,000; with the understanding that the Presbytery would regard Ferris as a Church Extension area.

TEMISKAMING

Elk Lake, Church—Agreed that, pending receipt of formal application, the request for a loan of \$1,000 be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Kirkland Lake, Federal Church—Agreed to take no action on request that the Board guarantee a loan at the Bank for \$1,500, to enable the congregation to pay all outstanding indebtedness.

SIMCOE

Rama. Parsonage—Agreed to authorize: (a) installation of new furnace, purchase of some furniture and decorating; and (b) sale of barn and use of proceeds for a garage.

TORONTO CENTRE

Toronto, 131 Ivy Avenue—Agreed to authorize Secretaries to have necessary repairs made and decorating done.

Toronto, 175 Parkside Drive—Agreed to authorize Secretaries to have any necessary repairs made and decorating done.

Toronto, 306 Woodbine Avenue—Authority was given to have the exterior of the house painted and verandah repaired, and to have necessary interior painting and decorating done.

TORONTO WEST

Toronto, Ukrainian Greek Orthodox Church, Dupont St.—No action was taken regarding enquiry whether a discount could be allowed if balance of mortgage principal, which is due January 1st, 1956, were paid off immediately.

Humber Valley, Manse—In order to make possible the purchase of a manse, it was agreed to vote a grant of \$2,500 and a loan of \$12,500, to bear interest at four-and-a-half per cent from December 31st, 1953; principal to be repaid as follows: \$500 on December 31st, 1953, \$1,000 per year on each December 31st for the next five years, and the balance of \$7,000 to be repaid each December 31st in the succeeding three years, at the rate of approximately \$2,333.33 each year.

Toronto, 104 Millwood Road—Agreed to authorize repairs to the verandah pier and other carpentry work, at estimated cost of \$85, repairs to the roof at estimated cost of \$50, and the painting of the exterior of the house and garage at estimated cost of \$276.

Islington, St. James Manse—Agreed to authorize the following arrangement for the purchase of a manse: That the Board make available a grant of \$3,000 and a loan of \$12,000, with interest at four-and-a-half per cent from January 1st, 1954; the principal to be repaid at the rate of \$1,000 per year for six years, beginning December 31st, 1954, and at the rate of \$1,500 per year, beginning December 31st, 1960.

BRANTFORD

Fairview. Church—It was agreed that this property be transferred to the Trustee Board of Fairview United Church.

BRUCE

Saugeen, Mission House-Agreed to confirm payment of \$58.00 for Space Saver couch.

Cape Croker, Manse—Agreed to approve proposal of Bruce Presbytery that, as a Church Extension project, they be allowed to build a new manse at Cape Croker and retain proceeds of sale of old manse to be applied on cost of new building.

GUELPH

Kitchener—Agreed to refer to'the Secretaries, with power, the suggestion that the Board should buy sites in the following locations: Land Assembly Division; Rosemont Sub-Division; Lincoln Heights.

NIAGARA

Grantham Township. Church—Re request that the Board, in addition to the \$20,000 already advanced to Niagara Presbytery Church Extension Committee, make available some further assistance: It was agreed that the

Board would advance a further \$8,000 to the Presbytery Committee, to be earmarked for Grantham, on condition (a) that the charges of Niagara Presbytery be asked to guarantee \$10,000 by October 31st or when all funds for the building are needed, the amounts in each case to be credited as part of the Church Extension allocations; and (b) that no part of the additional \$8,000 be requested until all local funds are used.

It was further agreed that if the above proposition is accepted by the Presbytery, the terms of repayment for the new total of \$28,000 should be as follows: \$8,000 to be repaid by June 30th, 1954; \$10,000 by December 31st, 1955; and \$10,000 by December 31st, 1956; with interest at three per cent after the first year.

Grantham, Manse—Agreed to vote a grant of \$2,500 and a loan of \$8,500 towards cost of new manse; loan to be repaid at the rate of \$600 annually, with interest at four per cent for five years, at which time the terms of repayment are to be reviewed; the first annual payment to become due December 31st. 1954.

SUDBURY

New Sudbury, Church Site—Agreed to vote grant of \$150 and loan of \$150 to complete financing of purchase of lot for church.

Spanish (Massey-Webbwood Charge), Zion Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$500 and loan of \$1,500; first payment on loan to be made December 31st, 1954, until which time loan shall be interest free.

Sudbury, 162 Jean Street-Agreed to vote grant of \$125 towards cost of garage.

ALCOMA

Sault Ste. Marie, All People's Apartment—Agreed: (a) to confirm action of Secretaries in authorizing expenditure up to \$60 for repairs to kitchen sink and new cupboards; and (b) to request that The Woman's Missionary Society pay rent at the rate of \$40 per month, instead of \$35, for this apartment, which is occupied by their Worker.

Sault Ste. Marie, All People's Manse—Agreed to vote grants covering the following: new doors for garage \$100; new cement walks around house \$40; materials for decorating \$40.

Sault Ste. Marie, Bruce Hill Church—Agreed to vote grant up to \$1,500 towards cost of major repairs, including new roof, strapping and sheeting for basement, moving and equipping kitchen, new oil furnace and new entrance doors, provided the Sault churches (St. Andrew's and Central) raise a similar amount towards these repairs and improvements.

Sault Ste. Marie, Maxwell Church—Agreed to advance \$4,000 to the Algoma Church Extension Committee, to be used for this and other new church projects in the area and to be repaid from funds raised for Church Extension purposes.

Wawa (Michipicoten Charge), First Church—Agreed that no action be taken on request for grant of \$5,000 and loan of \$7,000.

KENT

DIGEST OF MINUTES THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS October 29th, 1953

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Thursday, October 29th, 1953, at 9.30 a.m. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Present: Revs. W. M. Mustard, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, A. B. Irwin, J. H. Hamilton, George Telford and E. C. Armstrong; Messrs. Arthur Webster and A. W. Zurbrigg.

The Secretary explained the absence of Rev. J. R. Leng, who was in the Western Conferences with the United Church Exposition.

Rev. George Telford was appointed Minutes Secretary.

Resignation, Mr. R. Kenneth Campbell

The Secretary reported that the resignation of Mr. R. Kenneth Campbell from membership on the Board had been received and forwarded to the Secretary of the General Council.

It was agreed that Mr. E. R. Mattinson should be appointed to fill the vacancy on the Executive of the Board, created by Mr. Campbell's resignation.

Communications

Communications were presented from:

- (1) The Official Board of The United Protestant Church of Sydney River, N.S., expressing thanks for assistance from the Board of Home Missions in the erection of their church.
- (2) Dr. J. C. Cochrane, in appreciation of sympathy in his illness, extended on behalf of the Executive, and also from Mrs. Thos. Hart, in appreciation of sympathy expressed at the time of her illness.
- (3) Mrs. Philip Duncan, Mrs. D. M. MacKay, Mr. Ralph Mills and Dr. H. A. Kent, in appreciation of letters of sympathy sent on the occasion of bereavement.
- (4) Rev. K. G. MacMillan, Rev. R. W. K. Elliott and Rev. F. E. Archibald, acknowledging congratulations on their election to the presidency of their respective Conferences.

Resolutions of Sympathy

The Secretary called attention to the recent death of the Rev. S. S. Osterhout, Ph.D., D.D., former Superintendent of Missions, and it was moved and carried that the following resolution be adopted and inscribed in the Minutes:

The Executive has learned with regret of the death of the Rev. Dr. S. S. Osterhout, who was for twenty-eight years Superintendent of Oriental Work.

Since retirement Dr. Osterhout has maintained his interest in the work carried on by the Board among the native people of Canada and among the newcomers from China and Japan. A very serious accident prevented Dr. Osterhout from active participation in missionary activities, but his concern for those formerly under his care remained constant and unabated.

We remember with gratitude the kindly and brotherly spirit of Dr. Osterhout, his sense of humour and his unfailing faith. The Executive would express to Miss Delda Osterhout and to the other members of the

family its sympathy as well as its sense of appreciation for all the services Dr. Osterhout was by God's Grace able to render to the Church he loved and to the Master he served.

(5) It was decided to refer to the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents for recommendation to the Board the request of Cochrane Presbytery, "That the Board of Home Missions review the policy of securing licences to administer the Sacraments by students on summer fields, who are not candidates for the ministry or proceeding to ordination."

Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute

- (1) Dr. Dorey reported that the situation in the School had improved; that there were approximately 100 pupils in residence, that the quality of the pupils was higher, and the morale of the school better. He had attended two meetings of the Board and hoped to attend alternate meetings in the future.
- (2) It was agreed that the resignation of Rev. J. E. Boucher as Principal be accepted, to take effect June 30th, 1954, and that a committee, consisting of the Secretaries, the Superintendent of Missions, and Mr. Arthur Webster, be appointed confer with a committee of the Board of Pointe-aux-Trembles and present a nomination for the principalship to the meeting of the Board.
- (3) It was decided that no action be taken regarding the enquiry of Mrs. I. Cole with reference to payment of pension on termination of her services.

Immigration

British Youths, Assisted Passages

It was agreed: (a) To refer to the Secretaries, with power, the appointment of one or two persons in Great Britain with power of attorney to sign undertakings to repay Assisted Passage Loans granted by the Federal Government to British boys, destined for placement under this Board on Canadian farms; and (b) To guarantee reimbursement of the Federal Government should any of the British boys fail to repay such transportation loans.

Port Chaplain, Liverpool

The Secretary stated that arrangements had been made to have the Rev. H. R. Cornish, a retired minister of The Methodist Church, represent the United Church as Chaplain at the Port of Liverpool; his duties to include the forwarding by air mail of lists containing the names of all immigrants belonging to the Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches and The Church of Scotland. It was agreed to approve the payment to Mr. Cornish of an honorarium of £40 a year, plus expenses.

Re Needy Immigrants

A resolution was presented from The Committee on the Church and International Affairs, requesting that the Board of Home Missions "consider favorably appointing a special worker for a three months' trial period, to assist needy immigrants." No action was taken, as it was reported that the matter was already receiving attention by The Canadian Council of Churches.

Church Extension

Dr. Macdonald stated that the most recent figures available showed a total of \$1,588,148 raised in cash for Church Extension, that probably at this date the total would be over \$1,600,000, and that in the majority of Presbyteries the local campaign was making fair progress.

Moravian Missions, Labrador

A communication was presented from F/L P. D. Ross, Air Force Chaplain at Goose Bay, relative to the financial needs of the Moravian Missions in Labrador. It was decided that this matter be referred to the Secretaries for study and possible consultation with the Headquarters of the Moravian Missions in the United States after they have written to F/L P. D. Ross and Dr. Dawe.

Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

First United Church, Vancouver

(1) It was stated that, because of ill health, Rev. R. A. Redman had asked that he be relieved of responsibility as Superintendent of First Church and that the Presbytery had agreed to give him leave of absence until June 30th, at which time his connection with First Church will cease.

It was decided that the Board should pay Mr. Redman's salary in full for October, and for November and December make up the difference between what he will receive from the church in Oregon, where he is at present supplying, and the salary which he was receiving at First Church, minus travel allowance.

(2) It was reported that the Presbytery had named Rev. H. M. Morrow as Acting Superintendent. On motion, authority was given to the Secretaries, in consultation with the Superintendent of Missions and the Committee of Presbytery responsible for this matter, to make any necessary arrangements for the temporary supply of the work at First Church and to nominate a successor to Mr. Redman.

Survey, West Toronto

A communication was presented from the Rev. R. Simpson, minister of Alhambra United Church, drawing attention to the changing character of the population in certain areas of the Toronto West Presbytery because of the influx of Non-Anglo-Saxons and suggesting that a survey be-made. It was agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Finnish Work, St. Catharines

A suggestion was received that Rev. G. A. Koponen of the Church of All Nations, Toronto, make monthly visits to St. Catharines for the purpose of holding services for the Finnish people and opening up work amongst them in that area. It was agreed that the Secretaries be authorized to carry on negotiations regarding this matter with the Niagara . Presbytery, in consultation with the Superintendent of Missions.

Re Miss Vera Enticknap

It was reported that Miss Vera Enticknap, who terminated her services with the Board of Home Missions on July 31st, had received no salary for the month of August. It was decided that, while recognizing that the Board has no responsibility for salary for this month, payment be authorized so that Miss Enticknap may not be penalized because of a situation for which she was not responsible.

Annual Assembly, Division of Home Missions

- (1) It was decided that Dr. Dorey should represent the Board at the Annual Assembly of the Division of Home Missions, National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States, Buck Hill Falls, Pa., Dec. 13-16.
- (2) The Secretary was asked to express appreciation on behalf of the Board of Home Missions of the services of Dr. G. E. E. Lindquist, who at December 31st next will retire as Field Representative for Indian Work under the Division of Home Missions.

Marine Work

Central Mainland, "Thomas Crosby IV"

- (1) It was reported for information that Rev. A. F. Crewe had been appointed Missionary.
 - (2) Payment of the moving expenses of Mr. Crewe was authorized.
- (3) The Basis of Cooperation between the Missionary and the Skipper-Engineer, Mr. John Moore, as laid down by the Marine Committee, was considered and adopted, with slight amendment, as follows:
 - "(a) The Missionary is to be responsible for planning itineraries and for all other matters coming within the field of the life and work of the Church. In planning trips he is to take into consideration weather conditions, etc., and to consult with the Skipper-Engineer, Mr. Moore.

The Missionary, being responsible to the Presbytery and the Board of Home Missions, will be the Treasurer of the Mission, and will operate a bank account in which all offerings and donations in aid of the work will be deposited. This will be remitted quarterly to the Superintendent of Missions who will forward it to the Board in Toronto. This fund will not be used for the payment of any expenses in connection with the operating and maintenance of the boat.

Re purchasing of supplies: The Missionary is to be responsible to the Marine Committee; all purchasing to be done in consultation with the Skipper-Engineer.

"(b) Mr. J. P. Moore, Skipper-Engineer, will be responsible for navigation and upkeep of the boat, and such other matters as relate themselves directly to the running and care of the ship.

The Skipper-Engineer will cooperate with and give such assistance as is possible to the Missionary in his work, the Missionary on his part giving such assistance as he may be able and as may be necessary for the safety and welfare of the boat.

"The Committee is of the unanimous opinion that the only basis on which complete success under the above set-up can be obtained is that of genuine Christian cooperation between the missionary and the skipper-engineer."

Alert Bay, "R. C. Scott"

It was agreed:

- (a) To vote a grant of \$200 a month for the five months' period, November to March, to provide assistance for Rev. Oliver Howard; the future policy in this regard to be determined by the Board at its Annual Meeting.
- (b) To vote a grant at the rate of \$500 for operating and maintenance expenses for the period ending December 31st, 1953.

Housing Accommodation, Engineers

It was agreed to refer to the Board the recommendation of the Marine Committee that the matter of housing accommodation for the Engineers receive attention.

Indian Work

Re Norway House Residential School: It was agreed that the Board make provision for supply of the Norway House Mission for three months in the Spring, so that Rev. K. C. McLeod, the Principal-elect of the School, might have a holiday, visit other residential schools, and secure staff.

Student Mission Work

- (1) The Secretaries were authorized to deal with cases of exceptional cost of travel on certain student fields and other special problems relating to the final payment.
- (2) It was agreed that the Secretaries be authorized to give financial assistance where necessary in cases of hospital or medical expenses incurred by students while serving mission fields during the summer.
- (3) Dr. Macdonald reported that the matter of amounts owing by two former student missionaries had been placed in the hands of the Solicitor for the Church, as decided by the Executive in June, but that no satisfaction had been obtained. It was decided that this be referred to the Secretaries, for consultation with the Solicitor as to further action.

Hospital Work

Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont

It was reported that the Alberta Hospitals Board, having failed to secure the Archer house as a residence for graduate nurses, now proposed to erect a house on part of the hospital property; the project to be financed in part by a loan of \$8,000 from the N.H.A. It was agreed to ask that the Executive of General Council approve this project.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton

- (1) Administrator: It was agreed that the resignation of Mr. P. E. Russell as Administrator be accepted and that Mr. N. H. Edwards be appointed to succeed him on a six months' trial basis.
- (2) Matron: It was agreed to approve the appointment of Mrs. 1. Grace Taft as Matron.

(3) Banking Authority: It was agreed that the name of Mr. N. H. Edwards be substituted for that of Mr. P. E. Russell as one of the signing officers authorized to conduct business with the Royal Bank of Canada, Smithers, B.C., on behalf of the Wrinch Memorial Hospital.

(4) Hospital Board:

The Executive approved the appointment of the following as members of the Hospital Board: Mr. C. H. Drake, Chairman, Rev. E. B. Arrol, Messrs. C. Benson, W. Dunn, T. Marshall, W. Sargent, M. C. Jutras, Dave Goodridge, John Willan, Art Warren, Wm. Dennison, Stephen Morrison.

Skidegate Inlet Hospital

Dr. Macdonald reported on a meeting which he had attended while in Vancouver, at which representatives of the Powell River Lumber Company and other Companies operating on the Queen Charlotte Islands were present, when the matter of a new hospital was discussed.

It was agreed that negotiations be continued, that the Board express its willingness to operate the new hospital, and that in view of the considerable outlay in which the Board has already been involved in taking over this hospital, providing equipment and purchasing a residence for the doctor, it is the opinion of this Executive that practically all of the cost of providing a new hospital or of moving the hospital building now at Alliford Bay to a suitable site in Queen Charlotte City should be borne by the Dominion and Provincial Governments, and by the Logging and other Companies concerned.

Submission to Policy Commission

The Secretary submitted, for information, the final draft of the Board's Submission on Hospitals to the Policy Commission of the Church, general approval of which had been given by the Board in the Spring.

Car Subsidies

(1) Re cancellation on car subsidies due June 30, 1953, in respect of those whose salaries are above the Home Mission scale, it was agreed to adopt the following:

General Rule: That we consider the salary at the rate received for the first half of this calendar year (1953), plus travel rate for the same period.

- (a) That if the total is not more than \$50 above the Home Mission scale for that period, the regular cancellation be given.
- (b) That if the amount in excess of our Home Mission scale is between \$50 and \$100, a half cancellation be granted.
- (c) That if the total is more than \$100 above the scale, no cancellation be given.
- (2) Re Insurance against Fire and Theft: Attention was drawn to the regulation of the Board providing that insurance shall be placed covering loss by Fire or Theft, with the loss payable to The United Church of

Canada as its interest may appear, and the Secretaries asked for direction in the following cases;

- (a) Where the Insured has a contract with a Finance Corporation or Bank holding the first claim; and
- (b) In Saskatchewan, where insurance automatically goes with the Licence but with \$100 deductible.

It was agreed that in cases coming under (a) the Board should be provided with a certificate from the Insurance Company, showing that the car is sufficiently insured; and that in cases coming under (b) nothing further should be required.

Special Cases

The following special cases were considered: Rev. Harold Penner, Brantford, Ont., and Rev. F. A. Bunt, Temiskaming, Que. Authority was given to the Secretaries to deal with the special problems involved in each case, after they have had any necessary consultation with the Presbyteries concerned.

Re Retired Ministers

- -It was agreed that the following be cancelled:
- Rev. R. G. Halbert-retired July 1, 1952-\$75 cancellable June 30, 1953.
- Rev. D. T. Lancaster—retired June 30, 1953—\$75 cancellable June 30, 1954.
- Rev. L. B. Smith-retired June 30, 1953-\$75 cancellable June 30, 1954.

Cases in Arrears

It was agreed that the Secretaries be instructed to write to all those who are \$75 or over in arrears and inform them that if payment is not made or if no satisfactory explanation is forthcoming, the Board must exercise its responsibility to report the matter to the Presbytery concerned.

Education Grants

Consideration was given to the following special cases:

- Rev. S. A. Moote, London, Ont.—Re son attending Victoria University. No action.
- Rev. F. A. Bunt, Temiskaming, Que.—Re son attending Law School. No action.
- 3. Mr. A. D. Lehman, Caradoc Indian Mission, Ont.—Agreed that Dr. Dorey take up with the Ontario Department of Education the question of Mr. Lehman's daughter being allowed to attend a Secondary School in London and that if necessary assistance be given to Mr. Lehman under the regulation re children of Missionaries on Indian fields who have to leave home to attend school.
- 4. Rev. H. Allenby, St. John's, Quebec.—Agreed to refer to Secretaries, with power.
- 5. Rev. R. H. MacKinnon, Canmore, Sask.—Re daughter attending Business College in Calgary. No action.

 Mr. C. T. Morrison, Sovereign, Sask.—Agreed that Mr. Morrison is eligible to receive educational grant, as coming within the category of a minister of another Church.

Nominations to Boards and Committees

The Executive had before it the request of the Secretary of the General Council that the Board make suggestions and nominations for submission to the Nominating Committee of the General Council. It was decided to appoint a committee, consisting of the Chairman, the Secretaries, Dr. Telford and Mr. Webster, to consider the matter and report. The committee later presented the following report, which was adopted:

Greenspond, M. B. "Messenger"—Agreed: (a) to vote \$116.21 to cover cost of two fire extinguishers, search-light and four life jackets, as required by Government regulations; and (b) \$80 for battery labour, engine parts and miscellaneous items.

Hillview, Manse—Agreed to vote \$600 to assist in purchase of house, at present occupied by the lay supply, for use as a manse.

BURIN

Epworth, Church—Agreed to accept reduction of \$50 in instalment of principal and interest due at the end of 1953.

GRAND FALLS

Botwood, Church Hall—Agreed to vote loan of \$4,000 towards cost of erecting hall.

Buchans (Buchans-Millertown Charge), Church and Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$4,000, to be interest free for one year; first payment on principal to be made December, 1955.

TWILLINGATE

Glenwood (Gander Charge), Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,000 and grant of \$1,000, towards cost of new church.

Horwood South (Change Islands Charge), Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$750 towards cost of new church.

HALIFAX

Halifax, Brunswick Street, Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,400 and grant of \$2,600; loan to be repaid over a period of ten years; first payment to be due on December 31st, 1955.

Lake Echo (Port Wallis Charge), Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,500 to congregation from Property Fund, repayable over ten year period, and to advance \$1,500 to the Halifax Presbytery Church Extension Committee, with the understanding that this be made available to Lake Echo as a grant; to be repaid to the Board from funds raised in the Presbytery for Church Extension.

LUNENBURG-QUEENS

Middlewood, Student's Cabin—Payment of \$300 towards cost of cabin was confirmed.

MIRAMICHI

Kempt Road (Escuminac Charge), Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$2,000 and grant of \$1,500: loan to be without interest until December, 1954, and to be repayable over a period of eight years.

Lower Neguac (Tabusintac Charge), Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$400, provided it is used to assist in building basement hall, and not for repairs; to be repayable in four years.

MONCTON

Anagance Ridge (Petitcodiac Charge), Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$500 and grant of \$300, towards cost of providing basement hall; loan to be repaid in seven years.

Gunningsville (Moncton Suburban Charge), Church Hall—Agreed to renew authority for advance of \$2,000, as voted by the Board in 1952, on condition that amount is repaid out of funds raised for Church Extension in the Moncton Presbytery.

Lakeburn (Moncton Suburban Charge), Church Hall—Agreed to renew authority for advance of \$3,500, balance of amount voted by the Executive in October, 1951, to assist in the transforming of the hall into a church, provided the amount is used for the same purpose as formerly described and with the understanding that it will be refunded from moneys raised by the Moncton Presbytery for Church Extension.

Lower Coverdale (Hillsboro Charge), Church Hall—Agreed to vote loan of \$2,000 and grant of \$1,500; loan to be repaid over period of ten years.

SYDNEY

Dominion, Chalmers Manse—Agreed to cancel payment of interest for 1953 and to postpone for one year payment of instalment of principal.

Westmount (Westmount and Leitches Creek Charge), Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,000 and grant of \$2,000; loan repayable in period of five years.

MONTREAL

East Greenfield, Church Renovation—No action was taken on request for grant of \$250 towards cost of renovation.

Montreal, Union Church (Real Property)—Agreed to vote grant of \$150 to assist in making needed repairs to stone work and flashing.

OTTAWA

Manotick, Church Hall—Agreed to accept Agreement to Repay and Insurance Policy as security for loan of \$4,000, voted in June, 1953, as the congregation has had to deposit Deed with mortgagee, from whom it has had to borrow \$17,000.

Ottawa, St. Mark's Church.—Agreed to vote loan of \$2,500 and grant of \$3,000 towards addition to the church, on condition that there will be made available in the new structure office space for our Superintendent of Missions, for a ten-year period at least; loan to be repaid in ten years at the rate of \$250 a year, which amount the Board will place to the credit of the congregation annually as the Board's contribution towards maintenance during the occupancy of the building by our Superintendent.

QUEBEC-SHERBROOKE

Sherbrooke. Sangster Memorial Church—Agreed to renew the action taken by the Board in 1951: namely, that if the churches of Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery assume an allocation for Church Extension, \$5,000 of the amount raised would be earmarked for Sangster Memorial; and that, in addition, if this amount is provided through the Church Extension campaign within the Presbytery, the loan of \$2,000 given in 1949 would be cancelled.

KINGSTON

Kingston, St. Matthew's (formerly Rideau Heights) Church—Agreed to advance \$500 to Kingston Presbytery Church Extension Committee to assist in finishing church; the amount to be repaid from funds raised in the Presbytery for Church Extension.

OSHAWA

Courtice, Church—Agreed to authorize change in terms of loan of \$5,000, voted by the Executive in June, extending the period for repayment from five to ten years.

RENEREW

Denbigh, Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$125 towards cost of remodelling manse; loan to be interest free for three years.

SIMCOE

Penetanguishene, Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$400 towards installation of oil heating; loan to be repaid in four years.

TEMISKAMING

Elk Lake, Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$500 and grant of \$500 towards cost of renovation; loan to be repaid in five years.

Kenabeek. Church—Agreed to authorize payment of loan of \$60 for roofing church—to be a first charge against the building in case of sale.

TORONTO CENTRE

Toronto, 175 Parkside Drive—Agreed to confirm payment of \$125.54 for wiring for electric stove.

TORONTO EAST

Cliff Crest. Manse—Agreed to refer to the Secretaries, with power, on receipt of Presbytery action, the suggestion that the Board vote loan of \$11,500 and grant of \$2,500 for purchase of a house now on property, recently purchased by the Toronto Home Missions Council as site for new church.

Toronto. 131 Ivy Avenue—The Executive was asked for direction re the advisability of selling this property. Agreed that the matter be left in the hands of the Secretaries and the Superintendent of Missions.

BRANTFORD

Grand River, Ohsweken Manse—Agreed to pay cost of repairs to water cistern.

BRUCE

Cape Croker. Manse—Agreed to authorize advance of \$4,500 to the Bruce Presbytery, to be repaid from funds which Presbytery is raising for a new mission house as a Church Extension project.

Saugeen, Mission House—Agreed to authorize grant for necessary repairs to joists under house, etc., when estimate of cost received.

GUELPH

Guelph, Brooklyn Mission—Agreed to vote grant up to \$800 for painting building and to request that tender be secured.

Waterloo, Church Site—Agreed to advance \$6,000 to the Presbytery Church Extension Committee for purchase of the C. Pflug property, amount to be repaid from funds raised in the Presbytery for Church Extension.

HAMILTON

Hamilton, 97 Steven Street—Agreed: (a) to confirm payment of \$45 for control for furnace; and (b) to refer to Secretaries the request for a grant not to exceed \$190 for the installation of laundry tubs and water heater.

SUDBURY

Lively (Coniston Charge), Church—Re request of Presbytery that advances made by the Board, totalling \$4,850, be considered a grant. Agreed that the Board reaffirm its first position; namely, that the amount is an advance to Presbytery, to be repaid from funds raised in the Presbytery for Church Extension.

ALGOMA

Sault Ste. Marie. All Peoples', Apartment in Church—Agreed to authorize grant for repairs to sink in kitchen, being in addition to those for which grant was voted in June.

Sault Ste. Marie. Church—Agreed: (a) to vote grant of \$183 for repairs to furnace and boiler; and (b) grant of \$67 for repairs to plumbing in kitchen.

THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS

February 3rd, 1954

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Wednesday, February 3rd, 1954, at 9.30 a.m. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Webster, P. M. McCarrell, E. Russell Mattinson and A. W. Zurbrigg. Revs. J. I. MacKay, J. A. Lyttle and S. B. Stokes were present as corresponding members.

Rev. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communication

A resolution was presented from the Annual meeting of the Japanese Congregation of Queen Street and the Church of All Nations, Toronto, expressing their "deep gratitude to the Home Mission Board of The United Church of Canada and its officers for the kindly consideration they have given at all times for the evangelization of the Japanese Canadians and pledging anew their loyalty to the Board and their support of its work to the best of their ability."

It was agreed that the communication be received and that a letter of congratulation be sent to the Japanese congregation on its decision to become self-supporting from January 1st, 1954.

Confirmation of Minutes

The Minutes of the meeting of the Executive, held October 29th, having been previously circulated, were confirmed.

Dr. Doyle exercised a very fruitful ministry in the Saskatchewan Conference. His interest in Young People and in the Lumsden Beach Summer School will long be remembered and bear fruit.

The Executive would express to Mrs. E. D. Durrant, Dr. Doyle's oldest daughter, and to the other members of the family its sympathy, as well as its appreciation of the services Dr. Doyle was privileged to render.

The Secretary was requested to convey the sympathy of the members of the Executive to the families of the following who have recently passed away: Rev. Dr. Gordon Sisco; Rev. J. K. Curtis; Rev. A. E.  - (2) That, inasmuch as last year the Scholarships were awarded to ministers from Ontario, Saskatchewan and Alberta, this year there be one representative from the Maritimes, one from Ontario, one from Manitoba and one from Saskatchewan, and that the following be nominated: Rev. J. P. Matheson, Upper Stewiacke, N.S.; Rev. D. A. Brydon, Ripley, Ont.; Rev. John A. Ross, Manitou, Man.; and Rev. R. R. Smith, Elrose, Sask.; and that failing the acceptance by one or more of the above-named, the Secretaries be empowered to make another choice.

French Work

Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute

Dr. Dorey reported that Dr. Macdonald and he had spent January 14th in Montreal, meeting with the Committee on the Principalship in the evening and with the Pointe-aux-Trembles Board in the morning. So far as the principalship was concerned, very little progress had been made. So far as the School itself was concerned, some progress had been made and the budget for 1953 had not been exceeded. The future of the School had been discussed thoroughly, including the possibility of making it a co-operative venture with the Baptists and Presbyterians, but this had not been favoured.

Dr. Dorey stated that it was his intention to attend the next meeting of the Board of Pointe-aux-Trembles, called for February 11th, and it was agreed that the Board of Pointe-aux-Trembles be asked to invite Mr. Arthur Webster to sit in at this meeting.

French Periodical

It was stated that when the Secretaries were in Montreal, they had also attended a meeting regarding the publication of a French periodical to take the place of *L'Aurore*, which had ceased publication, and that the Presbytery of Montreal had asked that a grant of \$1,000 be made available for this purpose.

It was decided to make available \$400 (amount unexpended on L'Aurore in 1953) for the first three months of 1954 towards the production by the United Church French pastors of a four or six-page paper for distribution amongst their own people.

English Course, Mr. Armand Auberson

It was agreed to refer to the Secretaries, with power, the recommendation of Montreal Presbytery that Mr. Auberson, lay worker at St. Martyrs, be supplied with a course, such as the linguaphone method, whereby he might learn the English language by gramophone.

Hospital Work

George McDougall Hospital

It was stated that the Hospital had incurred a deficit of \$6,300 in its operations for 1953 and that some assistance was requested. It was decided to refer this to the Secretaries, with power, together with the request for extension and increase of the line of credit with the Bank.

Skidegate Inlet Hospital

The Secretary stated that no decision had as yet been arrived at by the interested parties in British Columbia as to the advisability of moving the hospital building from Alliford Bay or of erecting a new hospital.

On motion, it was agreed that if the moving of the hospital building from Alliford Bay was not found to be feasible or acceptable, the matter of the employment of an architect to prepare plans for a new building should be referred to the Secretaries, with power; and that the Secretaries be given authority to deal with the report of Dr. Bunt after his consultation with the Loggers' Association.

Indian Work

Brandon Residential School

The Secretary stated that he had received a letter from the Department of Indian Affairs, expressing dissatisfaction with the present conduct of the School, and that he had on his recent visit to Winnipeg conferred with the Superintendent of Missions and the Principal of the School.

On motion, the Secretaries were authorized to pay the expenses of the Principal if it should be found necessary or advisable for him to visit Ottawa to have an interview with officials of the Department of Indian Affairs.

Norway House Residential School

Dr. Dorey reported that the new school, to accommodate 125 pupils, was completed and would be opened in September. He had conferred in

Winnipeg with Rev. K. C. McLeod, Principal-elect, and Dr. Best with regard to the staffing of the school and other matters.

It was agreed to authorize payment of Mr. McLeod's airplane expenses from Norway House and return—\$74.34, and hotel expenses in Winnipeg—`\$25.50.

Educational Grants

- (1) On recommendation of the Middlesex Presbytery, it was agreed to pay tuition fees of \$15.00 per month, covering the school year September 1st to June 30th next, for attendance of Faith Lehman, daughter of the missionary on the Caradoc Indian Mission, at High School in London.
- (2) It was agreed to vote a similar grant of \$15.00 per month towards fees and transportation costs of Peter Hanna, son of the missionary at Grand River, who is in attendance at Brantford Collegiate.

Student Mission Work

A request was presented from the Prince Albert Presbytery for the payment of expenses of supervising pastors, as follows: Rev. S. R. Vincent—\$20.00; Rev. Marjorie Stedman—\$20.90. It was agreed to authorize payment of these expenses but to request that the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents give some study to the principle involved and submit a recommendation to the Board at its annual meeting.

Oriental Work

A letter was presented from Rev. J. Kabayama, Japanese minister at Kelowna, B.C., asking about the possibility of his being given six months leave of absence to visit Japan, not having visited his native land since coming to Canada twenty-four years ago. It was agreed that Mr. Kabayama be given leave of absence, details regarding duration of leave, supply during absence, etc., to be referred to the Secretaries.

Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Finnish Work, Niagara Peninsula

Dr. Macdonald stated that Niagara Presbytery had asked about the possibility of having a student appointed to carry on work among the Finnish people in the Peninsula, as it was not feasible for Rev. G. Koponen to continue paying visits to this area. It was suggested, also, that this student might give some service to the Hydro Project at Niagara Falls, when Rev. Harold Watts leaves, and to the new Margaret Street congregation in Niagara Falls South.

It was agreed to refer to the Secretaries and Dr. S. B. Stokes the matter of working out a plan for use of a Finnish student as outlined above, or in any other plans, including the Finnish work at St. Catharines.

Ukrainian Work, Prairie Conferences

Dr. Dorey stated that while in Winnipeg recently he had conferred with Dr. Best, Dr. Hall and Mr. Elliott regarding our Ukrainian work in

Manitoba and Saskatchewan, with special reference to Canora, Sask., and Ethelbert, Man. Dr. Best had stated that it was his intention to secure, if at all possible, the services of an ordinand from the Manitoba Conference for the Ethelbert charge next June. The conclusion reached by the Conference held in Winnipeg was that it would be unwise to have two ministers at Canora—an English-speaking and a Ukrainian-speaking minister, and it was suggested that if Mr. Wienowski, now serving under the Presbyterian Church in Winnipeg, should apply for work to the United Church and if Dr. Best is satisfied as to his suitability, he might be appointed on an experimental basis to hold services in Ukrainian at stated intervals at various points in Saskatchewan and Manitoba, and that a house be rented for him, probably at Benito or Makaroff, at either of which places a former United Church manse might be available.

It was agreed that report be adopted in principle.

First United Church, Vancouver

On motion, it was resolved that this Executive urge the congregation at First Church, Vancouver, to submit between now and the meeting of the Board of Home Missions a name or names to be considered as a nomination to the superintendency of First Church.

The Board will forward to the congregation one or more names for its consideration. As the right to nominate rests with the Board of Home Missions, it is important that the name agreed upon be submitted to the Board's annual meeting for necessary action.

Re Lotteries and Gambling

The Secretary said he had a communication from Dr. J. R. Mutchmor, pointing out that gambling had grown to large proportions and that the Government of Canada had proposed the appointment of a Royal Commission to consider the sections in the Criminal Code which dealt with Lotteries and Gambling. Dr. Mutchmor also drew attention to the desire in certain quarters that Lotteries should be legalized.

After discussion, it was agreed:

- That the Executive of the Board of Home Missions convey to the Board of Evangelism and Social Service appreciation of the fight it is making against Gambling and Lotteries.
- That the Superintendents of Missions be requested to support wholeheartedly the efforts of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service in this matter.
- That the Secretary of the Board write to the Prime Minister, urging that no change be made in the legislation regarding Gambling and Lotteries.

Education Grant

It was agreed that no action be taken on the request of Rev. W. Glenesk, Magnetawan, Ontario, that he be given an education grant

towards the support of his younger brother who is at present in his first year at Victoria University.

Car Subsidy Fund

Cases in Arrears

It was reported that correspondence with certain ministers had failed to obtain satisfactory results. It was decided (a) that the following cases should be reported to the Presbyteries concerned: Rev. Douglas Pilkey, Rev. Edwin Keam and Rev. Chas. H. Forsyth; and (b) that Rev. Harold Penner be notified that his suggestion re payment of arrears is not acceptable, because it does not refund to the Car Subsidy Fund the amount he actually owes.

Special Cases

- (1) Rev. W. H. Bartlett—minister retired because of ill health; Agreed to cancel balance on books—\$225 grant portion and \$20 loan;
- (2) Rev. C. A. Warren: Agreed to confirm cancellation of \$34.00, balance of old loan.
- (3) Rev. H. L. Jones—minister is ill: Agreed to cancellation of balance on books—\$425 loan and \$34.87 interest.

Special Grants for 1953

The Secretary stated that there was available for special grants on 1953 account an amount of approximately \$72,000.

Re Travel Allowances

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

That by way of bonus the following amounts be added to the special allowances for travel on the fields as outlined on pages 84-85-86 of the 1953 Digest of Minutes, on the following basis:

- (1) To depreciation allowances in 3 (a)-\$25.00.
- (2) To the 15 cents per mile for Sunday travel—
 \$50 where the Sunday mileage is 10 to 35 miles, and
 \$75 where the Sunday mileage is 40 to 100 miles.
- (3) To those in 3 (c) and 3 (d)—\$50.00.

That this apply to all grants made for 1953 and to any applications which may come in for that year; and

That applications for grants for 1954 be on the basis adopted by the Board for 1953.

Salary Grants

On motion, it was agreed:

(1) That, in the light of reports from the pastoral charges, the Executive authorize additional payments so that the scale of salaries adopted by the Board in 1953 be reached; each case to be decided on its

merits; and that the adjustment of these items be left in the hands of the Chairman, the Secretaries and the Superintendent concerned.

- (2) That fields not now on the list be dealt with on the same basis as above when all the requirements of the Board have been met: namely, canvass, visitation, and Presbytery recommendation; that authority be given to the Secretaries to deal with all cases which will arise between now and the meeting of the Board; and that payments be made out of 1954 account after the closing of the Treasurer's books.
- (3) That the Treasurer be requested to transfer to Home Mission Reserves the balance from the Missionary and Maintenance appropriation remaining unexpended when the books of the Treasurer are closed; and that a report be presented to the annual meeting of the Board of the amounts paid on 1953 account, the Board to deal with the balance remaining.

Church Extension

It was resolved that Presbyteries be urged to do their utmost between now and the meeting of the Board to have repayments on advances from the Property Fund of the Board brought up to date.

Transfers to Property Fund

It was agreed to authorize the transfer of the following items from Maintenance account to the credit of the Property fund, for 1953:

Plumas—Agreed to confirm payment of \$60 towards cost of providing bathtub.

Macoun-Agreed to vote grant of \$170 towards cost of insulation of manse.

SOUTH ALBERTA

Bow Island—Agreed that request for loan of \$450 and grant of \$450 be referred to Secretaries, with power, after receipt of formal application, with full information.

Property

GRAND FALLS

Bonne Bay, Church—Agreed to provide up to \$150 towards cost of purchasing a Delco Lighting Plant that would serve both the church and the United Church school, provided the Newfoundland Department of Education pays a similar amount and that the balance is provided by the community, total cost being estimated at \$600 to \$700; this being subject to Presbytery action.

MIRAMICHI

Lower Neguac (Tabusintac Charge) Church—Agreed to refer to Secretaries, with power, reconsideration of action taken by the Executive at its meeting in October.

Murdochville, Church—Agreed to refer to the Secretaries, with power, the question of giving assurance regarding willingness to co-operate with the Church of England in the procuring of a site and building a church, to be owned jointly by both communions.

SYDNEY

Sydney, United Mission—The Woman's Missionary Society having rejected an offer by this Board to pay one-half the total cost of new chimney and roof repairs up to a maximum of \$1,000 on condition that the Society take over the property for the sum of \$1.00 and continue its present work, Presbytery has forwarded a request for payment of the total cost by this Board. It was agreed that if it is the opinion of the Presbytery that the work should be carried on and that there is no other way of realigning it, and if the W.M.S. will not reconsider its decision, the Board pay for the repairs up to a maximum of \$1,000 and charge the Society \$40.00 a month rent for the living quarters occupied by their worker and the caretaker.

MONTREAL

Montreal, Church of the Redeemer—Agreed to accept the proposition submitted by the Church Council of paying eight annual instalments of \$900 or a total of \$7,200 principal as payment of the \$7,500 still owing; and that if the congregation will pay this year's instalment when due on Dec. 31st, one year's interest will be waived; the matter of future interest to be reviewed and decided upon at the first meeting of the Executive in 1955.

Nelson House, Mission House—Agreed: (a) to authorize repairs at estimated cost of \$2,000, and (b) the purchase of paint, linoleum, slip covers and chemical closet.

Nelson House, Lighting Plant—Agreed to authorize the sending in of a small 12-volt electric lighting machine, with the necessary wiring.

Poplar River, Manse-Payment of \$17.65 for kitchen utensils was confirmed.

Sandy Lake. Cabin—Payment of \$18.50 for chairs, building paper and stove pipes was confirmed.

Wassagomach (Island Lake Charge) Church—Agreed to confirm payment of \$105.58 in addition to amount previously voted towards cost of new church.

SUPERIOR

Fort William, 330 North Syndicate Ave—Agreed to grant permission for sale of house at price of not less than \$7,500.

Fort William, Broadway, Manse—Agreed that if congregation proceeds with the building or purchase of manse, the matter of a grant and loan be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Port Arthur, Current River Church—Agreed to authorize advance up to \$5,000 to the Presbytery Church Extension Committee towards new church building; the amount to be repaid from funds raised in the Presbytery for Church Extension.

Canora, Ukrainian Manse—Agreed to authorize sale of house no longer required for use of the Ukrainian minister.

SASKATOON

Leroy, Church—Agreed, subject to approval of Presbytery, to accept \$1,000 in full payment of outstanding indebtedness, provided amount is received by April 30, 1954.

EDMONTON

PRINCE RUPERT

Central Mainland Marine, "Thomas Crosby IV"—Agreed to confirm payment of \$352.60 for washing off, copper painting, etc.

New Hazelton, Manse—Agreed to authorize payment for re-roofing of manse, at estimated cost of \$200.

VANCOUVER

Alert Bay, "R. C. Scott"—Agreed to confirm payment of the following amounts: repairs, painting, equipment, etc., \$943.70; furnishings, etc., \$130.60; charts, log books, \$33.34—making total of \$1,107.64.

Westview, Church—Agreed to defer payment on principal of loan to May 31st next.

DIGEST OF MINUTES THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS

April 6-8, 1954

The Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Tuesday, April 6th, 1954, at 10 a.m. The Chairman, Rev. W. M. Mustard, D.D., presided and conducted devotions.

On motion, Rev. Dr. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Roll Call

The following members were present: Revs. W. M. Mustard, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, John R. Leng, A. B. Irwin, A. A. Rogers, J. M. Boyd, J. M. Fraser, J. H. Hamilton, Geo. Telford, E. C. Armstrong, K. G. MacMiffan, D. W. More, R. N. Rowsell (alternate); Messrs. Arthur Webster, E. Russell Mattinson, J. L. Forsyth, Fred Mann, A. W. Zurbrigg, H. L. Fowler, D. J. Regrets: The Secretary reported that Rev. Isaac Davis, Newfoundland Conference representative, was unable to be present, and that Rev. N. W. Whitmore, Alberta Conference representative, was absent because of illness, but that the alternates, appointed by the respective Conferences, were present. Regrets were presented, also, from Mr. P. M. McCarrell, memberat-large.

Hours of Meeting and Adjournment

It was decided that, unless otherwise arranged, the Board should meet from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30; from 2 p.m. to 5.30 p.m., and from 7.30 to 10 p.m.

Ratification of Minutes

On motion, the Minutes of the meetings of the Executive, held June 26th and October 29th, 1953, and February 3rd, 1954, all of which had been previously circulated, were confirmed.

Resolutions Committee

It was agreed that a Resolutions Committee be appointed, consisting of Rev. A. A. Rogers, Mr. H. L. Fowler, and Rev. E. C. Armstrong.

Scale of Expenses of Members

It was decided to adopt the following scale of expenses for members of the Board:

(1) That members be paid the cost of railway and sleeper tickets to Toronto and return; the cost of meals en route—such cost not to exceed-\$6 per day; and the cost of hotel and meals in Toronto.

- (2) That those travelling by motor be paid on the basis of railway fare.
- (3) That the amount for Sunday supply shall not exceed \$20 per Sunday.

Presentation of Reports

Mimeographed Reports of Superintendents of Missions, Superintendents of Institutions and Hospitals were distributed to the members of the Board.

Address, Moderator

The Moderator was welcomed by the Chairman. Dr. Scott spoke briefly, giving his impressions of the work of the Church as he travelled across the country, referring especially to Church Extension and new areas. Dr. Mustard thanked Dr. Scott on behalf of the Board.

Statements by Superintendents

The Board heard statements by the Superintendents of Missions on the work in their respective areas.

Sunday School in the Home-By Mail and Air

Dr. M. C. Macdonald introduced Miss Gertrude Patmore, Supervisor of the Inter-Board Committee on the Sunday School in the Home. Miss Patmore made a brief statement regarding the work of this Department. The Chairman expressed the appreciation of the Board.

It was agreed that the appropriation for this work be \$3,500 for 1954.

Grants to Organizations

The following grants were voted:

- To the Division of Home Missions, National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.—\$450.
- (2) To the Bureau of Church Building-\$50.00.
- (3) To the John Milton Society for the Blind-\$50.00.

Bissell Bursary Fund

The Secretary reported that at the meeting of the Trustees of the Fund, held September 2nd, 1953, sixteen applications for bursaries had been considered and thirteen awarded—eleven of \$75 and two of \$50 each.

Secretariat of Board

It was reported for information that the Executive of the Board in February had requested that the Sub-Executive or Executive of General Council grant Dr. Dorey leave of absence from the 19th April and appoint Dr. M. C. Macdonald Acting Secretary of the Board, until the meeting of the General Council.

Representation on Executive of General Council

It was agreed to forward to the Nominating Committee the names of two persons—namely, Rev. Dr. W. M. Mustard and Mr. E. Russell Mattinson, one of whom would be chosen by the Committee as the Board's representative on the Executive of General Council.

Superintendencies of Missions

NORTHERN ONTARIO AND NORTH-WESTERN QUEBEC

A resolution was presented from the Algoma Presbytery, urging that the Superintendency of Northern Ontario and North-Western Quebec be manned by two Superintendents instead of one.

It was moved and carried, That the Algoma Presbytery be advised that this Board, while appreciating the motive which prompted the resolution which it has sent forward, feels that the time is not ripe for the division of this territory now covered by Dr. Lyttle, and that, as the Board has now its full quota of Superintendents as authorized by the General Council, any addition to the number would have to be approved by the General Council.

Satisfaction was expressed that Dr. J. A. Lyttle had made such a good recovery from his illness of last year.

NEWFOUNDLAND

Dr. Macdonald explained the basis on which the services of Dr. H. M. Dawe were divided between the Board of Home Missions and the Board of Christian Education.

On motion, it was agreed to request that, if at all possible, beginning July 1st, 1954, Dr. H. M. Dawe be relieved of his responsibilities under the Board of Christian Education and that he devote his full time to the work of the Superintendency of Home Missions in the Conference of Newfoundland.

Immigration Work

Rev. J. R. Leng presented a mimeographed statement on Immigration Work, including reports of the Board's Immigration Agent, the Chaplain at Montreal, and the Immigration Workers at Halifax and Toronto. The total

number of immigrants admitted to Canada in 1953 was 168,868, of whom 47,077 were British, 35,015 German, 24,293 Italian, 20,472 Dutch, 9,379 U.S.A., 3,176 Polish, 908 Ukrainian, and other nationalities 28,548.

HALIFAX

(1) A resolution was presented from the Halifax Immigration Committee, requesting the appointment "forthwith of a full-time Chaplain in addition to the present Port Worker."

After careful consideration, it was decided that a Chaplain should be appointed, but that, in view of the serious shortage of ministers, especially in the Maritime Conference, the appointment should not be on a full-time basis and that a suitable retired minister should be sought to undertake this work.

(2) Purchase of Typewriter: The Board noted with appreciation the offer of The Woman's Missionary Society to purchase a typewriter for the use of the Port Worker.

MONTREAL

(1) Re Salary of Chaplain: A resolution was presented from the Maritime Conference Home Mission Committee (of which Conference Dr. A. S. Murray is a member), asking that the Board reconsider the matter of Dr. Murray's salary.

It was pointed out that from the time of his appointment the Board has paid and made yearly advances in Dr. Murray's salary, in accordance with the agreement entered into with him at the time of his appointment. It was moved and carried, That Dr. Murray's salary be at the rate of \$3,200 for 1954, which is a further increase of \$100; that travel be increased to \$250; and that the rent allowance continued at \$840.

(2) W.M.S. Immigration Worker: It was agreed that The Woman's Missionary Society be asked to pay all the expenses of Miss Louiza Mayova incurred travelling between Montreal and Quebec in connection with her duties, of which expenses the Board of Home Missions has been paying one-half.

Tracts for Student Mission Fields

It was moved and carried, That the Committee on Special Services be asked to give consideration to the provision of small tracts which might be used by students on their summer mission fields.

Appointment of Student Missionaries

The Report of the Committee on the Appointment of Students, which was introduced and spoken to by Dr. Macdonald, was adopted as follows:

(1) During the summer of 1953, 205 students served the Board under its co-operative plan (ordinarily called the "Students' Pool") and 18 others were appointed—nine to institutional missions and nine to special work. A total of 223 served under the Board. (2) The Committee, to date, has appointed to fields this year 230 students.

They are distributed in the different Superintendencies as follows:

- (3) To date 254 students have made application for fields. Of these 202 are candidates for the ministry (Arts 120, Theology 82). Of the applicants 26 were young women and of these 14 received appointments; 50 are non-candidates.
- (4) The Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students was carried out in 1953. The policy of setting allocations to fields is meeting with a continued response and proving a more effective means of financing our student work. To illustrate the effectiveness of this policy the following table shows what has happened in field contributions:

The increased response enabled us to advance payments to our student missionaries to \$30 a week plus board and travel on the field. The more experienced students serving their 3rd, 4th and 5th terms were paid at the rate of \$31, \$32, and \$33 per week, respectively, plus board and travel on the field. An additional \$5 per Sunday was paid to those students who served over 18 Sundays.

It is recommended:

- That the Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of students should be continued for 1954.
- (2) That this year a very special effort should be made to advance the basic payment of students to a new level, for which an appropriation of \$90,000 is required—an increase of \$16,000. (This is in line with a policy of cooperation with the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools, which will advance the bursary payments for its students.)

The goal can only be reached by the fields making corresponding advances in their total givings of at least \$10,000. The Superintendents are, therefore, asked to examine carefully the ability of each field to make certain the maximum in contributions for maintenance is secured.

- (3) That the allocations for student fields be referred to the respective Presbyteries early in the year for consideration and confirmation, and to Conference Home Mission Committees for information.
- (4) That if suitable workers (in addition to those already assigned) can be secured and are needed in the new areas of the larger centres, authority be given to the Secretaries in co-operation with the Superintendent concerned to make appointments and that we request the Woman's Missionary Society to share in this responsibility on the same basis as last year.

- (5) That an appropriation of \$90,000 be voted for student mission work. In 1954.
- (6) That we recommend to Congregations and Young People's Unions the policy of adopting student missionaries as their representatives on the mission field.

Report of Hospital Committee

Dr. C. H. Best presented the Report of the Hospital Committee, which was adopted as follows:

George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake

Agreed that the Board make available \$8,000 for the purpose of liquidating outstanding accounts, on the basis of \$6,500 grant and \$1,500 loan, the loan to be reviewed by the Executive in June.

Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont

Judge Buchanan made a brief statement regarding the situation so far as this hospital is concerned and the difficulties confronting hospitals in general.

Resolved, That this Board place on record its appreciation of the services of Judge Buchanan as member and chairman of the Alberta Hospitals Board and of his active participation and interest in the work of the Church in general.

Replacement of X-Ray Equipment: See Property items.

Religious Worker: It was reported for information that the Alberta Hospitals Board had decided to appoint a young woman to carry on Christian education and recreational work among the patients and personnel of Archer Memorial Hospital.

Skidegate Inlet Hospital:

New building: Dr. Bunt reported on the negotiations which were being carried on with the Lumber Companies, the Provincial and Dominion Governments regarding the proposed new hospital.

Agreed that in the event of using the former Air Force building, the Board make available up to \$10,000, but if it is to be an entirely new building, that the Board make available up to \$20,000; and, further, that in the light of the information now available, the Board of Home Missions favours the providing of a new building, the cost of which we understand will be \$200,000 and urges decision and action at the earliest possible date.

Second Doctor: Agreed that the Board approve the appointment of a second doctor, and provide a house, which will be rented to the doctor on reasonable terms.

Administrator: Agreed that Dr. W. Donald Watt be appointed Administrator of the Hospital, from July 1st. 1954.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton

Administrator: Agreed to confirm the appointment as Administrator of Mr. N. H. Edwards, whose appointment by the Executive in October had been on a six months' trial basis.

Matron: Agreed that, as it is the opinion of this Board that the Matron should live in the nurses' residence, and in view of the fact that Mrs. Taft lives outside the Hospital, she be advised that her services are no longer required and that she be paid a month's salary in lieu of notice.

Residential Schools

(1) Dr. Dorey reported on the excellent progress being made in the work carried on in the residential schools operated by the Board in cooperation with the Dominion Government, and noted with satisfaction that, beginning September 1st, the salaries of the teachers in all the residential schools would be paid directly by the Government. He commented briefly on the work of each residential school and referred to the difficulties which had arisen at Brandon on account of differences between certain officials of the Department of Indian Affairs and the Principal.

It was moved and carried, That the Board express its satisfaction that the difficulties which had arisen in connection with the Brandon Residential School have been resolved and that a letter be sent to Major R. F. Davey, Acting Superintendent of Education in the Indian Affairs Branch, conveying the Board's appreciation of his fair solution of this problem.

(2) Norway House: Dr. Dorey reported regarding the completion of the fine, modern school, which would be ready for operation in September.

It was agreed:

- (a) That authority be given to advance funds on account of the per capita grant from the Government for the first half year of operation.
- (b) That Rev. K. C. McLeod be authorized to open an account for the School in the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Donald and Portage Branch, Winnipeg; and that the following resolution be adopted:

Be It Resolved: That the Rev. Kenneth C. McLeod, Principal, be and is hereby authorized for and in the name of the Norway House Indian Residential School, Norway House, Manitoba, to sign cheques upon the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Portage and Donald Branch, Winnipeg, on behalf of the said Norway House Indian Residential School:

Also, That the said Rev. Kenneth C. McLeod be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the said School to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said School account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said School, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also, from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said School and the said Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release.

- (c) That authority be given Mr. McLeod to purchase a sound movie projector and a caterpillar tractor—the same to be special Home Mission Projects for 1954.
- (d) That the expenses of Mr. McLeod, when recruiting staff and enlisting pupils from the Reserves, be paid.
- (3) Alberni Residential School: Agreed that the indebtedness of \$500 on account of advance made in 1949 be cancelled.

· Statement, Norway House Presbytery

Dr. Best gave a comprehensive statement regarding the Indian Mission work in the Norway House Presbytery, calling special attention to the many vacancies and the need for recruits.

Cross Lake, Education Grant

Agreed to approve a monthly grant of \$26 for ten months towards the education costs of the daughter of the missionary at Cross Lake.

Hostel, Winnipeg

Mrs. C. M. Loveys reported progress in negotiations regarding the establishment of a Hostel for Indians. She stated that it was felt that this should be done in cooperation with the Church of England and the Presbyterian Church and negotiations were being carried on with that in view. This was received for information.

Resolutions, Kenora-Rainy River Presbutery

Re resolutions of Presbytery:

- Calling attention to the critical need for ministerial leadership for the Indian people at Sandy Lake, Deer Lake, Pekangecum and Red Lake, and requesting that the Board of Home Missions give consideration to the immediate provision of a suitable layman or minister for the Red Lake area, with responsibility to visit Deer Lake when practical.
- Requesting that the Board "do all in its power to cooperate with the Government in providing schooling for the fifty odd children at Sandy Lake not now attending school, and the somewhat smaller number in similar straits at Red Lake."
- 3. "(a) That the Church's policy be to discover, enlist and train lay supply for the pastoral charges in Norway House Presbytery.
 - "(b) That an ordained minister be appointed to supervise the work in the Norway House Presbytery.
 - "(c) That suitable and adequate equipment be provided for the transportation of such a worker.
 - "(d) That Conference go on record as approving the appointment of a Committee and personnel which would be prepared to work with the Home Mission Superintendent in his task of soliciting the necessary teachers and lay supply to do the work with the Indians."

Agreed that the following resolutions be adopted:

- That while the Board is in agreement with the content of these resolutions, it would point out that the basic problem is still that of "supply."
- That the question of providing schooling for the fifty odd children at Sandy Lake not now attending school be referred to the Secretaries.
- 3. That the Board is of the opinion that the formation of a Committee, as recommended by the Presbytery and Conference Home Mission Committee, is desirable, and that Dr. Best, in consultation with Rev. K. G. MacMillan, Rev. K. C. McLeod, and Dr. J. C. Pincock, appoint same, and that the Committee study ways of implementing the recommendation.
- 4. That the Board is not in favour at the present time of the appointment of some person to supervise the work in the Norway House Presbytery but is prepared to care for the expenses which may be incurred by Dr. Best in visiting the Reserves, and, on Dr. Best's recommendation, for the expenses of any other worker who is asked to make visits to the Reserves by the Superintendent.

Graduated Salaries

Re recommendation of the Executive of the B.C. Conference that the salaries of missionaries to the Indians be put on a graduated scale, it was agreed to adopt the following:

That missionaries serving fields that are entirely Indian, or where in the opinion of the Board the major part of the work is Indian, receive salaries on the following basis: an increase of \$100 per year above the normal minimum after three years, and a like increase at the end of each succeeding two year period, until a maximum of \$500 above the minimum, then in effect, be reached.

Ahousat, B.C.

Re communication from W.M.S. Worker regarding proposed erection of a Roman Catholic day school at Ahousat.—Agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries for consultation with the Departmental officials at Ottawa.

Oriental Work

Appointments and Nominations

- (1) Calgary. Chinese: Agreed that, subject to the favorable acceptance of the proposal by the Chinese Church in Calgary, Rev. A. L. Day be nominated to the Alberta Conference Settlement Committee; and that there be consultation between the Secretaries, the Superintendent and Mr. Day to determine the basis upon which he will work.
- (2) Edmonton, Chinese: Agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent, with the suggestion that Rev. C. P. Leung be asked to continue for another year.
- (3) Vancouver, Chinese: Agreed that, at the request of the Conference Home Mission Committee, the Transfer Committee be approached with a view to having Mr. W. L. Burnham (who will be ordained at the forth-

coming Conference) left in the British Columbia Conference, and, provided that the Transfer Committee takes favorable action, that he be nominated to the Settlement Committee of the Conference for appointment as Associate Minister of the Chinese Church in Vancouver.

Toronto, Japanese

Agreed that the Board send its heartiest congratulations and sincere good wishes to Rev. K. Shimizu and the congregation on their attaining self-support.

British Columbia, Japanese Work

Dr. Dorey made a statement regarding the work being carried on by Rev. W. R. McWilliams and reported that the integration of the Japanese with the Anglo-Saxon congregations hoped for at the time Mr. McWilliams undertook this work had not yet taken place.

Marine Work

Re "The Messenger"

Agreed that the question of the continued use of a boat in the Greenspond area, served by "The Messenger," be referred to the Executive.

"Thomas Crosby IV"

Agreed that the pending vacancy in the Central Mainland Marine Mission be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent, with power to make a nomination to the British Columbia Settlement Committee.

"R. C. Scott," Alert Bay

Agreed to refer to the Executive decision re policy on provision of assistance for the missionary, Rev. Oliver Howard.

Housing Accommodation, Engineers

Re recommendation of the B.C. Marine Committee that this matter receive attention: Agreed that the Board continue its present policy, which does not include the providing of housing for engineers on our Mission boats.

Treasurer's Statement

Rev. Dr. V. T. Mooney addressed the Board and presented a mimeographed statement of finances for 1953.

On motion, it was resolved that the Board express appreciation of the services rendered by Dr. Mooney, Mr. H. L. Arnup and the Department of the Treasury.

Report of Committee on Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Dr. J. I. MacKay presented the Report of the Committee, which was adopted as follows:

Nominations and Appointments

 Agreed that the Rev. Alec G. Rice be nominated to the Settlement Committee of the Toronto Conference as Superintendent of Oak Church, Toronto. Agreed that, in the event of vacancies or changes at Sault Ste. Marie, All People's Church, and Edmonton, All People's Church, authority be given to the Secretaries and Superintendents concerned to make nominations.

Appointments, Women Workers under H.M.B.

Agreed to adopt the following:

- Saint John, Exmouth St. Area: That Miss Jean Whitman be continued as Woman Worker.
- 2. Montreal, Union Church: That this be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent for possible appointment of summer student.
- 3. Toronto, Oak Church: That Mrs. R. E. Smith be appointed as a second worker, to begin May 1st or earlier.
- 4. Hamilton, Extension and Institutional Work: That Mrs. Turner be employed to June 30th under present arrangement, and that thereafter the matter be studied by Secretaries and Superintendent, and Committee in Hamilton.
- 5. Toronto, Extension Work: That one worker from the Scholarship students be made available for extension and survey work; the Secretaries, Superintendent and Mrs. Loveys to find worker.
- 6. Cornwall and Ottawa: That a worker from the Training School or elsewhere be appointed for summer survey work; Secretaries and Superintendent to find the worker.
- Central Winnipeg, Second Worker: That Miss Carol Palmer be appointed to the end of September, and possibly for week-end work thereafter.
- 8. Edmonton, All People's: That Miss Margaret E. Lattman be appointed from June 1st, for the summer months, as successor to Miss E. Hickerson; consideration to be given to her continuance.
- Grande Prairie: That the Superintendent be asked to give further study to the situation, to consult with the incoming minister and Presbytery, and, if satisfactory, that Miss Collins be continued for another year.

2. Re request of Cochrane Presbytery for appointment of Deaconess by The Woman's Missionary Society for work in the Presbytery: Agreed that Miss Geraldine Dearing be appointed for the summer to the Matheson area at student rate, to be paid by The Woman's Missionary Society.

Ukrainian Work, Prairie Conferences

Agreed that the proposal to appoint Rev. Wasyz Winiawsky, on an experimental basis, be approved, and that the plan of work be left to the Secretaries and Superintendents concerned.

Calgary, Ebenezer, German

Agreed to approve in principle the recommendation of the Alberta Conference Home Mission Committee that an ordained, bi-lingual minister be appointed to Ebenezer Church, Calgary, who would also serve Hopefield in the Coronation Presbytery, and that we work towards the end of securing a bi-lingual minister.

Vancouver, First Church

Agreed to adopt the following resolutions:

- That it is the conviction of this Board that the difficulties confronting
 First United Church now would largely, if not altogether, be solved by
 the congregation's accepting the procedure of the Board of Home
 Missions in the administration of this institutional church, especially
 in the fulfilling of the recommendation regarding the appointment of
 an Advisory Board.
- 2. That the Board, therefore, not only urges the appointment at the earliest possible date of such an Advisory Board by the Presbytery, but also makes clear its position that the continuance of the grant is conditional on (a) that the Presbytery set up by June 15th an Advisory Board whose duties will be defined by the Presbytery; and (b) that First Church will continue to operate as in the past with its work directed to the service of the constituency which the Presbytery is asked to define, and that the work will continue along the lines laid down by the Presbytery in its study of First Church in 1951-52.
- 3. That the Board further recommends, in the interests of harmony, goodwill and understanding, and also for the future success of the work at First Church, that the following actions be taken under the guidance of Presbytery:
 - (a) That the constituency to be served by First Church be clearly defined.
 - (b) That the type of ministries to be performed by the staff be outlined.
 - (c) That the relationship of Welfare Industries to First Church be defined and that the conditions under which the name of the church can be used by Welfare Industries in the promotion of its enterprises be clarified.
 - (d) That on the Board of Welfare Industries there be included the ministers of First Church, the Superintendent of Missions, the Home Mission Convener and one other representative of Presbytery.
- 4. That the Board regrets that for reasons already stated it cannot accept the recommendation of the Joint Pastoral Relations Committee of the Presbytery and the Congregation that the Rev. Alfred R. Laing be nominated to the Settlement Committee as Superintendent, and requests

that further consultation re a nomination be had between the Pastoral Relations Committee and the Home Mission Committee of the Presbytery.

Work among Doukhobours

Re resolution of the B.C. Conference Home Mission Committee: "That we record our concern about the Doukhobour problem and recommend support for any program which, after careful consideration of the difficulties involved, gives promise of being helpful": Agreed that we approve this resolution and that if an opportunity arises to support any program, the Secretaries and Superintendent be empowered to act.

3. Agreed that the communication from the Editor of "New Life," a Hungarian language monthly, published by the Canadian Hungarian Reformed Church, be referred to the Executive.

French Work

Re Pointc-aux-Trembles French Institute: The Board had before it the following resolutions adopted by the Montreal Presbytery:

- "(1) That in view of the fact that the Home Missions Committee of our Presbytery is not able to bring to us a recommendation for the grant... we suggest to the Board of Home Missions that the Pointe-aux-Trembles work be discontinued for the coming year, and that possibly some of the money could be saved and put into a realistic approach; and a thorough study be made as to what can be done for the French work."
- "(2) That this Presbytery request a grant for Pointe-aux-Trembles at the rate of \$35,000 till the end of June, and a further grant after that date for necessary maintenance, caretaking, insurance."

Dr. Dorey made a statement, giving the background of the situation and the causes leading up to the difficulties with which the School is now faced. He also read a lengthy petition from former pupils and friends of the School. After considerable discussion, and on recommendation of a committee appointed to bring in a report, the following was adopted as the action of the Board:

The Board of Home Missions has given careful consideration to the resolution of the Montreal Presbytery and to the representations made by the former pupils and others. The Board would say that it has not wavered in the policy, re-affirmed last year, as to the purpose of Pointe-aux-Trembles, which resolution was conveyed to the Board of Pointe-aux-Trembles, as well as to the Presbytery. The policy, as laid down last year, was:

- (a) to provide for the education of French Protestant children who cannot obtain such education where they live; i.e., where the population is Roman Catholic and no Protestant School is available.
- (b) To provide education in French for Protestant children who might obtain an English education but for whom it is desirable that French education be assured. (Education is education whether it be in French or English, but it does not seem to be desirable to equate English with Protestant and French with Roman Catholic. We should be interested in maintaining a Protestant witness in French.)
- 1.—The Board does not admit that it has failed to appreciate the missionary value of Pointe-aux-Trembles. It would draw attention to the fact that during the years of the war it maintained the School in operation at a 'time when it might have rented the property for other purposes and derived revenue therefrom, with which it might have rehabilitated the property.
- 2.— The Board has taken note of the point made that in 1950 it recognized that the existing facilities were inadequate and, on the strong and urgent request of the Alumni and the Presbytery of Montreal, it expended some \$200,000 of its own funds on reconstruction, the total cost of which was \$240,900.

The Board would also draw attention to the fact that the attendance in 1949 was 176, whereas in 1952 it had dropped to 78, and, even in 1953, had not quite reached 100.

- 3.— The Board has considered with care the representations in the petitions of many former pupils and would say that by acceding to the recommendation of the Presbytery that the School be closed for one year, the Board does not propose the abandonment of the French Canadian work, but it does propose to consider whether the expenditure of something like 3 per cent of its appropriation from the Missionary and Maintenance Fund on a project to educate the number of pupils available or likely to be available is the best expenditure of money for the purpose.
- 4.—The Board has noted the representations of the former pupils, especially those which suggest that, failing a system of bi-lingual education undertaken by the Protestant panel, which French Protestants have been demanding for twenty years, the United Church should maintain a French Protestant bi-lingual school or even a system of bi-lingual education which would provide for the maintenance of the French language in our Churches

and serve to evangelize by education, but it would point out that to do what is suggested would involve an expenditure of money far beyond its resources. To provide the proper staff at Pointe-aux-Trembles to do the work suggested would require a minimum grant of \$50,000 a year on current account and a capital expenditure for renovation would probably amount to \$150,000 to \$200,000. Further, to assure that the project would be successful, the staff, including the principal, should be assured that this support would be available for at least five years.

The Board would further point out that no valid assurance is forthcoming from those in a position from their knowledge of the situation to give guidance in the matter that a reasonable number of pupils would be available from the rural parts of the Province and from the Island of Montreal (without enrolling, as in the last few years, a considerable proportion of problem cases) to warrant the continuation of the School.

5.— The Board would point out that in days of great prosperity it has not been found possible to collect from the parents a sum sufficient to pay the salaries on a very low scale. It is doubtful if even if higher salaries were paid and a different class of pupils recruited, the results would differ.

6.— The Board is fully aware of all the implications in the representations of the former pupils. It is fully in sympathy with the demand for education that shall be both French and Protestant, but it believes that the inauguration of such a system in the Island of Montreal by the United Church is far beyond its means and that the maintenance of Pointe-aux-Trembles, desirable as that is, does not touch the heart of the problem.

The Board, therefore:

- (1) Accepts the recommendation of Montreal Presbytery that the work at Pointe-aux-Trembles be discontinued at June 30th, 1954, for one year; and
- (2) Appoints a committee to cooperate with a similar committee from the Montreal Presbytery to study the French work, which committee will report progress to the Executive of the Board during the year and make final report to the Board in 1955.
- (3) Desiring to offer constructive proposals, makes the following suggestions:
 - (a) That negotiations with the Protestant School Board of Montreal be continued, with the hope that the Board may be able to make use of the facilities offered by the Pointe-aux-Tremble buildings; and that negotiations be initiated with any other body that might be able to make use of these facilities for the purpose of French education.
 - (b) Recognizing that the buildings cannot remain unoccupied indefinitely, is of the opinion that if, during the next twelve months, the joint committee of the Board and of the Presbytery cannot present a feasible plan for the use of the property, it should be sold.

- (4) Would lay down as policy that if the property should be sold the proceeds should be used for French work and offers, among others, the following suggestions:
 - (a) That provision be made for the erection of a building or otherwise to provide for a French Protestant Centre in a strategic position in the City of Montreal, preferably related to the Church of St. Jean.
 - (b) That provision be made to assist St. Jean to extend its facilities either in their present location or in a place with equal strategic advantages, and for the development of other projects requiring capital funds.
 - (c) That approaches be made to other communions looking for cooperation in French work.
 - (d) That for the next year Dr. Boucher act as custodian of the property, having associated with him a small committee which would be empowered to engage a suitable caretaker and that, during the year, Dr. Boucher be asked to assume responsibility for the production of literature, including the new Bulletin, and, in cooperation with the Methodist Church, a French edition of the "Upper Room."

It was agreed that the following be named as the committee to cooperate with a committee to be appointed by the Montreal Presbytery: Dr. M. C. Macdonald, Dr. J. I. MacKay, Rev. J. H. Hamilton, and Mr. Arthur Webster.

Salary, Rev. J. E. Boucher

It was agreed that the matter of Dr. Boucher's salary be referred to the Executive.

Board of Management

The resignation of the following members from the Board of Management of Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute was accepted with regret: Rev. G. R. Cragg, Rev. E. C. Woodley, Miss M. Murchison and Mr. W. R. Stenhouse.

Inter-Board Committee on Special Services

Mrs. J. L. Halpenny, Chairman of the Committee, made a statement regarding the function of and the services rendered by the Committee.

On motion, it was agreed to refer to the meeting of the Executive in June the question of naming an additional representative to this Committee.

Recommendations of Committee of Secretaries and Superintendents Re Lay Supplies

On recommendation of the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents, the following resolutions were adopted and it was directed that they be sent forward for consideration by the General Council or its Executive and any necessary action:

- 1. That whereas confusion exists in the provision of appointing and supervising Lay Preachers and Lay Supplies (Manual Sec. 117 (t) and (u), and also Sec. 1 (Definitions), the Executive of General Council or General Council be asked to clarify the apparent ambiguity, especially as to the clause "a Lay Preacher not employed as a full-time Lay Supply."
- 2. That, inasmuch as some Presbyteries have appointed Lay Supplies to self-supporting charges, without reference to the Home Mission Superintendent of the area or the Board of Home Missions, and difficulties have arisen, seriously affecting the work of the Church, the greatest care should be exercised in the appointment of all Lay Supplies, so that no appointment shall be made without consultation with the Superintendent and the Board of Home Missions; and that the Manual be amended in Sec. 117 (u) ii by the removal of the words—"in any case that involves an aid-receiving charge."
- 3. That, in view of the dissatisfaction with and difficulty in the application of regulation 117 (u) iii of the *Manual* and the hardship it works on many charges, the Board of Home Missions requests the General Council to change it to read:
 - "A licence to administer the Sacraments for one year at a time may be granted by the General Council or its Eexecutive on the recommendation of the Board of Home Missions or its Executive, to:
 - (a) Any lay supply for whom application is made by Presbytery for a licence to administer the Sacraments, who shall have completed five years of preaching and pastoral service, and who by reason of age and academic standing cannot take any course leading to ordination.
 - (b) Laymen who are serving as full-time Missionaries on Indian fields.
 - (c) Laymen who are serving in exceptionally remote parts of the Church where, because of the distance of travel involved, the services of an ordained minister are not available.

Before making a recommendation, the Board of Home Missions or its Executive shall secure the concurrence of the Presbytery or its Executive, within whose bounds the right is to be exercised."

- 4. That, further, in Sec. 310 of the Manual, there be added to the duty of the Superintendent a provision for the supervision of all Lay Supplies, and that Presbytery require that they shall report monthly or quarterly on a prescribed form to the Superintendent, the Home Mission Convener of the Presbytery and the Supervising Pastor.
- 5. That the Board of Home Missions recommends, also, that all Lay Supplies serving full time, and not working on a prescribed course leading to ordination, shall be required to pursue the Lay Preacher's course, as provided by the *Manual*, or some specifically outlined course of reading, during the first year of their appointment, and also in each subsequent year under the direction and to the satisfaction of Presbytery.

Definition Home Mission Field

That, whereas the term "Home Mission Field" is used in a number of sections in the Manual with differences of interpretation, the General Council be asked to amend the Manual so that there will be a uniform definition of the meaning of the term "Home Mission Field."

Church Extension

A resolution was presented from the National Committee on Church Extension, approving "in principle the appointment of a man trained in fund raising campaigns and recommending such action to the Board of Home Missions.."

The Chairman and Dr. Macdonald were asked to name a committee to consider this matter and report to the Executive of the Board, which will make a recommendation to the General Council. The following committee was named and accepted by the Board:

Mr. H. L. Fowler made a statement, calling attention to the present situation on the prairies, in particular, which has arisen because of the influx of people from the country to the cities, making the need for the building of churches and manses and the opening up of Sunday School work exceedingly urgent.

Bursaries, United Church Training School

After hearing a statement, the Board felt that the results obtained during the past three years in connection with the plan by which the Board of Home Missions and The Woman's Missionary Society had co-operated in granting bursaries for Scholarship Students at The United Church Training School, who were pledged to give a minimum of two years' service in Home Missions, were disappointing.

It was moved and agreed, That the granting of these Bursaries be discontinued.

Annuity Gifts

It was reported for information that the following annuity gifts had matured and had been transferred to Reserves:

Statement Re Vacancies

Dr. Dorey presented a list of vacancies, totalling 163 in all the Conferences—these consisting of charges from which men are retiring and from which men have moved during the year to some other field, all being ordained fields or new fields where an ordained man should be appointed.

Car Subsidy Fund

Dr. Dorey stated that there would be available a total of \$60,000 for car subsidies in 1954.

It was agreed that the Car Subsidy Fund be continued on the same basis as last year: namely, that subsidies be granted to Ordinands only.

Date of Board Meeting

It was agreed that the Executive be authorized to set the date of the meeting of the Board in 1955.

Report of Resolutions Committee

Rev. D. W. More presented the Report of the Resolutions Committee, which, on motion, was adopted as follows:

Retirement, Rev. George Dorey, D.D.

We wish to congratulate the Rev. Dr. George Dorey on his selection by the Executive of the General Council to be Acting Secretary of the General Council. At the same time, we wish most sincerely to express our appreciation of the long and valuable service he has rendered to the Board of Home Missions, first, in the capacity of Superintendent and then for many years as Associate Secretary and Secretary of the Board. We would point out that Dr. Dorey has served longer in this capacity than any predecessor. His wide experience, bilingual education, and ready sympathy have made possible an unequalled understanding of the whole work.

1. That we express our appreciation and acknowledge our debt to the following:

The Chairman for his firm, yet courteous and kindly, conduct of the business of the Board.

The Minute Secretary for his careful and accurate work.

The Secretaries for their unfailing command of required information, for their wide sympathy, for their administrative skill, and for their personal friendliness, and to the staff for their courteous helpfulness—all of which makes for the unique spirit of this Board.

The Superintendents for their detailed knowledge of both finances and personalities in their respective areas, for their spirit of co-operation, and for their devotion to the missions under their charge. We would particularly thank Dr. Best for his presentation of the work and needs of Indian Missions in Manitoba.

2. That we express our gratitude for the stimulating and gracious presence of representatives of The Woman's Missionary Society and The Dominion Council of The Woman's Association at our meetings and for their through-the-year helpfulness and co-operation.

Report of Appropriations Committee

The Report of the Appropriations Committee was presented by Dr. Dorey and was adopted as follows:

- 1. That on the basis of estimates of contributions from congregations, the scale of salaries for 1954 be as on Schedule 1 below.
- 2. That a special grant of \$100.00 be made to any married, ordained minister or lay supply, in receipt of salary for 1954 not above the Home Mission minimum, who has a child or children having to leave home to pursue any University course or to attend a Normal School; special cases to be dealt with on their merits.

Payment of the grant shall be made in two instalments—the first on receipt of a certificate of enrolment or attendance for the Fall term, from the Registrar of the institution; the second on receipt of similar certification that the student is enrolled and in attendance for the term following the New Year.

- 3. Special Allowance for Transportation on Fields:
- That in harmony with the intent of Sec. 104 (e) of the Manual-
- (a) Every ordained minister or lay supply, on an aid-receiving charge or one eligible for assistance from the Board of Home Missions, and serving 100 or more families, on two or more appointments, where the Sunday drive is not less than 10 miles and not more than 39 miles, shall receive a yearly car depreciation allowance of \$200.00. Where the Sunday drive is 40 miles or more, the depreciation allowance shall be \$225.00.
- (b) To the depreciation allowance in the above categories, will be added 15 cents per mile of Sunday travel. This not only cares for Sunday travel, but adds something for pastoral work.
- (c) An ordained minister in the active work, serving a 1-point charge with 150 or more families, and on which a minister (in the active work) would normally be settled, and which cannot be linked up by Presbytery with another appointment to make a larger charge, shall receive \$250 a year towards car maintenance and depreciation.
- (d) An ordained minister on a charge of two or more appointments with 100 or more families, where the Sunday drive is less than 10 miles, and where Presbytery re-arrangement is impossible, shall receive \$250 a year towards his car maintenance and depreciation.
- (e) In charges where the summer and winter travel vary, the travel allowance will be worked out on the basis of three quarters summer travel and one quarter winter travel.
- (f) Charges, large or small, with exceptional conditions as to travel and location, and where re-arrangement by Presbytery is impossible, shall be dealt with on their merits.

The travel allowance to be as on Schedule 2, below.

Retired Ministers: Where retired ministers are temporarily giving full-time service to pastoral charges normally served by married ordained ministers, the salary may be built up to the above scale. In other cases, the salary scale to be set for each field in the light of all the circumstances, but not to exceed \$2,200. Pension is to be included in these totals. It is expected that appointments of Retired Ministers will be made only to charges which have a manse or parsonage. The Board does not provide rent.

Students: \$16.00 for week-end supply.

Superintendents of Institutions: Maximum \$3,400; minimum \$2,700. Maximum travel \$250.

Women Workers: Maximum \$2,400; minimum \$2,000.
