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DIGEST OF MINUTES
THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS
June 20th, 1952

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Friday, June 20th, 1952, at 9.30 a.m. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Members present: Revs. W. M. Mustard, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, J. R. Leng, J. H. Hamilton, J. M. Boyd, George Telford, W. R. Auld, and Mr. George Copeland.

Revs. J. A. Lyttle, J. I. MacKay, J. C. Torrance and S. B. Stokes sat as corresponding members.

Regrets: Regrets for absence were received from Mr. C. M. Doxsey and Mr. R. S. Mills.

Rev. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

The Secretary reported that a communication had been received from the Newfoundland Conference, in appreciation of Dr. Macdonald's visit and the services he had rendered, and that similar communications had been received from the British Columbia and other Western Conferences regarding Mr. Leng's visit and the fine contribution he had made.

The Secretary also stated that communications had been received from the former Superintendents of Missions, in appreciation of Greetings sent them on behalf of the Board.

Sympathy

The Secretary referred to the recent passing of the following: Rev. J. Currie Thompson, Rev. Dr. J. W. Churchill, Rev. Dr. Gordon Pringle, Miss Dorothy Schaufler, formerly on the staff of All People's Mission, Winnipeg, Mr. Silas Loder, formerly lay supply in the Newfoundland Conference, and Rev. Harold Wilding. It was requested that letters of sympathy be sent to the families who have thus suffered bereavement.

Congratulations

(1) The Executive extended congratulations to the following on their election to the presidency of their respective Conferences: Rev. Dr. George Telford, Bay of Quinte; Rev. Dr. W. A. Hunnisett, Toronto; Rev. Robert Hall, Saskatchewan, and Rev. Dr. H. T. Jones, Maritime.

(2) Congratulations were also extended to the following, who have recently been honoured by the conferring of the degree of Doctor of Divinity: Rev. J. Lavell Smith, Rev. F. E. Runnalls, Rev. W. McN. Matthews, Rev. H. T. Jones, and Rev. E. V. Forbes.

Report of Action of Executive of General Council

It was reported for information that the Executive of the General Council had taken the following action on matters referred to it by Board:

(a) *Re Church Extension Campaign*: Adopted the recommendation of the Board that the Executive support the request to have "every possible Presbytery in The United Church of Canada assume a responsibility in the Campaign for Church Extension. . . ."

(b) *Re Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont*: Agreed — "That this Executive associate itself with the Alberta Conference in protesting to the Department of Health of the Province of Alberta in its refusal to meet the full cost of hospitalization of old-age-pension and maternity cases and to pay such per diem grants as will enable our hospitals to operate without a deficit."

(2) St. John's Hall, Quebec City: The resignation of Rev. Hugh MacPhail and Mrs. MacPhail was submitted, with the request that they be relieved of their duties at September 30th, if at all possible. Agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned, with power to issue.

(3) Special French Work: Re request of Montreal Presbytery that, in view of the fact that Miss Martineau's services will terminate at the end of June, the Board of Home Missions immediately take steps to secure the services of Mr. Louis Foisy-Foley; his appointment to begin September 1st, 1952. Agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent, with power, for further investigation.

Licences to Administer Sacraments

(1) At the request of the Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee, it was agreed to recommend to the Sub-Executive of General Council that permission to administer the Sacrament of Baptism be given

to all students and lay supplies, appointed to regular pastoral charges for the conference year 1952-53.

(2) It was agreed to recommend that in the case of each of the following licence to administer the Sacraments be renewed, for one year:

(4) Agreed to refer to the Secretaries and Superintendent for action, after further information obtained, the request of Superintendent of Missions and the Home Mission Convener that a licence be granted to Mr. Wellwood A. Adam, Elk Point, St. Paul Presbytery.

Community Churches

A request was presented from the Executive of General Council that the Board of Home Missions or its Executive set up a Commission to study the problem of Community Churches and report to a future meeting of the Executive of General Council.

Agreed to refer to the Secretaries, to give consideration to the personnel of the proposed Commission and present nominations to the next meeting of the Executive of the Board.

School for Lay Supplies

(1) Re recommendation of Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents that a grant up to \$200 be voted for the holding of a School for Lay Supplies in Newfoundland in 1952. No action.

(2) Re resolution of the Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee, adopted at its recent meeting: "That the Board of Home Missions (in conjunction with the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools if this is feasible) explore the possibility of a longer course being provided for men of this class serving in the Newfoundland area, where we may have to continue this kind of supply on some fields for some time yet. We suggest the Board might present a plan to the next General Council."

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions, having received a resolution from The Newfoundland Conference asking that provision be

made for a Course for Lay Supplies serving in the Newfoundland Conference—(at present 42 Pastoral Charges out of a total of 88 have this type of supply) requests the General Council to authorize the Board of Home Missions to arrange for such a course for 1953 and 1954 and that the financial provision for this be referred to the Board of Finance for inclusion in the Budget for 1953; and that in planning the course the Board of Home Missions seek the co-operation of the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

It was agreed to refer to the Secretaries, the Superintendent of Missions and the Home Mission Convener concerned the request of Essex Presbytery that the Board of Home Missions "survey the Italian work in Windsor with a view to establishing Christian work among these new arrivals."

French Work

It was agreed to accede to the request of Rev. Edmond Perret, Eglise Unie du Sauveur, Montreal, that he be permitted to accumulate holidays for three years so that he may visit his family in Switzerland in 1953.

Indian Work

Edmonton Indian Residential School

Dr. Dorey reported regarding the steps which were being taken to secure a new Principal and that Dr. Hart was in communication with a teacher who it was felt would be suitable for this position. It was agreed to refer to the Secretaries and the Superintendent for the area the nomination of a Principal to the Department of Indian Affairs.

Work at Morley, Alberta

Re recommendation of the Alberta Conference Home Mission Committee "that consideration be given to the possibility of separating the missionary from the educational work at Morley."—Referred to the Secretaries for conference with the Rev. G. R. Inglis and report.

Hospital Work

Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont

The Secretary reported that the financial statement for the first four months of 1952 showed that the finances of the Hospital were in better shape than the previous year. He also stated that no report had been received regarding any action which may have been taken by the Alberta Conference.

George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake

(a) It was agreed to confirm the following arrangement agreed upon by the Alberta Conference Hospitals Board re salary of Superintendent:

"The George McDougall Hospital to supply office space, office help, house, fuel, light and telephone, for Dr. A. L. Thomas, and in lieu of these services, Dr. Thomas to contribute each month to the George McDougall Hospital 25 per cent of the receipts for medical services."

(b) No report having been received re matter of allowance for car expenses (referred by the Board to the Executive), it was agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent for the area.

Vancouver-Westminster Metropolitan Council and Church Extension

It was agreed to refer to the Secretaries and the Chairman of the Board, the matter of the Church Extension Campaign in the Vancouver area, with power to make necessary adjustment in financial relationship.

Representation at Meeting, Division of Home Missions

It was agreed to refer to the Secretaries the question of representation at the Annual Meeting of the Division of Home Missions, National Council of Churches in the U.S.A.

Students and Student Mission Work

Re Student Aid

A resolution was presented from the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools, adopted at its recent meeting, recommending that that Board "propose to the Board of Finance that a small committee, composed of members of these two Boards, and of the Board of Home Missions, be set

up to explore the whole question of Student Aid, and to review the responsibility of the Church in this matter." It was requested that the Board of Home Missions name two representatives.

It was decided that Dr. M. C. Macdonald and Dr. J. I. MacKay be the representatives of the Board on this Committee.

Hospital and Medical Expenses

The Secretaries were authorized to take any necessary action in the matter of hospital and medical expenses incurred by Miss Mary McNally, student missionary on the Endiang field in the Drumheller Presbytery.

Hospital and Accident Insurance

The question of placing blanket insurance to cover student missionaries against sickness and accident while serving summer mission fields was discussed. It was recommended that the suggested plan of coverage be reported to the Board and it was also decided to recommend that an amount of \$1,000 be placed in a special fund, from which any claims of this nature might be paid.

Insurance of Equipment in Superintendents' Offices

The Secretaries were authorized to place insurance on the equipment and furniture owned by the Board in the offices of the Superintendents of Missions.

Transfer from Reserves

It was agreed to transfer from Home Mission Reserves to Current Account the sum of \$14,180.25 to cover amount expended in 1952 on 1951 account and charged to the 1952 account.

Date of Board Meeting

It was decided that the meeting of the Board of Home Missions in 1953 should be held on April 14, 15 and 16.

Car Subsidies

1. It was agreed that no car subsidies would be granted until the next meeting of the Executive, except those already applied for or in the case of 1952 Ordinands.

2. Special cases were considered and action taken as noted:

- (a) Rev. Frank P. Gilmore, Westminster-Central Church, Westmount: Agreed to give loan of \$200.
- (b) Rev. Gordon Hume, Michipicoten: No action was taken on request for subsidy.
- (c) Rev. R. G. R. Webber, Sherbrooke-East River, N.S.: Agreed to cancel the remaining \$125 of the loan portion of former subsidy and give a further loan of \$400.

- (d) Rev. P. B. Gaudine, Cap-aux-Os, N.B.: Agreed to give subsidy of \$500—\$125 grant and \$375 loan.
- (e) Mr. G. tenZijthoff, Plainfield, Ont.: Agreed to cancel \$75 of grant portion of subsidy, according to regulations.
- (f) Mr. Donald W. Hooker: Mr. Hooker did not seek ordination. The matter of repayment of the subsidy advanced was referred to the Secretaries, with power.
- (g) Rev. Roy Rodgers: Agreed that \$250 of the subsidy should be repaid, less \$79.46 already paid.
- (h) Rev. Adam Crisp: Agreed to cancel \$75 of conditional grant in 1952-53.
- (i) Rev. E. P. Johnston, Baldur, Man.: Agreed to give subsidy.
- (j) Rev. H. S. McDonald, Revelstoke, B.C.: No action was taken on request for loan of \$600.
- (k) Rev. D. J. S. Pritchard, Turner Valley: Agreed to cancel \$50 of conditional grant and to let balance stand until Mr. Pritchard's return from post-graduate study in a year's time.
- (l) Rev. A. B. Simpson, Westworth, Winnipeg. Agreed to cancel \$150 of subsidy and require repayment of \$250.

Property

BURIN

Garnish, Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$1,000 and loan of \$2,000 towards new church, to cost \$15,000.

GRAND FALLS

Bishop's Falls, Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$3,000 towards new church, to cost \$14,000.

TWILLINGATE

Nipper's Harbour. Boat—Agreed to vote grant of \$100 towards purchase of boat for use of missionary.

CUMBERLAND

Wentworth Centre, Church—Re request for grant of \$2,000 and loan of \$1,500 towards new church, to cost \$8,200. Referred to Secretaries, with power.

FREDERICTON

Minto, Rothwell Hall—Agreed to approve sale of Hall, as recommended by Presbytery.

Boiestown, Church—Agreed to refer to the next Executive the enquiry of the Minister as to possibility of securing loan from Church Extension funds for building project, including putting in of basement hall and new heating system, at estimated cost of \$4,000; definite information to be

secured in the meantime as to total cost and the financial responsibility which the charge will assume.

HALIFAX

Fairview, Church—Re request for grant of \$2,000 and loan of \$5,000 for extension work on the church: Agreed to defer action until Halifax Church Extension Campaign gets under way and it is indicated whether part of the funds raised will be earmarked for this project.

Port Wallis, Church—Re proposal to purchase school building or community hall, to be used for church purposes in this new area of Dartmouth: Agreed to advance \$4,000—\$2,000 grant and \$2,000 loan—to Halifax Presbytery, on the understanding that amount will be repaid from funds raised for Church Extension in the Presbytery.

Woodlawn, Manse—Agreed to vote grant of \$1,500 for new manse, to cost \$14,000.

INVERNESS-GUYSBORO:

Malagawatch, Student Cabin—Agreed to confirm payment of grant, of \$200 towards cost of cabin for student missionary.

PICTOU

Loch Katrine-Lochaber, Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$3,000 and grant of \$600 towards manse, to cost \$8,000.

SYDNEY

Ingonish, Student Cabin—Agreed to confirm payment of \$200 towards cost of cabin for student missionary.

Stellarton, Mission Building—Agreed to confirm payment of \$66 in excess of grants totalling \$3,000 voted by the Exécutive in June and October, 1951.

MONTREAL

Caughnawaga, Manse—Agreed to vote grant of \$232 to connect the manse with new water system installed by the Indian Affairs Branch of the Dominion Government; subject to approval of Montreal Presbytery.

Montreal, Eglise Unie au Sauveur—Agreed to vote grant of \$2,500 towards extensive repairs, estimated cost of which is \$4,000.

Montreal, St. Columba House—Agreed to confirm payment of \$275, covering account for repairs to roof.

Pointe-Aux-Trembles French Institute—An estimate covering repairs, renovation and equipment, was submitted, and it was agreed to authorize the following items:

Kitchen: Equipment and renovation.....	\$5,500.
Dining-room: Cement floor, electricity, plastering painting, etc.	\$5,000

It is hoped that the Alumnae will make some grant towards this.

Girls' Building: Repairs and renovation: It was agreed to defer this

until next year, as it was not so pressing and was not part of the one project.

St. Eustache-sur-le-Lac, Manse—Agreed to authorize payment of grant equalling 25 per cent. of cost of house, estimated at \$11,000; to be paid out of Church Extension funds.

Verdun, Bethanie, Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$393.63 for repairs to heating plant.

OTTAWA

Bristol, Manse—No action was taken on request for assistance in building manse, to replace house destroyed by fire.

QUEBEC-SHERBROOKE

Saint Martyr's, Chapel—Agreed to vote grant of \$2,200, for tearing down and rebuilding present structure.

Seven Islands, Manse—Agreed, subject to action of Presbytery, to vote up to \$11,000 to provide prefabricated house; the amount to be paid from Church Extension funds.

BELLEVILLE

Gilmour (St. Ola Charge), Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$500 and loan of \$500, towards church to cost \$5,000; loan to be repaid in two years..

KINGSTON

Arden, Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$3,000 and loan of \$3,000, towards church costing from \$35,000 to \$40,000; loan to be repayable over five year period and to be interest free until January 1st, 1954.

PETERBOROUGH

Peterborough, Grace-Stewart Hall, Manse—Agreed to vote \$11,000—\$8,500 loan and \$2,500 grant—for purchase of house costing \$11,000; amount to be paid from Church Extension funds.

RENFREW

Rolphton (Chalk River Charge), Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,000, in addition to grant of \$1,000 which was voted by the Board in April, on condition that the Church of England makes a similar grant.

COCHRANE

Matheson, Manse—Agreed to vote grant of \$250 and loan of \$1,500, towards cost of enlarging manse.

NORTH BAY

Callander, Knox Church—Agreed to renew grant of \$250 and loan of \$1,500, voted by Executive in 1951, for additions and alterations.

TORONTO CENTRE

Toronto, 131 Ivy Avenue—Agreed to vote grant of \$100 towards cost of installation of electric lighting and stove service and general repairs to wiring, etc., at cost of \$148; Japanese congregation to assume payment of balance.

Toronto, 175 Parkside Drive—It was agreed: (a) to confirm payment of \$20.50 for emergency repairs to Ruud water heater; and (b) to refer to Secretaries and Superintendent a list of seven items—repairs and redecorating.

Toronto, 306 Woodbine Avenue—Agreed: (a) to confirm payment of \$30 towards costs of papering and painting kitchen, bathroom, livingroom, and hall, and \$44.50 for repairs to drain; and (b) to vote \$21 for repairs to verandah.

BRANTFORD

Grand River, Church—Agreed to vote \$75, being amount required in excess of estimate of \$125 given last Fall and presented to the Executive for painting the exterior, when the matter was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

BRUCE

Cape Croker, Parsonage—Agreed to vote grant sufficient to cover cost of providing combination storm and screen doors.

Saugeen, Parsonage—Agreed to confirm payment of \$23.50 for repairs to pressure system pump.

GUELPH

Guelph, Brooklyn Mission—Agreed to pay taxes, amounting to \$15.64, and to vote grant for repairs to building up to maximum of \$300.

HAMILTON

Hamilton, Church of the Redeemer—Agreed to vote grant of \$150 and loan of \$150 towards repairs to basement and putting new roof on church, estimated cost of which is \$760.

Hamilton, Church of the Redeemer, Manse—Agreed to vote \$100 for painting and decorating five rooms, and up to \$25 for purchase of paint for exterior.

SUDBURY

Foleyet, Manse—It was reported that Presbytery had approved sale of this property for \$750 and that monthly payments of \$30 by purchaser would be directed to this Board until outstanding indebtedness of \$365.42 on old loan is paid off. Agreed to approve.

Spanish (Massey-Webbwood Charge) Zion Church—No action was taken on application for grant of \$500 and loan of \$1,500 towards church to cost \$5,000.

ALGOMA

Sault Ste. Marie, All Peoples' Church and Manse—It was agreed: (a) that the interest from the Skewes Fund, amounting to \$450, be used to instal oil heating and blower in the house, the congregation to assume balance of from \$150 to \$250; (b) that, if a new boiler is recommended after inspection by a certified inspector and the furnace is converted to oil in the church, the matter be referred to the Secretaries, with power; and (c) that the redecoration of the kitchen be referred to the Secretaries, with power, on receipt of estimate.

Sault Ste. Marie (Rankin Subdivision) Emmanuel Church—Agreed to advance up to \$5,500 for new church; amount to be repaid from funds raised in the Presbytery for Church Extension.

Sault Ste. Marie, Pine Park Subdivision—Agreed to sell Lot No. 32 to Mr. David Archibald, who will in return convey to us three Lots on the corner of Elizabeth and Shepherd Streets.

Wawa (Jamestown) (Michipicoten Charge), Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$500 and grant of \$500 towards cost of renovation of manse.

ELGIN

Homedale (St. Andrew's and Homedale Charge) Church—Agreed to advance \$3,000 towards cost of building first unit of church; amount to be refunded out of receipts for Church Extension: \$1,800 on or before Dec. 31, 1952, and \$1,200 on or before Dec. 31, 1953.

Belle River, Church—Re purchase of site and suggestion re grant of \$1,500 and loan of \$2,000 towards cost of building—Agreed that action re building be deferred to next Executive, but that Secretaries and Superintendent be authorized to approve purchase of site and advance funds for this purpose, if necessary.

Tecumseh (Riverside Charge) Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$2,500 towards extension of church, subject to Presbytery action.

LAMBTON

Bright's Grove (High Park and Bright's Grove Student Field) Lots—Agreed to advance purchase price (not to exceed \$2,500) of lots 49 and 46, Plan 291, Sarnia Township—the Extension Committee of Presbytery to sign an agreement to repay amount to Board.

Sarnia, Dunlop Church—Agreed to release Title to congregation, holding only Agreement to Repay and insurance as security for our loan, so that they may borrow \$3,000 from a loan company.

MIDDLESEX

Oncida, Parsonage—The Secretaries were authorized to have repairs made or instal any equipment that may be considered necessary.

London, Argyle-Bellwood, Manse—Agreed to vote grant of \$3,000 and loan of \$9,000 for purchase of house; loan to be interest free for one year, after which interest at rate of 3 per cent is to be paid by congregation, which is also to be responsible for payment of taxes from January 1, 1953, and for the insurance as it falls due.

OXFORD

Woodstock, Lots—Agreed to advance \$2,700 for purchase of six lots at corner of Blandford concession and Kensington Street—amount to be repaid by Woodstock Church Extension Committee.

DAUPHIN

Ethelbert, Manse—Agreed to confirm payment of \$39 for putting two windows in the manse.

Oxford House—Agreed to vote additional grant of \$700 to \$800, necessary to finish three rooms on the second floor of the new house.

Amaranth (Langruth Charge) Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$500 and loan of \$1,500; loan to be without interest to January 1, 1954.

ROCK LAKE

Deloraine, Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$3,000 towards new church, estimated cost of which is \$48,250.

WINNIPEG

The Chairman welcomed the new members of the Executive.

Communications

The following communications were received:

(1) From Rev. Dr. Gordon Pringle, in appreciation of letter of sympathy sent on behalf of the Executive.

(2) From Rev. E. V. Forbes, D.D., J. Lavell Smith, D.D., W. McN. Matthews, D.D., H. T. Jones, D.D., F. E. Runnalls, D.D., and W. A. Hunnisett, D.D., in acknowledgment of congratulations extended on behalf of the Executive.

Sympathy

The Secretary referred to the death in July of Mr. W. E. Huty, who had given many years of service as missionary to the Indians in Northern Manitoba, and also to two tragic accidents which had occurred in the Maritime Conference during the summer, as a result of which two children of Rev. W. Sach of New Germany received fatal injuries, and Mr. Herbert Pond, lay supply at Harcourt, his wife and child were fatally injured. In each case, sympathy had already been extended on behalf of the Board.

The Chairman expressed the sympathy of the members of the Executive to Rev. J. R. Leng, whose mother had passed away in July.

Report of Action of General Council

(1) Re Memorial from Winnipeg Presbytery asking that a study be made of the Church at work in the downtown areas of our larger cities. It was the opinion of the Council that the first step towards meeting the situation must be through a study by the Presbyteries concerned, and it requested that the Board of Home Missions make available questionnaires and results of previous enquiries and give counsel and guidance where necessary.

The Secretary stated that the Board was prepared to comply with the request of the General Council.

(2) Re Memorial from Alberta Conference, asking that a definite policy be formulated for the work of our Church among the Indian people. The Council recommended that the Board be asked to make a survey of the Indian work along the lines followed by Dr. G. A. Lindquist in preparation for his book, "Indians in Transition," and to make the results available for the next General Council.

The Secretary stated that he would undertake to carry out this recommendation.

(3) Re Memorial from Alberta Conference, asking that the Council survey Church hospitals and formulate a comprehensive Dominion-wide hospital policy for the Church. The Council recommended that the Executive of the Board, in consultation with the Sub-Executive of the General Council, appoint a Committee to prepare a digest of former studies to set out the present status of hospitals under the Board of Home Missions, including financial standing, such a digest to be put in the hands of the Policy Commission not later than September, 1953; the Policy Commission to formulate a policy for presentation to the next General Council.

The Secretaries were authorized to nominate to the Sub-Executive of General Council three or four persons to act on the above-mentioned committee.

(4) The General Council concurred in the request of the Dominion Woman's Association Council that the Board be permitted to nominate a representative to the Dominion Woman's Association.

It was agreed to nominate Dr. M. C. Macdonald as the Board's representative on the Dominion W.A.

(5) *Re Ministerial Salaries*: Action was taken by the General Council as follows:

- (a) That Section 104, sub-section (a) of the *Manual* be amended to read as follows: "For married ministers, \$2,700 per year with free adequately furnished manse or parsonage, as from January 1, 1953."
- (b) That Section 104, sub-section (e) of the *Manual* be amended to read as follows: "Where the Pastoral Charge necessitates the use of a car for carrying on pastoral duties, such Pastoral Charges shall in addition to salary pay the cost of car upkeep and travel with such cost hereby fixed at an amount not less than \$400."
- (c) That in conformity with Section 117 (a) i of the *Manual*: "The responsibility for the oversight of the Pastoral Charges within its bounds is primarily the duty of Presbytery. The Presbytery shall arrange for a visitation of all Pastoral Charges at least once every five years," the General Council instruct every Presbytery to make a visitation to every Pastoral Charge within its bounds not later than March 15, 1953.

Dr. Dorey reported that the following steps had already been taken to implement the action of the General Council: (1) A letter had gone

forward to the Secretary of each Presbytery; (2) Superintendents of Missions were being asked to co-operate in their respective areas; and (3) a Standing Committee on Ministerial Salaries was now being chosen.

Hospital Work

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton

1. It was reported that Miss Muriel Rowe had resigned as Matron of the Hospital.

2. It was agreed to authorize a change in the signing officers for transaction of business with the Royal Bank of Canada. Smithers, substituting the name of Mr. C. E. Saunders for that of Miss Muriel Rowe, and the following resolution was adopted:

Be It Resolved: That Mr. Paul E. Russell, Administrator, the Rev. H. I. Hare, and Mr. C. E. Saunders, Accountant, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of The Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton, B.C., to sign cheques upon The Royal Bank of Canada, Smithers, B.C., on behalf of the said Hospital, and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000) Dollars;

Also That the said Mr. Paul E. Russell, Rev. H. I. Hare, and Mr. C. E. Saunders, or any two of them, be and are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also, from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

And That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be and are hereby revoked.

Skidegate Inlet Hospital

The Secretary stated that Dr. Bunt had written to say that Dr. Watt was enquiring about the possibility: (a) of a change in the terms of his employment so that he might be on a fixed salary basis; and (b) of having a furnace installed in his residence.

It was agreed that item (a) be referred to the Secretaries, after consultation with Dr. Bunt, for report to a later meeting; and that (b) be referred to the Secretaries, with power, after receipt of recommendation from the Prince Rupert Presbytery.

Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Church of All Nations, Toronto

It was agreed to approve the use of the upper chapel on Sunday mornings by the Russian Orthodox congregation, at a rental of \$50 a month, plus \$5 for each extra service or meeting held.

Ukrainian and German Work

It was requested that our Ukrainian work in Toronto and district be reviewed, and also that consideration be given to the employment of a German language worker in Toronto and other nearby areas.

On motion, it was decided that the Chairman, the Secretaries and the Superintendent of Missions be asked to set up a Committee to study this matter and report to the February meeting of the Executive.

Niagara, All People's

The Secretary stated that the Rev. Ugo De Lucia could be given credit for approximately two and a half years on the Pension Fund if the employer's equivalent for the period August 1, 1950, to June 30, 1952, were paid.

It was agreed that the Board pay \$76 to cover the employer's equivalent for the period in question, provided that Mr. De Lucia pays his own allocation for the period.

Italian Work, Windsor

The request of Essex Presbytery that a survey be made of the Italian work in Windsor was referred by the June Executive to the Secretaries, the Superintendent of Missions and the Home Mission Convener.

Dr. S. B. Stokes made a progress report, stating that he had visited Windsor and found that there was a large field for work amongst Italians in that city. It was decided that the Presbytery should be asked to explore the matter further and that report be made to the February Executive.

Indian Work

Edmonton Indian Residential School

On motion, it was agreed that Mr. Findlay Barnes, the new Principal of the School, be given authority to transact business with the Imperial Bank, Edmonton, on behalf of the School, and the following resolution was adopted:

Be It Resolved: That Mr. Findlay Barnes, Principal, is hereby authorized for and in the name of the Edmonton Indian Residential School, Edmonton, Alberta, to sign cheques upon the Imperial Bank of Canada, Edmonton, Alberta, on behalf of the said School, and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000) Dollars;

Also That the said Mr. Findlay Barnes be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the said Edmonton Indian Residential School to deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said School account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said School, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or to deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also, from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said School and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

And That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be and are hereby revoked.

Duplicating Machine, Norway House

At the request of Rev. Kenneth McLeod, missionary at Norway House, the purchase of a duplicating machine was authorized, to be paid for from monies held for the Norway House Residential School and to become the property of the School when it is re-opened.

Retiring Allowances

The Secretary reported on the matter of retiring allowances for the following persons, which he had investigated at the instruction of the Board or the Executive:

(1) *Mr. Rodmond Lobb*, who retired as Engineer at the Edmonton Residential School at June 30th, 1951, after 19 years' service. It was agreed that an allowance of \$15 a month be paid to Mr. Lobb until he reaches the age of seventy; payment to be retroactive to January 1st, 1952.

(2) *Mr. A. E. Caldwell*, Principal of the Alberni Residential School. It was agreed to endorse in principle the making of provision for a retiring allowance for Mr. Caldwell, and the Secretaries were given authority to work out the details in consultation with the Treasurer.

Commission on Community Churches

It was reported that the Secretaries were not yet in a position to make nominations for the personnel of the Commission on Community Churches, as requested by the June Executive. It was agreed to refer the matter to the Chairman and Secretaries for report to the February meeting of the Executive.

Student Missionary Work

Dr. Macdonald reported on the unusually large number of student missionaries who had met with accidents or suffered illness during their period of service on summer mission fields. A total of nine cases has been reported to date.

Authority was given to the Secretaries to secure the necessary information regarding medical, surgical and hospital expenses and to contribute as generously as the funds for such special cases of need permit to all students meriting aid.

Re Sickness and Accident Insurance: The Secretaries were asked to explore the possibility of insuring students with the Ministers' Casualty Union.

Hymn Sheets

It was agreed to authorize the reprinting of the Hymn Sheet with Scripture Readings and Prayers, for use on student mission fields, in new suburban and extension areas, etc.

Transfer from Reserves

On motion, it was agreed to authorize the transfer of \$26,709.07 from Reserves to Current account, to cover amounts expended in 1952 after the closing of the Treasurer's books and properly chargeable to 1951 account.

Basis for Advances on Grants for 1953

It was directed that advances on grants for the first quarter of 1953 should be made at the rate obtaining in 1952.

Basis for Applications for Grants by Presbyteries

It was agreed that Presbyteries be asked to make applications for grants for 1953 on the new salary basis of \$2,700, as set by the General Council, and that the travel grants requested be on the basis of the scale obtaining for 1952; it being understood that if the appropriation from the M. & M. Fund permits, these will be advanced in accordance with the recommendation of the General Council.

Ajax United Church

Rev. J. R. Leng stated that in 1949, when Ajax was operating as a community church, there had been used for local church purposes an amount of \$167.30, which had been raised for Missions and which should have been divided between the Anglican, Baptist, Presbyterian and United Churches in proportion to the financial interest of each communion in the enterprise. He asked that, as the United Church had taken over the Ajax Church in 1950, authority be given for the payment to the Anglican, Baptist and Presbyterian Churches of the proportion of the \$167.30 due to each, the understanding being that the amount will be repaid later by the Ajax congregation.

On motion, it was agreed that payment be authorized, as requested.

Late Arrival of Requests

The difficulty created by the late arrival of requests for grants, etc., to be considered by the Executive was discussed, and it was directed that the Superintendents of Missions be notified that in future only requests which reach the office one week before the date of the meeting of the Executive can be considered; that requests arriving later will have to wait until a subsequent meeting of the Executive or of the Board.

Property

BONAVISTA

Newtown, Church and Manse—Agreed to vote grant of \$150 towards purchase of lighting plant to serve both church and manse; subject to approval of Presbytery.

GRAND FALLS

Cow Head (Bonne Bay Charge) Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$300 towards cost of building church.

ST. JOHN'S

Brigus, Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,500 towards cost of new manse; loan to be repaid in five equal annual instalments.

TWELLINGATE

Fredrickton (Carmanville Charge) Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$500 towards cost of new church.

St. Anthony, "Chalmers" Mission Boat—Agreed to confirm payment of \$689.77 from Board's Marine Insurance Fund for repairs, and to authorize further payment of \$265.28 to cover cost of auto extinguishers, parts, labour, winter care, etc.

FREDERICTON

Bloomfield Ridge, Church Hall—Agreed to refer to Secretaries, to secure information on the request for grant of \$500 towards paying off Bank loan, amounting to \$1,969.95, on church hall erected in 1950, and to report to the meeting of the Executive in February for any necessary action.

INVERNESS-GUYSBORO

West Bay, Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$400 towards cost of converting hall into a church.

MONCTON

Havelock (Petitcodiac Charge) Church—Re request for loan of \$1,000 and grant of \$1,000 towards cost of restoring and repairing old church building: Agreed to refer to Secretaries, with power, after securing of fuller information re the nature of the work to be done, estimated cost of restoration, portion of cost to be undertaken by the charge, and the measure of growth of the community.

It was further suggested that an approach be made to the Cement Company re a possible contribution towards the cost of restoration.

Mountain View (Moncton Suburban) Church—Agreed to advance \$1,000 for installation of ceiling and insulation of main auditorium; the amount to be repaid from funds raised by the Presbytery for Church Extension.

Petitcodiac, Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,000 towards new church building.

PICTOU

Green Hill-Alma (Salt Spring—Green Hill—Alma Charge), Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$600 and loan of \$400 towards cost of converting hall into a church.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Alberton, Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$2,000 towards cost of new manse.

SYDNEY

Ingonish North, Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$500 and loan of \$500 towards cost of new church.

Sydney, United Mission—It was reported that account for \$2,715.41 had been received from Contractor for repairs, towards which the Board in April had granted \$2,595, in the hope that The Woman's Missionary Society might share in the cost. It was agreed to vote an additional \$120.41 and to request The Woman's Missionary to pay one-half of the total cost of repairs or to pay rental of \$40 per month for the living quarters in the building, now used by the caretaker.

TRURO

Lower Five, Island (Economy Charge) Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$200, without interest, towards cost of moving church building to a central site.

MONTREAL

Montreal, Church of the Redeemer, Manse—It was reported that this house, containing three apartments, in one of which the minister lives, had been offered for sale and enquiry was made as to whether the Board would be interested in buying it. It was agreed to refer to Secretaries, with power to take action, if this should become necessary.

Montreal, St. Columba House—The matter of repairs was referred to the Secretaries, with power, after receipt of further information.

Pointe-Aux-Trembles French Institute—Agreed to confirm action of Secretaries in authorizing that necessary work be done in connection with drainage under the diningroom, at estimated cost of \$2,167.

Verdun, Bethanie Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$2,500 towards cost of urgent repairs.

OTTAWA

Bristol, Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,500 towards cost of rebuilding house, recently destroyed by fire.

QUEBEC-SHERBROOKE

Seven Islands, Church—Agreed to vote grant of \$2,000 and loan of \$2,000 for church building, if it is to be owned entirely by the United Church, or grant of \$1,500 and loan of \$1,500, if building is to be owned jointly by the United Church and The Church of England, provided a like amount is voted by The Church of England on the same basis.

KINGSTON

Plevna (Ompah—Plevna—Canonto Charge) Manse—It was stated that the Superintendent of Missions had again raised the question of the deplor-

able condition of this house, in which the W.M.S. missionary lives, and the urgent need for making repairs and putting it into more habitable condition. It was agreed that no action be taken with regard to the matter of repairs, but that the Secretaries be asked to consult with The Woman's Missionary Society regarding this, and also to explore the possibility of securing a man to supply this field.

Tichborne (Parham Charge) Erskine Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$600; to bear interest from date of receipt of money, and first instalment on loan to be repayable in 1953.

OSIIAWA

Ajax, Church—No action was taken on request for loan of \$2,500, so that the services of the Wells Organizations should be engaged to promote a campaign to raise funds for the building of a new church.

DUFFERIN AND PEEL

Malton, Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$3,000 from Property Fund towards cost of new church, and also to advance \$4,000, with the understanding that this amount will be repaid from funds raised in the Presbytery for Church Extension.

MUSKOKA

Gibson Reserve, Parsonage Equipment—Agreed to authorize sale of washing-machine, sewing-machine and refrigerator to the Indian Affairs Branch, for the sum of \$150.

Severn Bridge, Manse—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,500 and grant of \$350 towards cost of building manse.

TEMISKAMING

Larder Lake, Manse—Agreed to confirm action of Secretaries in advancing loan of \$2,000 for purchase of house.

TORONTO CENTRE

Georgina Island, Mission House—Agreed to authorize renting of old mission house to the Indian who is constable for the Reserve and caretaker of the public buildings.

Toronto, 131 Ivy Avenue—It was stated that the garage which Rev. K. Shimizu had been renting was no longer available and that he had enquired as to the possibility of securing a larger house, with garage, nearer to the church. It was decided that Mr. Shimizu should be asked to continue the search for another garage; and that, in the meantime, the Secretaries and Superintendent of Missions look into the whole matter, and, if necessary, make a further report to the meeting of the Executive in February.

TORONTO EAST

Scarboro. St. Paul's Church—It was reported that when principal was repaid in full in December, 1950, there was outstanding interest of

\$2,794.83, towards which the congregation was to make a token payment and on which \$25 has been paid. The Executive suggested that the token payment should amount to at least \$300 and be paid over a three or four year period.

Wanstead, Manse—It was agreed: (a) to confirm payment of \$250 for new furnace; and (b) to instruct the Secretaries and Superintendent to secure an evaluation of the property, set a sale price, and approach the congregation with a view to their purchasing it.

BRUCE

Cape Croker, Mission House—Agreed (a) to confirm payment of \$140.96 for repairs to shed; and (b) to vote grant of \$125 for purchase and laying of linoleum on living-room floor.

HAMILTON

Hamilton, 26 Park Row Ave. S.—Agreed to vote \$26.94 for cost of materials for painting outside front of house and kitchen, and \$8 for removing obstruction from sewer; subject to Presbytery action.

Hamilton, 97 Steven Street—Agreed to vote \$14.95 for materials to paint outside of house.

NIAGARA

Grantham, Church—Niagara Falls, New Housing Area—It was agreed to advance up to \$20,000 to the Niagara Presbytery Church Extension Committee, towards building church at Grantham, and for purpose of securing site and erecting temporary building in new housing area at Niagara Falls; the amount to be repaid from funds raised in the Presbytery for Church Extension.

ALGOMA

Goulais River, Manse—No action was taken on request for loan of \$500 and grant of \$500 towards house costing \$3,000.

ELGIN

Homedale—Agreed to advance an additional \$2,000 to the Presbytery Extension Committee for a new church; this amount, plus a previous \$3,000 advance to be repaid from funds raised by the Presbytery Extension Committee.

KENT

Fairfield, Mission House—Agreed to vote grant of \$200 towards repairs to the old mission house at New Fairfield.

Wallaceburg, Warwick Subdivision, Site—The question of the purchase of a site for a church in this new subdivision was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Church Extension Work, Chatham—Dr. Stokes was asked to investigate Church Extension Work in this area.

LAMBTON

Bright's Grove, Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$6,500 to congregation from Property Fund and to make advance of \$6,500 to the Lambton Presbytery Church Extension Committee, towards cost of building first unit of church; the latter amount to be repaid from funds raised by the Presbytery for Church Extension.

St. Clair Reserve, Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$1,000, repayable in five years, without interest, towards outstanding accounts in connection with completion of church building.

St. Clair-Walpole, Manse—Agreed (a) to authorize installation of lighting rods, for which an estimate has not yet been obtained; and (b) to vote \$22, being amount necessary in excess of that allowed by insurance adjuster to put kitchen in shape, house having been struck by lightning.

Sarnia, High Park Area, Church Site—Agreed to advance \$3,339.60 towards cost of purchase of property on Brenchley St., the amount to be repaid from funds raised in the Presbytery for Church Extension.

MIDDLESEX

Caradoc Reserve, Mission House—Agreed to vote \$727.52, being estimated cost of installing plumbing in mission house.

CARMAN

Hilton (Belmont Charge) Church—No action was taken on application for loan of \$3,000 towards cost of new church.

Indian Springs, Mission House—Agreed to confirm payment of \$35.84 for labour and material re wiring garage and barn for electricity.

HUDSON BAY

Lynn Lake, Church—It was reported that the congregation wish to begin work on a permanent structure by putting in a basement that would serve for a few years until the superstructure is built. No definite request for assistance was received and it was decided to refer the matter to the Secretaries and Superintendent of Missions, with power.

Saskatoon, Balmoral Church (North Park)—Agreed to vote loan of \$4,000 to the congregation, to be repaid at the rate of \$400 for the first three years, first payment Dec. 31st, 1953; terms of repayment to be then reviewed; and to advance \$4,000 to the Church Extension Committee, to be repaid from funds raised by the Presbytery Extension Committee.

SWIFT CURRENT

The Interim-Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Thursday, February 5th, 1953, at 9.30 a.m. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

On motion, the Superintendents of Missions who were present—Revs. J. I. MacKay, J. A. Lyttle, J. C. Torrance and S. B. Stokes—were made corresponding members.

Rev. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Confirmation of Minutes

On motion, the Minutes of the meetings of the Executive, held June 20th and October 28th, 1952, having been circulated, were confirmed.

Resolutions of Sympathy

Rural Work

Project for 1953

Dr. Macdonald suggested that the project to be undertaken by the Board's Committee on Rural Work in 1953 should be a joint effort with the Board of Evangelism and Social Service to promote evangelism in rural areas.

It was agreed that this proposal be approved in principle and that it be a recommendation to the Committee that special emphasis be laid on follow-up-work in the various areas covered.

Summer School, O.A.C., Guelph

Dr. Macdonald stated that it was very desirable that the United Church should have as large a representation as possible at the School conducted each summer at the O.A.C., Guelph, by the Department of Agriculture of the Province of Ontario.

It was decided to request that a representative of the United Church be given a place on the Planning Committee and that the Rev. J. M. Boyd be named as our representative.

Scholarships, Garrett Biblical Institute

It was agreed:

(a) To accept the offer of the Garrett Biblical Institute to provide Scholarships for four ministers to attend the Interdenominational Rural School, to be held at Evanston, Illinois, June 22nd to July 24th.

(b) To suggest that the Scholarships be offered to two ministers in Ontario, one in Saskatchewan, and one in Alberta: namely, Rev. A. E.

Larke and Rev. A. F. Gardner—Ontario; Rev. A. D. Stade—Saskatchewan; Rev. H. P. Marston—Alberta. The names of alternates were suggested in case any of the above-named should be unable to accept the Scholarship.

Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Ukrainian Work, Toronto and District

It was decided that the Secretaries, the Chairman of the Board, Rev. J. C. Torrance and Dr. J. Lavell Smith be a committee to study this work and present a recommendation as to its future to the Board at its meeting in April.

German Work, Toronto and District

It was decided, further, that the above-named Committee be asked to study the possibilities of beginning work amongst the German people in the Toronto area and to present a recommendation to the Board.

Italian Work, Windsor

Dr. Stokes reported that arrangements for a survey were being made, following which a report would be made to the Board.

Italian Work, Montreal

Dr. Macdonald reported that, following the death of Rev. D. R. Gualtieri, arrangements had been made for the supply of the work: Rev. M. Di Stasi going from Toronto once a month, Rev. Pietro Moncada from Hamilton, once a month, and the other services being arranged for locally. It was hoped that a minister speaking the Italian language might be secured for this work not later than July 1st, next.

Pointe-àux-Trembles French Institute

Nominations from the Special Committee of the Montreal Presbytery for the Board of Management of the Pointe-àux-Trembles French Institute were submitted and ratified as follows, with the recommendation that there be added two representatives of The Woman's Missionary Society and that the Montreal Presbyterial be asked to submit two nominations to the Montreal Presbytery, to be transmitted to the Board of Home Missions:

Ex-Officio: The Principal of the School, one of the Secretaries of the Board of Home Missions, to be designated by the Board, the Chairman of the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery, the Superintendent of Missions; and Mr. H. Vallieres, Mr. Louis Perron, Mrs. A. McK. Porritt, Rev. E. C. Woodley, Mr. W. Stenhouse, Rev. J. Beaudon, Rev. H. Joliat, Rev. Chas. Pelletier, Rev. G. Campbell Wadsworth, Rev. Gerald R. Cragg, Mr. F. Stephens, Miss M. Murchison, Mr. Charles Holmes, Mr. Edgar Caron, Judge Arthur Smith.

Indian Work

Morley, Alberta

Dr. Dorey stated that it was the opinion of the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery that the work of Missionary on the Reserve and

Principal of the Residential School, hitherto carried on by one man, should be divided; that a missionary should be appointed to carry on the work on the Reserve and that the Principal of the Residential School should have responsibility for that work only.

He stated, further, that the house now occupied by the Principal of the School belongs to this Board and that it would be necessary for the Dominion Government to provide a house for the Principal.

On motion, it was agreed:

- (1) To concur in the recommendation of the Presbytery Home Mission Committee that the work at Morley, Alberta, be divided.
- (2) To request the Indian Affairs Branch of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration to make immediate provision for the erection of a house for the Principal; and, also, to make whatever provision may be necessary for the accommodation of all the children on the Reserve in the School.

Alberni Residential School

It was agreed that the request of Mr. A. E. Caldwell, Principal of the Alberni Residential School, that he be given two months' leave of absence to visit the Old Country this spring be granted, with the understanding that the Department of Indian Affairs grants permission, also.

Bursaries, United Church Training School

It was agreed to continue the plan, adopted two years ago, in cooperation with The Woman's Missionary Society, of accepting responsibility for a maximum of four Bursaries of \$350 each, plus travel to the School, to be given to young women to take one year's tuition at The United Church Training School, on condition that they will promise to give two full years of service in Home Mission work.

Request for Worker Under W.M.S.

A resolution was presented from the Edmonton Presbytery, renewing its request of a year ago, that The Woman's Missionary Society be asked to appoint two Women Workers to do visitation and survey work in the city of Edmonton, under the direction of the Presbytery. It was agreed that this request be passed on to The Woman's Missionary Society, but, at the same time, the Executive expressed the opinion that, in view of the shortage of trained Women Workers, the appointment of one Worker to the city of Edmonton would be a fair allotment.

Hospital Work

Committee to Survey Church Hospitals

As requested by the Sub-Executive of General Council, it was agreed that the following committee be appointed to prepare a submission re Dominion-wide policy for Church Hospitals, in accordance with instruction of the General Council and report to the Annual Meeting of the Board, for submission, later, to the Policy Commission: the Chairman, the Secretaries, Rev. E. C. Armstrong, Mr. P. M. McCarrell.

Alberta Conference Hospitals Board

On recommendation of the Hospitals Board, it was agreed to approve the appointment of the Presidents of the Archer Memorial Hospital and George McDougall Hospital Women's Auxiliaries as members of the Board.

Archer Memorial Hospital

At the request of the Alberta Hospitals Board, it was agreed that the name of Mr. N. F. Mutter, newly appointed Business Administrator, be added to those of the officers authorized to transact business with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, and the Treasury Branch, Andrew, Alberta, and to implement this, the following resolutions were adopted:

(1) Be It Resolved: That Judge Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. N. F. Mutter, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of the Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont, Alberta, to sign cheques upon the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, Alberta, on behalf of the said Hospital, and from time to time to borrow money from the said Bank, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00);

Also That the said Judge Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. N. F. Mutter, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, be and are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to negotiate with, deposit with, or transfer to the said Bank (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital, provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Bank;

Also That the said Judge Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. N. F. Mutter, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, are hereby authorized to open a payroll account for the said Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont, with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Lamont, Alberta; monies to be deposited to the credit of the said payroll account only by means of transfers from the main or regular account of the said Hospital at the Lamont Branch of the Bank; and the said Bank is hereby authorized to accept the signatures of Judge Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. N. F. Mutter, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, on cheques drawn upon such payroll account;

Also, the said Judge Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. N. F. Mutter, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, from time to time, to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Hospital and the Bank and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the Bank's form of settlement of balances and release;

And That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be hereby revoked.

(2) Be It Resolved: That Judge Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. N. F. Mutter, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, are hereby authorized for and in the name of the Archer Memorial Hospital, Lamont, Alberta, to sign cheques upon The Treasury Branch, Andrew, Alberta, on behalf of the said Archer Memorial Hospital;

Also That the said Judge Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. N. F. Mutter, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, be and are hereby authorized on behalf of the said Hospital to negotiate with, deposit with, or transfer to the said Treasury Branch (but for credit of the said Hospital account only) all or any Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, cheques, or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said Hospital provided that nothing in this authority shall be interpreted to entitle the drawer or signer of such Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes and negotiable paper to discount the same or deposit the same otherwise than for collection purposes with the said Treasury Branch;

Also the said Judge Nelles V. Buchanan, Dr. Morley A. R. Young, Mr. N. F. Mutter, Mr. Michael T. Nemirsky and Mr. John P. Matwichuk, or any two of them, from time to time, to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books of account between the said Archer Memorial Hospital and the said Treasury Branch and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers and to sign the form of settlement of balances and release of the said Treasury Branch;

And That all other powers heretofore given in this matter be hereby revoked.

Church Extension

Dr. Macdonald made a brief statement regarding the progress of the Church Extension Campaigns across the Dominion. He stated that, to date, a total of \$1,150,000 had been received in cash; that approximately 70 Presbyteries had accepted allocations and were carrying on campaigns.

Car Subsidies

1. It was decided that the Secretaries be authorized to advance \$400 as a subsidy to ordinands who may apply for assistance to purchase a car.
2. It was directed that:
 - (a) Any minister settled on a charge, after ordination, where there is only one preaching point shall be required to refund the subsidy immediately.
 - (b) The same regulation shall apply to any ordinand who does not take a charge because of post-graduate work or for any other cause.
 - (c) An ordinand settled on a charge paying a salary (including travel allowance) above the Home Mission scale shall refund all of the subsidy on terms to be worked out by the Board, the maximum period allowed being three years.

New Applications

It was agreed that subsidies be given to Rev. G. A. Boyle and Rev. Donald E. C. McLean, both of whom are taking post-graduate work in Edinburgh, so that they may purchase cars in the Old Country before returning to Canada; it being understood that the provisions outlined in Item 2 above shall apply in each case.

It was decided that all other new applications, except those from Ordinands, and applications for second subsidies should be deferred to the meeting of the Board.

Special Cases

Mr. C. A. Brittain: It was agreed to cancel \$100 of balance of \$250 owing on loan; the remaining \$150 to be repaid by Mr. Brittain.

Rev. Chas. H. Forsythe, Sioux Lookout, Ont.: It was agreed that the Secretary of the Kenora-Rainy River Presbytery be asked to take up with Mr. Forsythe the matter of repayment of loan of \$500; no acknowledgment having been received of communications sent from the Home Mission Office or by Dr. Best.

Rev. W. P. Smetheram, Rockyford, Alta.: It was agreed that if \$100 is paid before December 31st, 1953, it will be accepted in full payment of indebtedness.

Special Grants for 1952

The Secretary stated that there was available for special grants on 1952 account an amount of approximately \$36,500.

On motion, the Executive adopted the following resolutions:

(1) That, in the light of reports from the pastoral charges, the Executive authorize additional payments so that the scale of salaries adopted by the Board in 1952 be reached; each case to be decided on its merits; and that the adjustment of these items be left in the hands of the Secretaries and the Superintendent concerned.

(2) That fields not now on the list be dealt with on the same basis as above when all the requirements of the Board have been met: namely, canvass, visitation, and Presbytery recommendation; that authority be given to the Secretaries to deal with all cases which will arise between now and the meeting of the Board; and that payments be made out of 1953 account after the closing of the Treasurer's books.

(3) That the Treasurer be requested to transfer to Home Mission Reserves the balance from the Missionary and Maintenance appropriation remaining unexpended when the books of the Treasurer are closed; and that a report be presented to the annual meeting of the Board of the amounts paid on 1952 account, the Board to deal with the balance remaining.

Reports from pastoral charges were considered and the following grants were made under the authority given in sections (1) and (2) above:

ABERNETHY

Fort Qu'Appelle—Application for grant of \$350 and loan of \$350 towards cost of installing bathroom, fixtures, pressure tank and septic tank, etc., was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

WESTMINSTER

Hatzic—Agreed to vote grant of \$125 towards cost of new furnace, building chimney, etc.

Property

GRAND FALLS

Bishop's Falls, Church—It was agreed to vary the action taken by the Executive in June last so that \$500 of the loan of \$3,000 voted at that meeting be made a grant.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Alberton, Manse—It was agreed to make a grant of \$500 in addition to the loan of \$2,000, voted towards cost of new manse by the Executive in October.

SAINT JOHN

Glen View, Church—Agreed to advance \$3,000 to the Extension Fund Committee of the Presbytery towards cost of new church building, on the understanding that Agreement to Repay be completed and forwarded.

Saint John, St. David's Manse—Agreed to accede to request that loan of \$3,000 now carried on the church building be transferred to the new manse, that mortgage for this amount be accepted, and that the bond, which the Board now holds as security for the loan on the church, be returned to the congregation.

SYDNEY

New Aberdeen, Wesley Hall—Agreed to vote grant of \$300 towards cost of painting hall.

MONTREAL

Caughnawaga, Manse—Agreed to vote \$38, being additional amount necessary to cover cost of connecting manse with new water system, for which \$232 was voted by the Executive in June.

Montreal, Hungarian Church—Agreed to vote loan of \$10,000, with interest at 3 per cent, payable over a ten year period, towards current building project; subject to receipt of application form.

KINGSTON

Kingston, Cooke's Church—It was agreed that request for loan to help in getting new building started should be referred to the meeting of the Board.

Kingston. Kingscourt—Agreed to advance \$5,000 to the Kingston Presbytery Church Extension Committee, towards cost of new church building; the amount to be repaid from funds raised in the Presbytery.

It was further agreed that the Presbytery be challenged to consider raising its objective for Church Extension to \$50,000.

MUSKOKA

Gibson Reserve, Mission House—Agreed that house be rented to Mr. Archie Decaire at suggested rental of \$10 per month.

Huntsville United Charge, Manse—It was agreed to submit two propositions to this congregation: namely, (a) to sell this property to the congregation for \$6,500, on payment of \$2,500 cash, balance to be paid over a ten-year period at rate of \$400 a year, with interest at 4 per cent or (b) to charge congregation rent at rate of \$40 per month, beginning May 1st, 1953; the Board to care for taxes, insurance and minor repairs.

TORONTO CENTRE

Toronto, 209 Crawford Street—Agreed to authorize necessary redecorating and purchase of storm windows, after estimate of cost is obtained.

TORONTO EAST

Toronto, Oak Church—Request for assistance towards cost of building project was considered. It was agreed that the Chairman and Secretaries should confer with the Superintendent of Missions and the Toronto Home Missions Council re the making of a recommendation to the Board; such recommendation to have the necessary Presbytery action.

Toronto, Wanstead Manse—Agreed that this house be offered to congregation for \$8,500; if offer accepted, terms to be worked out by the Secretaries and Superintendent of Missions. It was further agreed to request that, if possible, the decision of the Wanstead congregation in this matter should be made known in time for the meeting of the Board in April.

BRUCE

Saugeen, Parsonage—Agreed to confirm payment of \$13.78 to Mr. F. J. Dodson for repairs made.

HALTON

Port Nelson, Church Site—Agreed that payments on principal of loan be deferred for three years from December 31st, 1952, but that payments on interest be required.

HAMILTON

Hamilton, Church of The Redeemer—Agreed to vary action taken by the Executive in June and to vote grant of \$300 instead of loan of \$150 and grant of \$150.

LAMBTON

Sarnia, St. Luke's Church—Agreed that payment of outstanding indebtedness of \$750 be deferred for one year, interest at 3 per cent to be paid in the meantime.

MIDDLESEX

Caradoc Indian Reserve, Church and Mission House—Agreed (a) to authorize repairs to church at estimated cost of \$1,000; and (b) to refer to Secretaries, with power, the matter of repairs to the parsonage at Muncey, following receipt of estimate of cost.

DIGEST OF MINUTES
THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS
APRIL 14-16, 1953

The Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Tuesday, April 14th, at 10.00 a.m. The Chairman, Rev. W. M. Mustard, D.D., presided and conducted devotions.

On motion, Rev. Dr. George Telford was appointed Minute Secretary.

Roll Call

The following members were present: Revs. W. M. Mustard, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, J. R. Leng, A. B. Irwin, A. A. Rogers, J. M. Boyd, Isaac Davis, J. M. Fraser, J. H. Hamilton, George Telford, E. C. Armstrong, K. G. MacMillan, N. W. Whitmore and D. W. More; Messrs. Arthur Webster, E. Russell Mattinson, Fred Mann, A. W. Zurbrigg, and H. L. Fowler, Judge N. V. Buchanan, Mrs. C. S. Patterson, Mrs. C. M. Loveys and Mrs. J. L. Halpenny. *Corresponding Members:* Revs. H. M. Dawe, W. S. Godfrey, J. I. MacKay, J. C. Torrance, S. B. Stokes, C. H. Best, Robert Hall, R. W. K. Elliott, Thos. Hart, W. P. Bunt.

Regrets for absence were presented from Mr. P. M. McCarrell and Mr. R. Kenneth Campbell. Dr. Dorey referred to the regrettable illness of the Rev. J. A. Lyttle, Superintendent for Northern Ontario, and stated that his condition was steadily improving.

Hours of Meeting and Adjournment

It was decided that, unless otherwise arranged, the Board should meet from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30; from 2.00 to 5.30 p.m., and from 7.30 to 10.00 p.m.

Ratification of Minutes

On motion, the Minutes of the meetings of the Executive, held June 20th, 1952, and of the Interim Executive, held October 28th, 1952, and February 5th, 1953, were confirmed.

Communication

A letter of greeting and good wishes was presented from Mr. D. E. Pelley, Chairman of the Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee.

Appointment of Committees

(1) It was agreed that the Interim Executive as named by the General Council be the Executive of the Board.

(2) The Resolutions Committee was named by the Chairman and appointed as follows: Rev. A. B. Irwin, Mr. A. W. Zurbrigg, Dr. W. S. Godfrey.

Scale of Expenses of Members

On motion, the following was adopted as the scale of expenses of members of the Board:

- (1) That members be paid the cost of railway and sleeper tickets to Toronto and return; the cost of meals en route—such cost not to exceed \$6 per day; and the cost of hotel and meals in Toronto.
- (2) That those travelling by motor be paid on the basis of railway fare.
- (3) That the amount for Sunday supply shall not exceed \$20 per Sunday.

Presentation of Reports

Mimeographed Reports of Superintendents of Missions, Superintendents of Institutions, etc., were distributed to the members of the Board.

Statements by Superintendents of Missions

The Superintendents of Missions gave brief statements regarding the work in their respective areas. The appreciation of the Board was expressed by the Chairman.

Sunday School in the Home—By Mail and Air

Dr. M. C. Macdonald introduced Miss Gertrude Patmore, Supervisor of the Inter-Board Committee on the Sunday School in the Home—by Mail and Air. Miss Patmore addressed the Board briefly, referring to the growth of this work and stressing its usefulness in the case of recent immigrants to this country. The Chairman thanked Miss Patmore on behalf of the Board.

It was agreed that the appropriation for this work be \$3,750 for 1953.

Grants to Organizations

The following grants were voted:

- (1) To the Division of Home Missions, National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.—\$425.
- (2) To the Interdenominational Bureau of Architecture—\$50.
- (3) To the John Milton Society for the Blind—\$50.

Bissell Bursary Fund

The Secretary reported that the Trustees of the Bissell Bursary Fund, at their meeting in September, 1952, had voted eight Bursaries of \$75 each and two of \$50, making a total of \$700, and had reserved \$200 to care for late applications. Later, one bursary of \$75 and two small amounts of \$25 each were awarded, and one bursary of \$75 was not paid, the recipient being unable to attend college because of illness. One student, who had been helped from the Fund and who was graduating in Engineering this spring, had been awarded an Athlone Fellowship entitling him to two years of post graduate study in Britain.

Immigration Work

Rev. J. R. Leng reported on the Immigration Work carried on by the Board. He submitted a statement containing statistics re immigrants admitted to Canada in the years 1949 to 1952. The total for the calendar year 1952 was 164,498. Of this number, 66,083 were men; 53,443 women, and 44,997 under 18 years of age. Approximately 40 national groups were represented: British 42,675; German 28,257; Italian 21,383; Dutch 21,213; Polish 5,485; U.S.A. 9,306; Ukrainian 2,821; others 33,358. Mimeographed reports were submitted from Mr. Alex Maclaren, Placement Officer, Rev. A. S. Murray, Immigration Chaplain, Montreal, and Miss M. Emminghaus, Port Worker at Halifax.

Re Montreal Chaplaincy: It was agreed that the matter of adjustment in the salary of Dr. A. S. Murray be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

Memorial, Rev. and Mrs. George McDougall

This was approved and the Secretaries were authorized to see that the project is carried out.

Resolutions of Vancouver Presbytery

(1) "Presbytery commends to the Board of Home Missions the principle of paying stipends above the minimum salary to missionaries who merit increments by virtue of years of service and responsibility." It was decided that this be referred to the Committee set up by the last General Council to study a more Equitable Basis of using the Supply of Ordained Ministers and related matters.

(2) "That the matter of travel allowance in the case of aid-receiving charges, which do not qualify on the basis of mileage, be referred to

the Board of Home Missions for its consideration." It was stated that no action was necessary, as this had been dealt with by the Appropriations Committee.

Report of Committee on Indian, Oriental and Marine Work

The Report of the Committee was presented by Dr. W. P. Bunt and adopted as follows:

Indian Work

General Survey

Dr. Dorey submitted a statement containing statistics and facts regarding the Indians in Canada. The population had increased from 112,510 in 1934 to 136,407 in 1949; there was a greatly increased number of children in residential and day schools, especially in the latter, the expenditure of the Dominion Government on education having increased from \$1,878,000 in 1941-42 to \$7,193,000 in 1952-53. A similar or greater increase had taken place in expenditures on Social Welfare, Health Services, etc., reflected in the greatly lessened mortality rate of the Indian people. The chief problem was economic, especially in parts of the Norway House Presbytery, where population pressure on available food supplies and the other necessities of life presented a serious problem. It was suggested that part of the answer to this problem was the migration over a period of a certain proportion of the population of the Indian Reserves in the North to the older settled parts of Manitoba or to Saskatchewan, which would present to the missionary and the Church the challenge of preparing the Indians for this transition. It was further suggested that, should the movement assume any proportions, The Woman's Missionary Society and the Board should consider the establishment in Winnipeg (and possibly in other centres) of a hostel which would care for such Indians, temporarily, and also the appointment of a person or persons to carry on follow-up work.

Agreed to adopt the recommendations of the Committee:

- (1) That we draw the attention of The Woman's Missionary Society to the need of a hostel in Winnipeg and assure them of the willingness of this Board to co-operate in establishing such a centre.
- (2) That an expression of appreciation be sent to the Dominion Government for the splendid contribution it has made during the past decade towards improving the educational, health and living standards of the Indians.

Appointments or Nominations

Agreed to confirm the appointment of Mr. W. E. Senior as Missionary at Nelson House, and that nominations or appointments to Little Grand Rapids, Poplar River, and Round Lake be referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent concerned.

Residential Schools

Dr. Dorey made a general statement regarding the operation of the residential schools under the United Church.

Norway House: Dr. Best stated that it was expected that the new school would be completed and ready for operations next Fall. Agreed that the Rev. K. C. McLeod be nominated to the Indian Affairs Branch as Principal of the new Residential School.

Morley: (1) Agreed that grant at the rate of \$4,900 be continued to June 30th, and then be referred to Executive;

(2) Agreed that the recommendation of the Calgary Presbytery that the missionary and educational work be separated, already agreed to in principle, be implemented, and that the nomination of Principal of the residential school be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned.

Edmonton: It was agreed: (1) That the Board concur in the request of the Principal for two months' leave of absence during the coming summer for attendance at Stanford University.

(2) That no action be taken on the recommendation of the Advisory Committee of the Edmonton Residential School that social benefits be provided for the employees; and

(3) That a loan of \$5,000 be advanced to cover the cost of breaking additional land, to be repaid by the School on a half-crop basis.

Alberni: Agreed that Mr. E. F. Peake be given authority to sign cheques on behalf of the Alberni Residential School during the absence of the Principal, Mr. A. E. Caldwell, on holiday leave.

Salaries of Principals: Agreed that the Principals of Residential Schools be allowed an increase of \$100 in salary for 1953.

Training Centre for Indians

A communication was received from Rev. K. C. McLeod, suggesting the setting up of a training centre for Indians near Winnipeg and asking that the Board give him permission to explore the possibilities of such a school. Agreed that, in the opinion of the Board, the time is not opportune for giving effect to the plan proposed by Mr. McLeod.

Oriental Work

Dr. Dorey outlined the situation so far as the work amongst the Chinese and Japanese is concerned.

Winnipeg, Chinese

Dr. Best reported that good progress was being made in this work under the leadership of Rev. Thos. Choy.

Calgary, Chinese

Agreed that the Secretaries continue their efforts to secure a satisfactory missionary for the Chinese work in Calgary.

Re Rev. Stephen Yee Tong

In reply to an enquiry from the Secretary of the Alberta Conference, it was directed that he be advised that the Board is not prepared to give financial support to the work suggested for Mr. Yee Tong.

B.C. Japanese

Dr. Bunt spoke regarding the work amongst the Japanese in British Columbia, pointing out that the extreme anti-Japanese feeling which had existed during the War had been greatly lessened.

Appointments or Nominations

Agreed that appointments or nominations, if any, be referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent concerned.

Marine Work

It was stated that the *Melvin Swartout* was being transferred from Alert Bay to the West Coast of Vancouver Island, the work to be re-opened this summer, and that the *R. C. Scott* was being transferred to Alert Bay.

Alert Bay

Agreed: (1) That the Board request the Transfer Committee to place Mr. Oliver Howard—1953 ordinand—in the Conference of British Columbia; and that when such action has been taken, he be nominated to the Settlement Committee for appointment to Alert Bay; and (2) that the Board concur in the recommendation of the B.C. Conference Home Mission Committee that Mr. Howard spend the last two weeks in June with Rev. Roy Rodgers, so that he may become acquainted with the field; the Board of Home Missions to make the necessary financial provision for this arrangement, and also pay whatever small fee there might be in connection with a short course in navigation for Mr. Howard; and that the Board suggest that Mr. Howard's appointment date from June 1st.

Central Mainland Marine

Agreed that the nomination of a successor to Rev. R. H. McColl, missionary on the *Thomas Crosby IV*, be referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent for British Columbia.

Salaries of Marine Missionaries

Agreed that the recommendation of the B.C. Conference Home Mission Committee be adopted, after amendment, as follows: That after three years' service the missionaries on the boats *Thomas Crosby IV*, *Melvin Swartout*, *Chalmers* and *Glad Tidings* shall receive a salary of \$100 above the current minimum paid to ministers in their classifications; after four years, a salary of \$200 above such minimum, and after five years, and each year thereafter, \$300 above such minimum.

Salaries of Engineers

Agreed to adopt the recommendation of the B.C. Conference Home Mission Committee that the annual salaries of the engineers on the *Thomas Crosby IV* and the *Melvin Swartout* be increased by \$100 as from July 1st, 1953, bringing that of the former to \$3,100 and that of the latter to \$2,800.

Report of Committee on Rural Work

The Report of the Committee was presented by Dr. W. S. Godfrey and adopted as follows:

Rural Evangelism

Re plans for Rural Evangelism in co-operation with the Board of Evangelism and Social Service,—agreed: That the following Presbyteries

be asked to co-operate with the Boards of Evangelism and Social Service and Home Missions in campaigns in their areas as an initial step in this direction:

Dr. J. R. Mutchmor addressed the Board, stressing the importance of Rural Evangelism.

It was reported that the following ministers, nominated by the Executive for Scholarships at the Interdenominational Rural School, Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Illinois, June 22nd to July 24th, had accepted the offer: Rev. A. E. Larke, Ontario; Rev. A. F. Gardner, Ontario; Rev. A. D. Stade, Saskatchewan; and Rev. H. P. Marston, Alberta; and it was agreed that \$600 be placed in the budget to pay expenses of travel and board.

Summer Schools

Action of General Council

Attention was drawn to the action of the 1952 General Council on the Report of the Commission on Rural Depopulation and Related Problems, which is to be found in the Record of Proceedings, page 160.

Pastoral Charge Realignment

Agreed that the Secretary of General Council be requested to inform each Conference of the action of the Council, by which each Superintendent is appointed Chairman of the Conference Committee on Realignment of Charges and Equalization of Ministerial Manpower, etc.

Conference at O.A.C.

In order to give publicity to the Summer School for Rural Ministers, which is held each summer at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, it was directed that a copy of the folder, "Summer School for Rural Clergymen," be sent to all Ontario ministers, along with a copy of the Rural Life Sunday Programme.

Re "Country Parson"

Mr. Leng commended to the members of the Board the book, *Country Parson*, just off the press—a collection of essays and articles by the late Rev. George W. Morrison, formerly Chairman of the Board's Committee on Rural Work.

Appropriation

Agreed that an amount up to \$2,000 be voted for the carrying out of the programme of Rural Evangelism, and that the total appropriation for Rural Work in 1953 be \$3,200.

Report of the Hospital Committee

The Report of the Hospital Committee was presented by Dr. C. H. Best and was adopted as follows:

George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake

Judge Buchanan reported that the situation at the George McDougall Hospital has greatly improved since the coming of Dr. A. L. Thomas and that the prospects for the future were excellent.

Agreed to confirm the appointment of Mr. C. A. Cross as Business Manager of the Hospital.

Archer Memorial Hospital, Ldmont

Agreed to approve the purchase of the "Archer" house, if available, at a price not exceeding \$10,000, for use as a residence for graduate nurses.

Cruise Memorial Hospital, Vita

Agreed that the salary of Dr. H. V. Waldon be increased to \$6,500 per year.

Bella Coola Hospital

Agreed that the salary of Dr. J. E. Whiting be increased to \$6,500 per year.

Skidegate Inlet Hospital

Agreed that Dr. Donald Watt should receive a basic salary of \$5,000, with the usual provisions for promotion, furloughs, etc., and the use of the house.

Cross, Mr. Michael Nemirsky and Mr. Steve Antoniuk, or any two of the aforesaid, be and they are hereby authorized for and in the name of the George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake, Alberta, to borrow money from the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Smoky Lake, Alberta, on behalf of the said Hospital, either by overdrawing the account or otherwise, the said borrowing at no time to exceed the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and such authorization to be valid to December 31st, 1953, only, after which date the said borrowing shall at no time exceed the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars.

John Edward Moody Bequest

Agreed that the matter of the disposition of the bequest of the late Mr. Moody to the Port Simpson Hospital, which has been closed, should be referred to the Executive of the Board for recommendation to the Sub-Executive of General Council.

Policy for Church Hospitals

Dr. Dorey outlined a draft of the submission, prepared at the direction of the Executive, on Dominion-wide policy for Church hospitals.

Agreed that the following resolution be adopted:

Whereas, by resolution of the General Council, the Board was asked to prepare a digest on Hospital Policy for the Policy Commission; and

Whereas the Sub-Executive requested the Board to present to the Policy Commission its recommendations on Hospital Policy;

Be It Resolved: That the Executive of the Board prepare the digest and that the Board, without desiring to limit in any way the freedom of judgment of the Commission but acting on the request of the Sub-Executive, place before the Policy Commission the following statement, as being the main questions which, in its opinion, are issues on which the Commission should give judgment:

1. That, in the light of the report of the Policy Commission which outlines the relation of the Church and the State in matters of Social Welfare and while recognizing the fact that the State is to an increasing

extent taking over the responsibility for the physical well-being of the individual, it is the opinion of the Board that the State having shown an increasing awareness of the problem and having manifested its desire to co-operate with voluntary agencies and to assist in financing hospitals, the Church should continue to take a share in providing in certain areas for the care of the sick, with such modifications as may become necessary from time to time, and that therefore our hospital ministry should be maintained.

2. That it is the opinion of the Board that in general the most effective method of carrying out this hospital policy is for the Church to provide total health services, including both doctor and hospital.

3. That the Board at the earliest opportunity carefully investigate the possibility of establishing small outpost hospitals, especially in Northern Ontario, for which a legacy was left by the late Miss Hattie E. Whaley.

Statement by the Treasurer

Rev. Dr. V. T. Mooney addressed the Board and presented a mimeographed statement of finances for 1952.

The Treasurer reported that there was being used to finance the work of the Church as at December 31, 1952, an amount of \$598,766, representing uninvested balances of Home Mission funds as follows:-

It was agreed to approve the action of the Board of Finance in this regard and to authorize the use of an amount up to \$500,000 for this purpose during the current year.

Moved and carried that the Board express its appreciation of the services rendered by Dr. Mooney, Mr. H. L. Arnup and the Department of the Treasury.

Church Extension

Dr. Macdonald reported regarding the Church Extension Campaign. He stated that:

(a) In the Campaign for Church Extension the total amount to be raised in Presbyteries is \$2,500,000.

(b) Up to the present, out of 105 Presbyteries over 70 have committed themselves to objectives. Indications are that several will be added to the list within the next few months. The hope was expressed that from 90 to 95 Presbyteries would participate.

(c) In quite a number of Presbyteries charges have yet to follow a systematic plan in their givings. An increasing number of smaller charges are forwarding periodically monies raised. It was urged that Presbytery and Conference organizations emphasize the importance of planned contributions.

(d) The Presbyteries where the best results have been achieved are those in which an intensive, sustained and educational policy has been followed, i.e., Montreal, Toronto (Centre, East and West), Moncton, Oshawa, Niagara, Algoma, Lambton, Middlesex, Regina, Winnipeg, Edmonton and Vancouver.

(e) To date a total of \$1,385,000 in cash (a small portion of it is in assured pledges) has been raised leaving \$1,115,000 still to be raised by June 30, 1955 (not later than December 31, 1955), when it is hoped the Campaign will be completed. The major portion is held by local incorporated Councils, or bodies authorized to retain contributions. Where there is no incorporated or authorized body, it is imperative that contributions be sent to the Toronto office. Emphasis must be placed on the need for setting up Conference Committees on Church Extension in accord with the instructions of the last General Council. Only by sustained action on the part of Conference, Presbytery and Congregational Committees can the full objective be reached. If the \$2,500,000 is not raised, many churches, desperately needed will not be built.

(f) Church Extension will be a responsibility for The United Church of Canada for many years to come. The steady expansion in industry and the continued growth in Canada's population will create new demands for churches to be built. Our Church must equip itself to assist newly established congregations in building their places of worship.

Appreciation of Dr. Macdonald's leadership in the Church Extension programme was expressed.

Appointment of Student Missionaries

The Report of the Committee on the Appointment of Students, which was introduced and spoken to by Dr. Macdonald, was adopted as follows:

(1) During the summer of 1952, 206 students served the Board under its co-operative plan (ordinarily called the "Students' Pool") and 14 others were appointed—8 to institutional missions and 6 to special survey work. A total of 220 served under the Board.

(2) The Committee, to date, has appointed to fields this year 224 students. They are distributed in the different Superintendencies as follows:

(3) To date 230 students have made application for fields. Of these 188 are candidates for the ministry (Arts 111, Theology 77). Of the applicants 30 were young women and of these 24 received appointments; 42 are non-candidates.

(4) The Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students was carried out in 1952. The policy of setting allocations to fields is meeting with a continued response and proving a more effective means of financing our student work. To illustrate the effectiveness of this policy the following table shows what has happened in field contributions:

The increased response enabled us to advance payments to our student missionaries to \$28 a week plus board and travel on the field. The more experienced students serving their 3rd, 4th and 5th terms were paid at the rate of \$29, \$30, and \$31 per week, respectively, plus board and travel on the field. An additional \$5 per Sunday was paid to those students who served over 18 Sundays.

(5) This year we experienced more difficulty than ever before in securing enough candidates for the ministry for our student mission fields. The lure of work in secular lines with higher pay makes it exceedingly difficult to get applications from the older and more mature students. This aspect of the situation is all the more disappointing in view of the continued increase in the number of candidates for the ministry throughout the Church. The total is now reported at 506.

The failure of so many candidates to volunteer for service in Home Mission work has greatly handicapped us this year. This is a matter that should be the concern of all Presbyteries and attention should be drawn to it when recommending their students to college and the pursuit of their training for the Christian ministry.

It is recommended:

(1) That the Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students should be continued for 1953.

(2) That the appropriation for student work for the summer of 1953 be up to \$70,000, having regard to the number of students appointed and the total weeks served.

(3) That if suitable workers can be secured and are needed in the new areas of the larger centres, authority be given to the Secretaries in co-operation with the Superintendent concerned to make appointments and that we request the Woman's Missionary Society to share in this responsibility on the same basis as last year.

The Report of the Committee was presented by Mr. Leng and adopted as follows:

Special Services Committee

Mrs. J. L. Halpenny, Chairman of the Inter-Board Committee on Special Services, drew attention to the literature issued by the Committee, both for special occasions and the regular hospital and prison visitation literature, available at a nominal cost. Appreciation of the work of this Committee was expressed by members of the Board.

Car Subsidies

Dr. Dorey made a statement regarding the financial position of the Fund. He reported that arrears now totalled over \$12,000.

On recommendation of the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents, the following resolutions were adopted:

1. *Future Policy*: That, in view of the increased amounts given by the Board in travel and in view of the fact that there is an annual depreciation of the Fund, car subsidies be continued to Ordinands only, on the present basis; and (b) that applications now in the office from other persons be not considered.

2. *Advances to Ordinands*: That authority be given to the Secretaries to continue the advance of \$400 of the subsidy to Ordinands who may apply for assistance to purchase a car, on the following conditions:

- (a) Any minister settled on a charge, after ordination, where there is only one preaching point shall be required to refund the subsidy immediately.
- (b) The same regulation shall apply to any Ordinand who does not take a charge because of post-graduate work or for any other cause.
- (c) An Ordinand settled on a charge paying a salary (including travel allowance) above the Home Mission scale shall refund all of the subsidy on terms to be worked out by the Board, the maximum period allowed being three years.

3. *Re Arrears*: That the Secretaries provide each Superintendent with the information on those in arrears in his area. He in turn is to follow up each case, urging prompt attention. If any man fails to co-operate or give a satisfactory explanation, his case is to be reported to Presbytery for necessary action, in accord with the terms of the covenant signed when he secured the subsidy: namely—"That any failure on my part to carry out the terms of the within agreement may be reported to the Presbytery which I serve, by the officers of the Board."

Report of Committee on Institutional Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

The report of the Committee was presented by Dr. J. I. MacKay and was adopted as follows:

Agreed, further, that the matter of an appointment to the Central Winnipeg Mission and the request of St. Paul's Church, Winnipeg, for the appointment of a full-time woman worker, to be paid by The Woman's Missionary Society, be referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent of Missions, in consultation with Mrs. C. M. Loveys.

Resolution of Temiskaming Presbytery

Re recommendation of Temiskaming Presbytery that The Woman's Missionary Society appoint their worker "expressly as missionary-at-large in the greater Kirkland area," her first charge to be the care of the Finnish congregation, and her second charge the discovery and enlistment of unchurched families so that they may be related to one of the churches in the area; her work to be carried on in closest co-operation with the other churches in the area.—Agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries, in consultation with Mrs. C. M. Loveys.

Extension Work, Toronto Area

Agreed that a grant of \$3,700 be voted for this work and that The Woman's Missionary Society be asked to share in the cost, up to \$1,400.

Montreal, Church of the Redeemer

Agreed: (a) That the grant for salary and house rent be continued to Mrs. Gualtieri to the end of the Conference year; (b) that the Secretaries be authorized to pay whatever grant is necessary for supply; and (c) that the Secretaries and Dr. J. I. MacKay be authorized to prepare the budget for 1953.

Toronto, Ukrainian Work

Agreed: (a) that, on the recommendation of the Home Mission Committee of the Toronto Conference, the grant be continued to the end

of June, under the present arrangement; (b) that Presbytery be informed of this action and its attention drawn to the very large salary grant (plus provision of living quarters) required for the Ukrainian minister, who reports only 15 interested families, no Sunday School or other organizations in his group, contributions to salary and maintenance only \$150 a year, and average monthly pastoral visitations, 23; and (c) that the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery be consulted as to the best way of serving the small Ukrainian group after July 1st.

German Work, Toronto and District

Agreed that \$500 be placed at the disposal of the Executive, to make possible the part-time employment of Mr. Fiegi.

Hamilton, All People's

Agreed that Rev. Victor Kvasheninikoff be continued in Hamilton, All People's Church, under present arrangement until June 30th; his area of responsibility after that date to be determined by the Secretaries and Superintendents concerned, after consultation with the Home Mission Committees of Hamilton and Toronto Centre Presbyteries.

Edmonton, All People's Mission

1. The Board received for information the following resolutions of the Edmonton Presbytery:

- (a) That, whereas there is need for more intensive work in the area adjacent to Bissell Memorial Institute, Forest Heights and Rundle be separated from the Mission and set up as two student fields.
- (b) That these two fields be placed under the supervision of Professor C. Johnston of St. Stephen's College.

2. Re recommendations of the Edmonton Presbytery re duties of student employed at All People's and the employment of Mr. Kaz Iwaasa as a special worker among the Japanese, it was agreed: (a) That, since Mr. Iwaasa has not applied for a summer appointment, no change be made at the present time, but when a new appointment is made next spring, Mr. Kaz Iwaasa be considered for the position; and (b) that, in the meantime, the student, Mr. Ian Holter, now employed, be continued under the existing arrangement.

Work amongst Doukhobors

Agreed, after hearing statements by Dr. Dorey and Rev. D. W. More, that the matter of work amongst the Doukhobors in British Columbia be referred to the Executive.

French Work

Appointments and Nominations

Agreed that appointments and nominations, if any, be referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent concerned.

Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute

After hearing a statement by Dr. Dorey regarding the situation at Pointe-aux-Trembles, it was agreed to adopt the following resolutions:

1. That the Board of Home Missions believes the policy should be:

(a) To provide for the education of French Protestant children who cannot obtain such education where they live; i.e., where the population is Roman Catholic and no Protestant School is available.

(b) To provide education in French for Protestant children who *might* obtain an English education but for whom it is desirable that French education be assured. (Education is education whether it be in French or English, but it does not seem to be desirable to equate English with Protestant and French with Roman Catholic. We should be interested in maintaining a Protestant witness in French.)

(c) To offer education in *French* to any who may be able to pay the cost of this service. (As a matter of fact, this is incidental and should not require any grant for the maintenance of the School.)

2. That, having the above in mind, it be an instruction to the Board of Pointe-aux-Trembles to have made immediately, and in as thorough a manner as possible, a survey showing the number of pupils which might be available for registration next September, and also an estimate of the amount of fees which might come in.

3. That this be in the hands of the Secretaries by May 1st.

4. That in the meantime the amount necessary to carry on the School to June 30th be voted.

5. (a) That the Executive be empowered to vote the amount necessary for the balance of the year, if it is satisfied that the number of pupils warrants the continuance of the School.

(b) That the Board is of the opinion that the minimum number of pupils should be 125, of whom 100 should be resident pupils.

- (c) That, in this regard, the number of teachers to be appointed bear the proper relation to the number of pupils enrolled and that the other staff should not be larger than the number of pupils warrants.

Literature

It was reported that the General Council in 1952 had adopted the following recommendations of the Committee on Policy:

1. That additional religious literature in the French language be made available by The United Church of Canada.

2. That the General Council or its Executive appoint a Committee to discharge this responsibility, this Committee to be representative of the Boards of Home Missions, Evangelism and Social Service, Christian Education, Publication and The Woman's Missionary Society.

3. That the Committee so appointed explore fully the possibility of securing from France and Switzerland literature in the French language which would suit our requirements.

4. That for preparation of literature not elsewhere available, the Committee appoint a sub-committee to translate and produce the material that is needed.

5. That costs be shared by the Boards represented on the Central Committee.

Agreed that this be received for information:

Bequests

Estate, Helen Shipley

It was reported that by the terms of the Will of the late Helen Shipley the sum of \$405.02 (now in Home Mission Reserve account) was to be expended for Home Missions in the Province of Ontario. It was agreed to authorize the Secretaries to apply this amount on the payment of a grant or grants to Home Mission work in Ontario.

Estate, Israel Taylor

By the Will of the late Israel Taylor of London, Ontario, seven-tenths of the residue of his Estate has been set aside to establish a special fund to be known as the Israel and Mary Taylor Endowment Fund, the capital of such fund to be expended by the Trustee in ten approximately equal annual instalments in addition to the interest received thereon, through the Metropolitan United Church of London, Ontario, as a contribution to the Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada for the advancement of its work; provided however that at least one-tenth of such annual expenditure shall be made within the Province of Ontario; and provided further that the Trustee shall require a written report on each year's expenditure, and before making any further annual advance shall receive satisfactory assurances in each instance that such new advances will be expended in accordance with its interpretation of the spirit and purpose which has prompted the establishment of the Fund. The Trustee is The Canada Trust Company of London. There was a life interest in favor of his widow, who is now deceased.

This was received for information.

Estate, Caroline Forbes Harcourt

It was reported for information that in May, 1951, The United Church of Canada, through the Executive of General Council, agreed to accept transfer from Mrs. Caroline Forbes Harcourt of certain property in the City of Guelph, described as Lots 24, 25 and 26 in Peter Martin's Survey, according to registered Plan No. 328, and commonly known as the Brooklyn Mission, and transferred it for administrative purposes to the Board of Home Missions. It is listed in the Real Property of the Board.

By the Will of the late Mrs. Harcourt other property has been bequeathed to the Trustees of Chalmers congregation, Guelph, for use in connection with the Brooklyn Mission. The Will also sets aside a sum of \$35,000 which is to be held by the Trustees of the Chalmers congregation as an endowment fund for the Brooklyn Mission. The details of this are in the Will.

Statement re Vacancies

The Secretary stated that, from information furnished by the Superintendents, it would appear that actual vacancies at the end of the Conference year would total 146. In addition to this, there were 17 new pieces of work; 21 charges now served by lay supplies should have ordained ministers; 9 fields served by lay supplies who planned to go to college next Fall; 9 fields now served by retired ministers which should have ordained ministers; and 47 students serving fields which normally had ordained supply, making a grand total of 249.

Home Mission Projects

It was agreed that the Secretaries be given authority to present to the Board of Finance a list of special projects for the Board of Home Missions, to be included in the Missionary and Maintenance Fund objective for 1953.

Date of Board Meeting

It was suggested that the Board meet on April 6, 7 and 8, 1954, and that final decision be referred to the Executive.

Report of Resolutions Committee

Rev. A. B. Irwin presented the Report of the Resolutions Committee, which, on motion, was adopted:

Appreciation, Moderator

The Board of Home Missions desires to express its sincere gratitude to the Moderator for the devoted service he is rendering to the Church. His presence with the Exposition has enabled him to bring to a very wide constituency the benefit of his experience at home and abroad.

This Board would include in its expression of appreciation the name of Mrs. Scott whose charm and grace have added greatly to the visits of the Moderator.

Resolutions

(1) That it is with sincere concern and regret that this Board has learned of the illness of the Rev. James Lyttle, D.D., Superintendent of Missions for Northern Ontario, and is happy to know that he is recovering satisfactorily. Our prayer is offered on his behalf that he may soon be restored to complete health.

(2) That, having learned of the bereavement suffered by the Rev. K. G. MacMillan through the death, last March, of his father, Mr. George MacMillan, who was for over forty years a devoted elder in the Church, we extend to Mr. MacMillan, his mother and other members of the family our deepest sympathy.

(3) That we note with regret the demise of the following: Mr. P. G. Stebbings, lay supply at Pender Island; Mrs. Leonard Norman, daughter of the Rev. Oliver Darwin; Rev. T. S. Paton; two of our Students for the ministry—Mr. Frank Hannah and Mr. Lawrence A. Moore; Mrs. Malcolm Strachan; and that to the relatives and friends we extend our Christian sympathy.

(4) That the Board of Home Missions tender felicitations and congratulations to the Rev. Robert Hall, Superintendent of Missions for Northern Saskatchewan, on being elected to the Presidency of the Saskatchewan Conference, and also on the fact that he is to be honoured by St. Andrew's College in the conferring of the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

(5) That we congratulate the R. W. Large Memorial Hospital at Bella Bella, B.C., on the celebration of its Fiftieth Anniversary in 1952.

(6) That our sincere thanks be expressed to the Rev. Bruce Gray and the officials and members of Kew Beach United Church for their gracious hospitality in making it possible for the Board to hold its annual dinner and social gathering in their assembly hall; and also to the Rev. John Short, D.D., for his interesting, informative and inspiring address on that occasion.

(7) That affectionate greetings be sent to the Rev. Grover Livingstone, Chaplain of the Muskoka Sanatorium, with the hope that his most unfortunate accident may not keep him too long from the work which is so much a part of his life and interest.

(8) That a letter conveying the greetings and good wishes of the members of the Board be sent to all retired Superintendents of Missions.

(9) That we express our warm appreciation to the Chairman of the Board for his courteous and efficient leadership; to the Minute Secretary for his fine service; to the Secretaries and their staff for their guidance, counsel and courteous helpfulness; and to the Superintendents of Missions, not only for their helpful direction during the Committee and Board meetings, but for their untiring zeal in the leadership given in their respective areas of labour.

(10) That we record our appreciation to Dr. Macdonald for his enthusiastic and intensive direction of Church Extension and pledge him our loyal support in promoting the campaign.

(11) That this Board record its gratitude to Mrs. T. E. Bissell for the Bursaries given to assist the children of ministers in their education.

Report of Appropriations Committee

The Report of the Appropriations Committee was adopted as follows:

1. That on the basis of estimates of contributions from congregations, the scale of salaries for 1953 be as follows:

Retired Ministers: Where retired ministers are temporarily giving full-time service to pastoral charges normally served by married, ordained ministers, the salary may be built up to the above scale. In other cases, the salary scale to be set for each field in the light of all the circumstances, but not to exceed \$2,200. Pension is to be included in these totals. It is expected that appointments of Retired Ministers will be made only to charges which have a manse or parsonage. The Board does not provide rent.

Students: \$15.00 for week-end supply.

Superintendents of Institutions: Maximum \$3,400. Minimum \$2,700.

Women Workers: Maximum \$2,250. Minimum \$1,950.

2. That to any married, ordained minister or lay supply, in receipt of salary for 1953 not above the Home Mission minimum, a special grant of \$100 be paid for each child having to leave home to pursue any University course or to attend a Normal School; special cases to be dealt with on their merits.

Payment of the grant shall be made in two instalments—the first on receipt of a certificate of enrolment or attendance for the Fall term, from the Registrar of the institution; the second on receipt of similar certification that the student is enrolled and in attendance for the term following the New Year.

3. Special Allowance for Transportation on Fields

That in harmony with intent of Sec. 104 (e) of the Manual:

(a) Every ordained minister or lay supply, on an aid-receiving charge or one eligible for assistance from the Board of Home Missions, and serving 100 or more families, on two or more appointments, where the Sunday drive is not less than 10 miles and not more than 39 miles, shall receive a yearly car depreciation allowance of \$125. Where the Sunday drive is 40 miles or more, the depreciation allowance shall be \$150.

(b) The depreciation allowance in the above categories will be added 15 cents per mile of Sunday travel. This not only cares for Sunday travel, but adds something for pastoral work.

(c) An ordained minister in the active work, serving a 1-point charge with 150 or more families, and on which a minister (in the active work)

would normally be settled, and which cannot be linked up by Presbytery with another appointment to make a larger charge, shall receive \$200 a year towards car maintenance and depreciation. 250

(d) An ordained minister on a charge of two or more appointments with 100 or more families, where the Sunday drive is less than 10 miles, and where Presbytery re-arrangement is impossible, shall receive \$200 a year towards his car maintenance and depreciation. 250

(e) In charges where the summer and winter travel vary, the travel allowance will be worked out on the basis of three quarters summer travel and one quarter winter travel.

(f) Charges, large or small, with exceptional conditions as to travel and location, and where re-arrangement by Presbytery is impossible, shall be dealt with on their merits.

That, in harmony with the above, the scale of travel allowances shall be as follows:

4. *Re Charges Not on the List*

(a) That at the first meeting following the Annual Conference, each Presbytery be requested to examine the salaries being paid by the respective charges to discover any charge or charges paying less than the scale set by the Board of Home Missions, and to arrange for a visitation by the Presbytery in co-operation with the Lay Committee on Ministerial Salaries.

(b) That such visitation shall be arranged at latest at the first regular meeting of Presbytery following Conference. Applications for grants from charges not already on the Home Mission list should not be endorsed by Presbytery unless and until the following requirements have been fulfilled:

(i) Presbytery visitation as above.

(ii) Every person canvass within the calendar year.

(iii) Application on the proper form (Annual Report and Request for Grant) completely filled out, from the Official Board of the Charge. Presbytery should be satisfied that such pastoral charges have made reasonable increases in salary responsibility in the past two or three years before recommending that they be brought up to the established minimum.

Charges that fall within the classification known as "special fields" shall be dealt with on their merits by the Secretaries in consultation with the Superintendents concerned.

(c) That this information be sent to Lay Associations as well as to Presbyteries.
