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DIGEST OF MINUTES
THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS
JUNE 21ST, 1943

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Monday, June 21st, 1943, at 10:00 a.m. The Chairman presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

Members present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., R. B. Cochrane, D.D., George Dorey, D.D., M. C. Macdonald, S. H. Greenslade, J. G. Gorwill, Messrs. K. M. Kilbourn, R. S. Dunlop, J. F. Maine and Fred Mann.

Appointment of Minute Secretary

Rev. S. H. Greenslade was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) Rev. J. F. Woodsworth, D.D., thanking the Board for letter of congratulations.
- (2) Revs. Drs. G. A. Wilson, S. S. Osterhout, Arthur Barner, Thomas Powell and J. A. Doyle, in appreciation of letters of greeting from the Board of Home Missions.
- (3) Mrs. J. R. Watts, acknowledging letter of greeting sent to Dr. Watts.
- (4) Revs. J. Lavell Smith, Fred Smith and J. M. White, thanking the Board for Scholarships granted.
- (5) Dr. James S. Thomson, General Manager of the Canadian Broadcasting Commission, in appreciation of letter of greeting and good wishes.
- (6) Mrs. M. W. Tyndal, Mrs. C. W. Ross, Rev. Dr. Geo. C. Pringle and Mr. John T. Ross, in appreciation of letters of sympathy.
- (7) The Prime Minister of Canada and the former Premier of Ontario, in acknowledgment of resolution regarding the liquor situation in Canada.
- (8) Rev. Dr. Mark A. Dawber, thanking the Board for its grant to the Home Missions Council of North America.
- (9) Secretary of the Presbytery of Rock Lake, conveying the Presbytery's appreciation of the Board's action in increasing the grants to aid-receiving charges by One Hundred dollars.
- (10) Chairman of the Wrinch Memorial Hospital Board, forwarding resolution passed at the annual meeting of the Patrons of the Hospital urging that steps be taken to secure permanent exemption from military service for Dr. Murphy.

It was agreed that the Executive endorse this request and instruct the Secretaries to send it forward to the Medical Supply Procurement Board at Ottawa.

Congratulations

It was resolved to extend congratulations to Rev. H. G. Forster, D.Th., on his election to the Presidency of the Hamilton Conference, and to Rev. H. D. Ranns on his election to the Presidency of the Saskatchewan Conference.

Sympathy

The Secretary was requested to extend sympathy on behalf of the Executive to the families of the following, who have recently passed away: Rev. T. G. Williams, who formerly served on aid-receiving charges in Saskatchewan; Mrs. W. T. Halpenny, wife of Rev. W. T. Halpenny, of Montreal; Mr. John Davies, who formerly served as lay supply in Northern Ontario; Rev. C. H. Morrison, who ministered in Alberta; Rev. J. E. Duclos, formerly missionary among the French in Northern Alberta; Mrs. Schrag, wife of the Rev. A. R. Schrag, Edmonton; and Mr. de Clercq, formerly on the staff of the Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute.

Report of Action of Executive of General Council

The Secretary reported that the Executive of the General Council had taken the following action on recommendations of the Board of Home Missions:

1. *Resolution re Radio*—
Adopted without change.
2. *Resolution re Sharing of Ministers*—
Commended to the attention of the city and town congregations of our Church.
3. *Resolution re Post War Immigration*—
Referred to the Commission on The Church, the Nation and World Order, for consideration.
4. *Resolution re Accelerated Summer Course for Students in 1944*—
The suggestion of a summer course for third year Theological Students, to be held in 1944, was approved; and a committee of three from the Executive was appointed to meet a similar committee to be named by the Chairman of the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and report to the autumn meeting of the Executive.
The committee appointed was as follows: Revs. Dr. A. Lloyd Smith, Leslie Pidgeon and Gordon Sisco.
5. *Resolution re Japanese in Canada*—
Resolution was adopted in substance. A small committee was appointed to change the wording in a few places and given power to submit the resolution, through the Committee, to the Prime Minister.

Dr. Dorey made a statement regarding changes which had taken place in the Japanese situation since the meeting of the Board.

Indian Residential Schools

Mount Elgin Residential School—

Dr. Dorey reported regarding the proposal made by the Dominion Government to close the Mount Elgin Residential School at the end of the present school year.

The Executive expressed the opinion that this action could not be taken without further consideration and agreed to co-operate with the Indian Affairs Branch in a proposed survey of the educational needs of the Indians in Ontario, urging that the survey be made as soon as possible and report made to the January meeting of the Executive.

Morley Residential School—

On motion, the Secretaries were authorized to pay to the Morley Indian Residential School an amount up to \$1,000 from unexpended balance of the amount received from the Government as a special grant to Residential Schools for 1942.

Alberni Residential Schools—

It was agreed that the Line of Credit of the Alberni Indian Residential School with the Bank of Montreal, Port Alberni, be increased from \$2,000 to \$4,000 and that the necessary resolution be inscribed in the Minutes.

Request For Appointment of Two Itinerant Missionaries In Saskatchewan

It was reported that the Saskatchewan Conference Home Mission Committee had adopted the Report of the Survey Commission of Saskatoon Presbytery, which recommended the appointment of an itinerant missionary for the northern part of the Province, and that the Saskatchewan Conference had amended this by requesting the appointment of two itinerant missionaries—one for the North and one for the South.

This was referred to the Secretaries for further study and correspondence with the Superintendents in Saskatchewan; report to be made to the Executive in September.

Bequest to the Vita Hospital Under the Will of the Late Janet A. Cruise

Dr. Dorey reported that, under the Will of the late Janet A. Cruise, the residue of her Estate (amounting to approximately \$30,000) was bequeathed to The United Church of Canada, to be used exclusively for the benefit of the Vita Hospital, and upon the further condition that the Hospital be renamed "The William Edmund Cruise and William Forestt Cruise Memorial Hospital."

It was agreed that the Secretaries be given power to accept the bequest on the conditions set forth, provided the Vita Hospital Board is in favor of this.

Licenses For Lay Supplies

1. On the recommendation of Miramichi Presbytery, it was agreed to recommend that the License to Administer the Sacraments granted to Mr. George Bennett, Lay Supply on the Matapedia charge, be renewed for one year.

2. No action was taken on the recommendation of Muskoka Presbytery that License to Administer the Sacraments be granted to Mr. C. H. Milton, Lay Supply on the Utterson charge.

3. The Executive recommended that Licenses be granted to the following lay missionaries supplying Indian fields in the Norway House Presbytery: Mr. Wm. Neufeldt, Island Lake; Mr. Wm. Dueck, Oxford House; and Mr. N. A. Dueck, Little Grand Rapids.

Radio Broadcasting

The Secretary presented the following Recommendations, which were adopted at the recent meeting of the Alberta Conference:

- (1) "We believe that the time has come when The United Church, by way of experiment, should set apart a few men for a distinctive Radio Ministry. The Radio Minister would serve a limited local area, supplement the work of our regular Ministers and Students and keep in touch with his constituency by occasional visitation for preaching, conducting special missions and for similar purposes.

"With the scarcity of ministers and the closing of many country appointments this might be a most effective time, of Home Mission Work. We therefore recommend to the Home Mission Board that such an experiment be undertaken, and we would respectfully suggest the Peace River area, centering in Grande Prairie, as a suitable district in which to make a beginning."

- (2) "We recommend that Sunday School by Air be established at Grande Prairie to broadcast regular lessons and programs; that a Sunday School by Post be part of the project to give the programs additional educational value; that a worker be put in charge to plan the programs, to handle the correspondence, to visit outlying areas and make personal contact; and that this recommendation be referred to the Board of Home Missions, the Woman's Missionary Society, and the Board of Evangelism and Social Service."

Referred to the Secretaries with power, with the understanding that they will consult with the Board of Christian Education and the Radio Commission, appointed by the Executive of the General Council.

Re Future Use of Nisbet Memorial School Home

A proposal was submitted from the Saskatchewan Conference Committee on Radio Broadcasting, asking the Board of Home Missions

"to consider the appointment of Rev. A. D. MacKenzie, D.D., to a radio ministry, through Prince Albert station CBKI, for a period beginning October 1st to April 30th, 1944," on the following conditions:

- (1) "That the Home Mission Board assume responsibility for the cost of the fee charged by CBKI for broadcasting; and
- (2) "For an allowance for travelling to various centres throughout the season in that part of the Province, the idea being that the Radio Ministry should be something more than just a weekly broadcast, embracing in its scope the visiting and formation of listening 'cells', discussion groups, worship centres, personal dealing, etc., and possibly something in the nature of religious education.
- (3) "That the Home Mission Board be requested to put the service of the Prince Albert School Home at the disposal of the experiment, at which Home Dr. MacKenzie and his family would reside."

It was also the hope of the Committee that the establishing of such a Radio Ministry would lend itself to the further establishment of a training school for lay workers.

It was agreed that this whole matter be referred to the Secretaries, with power, with the understanding that they will consult with the Board of Christian Education and the Radio Commission, appointed by the Executive of the General Council.

Hafford Hospital

An enquiry was received, through Dr. J. L. Nicol, from the Rural Municipality of Royal, as to what discount would be allowed on its debt of, approximately, \$1,500.00 to the Hafford Hospital. This was referred to the Secretaries, with power, pending further report from Dr. Nicol.

Woman Missionary-At-Large For Burin Presbytery

The request for the appointment of a woman missionary-at-large in the Burin Presbytery was referred to the Executive by the Board.

It was resolved to forward this request to The Woman's Missionary Society, with approval.

Toronto.....It was reported that the resignation of Miss Mina Barnes as Head Worker at St. Christopher House, had been received. The matter of a successor was referred to the Secretaries, for consultation with the Board of St. Christopher House.

Missionary Reference Library

The question of continuance of grant for rent of the Missionary Reference Library, and other expenses, after June 30th, was referred to the Secretaries for conference with Dr. Beaton and report to the fall meeting of the Executive.

Rural Work, Bursary

On the suggestion of the Chairman of the Rural Life Committee of the Board, the Executive adopted the following:

- (1) That, in place of the annual essay competition, a bursary of \$150.00 be granted to a minister who has given significant service to the rural church, to be used by him for a month's study at some centre to be determined by consultation with the Secretaries of the Board.
- (2) That this year's bursary be granted to a minister in the Maritime Conference, the appointment to be made by decision of the Board or its Executive.
- (3) That, for this year, the selection be made by the Secretaries and the Chairman of the Rural Life Committee, in consultation with the Superintendent of Missions and the representative on the Board of the Conference concerned.
- (4) That we recommend to the Board that, if possible, similar bursaries be made available annually for several years at least.

Rev. D. C. Amos and Work Along the Alaska Highway

The Secretary reported, for information, that from June 1st the Rev. D. C. Amos would serve the camps along the Alaska Highway on an inter-denominational basis, his salary being met by the Inter-Denominational Committee on Camp and War Production Communities.

Organization of Commission on City Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

The following suggestions, submitted by the Secretaries, were considered and approved in general, with the understanding that the Secretaries might make additions or amendments as they thought best:

- (1) That the Commission function in two sections—one in the East and one in the West, with a small Executive centering in Toronto.
- (2) That to avoid unnecessary travel, as much of the work as possible be done by questionnaire and correspondence.
- (3) That the Executive of the Commission prepare, as one of its first duties, a questionnaire which should go to City Institutions and those in charge of the Non-Anglo-Saxon rural work, and that when this questionnaire is completed it be considered separately by the Eastern and Western Sections.
- (4) That this Executive give consideration to the following names in connection with the *Eastern Section*: The Chairman, the Secretaries, Mr. K. M. Kilbourn, Mr. W. B. Cowan, Rev. J. C. Torrence, Mr. William Jardine, Rev. S. H. Greenslade, Rev. John MacDonald; and *Western Section*: Dr. J. A. Cormie, Dr. J. L. Nicol, Dr. J. C. Pincock, Rev. A. Cox, Rev. E. G. D. Freeman, Rev. J. E. Jones, Mr. A. J. Irving, Rev. E. G. Turnbull, and Rev. H. M. Rae.
- (5) That the Executive of the Commission consist of the members of the Board on the Commission who are resident in Toronto and the Chairman of the Board.

Request For Itinerant Missionary For Norfolk County

A request was received from the Haldimand-Norfolk Presbytery for the appointment of an Itinerant Missionary to carry on work among the New Canadians in Norfolk County.

The Executive decided to take no action at present.

Travelling Expenses of Men Serving Vacant Fields Adjoining Their Own Charges

A communication from Rev. Dr. R. J. McDonald raised the question of an allowance for travelling expenses to men giving some supply to vacant fields adjoining their own charges.

It was agreed to approve of the principle of making an allowance for such supply, the details to be left to the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned.

Property Claims

MIRAMICHI—

Matapedia.—The Executive agreed to the request that the loan be settled by payment of \$150.00 for three years.

MONTREAL—

Montreal, Hungarian.—It was agreed that \$1,000 from the proceeds of the sale of Community House be made available to help complete and equip the building which the Hungarians have purchased.

Pointe-Aux-Trembles French Institute.—The Town of Pointe aux Trembles offered to sell to the United Church a small piece of property adjacent to what is owned by the church, for \$1.00. Agreed to accept.

BELLEVILLE—

Baptiste, on Bancroft Charge.—A grant of \$150 was requested to assist in building a new church. Agreed.

COBOURG—

Batawa.—Presbytery formed a committee to co-operate with a local committee in getting plans and estimates for a new church. The Board was asked to assist in the necessary approaches to the Control Board to secure permission to put up the building and get material. Agreed.

SIMCOE—

Angus.—A report from a committee of Presbytery was received, in regard to provision to meet the need of the community created by the proximity to Camp Borden. A new building was requested, with suitable equipment. Referred to the Inter-Denominational Committee on Camp and War Production Communities.

TORONTO CENTRE—

Toronto, Church of All Nations.—A grant of \$150 was requested to re-arrange the front of the lower chapel in order to make it more attractive and give more space. Agreed, subject to Presbytery action.

Toronto, Royce Ave. Church.—\$100.00 was asked for painting, plastering, whitewashing and repairs to fence. Agreed, subject to Presbytery action.

BRUCE—

Cape Croker Parsonage.—The Home Mission Convener reported that wire screening, paint and wallpaper were needed—cost \$12.00. Allowed.

SUDBURY—

Levack.—A grant of \$500 and a loan of \$1,500 were asked for a new church. Agreed; subject to Presbytery action.

ALGOMA—

Wawa.—Presbytery endorsed an application for a grant of \$85 to repair the roof of the church. No action.

ESSEX—

Windsor, St. James.—A grant of \$700 was asked towards the cost of moving the church to a better site. Referred to the Secretaries, with power, on receipt of Presbytery action.

LAMBTON—

Lots Near Synthetic Rubber Plant, Sarnia.—Presbytery recommended the purchase of eight lots at \$75.00 each. Agreed.

St. Clair Parsonage.—A grant was requested for repairs to the well and for shingles to repair the roof—estimated cost \$30.00. Later information said wind had caused more damage and \$50.00 would be needed. Agreed.

CARMAN—

Indian Springs.—(a) Superintendent reported that eavestroughs, chimney repairs and papering were required, amounting to \$13.00. Agreed. (b) There was also a request for \$24.00 for changing the kitchen doors. This was referred to the next Executive.

ABERNETHY—

Dubuc.—The Executive agreed to the request that payment of \$100.00 each year for three years be accepted in full settlement of the loan.

ELROSE—

Dunblane.—In 1938, it was agreed to give credit for \$2.00 for every \$1.00 paid on the loan, provided the debt was paid in the next five years. This period has expired and an extension of three years is asked to complete payments. Allowed.

EDMONTON—

Fort McMurray.—The Superintendent has suggested the sale of the Church for \$100.00 to the Anglicans, who are now using it as a hall. Agreed, subject to approval of Presbytery.

MEDICINE HAT—

Redcliff.—The Executive agreed to accept \$500 in full settlement of the loan, the Board to hold the Title.

ST. PAUL—

Edward Land.—An offer of \$300 has been received for 40 acres. It was agreed to accept.

KOOTENAY—

Lemon Creek, Japanese.—A grant of \$100 was asked to repair the building used for kindergarten and church purposes; the W.M.S. to provide a similar amount and the Security Commission to provide the lumber. Agreed.

Nakusp.—A grant of \$200 was requested for repairing and redecorating the church. No action.

PRINCE RUPERT—

Port Essington, Nurses' Home.—It was agreed to accept an offer of \$250.00 for this building.

Port Simpson.—A grant of \$33 was asked to connect the water system of the mission house with the village system. Agreed.

"Thomas Crosby".—The Marine Committee reported repairs amounting to \$82.20. Allowed.

VANCOUVER—

Vancouver, Japanese Mission, Powell St.—Repairs to the heating system are necessary, but cost not stated. Referred to the Secretaries.

Vancouver, Columbia St. House.—A request was received for a grant of \$65.49 to cover the 1943 taxes. Agreed.

Cape Mudge.—A grant of \$50 was asked for repairs to the plumbing system and the steps of the mission house. Agreed.

"Melvin Swartout".—It was reported that the total repairs to this boat amounted to \$416.05, which the Board was asked to pay from the proceeds of the sale. Agreed.

VICTORIA—

Victoria, First Baptist Church.—A request was received that \$6,000, plus interest due in June, be accepted in full settlement of loan; payment to be made immediately. Agreed.

THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS

OCTOBER 21st, 1943

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Committee Room of the Home Mission Offices, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Thursday, October 21st, 1943, at 10:00 a.m., the Chairman presiding.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. Fred Mann.

Members present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., R. B. Cochrane, D.D., George Dorey, D.D., M. C. Macdonald, J.G. Gorwill, S. H. Greenslade, Messrs. Fred Mann, J. F. Maine and K. M. Kilbourn.

Regrets were presented from Rev. J. J. Black.

Appointment of Minute Secretary

Rev. S. H. Greenslade was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) Rev. D. C. MacGregor, in acknowledgment of greetings from the Board.
- (2) Rev. W. T. Halpenny, of Montreal, and Mrs. J. E. Duclos, of Edmonton, in appreciation of sympathy extended by the Executive.
- (3) Rev. H. D. Ranns, in appreciation of congratulations from the Executive on his election to the presidency of the Saskatchewan Conference.
- (4) The Alberta Conference Hospital Board, expressing appreciation of the Board's action in granting \$5,000 towards reduction of the Lamont Hospital Bank loan.
- (5) The Home Mission Committee of the British Columbia Conference and the Presbytery of Twillingate, expressing gratitude to the

Board for the additional \$100.00 granted towards salaries of men on aid-receiving charges.

- (6) Oxford Presbytery, commending the Board of Home Missions for its part in the inauguration of the project "The Sunday School in the Home—By Mail and Air."
- (7) Rev. W. O. Fennell, on behalf of the Board of Stewards of the Levack charge, Sudbury Presbytery, thanking the Home Mission Board for its loan and grant towards the erection of a church at Levack.
- (8) The Prime Minister of Canada, acknowledging resolution of the Executive of the General Council with regard to the Japanese in Canada.
- (9) The Treasurer of the United Church, reporting Legacies credited to Home Mission Reserve for the six months ended June 30th—\$17,066.39, and for the quarter ended September 30th—\$30,200.84.

Sympathy

The Secretaries were requested to extend the sympathy of the Executive to Dr. and Mrs. G. E. Darby, whose son was killed overseas; to Mrs. Gibson on the death of her husband, Rev. W. H. Gibson, who served for many years on Indian Missions in British Columbia; to the son and daughters of the late Mrs. J. W. McConnell, wife of the former Superintendent of Missions in the Maritime Conference, who recently passed away; to Rev. W. E. Sieber, of Carseland, Alberta, on the death of his wife; and to Mrs. Black, on the death of her husband, Rev. Bishop Black, who served on several Indian Mission fields in British Columbia.

The Secretaries were also directed to write to Rev. S. S. Osterhout, D.D., expressing the sincere regret of the Executive on learning of his serious accident and their hopes for a complete recovery; and to Rev. W. D. Noyes, D.D., expressing pleasure on hearing of his progress towards recovery after a serious illness.

Felicitations to Mr. Fred Mann

The Executive extended felicitations to Mr. Fred Mann on the recent celebration of his seventy-fifth birthday.

Thanks to Ministers Who Supplied Aid-Receiving Charges

On motion, the Executive expressed its gratitude to the following ministers, who supplied aid-receiving charges during the holidays, thus enabling the pastors of these fields to have a vacation: Rev. R. B. Cumming of Salford, who supplied Horton-Calabogie, in the Renfrew Presbytery; Rev. W. L. Davidson, of Tillsonburg, who supplied Matheson, in the Cochrane Presbytery; and Rev. G. W. Kaiser, of Plattsville, who supplied Nipissing in the North Bay Presbytery.

The Executive also suggested that the Secretary see that suitable publicity is given to this in the Church press.

Grant to John Milton Society for the Blind

On motion, it was decided to make a grant of \$20.00 to the John Milton Society for the Blind.

Resolutions of the B.C. Conference Re Education and Support of Students

The Secretary presented certain resolutions in regard to the education and support of students, adopted by the British Columbia Conference Committee on Education and Students and approved by Conference.

It was directed that the thanks of the Executive be conveyed to the British Columbia Conference for its interest in this matter, and that it be pointed out that practically all their requests are part of the administrative policy of the Board of Home Missions.

Summer Session For Theological Students

Confirmation of Payment—

The Executive confirmed the action of the Secretary in transferring to the Special Fund for the expenses of the Summer Session for Theological Students the sum of \$6,000, which was placed in the appropriations of the Board of Home Missions for this purpose.

Request for Additional Grant—

A request was presented from the Executive of the Board of Finance for an additional grant of \$2,000 towards the cost of the Summer Session. It was decided that no action should be taken at present.

Request For Itinerant Missionaries in Saskatchewan

The Executive had before it a reference from the Executive of June 21st, 1943, relative to the request of Saskatchewan Conference for the appointment of two itinerant missionaries. After hearing a statement from the Secretaries, who had been asked to give consideration to the matter, the following resolution was adopted.

Whereas the Executive has received the Report of a Survey Commission appointed by the Saskatoon Presbytery, to which Dr. Nicol referred at the time of the Board meeting; and also a letter from Dr. Nicol, explaining just what is in the mind of the Committee in connection with the term travelling missionary;

And Whereas the Executive has received from the Saskatchewan Conference the following resolution:

- "(1) That as a fruitful experiment a representative of the Church, properly equipped and financed, should be sent into a selected area; one in the north and one in the south of the Province, to work as itinerant missionaries. Their observations, their successes, and failures would be valuable as a basis for further work when more men are available, for more extensive operations, after the war.

"(2) And that this work be done under a plan of co-operation between the Departments of Home Missions and Christian Education."

Therefore Be It Resolved That, in view of the fact that the Saskatchewan Conference has a large number of vacancies, and whilst in no way minimizing the needs revealed by the Report—

1. We express our appreciation to the Committee in Saskatoon for its work in connection with the preliminary survey of certain districts in Northern Saskatchewan.

2. We express our confidence in Dr. Nicol as the Superintendent of Missions responsible for the work of the United Church in the northern part of the Province. We would assure Dr. Nicol that we realize that even his almost superhuman endurance and energy is not sufficient to overtake the work which has been placed upon him, and hope that the time may come before long when it will be possible for the Board to appoint additional help for our greatly overworked Superintendents of Missions all through the Church.

3. As a temporary measure, rather than appointing a man, Dr. Nicol be asked to confer with the Secretaries with a view to having a certain amount of money made available to enable Conveners of Presbyteries or ministers designated by them to continue the survey of certain areas already begun, with a view to providing Dr. Nicol and the Presbyteries and the Conference Committee with information that would be necessary to determine future policy in connection with the placing of ministers.

4. This whole matter, together with the proposal in regard to Southern Saskatchewan, be referred to the Board of Home Missions for further consideration.

Hospital Work

Vita Hospital—

It was agreed to increase travel allowance of the Medical Superintendent by \$100.00; the matter to be reviewed at the meeting of the Board.

George McDougall Hospital—

It was agreed to vote an extra \$100.00 travel allowance to the Medical Superintendent in connection with trips to Vilna; the matter to be reviewed at the meeting of the Board.

R. W. Large Memorial Hospital, Bella Bella—

A request was presented from the Hospital Board for increase in the salary of the Medical Superintendent and of the Matron.

It was decided (1) that the request for increase in the salary of the Superintendent should be referred to the Board; and (2) that increase in the salary of the Matron to \$130.00 per month, less board, should be authorized.

Port Simpson Hospital—

Dr. Dorey reported that Dr. Fiddes, the Superintendent, had desired to be released for military service, but had been directed by the Medical Procurement Board to remain at Port Simpson. It was agreed to give the Secretaries authority to grant leave of absence to Dr. Fiddes, in the event of a suitable supply being secured.

Wrinch Memorial Hospital, Hazelton—

The Executive approved of the appointment of Miss Myrtle MacLeod, R.N., as Matron.

Non-Anglo-Saxon Work*Kirkland Lake, All Peoples' Mission—*

The Executive confirmed the action of the Secretaries, who in conformity with the recommendation of the Executive of the Temiskaming Presbytery, have asked the Rev. J. R. MacCrimmon, retired minister, to supply the work; act as Interim Chairman of the Official Board of the Teck Township charge; have jurisdiction over Miss Hjelt, the Finnish Worker, and her work; offer to Miss Matthews, the W.M.S. Community Worker, such direction as she would seek; and conduct the survey of the south-west section of Kirkland Lake, mentioned on Page 98, Digest of Minutes, 1943.

Re Sale of Shaw Memorial Church, Montreal—

It was reported that the Shaw Memorial Church, which formerly housed the Italian Congregation in Montreal, has been sold. The Secretaries were given authority to take whatever action may be necessary.

Lakehead Mission—

The Superior Presbytery requested that the work in War Industries be operated on an inter-denominational basis and that another Deaconess be appointed to complete the staff of the Lakehead Mission. This was referred to the Secretaries.

Difficulties of New Canadians re Naturalization—

A communication was presented from the Superintendent of the Church of All Nations, Toronto, calling attention to the difficulties facing New Canadians who wish to become naturalized.

It was decided to refer to the Committee on The Church, the Nation and World Order the whole question of pressing upon the Federal Government the necessity for revision of its policy with regard to the naturalization of foreigners who desire to become Canadian citizens; and to refer to the Secretaries for conference with Mr. Smith any particular cases which he may wish to discuss with them.

Indian Work*Alberni Residential School—*

(1) *Financial Situation.*—A request for increase in the Line of Credit with the Bank from \$4,000 to \$6,000 was presented. It was

decided to take no action with regard to this request; but to refer the whole question of the financial situation of the School to the Secretaries, with power.

(2) *Resignation of Principal*.—A letter, submitting his resignation, was presented from Rev. R. C. Scott, Principal of the School. It was agreed that letter be received; that the Secretaries be asked to express to Mr. Scott, on behalf of the Executive, its sincere appreciation of his services; and that the whole matter be referred to the Secretaries for consideration and report to the next meeting of the Executive. 0

Marine Work

"Thomas Crosby IV"—

The appointment of Mr. J. Pittman Moore as Engineer, to succeed Mr. E. J. Avery, who has recently resigned, was approved; and the Secretaries were asked to give further consideration to the whole question of the personnel of the boat.

Statement Re Use of Nisbet School Home by Rev. A. D. MacKenzie, D.D.

Dr. Dorey reported that in accordance with the authority given to the Secretaries at the previous meeting of the Executive, the following proposals had been submitted to the Saskatchewan Conference Radio Committee with regard to the use of the Nisbet School Home by Dr. MacKenzie in connection with his proposed Bible School and Radio Ministry, and that some misunderstanding had arisen with regard to the interpretation of Item 4 (b) :-

1. That the Board of Home Missions is willing to put the premises known as the Nisbet School Home, together with its equipment, at the disposal of the Saskatchewan Conference Radio Committee for the purpose outlined in the correspondence: that is to say, Dr. MacKenzie will live in the Home and he will carry on a Bible School for young people and lay workers for longer or shorter periods as may be found possible. He will also carry on such a radio ministry as may be found possible; the Committee to be responsible for the finances. Dr. MacKenzie will also visit as many communities as he will find possible, both in connection with his Radio Ministry, and in general to make religious contacts with those communities in which there are no organized United Church services.
2. It is expected that the Saskatchewan Conference Radio Committee will at once get in touch with the City Council at Prince Albert, to secure a continuation of the rebate of taxes which is now being made on the basis that the building will continue to be used for educational purposes.
3. That, in case the City does not continue this rebate, the Board of Home Missions will be responsible for these taxes.
4. The Board of Home Missions does not assume any responsibility for the payment of any expenses in connection with the whole project, except as follows:
 - (a) The Board will assume the expenses of Dr. MacKenzie in visiting outlying communities, which expenses will be paid at the same rate as for Superintendents of Missions; and
 - (b) Such remuneration to Dr. MacKenzie as may be agreed upon between himself, the Superintendent of Missions, and the Board.
 - (c) The Board will also assume responsibility for the premises being in such repair as will make it possible for them to be used during the coming winter.
5. The present arrangement is to continue until June 30th, 1944, it being understood that the whole matter will be reviewed by the Board of Home Missions at its next Annual Meeting.

On motion, the report was received and adopted, with the understanding that the interpretation of Clause 4 (b) be as follows:

That the remuneration of Dr. MacKenzie be for preaching services and visitation on a basis to be arranged by the Superintendent of Missions and the Secretaries.

Special Licenses For Lay Supplies

The Executive recommended that—

- (1) On the recommendation of the Alberta Conference Home Mission Committee, License to administer the Sacraments, in the case of Mr. Bernard Richards, lay supply on the Evansburg charge, Edmonton Presbytery, be renewed for one year.
- (2) License to administer the Sacraments be granted to Mr. Alfred Kroeker, lay missionary on the Nelson House Indian Mission, Norway House Presbytery, for one year.

Date of Board Meeting

It was decided that the date of the Annual Meeting of the Board of Home Missions should be set for March 29th, 1944.

Difficulty of Securing Cars

The Secretary reported regarding the difficulty experienced by newly ordained ministers in securing cars to carry on their work, particularly in the West. It was decided to refer the matter to the Board.

Basis For Advances on Grants For 1944

It was directed that advances on grants for the first quarter of 1944 should be made on the basis of the 1943 grants.

Basis For Applications by Presbyteries

It was decided to instruct Presbyteries to make applications for grants for 1944 on the same basis as for 1943.

Representation at Meeting of Home Missions Council

It was agreed that two representatives of the Board should attend the Annual Meeting of the Home Missions Council, to be held January 9-11, 1944, of whom one should be the Secretary of the Board; decision regarding the other representative being left to the Secretaries.

Property Claims

BURIN—

Pool's Cove, "Mary Cunningham".—Payment of \$550.00, being half the cost of a new engine and reconditioning and equipment of this boat, was confirmed.

MONTREAL—

Mont Laurier.—A grant of \$82.00 was asked for repairs to the parsonage. Agreed.

Pointe-Aux-Trembles French Institute.—It was reported that an emergency having arisen in the summer in connection with the heating

plant, a new boiler had been authorized at a cost of \$1,135.00. Action was confirmed.

St. Columba House.—Agreed to allow grant up to \$300.00 from Property Fund for purchase of furniture for the manse.

KINGSTON—

Zion Manse Loan.—It was agreed that any payment made this year would be applied on principal, and that no interest would be charged for 1943.

Rama.—The Home Mission Committee of Presbytery recommended providing a new cook stove and repairs to the septic tank. Referred to Secretaries.

TORONTO WEST—

Toronto, Royce Ave. Ukrainian Church.—Agreed to vote an additional \$350 for repairs, subject to action of Presbytery.

ALGOMA—

Sault Ste. Marie, 130 Hudson Street.—It was reported that a new furnace was required for this house, to cost \$195.00. Agreed.

LAMBERTON—

St. Clair Indian Mission.—Presbytery recommended a new furnace for the parsonage, at a cost of \$195.00. Agreed.

Sarnia, Lots Near Synthetic Rubber Plant.—It was reported that, due to a change in conditions, Presbytery now recommends that the matter of taking up an option on the lots be held in abeyance. It was agreed that the grant voted for this purpose be considered as lapsed—any new application to be considered on its merits.

MIDDLESEX—

London, Friendship House.—The Property Committee reported that repairs are necessary to the floor in the basement—estimated cost about \$145.00. Referred to Secretaries, subject to action of Presbytery.

Oneida Parsonage.—Presbytery recommended that the proceeds of the sale of the Colborne parsonage be made available for repairs to the Oneida parsonage. Agreed.

CARMAN—

Indian Springs.—The changing of the doors of the kitchen of the parsonage, at an estimated cost of \$24.00, was agreed to.

NORWAY HOUSE—

Cross Lake.—(1) Storehouse: A grant of \$150 was asked to make a storehouse. Agreed. (2) Church: It was reported that repairs to the foundation and a new roof were required. Agreed. (3) Parsonage: It was reported that the following were required: Repairs to the foundation, painting, stove pipes, storm sash, linoleum and a mattress. Agreed.

Gods' Lake.—The Superintendent recommended the purchase of 1,000 feet of lumber to repair the roofs of some of the outbuildings, at a cost of \$12.00. Agreed.

Oxford House.—(1) It was agreed to confirm payment of \$26.85, authorized by Secretaries, for furnishings, and to authorize purchase of new plates for fire box. (2) Payment of a bill of \$35.00, submitted by Superintendent for work on outhouses, incurred by previous missionary, was confirmed.

WINNIPEG—

Winnipeg, Martin Ave.—A proposal was submitted that the manse be sold and the proceeds be accepted as settlement of the debt on the Martin Ave. church and manse, as well as of the debt on Morse Place.

Agreed to accept the proceeds of the sale of the Martin Ave. manse as full settlement of the debt on the Martin Ave. church and manse, only.

North Winnipeg Mission.—(1) Sutherland Ave.—Replacement of the partitions and platform in the shower room was authorized; also a door to replace a window. (2) Stella Ave.—Presbytery recommended that a fence should be put on the east and south side of the property and another high fence cut down about two feet—at a cost of \$115.00. Agreed.

ELROSE—

Beechy.—Presbytery recommended that if \$1,200.00 is paid by the end of 1943, this be regarded as full liquidation of the debt. Agreed.

KAMSACK—

Kelvington.—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$500.00 and a loan of \$300.00 for the purchase of a manse to cost \$2,800.00—this to be allowed when the proper papers have been received. Agreed.

PRINCE ALBERT WEST—

Porcupine Plains.—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$400.00 towards the erection of a church to cost \$1,000. Agreed.

SHAUNAVON—

Eastend.—Presbytery recommended that \$1,000 be accepted to cancel the debt in full. Agreed; provided this be paid in 1943.

EDMONTON—

Edmonton, Bissell Institute.—Presbytery recommended that a grant of \$125.00 be made for decorating the church and lounge. Agreed.

Sangudo.—Presbytery recommended that \$250. a year for four years be accepted as payment in full of the debt on the church and manse; the first payment to be made in 1944. Agreed.

LACOMBE—

Hobbema, Parsonage.—In the summer, the Secretaries authorized an outlay for floor covering for the kitchen. An expenditure of \$33.00 was confirmed.

RED DEER—

Burnt Lake.—The Presbyterian Church has received a recommendation from one of the Alberta Presbyteries that \$50.00 be accepted in full repayment of grant of \$100 that was given in 1905 by the Church and Manse Board to a Scandinavian congregation now defunct. The Executive agreed to the proposal, on the understanding that the \$50.00 be divided on the basis of 66% to the United Church and 34% to the Presbyterian Church.

KAMLOOPS—

Kamloops, Chinese Mission House.—Presbytery requested a grant up to \$200 to repair the house, which is in an unsafe condition. Agreed.

PRINCE RUPERT—

"Thomas Crosby".—The Executive confirmed payment of two accounts totalling \$234.20, for overhaul and repairs to this boat during the summer.

Terrace.—A grant of \$400.00 was requested to put the church on a new cement foundation, when the basement can be used for a social centre for the armed forces, for Sunday School, etc., the congregation to raise a similar amount. Agreed to vote this amount.

VICTORIA—

Cumberland, Japanese.—The Executive approved of the sale of this building for \$75.00.

Pender Island.—Presbytery recommended a grant up to \$50 towards repairs of the tank and pipes of the water system. No action.

WESTMINSTER—

New Westminster, Chinese Church.—Approval was given to the action of the Secretaries in selling the pews from this church to Burnaby Lake congregation for \$20.00.

YARMOUTH—

North East Harbor.—No action was taken on request for grant to assist in securing certain equipment for the manse.

MONTREAL—

Montreal, L'Eglise Unie du Sauveur.—Grant at rate of \$900.00 was voted to end of the year.

Montreal, St. Columba House.—Agreed to confirm payment of salary to the new Superintendent, Rev. J. K. Brown, at rate of \$1,600.00.

St. Ola.—(a) Agreed to make an additional grant of \$35.00 to Mr. James Wood for supply during last winter. (b) Agreed to vote grant at rate of \$525.00, plus \$25.00 for travel, for M.L.S. (c) Agreed to confirm advance of \$16.00 made towards moving expenses.

LINDSAY—

Kinmount.—Payment of \$7.10 made towards moving expenses was confirmed.

COCHRANE—

Hunta-Clute.—Agreed to allow \$72.81 on account of deficit in salary of lay supply.

Nakina.—A deficit of \$119.08 in salary paid the minister by the charge for the period, July, 1942, to May 30th, 1943, was reported. Referred to Secretaries for action.

MUSKOKA—

Otter Lake.—It was reported that there was a deficit of \$26.27 in salary of lay supply from the field for 11 Sundays in September quarter. Allowed.

LAMBTON—

St. Clair, Indian.—No action was taken on recommendation of Presbytery that salary grant be at rate of \$1,600.00 for the year 1943-44.

BIRTLE—

Bird Tail Reserve.—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$150.00 to reimburse Rev. H. I. Bowman for services to this Reserve, formerly under the Presbyterian Church but, by recent resolution of their Mission Board, transferred to the care of the United Church. Referred to Secretaries, with power.

BATTLEFORD—

Glaslyn: Travel Grant.—Agreed that grant could be made only for Sunday travel on the field, this to be paid when the distance is reported.

Pierceland: Travel Grant.—Agreed to continue travel grant of \$100.00 and that Sunday mileage should be reported.

ELROSE—

Rural Dinsmore.—It was agreed that the High School teacher who carried on vacation schools in several school districts should be paid at student rates for the five weeks she served.

PRINCE ALBERT WEST—

Nisbet Memorial School House.—Agreed to vote grant to cover net deficit of approximately \$309.42, as revealed by final audit.

SHAUNAVON—

Supply of Buffalo Horn and Hillandale from Cadillac.—Presbytery asked five cents a mile, from collections at these points (balance of collections to go on salary) for the extra 77 miles, fortnightly, which Mr. Sargent drives to serve these points.

It was agreed that the Board should decide on the principle to be adopted in regard to travel grants of this kind; but that in the meantime an additional allowance at the rate of \$100.00 should be made.

SWIFT CURRENT—

Empress.—Agreed to increase grant to rate of \$650.00 for M.O.

CALGARY—

Carseland.—Presbytery asked for sympathetic consideration of the case of Rev. W. E. Sieber, who had very heavy expenses because of the long illness of his wife. The Executive regretted that there was no fund at its disposal to meet such cases and referred the whole problem which is raised by this resolution of Calgary Presbytery to the earnest consideration of the Board at its next meeting.

EDMONTON—

Ministik (formerly New Sarepta).—Agreed to allow grant of \$3.00 per fortnight for supply from College.

B.C. CONFERENCE—

Marine Work.—Request for payment of bill of \$38.55 for work done on the "Melvin Swartout" was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

KOOTENAY—

Michel.—Agreed to pay \$15.00 towards moving expenses.

Ymir Manse Furniture.—The question of storage of the manse furniture and payment of costs was referred to the Secretaries.

VANCOUVER—

First Church, Sick Leave for Miss Henderson.—It was reported that it was necessary for Miss Henderson to take a complete rest for a month or six weeks. Payment of October salary was confirmed and it was decided to continue salary to end of December; future action to be determined later.

VICTORIA—

Cowichan Lake.—Agreed to vote \$100.00 towards moving expenses.

Ucluelet.—Agreed that grant at rate of \$350.00 be continued to end of year to the widow of Rev. Bishop Black, who died July 5th.

DIGEST OF MINUTES
THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS
JANUARY 27th, 1944

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Committee Room of the Home Mission Offices, on Thursday, January 27th, 1944, at 9:30 a.m.

In the absence of the Chairman, Rev. S. H. Greenslade was appointed to the Chair.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. Greenslade.

Members present: Revs. S. H. Greenslade, R. B. Cochrane, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, J. G. Gorwill, Messrs. Fred Mann and J. C. Pinch.

Corresponding Members: Revs. J. I. MacKay, James A. Lyttle and J. C. Torrance, Superintendents of Missions, were made corresponding members.

Regrets: Regrets for absence were presented from the Chairman, Rev. A. Lloyd Smith, Rev. J. J. Black, Mr. K. M. Kilbourn and Mr. R. S. Dunlop.

Minute Secretary: Rev. J. G. Gorwill was appointed Minute Secretary.

Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (a) Mrs. Jean Gregory, daughter of the late Mrs. J. W. McConnell, Dr. G. E. Darby, and Mrs. Bishop Black—in acknowledgment of letters of sympathy sent on behalf of the Executive.
- (b) The Secretary of the John Milton Society for the Blind, New York, in appreciation of grant voted by the Executive.

- (c) Rev. C. W. Badger, of Pense, Sâsk., announcing that his field will become self-sustaining this year and expressing the thanks of his people for assistance received from the Board in past years.

Letters of Sympathy

The Secretary was requested to send letters of sympathy on behalf of the Executive to the families of the following, who have recently passed away:

Whelen; Mrs. Parsons, wife of Mr. Abel Parsons, lay missionary on the Newtown charge, Newfoundland; Mrs. Dudoward, of Port Simpson, B.C.; Mrs. Neufeld, wife of Rev. H. Neufeld, Winnipeg; Rev. Archibald McNeill; and Mr. J. A. McLaren.

Request For Additional Amounts For Pension Fund For 1943

Dr. Cochrane reported that a request had been received from the Secretary of the Department of Pensions that the Board of Home Missions, under Section 234 of the Manual—in addition to the payments it now makes on behalf of the Secretaries, the Superintendents of Missions, and Principals of Residential Schools—pay the employer's equivalent on behalf of a number of other ministers serving in certain city institutions.

On motion, it was resolved to acquaint Dr. J. C. Cochrane with the fact that the Executive is of the opinion that his interpretation of the clause of the Manual in question is at least debatable, and that the Executive suggests that representatives of the Pensions Department go with representatives of the Board of Home Missions to the Judicial Committee, through the Sub-Executive of the General Council or other proper channel, for the purpose of securing the judgment of that Committee on the interpretation of this clause in relation to the ministers in question.

Short Course of Instruction For Lay Supplies in the Bay of Quinte Conference

Rev. J. I. MacKay submitted a suggestion regarding the holding of a short course of instruction for lay supplies in the Bay of Quinte Conference.

On motion, the Executive approved the suggestion as an experiment and decided to grant an amount sufficient to cover railway fare, plus \$10.00 expenses, for each man. The Executive instructed the Superintendent to secure a full attendance of the lay supplies of the Conference. Arrangements for the carrying out of the project were left with Rev. J. I. MacKay and Rev. M. C. Macdonald.

Special Licence For Lay Missionary

On motion, it was agreed to approve the renewal for one year of the licence of Mr. Herbert Lander, lay missionary, to administer the Sacrament of Baptism on the Alderville Indian Mission.

Summer Session For Candidates For the Ministry

It was decided to make a grant of \$6,000 towards the cost of the summer session for Theological Students in 1944.

The Executive expressed the opinion that it would be more businesslike if the Board were furnished with a detailed financial statement of the Expenditures.

Grant to Inter-Board Committee on Sunday School in the Home by Mail and Air

The Executive voted a grant of \$398.22 to cover this Board's share of cost of supplies, administration, etc., for 1943 in connection with the work of the Inter-Board Committee on Sunday School in the Home by Mail and Air.

Post War Immigration

The Executive of the General Council referred to the Board of Home Missions, for careful study and report to the next meeting of the Executive of the General Council a resolution of Halifax Presbytery, "demanding a more aggressive policy on the part of the General Council's Executive and the Home Mission Board of our Church regarding post-war immigration."

It was decided to appoint a committee, consisting of Revs. George Dorey, M. C. MacDonald, J. I. MacKay, John A. Cormie, Messrs. K. M. Kilbourn, A. J. Irving and J. C. Pinch, to consider this whole question and report to the Board.

Suggestion of Executive of Board of Finance Re Amendment of Section 200 (c) of the Manual

It was reported that at the last meeting of the Executive of General Council, the following recommendation, submitted by the Executive of the Board of Finance, was referred to the Boards concerned for consideration, the findings of the Boards to be reported to the Sub-Executive which will be responsible for reporting on the matter to the next meeting of the Executive of General Council:

"That the Executive of General Council petition General Council to amend that section of the Manual dealing with the duties of the Department of the Treasury by striking out Section 200 (c) and substituting for it the following:

'To invest and re-invest the funds of the Church and its Boards; to sell, transfer, exchange, mortgage, hypothecate, lease or otherwise deal with property real and personal, held

or hereafter acquired by the United Church, except such thereof as is now or has been formerly held for the use and occupation of The United Church of Canada; to effect or enter into settlement of claims made against any estate in which The United Church of Canada has an interest.'

"And that such other changes be made in the Manual as to bring it into harmony with such action by General Council."

On motion, it was resolved to refer this matter to the Secretaries for consultation with the Secretaries of the other Boards concerned and with the Treasurer, with a view to action before the Executive of General Council, and report to the Board.

Rural Work

Proposals of Committee on Rural Work—

The Chairman of the Committee on Rural Work submitted certain suggestions regarding the holding of a rural conference in Toronto at the time of the meeting of the Board.

On motion, it was resolved that we authorize an attempt to co-operate with proposed rural conference at the time of the meeting of the Board and leave the matter of arrangements to the Committee on Rural Work.

Recommendation re Joint Committee on Rural Work—

A resolution was presented from the Committee on Christian Education of Adults of the Board of Christian Education, recommending to the Board of Christian Education, the Board of Home Missions, the Board of Evangelism and Social Service and The Woman's Missionary Society that "in the interests of more effective Christian work in rural areas, a joint committee on the work and welfare of the Rural Church should be appointed."

It was agreed to name four representatives—Rev. J. G. Gorwill and the Secretaries—to a joint conference with the other Boards concerned; report to be made to the Board of Home Missions.

Financial Arrangements Re Commission on Radio

The Secretary reported that the Executive of General Council had directed that the Boards of Christian Education, Home Missions, Evangelism and Social Service, and the Office of the General Council, pay the expenses of the Commission on Church and Radio on a pro rata basis of the total appropriation allowed to each Board, and that on this basis the Board of Home Missions was requested to pay 40%.

The Executive agreed to approve of this arrangement, but to notify the Commission that it does so on the understanding that this applies only to the organization work of the Commission between now and General Council.

Appreciation of Gifts

The Secretary was requested to express the appreciation of the Executive to Rev. W. D. Noyes, D.D., for his gift of Victory Bonds,

totalling \$300.00, to the Board of Home Missions; and to Rev. Thomas Powell, D.D., for his annuity gift of \$1,000.

Scholarships For City Mission Superintendents

It was decided that for 1944 the Scholarships for the Superintendents of City Mission Institutions should be offered to—Rev. J. T. Stephens, Edmonton; Rev. W. H. Pike, Hamilton; and Rev. F. L. H. Stymiest, Sault Ste. Marie.

In the event of a Scholarship, being declined by any of the Superintendents named, the Secretaries were authorized to offer it to some of the other Superintendents of Institutions.

Indian Work

Survey, Educational Needs, Western Ontario—

Dr. Dorey presented a progress report on the Survey of the Educational Needs of the Indians in Ontario and their relation to the Mount Elgin Residential School. This was received for information.

Albarni Residential School—

Re Resignation of Principal: It was agreed (a) that the question of Rev. R. C. Scott's resignation be left with the Secretaries, to be dealt with after Dr. Dorey's coming visit to Albarni; and (b) that, in the event of the acceptance of Mr. Scott's resignation, the Secretaries be given authority to have conference regarding the nomination of a successor and to make a recommendation to the Board.

Oriental Work

Dr. Dorey reported that Mr. G. E. Trueman, who is in charge of the re-location of Japanese in Ontario, had expressed the view that a great deal of assistance could be given to the Japanese in Ontario if some missionary were released to work amongst them, for a period of three or four months.

On motion, the Secretaries were empowered to arrange with Rev. W. P. Bunt for the release of Rev. K. Shimizu from Kaslo, to work in Ontario and Quebec for a period of four months beginning with March 1st; the understanding being that Mr. Shimizu shall work under the direction of the Secretaries, and that in areas where there is a Superintendent of Missions, he shall also be under the direction of the Superintendent.

Missionary Reference Library

The Executive decided to continue for the twelve months ending June 30th, 1944, payment of \$200.00 towards rent and upkeep of the Missionary Reference Library.

Student Missionaries

Report re Payment—

Rev. M. C. MacDonald reported that student missionaries had been

paid at the rate of \$14.50 per week for their summer's work—an increase of \$1.50 over the previous year, leaving in the account a credit balance of \$701.13.

Appointment of Students—

Authority was given to the Secretaries to appoint Students to summer fields in 1944 prior to the meeting of the Board in March.

Appointment

It was agreed to approve the appointment of Miss Muriel C. Richardson as Deaconess to First Church, Vancouver, to succeed Miss B. Henderson, who had resigned.

Membership of Commission on City Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

On motion, it was decided to add Mrs. C. M. Loveys to the membership of the Commission on City Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work.

Property Claims

BURIN—

Pool's Cove.—The request for a new boat, to take the place of the "Mary Cunningham," was referred to the Secretaries.

CARBONEAR—

Old Perlican.—Request was made to have the whole debt on the church cancelled. No action.

ST. JOHN'S—

North West River.—It was agreed to accept \$150.00 to be paid in 1944, as full settlement of the loan.

MONTREAL—

St. Columba House.—The Home Mission Committee of Presbytery recommended that the Board establish some permanent figure at which the debt be carried without further requests for interest. No action.

St. Laurent.—Presbytery's Home Mission Committee recommended that the previous arrangement, whereby payment be made on the loan at the rate of 1% of principal, be continued for another five years. Agreed, provided the Finance and Extension Board accepts the same arrangements.

Montreal, Italian Work.—The Home Mission Committee of Presbytery recommended that the Board give sympathetic consideration to the erection of a building as soon as a site can be found. Referred to the Board.

KINGSTON—

Kingston, Zion Manse.—A request was presented that payment of \$200 a year for ten years be accepted in full settlement of the debt. Agreed.

NORTH BAY—

Re Proceeds of Insurance on *Trout Mills Church*.—Toronto Conference approved of a resolution of Presbytery that \$1,051.06 received, be used to pay the indebtedness of Phelps Township to the Property Fund—approximately \$606, providing this charge increase its givings for current revenue by \$20 per annum, and that the Home Mission Board agree to return the amount paid if, within 20 years, the Presbytery of North Bay deems it necessary to build a new church at Trout Mills.

Agreed to return the amount, if necessary, but without interest.

TORONTO CENTRE—

Toronto, Bedford Park.—Presbytery approved of a three-year postponement of payments of principal on the mortgage, from July 1st, 1943, as the congregation wish to secure a manse. Agreed.

GUELPH—

Kitchener, Knox Church.—Presbytery endorsed the request that the whole debt on this church be cancelled. No action.

MIDDLESEX—

London, Friendship House.—An expenditure of \$88.53 was made for repairs to the basement floor and for new linoleum, painting, etc. Payment of this amount was confirmed.

CARMAN—

Cypress River Loans.—It was agreed to accept \$1,150.00 on or before December 31st, 1945, in full payment of the loans on the manse and parsonage.

WINNIPEG—

West Winnipeg Site.—The Executive was asked to pay the taxes on this site for 1943, amounting to \$99.20. Agreed.

Pine Falls.—It was agreed to charge no interest for 1943 and to give credit for \$1,000 for the \$500 received on principal.

Regent's Park.—Request was made that \$750 credit be given for \$500 additional payment on principal. Agreed.

ASSINIBOIA—

Kincaid, Manse Loan.—Congregation requested that a payment of \$100 which had been made be applied on principal instead of interest. Agreed.

Woodrow.—Congregation asked that \$1,200 be accepted in full payment of the mortgage, providing the money is paid by May 1st, 1944. Agreed, subject to Presbytery action.

BATTLEFORD—

Loon Lake Manse.—It was reported that repairs were needed to the cellar, which had caved in; and also that fence posts were needed. Referred to Secretaries.

ELROSE—

Tuberoose.—A request was received that the balance of the loan be cancelled. Referred to Board.

ESTEVAN—

Outram.—It was agreed to accept \$400 in full settlement of the loan, if paid by December, 1944, subject to Presbytery's approval.

REGINA—

Riceton Loans.—A request was made that \$600 be accepted to cover the full debt, the money to be raised at once. Agreed, subject to Presbytery action.

WEYBURN—

Khedive.—A request was received that \$150 be accepted in full payment of the balance of the loan. Agreed.

YORKTON—

Foam Lake.—Presbytery approved a request that \$900 be accepted in full settlement of principal and interest owing on the manse loan, provided it was paid during 1943, or that \$1,000 be accepted, if not paid till 1944. Agreed.

BRITISH COLUMBIA—

"Melvin Swartout".—An account of \$34.05 for repairs to the boat, incurred some time ago, was presented by a machine shop in Alert Bay. Agreed to pay this.

Maintenance Claims

ST. JOHN'S—

Blackhead Road and Fort Amherst.—Agreed to vote additional grant of \$75.00 for Student Supply, from September 1st to end of year.

INVERNESS-GUYSBORO—

Boylston.—Payment of grant at the rate of \$650 for Married Lay Supply for the December quarter was confirmed.

COCHRANE—

Nakina.—Rev. C. D. Dicks, who served this field from July, 1942, to the end of May, 1943, claimed there was a deficit in salary from the field of \$119.08. It was decided that any deficit in salary must be the subject of negotiation with the congregation, but that consideration would be given to the payment of a cost of living bonus.

MUSKOKA—

Baysville.—It was agreed that grant be continued until the end of March to the widow of the late Rev. S. J. Proctor, who died in November.

SIMCOE—

Angus.—Payment of grant at rate for married ordained minister was approved, as the mother and brother of the minister live with him.

TORONTO EAST—

Toronto, Oak Street.—The request of the Superintendent of Missions that provision be made for supply by two students was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

SUDBURY—

Sudbury, All Peoples'.—Payment of \$50.00, being one-half moving expenses was confirmed; the field having paid the balance.

BIRTLE—

Bird Tail Reserve.—A grant of \$21.70 was voted for travelling expenses of Rev. H. I. Bowman in connection with services rendered to this Reserve.

SUPERIOR—

Nipigon.—Agreed that grant be at rate of \$350.00 for Lay Supply, from October 15th.

VANCOUVER—

Cranberry-Westview.—A grant of \$75.00 was voted towards moving expenses, totalling \$112.95, the field having paid \$10.00.

VICTORIA—

Union Bay.—Agreed to vote \$30.00 towards moving expenses amounting to \$106.40, the field having paid \$45.00.

Statement Re Finances

The Secretary presented a statement with regard to the financial position of the Board, showing that there was available for emergency grants at this meeting \$50,539.00.

Basis For Special Emergency Grants and Cost of Living Bonus

The basis for special emergency grants and the question of cost of living bonus were considered. On motion, it was decided:

- I. To vote special emergency grants so as to build up salaries, as far as possible, to the scale adopted by the Board in 1943.
- II. To adopt the principle of paying a cost of living bonus for 1943, of—
 1. \$100 to:
 - (a) Men on aid-receiving charges and home mission fields.
 - (b) Superintendents of Institutions and Members of their staffs, except St. Christopher House, in the case of whose staff the Secretaries are to enquire as to the bonus paid from other sources. Should this not have been paid, the staff is to be paid at the same rate as other institutions.

- (c) Medical Superintendents of Hospitals.—The Secretary of the Board reported that in the Report of the Appropriations Committee, adopting a scale of salaries for 1943 (Pages 108 & 109, 1943 Digest of Minutes) nothing had been mentioned about an increase of \$100.00 to Superintendents of Hospitals. The Executive agreed to authorize this payment to be made for the year 1943; the cost of living bonus of \$100.00 to be also paid; the hope being expressed that this can be met from the ordinary revenue of the Hospital.
2. 8½% of salary to:
- (a) Staff of Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute.
- (b) Janitors in the Institutions; it being understood that in cases where the bonus or a portion thereof has already been taken care of by an increase in salary during the year, only the unpaid portion of the bonus, if any, shall be paid.
3. 5% of salary to:
- Nurses and Staffs in Home Mission Hospitals; it being understood that in cases where the bonus or a portion thereof has already been taken care of by an increase in salary during the year, only the unpaid portion of the bonus, if any, shall be paid.
4. Re Office Staffs:
- It was decided that the office staffs should receive the same bonus as was decided upon by a Conference of the Secretaries of all the Departments—this bonus to be paid to the Home Mission Staffs on account of 1943.

Letter of Thanks—

It was directed that a letter of thanks and congratulations should be sent to all fields which raised the cost of living bonus for 1943.

Mr. Fred Mann and Rev. M. C. Macdonald.

Standing Committees—

It was agreed that Standing Committees of the Board be continued as at present constituted until the appointment of a new Board by the General Council.

Rev. M. C. Macdonald

The Secretary called attention to the action of the last General Council, appointing Rev. M. C. Macdonald Associate Secretary of the Board of Home Missions, such appointment to take effect after the first session of the Board in 1944. The Chairman congratulated Mr. Macdonald on his new status and expressed appreciation of his services.

Presentation of Reports

Stencilled Reports of Superintendents of Missions, Superintendents of Institutions and Principals of Indian Residential Schools were presented to the members of the Board.

Statements by Superintendents of Missions

The Superintendents of Missions made brief statements regarding the work in their respective areas.

Report Re Bissell Bursary Fund

It was reported that for the academic year 1943-44, the Trustees of the Bissell Bursary Fund had awarded seven Bursaries of \$100.00 each—as follows: Manitoba, 1; Saskatchewan, 4; Alberta, 2.

Home Missions Council of North America

On motion, it was decided to make a grant of \$400.00 to the Home Missions Council of North America for 1944.

Special Licenses For Lay Missionaries

1. It was agreed to recommend to the Executive of General Council—
- (a) That Special Licenses to administer the Sacraments be granted to the following:

2. It was decided to take no action re recommendation of Temiskaming Presbytery that Special License to administer the Sacraments be given to Miss E. Hjelt, Finnish Worker, Kirkland Lake.

Student Missionaries

Report of Committee on Appointment of Students—

Rev. M. C. Macdonald presented the Report of the Committee on Appointment of Student Missionaries:

1. During the summer of 1943, 161 students served the Board under its co-operative plan (ordinarily called the "Students' Pool") and 8 others were appointed on a special basis.

2. The Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students was carried out again in 1943. Because the fields gave a better response to student maintenance, it was not necessary to use quite all of the appropriation of \$30,000.00 to bring the salary of each student up to \$14.50 per week plus board and travel on the field.

3. The Executive decided that the Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students should be continued for 1944:

4. The Committee has appointed to fields this year 169 Students. They are distributed in the different Superintendencies as follows:

There is a possibility of two or three more appointments being completed so that we may expect the total to be 170 or more. In addition to those appointed for full time service, a limited number will give week-end supply at the various college centres.

5. A difficult situation confronted the Committee in securing a sufficient number of students to man the fields for the summer of 1944. Because of the accelerated theological course students in Second Year Theology were not available. To date, of the total of 177 who applied, 9 have withdrawn. Since the meeting of the Committee several additional applications have been received. It is of interest to note that of the 168 appointed, 23 are not candidates for the ministry. A number of these undoubtedly will become candidates. The rest are fine young people who have volunteered their services to help out our Church in the emergency. Of interest also is the fact that of the total of 169 appointed, 23 are young women. We are pleased to report that a reasonably fair distribution has been made of the students available and that only a very limited number of fields will be left without some form of service this coming summer.

6. The Secretaries, in co-operation with the Superintendents of Missions, have taken up with the Officers Commanding in the different college centres, the matter of securing, for our student missionaries, postponement of attendance at summer military training camps. The position we took was that the work done by our students on mission fields was a real national service. (It should be added here that all students who are eligible have taken the required 110 hours of military training during the college term.) We are glad to report that our efforts in this direction have been most successful and that the Officers approached have given us every encouragement to believe that students who will serve on mission fields will be able to secure postponement of the two weeks' camp.

7. The Committee recommends that the appropriation for student work for this coming summer be \$32,000.00.

On motion, the Report was adopted.

Ellsworth Toll Prize—

The Secretary reported that the father and widow of the late Rev. Ellsworth Toll had made available a prize of \$50.00 a year for five years, to be awarded to the Student at Emmanuel or Victoria, who had done the best work on a student mission field during the previous summer, and that the prize for last year had been awarded to Mr. Douglas Bradford.

It was resolved that the appreciation of the Board be extended to Rev. S. L. Toll and Mrs. Ellsworth Toll for their generosity.

Scale of Expenses of Members

Mr. Fred Mann presented the following Report of the Committee on Scale of Expenses of Members of the Board, which was, on motion, adopted:

- (1) That members be paid cost of railway and sleeper tickets to Toronto and return; the cost of meals en route—such cost not to exceed \$3.50 per day; and the cost of hotel and meals in Toronto—not to exceed \$4.50 per day.
- (2) That those travelling by motor car be paid on the basis of railway fare; and
- (3) That the amount for Sunday Supply shall not exceed \$15.00 per Sunday.

Report of the Literature Committee

Rev. M. C. Macdonald presented the Report of the Literature Committee.

Statement re Literature issued in 1943—

Under a co-operative arrangement, which included the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions and The Missionary and Maintenance Department, the following were issued in 1943—

Booklet—"From Lakes to Northern Lights"—110,000 copies (towards the cost of which a contribution was made by the War Service Committee.)

Leaflets—"Maritime Ministries"—100,000 copies.

—"All In The Master's Name"—100,000 copies.

The Board of Home Missions also issued 80,000 copies of the pamphlet, "The Church's Claim On You."

The total cost of literature and publicity, including Monthly Bulletin, Slides and Lantern Supplies, postage, etc., was \$4,415.03.

Orders for literature were received from 1,396 pastoral charges. Except in the case of "Maritime Ministries," the quantity printed was insufficient to meet the demand.

Recommendations for 1944—

1. That, following the principle of co-operation with The Missionary and Maintenance Department, the Board of Foreign Missions, and the War Service Committee, a series of five illustrated folders—two on Foreign Missions and three on Home Missions—be issued; the Missionary & Maintenance Department to bear one-third, and the Home Mission Board two-thirds, of the cost of publication and postage of the three Home Mission folders.

2. That the three folders to be issued on Home Mission Work deal with the following—

- (a) Non-Anglo-Saxon and New Canadian Work.
- (b) Home Mission Work in French Canada.
- (c) The Christian Ministry of Healing.

3. That the Board of Home Missions issue the following, independently:

- (a) A Story pamphlet.
- (b) A Facts pamphlet.
- (c) A pamphlet on the Work of the Church of All Nations, Toronto.

4. That the total Budget for Literature and Publicity be \$4,500.00, with estimated costs as follows:

On motion, the Report was adopted.

School For Lay Workers

Rev. J. I. MacKay gave a brief outline regarding the plans made for the holding of a three-day "School for Lay Workers" of the Bay of Quinte and Montreal & Ottawa Conferences at Albert College, Belleville, after Easter; approval having already been given by the Executive.

The plan was commended by the Board.

Requests For Appointment of Itinerant Missionaries

Saskatchewan Conference—

Re request of the Saskatchewan Conference for the appointment of two itinerant missionaries—one for the North and one for the South (see Pages 8 and 23), which was referred to the Board of the Executive.

The request for the appointment of an Itinerant Missionary for the Southern part of the Conference was withdrawn, after hearing an explanation by Dr. R. J. McDonald, who spoke on behalf of the Conference.

Dr. J. L. Nicol presented an explanation of the request so far as the Northern part of the Conference was concerned.

On motion, it was agreed to approve the appointment of an Itinerant Missionary for Northern Saskatchewan, as an experiment, for a period of four or five months; and that arrangements for the carrying out of the plan and determination of the grant necessary be left in the hands of the Secretaries and Superintendent of Missions.

Cochrane Presbytery—

Cochrane Presbytery endorsed the "urgent need of the appointment of a travelling missionary with requisite qualifications for the visitation of lumber camps, depopulated areas and isolated settlers."

On motion, it was resolved that, since no ordained man is available for such work, an effort be made to secure a suitable student to labour during the summer in the outlying districts of Cochrane Presbytery, and that he be asked to make a report to the Presbytery and the Executive of the Board of Home Missions in the Fall.

Rural Work

Report of Committees—

Rev. W. S. Godfrey presented the Report of the Committee on Rural Work, as follows:

1. The greater part of the work of this Committee has been done in connection with rural life conferences held during the past year in the Maritime, Montreal and Ottawa and Bay of Quinte Conferences. One of the conferences in the Maritimes was centred in an Agricultural College at Nappan; all the rest were held in country towns and villages. In connection with the conferences a great deal of local leadership was developed, but great help was given to the Maritime conferences by Dr. Mark A. Dawber and to the conferences in Quebec and Ontario by Dr. T. A. Tripp of the Congregational Churches in the U.S.A., and by Rev. R. A. Cameron of the Fellowship for a Christian Social Order.
2. If the circulation of Orders of Service provided by the Home Mission Board is a gauge of interest, observance of Rural Life Sunday is spreading in the Church. Over twenty thousand copies were circulated last year. An order of service for 1944 has been prepared by Rev. D. A. Brydon of Jerseyville and an article for the Observer on the subject has been written by Rev. N. A. McNairn of Copetown. The day set for the observance is May 21st.
3. Replacing the essay competition of other years, a scholarship was established for study in the work of the rural church and was awarded by the Executive to Rev. E. Lockhart, B.A., of Little Shemogue, N.B. Mr. Lockhart has gone to study at Scarritt College for Christian workers at Nashville, Tennessee, and will do lecturing and other work in connection with Pine Hill Divinity Hall on his return.
4. A proposal has been made by the Board of Christian Education that an Inter-Board Committee on Rural Work be formed. The

Executive of the Board of Home Missions has appointed representatives to attend a meeting to discuss this proposal. The meeting will be held shortly.

5. During the year, the Committee published a pamphlet prepared by a group of rural clergymen, under the leadership of Revs. D. A. Brydon and N. A. McNairn, showing overlapping in church work in their rural areas. The pamphlet was printed because conditions they found were thought to be fairly general across the country and it was hoped that their experience might lead others to attempt measures of co-operation.
6. Your Committee recommends—
 - (a) That a Scholarship of \$150.00 for study of rural work be awarded again this year to some rural minister, the appointment to be made by the Executive of the Board, and the study to be carried on under the direction of this Committee.
 - (b) That \$300.00 be granted for Rural Summer Schools in Newfoundland.
 - (c) That the budget of this Committee for 1944 be \$700.00.
 - (d) That the nomination of an Executive for carrying on rural work throughout the year be left to the Committee.
 - (e) That the Board express appreciation of the help given by Dr. Mark A. Dawber, Dr. T. A. Tripp, Rev. R. A. Cameron and Rev. Dutton S. Peterson.

On motion, the Report as a whole was adopted.

Address, Rev. Dutton S. Peterson—

The Chairman introduced Rev. Dutton S. Peterson, of Odessa, N.Y., who addressed the Board and invited guests, on his Experiences as a Rural Minister.

Rev. J. G. Gorwill introduced the members of a Rural Life Conference who had been meeting with Mr. Peterson in Toronto.

The appreciation of the Board was extended to Mr. Peterson for his very excellent services.

The guests who were present at the invitation of the Board were introduced. Mrs. C. M. Loveys introduced three Women Workers under appointment to Home Mission work; Miss Gertrude Rutherford, Principal of the United Church Training School, introduced three young women who are under appointment to summer mission fields; and Rev. J. C. Torrance introduced the Superintendents and Staff members of the Institutions and City Missions in Toronto who were present.

Report of the Commission on City Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

The Report of the Commission was presented by Dr. George Dorey. It was considered section by section and adopted as follows:

The Commission was appointed by the Executive, pursuant to action of the Board of Home Missions in 1943, as follows:

Chairman, Dr. A. Lloyd Smith; *Western Section*: Dr. J. A. Cormie, Dr. J. L. Nicol, Dr. J. C. Pincock, Rev. A. Cox, Rev. E. G. D. Freeman, Rev. J. E. Jones, Mr. A. J. Irving, Rev. E. G. Turnbull, Rev. H. M. Rae; *Eastern Section*: the Secretaries, Mr. K. M. Kilbourn, Mr. W. B. Cowan, Rev. J. C. Torrance, Mrs. C. M. Loveys, Mr. William Jardine, Rev. S. H. Greenslade, Rev. John MacDonald.

Meetings of the two Sections were held during the year.

At the meeting of the Eastern Section, held in the Fall, plans were made for the general carrying on of the work; and meetings of the Toronto members were held on two occasions.

Questionnaires were sent out to each Institution and answers duly received.

Every Institution was visited by one or more members of the Commission, who had conference with members of the staff and neighbouring ministers.

Meetings were held in Saskatoon with Hungarian and Ukrainian Ministers and some Western Members of the Commission, and with German Ministers in Calgary.

The Commission met in Toronto on March 19th and 20th, 1944, and presents the following Report to the Board:

I. Policy

1. General Policy:

Believing that The United Church of Canada has been brought into existence under the guidance of the Holy Spirit for the purpose of more effectively establishing the Kingdom of God in Canada, the Board of Home Missions declares its conviction that the United Church has a definite responsibility for providing leadership to every community in this country not otherwise served.

Following therefrom, The Board of Home Missions believes that it is the duty of The United Church of Canada:

(a) To care for Anglo-Saxon groups in communities of mixed racial origin which have become so weakened by replacement of the old stock with the new that without aid they cannot maintain church services.

(b) To provide religious ministrations for those belonging to the Reformed Churches of Europe, such as, for instance, Hungarians and Czecho-Slovaks and others ecclesiastically affiliated with the United Church.

(c) To minister to such groups among other Protestant people without religious services whose relationship to their mother churches has not been maintained.

(d) In the case of those racial groups not affiliated with Protestant Churches, to provide religious services, particularly for the following:

(i) Those who have come into the fellowship of the United Church through the efforts of our missionary agencies.

(ii) Those whose own churches have failed to provide an effective ministry.

(iii) Those young people who have lost vital contact with the Church of their fathers.

2. *Co-operation:*

The Board of Home Missions stands ready to co-operate with any of the Churches serving our non-Anglo-Saxon fellow-citizens to the fullest degree possible, in any movement which has for its object the interests of the religious life of the community and the welfare of the Dominion of Canada.

3. *Racial Understanding*

A study of answers to questionnaires submitted by Ministers in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta seems to suggest that there is no movement of significant proportions on the part of Europeans of Roman Catholic background into affiliation with our United Church but that the European peoples of Protestant background have, to a greater degree, associated themselves with the United Church where their own churches are not functioning.

Our conviction is, however, that unless there is a change of attitude on the part of many ministers and people of United Churches, The United Church of Canada is in danger of becoming an Anglo-Saxon sect. There is a basic measure of goodwill, but we have detected significant traces of smugness, exclusiveness and prejudice in our Church towards the non-Anglo-Saxon. Here and there, perhaps unintentionally and unconsciously, a somewhat unfortunate approach has been made to our non-Anglo-Saxon people. We are persuaded that the Church should be jolted out of its complacency with respect to this matter and we call upon our ministers and people to re-examine their own basic conceptions of the Church and its function and their fundamental attitudes toward people of racial and national strains other than their own.

A new emphasis must be laid upon the comprehensive inclusiveness of The United Church of Canada, and we depend especially upon the ministers to sound this note; without their leadership this ideal cannot be realized. We urge that Presbyteries (with the co-operation of the Home Mission Superintendents) make provision for an intensive study of the community life in the midst of which the Church has to function with a view to correcting some of the unfortunate attitudes, and that college faculties also be invited to give attention to this matter.

4. *Objectives of Institutional Missions*

The Board of Home Missions is conscious of the magnitude of the task entrusted to the workers in the Institutions serving non-Anglo-Saxon urban communities and of the great difficulties attending it and believes that the harvest may often be a long season from the sowing.

There are, however, certain objectives toward which all Institutional work should tend, which we believe can ultimately be reached if they are kept steadfastly in mind and faithfully pursued:

(a) To bring those with whom the Church is in touch into a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and to encourage them to give expression to such a relationship by active participation, as members, in the life and work of the Church.

(b) To develop in the members of the Church, Christian character and active interest in the task of building a Christian community, more especially in those areas in which moral failure, race and class prejudice are inimical to the highest interests of the state.

5. *Standards by which the Work of the Institutional Missions may be judged:*

(a) The existence of a church with a roll of membership and an organization made up of persons who have made profession of their faith in Christ.

(b) The development of a sense of responsibility on the part of the members of the Institutional Churches to furnish: Leadership in every phase of the work of the local church, and an increasing share in the administration of local affairs and the larger work of the Church.

(c) The presence of high standards in the social and religious life of the community resulting from the presence of the United Church in the district.

6. *Policy to be adopted in dealing with the Relation of an Anglo-Saxon Church on the edge of a non-Anglo-Saxon District in our Cities:*

(a) United Churches in a community of mixed races, in which there is no Institutional Mission, have responsibility for all persons in the community, whether Anglo-Saxon or non-Anglo-Saxon, who are not vitally related to another Church. The ministers of these Churches, therefore, are urged to put forth every effort to create a sympathetic attitude on the part of the membership of their church toward the non-Anglo-Saxons in the neighborhood, and more especially to bring the boys and girls and young people of the non-Anglo-Saxon homes not related to another Church into the Sunday School classes and Young People's organizations of the Church and through them ultimately into full membership.

(b) Where a church, by reason of shifting population, can no longer continue its independent existence as a self-supporting congregation:

(i) In the opinion of the Board of Home Missions, the first step is for Presbytery to determine whether the Church is necessary to the religious life of the community.

(ii) If it is to remain open and a grant is needed, application for this will be made in the regular way and the conditions under which the grant should be made will be determined by the Presbytery and the Board of Home Missions, subject to the following general principles:

Where aid from the Board of Home Missions is considered necessary to enable a church to give adequate care to the community in which it serves, the Board may provide for the support of a worker or workers who shall be appointed by the Board of Home Missions on recommendation of the Presbytery in consultation with the Official Board of the charge. While as far as possible the autonomy of the congregation shall be safeguarded, such workers shall bear the same relation to Presbytery as other workers under the Board of Home Missions.

(iii) When the church is located in an area where there is also an Institution under the direction of the Board and in the opinion of the Presbytery it is desirable to unify the work, the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee, the Official Board of the Church, the Board of the Institution, and the Superintendent of Missions shall confer to work out a plan of unification under the general rules and policy of this Board.

7. *School Homes:*

The Board of Home Missions reaffirms its conviction that School Homes of moderate size in which the family spirit can be preserved are of value in the work among non-Anglo-Saxons, and recommends that further study be given to the questions involved during the coming year.

8. *Ministers for non-Anglo-Saxon fields:*

The Board of Home Missions expresses its gratitude that young men who are bi-lingual are offering themselves for the service of the Church and is of the opinion that they should be encouraged to preserve and cultivate facility in the use of their mother tongue. The Board is further of the opinion that they should be trained in the Theological Colleges of the Church and that they should follow the regular course of study set out by the General Council.

The Board is further of the opinion that if it be not found possible on their graduation to settle these men on a charge among their own people, it would serve a good purpose to have them settled on Anglo-Saxon charges.

9. *Bi-lingualism:*

That the attention of the Church be drawn to the fact that the time has not yet arrived when the Preaching of the Word in the native language can be discontinued; and that the Board be permitted to make

provision for payment of a higher scale of salaries to men especially qualified for this work, on the same principle as Superintendents of Institutions receive a higher scale of remuneration.

10. *Non-Anglo-Saxon Literature:*

(a) That the Board of Home Missions make provision for the publication of literature in Ukrainian and Hungarian.

(b) That provision be made for the translation of the Catechism into Ukrainian—this to appear first in The Canadian Ranok and to be printed as a separate pamphlet.

11. *Recruiting New Workers:*

That consideration be given to the employment of students who will work with ministers and missionaries in the non-Anglo-Saxon rural blocs.

12. *Attitude of the Church to Non-Anglo-Saxon Work:*

(a) That consideration be given to the whole question of improving the attitudes and relations of the people of the United Church to racial and religious minority groups by publishing leaflets, and by encouraging the exchange of visits and fraternal greetings between the United Church and other churches of these racial groups.

(b) That, in the event of further study being given to this matter, representatives of Non-Anglo-Saxon groups should be asked to sit on the Commission.

13. *Designation of City Institutions:*

It is recommended:

(a) That the word "Mission" should be deleted from the records of local names.

(b) That all national names, such as "Ukrainian," "German," etc., should be deleted from all church records such as The Year Book.

(c) That our Institutions should be identified as "United Churches," prefixing whatever local name is approved by the Presbytery.

II. Evaluation of the Work of the City Institutions

The Commission made careful and systematic enquiry concerning the work of each City Institution. Questionnaires were sent to each Superintendent. Answers have been submitted in all cases. A schedule was prepared giving the figures reported in the Year Book for ten years. One or more members of the Commission visited each Institution and had conference with the Superintendent, the Staff and the Board.

Finally, the Commission made a full review of the record of each Institution, as revealed by the Questionnaires, the Statistics, and the Reports of the visits.

On the basis of the above, it is the judgment of the Commission, now adopted by the Board:

1. That the workers have, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and with the help of God, accomplished a good work for the Church and for the Kingdom. Accessions to membership on profession of faith in Jesus Christ have been, on the whole, above the average for the Church

The Christian nurture of children and young people, through Sunday Schools and the religious education activities, has been faithfully carried out.

The people who attend these city institutions and churches turn in ever increasing numbers to our ministers in their joys and in their sorrows, and to consecrate their children in Baptism.

The financial response is good. Contributions to the local church have increased substantially in the ten-year period; nor have the wider claims of the Church as represented by the Missionary and Maintenance Fund been neglected.

2. *The Board desires*

(a) To express its confidence in the leadership provided by the Superintendents and Workers in the city institutions and among the non-Anglo-Saxons, its admiration for their self-sacrifice, devotion and courage, and prays for God's blessing and guidance upon their efforts.

(b) To record its gratification at the measure of success that has attended the efforts of these workers. It believes that good progress has been made in making contacts and establishing friendships that will prove a secure foundation on which the work can be permanently established. It notes with particular satisfaction the number of persons of non-Anglo-Saxon stock who have become members of the Church on profession of faith.

3. While, on the whole, the work is in a satisfactory condition, there are certain changes which are desirable, certain policies which might with profit be adopted, and certain directions in which the work might be strengthened.

The following recommendations and suggestions are therefore adopted:

(a) *Gloucester Bay*

That the Sydney Presbytery, The Woman's Missionary Society and the Board of Home Missions be requested to study the situation in the Tower Road, Caledonia and Passchendaele area, with a view to providing more adequate accommodation.

(b) *Sydney*

That as soon as possible a man be appointed for the Community House to be associated with the Minister of Trinity Church (Superintendent) to take charge of physical culture, religious education, young people's work, etc.

(c) *Montreal, Church of All Nations*

(i) That the Presbytery Home Mission Committee give favorable consideration to the appointment of representatives from the Slavic and the Italian congregations to sit on the non-Anglo-Saxon Committee.

(ii) That the non-Anglo-Saxon Committee of the Presbytery explore the possibility of simplifying the bookkeeping, so that, instead of having three treasurers, there will be only two — one for each congregation.

(iii) That in view of the fact that the evening service at the Church of All Nations consists largely of younger people who prefer English, and in view of the fact that Dr. Katsunoff is so completely master of the English language, careful consideration be given by the non-Anglo-Saxon Committee and the Ministers of the Slavic and Italian congregations to making adequate provision for these younger people.

(d) *Montreal, Italian Church*

That the work of the Italian Congregation be continued, and that as soon as possible the Board of Home Missions make provision for a modest building to house this congregation.

(e) *Montreal, St. Columba House*

That the Presbytery of Montreal be asked to reconsider the decision regarding the Communion Roll at St. Columba, it being the judgment of the Commission that it should be possible for those who attend the services to become members of the United Church at St. Columba House.

(f) *Toronto*

(i) That Rev. J. C. Torrance be asked to call together the staffs of the Church of All Nations, Queen Street Church, College St.-St. Christopher, and the Minister of College Street Church from time to time to discuss matters of common interest which they face as representatives of the United Church in the area.

(ii) That this group arrange at the earliest possible date for a joint survey of the area.

(iii) That the joint staffs explore ways and means of bringing about closer co-operation between St. Christopher House and College Street Church and between the Church of All Nations and Queen Street Church.

(iv) That the Board of Home Missions make provision for a Boys' Worker for the Church of All Nations and Queen Street at the earliest possible moment and that the Boys' Worker at St. Christopher House be asked to give assistance to Boys' Work at College Street.

Church of All Nations

(v) That it be suggested that there should be more persistent and continuous pastoral visitation, both among congregational members and in the community at the Church of All Nations.

Queen Street

(vi) That Rev. J. C. Torrance have conference with representatives of the Kiwanis Club re social work in the area served by Queen Street and the Church of All Nations.

Oak United

(vii) That the Toronto East Presbytery and the Toronto Home Missions Council be commended for their efforts—now ultimately successful—in unifying the work of the former St. Giles, King Street and Parliament Street congregations as a first step to further unification.

(viii) That the Board of Home Missions do all within its power to assist the congregation of Oak United in securing a speedy settlement of a minister.

Fred Victor Mission

(ix) That congratulations be extended to the Minister and people of the Fred Victor Mission on the completion of fifty years of outstanding service by the Mission and of twenty-six years of devoted ministry by Rev. W. A. Hunnisett in this section of the city of Toronto.

(x) That the Toronto East Presbytery and the Toronto Home Missions Council be asked to study the possibility of further co-ordination and unification of the work of the United Church in the Moss Park area by bringing the Fred Victor Mission into some form of closer co-operation with the present Oak United and any other United Church or churches in the area.

(xi) That the Board of Home Missions be asked to study the whole matter of the development of a sound and Christian policy for the care of single homeless or transient men (at present so large a part of the work carried on at the Fred Victor Mission) and to make such approaches and representations to the Civic, Provincial and Federal authorities as may be deemed necessary.

St. Christopher House

(xii) That the Board record its pleasure that, as a result of a recent conference between representatives of the Board of St. Christopher House and of the Commission, there is a possibility of closer co-operation between St. Christopher House and College Street Church.

(xiii) That the Board approve of the idea that the member of the staff who works at College Street live in the St. Christopher

building and give part of her time to both the church and the institution.

(xiv) That, while recognizing the fine piece of Social Service work that has been done in St. Christopher House, the Board recommends that it be the future policy of the St. Christopher Board to try to see that all of the Workers at St. Christopher House should, not only be experts in some line of Social Service work, but should be church-minded as well; and that the workers at St. Christopher should do what they can among the United Church families in their community to get them to link up with College Street Church or one of our churches on Queen Street. If some of the members of St. Christopher were active members in College Street, it would help the situation very greatly.

(g) *Hamilton*

(i) That the present set-up, with Superintendent and Staff working under him, be continued.

(ii) That the Presbytery Home Mission Committee give consideration to the setting up of an adequate Committee or Board for the All Peoples' Churches, Hamilton, to consist of representatives appointed by the Presbytery including the Home Mission Convener, together with members of staff and representatives of each congregation.

(h) *Niagara Presbytery*

That the Superintendent arrange for the presentation of the wider claims of the Church, represented by the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, to the congregations and give them opportunity to support these undertakings.

(i) *Sudbury*

That the Superintendent make arrangements for periodic visits by Ukrainian, Hungarian and Czech ministers, in order to encourage the people of these nationalities to find a home within All Peoples' Church; and that the Sudbury Presbytery give consideration to the formation of a Sudbury Advisory Council of United Churches, including Sudbury, Copper Cliff, Sudbury Suburban and Coniston charges.

(j) *Sault Ste. Marie*

That the Superintendent, on consultation with the Board of Home Missions, arrange for regular visits from an Ukrainian minister and possibly representatives of other language groups.

(k) *London, Friendship House*

That the Middlesex Presbytery continue the present arrangement for a period of three or four years longer in order to give Friendship House work an opportunity to develop.

(l) *Lakehead Mission*

(i) That Fourth Avenue be retained and opened for work at once.

(ii) That work at Bay Street be continued in the meantime and that an adequate staff be provided to care for it.

(iii) Fort William, East Wayside—That the closest possible consultation between East Wayside and Knox be developed, with a view to some common policy and ultimate co-operation.

(iv) That a church be built on the West Wayside property when conditions warrant it.

(v) That the following be the minimum staff which should be provided for Lakehead Missions:

(a) Superintendent (ordained), who in addition to being Superintendent of the whole mission, will assume special responsibility for the work at the Fort William end of the Mission.

(b) Assistant to the Superintendent (ordained), whose primary work will be the Port Arthur end.

(c) Three women workers.

(m) *Winnipeg*

That, in regard to Stella Avenue, as a step towards making effective the policy of the Board as laid down in 1930—that is, "In all social centres and institutions in urban or rural communities, there should be provision for a service of worship"—the building of a chapel at Stella Avenue be proceeded with as soon as conditions warrant.

(n) *Regina, Settlement House*

(i) That as a step towards making effective the policy of the Board as laid down in 1930—that is, "In all social centres and institutions in urban or rural communities, there should be provision for a service of worship"—provision be made for a suitable place of public worship in connection with Settlement House, Regina, as soon as circumstances and conditions warrant.

(ii) That consideration be given to the removal of the Superintendent's residence from the building at Settlement House.

(iii) That the Regina Presbytery provide a definite place on the Board of the Institution for the inclusion of ex-officio members of the Woman's Missionary Society, to be appointed by the Conference Branch.

(o) *Edmonton*

(i) That the Presbytery give consideration:

(a) To the area mentioned in Mr. Stephen's Report North of 118th Avenue, to ascertain the advisability of opening up this appointment, and, if advisable, to make recom-

mendation to the Board of Home Missions regarding provision of a site.

(b) To the possibility of opening up work in North Edmonton, the need of a site and purchase of a building.

(c) To the present situation at Beverley, with a view to arriving at a conclusion as to whether there is likely to be permanent work; the possibility of obtaining a site on or near 118th Avenue and very much closer to the city limits; and also the possibility of tearing down the present building, using the material for the erection of a new building—a hall and church.

(ii) That Presbytery make a study of the relation between Eastwood and Buchanan and make a recommendation as to the future relationship between Eastwood and Rundle and Buchanan and All Peoples' Mission.

(iii) That, in view of the fact that there is no adequate service being rendered to the Ukrainians in their own tongue at the present time, Presbytery should study the possibility of having some minister from outside come in once a month to hold services amongst the Ukrainians in connection with All Peoples'.

(p) *Vancouver, First Church*

That Presbytery give most serious consideration to the appointment of a group of persons to advise with First Church Board and with Dr. Roddan in order to strengthen the general organization of the Mission.

III. Conclusion

In closing this report, we would draw attention to the significance of one of the opening sentences in the Basis of Union: "It shall be the policy of this Church to foster the spirit of unity in the hope that this spirit of unity will embody itself so far as Canada is concerned in a Church which can fittingly be described as national."

Our Church is not a new communion but an expression of a movement which seeks a new alignment of the Christian resources of this country.

The ultimate success of our Church will be judged by the measure in which the form, through which it presently finds expression, is modified to provide a place and influence for everything of proven value in the universal inheritance of Christ's people. Its success means service to the cause of good citizenship and national unity as well as to the cause of true religion. Nor can our Church look forward to any goal short of contributing to the building of the Kingdom in every land and being in turn enriched by the contribution to its thought and policy from every race of God's children.

This report deals with some of the problems that confront us in communities that exhibit racial and religious complexity, and with some

of the agencies and techniques employed by the Board of Home Missions in its efforts to deal with them, but the tasks herein reviewed are not merely Home Mission problems. They are problems that must be faced by the whole Church. Their solution depends in part on the effectiveness with which the Board of Home Missions is able to deal with them, but even more the solution depends on the attitudes and activities of our ministers and local congregations. It is a problem for every minister and for every pastoral charge, and in view of the nature of the average Canadian community, it is not too much to say that the future of our Church depends to a large degree on the success that attends our efforts to build a Church in which multitudes of different racial and religious types will be bound together in one fellowship.

Indeed it is not so much a problem as it is an opportunity. Everything of proven value in the tradition and usage of the Church universal lies ready to our hands, and given courage, tact, patience and love, we can build in this country a more glorious Church—a Church more truly catholic than the world has yet seen.

Historical Data—

On motion, it was resolved that the Secretaries be asked, in conference with Dr. J. A. Cormie, to gather up historical material in connection with our Non-Anglo-Saxon Work in order that the records may be preserved.

Appreciation—

The Board adopted the following resolution:

RESOLVED:

- (1) That the Board record its sense of obligation to the members of the Commission on City Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work for the thorough and comprehensive report which has just been considered and adopted;
- (2) That the Board express its thanks to all members of the Commission, both those who are members of the Board of Home Missions and those outside the Board, who gave of their time and thought so freely, especially to the prominent laymen, in Toronto, Winnipeg and Saskatoon, who made such a fine contribution to the consideration of the matters before the Commission;
- (3) That the Board express its special indebtedness to Dr. Dorey, the Secretary of the Commission, who, because of long acquaintanceship with the Non-Anglo-Saxon work in the West, and also on account of his unique ability in statistical research, gave such valuable help; and to Dr. Cormie, the Chairman of the Western Section, who, because of his intimate knowledge of the situation among the Non-Anglo-Saxons in Canada during the whole of his ministry, was able to help the Commission make wise judgments; and
- (4) That the Board direct the Secretaries to see that the findings of the Commission, now adopted, in regard to polity and the attitude of the Church toward the New Canadian Work, receive as wide

publicity as possible and be thoroughly discussed in all parts of the Dominion. To this end, it is hoped that it may be possible to print the most important parts of the Report and to see that they get into the hands of the leaders of the Church courts and the local congregations.

Treasurer's Statement

Rev. Dr. V. T. Mooney presented the Financial Statement of the Treasurer.

On motion, a vote of appreciation was tendered to the Treasurer, and to the Treasurer's Office for valuable assistance given to the Board of Home Missions during the year.

Uninvested Funds of Home Mission Board

The Treasurer reported that at December 31st, 1943, the following uninvested balances of Home Mission Funds were being used for carrying the deficit and financing the work of the Church:

Re Serving the Monteaagle-Maynooth and Carlow-Fort Stewart Area

The Belleville Presbytery requested the Board "to appoint a Lay Supply for the area north of Bancroft, and to request The Woman's Missionary Society to appoint, if possible, a Woman Worker to work in co-operation with the Bancroft minister in the area adjacent to Bancroft; the work to be under the direction of the Superintendent of Home Missions and the Home Mission Committee of Belleville Presbytery; and it is recommended that, since this will be in the nature of an experiment, the appointments be for one year, instead of for the summer months only."

On motion, it was decided to approve the request of the Belleville Presbytery, the understanding being that, in each case, the appointment should be for one year.

(2) Re recommendation of Alberta Conference Committee, in 1943, that The Woman's Missionary Society be asked for a grant of \$7,500 to enlarge and renovate the Nurses' Home:—That, in view of the uncertainty regarding the Social Security measure re hospitalization, no action be taken in the meantime.

Adopted.

Resolutions of Alberta Hospital Board—

(1) Re suggestion with regard to Future Policy of the Church in respect of Hospitals:—That the Board appoint a Committee to study the future policy of the Church in respect to Hospitals; that the Committee study the paper prepared by Dr. Morley Young and the paper on Policy prepared by the Alberta Hospital Board; and that in making this study the Committee take into its purview Government policies as these are made public from time to time.

Adopted; the Chairman to name the Committee.

(2) Re recommendation that Ministers serving on Home Mission fields, together with their dependents, be granted free hospitalization in our Church Hospitals:—That the Board approve the principle of granting lower rates to ministers serving on Home Mission fields and aid-receiving charges and their families, until the next meeting of the Board; and that the Executive be authorized to issue, after securing information as to possible rates, area to be served and number of patients who might be admitted.

Adopted.

Hafford Hospital—

Re Question of Re-opening Hospital and of Acceptance of \$7,500 from the Redberry Municipality in full settlement of indebtedness:—That a letter be sent to the Municipality of Redberry, recognizing the changes in the attitude and performance of the members, explaining our difficulties re medical staff and asking for their suggestions as to opening and operating the Hospital; and that the receipt of \$7,500 from the Redberry Municipality be considered as payment in full of the amount due the Hospital from that Municipality. Adopted.

Mitchell Memorial Hospital—

That the Board continue the operation of this Hospital and authorize provision for a special room at a probable cost of \$250; and that the details be referred to the Secretaries with power. Adopted.

Port Simpson Hospital—

That the salary of the Superintendent be increased to \$3,000, from January 1st, 1944, in accordance with the Regulations of the Board of Home Missions governing Hospitals. Adopted.

R. W. Large Memorial Hospital—

Increase in Rates—

That, the Secretary be instructed to write to the Indian Affairs Branch, requesting, first, an increase of fifty cents per day for Indian patients admitted to our Hospitals, and, second, that the amount paid to the Doctors for medical services to the Indians be increased.

Adopted.

Disposition of Monies received on Old Accounts—

That the Board be asked to set up a special account into which monies received on old accounts would be deposited. Adopted.

On motion, the Report as a whole was adopted.

Plan for Short-Term Post-War Church Workers—

Mrs. Loveys made a statement regarding a plan (which had been accepted by the Executive of The Woman's Missionary Society), whereby Scholarships, involving seven months' training at the United Church Training School, would be offered to suitable young women—primarily University graduates—who would agree to give three years' service to the Church.

It was suggested that the Board of Home Missions become responsible for the expenses involved in connection with the training, etc., of one such young woman. On motion, this was agreed.

Request For Deaconess, Verdun Area

A communication was presented from the Secretary of Montreal Presbytery, stating that the Executive of Presbytery had approved the request of the two churches in the Verdun area for the appointment of a Deaconess to serve in that district.

The Secretaries were requested to consult with The Woman's Missionary Society and report to the next meeting of the Executive.

Statement by Secretary of the Committee on Missionary Education

Rev. K. J. Beaton, D.D., addressed the Board regarding the work of his Committee.

The Chairman tendered the thanks of the Board to Dr. Beaton.

Re Radio

Statement re Work of Commission on Radio—

Dr. K. J. Beaton made a statement regarding the work of the General Council's Commission on Radio.

Recommendations of Radio Committee of Saskatchewan Conference Re Establishment of Nisbet Memorial United Church Centre, &c.

The Special Radio Committee of the Saskatchewan Conference passed the following Recommendations—which were endorsed by Saskatchewan Conference Home Mission Committee:

1. That there be established the Nisbet Memorial United Church Centre, under the oversight of a Board to consist of:

The Home Mission Superintendent for Northern Saskatchewan; Christian Education Field Secretary for the Conference; the Presbytery and Conference Conveners of Home Missions, Evangelism & Social Service, and Christian Education; two representatives of the Conference Committee on Radio, preferably Chairman and Secretary; and three others to be appointed by the Conference.

2. That this Board be instructed to set up an Executive having under its direction the immediate oversight of the Centre.
3. That this Executive set up sub-committees, such as (a) to have responsibility for Radio Broadcasting from Prince Albert; and (b) to have responsibility for promotion of Bible School and other Activities of the Centre.
4. That the Conference Radio Committee be requested to give sympathetic co-operation to the Prince Albert Broadcasting project.
5. That the Board of Home Missions make available the premises of the Nisbet School Home for this work.
6. That the Board of Home Missions be asked for a grant of \$1,200.00 towards the salary of the Director, a grant to cover taxes, and a grant of \$200.00, if needed, for maintenance.
7. That the Board of Evangelism and Social Service be asked for a grant of \$600.00 towards salary of Director.
8. That the Board of Christian Education be asked for grant of \$300.00 towards salary of Director.

The Conference Home Mission Committee also requested that the Board underwrite the radio time to the amount of \$1,000.00.

Moved; seconded and carried, That the Board continue to make available for another year from June 30th, 1944, the premises of the Nisbet School Home on the same terms as previously decided by the Executive in October (see Page 27); and that the other requests be referred to the Executive of this Board and to the Executive of the General Council; consultation to be had in the meantime with the Radio Commission, the General Council's Committee on Bible Colleges, and the Boards of Christian Education and Evangelism and Social Service.

Statement Re Work of Committee on Camp and War Production Communities

Rev. M. C. Macdonald, who, on the retirement of Rev. Wm. Fingland, was made Director of The United Church Committee on Camp and War Production Communities, made a statement regarding the work during the past year, describing the type of problem which the Committee was attempting to solve in the large cities, in the new industrial communities, and in new housing areas on the outskirts of large towns.

Mr. Macdonald was thanked for his statement and the Committee was commended for its work.

Sunday School in the Home by Mail and Air

Rev. Dr. C. A. Myers, Secretary of the Committee on The Sunday School in the Home by Mail and Air, made a statement with regard to what had been done by the Committee thus far.

Dr. R. J. McDonald presented the Report of a Special Committee appointed by the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents to make recommendations on this matter. The Report was considered item by item and adopted as follows:

There are four types of situations which have come within our purview. The order of priority is as follows:

1. The large areas untouched by the Church.
 2. Student Mission Fields.
 3. Marginal areas (between regular charges or on the outskirts of charges covering a large territory).
 4. Regularly organized charges, self-supporting and otherwise, which have Sunday Schools open in the summer and closed in the winter.
- A. Your Committee is of the opinion that in the meantime the scheme should not apply to the fourth class. The charges concerned should look after the families within their bounds. The Home Department is planned to cover such situations.
- B. Every encouragement should be given to furthering the project within the other classes of territory.

- C. In order to further the reopening and organizing of Sunday Schools on Student mission fields supplies should not be furnished to families on these fields for the July-September quarter. Students should be encouraged to establish Sunday Schools and to care for Christian Education in the Public Schools and by Vacation Schools, as thoroughly as possible.
- D. Clear instructions covering A, B and C should be sent to the District Committees and Supervisors and to the Presbyteries.
- E. The District Committees which know the territory should furnish the National Committee with all necessary information regarding cases about which there may be question.
- The Report as a whole was adopted.

Grant for 1944—

On motion, it was agreed that grant be \$1,000 in the meantime; and that if any further grant for this year is requested, the matter be referred to the Executive.

The appreciation of the Board was expressed to Dr. Myers, both for his statement and for his work as Secretary of the Committee.

Report of Committee on Indian and Oriental Work

Rev. W. P. Bunt presented the Report of the Committee on Indian and Oriental Work. The Report was considered item by item:

The Committee recommends:

Indian Work

Appointments and Nominations to Settlement Committees—

(1) That the following nomination be made to the Settlement Committee of the Manitoba Conference:

(2) That the following appointments be made:

Adopted.

Residential Schools—

That a statement be made by Dr. Dorey.

Agreed:

Dr. Dorey made a brief statement with regard to the work of the Indian Residential Schools and reported that as a result of representations made by Deputations to the Government, the Government had paid an additional \$10.00 per pupil for each Residential School for 1943, and had decided to restore payment of the per capita grant for every child enrolled up to the authorized pupilage, and, in addition, to pay a special cost-of-living bonus at the rate of \$15.00 per pupil, beginning January 1st, 1944.

Alberni Residential School—

(1) Resignation of Rev. R. C. Scott as Principal: That the resignation of Rev. R. C. Scott be accepted as from July 1st, 1944.

Agreed.

Dr. Dorey paid fitting tribute to Captain Scott and his work.

(2) Re Resolution of Victoria Presbytery: "That, in connection with applications for principalship, consideration be specially given by the Board to men trained in British Columbia, and who therefore would presumably know the British Columbia Indians better; and if a man is appointed to Alberni from outside the Conference, that the British Columbia men be considered in the future."

That the principle of this resolution be concurred in. Adopted.

(3) Nomination of Principal: That, in view of certain emergent circumstances which have arisen in other Schools, this item be referred to the Secretaries and others concerned, to make a recommendation, if possible, before the Board adjourns.

Adopted.

Mount Elgin Residential School—

That Dr. Dorey make a statement to the Board.

Agreed.

Dr. Dorey presented a progress report on the findings of the Commission which surveyed the educational needs of the Indians in Western Ontario and their relation to the Mount Elgin Residential School.

Resolution of Muskoka Presbytery—

Re Resolution of Muskoka Presbytery regarding the economic condition of the Indians on the Parry Island and Shawinaga Reserves and the need for more efficient planning. That the resolution be sent forward to the Indian Affairs Branch of the Dominion Government.

Agreed.

Communication from Elgin Presbytery—

That Dr. Dorey visit the Presbytery and discuss the correspondence.

Adopted.

Re Rev. F. Stevens, D.D.—

That the Board send a letter of appreciation to Dr. Stevens for fifty years of loyal service amongst the Indians of Manitoba, and that an honorarium of \$25.00 per month be paid to Dr. Stevens, as from July 1st, 1944, for editing "Spiritual Light."

Adopted.

Indian Workers' Conference, Norway House—

That the Board approve the holding of a Conference of Indian Workers at Norway House; that a grant of \$350.00 be voted to help defray the expenses; and that the Board instruct Dr. Dorey to attend the conference.

Adopted.

Educational Allowance, Miss Frances Rutherford—

That the grant of \$200.00 be continued for another year.

Adopted.

Resolutions of Prince Rupert Presbytery—

(1) "Kitamaat: That The Woman's Missionary Society be asked to turn over the nomination of Nurse and Teachers to the Home Mission Board."

That this matter be referred to the Secretaries and Mrs. C. M. Loveys.

Adopted.

(2) "Indian Workers' Conference: Presbytery asks a grant of \$200 towards cost of travel for a gathering planned for Port Simpson in August, and recommends that The Woman's Missionary Society be invited to co-operate."

That we approve of the holding of this conference and that a grant of \$200 be voted towards meeting the travel costs of Home Mission Workers.

Adopted.

*Oriental Work**Moose Jaw, Chinese Mission—*

Re Appointment of Missionary: That this matter be referred to the Secretaries, Dr. R. J. McDonald and Rev. W. P. Bunt.

Adopted.

Japanese Work—

That the Board adopt the following resolution:

That, since the established principle of our Government has been that every child, irrespective of racial origin, shall have an education, which principle has been applied to all children of alien enemies, excepting those of Japanese parentage, this Board would draw attention to the harmful effects of this exception upon these people in British Columbia, and not only upon them, but upon the progress of our Canadian democracy, which is based upon an enlightened and educated people, familiar with the development of our way of life.

The burden of providing other than elementary education for them has largely fallen upon the Christian Church, the financial cost being borne by The Woman's Missionary Society. This task is now becoming intolerable.

Therefore this Board would again petition the Government to undertake the cost of the education of children of Japanese parentage, and to make provision for complete elementary and secondary education, in regularly established provincial schools.

Agreed that resolution be adopted and that it be sent forward to the Executive of the General Council, with the request that representations to the Government should be made through that body.

Resolution of Kootenay Presbytery—

Re request of Kootenay Presbytery for a grant of \$100.00 by the Home Mission Board and \$100.00 by The Woman's Missionary Society towards cost of a Conference of Japanese Workers, which it is proposed to hold in the Fall:

That we approve of the holding of such a gathering; that a grant of \$100.00 be made towards expenses; and that The Woman's Missionary Society be requested to grant a like amount. Adopted.

On motion, the Report as a whole was adopted.

Report of the Committee on Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

The Report of the Committee was presented by Rev. J. I. MacKay. It was considered item by item and action was taken as follows:

Nominations to Settlement Committees—

That nominations to North Winnipeg Mission, Canora (St. Stephen's), Ethelbert, and any other vacancies which may occur, be referred to the Superintendent of the area concerned and the Secretaries. Adopted.

Appointment of Women Workers—

That Miss Ida Pitt be appointed to the Lakehead Mission in place of Miss Pearl Shipley, who has resigned, and that any other vacancies be referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent of the area concerned. Adopted.

(1) That the following grants be voted for 1944:

Provision of Literature—

Re Recommendations of Commission on City Missions and Non-Anglo-Saxon Work re Literature. That provision be made for the publication of literature in Ukrainian and Hungarian and for the translation of the Catechism into Ukrainian—this to appear first in The Canadian Ranok and to be printed, later, as a separate pamphlet, and that a grant of \$300.00 be voted for this work. Adopted.

Leave of Absence, Miss M. L. Campion—

Re Request of Miss Margaret L. Campion, Deaconess at Queen Street Church, Toronto, for a year's leave of absence for the purposes of study. That we adopt the policy of including our women workers as eligible for such Bursaries as are now available for the Superintendents of Institutions and under the same conditions. Agreed.

Resolution of Montreal & Ottawa Conference Committee—

Re recommendation of the Montreal & Ottawa Conference Committee that the Home Mission Board "adjust the salaries paid to Home Mission Institutional Superintendents, according to their periods of service to the Church."

That no action be taken.

Adopted.

French Work—

(1) Re request of Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery for the appointment of a Travelling French Minister for that area. That we inform the Presbytery that, for the time being, under all the circumstances, it is not possible to appoint a travelling missionary, but that we draw attention to the fact that we are making a student available for French Work and that we are providing \$400.00 for this work. Adopted.

(2) Literature and Preaching Mission. That we renew the grant of \$150.00 towards the obtaining of French literature and the grant of \$500.00 for the carrying on of preaching missions. Adopted.

(3) Re Inter-Church Committee on French Work. That the Board welcome the information that there is an inter-Church Committee operating and agree to vote \$10.00 towards incidental expenses, as recommended by the Conference Home Mission Committee. Adopted.

(4) Re Radio Broadcasts in French. That the Convener of the Home Mission Committee of Montreal & Ottawa Conference and the Superintendent of Missions be asked to explore and report to the Commission on Radio. Adopted.

On motion, the Report as a whole was adopted.

Statement by Secretary of the Missionary and Maintenance Department

Rev. Charles Endicott, D.D., addressed the Board on the work of his Department.

The Chairman expressed the appreciation of the Board to Dr. Endicott.

Re Suggestion To Amend Section 200 (c) of the Manual

The Executive in January referred the suggestion of the Executive of the Board of Finance re the amendment of Section 200 (c) of the Manual to the Secretaries for consultation with the Secretaries of the other Boards concerned and with the Treasurer, and report to the Board. The Secretary reported that consultation had been had as directed.

On motion, the Board expressed its disapproval of the amendment of Section 200 (c) of the Manual, as proposed by the Executive of the Board of Finance.

Fund For Retired Workers

Appropriation for 1944—

It was decided to place \$4,000 in this Fund for 1944.

Grants from Fund

The following grants were voted for 1944:

Miss M. M. Bawden... \$25.00 per month.

Miss M. M. Sleeth\$100.00.

Mr. Herbert Goodland...\$35.00 per month; payable from date of retirement.

Mr. Walter Staffin... \$40.00 per month, from July 1st.

Statement Re Work of Committee on Bible Colleges

Rev. M. C. Macdonald presented a progress report regarding the work of the General Council's Committee on Bible Colleges.

The Board expressed the hope that this Committee would continue its studies.

Request For Payment of Additional Amounts to the Pension Fund

The Secretary reported that, as directed by the Executive in October, he had suggested to the Secretary of the Pensions Department that representatives of the Board of Home Missions and of the Pensions Department make a joint approach to the Judicial Committee, asking for an interpretation of Section 234 of the Manual, which has to do with the matter in question; but that the Department of Pensions had declined to take this course of action.

On motion, it was agreed to authorize the Secretaries to ask the Judicial Committee, through the Sub-Executive of the General Council, for an interpretation of the Section in question.

Need of Ordained Ministers

The Secretary reported that, according to estimates furnished by the Superintendents of Missions, they would be short, at the beginning of the Conference year, 159 ordained ministers for the supply of fields in their respective areas which had previously been supplied by ordained ministers—as follows: Newfoundland, 10; Maritimes, 37; Montreal

& Ottawa and Bay of Quinte, 21; Northern Ontario, 7; Manitoba, 28; So. Saskatchewan and So. Alberta, 12; Northern Saskatchewan, 17; Central and Northern Alberta, 19; British Columbia, 8.

Post War Immigration

Dr. Dorey presented the following Report of the Committee on Post War Immigration, which had been appointed by the Executive:

WHEREAS the promotion of immigration by commercial interests and the per capita payment to agencies interested in promoting the entry to Canada of particular groups of people in the past resulted in bringing to this country a considerable number of people not easily integrated into the national economy;

AND WHEREAS many of these immigrants have suffered great hardships because they were placed on unsuitable land or were otherwise exploited;

AND WHEREAS, as a result, many have not remained in Canada but have moved to the U.S.A. and elsewhere;

AND WHEREAS it seems expedient that in the promotion of Post War Immigration a wise, humane and Christian policy be followed;

BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That we request the Dominion Government to declare its willingness to bear its fair share of whatever burden may be involved if an international Commission thinks, a post war redistribution of population to be necessary for world peace and welfare.
2. That the Government of Canada be requested to appoint a Commission to make a scientific examination as to the number of immigrants for whom, under post-war conditions, this country can be expected to provide a satisfactory livelihood; that this Commission be comprised of persons of expert knowledge and judicial ability who would command the confidence of the Country; and that every interest in Canada, (Church, Education, Labour, Agriculture and Industry) be invited to make such representation to the Commission as it considers necessary.
3. That we ask the United Church to appoint a Commission representative of every section of the Country, to study from the point of view of the United Church the whole question of Immigration and to make on behalf of the United Church representations to the Government's Commission; the members of this Commission to be chosen by reason of special qualifications and knowledge of the subject.
4. That the Board appoint four representatives to confer with representatives of other Churches on the question of post war immigration.

On motion, it was resolved that Report be adopted and that it be forwarded to the Executive of the General Council.

Re Difficulty in Securing Cars

The Secretary stated that this matter had been referred to the Board by the Executive, and that the following recommendation had also been received from the Presbytery of Cariboo:

"That the Home Mission Board initiate a plan whereby a loan up to \$500 without interest be made available to any minister requiring to purchase a car for the effective working of a Home Mission field to which he is appointed, the same to be repaid in annual instalments of at least \$100. It is further recommended that in the case of a newly ordained minister receiving his first appointment to such a Home Mission field, \$200 of the amount be in the form of a grant."

On the recommendation of the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents the Board adopted the following resolution:

That the Board appropriate a sufficient sum to provide loans of \$250.00, repayable without interest in monthly payments extending over two years, for such newly ordained ministers as will be settled on charges paying the minimum or less;

And That the Secretaries be asked to study the question of extending loans to other men on aid-receiving charges and to report to the Board next year.

Definition of Furnished Manse

The Toronto Conference Home Mission Committee requested that the Board define what is meant by a furnished manse.

The Board adopted the following recommendation of the Conference of the Secretaries and Superintendents:

That we define a furnished manse as containing at least the following: Kitchen—range and furniture; dining room—table, chairs and buffet; living room—at least couch and easy chairs; bedrooms—beds, springs and dressers; rugs and floor coverings, where necessary; all in a reasonable state of repair; and in cases where there is no furnace, a heating unit.

Missionary Reference Library

A grant of \$200.00 was voted towards rent and upkeep of the Reference Library for 1944.

Report of Resolutions Committee

The Report of the Resolutions Committee was presented by Dr. C. L. Gass and was adopted as follows:

Re The Late Rev. George A. Wilson, D.D.—

This Board desires to place on record a brief tribute to the life and work of the late Dr. Wilson. For thirty-two years he served as

Superintendent in British Columbia, rendering a service which was characterized by the utmost in devotion, far-sighted leadership, and by a love for the Home Mission Work which dominated his whole ministry. His work was his hobby and his hobby was his work.

A man of high ideals, he was uncompromising in his insistence upon Christian standards in private life and public practice by both the ministry and the laity. It was in the councils of the Church that he made possibly his greatest contribution, gifted as he was with a clear mind and a capacity for sound and statesmanlike judgments.

In his sudden and tragic death on the sixteenth of February, a fellowship which made life richer for so many of us was broken, and our Church lost a loyal servant, the value of whose work only those closest to him can fully appreciate.

To Mrs. Wilson and their son, Dr. Gordon Wilson, we extend our most sincere Christian sympathy.

Re The Late Rev. G. D. Armstrong, D.D.—

The Board of Home Missions was deeply shocked to hear of the sudden passing of Dr. G. D. Armstrong. He had taken his services on Sunday morning and afternoon, and at six p.m. became unconscious. He died on Tuesday, March 14th.

Dr. Armstrong had always been interested in the Home Mission work in Alberta. He had served as Presbytery and Conference Convener, and for some years was a member of this Board. He was a true friend to all who served on the fields, and students found in him a wise counsellor. He had been President of both the Methodist and the United Church Conferences and he was honoured by the Senate of St. Stephen's College with the degree of Doctor of Divinity, Honoris Causa, for his valuable services in the cause of Church Union. For many years he had been Chairman of the Conference Hospital Committee. He was beloved in all his pastorates and has left behind him a fine record of faithful service to his Master and his Church.

The Board directs that this expression of sympathy be sent to Dr. Armstrong's son, Rev. C. C. Armstrong.

Re Rev. R. C. Scott, B.A.—

This Board desires to express its appreciation of the diligent and distinguished services of Rev. R. C. Scott, Principal of Alberni Residential School, who, owing to what we trust is temporary disability, has tendered his resignation to take effect at the end of June. Mr. Scott has given over thirty years' service under the Home Mission Board in British Columbia as Missionary to the Indians, in the Marine Work, and as Principal of Coqualeetza, which later merged with the Alberni School. During the critical years which followed this amalgamation, Mr. Scott served with great devotion as Principal, as missionary to the Indians adjacent to Alberni, and as a trusted friend able to conciliate differences between various Indian peoples.

Few of our workers are more generally honoured and beloved, not only by the native peoples of British Columbia, but also by the people in scattered settlements and logging camps of the West Coast, where he served as Marine Missionary. While regretting his resignation, the Board hopes for a speedy recovery and his restoration to a position of leadership in some phase of our Home Mission work.

Re The Late Rev. H. G. Cairns, S.T.L.—

The Board sends an expression of its sympathy to the widow and family of the late Rev. H. G. Cairns, S.T.L., of Saskatoon, who was a beloved and faithful servant of the United Church.

Re Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D.—

The Board sends sincere greetings to the Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, D.D., of Toronto, expressing the hope that he may have a speedy recovery to health.

Re Rev. F. G. Stevens, D.D.—

The Board directs that a letter be sent to Dr. F. G. Stevens, of Berens River, expressing gratitude on his completion of fifty years of service in the Indian work of the Church.

Re Rev. S. S. Osterhout, Ph.D., D.D.—

The Board directs that a letter be sent to Dr. S. S. Osterhout, of Vancouver, carrying the greetings of the Board and our prayers for a speedy restoration to health.

Re Rev. Gordon A. Sisco, M.A., D.D.—

The Board expresses delight regarding the prospect of Dr. Sisco's return to the office after a period of hospitalization, and sends him our greetings and good wishes.

Re Rev. W. E. Wilson—

For almost thirty years the Rev. W. E. Wilson has, with tireless devotion, given himself in sacrificial service to one of the most difficult areas in Toronto. Coming about 1917 to King Street East Methodist Church, Mr. Wilson specialized in a social service ministry to the unfortunate and discouraged people of a downtown community. Countless people have been befriended by this kindly, genial soul who through the years so depleted his physical and nervous energies as to necessitate retirement from active responsibilities at the close of 1943.

When negotiations were undertaken to amalgamate three churches in the Moss Park area, Mr. Wilson, thinking in terms of the future and the larger good, loyally led his members into the newly formed Oak United congregation, and for the past year and a half has given his best to the consolidation of this work.

This Board honours itself in conveying to the Rev. W. E. Wilson its deep appreciation for so sacrificial and so devoted a ministry.

Re Miss M. E. McDowell, B.A., P.H.N.—

The Board requests that a letter be sent to Miss McDowell, Matron

of the R. W. Large Memorial Hospital, Bella Bella, expressing sympathy with her in her illness and our best wishes for a speedy recovery.

Letter to Fields Assuming Self-Support

It was directed that a letter of congratulation should be sent to fields assuming self-support.

Date of Next Meeting of Board

Decision as to the date of the next meeting of the Board was referred to the Executive.

Re Post War Situation

Consideration of the Post War situation as it may affect the Board of Home Missions was referred to the Executive.

Report of Appropriations Committee

The Report of this Committee was presented by Dr. Dorey and was adopted as follows:

1. That on the basis of estimates of contributions from congregations, the following scale of salaries be adopted for 1944:

Married Ordained—with unfurnished house	\$1,500
Married Ordained—with furnished house.....	1,450
Single Ordained—without house	1,300
Single Ordained—with house	1,250
Married Lay Supply.....	1,150
Single Lay Supply.....	950
Special Fields—with unfurnished house	1,300
Special Fields—with furnished house.....	1,250
Retired Ministers (including pension) up to	1,300

Students: \$7.50 for week-end supply except in cases where a lower rate has been agreed on by the Appropriations Committee or may be arranged between the Superintendent and the office.

2. Special Allowance for Transportation on Fields: That the basis for 1944 be as follows:

Where the Sunday drive is 25 to 30 miles, that a grant of \$25 be made;

Where the drive is over 30 and up to 40 miles, that the grant be \$40;

Where the drive is over 40 and up to 50 miles, that the grant be \$50;

Where the drive is over 50 and up to 60 miles, that the grant be \$60;

Where the drive is over 60 and up to 75 miles, that the grant be \$80;

Where the drive is over 75 miles, that the grant be \$100.

Special Fields with exceptional travel to be dealt with on their merits.

In cases where one or more points are served during the week, the grant to be based on the shortest distance if all points were served on a Sunday.

3. Whereas the General Council instructed the Presbyteries to arrange for an official visit to every Pastoral Charge paying a salary of \$1,500 or less; and whereas it is a duty of Presbyteries to visit all Pastoral Charges and Home Mission Fields in receipt of a grant from the Board of Home Missions, that in these visits, charges be urged to provide an additional \$100 towards the salaries of ministers or supplies for the year 1944.

4. *Re Special Cost of Living Bonus in Newfoundland:* That in view of the fact that the cost of living for ministers and supplies on aid-receiving charges in Newfoundland has risen considerably higher than it has in Canada, it is recommended that a special bonus of \$150 be granted to all married ministers and lay supplies in Newfoundland for 1944; and ask that the Secretaries secure, from as many sections of Canada and Newfoundland as possible, detailed information of the cost, for ministers, of food, clothing, fuel and transportation, and report to the Executive as soon as possible.

That the Executive be authorized to take such further action as may be necessary in the light of these returns.

Communication From St. John's Presbytery

The request of St. John's Presbytery that a War Bonus be paid to Rev. H. M. Dawe, Superintendent of Missions, owing to the high cost of living in Newfoundland, was considered in connection with Item 4 of the Appropriations Committee's Report.

It was decided that a letter should be sent to the Executive of the General Council, drawing attention to the situation in Newfoundland, reporting the action of the Board with regard to salaries of married ministers and supplies on aid-receiving charges, and requesting that the Church authorize the Board of Home Missions to pay a similar War Bonus to the Superintendent of Missions for Newfoundland.

Request For Adjustment of Salaries by Board of Christian Education

It was agreed that the Secretaries be asked to approach the Board of Christian Education, asking for an equitable adjustment in the salaries of the two Superintendents of Missions who serve jointly as Field Secretaries of Christian Education.

Re Salaries of Secretaries and Superintendents

Moved, Seconded and Carried, That the Board request the Executive of the General Council to recommend to the General Council that the salaries of the Secretaries and Superintendents of Missions be restored to the rate at which they stood prior to the Resolution of the Fourth General Council at its meeting in 1934.

Salary of Rev. M. C. Macdonald

It was decided that the salary of Rev. M. C. Macdonald as Associate Secretary should date as from January 1st, 1944.

Special Fund

On motion, it was agreed that an appropriation of \$1,500.00 out of 1944 Maintenance Fund be placed at the disposal of the Secretaries for cases of special emergency.

Moderator's Fund

Statement re Fund—

The Secretary reported—

That grants, totalling \$19,439.52, were voted to 150 fields in 1943;

That grants voted by the Appropriations Committee to 90 fields for 1944 totalled \$17,000.00;

And that there was still available in the Fund for 1944—\$40,100.00.

Future of Moderator's Fund—

The Board, on the recommendation of the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents, adopted the following resolutions:

- (1) That the Board of Home Missions request the General Council to abolish the Moderator's Fund at the end of 1944.
- (2) That the General Council be asked to instruct the Finance Committee to increase the appropriation to the Board of Home Missions by an amount sufficient for the carrying out of this extra work.
- (3) That the Executive in June be asked to set the amount required to meet this need and report to the General Council.

Resolution of Montreal & Ottawa Conference—

A recommendation was presented from the Montreal & Ottawa Conference that "the Home Mission Board request the General Council to permit it to add the Moderator's Fund fields to the Home Mission list, and do away with the Moderator's Fund." No action necessary.

Rate of Interest on Loans

It was agreed that interest rates on loans from the Property Fund should be lowered 1% for 1944.

Property Claims

ST. JOHN'S—

Flower's Cove.—Presbytery recommended a grant of \$200 to help rebuild the church which was destroyed by fire. Agreed.

PICTOU—

Stellarton Mission.—A grant of \$200 was recommended for painting the building. Allowed.

SYDNEY—

Sydney Community House.—A special grant was asked for a new furnace and radiators, to cost \$900. Approved.

HALIFAX—

Dartmouth, Stairs Memorial Church.—Conference Committee recommended the cancellation of \$500 of the amount of debt, on condition the balance is paid by March 1944. Agreed to accept \$2,000 in full settlement in 1944.

FREDERICTON—

Minto.—Presbytery and Conference Committee recommended that \$20 of the interest be cancelled and all future interest, on the understanding that the debt be paid in two annual instalments of \$260 each, beginning in 1944. Agreed.

MONTREAL—

Montreal Italian Work.—The following resolution was adopted by the Home Missions Committee of Montreal Presbytery in March 1944, and agreed to by the Board:

- (a) The purchase of a site 75'x100' on the corner of Belanger and Chabot, or Belanger and Cartier, from the Protestant School Board

for not more than \$1,500.00; or otherwise, the purchase of a site slightly north of Belanger, and immediately north of 6957 Fabre Street, 75' x 90', for not more than \$1,300.00, and that the Congregation assume the purchase price as a first contribution to the building project.

- (b) That the Italian Congregation be requested to begin immediately the financial campaign which it has agreed to undertake among its people and friends, and that it be urged to raise as much money as possible towards the new building.
- (c) That the Board of Home Missions be requested to provide a grant of at least \$15,000 and a loan of \$5,000.00, without interest, to be used for the erection of the church building; the plans for such building to be subject to the approval of Rev. Geo. Dorey, Associate Secretary of the Board of Home Missions; Rev. J. I. MacKay, Superintendent of Home Missions in the area concerned; Rev. D. R. Gualtieri, the Minister of the Italian Congregation, and the Sub-Committee of the Home Mission Committee of the Montreal Presbytery which has been appointed to provide suitable accommodation for the Italian work.

Longueuil.—It was recommended that the Board cancel all arrears of interest and charge no further interest, and enter into such engagement as will hold the capital of this loan as a debt to be paid only when and if the property is sold. It was agreed to charge no interest for five years, the matter then to be reviewed.

St. Columba House, Montreal.—The H. M. Committee of Presbytery recommended that repairs to the furnace amounting to \$74.44 be voted, and that a grant of \$180 be given for painting and plastering. Agreed.

BELLVILLE—

Coe Hill Charge, The Ridge.—Conference Committee endorsed a request for a grant of \$500 to help build a church to cost \$2,000. Agreed.

OSHAWA—

Northminster Church.—The Board of Stewards passed a resolution offering to pay the Board of Home Missions \$1,000 during 1944, in full payment of the principal and interest owing on the Scott mortgage. Referred to the Secretaries, to confer with the Scott family and to report to the Executive.

COCHRANE—

Monteith.—Presbytery recommended cancellation of all interest charges on this loan. Board agreed to add no interest for five years.

Schumacher.—Presbytery recommended that the Board cancel interest for 1942 on condition that the congregation paid \$500 on principal in 1943. \$1,200 was paid in January. It was recommended also that the extra \$700 paid be applied on principal and that all accrued interest be cancelled on condition that \$2,550 due on principal is paid in 1944. Agreed.

MUSKOKA—

Gibson Reserve.—It was reported that the fence needs repairs and that a tender of \$50 had been received. The house also needs repairs and insulation of outside walls. A grant up to \$350 was allowed.

SIMCOE—

Christian Island Parsonage.—Conference Committee concurred in the recommendation of the Home Mission Committee of Presbytery that the outside walls and ceiling downstairs be lined with insulation board, and that the chimney be repaired and floor levelled. A grant of \$200 was allowed.

TORONTO CENTRE—

Toronto, 127 Pacific Ave.—Repairs amounting to approximately \$100 were recommended by Presbytery and Conference Committee. Agreed.

TORONTO EAST—

Dentonia Park.—The Board approved of a recommendation of Presbytery and Conference Committee that \$1,000 a year be paid on the loan for the next five years, and that it be applied on principal, interest during this period to be waived, and the whole situation reviewed at the end of five years, in the light of conditions then existing, the first payment to be made in 1944.

St. Enoch's.—Subject to the recommendation of Presbytery, the Board agreed to accept \$5,000 in full payment of this loan, by the end of 1944.

ALGOMA—

Sault Ste. Marie, All People's Church.—It was agreed to give a grant for painting the manse and house adjoining the Mission.

MIDDLESEX—

London, Friendship House.—Repairs as recommended were approved as follows: New eavestroughing around the building, porch for front door, and fixing up the grounds following the removal of the old house—total \$390.00.

NORWAY HOUSE—

Norway House.—The missionary asked for an auxiliary water tank to be constructed of cement. No action.

SUPERIOR—

Port Arthur, Knox Church.—A grant of \$5,000 and a loan of \$5,000 were asked for a new church to cost \$20,000. The following was passed: "That in view of the fact that Knox Church, Port Arthur, serves a community in which there are many non-Anglo-Saxons, resolved to make a loan of \$7,500 for ten years without interest, on further condition that the people of the other churches of Port Arthur, make a contribution of a like amount to the building fund of Knox Church."

Lakehead Missions.—Presbytery and Conference Committee recommended repairs to West Wayside, \$100; East Wayside repairs, \$98.00, and Fourth Ave. painting, \$100. Agreed.

WINNIPEG—

Robertson House.—On recommendation of the Conference Committee it was agreed to vote \$121 for a new kitchen floor.

Selkirk.—On recommendation of the Conference H. M. Committee, it was agreed to accept the proposal that credit be given for \$3 for every \$2 paid, on the understanding that the congregation raise \$400 each year for five years, and interest to be cancelled from Jan. 1st, 1944.

ASSINIBOIA—

Hazenmore.—It was agreed on recommendation of Presbytery, that \$1,000 from the sale of the manse be accepted in full settlement of the church loan.

Meyronne. It was agreed to accept \$1,130.82 in 1944, as payment in full of the loan.

ELROSE—

Tuberosa.—On recommendation of the Conference Committee it was agreed to accept \$50 in full settlement of the loan.

KINDERLEY—

Smiley.—On recommendation of Presbytery it was agreed to accept one half the total amount of the interest and principal outstanding, or \$528, in settlement of this debt, the amount to be sent in 1944.

MOOSE JAW—

Tugaske.—The Board agreed to accept the recommendation, that \$1,000 be repaid at \$200 per year for five years without interest in full settlement of the loan, the first payment in 1944.

PRINCE ALBERT—

Mitchell Memorial Hospital.—The Hospital Board requested a sum necessary to paint both inside and outside of the building, and also to secure certain furnishings for the Matron's room. \$90 was passed for furnishings and the balance of the request was referred to the secretaries after hearing from the Superintendent of Missions.

Mistatim.—Presbytery recommended grant of \$29.50 for repairs to the church. Referred to Secretaries and Superintendent.

QU'APPELLE—

Broadview.—It was agreed to accept the recommendation of the Conference Committee, that \$100 when paid, be credited to principal.

Whitewood.—It was agreed to apply the \$100 received in January to principal instead of interest, as recommended.

REGINA—

Pasqua Indian Church Property.—Consideration was given to the recommendation of Presbytery and Conference Committee, that any dispo-

sition of this property be left with the Home Mission Board in consultation with Presbytery. It was agreed to protect the building and board up the windows.

SASKATOON—

Delisle.—Presbytery approved the proposal of the congregation to sell one manse not in use, the proceeds to be given partly to Donovan congregation and partly to the Home Missions Board, and also recommended that the Board accept \$700 in full liquidation of debt. Referred to Secretaries.

Domremy.—On recommendation of Presbytery and the Conference Committee, the Board agreed to accept in full settlement \$200 in 1944, \$200 in 1945 and \$100 in 1946, total \$500, in connection with the loan.

Harris.—Presbytery and Conference Committee concurred in the request that the Board accept in full settlement of the debt, the sale price of the house, provided it is at least \$1,108.65 and if more is realized from the sale, the additional amount to be paid. Agreed.

Lockwood.—The Board agreed to the recommendation of Presbytery and Conference Committee that this debt be cancelled providing the charge pays \$250 in 1944, \$250 in 1945 and \$148 in 1946, total \$648.

Viscount.—It was agreed to accept the recommendation, that the loan be settled in full by payment of \$2,000 at the rate of \$200 a year for the next ten years, beginning in 1944.

Wakaw.—The Board agreed to accept \$950 in full settlement of the loan, the amount to be paid in 1944. This was on recommendation of the Presbytery and Conference Committee.

SHAUNAVON—

Frontier.—Presbytery and Conference Committee recommended that the Board accept \$150 in full settlement of the debt if paid by May 1, 1944. Agreed.

Pontiox.—On recommendation of the Conference Committee it was agreed to accept \$375 in full settlement of the indebtedness, the amount to be paid in 1944.

DRUMHELLER—

Acadia Valley.—Presbytery recommended transfer of the church lots to the Mennonite church for \$80. Agreed, subject to approval of the Sub-executive of the General Council.

HIGH RIVER—

Brant.—On recommendation of the Conference Committee it was agreed to liquidate this loan by payment of \$125 in each of the years 1944, 1945 and 1946, without interest.

LETHBRIDGE—

Nobleford.—Presbytery and Conference Committee recommended that \$700 be accepted in full payment of this loan, the amount to be sent in 1944. Agreed.

LACOMBE—

Land near Lacombe.—It was agreed to rent this forty acre plot for \$40, the lessee to pay the taxes. It was also agreed to ask the Superintendent to make an effort to sell the land.

PEACE RIVER—

Fairview.—Presbytery and Conference Committee recommended that \$1,000 sent forward, be accepted in full payment of the loan. Agreed.

Hotchkiss, on the Notikewin Charge.—A grant of \$400 was voted towards the building of a church.

ST. PAUL—

George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake.—Conference Committee recommended a grant of \$1,400 for a Diesel Engine. Agreed.

Iron River on the Bonnyville Charge.—Conference Committee recommended a grant of \$50 to help shingle the church. No action.

CARIBOO—

Williams Lake.—Presbytery and Conference Committee recommended a grant of \$645 to cover, excavation for basement under the church \$200, concrete wall for basement \$350, and new foundation for manse \$95, on the understanding that when such grant is made they will take over and assume responsibility for the future maintenance of the property. Agreed to make a grant of \$400 on this understanding.

PRINCE RUPERT—

Hartley Bay.—Conference Committee recommended a grant up to \$90 for furnishings. Agreed.

Port Simpson.—Conference Committee recommended a grant up to \$40 for improvements to the Mission House, \$100 for a kitchen range. Agreed.

"Thomas Crosby".—As the Marine Committee must each year incur certain expenditures in the month of May for overhaul of this boat, it was requested that the Secretaries be authorized to pay up to \$400 to cover these accounts, anything over this amount to be referred to the Executive. Agreed.

VANCOUVER—

Deep Cove.—Conference Committee recommended a grant of \$500 and a loan of \$500 to build a church. Agreed.

VICTORIA—

Wellington.—Presbytery and Conference Committee recommended a grant of \$500 for a new church. Agreed.

WESTMINSTER—

New Westminster Chinese.—Confirmation was given to the payment of \$10.70 for repairs to the range boiler.

Special Maintenance Claims

BERMUDA—

Moving Expenses, Rev. R. C. White.—Presbytery requested that the Board give special consideration to the case of Mr. White, St. George's charge, and assume responsibility for the moving expenses of himself and family on their return to a charge in Canada. No action.

HALIFAX—

Sambro.—Agreed to vote \$27.26 for week-end supply by student, from October 1st to December 31st.

MONTREAL—

Lacroix.—Payment of taxes for 1943, amounting to \$63.69, was confirmed.

ELROSE—

Lucky Lake.—Agreed that grant be continued for six months to Mrs. H. J. Stirling, widow of minister.
