# DIGEST OF MINUTES

# THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS JUNE 28TH, 1945

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Thursday, June 28th, 1945, at 9:30 a.m., the Chairman presiding.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Chairman.

Members present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, R. B. Cochrane, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, S. H. Greenslade, J. G. Gorwill, Geo. Telford, Mr. M. H. Staples and Judge M. A. Miller.

Regrets were received from Mr. Fred Mann, Mr. J. C. Pinch and Mr. K. M. Kilbourn. The Secretary reported that Mr. Mann had recently undergone an operation and was still in hospital. The Secretary was asked to write Mr. Mann, expressing the hopes of the Executive for a full and speedy recovery.

Minute Secretary: Rev. S. H. Greenslade, B.A., was appointed Minute Secretary.

#### Communications

Communications were presented as follows:

- (6) Twillingate Presbytery, expressing gratitude for increased grants, continuation of cost of living bonus, and extra travel allowance.
- (7) Cariboo Presbytery, in appreciation of increased salary grants.
- (8) Chairman of Maritime Conference H. M. Committee, expressing pleasure that the Board accepted the recommendation that Mr. Godfrey give his full time to Home Mission Work.
- (9) Home Missions Council of North America, in appreciation of grant.
- (10) John Milton Society for the Blind, thanking the Board for grant.
- (11) Chief Billy Assu, Cape Mudge, B.C., thanking the Board for its action requesting the appointment of a Royal Commission to investigate Indian affairs.
- (12) Associated Board of Stewards, Grande Prairie Presbytery, asking that "a minister of some standing be stationed in the Grande Prairie area to serve as Radio Pastor and under Presbytery to act as general supervisor and co-ordinator of the work of the United Church in the area, the initial support for the man to come from the Home Mission Board and the Radio Committee of The United Church of Canada. It is further requested that in the event of this appointment being made the Associated Board of Stewards be consulted." It was reported that this had been referred to the Committee on Radio.
- (13) The Treasurer, reporting Legacies paid to Home Mission Reserve for five months ended May 31st, 1945—\$18,269.13, and Annuity Gifts—\$4,073.30.
- (14) Rev. W. P. Bunt re gift of \$450.00 from Mr. James Collins of Bowen Island, B.C., to be divided equally between Home and Overseas Missions, and suggesting that this Board's share might be set aside to purchase some piece of equipment for the new boat which will serve the West Coast of Vancouver Island. It was agreed to accept this suggestion.

# Sympathy

It was directed that an expression of the sympathy of the members of the Executive should be sent to Dr. and Mrs. W. D. Noyes on the death of their son on active service in the Pacific; and also to Rev. J. C. Cochrane, D.D., whose wife passed away a few days ago.

# Congratulations

The Executive directed that congratulations should be extended to Rev. Andrew Roddan on his election to the Presidency of the British Columbia Conference, and to Rev. S. R. Cooper on his election to the Presidency of the Newfoundland Conference; also, to Rev. E. J. Staley, who has completed twenty-five years as Principal of the Morley Indian Residential School.

#### Report Re Action of Executive of General Council

The Secretary reported for information that the Executive of the General Council had taken action as follows, on matters referred to it by the Home Mission Board:

Re Licentiates from Presbyterian Church in Ireland-

The suggestion regarding employment of Licentiates of The Presbyterian Church in Ireland was referred back to the Board of Home Missions, with the recommendation that, provided there are openings in the church when these men are available, the church should consider making use of their services.

#### Baptisms, Newfoundland Conference-

"The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions was requested to notify the Newfoundland Conference that when the Executive of General Council or its Sub-Executive receives the names of Lay Workers in the Newfoundland Conference who should be given authority to administer the Sacrament of Baptism, the Executive or the Sub-Executive will take the necessary action."

#### Nisbet Memorial School Home

Mr. Macdonald made a statement with regard to the present situation of the Nisbet Memorial School Home. After discussion, the following resolution was adopted:

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions agrees to the appointment of Rev. E. J. Rainey, Tisdale (nominated by the Saskatchewan Conference Home Mission Committee) as Principal of the Nisbet School Home, on the following conditions:

- (1) That salary be at the rate of \$1,300 a year plus board and maintenance for himself and his family.
- (2) And further, that the Executive expresses itself as favourable to the following proposals made by a joint meeting of representatives of the Radio Committee and the Secretaries of this Board:
  - (a) In addition to his regular duties as Principal, Mr. Rainey will co-operate with the Radio Committee and give three half hour radio broadcasts a week from the Prince Albert Station. He will devote as much time as his duties permit to the cultivation of the Radio Ministry from the Prince Albert centre.
  - (b) For this extra work he shall receive in addition to his salary, as above stated, an honorarium from the Radio Committee of \$300 per year.

- (c) The Radio Committee will pay to the Board of Home Missions the sum of \$500 in lieu of the provision made by that Board for residence and maintenance for Mr. Rainey while serving in the dual capacity.
- (d) The term of dual service shall be for the Conference year and shall then be subject to review. Therefore, this is not to be considered as a final policy either for the School Home or the Radio Ministry.

It was directed that a copy of the above resolution should be sent to Rev. Dr. Nicol, Superintendent of Missions, and to Rev. E. J. Rainey.

#### Equipment-

The purchase of new mattresses and bedding for the School Home was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

# Appointments

# Institutions-

Toronto, Queen St. Church: (1) Agreed that Miss Gladys Gerard be appointed as Girls' Worker, for one year, with the proviso that she assist in camp work during the summer.

(2) Agreed to the appointment of Mr. Lloyd Perry as Boys' Worker, for one year, on a part-time basis, on condition that he help with the camp work during the summer; and that the matter of salary be left with the Secretaries.

#### Indian Work-

The following appointments were confirmed

#### Hospitals-

The appointent of Mr. J. H. Toogood as Student Assistant for the summer at the R. W. Large Memorial Hospital, Bella Bella, was reported for information.

#### Sarnia Area—

It was agreed that the request of the Extension Committee, approved by the Lambton Presbytery, for the appointment of an Inter-Church Woman Worker for the suburban area of Sarnia, be referred back to the Extension Committee for further information.

# Appointment of Workers Under The Woman's Missionary Society

#### Algoma Presbytery-

Agreed to recommend to The Woman's Missionary Society that a Woman Worker be appointed to serve on St. Joseph Island in the summer and in the Wharncliffe area in the winter. Moose Jaw Presbytery\_

The request for the appointment of a Missionary-at-Large for Moose Jaw and district was referred to the Secretaries for consultation with The Woman's Missionary Society.

#### Twillingate Presbytery-

It was reported for information that Miss Bessie French, whose appointment as Travelling Missionary had been confirmed by the Board, was unable 'to accept the appointment.

#### Licenses for Lay Missionaries to Administer Sacraments

(1) Agreed to recommend that the license of Mr. C. H. Milton, White River, Sudbury Presbytery, be renewed for one year.

(2) No action was taken on the request of Lunenburg-Queen's Presbytery that a license be granted to Mr. S. A. Custance, of The Rocks.

(3) Agreed to recommend that license be granted to Mr. Geo. Wilkinson, if appointed to Nakina, in the Cochrane Presbytery.

(4) Agreed to recommend that licenses be granted to the following lay missionaries on Indian fields:

Little Grand Rapids Mr. Abram Neufeld Norway House Presbytery Oxford House ..... Mr. Edwin C. Brandt Norway House Presbytery Bella Coola ....... Mr. Luther Schuetze Prince Rupert Presbytery

# Indian Work

# Re Mount Elgin Residential School-

Dr. Dorey reported on the financial and general situation with regard to this School, and stated that it would be necessary to carry on as at present for another year.

# Hospital Work

Salaries of Doctors-

Dr. Dorey stated that information had been received regarding the very large amounts paid on income tax and for transportation by the Medical Superintendents of the Cruise Memorial and the George McDougall Hospitals, leaving the net salary totally inadequate and making some adjustment necessary.

It was decided to refer the matter to the Secretaries, Dr. Dorey to confer with the Doctors when he visits the Hospitals in September.

# George McDougall Hospital-

It was agreed to refer to the Secretaries the request of the Medical Superintendent for the appointment of a second Doctor.

### Port Simpson Hospital-

1. It was reported that Dr. G. W. Fiddes had resigned as Medical Superintendent, effective June 30th. On motion, it was resolved to accept Dr. Fiddes' resignation and that the Secretary be asked to send him a letter, expressing appreciation of his services.

2. It was agreed that Dr. V. Franklin be appointed Medical Superintendent, from July 1st, 1945, at a salary of \$2,500 per annum, with furnished house.

3. On motion, it was resolved that Dr. Franklin be given authority to conduct business with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Prince Rupert, on behalf of the Hospital, and that a resolution to that effect be inscribed in the Minutes.

# Hafford Hospital-

D

It was agreed that authorization for transacting business with the Bank of Nova Scotia, Saskatoon, on behalf of the Hafford Hospital, be given to Dr. J. L. Nicol and Mr. A. J. Irving, replacing the authority given to Dr. J. L. Nicol and Dr. J. A. Snell, by action of the Executive on January 25th, 1945.

#### Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Dr. Dorey reported that a letter had been received from Rev. H. W. Kerley, a Chaplain Overseas, with regard to the possibility of the United Church using the services of Mr. Yourko Kluchevsky, a Ukranian student, who has completed his course at New College, Edinburgh, having taken his B.A. degree. and three years' Theology, and is at present Assistant to the Minister at Newington and St. Leonard's Parish, Edinburgh.

It was decided that this be left with the Secretaries to explore the situation and take any necessary action.

#### Student Missionary Work

#### Reports on Students-

Mr. Macdonald stated that a letter had been received from Dr. F. W. Langford, Dean of Emmanuel College, asking if it would be possible to secure reports on Students about the time of or soon after the opening of College. This was referred to the Secretaries and Superintendents.

#### Hunta-Clute Field-

It was requested that permission be given to the Student serving the Hunta-Clute field to use a portion of the funds raised during the summer to repair the churches at these two points. Agreed to refer to Mr. Macdonald, for conference with the Superintendent of Missions.

# Re Mr. Edward Yoshioka-

It was reported that Mr. Yoshioka had suffered an accident while serving his field, occasioning medical and hospital expenses of \$62.50. Agreed to refer to Secretaries, with power.

#### Re Portable Church at Ajax

After discussion, the Executive adopted the following resolution:

When the Board of Home Missions loaned free of charge the Portable Church to the Co-operating Committee for Christian Service in Camp and War Production Communities, it was on the understanding that it would be used to provide religious services for the Protestant people of Ajax on a co-operative basis agreed upon by the four communions (Anglican, Baptist, Presbyterian and United).

Our Executive has learned that by July 31st the war industry plant at Ajax will be closed. The young people resident in the dormitories will all be gone by June 30th. Those who will be living in the houses will no longer be engaged in war industry work, but rather in non-war work in Toronto, Oshawa, and other centres.

In view of this definite change in the situation, the Executive of the Board of Home Missions feels that the purpose for which the Portable Church was loaned has been fulfilled.

We recognize the need for providing on a co-operative basis religious services and ministries to the Protestant people who will be living temporarily in the Ajax community. We are informed of the desire of the Board of the Inter-Church Congregation there to have a minister to succeed the Rev. A. W. Jones after June 30th, this minister to give full time services and live in the community.

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions will, therefore, gladly consent to the continuing of the loan of the Portable Church, free of charge, to Ajax for one year at least (if the need still exists at the end of the year, the term will be extended accordingly), on the following conditions:

(1) That the building will be used for co-operative and interdenominational services and that no one of the four co-operating communions will ask for special considerations not enjoyed by any or all of the other three;

(2) That the local board may permit the use of the building ' by any co-operating church at any time which does not interfere with the regular co-operative services at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Sunday; and

(3) That provision will be made by the four co-operating communions to bear the expense of returning the Portable Church to Toronto (or to some other point) at the end of its term of service at Ajax.

# Possibility of Purchasing Houses from War Assets Corporation

The question was raised as to the possibility and advisability of purchasing houses from The War Assets Corporation, with the idea of using them on Home Mission fields. This was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

#### Re Ministers Giving Service to Vacant Charges

Mr. Macdonald reported that a letter had been received from Rev. A. D. Pringle, Elk Point, Alberta, re additional remuneration for ministers, now on aid-receiving charges, who might possibly give service to an adjoining vacant charge.

Agreed to refer this to the Secretaries, with power, after consultation with the Superintendent and Presbytery concerned.

# Date of Board Meeting

It was decided that the date of the Annual Meeting of the Board should be set for April 3rd, 1946.

# Fund for Retired Workers

It was agreed to vote a grant of \$25.00 a month from the Fund for Retired Workers to Miss Rheba Hossack, after resignation from College Street Church-St. Christoper House, Toronto, which will take effect September 1st, next.

#### **Property** Claims

#### PICTOU-

Stellarton Mission.—Agreed to vote grant of \$150.00 for repairs, instead of \$50.00 as requested, in error, at the time of the Board.

#### MONCTON-

Gunningsville.—Agreed to make loan of \$2,000, without interest, for one year, to build a Sunday School hall.

# QUEBEC-SHERBROOKE-

Lake Megantic.--No action was taken on request for grant of \$250 towards cost of repairs to manse.

#### MONTREAL-

Montreal, St. Columba.—Agreed to vote \$136 for repairs and painting.

# BELLEVILLE-

St. Ola-Cashel Church.-No action was taken on request for grant of \$75.00 for repairs.

#### SIMCOE-

Angus.—A grant of \$1,650 was voted towards cost of basement and additional room.

#### SUDBURY-

Silverwater—Evansville Appointment.—Agreed to vote grant of \$100 and loan of \$100 towards re-opening and rehabilitation of old old church, closed for many years. Sudbury, All Peoples'.---Agreed to vote \$125 for painting exterior of building.

Essex-

Tecumseh Church.-Agreed to make grant of \$1,000 and loan of \$2,500, without interest for one year, towards erection of church.

Roseland Church.--Agreed to make grant of \$1,000 and loan of \$2,000, without interest for one year, towards erection of church.

The amounts in each case were put in the hands of the Secretaries, for release subsequent to visitation and investigation.

Walker Road Church.—Presbytery requested grant of \$3,000 and loan of \$5,000, without interest, if possible, towards building church. Action deferred, pending investigation by Secretaries.

#### SUPERIOR-

Nipigon-Beardmore.—Agreed to vote grant of \$250 and loan of \$750, towards cost of basement and additional room.

Port Arthur, Knox Church.—Presbytery requested that the loan of \$7,500 be now made available. The congregation has \$10,000 on hand, including 'gifts from members of other churches in Port Arthur. Agreed to grant proportion of the loan of \$7,500 which the amount on hand bears to the sum of \$12,500 which it was hoped to raise when the application was before the Board.

Fort William, West Wayside.—Presbytery recommended loan of \$20,000 for erection of a church. Referred to Secretaries for further information and report to Executive.

#### WINNIPEG-

Winnipeg, McLean Mission.—Agreed to vote \$100 for repairs to roof.

ASSINIBOIA-

Viceroy—Manse.—Agreed to allow congregation to retain \$300 (being amount received over and above anticipated sale price), to help restore church property.

#### ELROSE-

Dunblane.—It was reported that the Superintendent had an offer of \$1,100 for the building known as the Finnish Manse. It was decided to ask for \$1200 and to agree to the sale at that price.

#### MOOSE JAW-

Shamrock.—Agreed to accept offer to purchase the manse for \$950—\$500 cash and balance at \$25.00 per month.

# REGINA-

Avonhurst.—Agreed to accept \$75 in full settlement of balance due on loan.

# CALGARY-

Ebenezer.—Agreed to vote grant of \$500 and loan of \$1,000, with interest at 4%, to help congregation provide manse for minister. EDMONTON—

Athabasca—Manse.—Agreed to vote grant of \$500 and loan of \$500 towards erection of new manse, with the suggestion that part of the grant come from the Arnold Estate.

Beverly, Church.—A grant of \$4,000 was voted towards cost of moving building to new site, adding basement, reshingling roof, etc.

# ST. PAUL-

George McDougall Hospital, Smoky Lake.—Agreed to confirm action of Secretaries in authorizing purchase of Esso Stove at cost of \$1,050.00.

# THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS September 6th, 1945

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Home Mission Offices, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Thursday, September 6th, 1945, at 9:30 a.m., the Chairman presiding.

The devotions were conducted by the Chairman, who made reference to the great loss sustained by the Board in the sudden death of its Secretary, Dr. Cochrane. Members present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, S. H.<sup>3</sup>Greenslade, J. G. Gorwill, George Telford, Messrs. K. M., Kilbourn, Fred Mann, and Judge M. A. Miller.

Regrets were presented from Mr. J. C. Pinch and Mr. M. H. Staples. It was directed that a telegram of congratulations be sent to Mr. and Mrs. Pinch, who are to-day celebrating their Fortieth Wedding Anniversary and the home-coming of their son after five years' service overseas.

Minute Secretary: On motion, Rev. S. H. Greenslade was appointed Minute Secretary.

# Communications

Communications were presented from the following-

- (1) Miss Edith Cochrane, in appreciation of flowers sent on behalf of the Board, at the time of Dr. Cochrane's death.
- (2) Dr. J. C. Cochrane, thanking the Executive for expression of sympathy.
- (3) Dr. W. D. Noyes, in appreciation of sympathy extended in connection with the death of his son on active service.
- (4) The Secretary of the Newfoundland Conference, and also the Secretary of the Carbonear Presbytery, recording appreciation of the action of the Board in providing a bonus for Married Ministers and Lay Supplies on aid-receiving charges.

Thanks to Ministers Who Supplied Aid-Receiving Charges

The Executive expressed its gratitude to ministers who supplied aid-receiving charges during the holidays, thus enabling the pastors of such fields to have a vacation.

# Sympathy

It was requested that letters of sympathy be sent to the family of the late Rev. Frank Myers, Home Mission Convener of the Estevan Presbytery, and to the family of the late Rev. Arthur Wilkinson, Secretary of the Home Mission Committee of the Montreal Presbytery.

#### Death of Dr. Cochrane

Resolution of Appreciation-

It was agreed that the Chairman and the Rev. J. G. Gorwill be a committee to prepare a resolution of appreciation of Dr. Cochrane. Later, the Committee reported the following Resolution:

With the passing of Rev. Robert B. Cochrane, M.A., D.D., on July 17th, 1945, the Board of Home Missions lost its Secretary and The United Church of Canada a leader who had enthusiastically espoused the cause of Church Union and whose hand and heart had been given to every major enterprise in the Church since the Union.

Before entering the service of the Board in the spring of 1929, Dr. Cochrane had served with singular effectiveness in three churches-Knox, Woodstock, 1907-15; College Street, Toronto, 1915-25; and Augustine, Winnipeg, 1925-29. His exceptional qualities of mind and heart, developed and enriched by over twenty years in the pastorate, were given without stint to the service of this Board. It was providential that he had a few brief months to acquaint himself with the workings of the Department before the depression depleted the revenues of the Church and the drought in the West set back the process of growth in the Church's work on the prairies. That the United Church met these twin misfortunes with resourcefulness was due, in large part, to the way in which Dr. Cochrane compelled the Church to take a serious view of her responsibilities. By his own faith, he constrained the whole body of Home Mission workers to realize that the national crisis constituted an opportunity for the Throughout the war period which ended the depression, the Church. same venturesome, experimental spirit marked the leadership of our late Chief, and we are grateful that he was able to carry through his work until peace was about to return. It is a source of amazement to us all that this man, so hard-pressed with administrative duties. could find time and have the vision to inspire movements so significant for the future of the 'Church.

Dr. Cochrane had a way of drawing to himself, all through his working life, men twenty years his junior. He loved youth and he belonged among them. It was useless for "R.B." to tell his young colleagues that he was getting old. They knew him as one of themselves. As the Moderator declared at his funeral, "The Church has suffered no greater loss since the time of Union." That loss will be felt more keenly as the months pass, and most keenly by those who are only coming to places of leadership in the Church,—the men for whom he planned and who will live to see the wisdom of his course proved.

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions, meeting in Toronto on the 6th day of September, 1945, wishes to record its great sense of loss in our Chief's passing, and to express to Mrs. Cochrane and her daughters the deepest sympathy of its members.

#### Payment of Grant\_\_\_\_

It was moved, seconded and carried, that we make a grant of \$4,125 to the Estate of the late Dr. R. B. Cochrane,—\$2,125 to be paid out of 1945 income and \$2,000 out of 1946 income.

# Recommendations to Sub-Executive of General Council-

'1. On motion of Mr. Fred Mann, seconded by Rev. George Telford, it was resolved that we recommend to the Sub-Executive of the General Council:

(a) That Dr. Dorey be appointed Acting Secretary of the Board of Home Missions until the next meeting of the General Council; and (b) That payment of salary to Dr. Dorey be on the basis of Secretary of the Board.

The Associate Secretaries were excused from voting.

2. It was moved, seconded and carried, That we nominate Dr. Dorey for appointment to the Executive of the General Council and to the Board of Finance.

# Distribution of Work-

It was agreed that the matter of distribution of the work of Dr. Cochrane be left to the Associate Secretaries for arrangement between themselves.

Mr. Macdonald made a further report regarding the difficulty of securing reports on Students in time for opening of Colleges. He recommended-

(1) That this matter be referred for special study to the meeting of the Secretaries and Superintendents in the Spring;

(2) That Superintendents of Missions be asked to report directly to the College authorities regarding students who have not made a satisfactory showing; and

(3) That Presbyteries be asked to forward as soon as possible reports on students to their home Presbyteries,—copies of such reports to be sent to the Colleges concerned.

Agreed.

#### Hunta-Clute Field-

Mr. Macdonald reported that the property had been repaired and redecorated satisfactorily, and the financial problem solved.

# Medical Expenses of Mr. Edward Yoshioka-

Mr. Macdonald reported that, no assistance being forthcoming from any other source, it would be necessary to pay the medical and hospital expenses of Mr. Yoshioka.

#### Re Supplies from War Assets Corporation-

Mr. Macdonald stated that, after investigation, it had been found that it would be impossible to secure, at the present time, houses, cars, or any other articles, from the War Assets Corporation.

# Remuneration of Ministers serving adjoining Vacant Charges-

Mr. Macdonald stated that no decision had been arrived at since the last meeting of the Executive and suggested that the matter be considered in the light of any action taken by this Executive regarding the remuneration of ministers serving combined fields in Saskatchewan. It was decided to refer the matter to the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned.

# Re Salaries of Doctors-

After hearing an explanation by Dr. Dorey, it was decided:

That for 1945 the salary of the Medical Superintendent be \$3500.00 and that the Hospital be authorized to pay car expenses not exceeding \$800.00.

# 2-Re George McDougall Hospital-

That for 1945 the salary of the Medical Superintendent be \$3000.00, and that the Hospital be authorized to pay car expenses not exceeding \$800.00.

# Nisbet Memorial School Home

Mr. Macdonald reported that, in accordance with the action of the last Executive, Rev. E. J. Rainey had taken over his duties as Principal of the School Home, but that the suggestion that Mr. Rainey also act as Radio Minister for the Saskatchewan Conference had not been acceptable to the Saskatchewan Conference Home Mission Committee or the Saskatchewan Conference Radio Committee.

#### "Star-Phoenix" Account\_

It was reported that the "Star-Phoenix" newspaper of Saskatoon had called Dr. Nicol's attention to a long overdue account for advertising, amounting to \$34.84, overlooked on account of the illness of a former Principal, and had signified their willingness to accept payment of one-half the amount. It was agreed to pay an amount of \$20.00 in settlement of this account.

It was agreed that Mr. Goodland be permitted to retain this money,—Dr. Dorey to have further correspondence with him.

#### Re Student Missionaries

#### Accident to Mr. R. M. Moriartey-

Mr. Macdonald reported that Mr. Moriartey, Student Missionary on the Hines Creek field, had suffered serious injuries while helping to fight a bush fire. The Executive expressed sympathy and referred to the Secretaries the question of payment of medical and hospital expenses.

# Date of Students' Leaving Fields-

Mr. Macdonald stated that a problem had arisen through the fact that a number of students, owing to the early date of opening of some of the Colleges and for various other reasons, were leaving their fields before the date agreed upon at their appointment. This was referred to Mr. Macdonald and the Superintendents of Missions, to take what action was thought wise.

#### Candidates for the Ministry in Armed Services

On motion, it was resolved that we recommend that the Sub-Executive of the General Council make representations to the Department of National Defence, asking that all Candidates for the Ministry now in the Services be released as soon as possible.

# Memorial Service-for Dr. Cochrane

It was decided that a Memorial Service for Dr. Cochrane should be held at the time of the Board Meeting.

It was also directed than an enlarged photograph of Dr. Cochrane should be secured, to be placed alongside those of other former Secretaries in the Home Mission Office.

# Maintenance Claims

Report Re Items Referred to Secretaries by Last Executive -

1. Re Combined Fields in Saskatchewan: Dr. Nicol reports that the Edam-Turtleford-St. Walburg field will pay Rev. Robert G. Oliver \$2,250 and that no grant will be required from the Board. Meadow Lake-Pierceland-Glaslyn field has promised to pay \$1,900. Pelly-Eldersley-Hudson Bay Junction promises to pay \$1,450. There is no report from Aylsham-Smeaton-White Fox.

Under the terms of the resolution of the Board (Digest, page 71) and of the Executive, June 28th, the salary to be paid on the Meadow Lake-Pierceland-Glaslyn field is \$1,750; and at Pelly-Eldersley-Hudson Bay Junction, \$1,550 or \$1,600, depending on whether there is a house or not. The grant for salary at Pelly is therefore \$100 or \$150, depending on the category into which this field falls.

It was agreed that with regard to extra travel to be paid in the case of Meadow Lake and Pelly, Dr. Nicol be asked to submit an estimate of the amount which, in his judgment, he considers to be necessary to meet the requirements laid down by the Board (Digest page 71, Sec. 2) and that in doing this, he take into consideration (a) the distance between charges and the number of trips necessary each quarter,—this to be paid for at the rate of 5 cents per mile; and (b) the additional amount necessary to do in one week the pastoral work usually done in three weeks; and that the Secretaries be empowered to deal with the matter on receipt of this detailed information from Dr. Nicol, and that the Secretaries have power to make any grant necessary for the Aylsham-Smeaton-White Fox field when Dr. Nicol has reported.

2. Re Tugaske—Moose Jaw Presbytery: The Secretaries reported that, following correspondence with Dr. McDonald, they had agreed to pay the grant at the rate of \$500 a year for the balance of 1945, with the expectation that the Presbytery would review the situation.

#### OTTAWA----

Aylwin.—It was reported that Mr. Adams owes the Board \$40.00, being overpayment on 1944 salary. Mr. Macdonald was instructed to write Mr. Adams, stating the facts regarding the overpayment and advising him that a payment of \$25.00 would be accepted as a satisfactory settlement of the balance.

Regrets were presented from Judge M. A. Miller, Messrs. K. M. Kilbourn and J. C. Pinch.

Minute Secretary: On motion, Rev. S. H. Greenslade was appointed Minute Secretary.

# Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) Mr. Alexander R. Cochrane, thanking the Executive, on behalf of Mrs. R. B. Cochrane, for its action with regard to grant to the Estate of Dr. Cochrane, and also for the resolution with regard to Dr. Cochrane.
- (2) Extending sympathy in connection with Dr Cochrane's passing— The General Board of Missions of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
  - The Canadian Home Mission Council.
  - The Colonial and Continental Committee of the Church of Scotland.
  - The Official Board of Parkview United Church, Stratford.

Reference was made to the recent passing of Mrs. Frank J. Day, Rev. A. Lappala, Mrs. J. G. Perold, Rev. Wm. McNichol, Rev. J. F. MacKay, Mrs. T. Hannochko, and Rev. W. W. Shoup. The Executive directed that in each case a letter of sympathy should be sent to the bereaved wife or husband.

# Report Re Situation at Ajax

Mr. Macdonald reported regarding difficulties which had developed at Ajax with regard to the use of the portable church by the cooperating communions.

It was decided that the matter should be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

# Licenses for Lay Missionaries

It was agreed to recommend to the Executive of the General Council that Licenses to administer the Sacraments be granted to— Mr. Richard Reeves.... Lower Island Cove Carbonear Presbytery Mrs. John Davies .....Nakina ..... Cochrane Presbytery Mrs. Helen Flesseman.....Hornepayne ....... Sudbury Presbytery

# Survey, Northern B. C. Area

Dr. Dorey suggested the advisability of a survey of the area along the line of the Canadian National Railway between Red Pass Junction and Hazelton, having noted on his recent trip the points where there seemed to be a considerable number of children and young people but no United churches or ministers. It was agreed that this be referred to the Secretaries.

# Hospital Work

Dr. Dorey made a statement with regard to his recent visit to Hospitals and meetings with Hospital Boards in the West, which had been undertaken at the direction of the Board. He had visited the Cruise Memorial Hospital, Vita, the Lamont, Wrinch Memorial and Port Simpson Hospitals, had a meeting at Prince Rupert with the Superintendents of our four Hospitals in British Columbia, together with Mr. Bunt, and had also met with the Alberta Hospitals Board.

# Case of Mrs. Silas McAuslan

The Department of Pensions referred to the Home Mission Board for consideration the case of Mrs. Silas McAuslan, widow of a lay supply who had served on various fields for a considerable length of time, Mrs. McAuslan being without any resources. It was decided to make a compassionate grant of \$25.00 a month to Mrs. McAuslan until the meeting of the Board in the Spring; the amount to be paid out of the Fund for Retired Workers.

# Re Full-Time Christian Service Fellowship

Mr. Macdonald reported that the Board was asked to give some assistance in connection with the expenses of a Full-Time Christian Service Fellowship, which it was proposed to hold at Queen's University, the first weekend in January, under the auspices of the Young People's Union of the Bay of Quinte Conference, the purpose being to try to discover the best way of interesting young people in life service to Christian work.

It was agreed to make a grant not to exceed \$50.00, it being understood that the Board of Overseas Missions and The Woman's Missionary Society would make similar contributions.

#### Appointments

It was agreed:

- (1) That Miss Irene Douglas be 'appointed to Friendship House, London, on a part-time basis; grant to be at the rate of \$25.00 a month.
- (2) That the appointment of Miss Helen MacKay, R.N., as Matron of the Bella Coola Hospital be confirmed.

# Missionaries Under the W.M.S.

It was agreed:

- (1) To accede to the request of the Toronto East Presbytery that The Woman's Missionary Society be asked to provide a full-time woman worker, in the person of Miss Jean Stewart, for Oak United Church, Toronto, Mrs. M. E. L. Mercer having asked to be relieved of her duties there.
- (2) To approach The Woman's Missionary Society with the suggestion that, as soon as possible, they provide a full-time woman worker to serve in the two new residential areas in the Eastern end of the city of Sarnia.

#### Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

Finnish Work-

(1) Resolutions were presented from the Committee of the Church of All Nations, Toronto, (a) expressing appreciation of the prompt action of the Board in making available the services of Mr. Helge Hongisto, following the death of Mr. Lappala; and (b) urging that the most careful study be given to the whole situation with respect to the local Finnish work and the work in other parts of Canada, prior to the appointment of a successor to Mr. Lappala. It was decided that item (b) should be referred to the Secretaries, with power.

(2) It was agreed to continue payment of salary to Mrs. Lappala until the time of the meeting of the Board.

#### Italian Work, Toronto-

<sup>9</sup> It was agreed to accede to the recommendation of Presbytery that Mrs. M. E. L. Mercer (who had been serving St. Paul's Italian Church and Oak United, and also doing some survey work) be given permission to do half-time work, in order that she might take a course of study at Emmanuel Collège, the arrangement being that she would continue to serve the Italian Work only.

#### Lakehead Missions-

It was agreed (a) to accede to the request that Miss Gladys Ansell be given two months' leave of absence, with salary, in January and February, in order that she may receive hospital treatment; and (b) to approve the appointment of Miss E. Moffitt as full-time worker during the two months of Miss Ansell's absence, and on a part-time basis for the balance of 1945 and for three months in 1946.

#### Nomination of Secretary, Board of Home Missions

The Chairman reported that a request had come from the General Council's Committee on Vacancies that the Board of Home Missions or its Executive make a nomination to the post of Secretary of the Board of Home Missions.

The Secretaries having retired, the matter was discussed fully, and, on motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

- 1. That a communication be sent to the Committee on Vacancies, presenting the name of Rev. George Dorey, D.D., as our nomination for the post of Secretary of the Board of Home Missions.
- 2. That the Chairman communicate with all members of the Board not members of or present at the Executive and request from them a poll by letter as to whether they are in agreement with this action of their Executive.

#### Student Missionary Work

The Secretaries were given authority to increase the appropriation

for Student Missionary Work, if necessary, in order to bring the salary up to the standard of 1944.

# Authority to Print Hymn Sheets

Authority was given for the expenditure of an amount up to \$200.00, to be taken from the budget for Literature, towards the cost of printing Hymn Sheets with Scripture Readings, in co-operation with the Crusade Committee on Literature.

# Representation, Annual Meeting of Home Missions Council

It was agreed that Dr. Dorey and Mr. Greenslade should represent the Board of Home Missions at the Annual Meeting of the Home Missions Council of North America, to be held at Buck Hill Falls, Pa., January 6-9.

#### Basis for Advances on Grants for 1946

It was directed that advances on grants for the first quarter of 1946 should be made on the basis of the 1945 grants.

# Basis for Applications for Grants by Presbyteries for 1946

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

That the basis on which Presbyteries will make applications for grants for 1946 be \$1600 for Married Ordained Ministers, with furnished manse (\$1650 with unfurnished manse); that Presbyteries urge each pastoral charge to increase its promise on salary for 1946 at least \$50.00 (more if possible), in the hope that when the Home Mission Board meets in the spring to vote grants for 1946, it will be possible to bring the salary scale up to the \$1650 and \$1700 basis for Married Ordained Ministers, with furnished and unfurnished manses, respectively, (and a corresponding increase for those in other categories); further, that Presbyteries give definite notice that the advance to the higher scale of \$1650 and \$1700 will depend entirely upon pastoral charges increasing their promises on salary for 1946, as requested.

# Representation at Meetings of Western Conference Committees

It was agreed that one of the Secretaries should meet with the Home Mission Committees of the Western Conferences in the Spring.

# **Property** Claims

Newfoundland—Boats: (a) It was reported that Mr. Dawe had wired that two boats were available from The War Assets Corporation and recommended their purchase for *Pool's Cove Mission* and *St. Anthony.* A grant had already been made for a boat for Pool's Cove and the Secretaries authorized the purchase of, this boat at a cost of \$3050.00—one-half of which would be borne by the Department of Public Health and Welfare—in addition to which there would be other expenses.

It was later found that the second boat was not suitable for the St. Anthony Mission and it was decided not to purchase it. A grant of \$2,500 is therefore requested so that a boat may be built during the winter, using the engine (which was purchased only last year) from the boat formerly in use at Pool's Cove. It was agreed to grant \$2,500.

(b) It was reported that the new boat for *Pool's Cove* had been damaged by a very severe storm on its trip from St. John's to Fortune Bay. Authority was given for payment of the necessary amount for repairs from the Marine Insurance Fund.

### SYDNEY-

United Mission.—Request for a grant of \$1,000 for repairs was referred to the Secretaries.

Passchendaele, Glace Bay.—Agreed to grant \$5,000 towards provision of suitable building for this mission, the people having pledged themselves to raise \$5,000, and that the Secretaries have conference with The Woman's Missionary Society, with a view to this Board's taking over the building owned by the Society.

# THE EXECUTIVE OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS January 25th, 1946

The Executive of the Board of Home Missions met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Friday, January 25th, 1946, at 9:30 a.m.

The Chairman presided and conducted devotions.

Members present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, S. H. Greenslade, J. G. Gorwill and George Telford, Messrs. K. M. Kilbourn, Fred Mann, M. H. Staples and J. C. Pinch.

On motion, Revs. J. L. Nicol, J. I. MacKay, J. A. Lyttle and J. C. Torrance were made corresponding members.

Regrets were presented from Judge M. A. Miller.

Minute Secretary: Rev. S. H. Greenslade was appointed Minute Secretary.

### Confirmation of Minutes

The Minutes of the meeting of the Executive, held November 6th, 1945, were confirmed.

### Communications

Communications were presented from the following:

- (1) The Presbyteries of Grand Falls and Lacombe, expressing sorrow at Dr. Cochrane's death and paying tribute to his life and work.
- (2) Rev. Dr. Frank J. Day, in appreciation of sympathy extended on the passing of Mrs. Day.

### **Resolutions of Sympathy**

The Late Rev. S. C. Murray, D.D.-

Reference was made to the passing of Dr. Murray, former Superintendent of Missions, and Dr. Nicol was requested to prepare a suitable resolution, to be inscribed in the permanent records of the Board.

#### The Late Rev. W. E. Wilson-

Rev. S. H. Greenslade was asked to prepare a resolution regarding the Rev. W. E. Wilson, formerly minister of King Street United Church, Toronto, who had recently passed away,—for inscription in the permanent records.

The Executive directed that a letter of sympathy should be sentto the widow of the late Rev. Angus C. Cameron, who had been serving an aid-receiving charge in the Vancouver Presbytery, and to Rev. Norman Rawson, Home Mission Convener of the Hamilton Presbytery, on the death of his son.

### Leave of Absence, Dr. J. L. Nicol

The granting of leave of absence to Rev. Dr. J. L. Nicol, for the purpose of delivering the Robertson Memorial Lectures in the Theological Colleges in Eastern Canada, was confirmed.

Contribution Towards Publication of Rev. J. V. M. Beaudon's Book

Request was made for a contribution towards the cost of Mr. Beaudon's book, "Introduction to the New Testament," which is being published in French.

It was agreed that this should be referred to the Secretaries.

### Hospital Work

### George McDougall Hospital-

It was reported that Dr. Dobson estimated that the Hospital would have a surplus of over \$5,000 at the end of 1945 and had asked what disposition should be made of this amount. He stated that expenditures, with estimated costs, should be made as follows: Plaster-boarding of maternity ward..... 200 Plaster-boarding of operating room ..... 100 Walk-in Cooler 1,000 Additional expenses for Doctor-already authorized by the Executive..... 600 \$3,400

It was decided that these expenditures should be authorized, the amounts to be paid out of the present available balance.

### Lamont Hospital-

The appointment of Miss Helen Mayers as Superintendent of Nurses was confirmed.

#### Port Simpson Hospital-

1. It was agreed that the resignation of Dr. V. Franklin as Superintendent be accepted, and that Dr. H. H. Colwell be appointed temporary Superintendent; salary to be at the rate of \$3,000.

2. On motion, it was resolved that Dr. Colwell be given authority to conduct business with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Prince Rupert, on behalf of the Hospital, and that a resolution to that effect be inscribed in the Minutes.

### License for Lay Missionary

On motion. it was decided to recommend to the Sub-Executive of the General Council that a license to administer the Sacraments be granted, to June 30th, to Miss Mary Mansfield, W.M.S. Missionary at Ashmont, in the St. Paul Presbytery.

### **Revision of Manual**

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the General Council, stating that Boards and Departments of the Church were invited to submit recommendations regarding changes in the Manual, for consideration by the Committee on Revision of the Manual, which would report to the next General Council.

The Superintendents of Missions who were present were asked to confer and submit any recommendations which they might have.

# Re Portable Church at Ajax

Mr. Macdonald reported that the portable church was still in use at Aax by the co-operating Communions, the understanding being that, when no longer required there, the expense of moving it would be shared by the Communions making use of it.

### First United Church, Vancouver

It was agreed to authorize the purchase of a warehouse and assets from National War Salvage, at cost of \$6,500—terms: \$2,000 cash and \$100 per month; for use of Welfare Industries in connection with First United Church, Vancouver. (A letter from Dr. Roddan received subsequent to this meeting reports that the deal fell through.)

### Indian Work

#### Mount Elgin Residential School

I. The question of the discontinuance of the Mount Elgin Indian Residential School as a residential school, after June 30th, was discussed at length, and, on motion, it was agreed:

1. That a Committee be appointed to assist the Secretaries in arranging for the termination of the Mount Elgin Residential School at June 30th, next, and to take up with the Government the safeguarding of the interests of the Church, as follows—

- (a) To ensure the enforcement of adequate attendance regulations.
- (b) To see that we have an opportunity to carry on a spiritual ministry as heretofore; and
- (c) To stress the fact that, since we are co-operating in this new educational venture, we expect that more adequate provision will be made for the erection of schools in Northern Manitoba and on other Reserves where the need is great.

The following Committee was named: the Secretaries, Rev. J. G. Gorwill and Mr. K. M. Kilbourn.

II. The financial situation of the Mount Elgin School was also discussed, and it was decided:

(a) To transfer \$3,000 from ordinary revenue to the Indian Work Account, to cover advances made to the Mount Elgin School to December 31st, 1945; and

(b) To pay off \$2,000 of the Bank Overdraft and to authorize an increase in the amount of overdraft from \$6,000 to \$7,000, at the same time informing the Principal and the Manager of the Bank of Montreal, St. Thomas, that this is a maximum amount which must not be exceeded.

III. Reference was made to the epidemic of whooping cough among the pupils at the Mount Elgin School and to the appeal for assistance made by the Principal to students of The United Church Training School, and Dr. Dorey reported that he had got in touch with the Red Cross and that everything possible was being done.

# Alderville Indian Mission-

It was resolved that the sympathy of the Executive be extended to the Chief and Councillors of the Band at Alderville on the loss by fire of their school and community hall.

### Non-Anglo-Saxon Work

### St. Paul's Italian, Toronto-

Mr. Macdonald presented a communication with regard to the provision of proper church facilities for the congregation of St. Paul's Italian Church, Toronto. It was decided to refer the matter to Presbytery and the Toronto Home Missions Council, on the understanding that there should be conference with the Secretaries of the Board of Home Missions.

# Finnish Work, Toronto-

Mr. Macdonald reported, for information, that negotiations were in progress, with a view to securing a minister for the Finnish Congregation of The Church of All Nations, Toronto.

# Friendship House, London-

1. Appointment of Woman Workers It was agreed that Miss Verda Ullman be appointed to Friendship House, London, her services to begin April 1st, if possible,—salary to be at the rate of \$1,000, plus \$200 house allowances and \$120 expenses; and that The Woman's Missionary Society be asked to assume one-half the amount involved.

2. It was decided that the services of Miss Irene Douglas as part-time worker should be continued until the meeting of the Board.

### Oak United Church, Toronto

Mr. Macdonald reported that Miss Jean Stewart had been unable to accept the appointment of Woman Worker at Oak Church, but that Miss Judith Silcox had agreed to give as much time as possible to Girls' Work, the understanding being that she would receive \$100.00 for the term of her service, which would be paid by The Woman's Missionary Society; and that Mrs. M. E. L. Mercer would continue to give part-time service at Oak Church.

### Grace Church, Winnipeg

The following resolution, adopted by the Winnipeg Presbytery on January 8th, was presented:

"That the Board of Home Missions be requested to discharge the mortgage on Grace Church, for \$6,000.00, given on July 11th, 1934, to The United Church of Canada by the Trustees of the property known as Grace Church, Winnipeg." It was agreed that this be referred to the Board.

# Marine Work

It was decided to refer to the Secretaries, with power, the question of a survey of the West Coast of Vancouver Island, with a view to determining whether work should be re-opened, and to defray the expense involved, if a survey is undertaken.

# Re Japanese in Canada

Dr. Dorey stated that the Executive of the General Council had referred to The Woman's Missionary Society and the Executive of the Board of Home Missions a request from the Co-operative Committee on Japanese Canadians for financial assistance.

On motion, it was decided to make a grant of \$500.00.

### Request for Appointment of Worker Under the W.M.S.

It was decided to refer to the Board the suggestion of the Sudbury Presbyterial that a "W.M.S. Worker be provided as soon as possible for the West End of Sudbury and Gatchell Subdivision," with the understanding that we should have a recommendation and report from the Sudbury Presbytery.

# Refund From Rev. J. B. Adams

Mr. Macdonald reported that Mr. Adams had refunded an amount of \$25.00 on account of overpayment while serving on the Aylwin charge, in the Ottawa Presbytery. After discussion, the matter was referred to the Secretaries, with power.

### Conference on Non-Anglo-Saxon and Institutional Work

Mr. Macdonald stated that arrangements had been made for a Conference on Non-Anglo-Saxon and Institutional Work, to be held in Toronto, January 30th, and to which Superintendents of Institutions and Ministers engaged in City Mission Work in the Central Conferences had been invited. It was agreed that the Board should defray the expenses of the Conference.

# Statement Re Finances

An Interim Financial Statement was presented, showing unexpended balance of Home Mission funds as at January 19th, 1946, of \$98,000, which included \$32,208, transferred from the Moderator's Fund.

### Basis for Special Grants

On motion, it was resolved:

That, in the light of reports from the Pastoral Charges and Home Mission Fields, in keeping with the resolution of the Board (Digest, page 100), the Executive authorize additional payments, so that the scale of salaries adopted by the Board in 1945 (Digest, page 98) shall be increased,—the maximum to be as follows:

It was also agreed:

1. That for *Institutions* there be an increase of \$100 for Superintendents and other Ministers and all employed women workers, above the scale set by the Board, and that the Secretaries be given authority to make the necessary adjustments and, after consultation with the Superintendents, to adjust salaries of other employees in conformity with the above.

2. That *Doctors* in charge of *Hospitals* receive another \$100.00 to apply on their expenses, and that the Secretaries have authority to deal with any increase which may be necessary for the nursing and other staffs, no increase to be above \$100 per year.

3. That the Secretaries be authorized to deal with any increase necessary for *Office Secretaries of Superintendents* in case salaries have not been restored to pre-depression scale.

With respect to the requests from Dufferin and Peel Presbytery, it was agreed to recommend to the Board that, in the light of the resolution passed by the General Council in 1944 and found on Page 73, Record of Proceedings, the request for grant from Mono Mills, among others, be reviewed by the Board, with the idea of applying the principle contained in this resolution.

It was also agreed that the Superintendent be requested to take up with the Grey Presbytery the question of the application of the same rule.

Authority to Adjust. Grants and to Make Further Payments

The Secretaries were given authority to make adjustments in the grants voted, if this should be necessary, and to make any further grants that may be required.

### Transfer to Missionary Emergency Salary Account

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS the Executive of the Board of Home Missions has before it the Interim Statement of the Treasurer, showing a balance available for grants at January 19th, 1946, of \$98,000,---which sum includes an unexpended balance of \$32,000 from the Moderator's Fund, which was placed at the disposal of the Board of Home Missions to meet the needs of men serving charges not on the aid-receiving list and which have in the meantime become the responsibility of the Board; and WHEREAS the Board at its annual meeting in April, 1945, estimated that there would be available for grants by the Executive the sum of \$35,000; and

WHEREAS this difference is due-

- (a) To additional revenues, which could not be forecast at the time, of \$13,500, but more significantly to---
- (b) Unexpended appropriations of \$38,000, due to the acute shortage of ministerial supply and of students, with the consequent vacancies in the Church of 181 on July 1st, 1945; and

WHEREAS the Executive has presently been required to appropriate approximately \$62,000—to bring salaries up to the scale set by the Board in April, 1945, (in the expectation that the appropriations then made would leave and unappropriated balance of \$35,000), and for other emergent purposes; and

WHEREAS even after the grants just made, our ministers on aid-receiving charges will be paid less than the commendable salary objective of \$1800 and a free, furnished manse, set by the Church; and

WHEREAS it is the judgment of the Executive that the Board itself should have the opportunity of reviewing the whole situation and the decisions made in April, 1945, and particularly to determine whether it would not be wise and desirable—

- (a) To increase the grants for travel on the fields, and in other ways to assist ministers—many of whom are facing not only large costs for travel but the necessity of renewing their means of transportation; and
- (b) To strengthen the Fund for Lay Workers and the Marine Insurance Reserve;

### THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT the Executive request the Treasurer to transfer to Missionary Emergency Salary account any balance of the said sum of \$98,000 which may be unexpended on January 31st, to be held in this account until the Board may have an opportunity to review its obligations at the annual meeting in April, 1946.

### **Property Claims**

(b) Agreed to vote \$362.00, to cover cost of new furnace, installation, etc.

Lilly Memorial Church.--Agreed to accept payment of \$500.00, without interest, on loan, for 1945.

Longueuil.—Agreed to make such modifications in the mortgage as will enable the congregation to build a manse and to mortgage the property.

Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute.—Agreed to vote an additional \$135.00 in connection with installation of furnace.

#### MUSKOKA-

Muskoka United Parish.—Agreed (1) to refer to the Superintendent and the Presbytery the securing of estimates for new manse; and

(2) to give authority to the Secretaries and Superintendent to arrange for the purchase of materials, if this is deemed necessary.

#### TORONTO CENTRE-

Toronto, Chinese Mission, Bay Street.—Agreed to vote \$150 for cleaning, painting and redecorating.

Toronto, Bedford Park.—Enquiry was made as to whether the Board would accept \$3,323, with interest to date, in full settlement of balance of \$5974.69 due on loan, the amount to be paid in June, 1946, in order to enable the congregation to proceed with plans for building a new church.

The Secretary was directed to write the congregation, expressing appreciation of what they have already done towards repayment of the loan, but informing them that, in view of the responsibilities of the Board, the best proposal that could be offered them is to agree that all payments made, whether on principal or interest, shall be credited on principal, with the expectation that the full amount of the original loan, namely, \$20,000, will thus be repaid.

#### HAMILTON-

Hamilton, All People's.—Agreed to vote \$400.00 towards cost of new heating plant.

#### SUDBURY-

Sudbury, All People's.—Agreed to accept payment of \$450.00 per year for three years in cancellation of debt of \$1677.77.

Sudbury—West End.—Authorization was given for the purchase of suitable lots, for the establishment of a new cause in the west end of the city.

#### KENT-

Moraviantown.—Agreed to grant \$75.00 to purchase furniture for the teacherage.

# MOOSE JAW-

Keeler Charge, Lake Valley Appointment.—Agreed to give permission to sell old shed for \$100.00.

# REGINA---

Pasqua Indian Reserve.—It was requested that part of the proceeds from the sale of the Condie property be used to make repairs to the fence around the Cemetery on the Reserve. Referred to Secretaries, with power.

### SASKATOON-

Saskatoon—(1) 11th Street and Avenue K.: It was agreed (a) to purchase suitable lots for a church site in this area, at an estimated cost of 225.00; and (b) to refer to the Board the question of grant towards church building, plans and estimates to be submitted.

(2) Westmount Areas Agreed to purchase Lots 1, 2 and 3, Block 26, plan H.J., Corner 27th Street and Ave. L. North, at a price of \$462.50.

# CALGARY-

Morley.—Agreed to recommend to the Sub-Executive of the General Council that the old Church, the Cairn, and about 4 or 5 acres of land be set apart as an Historic Site forever.

### EDMONTON-

*Beverly.*—Agreed to recommend to the Sub-Executive of the General Council that permission be given for the sale of Lots 26-28, Block 21, Beacon Heights Annex, sub-division of the Town of Beverly, in the Province of Alberta.

## VERMILION-

Lamont Hospital-Nurses' Home.-It was reported that the total cost of this building had exceeded the grant by \$3,459.85 and that a grant to cover the deficit was requested. It was decided to make a grant from Maintenance Account of \$5,000 to pay off Bank overdraft, the local Hospital Board to be responsible for the deficit on building account.

#### PRINCE RUPERT-

Bella Coola Mission House.—Re finishing of certain rooms: Referred to Board for further information.

Mansonville.—It was agreed that any amount paid by the congregation of or furniture for the manse now occupied by a married student, would be taken into consideration if application were made later for grant to purchase furniture for married, ordained supply, in accord with the regulation of the Board.

### SUPERIOR-

Beardmore-Nipigon.-Agreed to pay additional rent of \$15.00 per month from November 1st.

#### ARCOLA-

*Viewfield.*—The provision of grant for married lay supply was referred to the Secretaries, with power, on receiving recommendation of Presbytery.

# KOOTENAY-

Grand Forks, Japanese.—Agreed to pay additional rent of \$7.00 per month from November 15th.

### PRINCE RUPERT-

Hazelton, Travel Grant.--Agreed to allow grant at rate of \$150, under special arrangement for serving also Kispiox and Kitzegucla.

# DIGEST OF MINUTES -THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS APRIL 3RD-5TH, 1946

The Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada met in the Board Room, Wesley Buildings, Toronto, on Wednesday, April 3rd, 1946, at 10:00 a.m.

The Chairman, Rev. A. Lloyd Smith, D.D., presided and conducted devotions.

On motion, Rev. S. H. Greenslade, B.A., was appointed Minute Secretary.

#### Roll Call

The following were present: Revs. A. Lloyd Smith, George Dorey, M. C. Macdonald, S. H. Greenslade, J. G. Gorwill, Waldemar Williams, A. E. Kewley, Isaac Davis, J. Hugh McLean, George Telford, W. M. Mustard, R. Simons, W. Stott; Messrs. K. M. Kilbourn, N. V. Buchanan, Fred Mann and A. J. Irving; Dr. J. C. Pincock, Mrs. C. M. Lôveys. Corresponding Members: Revs. H. Maxwell Dawe, W. S. Godfrey, J. I. MacKay, James A. Lyttle, J. C. Torrance, J. A. Cormie, R. J. McDonald, J. L. Nicol, Thomas Hart, W. P. Bunt and W. D. Noyes. It was agreed that Rev. John MacKay, who was present as a substitute for Mr. J. D. McFadyen, representative of the Montreal and Ottawa Conference, be made a corresponding member.

It was also agreed that the privilege of corresponding membership be extended to Rev. A. J. Wilson, D.D., Rev. W. H. Pike, Rev. George Williams and Mr. A. T. Whitehead.

Regrets were persented from Judge M. A. Miller, Mr. J. C. Pinch, Mr. J. D. McFadyen and Mrs. J. Erle 'Jones. Dr. Dorey explained that Judge Miller was prevented from attending on account of the recent death of his mother and pressure of work arising thereafter, and Mrs. Jones and Mr. Pinch through indisposition. It was directed that a letter of sympathy be sent to Judge Miller, and also that a letter be sent to Mr. Pinch and Mrs. Jones, conveying greetings and expressing the hope that they would soon be restored to normal health.

### The Late Rev. R. B. Cochrane, D.D.

The Chairman made fitting reference to the late Secretary of the Board, and it was directed that flowers be sent to Mrs. Cochrane as an expression of the affection and sympathy of the members. It was also decided that the half-hour devotional period on the first day of the Board should take the form of a Memorial Service for Dr. Cochrane, to be conducted by the Chairman.

#### Sympathy and Greetings

It was directed that greetings and sympathy in their illness should be sent in the name of the Board to Rev. Mark Fenwick, D.D., Rev. J. C. Cochrane, D.D., and Rev. Hiram Hull, D.D., and that a letter of greeting should be sent to Rev. J. R. Watts, D.D.

On motion, it was agreed-

- (1) That, unless otherwise arranged, the Board meet from—9:30 a.m. to 12:30; 2:00 p.m. to 5:30; and 7:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- (2) That the half hour from 12 noon to 12:30 each day be reserved for devotions; to be conducted on Wednesday by the Chairman of the Board and to take the form of a Memorial Service for Dr. Cochrane; on Thursday by the Moderator; and on Friday by Rev. W. F. Banister, B. Th., B.D., O.B.E.

### Ratification of Minutes

On motion, the Minutes of the meetings of the Executive held June 28th, September 6th, November 6th, 1945, and January 25th, 1946, were ratified.

### Communications

Communications were presented as follows:

- (1) Greetings from Rev. J. U. Tanner, D.D.
- (2) Resolution of the Manitoba Conference Home Mission Committee, and of the Newfoundland Conference Home Misssion Committee, expressing a deep sense of loss in Dr. Cochrane's passing and paying tribute to his life and work.
- (3) From Rev. Norman Rawson, in appreciation of sympathy extended by the Executive on the death of his son.
- (4) Resolution of the Presbytery of Saskatoon, and also of the Presbytery of Prince Albert, placing on record their high appreciation of the services of Dr. J. L. Nicol.
- (5) Resolution of the Newfoundland Conference Home Mission Committee, expressing thanks for the cost of living bonus paid to all married ministers and supplies in that Conference in 1945, and endorsing the recommendation of the Presbyteries that the bonus be continued during 1946.
- (6) Resolution of the Presbytery of Cariboo, expressing appreciation of special grants paid to men on aid-receiving charges for 1945.
- (7) Letter from Miss' G. E. M. Tapp, Secretary of The Colonial Missionary Society, London, England, thanking the Board for assuming financial responsibility for the work at Fortune Bay, Newfoundland, during the war years and advising that their Directors felt that, now that peace has come, they should begin making to the United Church whatever grants for the running of the Mission the Board would recommend.
- (8) Resolution of Middlesex Presbytery, putting itself on record as favoring "the immigration into Canada of a limited number of Jewish refugees from Europe, such as can be assimilated into the economy of our national life."

#### Scale of Expenses

. It was resolved that the following be the scale of expenses for members of the Board:

- (1) The members be paid the cost of railway and sleeper tickets to Toronto and return; the cost of meals en route—such cost not to exceed \$4.00 per day; and the cost of hotel and meals in Toronto.
- (2) That those travelling by motor be paid on the basis of railway fare.

(3) That the amount for Sunday supply shall not exceed \$15.00 per Sunday.

# Superintendency of Missions in Northern Saskatchewan

Dr. Dorey made reference to the retirement, at June 30th, 1946, of Dr. J. L. Nicol, as Superintendent of Missions, and on motion the following resolution was adopted:

THAT: The Board regrets that the time has come when under the regulations of the Board, it has become necessary for Rev. J. L. Nicol, M.A., Ph.D., D.D., to relinquish his position as Superintendent of Missions for Northern Saskatchewan, to take effect on June 30th, 1946;

The Board requests the Committee on Resolutions to prepare a suitable resolution;

The report of the meeting of representatives of the Executive of the Saskatchewan Conference and of the Conference Home Mission Committee be referred to a committee to be named by the Chair—which shall later present a nomination or nominations to fill the vacancy; and

In accordance with the usual practice Dr. Nicol's salary be continued to September 30th, 1946.

The Chairman named the following to be the Committee on the Superintendency in Northern Saskatchewan: Dr. J. C. Pincock, Rev. R. Simons, Mr. A. J. Irving, Rev. Geo. Telford, Rev. S. H. Greenslade, Mr. K. M. Kilbourn, the Secretaries and the Chairman.

Dr. J. C. Pincock later presented the Report of the Committee, as follows:

"Two meetings of your Committee were held, at which the nominations of a joint meeting of the Home Mission Committee and the Executive of the Saskatchewan Conference were carefully considered. The names of eleven ministers had been submitted to this joint meeting, which recorded its preference for four. These four names along with the remaining seven nominees, as well as a nominee submitted by the Saskatchewan Rural Ministers' Fellowship, were considered by your committee.

"Your committee now recommends that Rev. Robert Hall, B.A., B.D., of Knox Church, Saskatoon, one of the four for whom preference was recorded by the Saskatchewan Conference Joint Committee, be appointed Superintendent of Home Missions for Northern Saskatchewan; appointment to be effective from July 1st, 1946.

"Your committee further recommends that the Secretary wire Mr. Hall to-night in order that his acceptance of the appointment may be received before the close of the present session of the Board of Home Missions."

On motion, it was resolved that the Report be adopted.

At a later session, Dr. Dorey reported that a telegram had been received from the Rev. Robert Hall, accepting the position of Superintendent of Missions in Northern Saskatchewan.

#### Statements by Superintendent of Missions

Brief statements were made by all the Superintendents of Missions regarding the work in their respective areas.

### **Bissell Bursary Fund**

The following report was presented by Dr. Dorey: For the academic year 1945-46, the Trustees awarded 6 Bursaries of \$75.00 each and 4 of \$100.00 each.

Since the meeting of the Trustees, in consultation with Mrs. Bissell, two Bursaries of \$50 each have been awarded.

At the last meeting of the Trustees of the Fund, the following action was taken:

"After a general discussion of the future of the Fund, it was decided that next year application forms be sent to all ministers, with eligible children, in aid-receiving charges across the country, including Newfoundland, and that in doing so, the attention of the Superintendents be drawn to the original object of the foundation of the Bursary Fund, namely, "to assist children of ministers on aid-receiving charges who show special ability during their High School work and who desire to go on to a College course'." It was agreed to adopt the Report.

### Grants to Societies

Home Missions Council of North America-

A grant of \$400.00 was voted for 1946.

International Bureau of Architecture-

On motion, it was resolved:

(1) That we refer the request for a grant to the International Bureau of Architecture to the Executive of the General Council for consideration;

(2) That we draw to the attention of the Executive of the General Council the inadequacy of plans secured from the International Bureau of Architecture to meet the needs of small self-supporting charges or aid-receiving charges when contemplating building churches and manses; (3) That we request the Executive of the General Council to make available plans that would be helpful in guiding such charges when confronted with the need for building either churches or manses; and

(4) That we inform the Executive of the General Council that the Board of Home Missions will be willing to make a grant towards the cost of this project.

### John Milton Society for the Blind-

It was agreed to make a grant of \$25.00 for 1946.

### Future Policy Re The Secretariat

The Chairman made a statement, outlining the present situation regarding the Secretariat of the Board.

It was moved and carried, that the Chair nominate a Committee re the Secretariat. The Chairman named the following Committee:

It is recommended that the following sub-committee be appointed and asked to complete the work begun by the Special Committee on the Secretariat:

On motion, the report was adopted.

#### Grace Church, Winnipeg, Cancellation of Mortgage

Dr. Cormie made a statement regarding the situation existing at Grace Church, Winnipeg.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

That the Board recommend to the proper officers of the Church that the Mortgage for \$6,000 on Grace Church, Winnipeg, placed in July, 1934, be discharged; and

That the sum of \$4,620.56 be advanced from the Property Fund to enable payment of the taxes due on Grace Church property to date, —on condition that the present owners or trustees of the property assure the Board that this sum will be repaid out of the proceeds of the sale of the said property.

It was agreed that for the present the appropriation for 1946 be \$4,000 and that the matter of a further appropriation be referred to the Executive in January, if there should be a balance available for this purpose.

# Resolution of General Council, 1944, Re Policy in Respect of Grants

On recommendation of the Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents, the Board adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS the Genéral Council in 1944 passed the following resolution:

"That the Board of Home Missions consider a policy in respect of grants to aid-receiving charges and other charges under the Board whereby a reasonable time limit will be placed upon the receipt of missionary funds by such charges."

Be It Resolved that, in order to put this into effect:

- (1) The Appropriations Committee shall each year designate the charges to which this shall apply.
- (2) When the charges have been named, the Secretaries shall communicate this decision to the Home Mission Conveners, and the Secretaries of the Presbyteries concerned, and to the Superintendent of Missions, informing them that in the opinion of the Board the charge is one for which a time limit should be placed upon the receipt of missionary funds, and requesting that Presbytery to visit the charge so as to determine:
  - (a) Whether it is efficiently organized and whether the provisions of the Manual regarding an every person canvass, etc., have been effectively carried out.
  - (b) Whether there are circumstances, such as the number of families and their economic resources, which make a more substantial support of the minister impossible; and
  - (c) Whether these circumstances are such as to make the full support of the minister on the salary scale recommended in the Manual, and having regard to the necessity of maintaining the property and other necessary expenses, impossible.
- (3) The Presbytery shall also be requested to make a careful study of possible re-arrangements of charges, so that the charge for which a grant is sought may be strengthened or cared for otherwise than it is now.
- (4) The Presbytery shall report its findings on the above, if possible, to the Executive of the Board in January, and, in any case, not later than March 15 the following year.

(5) The report of the Presbytery, and, if possible, of the Executive shall be laid before the Appropriations Committee at its next annual meeting, which committee shall recommend to the Board what time limit, if any, shall be placed on the receipt of missionary funds by the charges concerned, or if such charges shall be given the status of special fields.

It was decided that the naming of charges this year on which a time limit should be set for the receipt of missionary funds, in accordance with the above resolution, should be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendents,—the names to be inserted in the Minutes of this meeting.

(3) Mount Elgin: After hearing the viewpoint of the Middlesex Presbytery, presented by Rev. James Scobie, that a conference between Dr. Dorey and the Presbytery be held, and that any action,' further to that already undertaken by the Executive of the Board, be referred to the Executive, with power.

(4) Uniformity in Administration: The Board adopted the following resolution:

Whereas there has been increasing difficulty in financing the Indian Residential Schools under the care of the United Church;

And Whereas there is a lack of uniformity in administration of the Schools and little or no control over expenditure on herds of cattle and certain farm equipment;

Therefore be it resolved:

That when a considerable expenditure is contemplated by the School Principal, it be authorized by the Board of Home Missions; and

That the Superintendent of Missions of the area in which the Residential School is situated should keep closely in touch with the School and make such recommendations to the Board'of Home Missions or its Executive as may be necessary.

#### Resolution of Prince Rupert Presbytery-

"That Presbytery recommend the inauguration of a carefully planned system of promotions and increases for-

- (a) All ministers on Indian fields.
- (b) All lay employees on Indian fields.
- (c) Doctors in Mission Hospitals.

"And that a pension system be worked out for teachers, missionaryteachers and hospital employees."

This was referred to the Executive for study and report to the 1947 session of the Board; the Presbytery of Prince Rupert and any others interested to be invited to make further representations to the Executive.

## Resolution of Victoria Presbytery-

"That, owing to the pressure of work placed on Mr. Bunt, a deputy be employed to visit fields which he finds hard of access, especially isolated Indian fields."

The Secretaries were authorized to pay the expenses of any minister appointed by the Superintendent to visit such fields as he cannot personally visit and which, in his judgment, require such visitation.

Resolutions of Indian Workers' Conference, Norway House Presbytery-

The following resolutions of the Conference of Indian Workers, held at Norway House, July, 1945, were approved, as amended:

(1) "This, the Indian Workers' Conference of the Norway House Presbytery, draws the attention of the Home Mission Board to the fact that there are some hundreds of children of school age in the five Agencies within the bounds of the Presbytery of Norway House, as the Census returns show, for whom there are no adequate educational facilities;

"Therefore: We would respectfully ask the Home Mission Board to urge the Department of Indian Affairs to provide sufficient improved Day Schools on all reserves, and, in addition, to increase the capacity of the Norway House Indian Residential School.

(2) "We, the Indian Workers' Conference of the Norway House Presbytery of The United 'Church of Canada, request the Ontario Department of Vital Statistics to reconsider the case of the isolated mission fields of Pekangecum and Sandy Lake in Ontario, and grant licenses authorizing lay missionaries appointed and approved by the United Church, to perform marriages.

- (3) "Whereas it is obvious that the present system of Indian Education, based on the provincial curriculum, is inadequate and out of line for the education of Indian children;
  - "Be It Resolved: That we, the Indian Workers' Conference of the Norway House Presbytery, urge that a commission be set up to study present conditions with a view to revising and improving the curriculum of the schools, with the idea of meeting the needs of the children on the various reservations."

#### Re Resolution sent to the Minister in 1945-

The Board re-affirmed the resolution, urging the immediate appointment of a Royal Commission to study Indian affairs, sent forward to the Minister in 1945.

# Representations to the Commission or Select Committee-

The Board adopted the following resolution:

That we ask the Executive or Sub-Executive of the General Council to appoint a person or persons, to represent the United Church before the Select Committee to be appointed by the Dominion Government in presenting to that Committee our policy, as a Church, in the administration of our work among the Indian people, together with a statement of additional needs and of educational policy. The representation in regard to Education to be along the following lines:

. (1) The Day School should be the normal method of educating Indians as it is white children.

(2) Where it is desirable and possible for Indian children to avail themselves of higher education,—especially technical training, the Department ought to bring them together in hostels, so that they could attend schools which are already in operation; these hostels, if desirable, to be under the direction of some Church.

(3) Where residential schools are necessary, the Department ought to operate them. If there is a chaplain on the staff, he ought to be paid by the Government.

### Conferences of Indian Workers-

The question of the holding of Conferences of Indian Workers in 1946 was referred to the Executive, with power.

### Honorarium, Dr. F. G. Stevens-

Agreed that the honorarium of \$300.00 to Dr. Stevens, in connection with the preparation and editing of "Spiritual Light," be continued for 1946.

# Representation at National Fellowship of Indian Workers-

The sum of \$200.00 was set aside to meet expenses in connection with representation at the National Fellowship of Indian Workers, to be held at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, June 17-22, 1946; the selection of the personnel to be referred to the Secretaries and Superintendents concerned. 97

Representation at Ottawa-

It was agreed that a representative of the United Church should be in Ottawa to confer with the delegation from the Native Brotherhood of British Columbia when the Indian Act is under revision, and that Dr. Dorey undertake this responsibility, if at all possible.

# Chinese Work

Re Resolution of B.C. Conference Home Mission Committee\_

"That Rev. George Lowe be invited to return to British Columbia, and in the event of there being no pastoral charge available for him among the Chinese, this Committee recommends to the Board of Home Missions that an appropriation be made to make possible a special work among Chinese young people in Victoria, Nanaimo and Vancouver."

Approval was given to the resolution and the appointment of Mr. Lowe to work described in the resolution or to some other Chinese Mission was referred to the Secretaries and Superintendent concerned; and the Executive was authorized to make the necessary grant if Mr. Lowe should be employed as a special worker among young people in Vancouver and Victoria.

Re Rev. Lei Shing Wah-

Re suggested bringing to Canada of Rev. Lei Shing Wah, of the West China Mission: Approval was given to the proposal, enabling Mr. Lei to come to Canada for post graduate work; Winnipeg or Toronto to be considered as possibilities for further study and part-time work; remuneration to be on the basis of \$1,000 per year; and the final decision as to the place to be referred to the Secretaries, after conference with Dr. Noyes and Dr. Cormie.

### Japanese Work

Statement\_

Dr. Dorey made a brief statement, touching on the work of our Missionaries during the year, and the action taken by the United Church on the relocation and the repatriation of the Japanese.

Resolution for Dominion Government—

The Board adopted the following resolution:

Be It Resolved:

That this Board of Home Missions of The United Church of Canada hereby expresses its deep sense of the importance of the issue before the Canadian Government in connection with our Japanese citizens and others of the Japanese race. We would reassert our previous attitude that citizenship of Canadian-born or naturalized Japanese be honoured, and our conviction that families ought not to be broken in any repatriation of Japanese. We believe that Canada's attitude in this crisis will have far reaching effect, both on th'e international situation and also on the morale of Canada's people; and

#### Transfer of Missionaries, etc.-

The question of the transfer of Missionaries and the continued employment of Rev. W. R. McWilliams was referred to the Secretaries and Superintendents concerned.

# Statement Re Crusade for Christ and His Kingdom

The Moderator, the Right Rev. Dr. Arnup, introduced the Rev. Bruce Millar, Executive Secretary of The Crusade for Christ and His Kingdom, Mr. Millar reviewed the campaign to date, after which the Moderator made a brief statement. This was followed by general discussion. The Chairman expressed the thanks of the Board to the Moderator and Mr. Millar.

# Statement by The Treasurer

The Treasurer, Rev. Dr. V. T. Mooney, presented the Financial Statement of the Board. The Chairman expressed the Board's appreciation to Dr. Mooney.

It was agreed to approve the action of the Board of Finance in this regard and to authorize the use of an amount up to \$500,000 for this purpose during the current year.

## Changes In The Manual

The 'Treasurer made a statement regarding certain proposed changes in the Manual. It was agreed to approve the proposed changes, as follows:

1. That Section 199 (c) be changed to read:

"To invest and reinvest the funds of the Church with consideration for the needs of the Boards and Departments concerned."

2. That the Constitution of the Department of the Treasury be altered so that Section 198 (b) shall read:

"One Secretary of each Board or Committee participating in the unified plan of finance which is not already represented under section (a).."

### Sunday School in the Home by Mail and Air

Rev. C. A. Myers, D.D., Secretary of this Committee, made a statement regarding the work. The Chairman thanked Dr. Myers on behalf of the Board.

It was agreed to vote a grant of \$1800.00 for this work in 1946.

### Report of the Committee on Appointment of Students

The Report of the Committee on the Appointment of Student Missionaries was presented by Mr. Macdonald, and on motion was adopted as follows:

1. During the summer of 1945, 176 students served the Board under its co-operative plan (ordinarily called the "Students' Pool") and 14 others were appointed on a special basis.

2. The Committee has appointed to fields this year 203 Students, They are distributed in the different Superintendencies as follows:

In addition to those appointed about twelve are giving full time service on a special basis, and a limited number will give week-end supply.

3. To date 223 students have made application for fields. This is the largest number since 1941. Of the applicants 33 were young women and of these 20 have received appointments.

4. The Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries of Students was carried out again in 1945. The response of the fields to student maintenance improved and by using an appropriation of \$33,000 the salary of each student missionary was brought up to \$16.00 per week plus board and travel on the field. This is the highest rate that has ever been paid student missionaries by The United Church of Canada.

5. It has been decided that the Plan for the Co-ordination of Salaries' of Students should be continued for 1946.

6. A change has been made in the method of paying our student missionaries. The underlying purpose in this change of policy is to pay the more experienced students a higher rate of salary. It is hoped that as a result of this new scale of payments a larger percentage of the more experienced students will make application for mission fields in the future. The following is the plan which has been decided on:

(a) All students serving the first and second year under appointment by the Home Mission Board will receive the basic

weekly scale of salary determined under the 'Pool" arrangement.

- (b) (i) A student who serves a *third* term of at least 20 weeks will receive the 'Pool' rate plus \$1.00 per week.
  - (ii) A student who serves a *fourth* term of at least 20 weeks will receive the 'Pool' rate plus \$2.00 per week.
  - (iii) A student who serves a *fifth* term of at least 20 weeks will receive the 'Pool' rate plus \$3.00 per week.
- (c) No student serving the third, fourth or fifth term whose work is not judged satisfactory by the Superintendent and the Presbytery in which the student serves will be entitled to the additional payment. In cases of difference of opinion the decision shall be made by the Executive of the Board.
- (d) This plan will apply only to students who are candidates for the ministry and who have served the first and second years under the Board of Home Missions in the 'Pool' arrangement, special cases to be referred to the Executive for consideration.

7. It is recommended that the appropriation for student work for this coming summer be \$38,000.00.

- No. 4—A pamphlet on How the Crusade should help Home Missions. An educational statement in pamphlet form bringing afresh before the Church the scope, needs, opportunities and possibilities in our Home Mission work in the days of rehabilitation and reconstruction.

2. A number of charges now supplied by Lay Supply should have Ordained Ministers—estimated at 10.

3. New work requiring Ordained Ministers which should be undertaken:

The answer is not yet clear, because replies have not come from certain areas but the following facts are presented:

(a) The growth of urban centres which is a feature of North American civilization and which was accelerated by the war shows no sign of abating in Canada. As a matter of fact, it would seem that we shall continue to see a decrease in rural population and the growth of our cities for some time to come.

(b) Very few additions either to ministerial supply or to buildings in Canada's cities have been made in the last fifteen years—during which period there has been a large growth of urban population.

While the needs are not yet fully stated, the following illustrations will give some idea of what is required:

/Toronto: Mr. Torrance lists 10 new churches which need to be built almost immediately at a cost of \$375,000 to \$400,000. Four of these would need ordained ministers.

Winnipeg: Dr. Cormie lists as the needs of that city provision for 11 new or greatly enlarged church buildings, and three ordained ministers.

British Columbia: Mr. Bunt has not yet given an estimate of building requirements but he says he needs more ordained men for urban centres—all but two in the Vancouver and Westminster area.

This partial statement, together with the fact that other cities need men and that there is likelihood of development of mining area and the

establishment of towns in connection with the Pulp and Paper Industry, would warrant the statement that in the next four or five years the United Church will need to provide from 25 to 30 ordained ministers adequately to care for pastoral charges now existing in embryo or which have as yet no existence at all.

# Report of the Committee on Rural Work

Rev. J. I. MacKay presented the Report of this Committee. It was considered item by item and adopted as follows:

1. That the Board set up a Committee of five laymen, representative of the various sections of the Church, who will give special study to the rural problem confronting our Church, and who will make suggestions as to programme, policies and methods, whereby our Committee on Rural Life can most effectively serve and give encouragement and help to the men in our rural ministry.

It is suggested that one of the representatives be from the East and one from the West, and that they be Chairmen of two small regional Committees—East and West.

2. That there be a Central Regional Committee, consisting of five members and that its Chairman, the Secretaries of the Board and two other members constitute the Executive of the Rural Life Committee.

- 3. That consideration be given to the holding of Regional Conferences in Prince Edward Island, Temiskaming, South Western Ontario and possibly in Saskatchewan and Alberta.
- 4. That the Executive of General Council be asked to set up an Interboard Committee on Rural Work,—the co-operating bodies to be the Board of Christian Education, the Board of Evangelism and Social Service, the Board of Home Missions and the Woman's Missionary Society.
- 5. That a budget of \$1,300 be allowed for the work of the Rural Life Committee.
- 6. That power be given to the Executive of the Board to appoint three representatives to the Town and Country convocation, to be held at Des Moines, Iowa, in November.

The Chairman thanked Rev. J. G. Gorwill for his leadership in the work of this Committee.

### Statement by Secretary of Committee on Missionary Education

Rev. K. J. Beaton, D.D., addressed the Board on the work of The Committee on Missionary Education, and also on the work of the Radio Commission. The Chairman expressed the appreciation of the Board to Dr. Beaton.

# Recommendations from Conference of Secretaries and Superintendents

The recommendations of the Committee were considered item by item and adopted as follows:

1. Re Memorial of Bermuda Synod, requesting "the Home Mission Board to reconsider and to revise its policy regarding the moving expenses of ministers serving the Church in Bermuda, so that no minister may be burdened with the ocean expense to return to Canada,"—

Whereas the high cost of the return transportation from Bermuda imposes a hardship upon the ministers of the Bermuda Synod of the Maritime Conference; and

Whereas this, coupled with the high cost of living in Bermuda, is making it increasingly difficult for the Synod to secure ministerial supply;

Therefore be it resolved that the Board request the General Council to make provision for the necessary return transportation expenses.

2. Re audio-visual educational project, which a group of ministers in Kamsack Presbytery are trying to organize, and towards which the Home Mission Board is asked to provide financial assistance, if needed, up to but not exceeding \$500, as well as to explore this field of service and to co-operate with other Boards of the Church that might be interested in this project (recommended by Kamsack Presbytery and Conference Home Mission Committee)—

1

That this matter be referred to the Secretaries for a report from the Kamsack Presbytery and the Saskatchewan Conference, and that it be brought before the Executive in June for issue.

3. Re Resolution of Saskatoon Presbytery, recommending "to the favorable consideration of the Board of Home Missions the payment of not less than \$20.00 per week to students engaged as summer supply."

This matter already dealt with in the Report of the Committee on appointment of Students.

4. Policy re Car Loans.—That the Board adopt the following resolution:

Whereas the Executive, at its January meeting, referred to the Board disposition of the balance of its appropriation which remained unexpended from January 31st, which balance was transferred to the Missionary Emergency Salary Account; and

Whereas the Board, in 1944, adopted the policy of making loans to newly ordained ministers to enable them to purchase cars;

Be it resolved that the Board set aside \$32,208.36 as a Revolving Fund from which shall be made loans to newly ordained and to other ministers serving aid-receiving or Home Mission charges, to assist them in purchasing cars and that the Executive be authorized to frame the regulations under which this Fund shall be administered.

5. Re Pension Plan for Office and other Workers—That the Board make payment for women serving under the Board of Home Missions, who are connected with the Fund managed by the Committee on the Deaconess Order and Women Workers, on the same basis as that paid for other workers.

6. Re Insurance of Properties—(a) That the Board insist that properties be fully covered by insurance, irrespective of the amount of indebtedness to the Board of Home Missions; and

(b) That the Board issue a statement, to be sent to Presbyteries, that it will not be sympathetic to making grants or loans to assist in rebuilding churches, manses or parsonages destroyed by fire, on which a reasonable amount of insurance was not carried.

# 7. Re Health Certification of Candidates for the Ministry-

Whereas, a considerable number of candidates for the ministry have been found to be suffering from physical disability which makes impossible effective service on the Mission Fields; and

۰.

Whereas, the Manual provides that "the candidates must furnish a medical certificate of health;"

Therefore, the Board of Home Missions draws the attention of Presbyteries to this requirement of the Church and urges that the regulation be strictly enforced.

## 8. Re Marriage of Students-

0

The Board of Home Missions respectfully requests the Board of Colleges and Secondary Schools to give further consideration to the problems created by candidates for the ministry getting married, particularly in the early years of their course.

We believe that a number of factors make this a matter of urgent importance. It is not within the province of the Board of Home Missions to recommend with regard to all of these, but it is obvious that at certain points our work is vitally affected.

It is practically impossible to send married students to summer fields in parts of the country where their services may be needed most, because of the fact that transportation costs to and from fields cannot be provided for their wives, and on very few student fields is there suitable manse or parsonage accommodation for married couples.

9. Policy re City Mission Boards-

Whereas there has been large migration into new areas of the major urban centres in Canada; and

Whereas this has created a need for greatly increased and improved church facilities, which the people of these new areas are unable to provide for themselves;

The Board of Home Missions urges the Presbyteries concerned to appoint Church Extension Committees, whose duties shall be:

- (1) To assist in the selection of suitable sites for new churches.
- (2) To assist in securing funds from the larger community towards the cost of erection of such churches.

The Board of Home Missions is further of the opinion that these Committees should not be incorporated bodies but should work in close co-operation with the Presbyteries and their Home Mission Committees, to provide adequate church accommodation for all our people in the urban areas.

10. Re Deputation Work—That the Missionary & Maintenance Department be advised that, should any of the ministers serving on aid-receiving fields be desired for deputation work, the initial approaches should be made to the Secretaries of the Board.

11. Appointments under other Boards—With regard to the question of other Boards of the Church making appointments of ministers who are now serving on aid-receiving charges,—That negotiations between other Boards of the Church and ministers of aid-receiving charges should not be initiated without consultation with the officers of the Board of Home Missions.  $\$ 

## Report of Committee on Hospital Work

The recommendations of the Committee, presented by Rev. Dr. Nicol, were considered seriatim and action taken as follows:

# Hospital Policy-

After consideration of certain resolutions and correspondence which have been submitted:

# A. From the Alberta Conference Hospitals Board:

- (1) November, 1945, re Lamont Hospital, recommending "the construction of a fire-proof 50-bed wing with the linking up of that wing with present services in the old building, with the eventual objective of providing a fire-proof 100-bed hospital with adequate facilities for administration and group medical practice and health unit," at an estimated cost of \$150,000.
- (2) February, 1946, requesting the Board to consider the advisability of having the Alberta Conference Hospitals Board incorporated.
- (3) March, 1946, approving the plans as submitted for the extension to the Lamont Hospital; recommending that construction be commenced as early as possible in the Spring; and recommending that the Board investigate the possibility of obtaining a federal loan. (Approved by Conference Home Mission Committee.)
- (4) March, 1946, recommending construction of extension, to the George McDougall Hospital, at an estimated cost of \$16,000. (Approved by Conference Home Mission Committee.)
- B. From the British Columbia Conference Home Mission Committee, recommending that consideration be given to a request that the Queen Charlotte City Hospital be taken over by the Church.
- C. Letter from. Dr. Donald Murphy, Superintendent of the Wrinch Memorial Hospital, stating that the Prince Rupert Presbytery had asked him to study the question of the need of a hospital at Terrace and on the Naas River, with the suggestion that the Board might open hospital work at these points.

The Board adopted the following resolution:

That, in view of the new conditions created by the proposed provision of hospital facilities by the State, the Board of Home Missions and The Woman's Missionary Society appoint a joint Commission, representative of both Boards, to survey the hospital services provided by the Church, with a view to determining future policy in this matter, and that the Commission report to the next meeting of the Board of Home Missions and The Woman's Missionary Society; and

That, in view of the need for immediate decision with regard to Lamont, and without waiting for the final report on policy, the Joint Commission be asked to meet as soon as possible to report to a meeting of the Executive of the Board, enlarged by the addition of all Board members resident in the Central Conferences, and the representatives of The Woman's Missionary Society on the Board,—which shall deal with the proposals of the Alberta Hospitals Board in relation to Lamont Hospital and which shall have power to issue.

# Nomination of Commission-

The Chairman of the Committee named the following committee to nominate the Commission on Hospital Policy: Dr. Smith, Dr. Cormie and the Secretaries. The nominations of this Committee were presented and accepted as follows:

> Rev. A. Lloyd Smith (Chairman) Rev. S. H. Greenslade Rev. J. A. Cormie Rev. G. R. Inglis Dr. Harvey Agnew Dr. F. W. Routley Dr. R. M. Parker Mr. K. M. Kilbourn The Secretaries

It was also agreed that Mr. Greenslade, Mr. Kilbourn and the Secretaries be a Committee to try to secure the services of one or two laymen resident in Toronto.

Extension, George McDougall Hospital-

It was agreed that the question of extension to the George McDougall Hospital be dealt with under the powers conferred in the resolution on Hospital Policy.

### Letter, Dr. Donald Murphy-

The matters raised in the communication from Dr. Donald Murphy were referred to the Commission named above.

#### Queen Charlotte City Hospital-

The request that the Queen Charlotte City hospital be taken over by the Board was referred to the Executive, with power.

#### Revision of Hospital Constitution-

It was agreed that certain changes in and amendments to the Constitution under which our Hospital Boards operate be made, so that the Constitution shall now be as follows:

(1) There shall be a Board of Directors for each Mission Hospital, to consist of the Members of the Board of Home Missions from the Conference concerned, the Convener of the Conference Home Mission Committee, the Superintendent of Missions for the area, one of the Secretaries of the Home Mission Board, the Superintendent of each Hospital concerned and six persons nominated by the Conference Home Mission Committee and elected by the Board of Home Missions,—it being understood that the Annual Meeting of the Hospital Board may forward names for nomination to the Conference Committee. In British Columbia there shall be four nominated and, in addition, the Board shall include a representative appointed by the Provincial Secretary and one appointed by the Department of Indian Affairs of the Dominion Government.

- (2) Vacancies on the Board occurring during the year through death or resignation shall be filled by the Board of Home
   Missions or its Executive, except in the case of the representatives of the Provincial and Dominion Governments.
- (3) This Board of Directors shall have complete control of the management of the Hospitals except in matters hereinafter mentioned, and shall be responsible for the financing of the Institution with the assistance of any grant to each Hospital made from time to time by the Board of Home Missions.
- (4) The Board of Home Missions shall give approval before any expenditure is made on capital account exceeding the amount stated in the Annual Estimates.
- (5) There shall be an annual estimate of receipts and expenditures on which the grant, if any, is to be based. This will include an estimate of necessary replacements and necessary capital expenditures. Normal replacements shall be made out of current account, but if this is not possible a special grant shall be requested from the Board.
- (6) Should actual receipts exceed expenditures, the surplus shall not be used for the purchase of equipment in excess of the amount stated in the estimates without consultation with the Board of Home Missions or its Executive.
- (7) All appointments to minor positions shall be made by the Board of Directors, on the nomination of the Medical Superintendent.
- (8) The appointments to major positions—such as Medical Superintendent, Assistant Doctor, Head Nurse and Executive Secretary—shall be made by the Board of Home Missions after consultation with the Medical Superintendent and the Board of Directors.
- (9) The Board of Directors shall report annually to the Presbytery, to the Conference through its Home Mission Committee, and to the Board of Home Missions.
- (10) The Board of Directors shall appoint an Executive to include the Chairman, Medical Superintendent concerned, Superinten-

dent of Missions of the area, and three other members of the Board; said Executive to have such powers as may be delegated to it by the Board of Directors. Three shall constitute a quorum.

(11) The Board of Directors or its Executive shall, if possible, meet at least monthly, scrutinize all accounts, authorize all expenditures, provide the Board of Home Missions with a monthly financial statement and an annual audit by an auditor acceptable to the Board of Home Missions.

# Wrinch Memorial Hospital-

(1) Resignation of Dr. W. E. Austin: Agreed to accept the resignation of Dr. W. E. Austin; the Secretary to send him a letter of appreciation for past services.

(2) Need of Second Doctor: The communication from the Hospital Board advising of the need of a second doctor was referred to the Executive.

(3) Appointment of Superintendent: This matter was referred to the British Columbia Conference Home Mission Committee,—they to make a recommendation to the Executive of the Home Mission Board.

(4) Leave of Absence, Matron: Agreed to grant twelve months' leave of absence to Miss Myrtle MacLeod, R.N., Matron.

(5) Repairs to Heating System: Agreed that the Board of Home Missions secure the services of a heating engineer to inspect the Hospital,—his recommendations to be reported to the Executive.

#### R. W. Large Memorial Hospital-

(1) Furlough for Dr. G. E. Darby: This matter was referred to the Secretaries,—they to report to the Executive which shall have power.

(2) River's Inlet: Agreed to make a grant of \$2,000 for a new hospital.

# George McDougall Hospital-

Salary of Superintendent: Agreed that the remuneration of Dr. Albert Dobson be \$2,500 salary, plus \$1,750 expenses, these amounts to be retroactive to Jan. 1st, 1945.

### Port Simpson Hospital-

....

(1) Re Disposal of Buildings, etc.: Authority was given to the Secretaries to negotiate with the Department of National Health for the disposal of the buildings and equipment for report to the Executive, which shall have power to issue.

(2) Resignation of Matron: Agreed that the resignation of the Matron, Miss Margaret Scott, be accepted; that she be given two months' salary; and that Mrs. Jane Vincent be appointed Matron, as of March 1st, 1946.

## Wm. Edmund Cruise and Wm. Forestt Cruise Memorial Hospital-

(1) Illness of Superintendent: Resolved: That the Board, having learned of the illness of Dr. Waldon, desires to express its high appreciation of his services, refers to the Hospital Board the matter of leave of absence and provision for supply, and extends to Dr. Waldon its hopes for a speedy and complete recovery.

(2) Resignation of Matron: Agreed that the resignation of the Matron, Miss Kerr, be accepted, with regret, and that the Board of Directors of the Hospital be asked to nominate a successor.

#### Refresher Courses for Doctors-

Agreed that Dr. J. E. Whiting, Superintendent of the Bella Coola Hospital, be granted three months' leave of absence, to take a refresher course, and that the general principle of making provision for refresher courses for Doctors be referred to the Commission on Hospital Policy.

#### Resolutions from Doctors, meeting at Prince Rupert-

Agreed that the following resolution, adopted by the Medical Superintendents of our Mission Hospitals in British Columbia, meeting at Prince Rupert, October, 1945, be sent forward to the Department of National Health and to the Commission on Hospital Policy:

# "Whereas:

"In the past our doctors were able to collect from Indians who could afford to pay, and this income was taken from them when the Indians were told by Dr. Scott that they would receive free medical and hospital care, it is felt that the Department has been unjust in making a ruling that doctors appointed on salary after August, 1936, would not be allowed *special* fees;

"Since then further developments have arisen and, especially in connection wih tuberculous patients, treatments requiring special training and skill, such as Collapse Therapy and Phrenic Nerve Operations, are being done; and since this is not work which was anticipated when the present salaries were set;

"We feel that our Doctors are entitled to an increase in salary, this increase to be according to the amount of extra work done."

## Legacy under Will of the Late Hattie E. Whaley-

Re legacy of \$30,000, to be used for the establishment of a Hospital in Northern Ontario,—The Secretaries were authorized to confer with the Department of Health of Ontario and the Red Cross, to discover areas in Northern Ontario where hospital facilities are lacking and where a hospital might be located, which will meet the conditions of the Will of the late Hattie E. Whaley; report to be made to the Commission on Hospital Policy and to the Board in 1947.

(2) Central Winnipeg, Mission: That the appointment of a lay worker for Central Winnipeg Mission be approved; the Home Mission grant to be at the rate for a single man, and the appointee to be subject to approval by the Secretaries and Superintendent.

(3) Brunswick Street Church, Halifax: That we accept, with regret, the resignation of Miss Ruth McLeod, and that the appointment of a successor be referred to the Secretaries and the Superintendent of the area.

# Church of All Nations, Toronto-

That the salary of the late Rev. A. Lappala be continued to Mrs. Lappala to June 30th, 1946.

## Friendship House, London-

That the honorarium of \$25.00 per month to Miss Irene Douglas be continued to June 30th, 1946.

#### Request London United Church Council,

That the request of London United Church Council for a grant of \$400.00 for a Chaplain, who would do special work, and any similar requests from elsewhere, be referred to the Executive for study and action.

## Ukrainian Minister, Dauphin Presbytery-

With regard to the request of the Dauphin Presbytery,—That we agree to the appointment of an ordained Ukranian minister, when available, to work in the southern part of the Presbytery, in conjunction with the various pastoral charges in that area.

#### Survey, Winnipeg Area-

Re recommendation of the Conference Home Mission Committee that a survey be made of certain areas where new housing projects are under way,—

(a) That no action be taken on request that the Board of Home Missions pay the salary of a competent worker to make the required survey; and

(b) That we approve the request that The Woman's Missionary Society provide a worker for certain areas to be surveyed, to work with the Home Mission Committee of the Presbytery and the Presbyterial of the W.M.S.

Re recommendation of Presbytery "that unless an ordained minister with special qualifications for this type of work can be secured as Superintendent, from outside of the Conference, Mrs. F. W. Whitworth be continued as Acting Superintendent,"—

Be It Resolved:

- (1) That Regina Presbytery be urged to take action to secure at least two, preferably three, men who will take an active interest in the work of Settlement House, to be added to the Settlement House Board.
- (2) That, for the present, the arrangement with Mrs. F. W. Whitworth as Acting Superintendent 'be continued, subject to the terms as to three months' notice previously arranged; this, however, to be conditional upon the following:

Inasmuch as the Settlement House work is a joint enterprise of the Home Mission Board and The Woman's Missionary Society, the W.M.S. Worker shall have equal rights in the use of the building without interference for meetings, in which she is the leader, including the use of the kitchen, by herself, for her own Settlement House activities.

While appreciating to the full the services rendered by Mr. Whitworth and the time and energy he has expended so freely in improvement of the building and in connection with Boys' Work, it should be pointed out that it was not contemplated in the appointment of Mrs. Whitworth, that Mr. Whitworth would have anything to do with the direction of the activities. It is felt, therefore, that it would be better in the interests of this co-operative enterprise that Mr. Whitworth should refrain from any participiation in connection with meetings of women, girls and children.

- (3) It is the policy and expectation of the Home Mission Board that in 1947 an ordained minister will be appointed to Settlement House. In the meantime the Settlement House Board should look about for a suitable residence for such minister.
- (4) That copies of this finding should be sent to the Secretary of Regina Presbytery, to the Convener of the Home Mission Committee of the Presbytery, and to the Secretary of the Settlement House Board.

That the request of Rev. E. Csendes for transfer to Ontario be referred to the Secretaries, for conference with the Superintendents of Missions for Northern Saskatchewan and Manitoba. First Church, Vancouver-

Re resolution of the Vancouver Presbytery:

- "(a) That First Church Welfare vacate present building as soon as possible. It is unsanitary and utterly inadequate for the work.
- "(b) That we affirm our belief in the value of this activity as part of the total work of First Church;
- "(c) That we endorse the plan put forward by Dr. Roddan in his letter of March 20th to the Convener; and
- "(d) That we are convinced that the proceeds from sale of various properties in the East end should be applied to the cost of erection of the proposed new building."

### French Work

# Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute-

1. Report of Committee: The Committee, appointed by the Executive to consider the question of the future of Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute, presented the following recommendations:

- "(a) That new facilities be provided for the work of Pointe-aux-Trembles as soon as conditions warrant.
  - "(b) That the Board appoint a Committee to consider the question of a site and to recommend to the Board or its Executive the acquisition of a site if it be found that the present one is unsuitable; the Committee to report to the Board the assets available and in prospect for the completion of the project."

On motion, the Report was adopted and present committee was continued.

2. Re Maintenance: It was agreed that, in view of the increased costs which face Pointe-aux-Trembles French Institute and the increase of grant which has been necessary from \$12,400 in 1945 to \$14,225 in 1946, we request The Woman's Missionary Society to consider sharing in the increased cost by an increase in grant from \$3,500 to \$4,500.

#### Literature-

A grant of \$150.00 was voted for French literature.

#### Chaplaincy Service in Sanitaria

It was agreed that the grant of \$25.00 per month for a Chaplain to the Kentville Sanitarium be continued, and that the whole matter of providing adequate chaplaincy services for the Protestant patients in the T.B. sanitaria in Canada be referred to the Canadian Council of Churches and the Canadian Home Missions Council.

# Report of the Resolutions Committee

Rev. John McKay presented the Report of the Resolutions Committee, which was adopted as follows:

#### Be It Resolved:

Mr. Fred Starkey

1. That this Board place on record its deep sense of appreciation of the services of Rev. John L. Nicol, M.A., Ph.D., D.D., as superintendent of Missions in Northern Saskatchewan.

After a distinguished University career and a position as Assistant Minister in First Presbyterian Church, Edmonton, Dr. Nicol went to Saskatchewan in 1914 to become minister of Knox Church, Swift Current. There followed two other regular pastorates in the Province, with an interval of three years' valuable service under the Provincial Government in Temperance Work.

In 1929, he answered the call of this Board to become Superintendent of Missions for an area of which he had, by this time, extensive knowledge. Northern Saskatchewan was already in the midst of a rapid

For a few years, the Education Department was able development. to announce that a new School District had been opened for every day in the year, and a large part of this growth was in the Northern part Very soon, however, a new situation was created. of the Province. With drought conditions becoming severe in the South, families began to migrate towards the North where moisture conditions were more constant. As dry conditions persisted and became worse, this migration was accelerated, until some forty thousand people had moved into the Northern part of Dr. Nicol's territory, seeking new homes for themselves. This necessarily involved a new responsibility for The United Church of Canada and for this Board, and new heavy duties for Dr. Nicol. In these people and their condition and needs. Dr Nicol always took the keenest interest, and we remember his constant expression of regret that our Church was not able to send in the force of workers which the situation required.

There were two other special features of Home Mission work in Dr. Nicol's area. One of these had to do with Hospitals and the interests of two of these required much care from him. The other was Non-Anglo-Saxon work, since a large proportion of the rural population of Northern Saskatchewan is of such origin. The welfare of these fellow-citizens of ours has always been close to Dr. Nicol's heart, and the Board is much indebted to him for his wise leadership in connection with this branch of our work.

Dr. Nicol has had under his care each summer virtually one-quarter of all the students serving under the Board. In journeyings oft and difficult, Dr. Nicol has madé it his business to visit all the student fields, to meet and advise the young men and women concerned. They have always found him a wise counsellor and friend, and remember him with gratitude and affection.

To one particular development in the religious life of Saskatchewan, Dr. Nicol has given special attention, namely the growth and activity of the so called "sects." Of their beliefs, aims and methods, he has made a special study which will be found very valuable in the days which lie ahead.

At meetings of the Home Mission Board and its Committees, Dr. Nicol has always proven himself a man of wise judgment and his expressed opinions have always commanded respect and confidence. His fellow-Superintendents have found him a real brother, and his deep sympathy and bright, spontaneous humor have endeared him to all connected with the Board.

As he leaves the direct services of the Board, we all rejoice that he has retained such a full measure of strength. We know that he will find many and constant opportunities of service to the Cause and Kingdom of the Christ. It is our hope and prayer that he and his wife may long be spared to each other and for the happiness of their host of friends. 2. That letters of sympathy and prayerful remembrance be sent by the Secretaries to the following who have suffered bereavement since the last meeting of the Executive.

3. That the Board record its appreciation of the gracious manner in which the Acting Secretary of the Board, Dr. Dorey, and his able associate, the Rev. M. C. Macdonald, assumed the very heavy and exacting duties so suddenly thrust upon them by the passing of Dr. R. B. Cochrane. We recount with pleasure the wise division of responsibility for the various departments of the work which they effected, and by which the machinery of administration has functioned so smoothly, and to such good purpose. Most of all we register our admiration of the fine spirit of renunciation which they exercised in attaining co-ordination in and concentration upon their very greatly enlarged task.

4. That the Board express its thanks to the Chairman for the gracious and efficient manner in which he has conducted the business of the Board, and to the Minute Secretary for his valuable services.

#### **Report of Appropriations Committee**

The Report of the Appropriations Committee was presented and adopted as follows:

1. That, on the basis of estimates of contributions from congregations, the following be the scale of salaries for 1946:

Superintendents of Institutions—\$100 more than the scale voted by the Board in 1945.

Women Workers—\$100 more than was voted in 1945, but it is recommended that there be a gradual increase for new appointees from the basic salary of \$1,200 to a maximum of \$1,500.

- 2. Re Special Allowance for Transportation on Fields:
  - (a) That there be a travel allowance for all ministers on aidreceiving charges who find it necessary to operate a car in the performance of their duties.
  - (b) That the basis for 1946 be as follows:

Where the average Sunday drive over the year is up to 25 miles,

Where the drive is over 25 and up to 30 miles,the grant be \$50.Where the drive is over 30 and up to 40 miles,the grant be \$65.Where the drive is over 40 and up to 50 miles,the grant be \$80.Where the drive is over 50 and up to 60 miles,the grant be \$90.Where the drive is over 60 and up to 75 miles,the grant be \$120.Where the drive is over 75 milesthe grant be \$120.

In cases where one or more points are served during the week, the grant to be based on the shortest distance if all points were served on Sunday.

Special fields, with exceptional travel, to be dealt with on their merits. 3. That the following be regarded as *Special Fields*:

- (a) One point rural charges.
- (b) Small rural charges of two appointments in such close proximity that the use of a car is not justified.
- (c) Charges having such a limited number of families and constituency that they could be served by retired ministers or lay supplies.
- (d) A charge which could be eliminated by re-adjustment by Presbytery, and whose appointments could be included in neighbouring charges, without overburdening these charges.
- 4. That Whereas, the General Council directed Presbyteries to visit, as soon as possible, every charge paying a salary of less than \$1,800 with furnished house, to married, ordained ministers, urging that a real effort be made to reach the above amount, which is a commendable objective towards which Presbyteries and Congregations are instructed diligently to strive;

And Whereas, the Board of Home Missions desires to put into effect this commendable minimum as soon as contributions from the pastoral charges to stipend and the amount of money provided by the Church, through the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, make this possible; Be It Resolved:

That the Board of Home Missions again calls attention to the need of this, and that in making this visitation, Presbyteries be urged to bring to the attention of the charge—

- (a) The minimum salary basis set by the General Council in 1926 was \$1,800 for a married ordained minister with a furnished house and this still obtains.
- (b) In the light of changing conditions this minimum is less adequate than it was in 1926.

And that Presbyteries be asked to make adequate arrangements for these visitations immediately and that in the case of aid-receiving charges or those where it is found impossible to reach the above minimum, they be challenged to pay an additional \$100 to the salary for 1946, it being understood:

- (a) That any addition up to \$100 will not be deducted from the grant given to charges on the aid-receiving list.
- (b) That the Executive be requested at the end of 1946 to gather information as to the amounts paid on salary by these charges in 1946, so that, if it be found possible, from the additional amounts paid by the pastoral charges, from any balance available, or from any other source, Married Ordained Ministers may receive, if the funds will permit, \$1,750 with a furnished house.
- (c) That this information be sent to Lay Associations, as well as to Presbyteries.

1

- 5. That the Board notify Presbyteries that all charges below this \$1,650 minimum may apply for grants during 1946 when the requirements with regard to canvass and visitation have been fulfilled.
- 6. Re Special Cost of Living Bonus in Newfoundland and Bermuda: That in view of the fact that the cost of living for ministers and supplies on aid-receiving charges in Newfoundland has risen considerably higher than it has in Canada, a special bonus of \$150 be granted to all married ministers and lay supplies in Newfoundland for 1946, and that, in view of the fact that the cost of living in Bermuda is higher than in Canada, a special cost of living bonus of \$100 be paid to aid-receiving charges in Bermuda having married ordained ministers for 1946.
